MINUTES
OF THE THIRTY-SIXTH ANNUAL MEETING
Dallas Diocesan Branch
OF THE
Woman's Auxiliary
REPORT TO THE
PRESIDING BISHOP AND NATIONAL COUNCIL

The Thirty-sixth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary convened on January 25th, 1933, at 2 o'clock, P. M. at St. John's Church, Corsicana.

The meeting was called to order by Mrs. H. G. Lucas President, who opened the meeting with prayer.

The secretary called the roll and twenty-five branches responded with one hundred delegates and visitors present.

The minutes of the Executive Board Meeting held in Dallas on November 18th, 1932 were read and approved.

Mrs. Lucas announced that the handling of the work of the Auxiliary through committees had been abandoned and that now it has Department Heads that coincide with the names used in the National Council.

The question of the requirements of a new branch of the Auxiliary was brought up and the president stated that only the payment of dues was obligatory, all other pledges being voluntary.

Reports were called for from the officers of the Diocese.

President, Mrs. H. G. Lucas, stated she had no official report but expressed her happiness at being able to be present, and voiced her appreciation for the prayers offered for her recovery from an automobile accident. She stated that in spite of the trying year just past, most branches reported progress and that she was happy to announce a new branch at Cleburne, and that Bonham is back in the Auxiliary this year. She expressed sorrow in the loss by death of the Educational Secretary, Mrs. Ernest May.

The many things taken care of by dues and Discretionary Fund were enumerated and the recommendation of the Board to combine these two pledges into one pledge, as Dues, was accepted.

First Vice-President, Mrs. W. J. Lawther and

Second Vice-President, Mrs. J. S. Herring, reported together in clever verse that their accomplishments this year had been few owing to the efficiency of the president.

Third Vice-President, Mrs. J. R. Boswell, reported her attendance of two district meetings and the Waco Conference.

Recording Secretary, Mrs. Jas. G. Oakley, read the treasurer's report in the absence of the Treasurer, Mrs. J. T. Rountree, who has recently

suffered the loss of her husband and was unable to attend the meeting. A balance of \$258.18 was reported.

The secretary also read the report of the Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. J. E. Moore, stating she had written thirty-two letters during the year.

Mrs. Richard S. Watson was introduced as the new Educational Secretary, who reported that Mrs. W. D. Bratton, who succeeded Mrs. May, and shortly afterward moved from the Diocese, had carried out the year's program as arranged in the year book by Mrs. May. Mrs. Watson recommended studying "Kingdoms of our Lord" through the whole Triennium.

United Thank Offering Custodian, Mrs. B. A. Fowler, reported a total of \$1807.27 collected since the General Convention. She also stated that she had sent out 187 new blue boxes during the year. She especially recommends the use of U. T. O. leaflets at special U. T. O. services.

At this point the Bishop came in and introduced the Reverend Mr. Claude W. Sprouse of Kansas City, who is the provincial representative, of the seventh province, to the National Council. He spoke of what the women's work meant to the Church, of the splendid reports, financial and otherwise, that the women of the church had made. He told in a graphic manner the result in the Mission Fields of the drastic cutting of the budget, saying that it is a cut in dollars, but in reality it is an eliminating of flesh and blood and asked that we think of it in those terms before we cut our own budget for missions.

Upon his departure, the reports of the officers were continued.

Supply Box Secretary, Mrs. W. A. Porter, gave a splendid report of the year's work, stating the value of boxes sent totaled \$797.71. She reported a balance of \$64.28 in bank.

Assistant Supply Box Secretary, Mrs. A. B. Wood was introduced.

Church Periodical Club Director, Mrs. J. F. Rennie, will be asked for report under department of Social Service.

Miss Ilione Baldwin, U. T. O. student worker at C. I. A. and N. T. T. C. at Denton gave a most interesting report of her work, stating there were 115 Episcopalian students in the two colleges. She said that the students went to towns where they were no clergymen and held lay services.

Mrs. Hubbard, wife of the President of C. I. A., spoke on the importance of student work and the far-reaching effect that it has.

Mrs. A. F. Evers, Jr., who is chairman of the Publicity Department, presented the following recommendations from the executive board, which were adopted.

First, the Executive Board recommends that the Diocesan Auxiliary establish a lending library, in Denton, as a memorial to Mrs. May and that \$25.00 be given Miss Baldwin to purchase suitable books, as a nucleus, other books to be added by the branches or individuals in memory of Mrs. May or others.

Second, it was recommended that (\$10.00) ten dollars, be sent the Kuling School in China for books for children of missionaries.

Third, it was recommended that (\$10.00) ten dollars be spent to provide literature for the blind.

Fourth, it was also recommended that a letter of condolence be sent to our Treasurer, Mrs. J. T. Rountree, who recently lost her husband.

Fifth, it was further recommended that the following resolutions on the death of Mrs. Earnest May be adopted:

Whereas, The Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Dallas has suffered the loss of one of its most valued members in the death of Mrs. Earnest May, and,

Whereas, Mrs. May was not only a most valued and beloved member of her Parochial Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in St. Andrew's Parish, Fort Worth, but was also a Diocesan Officer, holding the office of Educational Secretary, and discharging her duties in such a manner as to win the ready response of the various Branches in the Diocese:

Therefore, Be It Resolved, that we, the members of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Dallas, spread upon our minutes this expression of our deep sense of loss and this token of our love for her and our appreciation of the devoted service which she rendered to our Diocese, and through our Diocese, to the General Church.

"Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord: even so saith the Spirit; for they rest in their labours."

Be it further resolved, that a copy of these resolutions be sent to the family of Mrs. May.

The president appointed Mrs. W. J. Lawther, Mrs. C. E. Dinkle, and Mrs. C. M. Harper to serve on the Resolutions Committee.

Mrs. Boswell was named chairman of the nominating committee to select the names of delegates and alternates to be sent to the Provincial meeting in Houston in October.

Mrs. Lucas requested a letter be written to Mrs. W. D. Bratton, former Educational Secretary, who has moved from the Diocese, telling her she is missed at the Council.

DEPARTMENT OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

At this time, Reverend Bertham Smith, chairman of Religious Education in the Diocese, came in and talked briefly on the teachers Institute, the church school work, work among the isolated and adult education. He stated there would be at least two teachers from Headquarters at the Summer Conference.

The meeting adjourned at 5 o'clock P. M. to reconvene at 9 A. M. January 26th.

The second session of the convention opened at 9 o'clock A. M., January 26th at St. John's Church with the annual corporate communion, with Bishop Moore as celebrant. The offering at this service went for the United Thank Offering.

The business session opened at 10 o'clock A. M., with prayer by the president, Mrs. Lucas, who also called attention to the complimentary copies of the Corsicana Daily Sun.

Twenty-five Branches responded to roll call.

The reading of the minutes was dispensed with and the president proceeded with the report of her official acts, stating she had written some

225 letters, sent 51 packages, including Educational year books, attended the meeting of the Bishop's Executive Council in the Spring, and Executive Board meeting in the fall, also attended meetings of Districts No. 2 and 5 and 6.

Greetings were read from the Provincial President, Mrs. Benjamin S. Brown.

Mrs. Lucas presented Reverend R. S. Watson, Secretary of the Young People's work in the Diocese, who talked on the need to develop leaders among the young people. He stated he expected an attendance of 200 at the young people's conference to be held next month in Fort Worth. He urged that a keen interest be shown in the Y. P. F. groups of each parish.

Reverend C. J. Kinsolving was next introduced, who spoke on some results of the student work in the Diocese and announced that a "Student Work Conference" will be held in Fort Worth on February 4th and 5th, the keynote being, "Life Through Christian Relationship."

DEVOTIONAL LIFE

Mrs. Lucas read the report of the devotional chairman, Mrs. J. F. McDonald, who requested to be relieved from her duties this year, owing to ill health. Mrs. Lang was appointed to fill the unexpired term.

Mrs. Lucas announced the "World Day of Prayer" for the first Friday in Lent and asked that all Branches observe this day. She also asked for experiences in observance of "Days of Intercession" and several responded.

DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

The work of the Department of Missions and Church Extension was next taken up. Mrs. J. S. Herring, chairman of the department, gave an interesting report, stating that over \$1200.00 had been given to the quota this year by the Auxiliary of the Diocese. Mrs. McCurrie read the Provincial Pledge report in the absence of Mrs. R. W. Rodgers, chairman.

Mrs. Watson spoke of the Dunlap School for Young People and the Inter-Diocesan Conference.

Mrs. Daup spoke on the work among the isolated and urged the members of the Auxiliary and the Daughters of the King to keep in touch with the isolated in each neighborhood.

Miss Sullenberger gave a most interesting report of her correspondence church school among the isolated children, and told how enthusiastic were its 43 members, who aspire to be vestrymen rather than millionaires.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL SERVICE

Mrs. B. H. Russell, chairman of the Department of Christian Social Service gave a splendid report of her year's work.

Deaconess Crowe of St. Matthew's Home for Children gave a most appealing report of the children in the Home and suggested that a Junior Auxiliary might be started at the Home. She also spoke of several children there not having anyone in the world, who might be "adopted" by some Branch of the Auxiliary.

Mrs. Bevans read the report of All Saint's Hospital, in the absence of the Superintendent, Mrs. Taylor, who was ill. The hospital took, free of charge, a little girl from the "Home" who has chronic heart trouble. The school of nursing had to be closed on account of lack of funds. The hospital charity work has been more than ever this year.

Mrs. Boswell, chairman of nominating committee, presented six names to be voted on, three as delegates, three as alternates, to the Provincial meeting. Mrs. A. F. Evers, Jr., Mrs. R. S. Watson, and Mrs. Allyn Lang were elected delegates, and Mrs. Mitchell Langdon, Mrs. W. W. Daup, and Mrs. C. S. Wagget were elected alternates.

FIELD DEPARTMENT

Rev. L. Valentine Lee, head of the Diocesan Field Department, next addressed the body, telling what the department represented, and asking that we go home and talk and preach missions, as the Diocese needs our help and co-operation, if the quota is to be raised.

Mrs. Langdon, chairman of the Field Department of the Auxiliary made her report. She stated there would be a Missionary speaker sent from New York this spring to speak at the District meetings.

The meeting adjourned at 12:30 o'clock and lunch was served in the Parish House by the ladies of St. John's.

The meeting opened it's afternoon session at 1:30 o'clock, with prayer by the President.

Reports from the District Chairmen were called for and given as follows:

- District No. I, Mrs. R. H. Steger, reported no report.
- District No. II, Mrs. J. W. Chenault, reported 2 meetings.
- District No. III, Mrs. Allen Birge, no report.
- District No. IV, Mrs. W. A. Lang, reported 1 meeting.
- District No. V, Mrs. J. E. Moore, reported 2 meetings.
- District No. VI, Mrs. W. D. Maynard, reported 2 meetings.

PUBLICITY DEPARTMENT

Mrs. Evers, chairman of Publicity Department, stated she had written all branches to publish accounts of all meetings. She also promised the Auxiliary a Diocesan paper this year.

The report of the Church Periodical Club Director was read by the Secretary.

Mrs. Lawther gave some experiences she had had in carrying on the Inter-racial work in the Diocese. Mrs. Evers added an experience of her's, also.

Mrs. Lawther's motion that a committee be appointed to work over the constitution and by-laws was carried. Mrs. Watson was appointed chairman, and asked to present it at next Council.

The president announced that pledges would be due quarterly, as printed in the year book.

Mrs. Bone's motion to take up a collection for Deaconess Crow to use for the children of St. Matthew's Home, was carried and \$15.14 was taken up.

It was recommended that each Auxiliary adopt a child in the Home and the Deaconess would see that the gifts were properly distributed.

The Resolution Committee offered the following resolutions:

Whereas, the Parish of St. Johns, Corsicana, had offered its hospitality in so gracious a manner to the Woman's Auxiliary, Diocese of Dallas, the thanks of the body assembled are tendered to the Reverend H. J. Ellis and Mrs. Ellis, St. John's Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary and members and friends of St. John's Parish and,

Whereas, so delightfully a place of meeting has been provided by the Pastor and members of the Baptist Church;

Be it resolved that we hereby wish to go on record as expressing our deep appreciation for the aforesigned courtesy and kindness;

Be it further resolved that copies of these resolutions be sent to the Parish of St. John's, and the Pastor of the Baptist Church, and be spread on the minutes.

And Whereas, it was necessary for Miss Martha Sullenberger in her work as Church School Correspondent to partly finance the work from her own funds,

Be it resolved that the Diocesan Auxiliary Treasurer be instructed to re-imburse Miss Sullenberger to the amount of \$20.00.

PROVINCIAL PLEDGE REPORT

The Provincial Pledge is the united effort of the women of the Province for some definite objective which is determined at the Provincial Meeting and is for a period of three years.

The women of the Auxiliary of the Province pledged during the years 1930-31-32 to put in a water supply for the Helen Dunlap School at Winslow, Arkansas. This is a school for mountain girls and in the summer time is used for the Annual Provincial Young People's Conference. Our Diocesan Auxiliary also has a share to the extent of \$5.00 (taken from the general fund) to the Young People's Conference. The pledge for the last triennium was completed in full.

At the Provincial Meeting at St. Louis last year the pledge was reduced from \$4,500.00 to \$3,600.00 for the Provincial Auxiliary for the triennium. \$2,400 is to be used to rebuild Indian Chapels in the Dakotas, \$1,200.00 for Y. P. F. delegates to the Summer Conference at Winslow. The pledge from the Diocese of Dallas has been reduced from \$150.00 to \$120.00 a year for the next three years.

Christian Social Service

Your chairman begs to submit the following report and recommendations:

At the beginning of the year we attempted to have a complete survey of Social Service work done and work that could be done in the Diocese, therefore a letter was mailed to every branch asking certain questions and making some recommendations. We received 20 replies. If they meant that they take an active part in the work we are well pleased. We do not consider it cooperative when it is confined to financial contributions, to drives, etc., we have in mind cooperation when one or more serve on some committee or board. We feel that now is the time for our Church to put into practice our teaching that all people are children of our Heavenly Father and therefore it behooves us to take an active part in our present period of readjustment. We recommend to all branches that they try to enter this work. We do not hesitate in saying that we do not recommend cooperation with other churches unless that is the only agency in the community doing relief work. It has been found that some of our neighboring churches enter the work for their own benefit, therefore it is best to cooperate with some civic organization.

We find that ten branches have a Church School Social Service Work. We mailed letters to every branch asking that the Church School make up one or more baskets to be distributed locally either Thanksgiving Day or Christmas Day. Ten branches reported doing so. Our idea was to train the children in charity work. Some reported sending food to St. Matthews' Home. This is good, yet it does not take care of local conditions. We must take care of St. Matthews Home, but also, we must demonstrate to our community that we are interested in others. By taking an interest in the community outside of our own people we win the admiration of the citizens and finally win many to our Church, beside doing a fine piece of missionary work.

We find that there are several county and state institutions in the Diocese, but that no organized work is being done. We do not consider calls at jails and hospitals as organized work. While it is good yet it is not thorough enough. It should be our aim to be officially recognized in all institutions. We suggest that as soon as funds will permit that the Diocese take up this work by, we suggest, have a priest in Dallas and one in Fort Worth, whose sole duty is to work in these institutions as chaplains, and he call for such additional help as may be needed. After Dallas and Fort Worth have worked out the problem then we can look forward to other cities where the Church ought to administer to public institutions.

We regret that the returns indicate that only three branches had a definite social service program. That is something to think about.

While All Saints Hospital and St. Matthews Home are a part of this department we do not include their reports but leave them to turn in their own reports.

In this connection we have a recommendation to offer which we hope will receive some attention and action at this meeting. Both institutions seek the assistance of all parishes and missions within our Diocese. The remark has been made, perhaps justly, perhaps not, that only the cities wherein these institutions are located receive benefit from them. Therefore, we recommend, in the case of All Saints Hospital that some plan or regulation be formulated so that every Parish or Mission that contributes funds to that institution can receive some benefit from the institution if needed.

In the case of St. Matthews Home, we recommend that as soon as funds are available the Home be enlarged and then every Parish or Mission that contributes funds will have the right to send girls to the Home in proportion to their contributions.

We believe that the adoption of the foregoing recommendations will result in larger support to our institutions. To include in this report all the work done would make a lengthy report, therefore we will summarize it as follows:

Nine Parishes doing Christian Social Service work in the Parish.

All Parishes doing Christian Social Service work in the community and the Diocese.

Fifteen have Social Service Committees.

Sixteen are working definitely with other communions. All cooperate with Social Service agencies in the community, Red Cross, Welfare Agencies, United Charities, Community Chest Drives, Unemployment Relief Canvass, Public Health work, Case work, supplies for Negro Schools, Christmas trees, gifts, etc. In some cases a member is the representative of the Church on the governing board of the Welfare Association, in others work is done as called upon.

Thirteen branches have social service discussion groups.

It is impossible to put a value on the work that has been done. Eight branches report a total of \$531.81. In addition to this many baskets have been sent out. Every branch has given both money and clothing. One branch alone reports giving 650 new and used garments, bedding and clothing to seventy families, another reports giving eleven comforts besides food and clothes.

The Daughters of the King is an Order of Women in the Episcopal Church. Members are admitted with a solemn service before the altar, invested with the Cross, and pledged by a vow to prayer and service. The Bible class is the cornerstone of all chapters. The members are found at work in one or more organizations of the Church. They approach persons for baptism, confirmation, attendance at Church services and Church School; welcome strangers at services, visit the sick and shut-ins, hospitals and other institutions; interest themselves in the newly confirmed and many other activities where the personal touch is needed. Where there is no Altar Guild, they care for the altar and prepare for the services. They assist with the Rural and Isolated work, Christian Social Service, make plans for or assist with Days of Prayer, etc.

The Bishop's Chapter is composed of women in rural or missionary districts or city parishes where there is no local chapter of the Order, who are willing to fulfill the duties of the senior chapters. They are under the direction of the Bishop.

The Junior Daughters of the King does not take the place of any other organization. It includes girls from 12 to 16 years of age, and young women from 16 to 25.

Its aim is to train young folks for leadership and for personal service; to give instruction in Churchmanship and Christian living, and to encourage individual and corporate devotions.

The hope is, not so much to increase knowledge, as to create ideals and attitudes. The program aims to supplement the Church School training. At present, the Diocese of Dallas has but one Junior Chapter. Who will be the leaders of tomorrow for the spread of Christ's Kingdom?

The Royal Cross is the official organ of the Order and is a medium for the free exchange of views, and a record of chapter work. The annual reports and convention papers show the life, energy, and success of the respective chapters, and have been found valuable in expounding the principles and work of the Order.

Anyone wishing further information on organization or becoming a member, communicate with the President or any officer.
