Minutes of the Tenth Annual Meeting.

The Tenth Annual Meeting of the Delaware Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, was held in St. Thomas Church, Newark, Thursday, October 11th, 1894. Morning Prayer was said by the Bishop of the Diocese assisted by the Rev. Charles E. Murray, at 9.30 o'clock. At 10 o'clock Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop assisted by Rev. Messrs. Murray, Gassner and Bond.

The missionary address was delivered by the Rt. Rev. F. W. Brooke, Bishop of the Missionary Jurisdiction of Oklahoma. He presented an earnest appeal for help for his Jurisdiction, and explained the nature of the work committed to his care.

The Bishop interrupted his remarks to offer "Noonday Prayer for Missions," an office observed throughout the land, at the hour of twelve. The offertory at this service amounted to \$32.01 for the Treasury of the Auxiliary. Following the service, which was attended by a large number of women, luncheon was served in the Parish house to visiting delegates, clergy and members of the parish, by the ladies of St. Thomas Guild.

At 2 o'clock the President called the business meeting to order, the Bishop opening with a service of prayer. Eight officers of the Executive Committee were present. Thirteen parochial branches responded to the roll call, with a representation of 150 women, besides many who were not connected with the Auxiliary. The President addressed the meeting, setting forth the plans for the work of the coming year, encouraging and commanding the work of the women of the Delaware Branch of the Auxiliary, who have always met the demands of the Executive Committee in whatever way was most desired. In the absence of Mrs. Lodge, Mrs. Caleb Churchman was appointed to fill the office of Treasurer pro tem.

The Secretary read the minutes of the May meeting and submitted the annual report, which was followed by the Treasurer's report.

The President appointed Miss Emily Rodney and Miss Comegys a committee to audit the Treasurer's accounts. The report of the Junior Auxiliary was most encouraging, showing an increase in the number of workers and an earnest, active spirit in the work they have so nobly begun. The report of the Mexican Secretary and Treasurer was followed by a verbal report of the work of the Girls' Friendly Society of St. Andrews Church, Wilmington, and several reports of parochial branches.

The election of officers of the Executive Committee resulted as follows: President, Mrs. C. E. McIlvaine; Vice President, Miss Emily Rodney, New Castle county; Miss H. Comegys, Kent county; Mrs. Hiram R. Burton, Sussex county; Directress of Domestic Missions, Mrs. C. E. Murray; Directress of Foreign Missions, Miss Sophie Rodney; Secretary, Miss Frances B. Hurd; Treasurer, Mrs. William C. Lodge; Librarian, Miss Mary Lafferty; President of the Junior Auxiliary, Mrs. George C. Hall, Secretary and Treasurer, Miss Frances Dorr Swift.

It was with great pleasure and gratification the Auxiliary welcomed their ex President, Mrs. Littell, whose eight years' labor for the diocese of Delaware, as well as the mission work through the Woman's Auxiliary, will long be remembered and appreciated. Mrs. Littell made a few remarks, which was followed by the reading of five-minute papers upon the subjects of the pledges for 1894-5.

The Bishop's paper upon The Clergy House, was read by Mrs. Littell. The Bishop asks the help of the Auxiliary to complete this work, which use and benefit would be felt by all the clergy of the Diocese.

Mrs. E. K. Miller read the paper on St. Barnabas Mission, explaining the organization and consequent success of the work of establishing a house of worship in Marshallton.

Mrs. Morse's paper on the Bishop Lee Memorial Scholarship in Mexico, read by Miss Knight, urged the Auxiliary to increase their pledge of \$60 to \$100. The object of the pledge is one that appeals to the Diocese, being a memorial tribute to one whose heart was in the work of christianizing Mexico; who appointed the first missionary, the Rev. W. B. Gordon in charge of the work, whose successor the Rev. Henry Forrester, has been most successful in his efforts.

The history of the United Offering for the Missionary Episcopate was explained in a paper by the Secretary, Miss Hurd. Mrs. Hall's paper on the Systematic Offering for Diocesan Missions, suggested ways and means for a more just distribution in money-giving; that one be more systematic, thereby benefitting all, by the surety of the pledge.

Miss Sophie Rodney read a letter from Miss Goepp, relative to her work, describing the surroundings of her old and new location, sending pictures of her pupils and post. A letter was also read from Miss Mac Rae, missionary to China.

Mrs. McIlvaine's paper on The Foreign Insurance Fund, was read by Miss Warner. The object has been one of the pledges for several years, it insures the lives of missionaries, to benefit the families, who have given up all to go into distant lands to take the gospel to the heathen. It is but a fit recognition the church makes of their sacrifice.

A letter was read from Miss Emery relative to the gift from Delaware to the Mission House, making suggestions as to the form of the gift. The Auxiliary voted to present \$50 to Bishop Brooke for his work in Oklahoma. The Auditing Committee reported the accounts of the Treasurer correct.

The Treasurer then took the pledges for 1894-5. The Foreign Insurance Fund of \$50 was made up. The Bishop Lee Scholarship of \$100 was made up to \$81. Miss Goepp's salary of \$50 was made up to \$45. Several pledges were made for the Clergy House, and St. Barnabas Mission. The annual dues were paid to the Treasurer and orders received for the mite chests for the United Offering. The offertory taken at this meeting was \$17.64.

Mrs. Bird raised a question as to the Auxiliary sending the President to the Missionary Council in Hartford and the Triennial meeting to be held in Minneapolis in 1895. The motion was carried that the money be raised for the expenses to Hartford and that the offerings at the quarterly meetings of January and May shall be devoted to that purpose, and if insufficient, a committee be appointed to wait upon the branches for further contributions. It was decided that the Junior Auxiliary Treasurer shall receive all monies of that branch, transmitting the same to Miss Emery.

Mrs. Bird was asked to repeat, at the January meeting, her paper on "The True Work of the Auxiliary," read at the May meeting in New Castle. It was suggested that persons having old copies of the *Spirit of the Missions* bring them to the January meeting for distribution.

A vote of thanks was passed to Bishop Brooke for his address and presence among us by a rising vote. Thanks were returned to the Rector and women of St. Thomas Church for their generous hospitality. After the singing of a hymn the meeting closed with the benediction pronounced by the Bishop.

The pledges for 1894-5 are the same as last year.

The annual meeting will be held in Old Swedes Church, Wilmington, in October, 1895.

The January meeting will be held in Trinity Church, Wilmington.

Tenth Annual Report of the Secretary.

Right Reverend Father in God and Women of the Auxiliary.

The year ending with October, 1894, completes the tenth year of the Auxiliary of the Diocese of Delaware.

- Last year's report was sent as usual to all the Branches of the Auxiliary and many of them responded with like annual reports of their work. A full set of our Reports is kept by the Secretary. During the year the Executive Committee has held its usual meetings for the transaction of business and further help to the branches in their work. The quarterly meetings have been of much help and interest, keeping the various branches in touch with the general work of other branches in the Diocese, giving strength and encouragement with suggestions of mutual benefit.

At the May meeting held in New Castle, the Auxiliary was called upon to accept the resignation of Mrs. P. B. Lightner, Founder and President of the Junior Auxiliary of Delaware. Resolutions of appreciation and regret were passed and ordered incorporated in the annual report as follows :

Resolved, Expressions of regret that Mrs. Lightner, wife of the Rector of Immanuel Church, New Castle, finds it necessary to send in her resignation to the Woman's Auxiliary, as President of the Junior Branch.

Resolved That they place on record their grateful appreciation of her efforts and labors in our Diocese.

Resolved, That they incorporate this resolution in the Minutes and Annual Report and a copy be sent to Mrs. Lightner.

Mrs. G. C. Hall, of St. John's Church, Wilmington, was appointed to fill the vacancy until the annual election of officers. The Secretary has distributed such leaflets and notices as have been sent to her, also distributed 200 mite chests; for the United offering and would say to any parishes who may desire mite chests, that she will furnish them, upon notification as to the number desired. A Quiet Day for

Women was held during Lent in St. Andrew's Church, Wilmington, conducted by the Rev. J. H. Stone, D. D. We have Branches of the Auxiliary in seventeen parishes, three, however, have taken no part in the work, and should not be counted as active. The Secretary has received reports from 14 parishes showing an enrolled membership of 234 active workers. Doubtless there are many women in the Diocese who are quite as well able to help in the work undertaken by the Auxiliary, as those who are already contributors, and would do so, did they realize that it is a privilege to be permitted to share in this blessed work.

Particular attention is asked for the reports of Secretaries of the various departments of our work, both in this and in our Junior Report, and we trust that they may be read aloud and explained at the parish meetings throughout the Diocese. The Juniors continue to show such a gain under the guidance of their devoted President and Secretary, contributing in boxes and money, \$675.14 of our sum total; that we should surely read their special report with much interest and thankfulness.

In money and boxes the Auxiliary has disbursed to the value of \$933.29. The Mexican Division has sent \$297.00 to Mexico to the Bishop Lee memorial scholarship.

Annual Report of the Corresponding Secretary of the
Mexican Division.

Since the last annual meeting of this body, the work in Mexico has been carried on with energy and faithfulness by the Reverend Henry Forrester, the Superintendent appointed by the Presiding Bishop. During his visit to the United States last Autumn; Mr. Forrester spent two days in Wilmington, and addressed the annual meeting of the Delaware Association in aid of Mexico, on the 14th of October; and also gave us a very interesting sermon on October 15th on the state of the work at that time. All who met him were impressed by his sincerity and candor, and by his earnest desire to be faithful and thorough in all his plans. The Church in this country is most fortunate in having such a superintendent to oversee and conduct its work in our neighboring republic. Mr. Forrester spoke earnestly on the necessity of making the work in Mexico one of education; and since his return to his field of labor, he has established a Divinity school "and a school for boys connected therewith." In the Divinity school there were at that time two scholarships already established, one "The Bishop Lee Memorial Scholarship," supported by the Woman's Auxiliary of Delaware, and the Sunday School of St. Andrews' Church, Wilmington, and the other by the ladies of St. Thomas' Church, New York. Soon after the school was begun a third scholarship was provided for by the Woman's Missionary Association of St. Bartholomew's Church, New York. At the time of Mr. Forrester's visit to Delaware there were five candidates for Holy Orders; and in January, 1894, two of these were ordained *deacons* by Bishop Kendrick, who spoke well of their fitness for admission into the ministry in an article written after his return from Mexico. Mr. Forrester told us that the amount needed for the support of a theological student was \$250. As the two Societies in Delaware supporting the Bishop Lee Scholarship, had only been sending \$120 per annum, it was decided to write to Mrs. Barker, President of the Ladies' Central Committee of New York, and find out the amount given by St. Thomas's Church for its scholarship. Mrs. Barker answered,—"In

reply to your inquiry, St. Thomas's Church has increased the amount given for the support of a theological student per annum, from \$150 to \$250." In closing her letter Mrs. Barker says, "I must add a word of deep appreciation of the work done for Mexico, in Delaware." Our Society felt that we ought to increase our amount to the required sum, and by the help of the Mexican Band of St. Andrew's Church, which contributed \$50, and by some special donations secured by the efforts of our energetic Treasurer, the full amount was finally raised, and sent to New York, for transmission to Mexico. This year, having been a time of financial stress with almost every one, has been felt by the two Societies working for Mexico, in this diocese, and therefore our Treasury has contained less than usual; and having devoted all of our earnings to the scholarship, we were unable to send any help to Mrs. Hooker's Orphanage, or to the General Work as heretofore. The Orphanage continues to do a noble work among the young girls of Mexico, and all the reports from it are very encouraging; \$80 per annum, will support and educate a young girl in this excellent school.
