MINUTES
THIRTY-NINTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE
DALLAS DIOCESAN BRANCH
OF THE
WOMAN'S AUXILIARY
TO THE PRESIDING BISHOP AND COUNCIL

The Thirty-ninth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary convened on January 22, at Christ Church, Dallas, meeting in the Service Auditorium of the Dallas Power and Light Building, Oak Cliff.

In the absence of the President, Mrs. Lucas, the meeting was called to order at 2 o'clock by the First Vice-President, Mrs. W. J. Lawther.

Twenty-one branches responded to roll call with one hundred and twenty-five delegates and visitors present.

Mrs. Lawther opened the session with the reading of the day's meditation in the Forward Movement Commission's pamphlet—"Forward Day by Day".

Of necessity, the first business of the afternoon was the appointing of a nominating committee by the Chair, Mrs. Richard Watson, Mrs. Marshall, and Mrs. Allan Birge.

This was followed by the introduction to the Auxiliary of the Diocesan Officers and Heads of the Departments.

The acting President, Mrs. Lawther, then read the report of the beloved President, Mrs. Lucas, absent on account of illness. In her report, which will be printed in full in the Auxiliary Year Book, Mrs. Lucas expressed her great regret at not being able to be present, stressing the pleasure she always experienced in the opportunity offered for renewing old friendships and making new ones. She quoted from a letter written by Mrs. Fitzpatrick, one of the Auxiliary delegates to the Regional Conference held in New Orleans, in which the latter spoke of the great spiritual value of such a conference in the work of building the Kingdom of God.

Mrs. Lucas told of the Diocesan project in Religious Education, the bringing of Miss Mabel Lee Cooper for a month's visit throughout the Diocese last spring, of the great help she had been, and expressed the vain hope that the visit be repeated this year. However, within our own Diocese is one capable of carrying on Miss Cooper's work, Mrs. Richard Watson, who has been made Diocesan Director of Religious Education.

Mrs. Lucas reported two new Auxiliary branches, one at Stephenville and one at Hubbard, and mentioned six other places where the situation seems ripe for the starting of more branches—Gainesville, McKinney, Bonham, Dublin, Sulphur Springs, and Commerce.

She called attention to the definition given in the Resolution by the National Executive Board—"Be it resolved that the Board recognize as church work any form of Church work done as an expression

of a woman's religion", and suggested that a study of the full meaning of this resolution might make an interesting program for a meeting.

Mrs. Lucas closed her report, much to the sorrow and regret of every member of the Auxiliary, by tendering her resignation as Diocesan President, announcing, however, that she is not giving up her membership on the National Board, where she feels that she can still be of service to the Diocese by the broader contacts afforded her there.

The Bishop brought his greetings to the Women of the Diocese, expressing his sadness, not only for Mrs. Lucas' resignation, but for the sickness that made it necessary. He thanked the women of the Auxiliary for their devoted service to the Church and to the Diocese and expressed the hope that their gifts of money meant a deepened devotion, more prayer, greater love and a complete dedication of self to Christ and His Kingdom; that the W. A. is "blazing trails to bring the world to Christ".

The Bishop introduced to the Auxiliary the guest of the Council the Rt. Rev. Robert Spencer, Bishop of West Missouri.

Bishop Spencer reminded us that the patron saint of the Woman's Auxiliary is Mary of Bethany, who discovering our Lord's secret, poured out upon Him her choicest gift, and heard His prophecy—"Wheresoever this Gospel shall be preached throughout the whole world, this also that she hath done, shall be spoken of for a memorial of her."

Fulfilling the example of St. Mary of Bethany, the women of the Auxiliary have sent their gifts of money to the ends of the earth. The Department of Missions could not have functioned without their help, for money is necessary in this world, money counts, money talks. The little Blue Boxes, the United Thank Offering, have literally saved the cause of the Kingdom of God.

Bishop Spencer urged loyalty to the Forward Movement, daily Bible Reading, meditation and prayer. He told how the daily newspaper sometimes called "The Daily Horror", may be made by the Christian, a daily litany of prayer, of inestimable subjective value—for "through such practice will the soul grow".

The Bishop closed his address by congratulating the women on the splendid attendance at the Council.

The report of the recording secretary, Mrs. James G. Oakley, was read and its acceptance moved by Mrs. Hubbard.

Mrs. Oakley also tendered her resignation as secretary of the Auxiliary. Mrs. Marshall moved that we accept with deep regret the resignation of both Mrs. Lucas and Mrs. Oakley and that the secretary be instructed to write to each expressing that regret.

Mrs. Lawther appointed the following to act as the committee on resolution—Mrs. Wendell Mayes, Mrs. J. J. Slaughter, and Miss M. Stewart.

The resignation of Mrs. J. T. Rountree, Diocesan Treasurer, was read and its acceptance moved by Mrs. Marshall, who also moved that a letter of regret be written to Mrs. Rountree by the secretary.

An amendment to the Auxiliary Constitution was turned over to Mrs. W. D. Maynard, Parliamentarian, for her correction in preparation for later action by the Auxiliary.

Mrs. Watson explained the New Orleans Conference, which took place last November, as a three day Regional Conference of the National Staff with delegates from the Province of Sewanee and the Province of the Southwest. Our delegates were Mrs. Somerville and Mrs. Fitzpatrick. The purpose of the Conference was a consideration of world conditions today and the deepening of the spiritual life.

A list of deceased members was prepared to be read at the Corporate Communion in Christ Church at 9:00 A. M.

The secretary read a letter asking for financial help for the Kuling School, China. A motion was made by Mrs. Herring and seconded by Mrs. Donalson that we send financial help to the Kuling School, if we have sufficient funds in the Treasury, the amount being left to the discretion of the Financial Committee.

A number of the Auxiliary women, unable to attend the Thursday session, requested the Chair, that Miss Sumners tell them of St. Agnes School, Kyoto, Japan. Miss sumners gave a vivid and interesting description of St. Agnes' School for girls, located in the very center of Kyoto, across from the Imperial Palace:—of the 600 girls, to which the Board of Missions limits such a school, and of the 125 of them who are Christians, but whose influence is great just the same, beggarizing and dwarfing mere numerical computation, and really carrying Christianity wherever they may go. She stressed the fact, that even without direct teaching, through the give and take of every day living, these girls absorb something of the meaning of the Christian life, and she thanked the Auxiliary for their help in the work.

Miss Sullenberger, leader of Church Correspondence School, read the report of her splendid work with 45 boys and girls on farms, in the oil fields, and small towns of the Diocese. The Course of Study this year has been on the Saints, who "belong to all Christians everywhere."

The lessons are mailed to the pupils, as well as letters on Christmas, Easter, and birthdays. The cost is about \$1.00 per pupil. Since the work has been financed for the past two years chiefly by Miss Sullenberger's mother, a motion was made by Mrs. Smith, St. Andrew's, Ft. Worth, that the secretary of the Auxiliary write her a letter conveying their appreciation and thanks.

The new Diocesan paper, Bulletin 1, published by the Department of Religious Education, was distributed and explained by Mrs. Watson, who asked for contributions and suggestions for the future issues.

The meeting adjourned at 4:30 P. M. to reconvene at 10:00 A. M. January 23, following a Corporate Communion in Christ Church.

The second session of the Auxiliary was called to order at 10:00 A. M. Thursday by Mrs. Lawther, with a prayer for the Forward Movement and one for Deaconess Grace Smith, the anniversary of her setting apart being January 22nd.

The minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Mrs. Lawther read a telegram from Deaconess Crow, conveying her greetings and best wishes to the women of the Auxiliary. Mrs. Herring moved that the secretary write the Deaconess a letter of thanks.

The first speaker of the morning was Miss Gertrude Sumners, who once more and in greater detail described the work being done in St. Agnes' School for Girls, Kyoto, Japan. She painted a vivid and most fascinating picture of the daily life of the school, stressing the fact that St. Agnes is vitally interested in each individual girl, which is not true of the government schools in Japan, and the girls themselves respond to such interest gratefully and often touchingly. She closed her address with an exhibit of Japanese costumes, one of which had been presented to her by her pupils at St. Agnes.

Mrs. J. S. Herring, the second speaker of the morning, represents the women of the Dallas Diocese on the Texas Inter-racial Commission, a movement which had its inception when the negro returned from the World War, with changed ideas and points of view; a movement born in prayer, whose primary purpose is not social equality between whites and blacks, but justice to the negro, his education and social betterment, both at home and at school. The spirit of the Texas Inter-racial Commission is one of Christian brotherhood, for the safest meeting ground between the races is a Christian one—we are all children of God the Father.

The work of the Commission has, of necessity, been very slow and always quietly done.

The people chosen on the Board are carefully investigated as great harm might result in the choice of the wrong sort of person. They must be real Christians, well-balanced, and possess a keen sense of justice. Mrs. Herring told of what has been accomplished in Waxahachie for the negroes and the organization of an Inter-racial Club there.

The Commission has already secured one step toward the accomplishment of a fine piece of work. The State Legislature has appropriated \$200,000.00 for a negro tubercular hospital, which it is hoped will be manned by negro doctors and nurses. There is also the hope of building a home for delinquent negro girls.

A letter to Mrs. Rose from Miss Nancy K. Graves, Secretary of All Saints' Hospital Board, was read to the Auxiliary. It asked that the Council pass a resolution that the Diocese assess each communicant \$1.00 per year to be put into a fund to retire the hospital debt.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:25 A. M. for the Joint Session of the House of Men and the House of Women in Christ Church.

The Bishop introduced Mrs. Violet S. Greenhill, Chairman of the Child Welfare Division of the State Board of Control of Texas, who spoke on the subject of "Needed Social Legislation Affecting Texas Children."

The Child Welfare Division is concerned with the underprivileged

boys and girls, often mistakenly called the "bad" boy and girl. They are really boys and girls with bad habits, largely the fault of home conditions and wrong leadership.

Mrs. Greenhill named some of the State institutions where these underprivileged boys and girls are cared for—The Homes for Dependent Children at Corsicana and at Waco; the Orphanage for Dependent Negro Children at Waco; the two training schools of the State, Gatesville and Gainesville; the Austin State School for the mentally deficient. Pointing out the great expense which these institutions are to Texas, Mrs. Greenhill urged a program of education and prevention, especially advocating a "Children's Code" and pointing out the need of a strong Juvenile Court system in Texas. She outlined the "Mother's Aid Law" as part of the program of prevention, whereby a widow would be enabled, through financial assistance, to support her children in the home, for no institution can give a child what its own mother can. The bill is already prepared but a State Supplementation to counties which may require help in paying Mother's Aid is needed. Such a bill is before the State Appropriations Committee, and Mrs. Greenhill urged us to indicate to our Congressman our interest in the bill, for it means better citizens for Texas in the years which lie ahead. "Christian citizenship," she said, "demands for our boys and girls a chance to stay at home, a sense of security, of being loved, of being wanted. This Mother's Aid will accomplish." At the close of Mrs. Greenhill's address, the Council prayed for guidance, wisdom, and spiritual strength for all members of the Child Welfare Division.

The third session of the Auxiliary was called to order at 1:00 P. M. by the Vice-President, Mrs. Lawther.

Mrs. J. E. Moore, Corresponding Secretary, reported sending out 58 letters during the year, urged prompt answers to letters, and requested that she be notified at once wherever a branch makes a change in officers.

Mrs. Boswell, Third Vice-President, reported that all Guilds at St. Andrews, Ft. Worth, had united in the Auxiliary.

Copies of the report of the United Thank Offering Treasurer, Mrs. B. A. Fowler, were distributed. Her report will be found elsewhere in this year book.

The Educational Secretary, Mrs. Richard Watson, displayed the Lenten Study books, on Latin America, "That Other America" and the guide book, "Understanding Latin America" and a set of four maps to aid in the class work. She announced that the study course for next year will deal with inter-racial problems, especially the negro question. She urged the various branches to give their attention to certain subjects which will be considered by our National Board, such as "The Social Security Act"; "Inter-state Commerce"; "Grants to States for Old Age Pensions"; and "Moving Pictures; Block Moving and Selling."

Mrs. W. A. Porter, the Supply Box Secretary, read a number of letters of thanks from those to whom the Auxiliary sent boxes last

year. A letter from the National Supply Secretary contained a list of unfilled assignments for boxes and the question Mrs. Porter brought before us was, "Shall we take on an extra box?" A motion was made and carried that we leave the matter to Mrs. Porter's judgment.

The Church Periodical Secretary, Mrs. L. B. Johnston, described the work of the Club as three-fold,

1. Saving and passing on current magazines and books.
2. Sending directly new magazines, the subscriptions being paid for by the Auxiliary branch.
3. Making cash contributions to the "Library Fund", thus enabling the National C. P. C. secretary to maintain libraries in our various mission schools at home and abroad.

Mrs. Johnston enumerated the Auxiliary branches which had done outstanding work during the past year, through their C. P. C. secretaries.

Mrs. Ben H. Russell, chairman of the Social Service Committee, read a report which is printed elsewhere in this issue.

The Publicity Chairman, Mrs. Wendell Mayes, presented her report, which is also printed in this year book.

Mrs. Mitchell Langdon, Field Department Chairman, described last year's education project, the bringing of Miss Cooper to the Diocese and the splendid help she had been to the various Church Schools visited. Her report will be found in this issue also.

Mrs. Wendell Mayes, chairman of the Resolutions Committee, presented the following to the Auxiliary:—

Resolved:

1. That the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Dallas express its great sorrow for the illness of its beloved president, Mrs. H. G. Lucas. Our earnest prayers are asked for her speedy recovery.
2. That even though her illness and necessary resignation have taken her temporarily out of the Diocesan work, her devoted leadership will continue to be an inspiration and a joy to us.
3. That we regret the circumstances which make necessary the resignations of Mrs. Lucas, Mrs. J. G. Oakley, Mrs. J. T. Rountree and Mrs. W. A. Lang, and we hereby express to them our appreciation for their faithful and untiring services.
4. That we extend our thanks to the speakers, the Rt. Rev. Robert N. Spencer, Bishop of West Missouri; Miss Gertrude Sumners of Kyoto, Japan; and Mrs. Violet S. Greenhill of the State Child Welfare Board for the instructive and inspirational messages which they have brought to us.
5. That this group co-operate with our Bishop in his suggested program as outlined in his address.
6. That we recommend that the secretary write Congressman Buchanan, respectfully stating our profound interest in the children of Texas, requesting his thoughtful consideration of such measures and appropriation of such funds for the Social Security Law as may prove to be remedial and alleviating of such problems as affect our children.

7. That we recommend that the secretary write the Governor of Texas asking that if a special session of the legislature is called, he request a consideration of an appropriation for the Division of Child Welfare in order that this Division may receive Federal funds to develop Child Welfare services if and when Federal appropriations are made available.

8. That we thank the Rector, the vestry, the Auxiliary and members of Christ Church Parish for their gracious hospitality which we have received in their midst.

A motion was made and carried that the report be accepted and that the secretary be instructed to cast the unanimous ballot of the Auxiliary.

Miss Taylor read a financial report of All Saints' Hospital which is printed in this journal, and thanked the Parishes and Guilds which had helped All Saints during the past year.

The attention of the women was called to the letter read in a previous session, asking that each communicant of the Church be assessed \$1.00 to retire All Saints' Hospital debt. The action taken by the House of Men on the same matter was quoted, namely, that "they would be glad to lend all their moral support." It was finally determined, moved and carried that each Auxiliary Branch especially stress the needs of All Saints' Hospital as a definite project for the year, and, wherever possible, secure \$1.00 from each member as an additional gift.

The new officers were introduced, Mrs. Langdon taking the chair and addressing the women briefly, telling of her hopes for next year, and expressing her thanks for the honor conferred upon her.

There being no further business, the Thirty-ninth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Dallas adjourned at 3:30 P. M., January 23, 1936.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dear Friends:

It is a real regret that I am sending you this message instead of bringing it in person. I always look forward to our meetings with the greatest of pleasure, not only because of the many splendid talks arranged by our program committee but also because of the opportunity presented for renewing old friendships and acquaintances and making new ones. This informal contact with others who are doing the same things is, I believe, one of the most valuable things and I hope that all will take advantage of making such friendships. The old adage says "The roof is an introduction" but let us go a little further and feel that we are all really sisters in the Church and instead of associating only with those whom we already know, let us talk to the woman who happens to be next to us, or the Clergyman or the Layman even and so gain from the exchange of opinions and experiences.

I should like here to quote from a letter written by Mrs. Fitzpatrick of Paris after her return from the Regional Conference for leadership training in New Orleans. "It would be hard to put in a few words my reaction to the two days of intensive concentration on Prayer, inspirational talks and classes. There was nothing but constant attention at these meetings every minute of the day. No entertainment other than serious where exchange of views were given and you could hear a discussion of some of your local problems and how they were handled by other Parishes. New literature was put into our hands, new courage was given and faith restored in the right to know God and the right to help him. We were impressed with the fact that we were not gathered to make reports or to give records but to discuss our part in God's plan here on earth, to watch and pray—study and pray and build the Kingdom of God within our group; "that if Mrs. Jones and Mrs. Brown can't live together in this manner, neither can Italy and Ethiopia be expected to". You will hear further from Mrs. Fitzpatrick and more about this New Orleans conference later in the sessions.

I am not going to attempt to give my report of the branches in the Diocese because that will be done by the recording secretary. However, there are a few things which I should like to mention. Our chief project for the past year was helping build up the church schools in our own Parishes. To this end we brought Miss Mabel Lee Cooper of the National Department of Religious Education, for a month's visit throughout the Diocese. From every Parish which she visited we received the most enthusiastic reports of the help which she had been able to give in the local situation. There have been many requests for her return visit and I have asked the National Department for her again, but Dr. McGregor said that she was in such demand that he doubted if he could let us have her again soon. However, if you wish, you might pass a resolution and send to him to this effect. However, we have in our own Diocese, one who can most ably carry on the work she started and give us new help. As you know, our own Mrs. Watson has been made Diocesan Director of Religious Education. Get in touch with her and arrange teacher training, classes, etc. In addition to her previous post-graduate work in Religious Education in Columbia University, she spent last summer doing more work and Dr. Case said at the National Executive Board meeting that her work was outstanding, that she contributed more than anyone else in the class in Adult Religious Education. So complimentary indeed, were Dr. Case's remarks, being the only person she spoke of particularly, that I quite swelled with pride to think that I was from the same Diocese.

Many of our branches also had the privilege of hearing Deacon-

ess Crow. I only wish that all of you might have heard her as everyone was most impressed by her account of her work in Nevada, the Home Mission Field.

I have not seen the branch reports but from visits and letters throughout the year, I know that more and more are the women of the Diocese understanding what the Auxiliary really is. That it is simply the women of the Church in **action**; that the Auxiliary has no program but the program of the Church and the program of the Church is only that given by our Lord to extend his Kingdom throughout the world, in every sphere of life and in every land.

We are glad to welcome today two new branches, one at Stephenville and one at Hubbard. There are several places in the Diocese where I hope they might have Auxiliary before long. I shall name these so that those of you here who have friends in any of these towns may help by talking Auxiliary with your friends. These are: Gainesville, McKinney, Bonham, Dublin, Sulphur Springs and Commerce.

Another thing I wish that we might do this year is that every branch make an intensive campaign among the church women of its Parish of Mission to interest them in the Auxiliary. Before doing this you will have to think through for yourselves, what the church work means and may I suggest the definition given in the resolution in the National Executive Board, "Be it resolved that the Board recognize as church work any form of church work done as an expression of a woman's religion." In the October, 1935, number of the News Sheet you will find this resolution in full. A study and full discussion of this question would make an interesting program for a meeting. Certainly the woman who is teaching in the Church school or doing social service work in the community should be recognized as doing church work and we need to tie them up with the Auxiliary for their sake as well as for the Auxiliaries. One way we can do this might be to have them tell of their work at a meeting. The Church school teacher would, I know, welcome this opportunity of contact with the parents, telling them what is being attempted in Religious Education for children. The social worker would also welcome with interest and the social service committee might very definitely put themselves on record as being at the service of the worker and emergency calls and such cases as she could not handle herself. The worker when taking of her church friends on a visit to a client might introduce her as "here is Mrs., a member of my church who would like to help you." This would also help to tie up the church with brotherly work in the minds of the less fortunate.

A way of introducing a visit to a church woman who is not an Auxiliary member might be to consult with the Rector and volunteer to take the next copy of the Forward Movement leaflet to her. This would also help in disabusing the minds of many of the women of the thought that the Auxiliary is only an organization for making money by showing them that the Auxiliary is interested first of all, in the spiritual development of the individual and of the group.

That brings to me another point I wish to emphasize, the very great value of these Forward Movement booklets. I wish that we might induce every one of our members to use these Bible readings daily. Really read them and think about them.

There is one very great need in our Diocese that I hope the Auxiliary may promote sometime; that is a conference center. The Bishop and Mrs. Watson will tell you of this. Though the time, I suppose, is not right for doing anything towards it, I feel that if we keep it in our thoughts, some one may at some time know of some one to give the land for such a center.

I hope you will not think me presumptuous with all the above

suggestions when I tell you the next thing I have to say: That is I herewith tender my resignation as Diocesan President of the Auxiliary but when one has had a thing on her mind as constantly as I have the Auxiliary during the past five or six years, she can not immediately dismiss all thoughts of it or planning for it, even though she is constantly told not to plan or not to think even. It has been a great privilege and pleasure to work with you as your President. I have always found such hearty co-operation. You have always made me so welcome on every side. I am planning, however, to keep in close contact with you for I am not giving up my membership on the National Board so I flatter myself that when anything of special interest or importance comes up at the Board meetings, you will still welcome a visit or a letter from me. The Bishop and I both think that I can be of more service to the Diocese by the broader contacts afforded me as a member of the Board and of course it is an honor that I value most highly.

ANNUAL REPORT CHAIRMAN SOCIAL COMMITTEE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY, DIOCESE OF DALLAS

Jan. 22-3, 1936.

Replies were received from twenty-two of the thirty-one letters sent to the Auxiliary Branches of this Diocese, asking what was considered their outstanding practical work during the past year. Only sixteen of the twenty-two were received in time to be included in the President's report to Miss Lindley.

While a great many followed the suggested course of study outlined in "Christian Citizenship", some did not—part of whom expressed their intention of doing so next year.

To do our best practical work should we not first strive to know just what is meant by "Christian Social Service", what is meant by being "a Friend to those in need?" How we may best co-operate with some of those splendid community and state-wide organizations which are, in fact, tho not using the term "Christian Agencies?" Then we would no be "give-baskets-at-Christmas-and-forget-them-the-rest-of-the-year" minded.

Some splendid practical work has been done by the different Branches. The outstanding work of one group was with the Negro. Another with the Federated Missions—assisting in maintaining a day nursery for from eighty to one hundred children of employed mothers. This nursery is managed by the wife of a former priest of the diocese, now deceased.

In one small town where there is no Parent-Teacher organization, the Auxiliary works with the school children—doing the P. T. A. work themselves.

Being eyes for the blind at the "Light House" is the privilege of one group, while another takes the responsibility (supposedly the year-round) for a family of four—mother, daughter, and two sons. They are going to see that the older son has employment.

Most of the groups are working with local agencies such as Red Cross, Good-Fellows, Child Welfare, United Charities, King's Daughters, Federated Missions, etc.

One Branch has been making a study of the local Negro community—and with the co-operation of the Junior Warden of the parish, have been making a start toward a real study of the problem children of the city and county. The "practical" results would naturally come later.

A letter has been sent with suggestions for the coming year. Two closely associated subjects—"Child Welfare" and "Prevention of Delinquency" (including some practical attempts at co-operation in the after-care of delinquent boys and girls). If these subjects are given earnest, intelligent consideration, there will be no question as to the value of our practical work for the year.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION—1935

During the past year almost all of the Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary have reported some study. The emphasis of the National Woman's Auxiliary for the Triennium has been upon the three phases of Discipleship—Missions in the New Age, Christian Citizenship, and Deepening the Devotional Life. Most of the Branches have tried to incorporate in their program these subjects.

The books used by most of the Auxiliaries have been those published by the Missionary Education Movement for a study of the general subject of Latin America. These books were: "That Other America", by John Mackay and "A Guide to the Study of Latin America", by Dr. Arthur Sherman.

The Woman's Auxiliary of Denison published and mailed to each Branch a splendid year's program on Christian Citizenship. This was followed by several of the Branches. "Forward Day by Day", the devotional booklets published by the Forward Movement Commission, has been used extensively.

The general subject for study for the coming year will be some phase of Inter-racial Relations, probably with a special emphasis on the American Negro. This material will be available during the summer and may be ordered from the Book Store, 281 Fourth Avenue, New York.

FIELD DEPARTMENT

The Field Department has had only one special project of active work this past year. The Auxiliary decided to spend some money toward promoting educational work in the Diocese and we were able to secure Miss Mabel Lee Cooper from the National Council. We felt that we especially wanted some of the smaller parishes in the Diocese to have this privilege and so Miss Cooper spent 10 days with us holding group meetings in about 10 parishes with splendid attendance. I want to thank all these parishes for their wonderful co-operation and interest. We feel that Miss Cooper accomplished some very definite work even tho her time was so limited. Our allotted time was shortened from two weeks to nine days which necessitated many extra letters and phone calls to change our schedule but all the parishes were very accomodating and changed their dates without a great deal of confusion.

Miss Cooper's greatest asset is the wonderful way in which she can give you actual interesting methods of how to really teach and to meet practical experiences of parish and church school life. I heard numbers of reports from the parishes in which she visited and they were all very enthusiastic about Miss Cooper's classes.

A person cannot possibly sit in one of Miss Cooper's classes and not learn something instructive. We have a person right in our own Diocese who is of similar characteristics; she is at present teaching a course in The Teachers' Training School, which is being held at All Saints Church beginning on Jan. 27.—Miss Edith James.

The Field Department had planned one other project for this last Fall but after several conferences it was decided to wait and present our project at the Diocesan Council meeting as a high beginning point and then plan our work from this time. When I tell you that it was our plan to have Miss Gertrude Sumners visit many places in the Diocese you will be filled with regret just as I am that Miss Sumners plans are such that she cannot remain in our Diocese at present but we hope that she will come at some future date. In the meantime, other plans will be arranged for our Spring work.

We did not use as much money as we had planned to spend because of the generous help of the parishes in entertaining Miss Cooper. I want to urge the members of this Auxiliary toward helping to nourish this fine beginning by visits during the year between the various Branches of the Auxiliary.
