Minutes of the Eighth Annual Meeting.

The Eighth Annual Meeting of the Delaware Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in Christ Church, Dover, November 3, 1892, at 10:30 A. M. During the singing of hymn 202 the Bishop of the Diocese entered the church, accompanied by the Bishop of Oregon, the Bishop of Montana and the Bishop of Wyoming and Idaho, the Rev. Lewis Gibson, Rev. Dr. Littell, Rev. J. Holwell Gease, Rev. J. S. Ellis and Rev. K. J. Hammond. The Bishop of the Diocese administered the Holy Communion to a large congregation of devout women. He was assisted by Rev. L. W. Gibson, Rector of Christ Church, Rev. Dr. Littell and Rev. K. J. Hammond. Bishop Coleman spoke a few words of greeting. Addresses were made by Bishops Morris and Talbot. The offertory amounting to \$30.15 was devoted to the work of the Auxiliary. At one o'clock the ladies of the Dover Branch entertained the visiting delegates with the Bishops and Clergy, at luncheon, the house of Miss Bradford being kindly offered for the purpose. The Missionary Bishops gave informal addresses at Miss Bradford's house after luncheon.

At 2:30 o'clock the President called the business meeting to order. Collects were read by the Bishops. In the absence of the Secretary, Mrs. McIlvaine was elected Secretary *pro tem.* The roll-call showed that fifteen parishes were represented, by about sixty-nine officers and delegates; about one hundred were present.

The Minutes of the last Annual Meeting, of the Quarterly Meeting of May 12, 1892, of the Special meeting at Newport, May 18, 1892, and of the last Executive Committee Meeting were read and approved. The yearly report of the Secretary was read, also the reports of the Domestic Directress, the Junior Auxiliary, the Mexican Division, the Girls' Friendly of St. Andrews, the Treasurer of the Mexican Division and the Treasurer of the Auxiliary. Reports from nearly all Parish Branches were read by their Secretaries. The New Castle Branch reported the

retirement from office of its faithful Secretary, Miss N. J. Stockton, on account of feeble health, and of the loss of two members by death, Mrs. Henry Newlove and Mrs. Hannah Dixon.

The President read the following address:

Right Reverend Father in God and dear Friends of the Auxiliary:

It gives me great pleasure to greet you once more as we are assembled for our Eighth Annual Meeting, and to see so many familiar faces, testifying by our presence that we have not grown weary in well doing or given up our places to new laborers. The record of the past year has been a good one. We have made some advances upon the Kingdom of Satan. It was my very pleasant duty to organize a new Branch in the united Parishes of Newport and Stanton, and they have shown by their energy and zeal how much a few faithful women can do, when heartily enlisted in the cause of Missions. At the time of the Diocesan Convention I met with the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Philips, Laurel, and we talked together of the aims and needs of our portion of the Lord's vineyard.

It was an inspiration to see so many of our delegates at the great Triennial Meeting in Baltimore, the celebration of our twenty-first birthday, and I know they have all returned with an earnest desire to enlarge their work and to give themselves more fully to it. Our day opened with the Service of the Holy Communion, at which time 1250 women with joyful and thankful hearts shared in the sacred feast, and brought with them as a token of their love a united offering of \$20 for the Enrolment Fund. Our Diocese sent \$233 in gold, \$28 of the amount being raised by the Junior Auxiliary—as a pledge of their interest in the spread of missions. At the close of the service the whole body of women adjourned to a hall, where the most hospitable preparations had been made by the generosity of the officers and members of the Maryland Branch of the Auxiliary.

It was a day long to be remembered, and my only regret was that every member of the Auxiliary in Delaware could not have shared in the feast of good things, and brought back to their own Diocese a strong determination that in the year to come they will more faithfully and with greater self-denial advance the cause

of Christ in our midst. Verily, "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

Our efficient Secretary has been prostrated by sickness. We hope that she will be able to resume her duties, as we feel that we cannot afford to lose the services of such a valuable assistant. In the meantime Mrs. Janvier has consented to act as Secretary. In closing my brief address I will quote the words addressed to the House of Bishops and House of Deputies convened as a Board of Missions.

"It was an inspired thought to organize for the missionary work the power of Consecration which God has put in womanhood. With a steady growth of twenty-one years the Woman's Auxiliary has now established itself in fifty-one Dioceses and eleven Missionary Jurisdictions. In these years its offerings have amounted to one million dollars.

"The organization ought to have a place in every parish in the land. It has peculiar facilities for the personal solicitation and systematic gathering of Missionary offerings. It is of the utmost value in inspiring women to and sustaining them in a personal consecration to Mission Work." God grant that we may arise to the measure of our privilege and duty in our own Diocese.

The election of officers resulted in the re-election of all who had served during the past year. The old officers were also re-elected for the Junior Auxiliary. The following objects of work for the ensuing year were presented by the President:

1. The Foreign Insurance Fund.
2. The Bishop Lee Scholarship.
3. Clergy House, Cape Henlopen City.
4. Chapel, Cape Henlopen City.
5. St. Barnabas Chapel, Marshallton.
6. United offering toward endowment of Missionary Bishopric of \$50,000 to be raised during the next three years.
7. Furnishing rooms in Bishop Talbot's School, Boise City.
8. Salary of Miss Gueppe, Japan.
9. Systematic offerings of five cents per week for Diocesan Missions.

The Bishop urged the claims of the clergy house and of the

unselfish nature of the deed in building this sea-side home where Diocesan clergy can go for a short rest during the summer heat. Delaware will have the first clergy house in the American Episcopal Church. He also urged that while all good objects should be remembered, Diocesan Missions should never be forgotten.

The Treasurer then received numerous pledges, and annual dues were paid.

The following resolution was offered :

Resolved, That our quarterly meetings be held without speakers other than those belonging to our own Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary. After debate the following substitute was adopted :

Resolved, That the meeting in May, 1893, be held without any speakers from abroad, and that the subject for discussion be "The true Motive of Giving," and that the Vice President for New Castle County be asked to prepare a paper of five or eight minutes in length to open the discussion. It was

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Branch be instructed to notify by letter the Secretaries of the Parish Branches immediately after the May Meeting, the objects we are expected to work for in the ensuing year, so that officers may come to the Annual Meeting prepared to give pledges for their Branches. It was

Resolved, That there be a By-Law added to the Constitution. The Executive Committee of the junior Auxiliary of the Diocese of Delaware shall attend the meetings of the Executive Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary of this Diocese.

Votes of thanks were passed to the Bishops for their inspiring addresses, and to the Ladies of the Dover Branch for their generous hospitality by a rising vote. After prayer by the Bishop the meeting adjourned to meet in St. John's Church, Wilmington, on the 2nd Thursday in October, 1893.

Eighth Annual Report of the Secretary.

Right Reverend Father in God and Women of the Auxiliary:

Since the annual meeting of October, 1891, the Executive Committee have held seven meetings to plan the work of the Auxiliary, and have been present at the January and May meetings, besides holding a special meeting at St. James, Newport. In response to the appeal of the President that each branch should make a donation towards the united offering for the Enrolment Fund, asking for \$100 from the Delaware Branch, she was very thankful to receive \$205. As the Smyrna Branch sent their contribution of \$20 in gold, all the money was changed into the same coin, that our offering should be the very best and purest that could be obtained. The Junior Auxiliary sent \$28, making a total of \$233 as a special offering sent to the General Convention of 1892. We are very much indebted to Mrs. Joseph Swift, through whose earnest and zealous work so large a proportion of the Enrolment Fund has been obtained during the past two years and forwarded to Miss Carter. The Mexican Division sends a very encouraging report, holding many meetings. One especially interesting, when they were addressed by Rev. Mr. Gordon, who never fails to bring out a goodly number of interested workers in the Mexican cause. We regret his health will not permit him to continue in the work so well begun. We were well pleased to have twenty-four delegates present at our General Auxiliary meeting held in Baltimore. If every woman in our Diocese could have been there such an impetus would have been given to our work in the missionary cause, that all would feel the reflex action of increased love and enthusiasm that our work of the coming year would be greatly increased. May it be so.

In reply to a request from Bishop Graves, Nebraska, asking for bedding for his School, contributions of work were sent by seven branches and money from Trinity, St. John's, Immanuel, New Castle, St. Andrew's, \$15.00 cash.

Thanks are due to the Penn. R. R. for the free transportation of two barrels of clothing as far West as they control the freight.

REPORT OF THE MEXICAN DIVISION.

The following extracts from the Annual Report of the Mexican Aid Association, read in Immanuel Church, Highlands, Oct. 15, 1892 are respectfully submitted to this meeting as the "Report of the Mexican Division."

We congratulate Rev. Mr. Gordon, and all friends of Mission work in Mexico on the important event of the past year, *i. e. the unification of all work of the Episcopal Church*, under one superintendent, with the Presiding Bishop as its ecclesiastical head. This makes the work stronger, more harmonious and more extensive, adding five congregations to the 30 already connected with the Mission.

To carry on this extended work more laborers and larger contributions are needed, as a matter of course.

The "Mexican Aid" has in the past year collected funds for the support of clergy and teachers, as well as for Mrs. Hooker's orphanage and other schools. The orphanage is now in a suitable building of its own, with private chapel, and at less expense than when renting a less convenient house.

In pursuance of a resolution passed at the Annual Meeting of 1891, the Secretary prepared a circular letter to the Clergy of

Delaware, with a view to increasing the interest in Mexican Mission work, Bishop Coleman giving his cordial endorsement. In response to this appeal, Rev. H. Ashton Henry has appointed three delegates from Trinity Church; Rev. K. J. Hammond three from Immanuel Church, Highlands; Rev. E. K. Miller three from Stanton and Newport; Rev. C. E. Murray one from St. Andrew's Church, there being two delegates already at work in that parish.

Our Treasurer's report will show \$130 sent for the support of the Theological student on the Bishop Lee Scholarship. This is supported by the Woman's Auxiliary and the Sunday School of St. Andrew's Church. The name of the student at present under instruction is Samuel Martinez.

The faithful band of King's Daughters of St. Thomas' Church, Newark has sent for the orphanage \$15.33, Miss Briscoe's S. S. class \$11.66, and we have had a thank offering from Mrs. John Rhodes of \$10. The Mexican Band of St. Andrew's Sunday School has labored on steadily and perseveringly, and has cleared \$63.63 in the year. The young ladies of this Society will gladly fill orders for fancy or useful articles, and they ask for a helping hand from the Woman's Auxiliary.

We feel that the merits of this Missionary effort for the evangelization of thousands of degraded and idolatrous people on the very borders of this fair land should not be overlooked by the Church at large. In this *almost* Domestic Missionary field, "the harvest truly is great, but the laborers are" as yet "few." .

REPORT OF JUNIOR AUXILIARY FOR 1891 AND 1892.

Since the last Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, branches have been started in both St. Andrew's and Trinity parishes, Wilmington, and Christ Church, Dover, with large numbers of children in attendance. In February was held the 2nd Annual Meeting of the Junior Auxiliary in St. Andrew's Church, Wilmington, at which time the church was well filled with children and was presided over by our own Bishop; a large

number of the Clergy were present. Dr. Langford, the Gen. Sec. addressed the children; reports were read by the different parish branches; an offering of some \$22.00 was made. We all felt we had been greatly helped by the meeting.

The children sent during Advent as their united work a Christmas box to the Rev. Wm. J. Cleveland, Flanderan, S. Dakota, for distribution among the Indians, valued at \$80.00. As their united work at Easter they sent 2 barrels valued at \$75.00 to Bishop Leonard, for the poor of Salt Lake City. The Junior Auxiliary also sent as their United offering toward the Enrollment Fund \$28.00, which was placed upon the altar at the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in Baltimore.

Besides the united work of the Juniors, work has been done in the different parish branches towards Diocesan Missions and work in the respective parishes.

We cannot expect much from the children in the way of actual work, considering that they meet but one hour on Saturday—that only at stated times of the year, but we can increase their interest in Missionary Work by oral instruction, using the "Missionary Clock" and the Instructions sent by the Board of Missions, besides having a copy of the "Young Christian Soldier," and I would advise again every parish branch taking a copy. As the Board of Missions has issued no map for our use, the best we can do is to send to Mr. Eustis, the General Agent of the Burlington Route Chicago, for one of their maps, which will be sent by paying the postage, marking the different Missionary jurisdictions with a pencil and so making the children familiar with them. It was suggested at the meeting in Baltimore that the different branches of the Junior Auxiliary unite in sending \$1,000 to the Rev. Mr. Partridge in China to procure a printing press.

In concluding let me commend this work of the Junior Auxiliary to the sympathy and interest of every one who love the Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity and truth and desires the prosperity of His great Kingdom of Love and Mercy. We need the interest of the whole church, every one whose pleasure it should be to see day by day and year by year, our sons growing up as young plants, our daughters becoming as the polished corners of the

temple in singleness of heart and all works well pleasing to God the Father of us all.
