The Thirty-fourth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary convened on January 28th, 1931 at 2 o'clock P. M. at the Church of the Incarnation.

The meeting was called to order by Mrs. W. J. Lawther, President and was opened with prayer.

Twenty Branches responded to Roll Call with forty delegates present.

Mrs. Lawther then appointed the nominating committee: Mrs. R. H. Steger, chairman; Mrs. Wilmot Odell and Mrs. W. D. Bratton.

Resolutions committee: Mrs. Allen Birge, Mrs. Wm. Belsterling, and Miss Noble.

Mrs. J. C. Tolman, president of the Provincial Branch of the Auxiliary and member of the executive board of the National gave a most interesting talk using for her subject, "A sample day of a National Board Meeting."

Deaconess Smith of St. Matt. Cathedral told of a plan to provide a retiring fund for Deaconesses when their years of service are over. This fund is being sponsored by our presiding Bishop, and Deaconess Smith asked that it be given careful consideration.

Mrs. J. W. Chenault, of 908 S. Henderson St., Ft. Worth, Texas, spoke on the National Conference that is held each year at Evergreen, Colorado, and asked the ladies that when planning their vacations not to forget this place. Further information may be obtained by seeing Mrs. Chenault after the meeting.

Reports were then heard from Officers of the Diocese.

The President in her report stated that interest in the devotional program had grown in a majority of the branches in the past year, and that all of the branches did some form of missionary work in Parishes, Community and Diocese.

First Vice.-Pres. Mrs J. S. Herring was absent, but a letter was received saying that she was in New Orleans for a funeral of a relative.

Mrs. J. R. Boswell, 2nd Vice-Pres. gave no report.

Mrs. C. R. Hannah, 3rd Vice-Pres. was absent and sent no report.

Mrs. R. H. Steger, corresponding secretary, reported that she had sent out thirty notices of the Auxiliary meeting.

Mrs. L. O. Malcom, Treasurer reported a balance on hand at this time of \$251.75.

Mrs. J. H. Myers, U. T. O. Treasurer was absent but sent in her report. She stated that the offering for the year 1930 was \$2,671.50 this bringing the total up to \$5,786.32. She thanked the Auxiliary for having given her the opportunity to serve as U. T. O. Treasurer for the past five years and wished all success and joy to her successor in this work.

Mrs. H. G. Lucas, Educational Secretary reported that the country to be studied by the Auxiliary for the year 1931 is India, and recommends the book "India on the March" as the most interesting of the books offered. She thanked the ladies for the co-operation given her during her two terms of office, and asked that delegates take home this message to their local organizations: "That we be fundamentally and aggressively missionary."

Mrs. C. E. Roberts of All Saints gave the report for Mrs. Petter, secretary for the Spirit of Missions. She reported 253 subscriptions for the year 1930. Two branches, Hubbard and Forney were 100 per cent subscribed.

Mrs. A. B. Wood, Supply-Box Secretary, reported that our box work for the year totaled \$1457.55. This included boxes sent to Porto Rico, S Dakota, Wisconsin, Nebraska and Washington. She read a letter from Bishop Moore commending the fine work done by the Women of the Diocese in this department. She also read a letter from Mrs. G. K. B. Wade, Supply Secretary for the National, asking that we begin the new year by helping with some of the unassigned appeals. No action was taken on this letter. Mrs. Wood thanked the ladies of the Auxiliary for the co-operation given her during her term of office. Mrs. Lawther paid a tribute to Mrs. Wood's loyal service and asked that a rising vote of thanks be given her.

Mrs. J. H. Vance, Director of the Church Periodical Club, was absent but sent in her report stating that she had written 92 letters during the year and distributed Bibles, testaments, prayer books, hymnals current periodicals, tracts and catechisms, music, pictures, games and other miscellaneous articles to the number of 15,000. She stated that she had spent a total of \$18.25 leaving no balance in the treasury.

Mrs. William Belsterling, Chairman of the corporate gift, reports that the present balance of the fund is \$158.52.

Miss Elnora Rice, Chairman of Provincial Pledge, was absent but sent in a report stating that the amount paid in amounted to \$141.50 for the year 1930.

The meeting adjourned to reconvene at 9 A. M. January 29.

The Second session of the convention opened at 9 o'clock A. M., Jan. 29th, at the Church of the Incarnation with the annual corporate communion. Bishop Moore was the celebrant. The offering at this service for the U. T. O. amounted to \$11.45. The business session opened at 10:30 A. M. Mrs. W. J. Lawther presiding. The Minutes were read and approved.

Mrs. Bone of Sherman moved that the Auxiliary support the plan of the department of religious education in regard to the summer conference. Seconded and carried.

Mrs. J. C. Tolman spoke again to the body, first thanking them for the book just given her then giving a most interesting talk on the advanced program of the church.

Bishop Moore greeted the members of the Auxiliary thanking us for the work of real worth we are doing in the Diocese, and exhorted us that we be diligent in carrying on the Master's work. He also asked that we support our share of the advanced program during the coming year.

Of the 30 active branches

19 studied last year's text (on the Jerusalem Conference), and 15 of these had other programs in addition.

Of the 11 that did not study the text

5 had definite study programs.

3 are branches of three or four members each, and the members read individually Spirit of Missions, Church at Work, Home Department Quarterly (sent by the Diocesan Home Study Chairman), the text-book, etc.

2 no answer, but both have formerly done good educational work.

1 reported no study or programs, but this one has formerly had a monthly study based on the "Spirit of Missions".

24 branches report they have started or have already definitely planned the study of India.

As for the past several years, I made out a booklet of suggested educational programs for the year and sent copies to each branch, together with a letter of further suggestions. In addition I have written 98 letters, 2 telegrams, sent 15 packages of books, distributed 111 leaflets.

Mrs. Tolman, Provincial President, again appointed me Provincial Educational Chairman, but to my great regret I was unable, because of illness, to attend the Provincial Meeting at Little Rock. However, I had the pleasure of attending later the Educational Conference and some of the meetings of the Province of Sewanee.

At this, the close of my five years of service, I wish to thank all for your splendid co-operation and enthusiastic support which have made my work a real joy and privilege.
