Minutes

OF THE

Twenty-sixth Annual Meeting.

The 26th Annual Meeting of the Delaware Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in St. Andrew's Church, Wilmington, at ten o'clock, on Thursday, May 26th, 1910.

The Bishop of the Diocese celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by Rev. H. W. Wells and Arch-deacons Hall and Turner.

Addresses were made by the Rev. H. W. Wells, Rector, Rev. Hunter Lewis and Miss Julia Emery. Mr. Lewis told of his work in Masilla Park, New Mexico, and asked for help in building a much needed church.

Miss Emery described her travels among the Missions of China, Japan, the Philippines, and the Hawaiian Islands.

At twelve o'clock Bishop Kinsman offered noonday prayers for Missions. He then spoke of the new Mission at Hartly and of what one woman had accomplished for the people of that community; he said that some of the Leighton Coleman Fund would be used to help build a chapel at Hartly.

Luncheon was served at 12.30 to about 250, including clergy, delegates and guests.

At two o'clock the business meeting was called to order, with Mrs. F. W. Curtis in the chair.

One hundred and fifty representing twenty-two branches, answered to the roll call. The minutes of the October meeting were read and accepted. Reports were heard from the Secretary, Domestic Directress, Foreign Directress, Treasurer of Mexican Division and Treasurer of United Offering.

In the absence of the President of the Juniors, Mrs. F. M. Kirkus gave the report of the Annual Meeting held in Smyrna, on May 22, 1910.

Mrs. Lodge moved that the collection taken at the morning service should be given to Rev. Hunter Lewis, for his work in New Mexico. Carried.

Before taking up new business, Miss Emery, in response to an urgent request, talked about the United Offering.

Pledges were then made for Alfred Lee Mexican Scholarship; Leighton Coleman Memorial Fund for Diocesan Missions; General Missions; Diocesan Missions; Foreign Insurance; Point Hope, Alaska; Rev. Harrington Littell's work in China; Bishop Spalding, Utah; St. Matthew's Mission, and Babies' Hospital.

After discussion as to whether the missionary meeting, under the auspices of the Third Missionary Department, to be held in January, should take the place of the Epiphany Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, a motion was carried "That the subject be referred to the Executive Committee, with power to make necessary arrangements about the Epiphany Meeting."

An invitation from the Middletown Branch for the Autumn Meeting (which this year will be held in November), was accepted.

The thanks of the Auxiliary were extended to the Rector, the Choir, and the ladies of St. Andrew's Church, for their bounteous hospitality.

Mrs. John M. Harvey and Mrs. C. L. Middleton were appointed auditors of the Treasurer's accounts, and Mrs. Henry Higgins and Miss Prettyman of the United Offering Treasurer's accounts.

After benediction by the Bishop, the meeting adjourned.

Report of Secretary.

Two meetings of the Delaware Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary have been held during the past year, the 25th Annual Meeting at Christ Church, Christiana Hundred, in May, and the Missionary Meeting, at Georgetown, in October. The service, held in Trinity Church, Wilmington, on January 13th, was in place of the usual Epiphany Meeting, and \$25 of the offering was given to the treasury of the Woman's Auxiliary. At this

service Bishop Thomas, of Wyoming; Rev. F. L. H. Pott, of China, and Rev. T. J. Garland, were the speakers.

A special meeting of the Executive Committee was held at Bishopstead, on January 21st, to take action on the resignation of Mrs. McIlvaine. A message of loving sympathy was sent to her from the officers and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That the Executive Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions in the Diocese of Delaware, declines to accept the resignation of Mrs. C. L. McIlvaine, as President of the Diocesan Branch.

The Auxiliary wishes for no other President while Mrs. McIlvaine is able to continue in office. At this time the Executive Committee, not only hopes, but for good reason believes, that her disability is only temporary, and that another year will see her restored not only to health, but to her usual activity. If after six months, or a year, it should appear that Mrs. McIlvaine could only remain in office to her own discomfort, and her resignation were again tendered, the Auxiliary would have no choice but to accept it; but with the possibility and prospect of her recovery before them, the Executive Committee respectfully declines to consider it at this time.

The Committee recognizes, however, that it would be unjust and unkind to expect Mrs. McIlvaine to carry the responsibility of the Presidency during the ensuing year, when her one duty is to seek restoration of health and strength. The Committee has, therefore, further

Resolved, That the President of the Auxiliary be, and hereby is, relieved of all responsibility for the management of the Branch until January 1st, 1911, and that her duties be discharged by an Acting-President during 1910.

As it appeared, that because of illness or absence from the State, no one of the Vice-Presidents of the Auxiliary would be able to assume the duties of the President at this time, it was by unanimous vote of the Committee decided to invite Mrs. Frederick William Curtis, of Wilmington, to become Acting-President, until the meeting of the Auxiliary in May. Mrs. Curtis consented to serve.

In the months that have elapsed since that meeting Mrs. McIlvaine has made such good progress towards recovery that we feel sure she will be able to take up the duties of her office in the Autumn.

It is with deep regret, that we have to report the resignation of Mrs. John P. Saulsbury, Secretary-Treasurer of the Babies' Branch; her earnest and faithful work has made the Branch what it is to-day.

Mrs. Bringhurst, Domestic Directress, reports "that all but three branches have had a share in sending missionary boxes, the older and well established ones have worked with added zest, while the work of the younger branches has been most encouraging. Twenty-six boxes have been sent outside the diocese, valued at \$1,320.19, and eight to the Babies' Hospital, value \$145.17. From one branch the best gift of all has been given, the gift of a young life for the Master's service, and Newark is justly proud to claim Miss Helen Cooch, as its own Missionary to the mountain whites of Virginia."

Miss Shearman, Foreign Directress, reports, "Twenty-three letters were written to the various branches asking that representatives be appointed to attend the Normal Mission Study Class, at Bishopstead, which was conducted most delightfully by Miss Kinsman. Representatives attended from St. Peter's, Smyrna; St. Barnabas, Marshallton; Christ Church, Christiana Hundred, and from Immanuel, Trinity, St. John's and St. Andrews, Wilmington, with eleven members.

"The course was on Japan, and the class was in session for six weeks previous to Lent. During Lent classes were conducted in the following parishes: Christ Church, Dover, on Alaska; Trinity, Wilmington, on Domestic Missions, and St. Barnabas, Marshallton, Old Swedes, and St. Andrew's, Wilmington, on Japan."

Two parish branches have been organized during the past year, one at Immanuel Church, Wilmington, in November 1909, with ten members, and the other at St. Mark's, Millsboro, in January, 1910, with fourteen members. We feel that new life

has been infused in the work in Sussex County, due to the splendid meeting at Georgetown, and to the visits made in that part of the diocese, by the President, before and after that meeting.

We appeal for more interest in the Church Periodical Club, a most important and helpful part of our Auxiliary work. We seem to forget that missionaries in different parts of the field are hungering for good literature. Can we not revive the waning interest and help Miss Gibbs to make a better report?

Are we making any effort to raise our Apportionment for General Missions? The majority of our branches make no pledge to help the Board in the way most needed.

With the constant demand for more women in the Mission Field, we must realize the importance of the United Offering for 1910. We are asked that with our united gifts, united prayer for more workers, shall form a real part of this offering.

Junior Auxiliary.

President's Report.

The 20th annual meeting of the Junior Auxiliary of the Diocese of Delaware, was held in St. Peter's Church, Smyrna, Saturday, May 21st, 1910.

It was the first annual meeting of the Juniors ever held outside of the "See-City," but the experiment proved that it would be wise to occasionally hold the annual meetings in various sections of the Diocese, as such meetings would certainly tend to create a deeper interest in the work of the Junior Auxiliary, and might become the means of establishing Junior Branches in parishes where none now exist.

The morning session was held in the parish house. The rector, Rev. Charles Holmead, conducted the opening service, and extended most cordial greetings. He said St. Peter's had looked forward with much pleasure to having the annual meeting in Smyrna, and now that the auspicious day had arrived, they were proud and pleased to have the Juniors of Delaware as honored guests.

The President responded, saying: "The Juniors were very certain the invitation to come to Smyrna was a heart-felt and sincere one, and that they would receive just such a welcome as had been accorded unto them. Three years ago, and again two years ago, similar invitations from Smyrna had been extended, but on both occasions circumstances arose that rendered going there impracticable, but they were here at last, and very glad were they, one and all, to be here."

The reading of the minutes of the last annual meeting was followed by the roll call of parishes.

St. Peter's, Smyrna; St. Anne's, Middletown; and Old Swedes', Trinity and St. John's, Wilmington, were represented.

Pledges for the coming year were assumed, destination of the United Lenten Box decided, and nominations of officers made, subject to confirmation by the Woman's Auxiliary.

The remainder of the morning was devoted to hearing reports of Branch Secretaries. The reports were full and interesting, showing good work done by all the parishes.

At mid-day, prayers for missions were said by the rector, after which all adjourned to the New Century Club building, where a most delicious and bountiful luncheon was served to delegates and visitors. Exquisite taste was displayed in the floral decorations of the rooms, roses, ferns and sweet peas prevailing.

The afternoon session was held in the church.

The full vested choir was in attendance, and rendered well the spirited missionary hymns.

In the absence of the Bishop of Delaware, due to illness, the Archdeacon of Dover presided. He read a letter from Bishop Kinsman to "The Juniors," containing loving greetings, and regrets that he could not meet with them.

Archdeacon Turner gave a fine address on "Missions," and then introduced Rev. Wm. Meares, rector of Delaware City. Wm. Meares was for many years a missionary in the mountain district of North Carolina. He graphically pictured the truly pathetic conditions that confront all missionary workers in that and other mountain districts of the Southland. He told of the work being done there, and also of the work *waiting to be done*, simply for the lack of *men and money*.

By request Rev. Wm. Donaghay, of Middletown, read the following *abbreviated reports* taken from those submitted by the Branch Secretaries at the morning session. They are given space in this report for the benefit of the many Juniors, who cannot get to the annual meetings and, therefore, do not know what other Branches outside their own are doing.

ST. ANNE'S—Middletown.

The Juniors hold their meetings every Saturday afternoon,

at three o'clock. The rector opens the services with prayer, creed and hymns, and instructs the members in Mission study.

A box of groceries was sent to the Babies' Hospital at Thanksgiving. In December was given the annual bazaar, netting \$80.00.

The work during Lent was sent to the Babies' Hospital, so instead of sending clothing in the "United Lenten Box," money was sent to Archdeacon Neve, to place a child in school at one of his Missions.

St. Anne's Juniors are also contributing to the much-needed addition to St. Anne's Parish House.

They also met all their pledges.

ST. PETER'S—Smyrna.

The Juniors of St. Peter's held weekly meetings. They met all their pledges, and in addition to work done for "United Lenten Box," aided some worthy poor of their own town.

OLD SWEDE'S—Wilmington.

Regular meetings were held every Thursday evening, from 7.30 to 9 o'clock. Beginning October 14th, with an attendance of fourteen, the auxiliary increased until seventy-one were enrolled. Rev. Mr. Clay, Vicar of the parish, gave frequent Mission talks. The Diocesan President, Mrs. Hall, gave talks on Alaska and the mountain districts of the South. February 3d, the Auxiliary gave a musicale in the parish house, proceeds amounting to \$25.00. The Lenten work went to the "United Lenten Box," sent to Archdeacon Neve. A small box was also sent to the Babies' Hospital. All pledges to Missions were met.

CALVARY—Wilmington.

The Juniors, of Calvary, meet Sunday afternoons. Mission talks are given by the Rector. They generally sew for the "United Lenten Box" during Lent, but this year were not able to do so. Their offerings, entirely in money, were devoted to meeting their pledges.

TRINITY—Wilmington.

Trinity Branch opened with twelve members, and twelve to fifteen was the average attendance. During Advent they sent a box to a clergyman in Tennessee; some articles were for the clergyman's little daughter, and she wrote them a very interesting letter, containing thanks for each gift. During Lent, the work was for the United Lenten box, sent to Archdeacon Neve. Mrs. Tallman gave many interesting mission study talks on Japan and work among the Indians. The Diocesan President visited the Branch several times and gave interesting talks. The Juniors gave a beautiful Japanese tea and musicale with several selections from "The Mikado," also a pretty fan drill. More than "Three Little Maids From School" wore the pretty Japanese costume with flowers in their hair, and used to advantage the pretty Japanese fans they carried. The parish house was decorated with artificial flowers, suggestive of "The Sunrise Kingdom." The whole made a lovely picture. The net proceeds were \$48.00. Trinity met all her pledges, and with the assistance of St. John's Branch, embroidered a communion set of linen for a mission church in the Diocese.

ST. JOHN'S—Wilmington.

St. John's Branch began their work by giving a Hallowe'en Party, which netted them \$50.00.

The parish house was very artistically decorated in autumn leaves, corn-husk and Jack-lanterns. The various booths, while in harmony with the general color scheme, orange and black, with a dash of crimson, were individual in decoration, as was each presiding genius. During Advent and Lent, the Juniors worked for the Babies' Hospital and for the United Lenten Box for Archdeacon Neve, and contributed some embroidered linen for a mission church, suggested by Bishop Kinsman. Mission study formed part of the winter's program. The Diocesan President gave talks on Japan, Alaska, and work among the mountain districts of Virginia.

St. John's closed their meetings May 5th, with a charming musicale and reception, from which \$20.00 was realized. At

each entertainment only a nominal admission was charged. The main object being, not so many dollars and cents, but rather to interest more persons in the cause for which the money was to be expended—the Missions of the Church. All the missionary pledges were met.

ST. JAMES'—Stanton.

St. James' Branch, the youngest of all the Junior Branches in the Diocese, was organized in October, 1909. Weekly meetings were held Saturday afternoon at the home of the very efficient leader, Mrs. Truxton Boyce, of Stanton. During the winter they held a bazaar, from which they realized sufficient to give to Missions nearly \$25.00, and still have a small balance in the treasury with which to begin work next fall. Archdeacon Turner listened attentively to the reports of the Branches, and when finished congratulated the Juniors upon the good work done by them. He added he was going to have a Junior Auxiliary in his own parish. When he does, we know it will be a good one.

Thus ended the annual meeting. Our only regret was the absence of our good Bishop, and still more the cause of his absence.
