MINUTES
THIRTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE
Dallas Diocesan Branch
OF THE
Woman's Auxiliary
TO THE PRESIDING BISHOP AND NATIONAL COUNCIL

The Thirty-Seventh Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary convened on January 31, 1934, at 2 o'clock p. m. at the Church of the Incarnation, Dallas.

The meeting was called to order by the president, Mrs. H. G. Lucas, who gave a beautiful devotional, with a litany and prayers.

Twenty-five branches responded to roll call with one hundred three delegates and visitors present.

The minutes of the Executive Board meeting, held January 30, 1934, were read and approved.

The President's Message was heard at this time, her theme being our Lord's command to "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." She reminded us that if we say that money is a sordid subject, then work and effort is sordid, for that is what money represents. When we give money, we give a part of ourselves; so, if we give to help meet the quota we have put something of ourselves into the gift for others. Our chief objective this year is to pay our obligations to the Diocese and General Church first before we give to special things. She asked that each delegate take the message back that in this diocese of 7,000 communicants we gave so little toward carrying on our Lord's work this year that we averaged only the miserable amount of $\frac{1}{2}c$ per week a communicant. Can we be so poor?

The first speaker of the day was Mrs. Edwin Phillips of Fort Worth. Her subject was "The Church Woman's Part in a Spiritual Recovery." Mrs. Phillips is Texas chairman of Women's Crusade and also does case work for the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce. She gave some vivid accounts of conditions existing in families of the unemployed. She said, "The thing which means most in business is the perspective that my Faith has given me." If we applied the tenets of Christianity to life, what would we have—no greed—no war. We would be doing what our Lord did. "He went about doing good." She spoke of her trip to Washington in the interest of the work of the Women's Crusade. Mrs. Roosevelt was chairman of this convention. Her reaction to seeing the President and realizing the innate courage and strength of the man whose physical lameness seemed so pathetic,

was that his weakness is his greatest strength, and the very sight of him inspired you with renewed vigor and determination to go back home and do everything in your power to help him carry out his program. Let us have a Renaissance—a rebirth—instead of just a Recovery.

Mrs. W. W. Daup was the next speaker and her subject was, "Our Part in the Work of Missions and Church Extension." She pointed out what an important phase of church work this was. She suggested that we devote more time to devotional, encourage friendliness to strangers, use of tracts, pamphlets and pageants. Through the Church School you may also extend the Kingdom. She advocated that we adopt the Big Sister idea among smaller Auxiliaries, visiting them as a body and inviting them, as a body, to meet with the larger ones sometimes. This was presented in the form of a motion by Mrs. Boswell and the motion carried.

The president appointed the nominating committee, naming Mrs. Evers, chairman; Mrs. Leedon, and Mrs. Birge. The Resolutions committee was also appointed at this time, with Mrs. J. H. Allison, chairman; Miss Spiller, Mrs. Brown, and Mrs. Curley assisting.

The recommendation of the Executive Board to use the money left in the treasury of pledges on St. Matthew's Home, as a gift from the Diocese to the Deaconess Retiring Fund in recognition of the services of Deaconess Crow at the Home, was accepted unanimously and the treasurer stated that she had \$83.00 to send.

Miss Bowden, president of the St. Phillip's Junior College for Negro Girls, San Antonio, Texas, was next presented and she made an appeal for help for this school. She stated that it was the only school that the Church has for negroes west of the Mississippi river. It is an enterprise of the National Church and a provincial enterprise and they were anxious that it receive help enough to keep it open.

Mrs. Fitch and Mrs. Edwards both spoke a few moments on St. Matthew's Home and stated that the Home planned to re-open in the late fall. The reasons for its closing were not entirely financial, and, while they were retaining their charter, it would probably open under slightly different regulations.

The meeting adjourned at 4 o'clock p. m., when the ladies were invited to attend the afternoon tea given in their honor by Mrs. Lee at her home in Highland Park, to reconvene at 9 a. m. Feb. 1, 1934.

The second session of the convention opened at 9 o'clock a. m., February 1st, at the Church of the Incarnation with the annual corporate communion, with Bishop Moore as celebrant. The offering at this service was given for General Missions.

The business session opened in the Auxiliary rooms at 10 o'clock with prayer by the president. She announced that Mrs. Violet Greenhill, state chairman of the Division of Child Welfare, who was to have spoken to the convention, was called back to Austin unexpectedly

and expressed regret that we would not hear her.

Several booklets and leaflets that are put out by the Department of Religious Education were displayed. The one on Program Building was especially recommended.

Mrs. R. S. Watson, educational secretary, told of the work at the Summer Conference and of the privilege of those attending of having our national educational secretary, Miss Margaret Marston, as instructor for the course on "Devotional Life" and on "Christ and the Modern World." She also spoke of the work of the Y. P. F. in the Diocese. Rev. R. S. Watson spoke on the Young People's Fellowship, of which he is Diocesan secretary, in a most enthusiastic manner, commending their interest in their particular work. He spoke of the need of a whole time Y. P. F. secretary instead of a part time worker. He asked that the delegates report the need of a Diocesan camp site for the young people, in the hope that someone could donate a suitable site.

On account of Miss Ilione Baldwin's illness, she was not able to be present but sent in her report, which will be printed in the year book, so that everyone will know of the wonderful work she is doing as a Student Worker, under the auspices of the U. T. O., in the colleges in Denton.

The report of the Nominating committee was heard. The ticket presented was the names of the officers now in office, and the committee asked that these same officers be re-elected for the next three years. The ticket was accepted and the officers were re-elected by a unanimous vote. Mrs. Rennie stated that she could not serve again as C. P. C. secretary, so Mrs. L. B. Johnstone was nominated and elected to take her place.

This being the Triennial year, it was necessary to elect the delegates and alternates to go to the General Convention in Atlantic City in October. A list of twelve names each, for alternates and delegates, were placed on the blackboard by the nominating committee, and from them five delegates and five alternates were elected by ballot. The delegates elected were Mrs. H. G. Lucas, Mrs. B. A. Fowler, Mrs. R. S. Watson, Mrs. W. A. Porter, Mrs. Mitchell Langdon. The alternates were Mrs. W. A. Lang, Mrs. W. J. Lawther, Mrs. Jas. G. Oakley, Mrs. J. S. Herring, Mrs. Allen Birge.

Mrs. Watson read the Resolutions on the Constitution and they were accepted.

It was requested that the Woman's Auxiliary be allowed to meet in joint session with the Council Body. This request was granted by the Bishop and the joint session was arranged just after lunch.

The Bishop spoke of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary. He introduced Mrs. H. G. Lucas, who spoke to the council on meeting the quota and the help the women could be to the vestry in putting before the Auxiliary just what was being done with the money given as a Diocesan assessment and to General Missions.

Mrs. Daup then spoke on the success of the Big Brother idea in churches. She told of the possibilities of closer fellowship being developed by larger churches visiting smaller churches in a body and having a joint service with them. The Bishop recommended this plan to the Council and asked that it be tried out wherever possible.

Mrs. Taylor gave her report on All Saints Hospital. It was most interesting, and a detailed report of the hospital's work will be printed in the Council Journal.

Rev. James Kinsolving spoke enthusiastically on the Student Work done in Denton and commended Miss Baldwin for her able leadership in this field.

The reports of the officers were called for by the president.

PRESIDENT—Mrs. H. G. Lucas spoke of Mr. Roderick Jackson's visit to the Diocese and stressed that each branch carry out the plan of having a devotional at all meetings. Her report will be found in the year book and is most interesting.

VICE-PRESIDENT—Mrs. W. J. Lawther gave no report.

VICE-PRESIDENT—Mrs. J. S. Herring gave no report.

VICE-PRESIDENT—Mrs. J. R. Boswell gave items of interest she had done during the year.

RERORDING SECRETARY—Mrs. Jas. G. Oakley gave no report.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY—Mrs. J. E. Moore was absent and her report was read by the secretary.

TREASURER—Mrs. J. T. Rountree reported she had received \$2,440.10 and had a balance of \$238.47 on hand. She stated she had \$83 in pledges for St. Matthew's, which she could send to the Deaconess Retiring Fund, as was recommended by the Board and voted by the delegates to do.

U. T. O. CUSTODIAN—Mrs. B. A. Fowler reported she had sent out 330 blue boxes and 150 leaflets. The offering this year amounted to \$1,220.25.

EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY—Mrs. R. S. Watson reported all branches had reported some form of religious education. She stated that she was disappointed that there had been so few calls for books from the Rachel May Lending Library. A list of the books available will be printed in the year book.

SUPPLY BOX SECRETARY—Mrs. W. A. Porter reported she had sent boxes to Arizona, Kansas, Japan, South Dakota, Wisconsin, Philippine Islands, to the amount of \$685.00. Balance on hand, \$20.32.

C. P. C. SECRETARY—Mrs. J. F. Rennie reported that she had been much encouraged over the work in this department the past year.

The chairmen of the departments were next heard from.

Mrs. W. W. Daup, chairman of Missions and Church Extension, gave an interesting account of her work.

Mrs. B. H. Russell, chairman of Christian Social Service, stated her department had done an unusual amount of work this year, owing to the condition of the country just now.

Mrs. A. F. Evers, chairman of Publicity, reported she had edited five editions of the Diocesan Paper this year, at a cost of about \$23.00.

Mrs. Y. M. Langdon, chairman of the Field Department, reported that the activity of this department had brought about a spirit of fellowship among the parishes. The visit of Rev. Roderick Jackson to the Diocese proved inspirational to each branch he contacted.

Mrs. W. A. Lang, Devotional chairman, reported how the different branches had responded to requests that each pay more attention to the devotional part of their programs.

Reports from the District Chairmen were called for. Each district had held one or two meetings during the year.

Twenty-five Dollars was given to the department of Publicity to continue the publishing of the Diocesan News-sheet.

Mrs. Herring moved that \$100.00 be used for Y. P. F. work in the Diocese if it was needed. This money being a balance on hand that might be used for a special purpose, if desired. The motion carried.

Branch reports were given at this time.

It was requested that the corresponding secretary write notes of sympathy to Mrs. Hennessey, Miss Baldwin, and Mrs. W. C. Van Hook, who are recovering from accidents.

The Resolutions committee offered the following resolutions:

Resolved: That the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Dallas wishes to express our gratitude for that hospitality which we have received in your midst here in the parish of the Incarnation. That hospitality means to us a spirit of sisterhood which reaches a heart kinship of understanding oneness of spirit.

Resolved: That we wish to thank the ladies of this parish for the delicious lunches, the beautiful tea given by Rev. and Mrs. Lee at their lovely home, and the banquet at the University Club; for the fellowship and inspiration of the talks made by our efficient officers, our clergy and our Bishop; for the message brought to us by Mrs. Edwin Phillips and others.

Resolved: That we are grateful for the efficient work done by our officers, who have so kindly assumed the responsibility of carrying on for another term. We pledge to them that we carry home an awakening of soul to the beauty of our work and organization.

At the close of our meeting Bishop Moore spoke to us for a few moments asking that we be forerunners of the Presiding Bishop's Appeal. Catch this vision and live it: God in Heaven, Christ in His Church, His Spirit in the hearts of His People. Trust in God, and fear not. The Bishop then dismissed the meeting with prayer.

There being no further business, the Thirty-seventh Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Dallas adjourned at 4 p. m., February 1, 1934.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

As a whole, this has been a year of encouragement and progress—more and more women are catching the Auxiliary vision of working not only for their own Parish, but also for "the whole program of the whole Church." The Cathedral, Dallas, and St. Luke's, Sherman, have joined the ranks of those parishes who have united the guilds and auxiliary and are meeting once a month in a general inspirational meeting and at other times in groups. In Weatherford, also, the guild and auxiliary are now combined. It is with regret that I have to report that the Hubbard Auxiliary has written they have had to disband, but with them, we hope that it will not be long until they will be able to resume their activities, which have always been so excellent.

In summarizing the branch reports, I rejoice to find that greater attention is being paid to the development and deepening of both the corporate and individual spiritual life.

Naturally, in times such as these, Christian Social Service work in the home community is often of primary importance. However, the report of that, as well as educational, missionary, and other work, will be given by the various officers and heads of departments.

A great deal of Parish work is, as always, done by the Auxiliary women. Visiting, help with the Church School and Y. P. F. work, serving Church suppers, improvements on buildings and grounds, payments on Parish debts and on the Parish quota for the General Church program, are some of the many things done.

The Diocesan Branches have had the privilege of three leaders from outside the Diocese. In the spring our field department chairman arranged in co-operation with the "Speaker's Bureau" of New York and the district chairmen a series of missionary meetings with the Rev. Roderick Jackson, returned missionary from Japan, as speaker.

At Summer Conference, we had the great privilege of having our national educational secretary, Miss Margaret Marston, lead the Auxiliary courses on *Christ and the Modern World* and *Deepening the Spiritual Life*. In order that more women might have the opportunity of hearing and meeting Miss Marston, an "Auxiliary Day" was arranged, at which time more than a hundred women were present. Miss Marston was not only of inestimable help and inspiration to all who heard her, but also most gracious and seemingly untiring in requests for conferences.

On her way home from the Provincial meeting at Houston in October, our Provincial President, Mrs. Benjamin S. Brown of Kansas City, was kind enough to make several visits. The women of Brownwood, Trinity, Fort Worth, and Terrell were her hostesses, and the women of these and nearby towns were delighted to have the chance of knowing Mrs. Brown and hearing her most interesting account of the national board meetings, plans for Quiet Day of Prayer, and other Auxiliary matters.

This "Quiet Day of Prayer" is one of the finest things ever undertaken by the Auxiliary, I think. It was observed throughout the Church. In our Diocese, not only the women had part, but in many cases men and young people and friends of other communions joined. Our thanks are especially due the Daughters of the King for their help and co-operation. And not only in places where there is an active Auxiliary Branch was the day observed, but also by groups and individual women throughout the Diocese.

At the Provincial meeting at Houston we had as delegates Mrs. R. S. Watson of Sherman, Mrs. Dan McCranie of Corsicana, and Mrs. Wm. A. Smith of Texarkana. Your President also attended. I have attended also the Mineral Wells district meeting and a Summer Conference committee meeting at Dallas and visited several Branch meetings. I have written 174 letters, 15 cards, and sent 35 packages of materials and leaflets.

On every side I have had the heartiest co-operation and help—from our Bishop, National officers Diocesan and Branch officers and from individuals. May I take this opportunity to thank each of you for your prayers and loving encouragement throughout these three years and assure you of an appreciation for all you have done that is deeper than I can ever hope to express.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

DIOCESE OF DALLAS, JAN. 1933 TO JAN. 1934

The Department, during the past year, has endeavored to help members of the Diocesan Family to grow in Missionary understanding and to become more conscious of their share in the work of a great National Church. The field of the Department is the whole Kingdom. Its task is to provide ways and means to carry out our Lord's command to Evangelize.

Efforts have been made to extend the Church through the personal religious life of individuals, through parishes and the Diocese as well as the National Church. Isolated members have been cared for by sending them Leaflets, Sermonettes, Seasonal Letters, Churchman's Daily Bible Reading Calendars and instruction in personal religion. Several personal visits have been made. The Chairman has received many delightful letters of appreciation from the recipients, numbering 53. Forty-four young folks have received regular Church instruction through the Corresponding Church School under the very efficient leadership of Miss Martha Sullenberger.

The Department wishes to state that if parishes in the Diocese would adopt the Big Brother idea, much joy and help would be derived. One new branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has been organized in Gainesville.

Attempts have been made to arrange for get-together meetings and services in different stations in the Diocese where there is no Rector. Holy Comforter, Cleburne, and St. John's, Fort Worth, have interchanged services Sunday nights with most happy results.

It has been a privilege for the chairman to have been given opportunities to speak before several Auxiliaries and District Meetings concerning Extension work. Wherever possible, all the Churches in the Diocese were open for the Quiet Day of Prayer, Nov. 11, and the isolated members received letters and Prayer Leaflets appropriate for the day. 125 personal letters have been written by the chairman.

In several parishes the Church School Lenten Offering was given wide publicity through the Committee on Church Extension.

The jail and county farm have been ministered to, regularly; also the Eastern Star Home at Arlington. The committee looks forward to extending this phase of the work throughout the Diocese.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

The most notable event in the field of Religious Education during the past year was the presence at our Summer Conference of Miss Margaret I. Marston, national educational secretary of the Women's Auxiliary. Miss Marston's two courses were very stimulating and interesting, and she was a great inspiration to those who learned to know her.

Preceding the conference, scholarships were offered in part payment of their expenses to a suggested list of outstanding educational leaders from all parts of the Diocese. Unfortunately only two women were able to avail themselves of this opportunity.

The past year marked the beginning of the Woman's Auxiliary Memorial Lending Library in memory of our former educational secretary, Rachel Garza May (Mrs. Ernest May). The library is known as "Rachel May Memorial Library." It is hoped that the library will grow each year through gifts and that greater use will be made of the books now available.

Your secretary attended the meeting of all educational secretaries of the Province at the meeting of the Provincial Synod in Houston in October. Great stress was placed upon the value of planning the entire year's program of study in advance.

STATISTICS

Educational work has been conducted by all branches: 20 studied the courses "China" and "American Indian" (some studied China, some studied American Indian, some studied both). 11 had discussion groups. 20 had program meetings. 4 had Bible classes. 5 had missionary plays or pageants. One had a reading club. One had an exhibit. 6 had libraries or bookshelf.

Sixteen have representatives of *Spirit of Missions*.

23 copies of "Never Failing Light" sold. 10 copies of Guide Book for "Christ and the Modern World" sold. 3 books loaned from Rachel May Memorial Library.

REPORT ON SOCIAL SERVICE WORK

There has been splendid work done in the Diocese during the year. The reports from the different Auxiliaries show that all are doing social service work in the community and in the Diocese.

Sixteen branches have social service committees and seventeen are working with other communions in community service—through federated church societies—“All Church”—Children’s Home—Presbyterian Clinic—Day Nursery and Vacation Bible School.

All groups are co-operating with social service agencies in the community. Some are solicitors and contributors to the “community chests”—others are members and officers on Red Cross and community council boards. Some report doing Red Cross sewing, case work, Christmas boxes for soldiers, Christmas baskets, Christmas pageant at Brownwood. Between five and six hundred colored children were entertained with a Christmas party at Waxahachie. Soup kitchen at Cleburne; free dental clinic for underprivileged children at Texarkana. At Denton work was done with the underprivileged children in conjunction with the Kiwanis Club.

The work at Brownwood was so splendid that Miss Lindley felt it worthy of a writeup in *“Spirit of Missions.”* This small organization of women started a work that got the interest of the whole town—opened the way for a constructive program of “adult education wedded to intelligent social planning.”

I am sorry not to be able to go into detail and show just what each branch has accomplished. Eleven branches had social service discussion groups during the year.

It is impossible to estimate the value of the boxes sent for Diocesan and Social Service. Each branch adopted a child at St. Matthew’s Home. Supplied her with clothing, gifts, etc., and it was done most enthusiastically. It was with deep regret that it was learned that the Home would have to be closed. Boxes of food and clothing were sent to the Home and to All Saints Hospital.

Over 100 tracts on social service work were placed.

REPORT OF FIELD DEPARTMENT

The Field Department of the Woman's Auxiliary, Diocese of Dallas, sponsored one especial project during 1933. Through the courtesy of the Church Mission House, New York City, Mr. Roderick Jackson of Bennettsville, S. C., on leave of absence after five years in the mission field of Japan, spent 10 days in our Diocese last spring, during which time he addressed five district meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary, three meetings of the Young People's Fellowship, two services on Sunday and five additional parish meetings. These meetings were held in Paris, Mineral Wells, Denton, Sherman, Cleburne, Fort Worth, Brownwood, Church of Incarnation, Dallas, and Christ Church, Dallas. As these meetings were either district or inter-parish meetings, almost the entire Diocese was contacted except for the Wichita Falls district. Time, distance and conflicting parish engagements made it impossible for Mr. Jackson to go to Wichita Falls.

The meetings were all exceedingly well attended and intensely interesting. Mr. Jackson's sincerity and interest in his work created much enthusiasm and his talks were both educational and inspirational. We feel deeply indebted to him for his good work in our Diocese and to the National Church for sending him.

The offerings taken at the meetings were for the most part turned over to Mr. Jackson, who in turn sent them directly to Japan to carry on the work of a Summer Camp for Japanese boys.

DEVOTIONAL DEPARTMENT

Thirty-two letters, containing material and information concerning the World Day of Prayer, were sent to the branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in this Diocese.

Information was given to the district, naming a Prayer Partner for each district and requesting that a correspondent be appointed by each district to contact the Prayer Partner for that district.

Each branch was urged to observe the Day of Prayer on November 11th and leaflets on a program, which could be obtained from New York, were sent to them.

All branches reported Corporate Communions, some weekly, some monthly, others only at times of presentation of U. T. O.

Nineteen branches reported Quiet Days or Days of Intercession, twenty-three reported Quiet Hours, six reported Prayer Groups, and eleven reported all day observance of World Day of Prayer. Some included women of other churches in this observance, other branches devoted only an hour or so to this day, but all reported great inspiration derived from it. Twenty branches observed Day of Prayer on

November 11th, either by keeping churches open all day for silent prayer and meditation or shorter services in which all women took part.

Several branches reported more attention paid to devotionals, encouraging private prayers, prayer groups, daily prayer and Bible readings, individual reading, and use of the Church Calendar.

Our hope is that, in the years to come, more attention will be paid to this phase of the activities of the Woman's Auxiliary and that we will grow more and more in our devotional life.

REPORT ON PROVINCIAL PLEDGE

The Provincial Pledge, a comparatively new project, is the united effort of the women of the Province for some definite objective which is determined at the Provincial Meeting and is for a period of three years. At the present, our efforts are centered on the Helen Dunlap School at Winslow, Arkansas, and repairs on Indian Mission Chapels in South Dakota.

The scholarship pledge to the school came in one hundred per cent; but there is still some owing on the Indian Chapels. Four Hundred Dollars provided scholarships to seventeen boys and girls from various Dioceses and missionary districts. Mrs. Campbell, Provincial Pledge Chairman, has sent six hundred dollars for the repairs on Indian chapels and will send one hundred more in a few days. The various Dioceses and missionary districts in the Province are to receive the same amount in scholarships the next three years.

Two recommendations were carried at the Houston meeting:

First, That money for scholarships be in the hands of chairman by April 15th, not later than by May 1st.

Second, No boy or girl under eighteen is to receive a scholarship.

It was said at Winslow last year that the crowd of young people was the best that had ever attended the Summer Conference.

REPORT OF STUDENT WORK IN DENTON

A statement appeared in the Fort Worth paper Sunday, written by a senior student at T. C. U., which is worthy of repetition. "The college student of today," he says, "is more given to thinking upon the subject of religion than was the student of a few years back. He is seeking in religion a solution for the problems that confront his

generation. He is vitally interested in knowing the truth that religion holds for him, and will accept only that religion which is a motivating force permeating every relationship in human society, seeking to reconstruct those relationships on a higher plane." That is the challenge which college workers are confronted with, and which we must meet with a deep and vital presentation of a livable religion.

These same demands for religion we are attempting to meet in Denton. I wish to tell you first of the student group itself. Of the 80 students associated with us by choice or by church membership or preference, 65 are church members representing 11 Dioceses. This year five students have been confirmed, and two more are ready for the Bishop's Spring visit, a number I hope to enlarge before that time. The student group has continued interesting in its four-fold program of Worship, Service, Fellowship and Study; the latter covering a rather significant selection of subjects this year, namely, "The Church's Responsibility in the Modern World," "The Church, Its Services and Symbolisms," "Comparative Religions." Those discussions, together with the worship-study group, the student Bible class and the underclassman discussion group, have stimulated the student's consideration of creative life and religion.

I wish to take this opportunity to thank the several individuals and Woman's Auxiliary groups for their gifts of cookies, jams, etc., sent me for the weekly teas I had at my apartment this year. Over 50 different students were in this Fall on Wednesday afternoons and I served over 80 persons. It has not been only a social relaxation for the students and a pleasurable time, but it has also been an opportunity for me to know them better and to bring many a student into our group, as an informal gathering breaks down the possible reserve shown on other occasions. My other chief means of meeting our students is by calling on them in the afternoon.

In a broader scope of interest the students took part in the Diocesan Students' Council in Fort Worth last January, and Denton was represented in the student division of our Diocesan Summer Conference last June. Too, we co-operated with the Y. M.—Y. W. C. A. Student Conference at Waxahachie. Our contacts with the local student Christian associations in Denton and other Christian agencies have been worth while and the membership of our group has been repeatedly asked to help with C. I. A. worship services on special occasions as well as for the regular meetings. The students held a service in Gainesville last Spring and are hoping to make another deputation there as soon as the repairs on the church are made. Denton contributed \$10.00 toward the Diocesan Student Lenten Offering to be sent to a hospital in Shanghai, China. We are more than grateful to the Church Periodical Club in New York City for sending us some 75 volumes of current religious literature, which is having a remarkable circulation among the students and the W. A. Students in other

colleges are invited and urged to use these books by only paying the postage to and from Denton.

Every student community in the U. S. brings forth a different problem. Our local situation seems to necessitate a parochial emphasis, as over half the church members have no definite connection with a home parish. Denton's mission, being small, affords marvelous opportunities for developing student parochial responsibility. We have continued with our Student Altar Guild for two and a half years and also have supplied the Church School Superintendent, several teachers, and a lay reader. A student-parish dinner was held last Spring and was a success. A new relationship of comradeship was developed, and we are hoping to continue it. The students have assisted the Woman's Auxiliary in a program, a parish dinner and picnic and have had a definite part in parish life through the monthly early Holy Communion service.

The high point of the year's work, in my mind, was a simple Christmas pageant given in the church the Sunday evening before vacation. Members of the Worship Committee wrote the pageant which was directed by the group, having a student organist and choir to assist the students and the Church school youngsters who composed the cast. More than half of the students associated with us did something toward the pageant, and the Parish, Church School and the Student Group co-operated in making it a successful climax for an interesting year's work in St. Barnabas Mission, Denton. I can only hope for as fine a relationship between all student groups and the Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary to be developed in the near future.
