

Minutes OF THE Twenty-seventh Annual Meeting.

The 27th Annual Meeting of the Delaware Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held on May 18th, in St. Thomas' Church, Newark. Rev. H. B. Phelps, rector, celebrated the Holy Communion at 7.30 A. M.

At half after ten o'clock there was a celebration of the Holy Communion, with an address by the Bishop of the Diocese. Before this service Deaconess Stewart of Hankow, China, gave a most interesting talk about her work among women and children, and immediately after the service, Miss Fisher spoke most earnestly of the great opportunities within the reach of every woman, to help in the good work of the Church Periodical Club.

After noonday prayers for Missions, luncheon was served to about 160 guests.

At two o'clock the business meeting was called to order by the Bishop, who conducted the annual election.

All the old officers were elected, and Mrs. McIlvaine took the chair. 130 answered to the roll call, representing 21 branches. The minutes of the November meeting were read and accepted.

The Treasurer reported a balance in hand of \$67.35, of this sum \$9.00 was appropriated to make up the pledge for the Foreign Insurance, and \$21.00 for the deficit in the Mexican Scholarship. \$15.00 was voted to Bishop Brooke of Okla. Mrs. Frederick Bringhurst and Mrs. S. L. Baxter were appointed auditors of the Treasurer's books.

A motion was carried to give the offering taken at the morning service to Deaconess Stewart for her work.

The annual reports were presented by the Secretary; Domestic Directress; Foreign Directress; the Mexican Division; Treasurer of the United Offering, and the Babies' Branch.

The Bishop made an appeal for St. Martin's Mission at Hartley, and St. Matthew's mission for colored people in Wilmington.

Pledges were taken for the coming year, for The Alfred Lee Mexican Scholarship; Leighton Coleman Memorial Fund for Diocesan Missions; General Missions; Diocesan Missions; Foreign Insurance; work in Alaska; Rev. Harrington Littell's work in China; St. Matthew's Mission, and Babies' Hospital. Delegates were urged to do their part towards the Mexican Scholarship as the revenue for this from other sources has been cut down. A motion was carried that the Diocesan Branch pledge \$100.00 annually to the Scholarship.

A greeting from Mrs. Finley, President of the Easton Branch was read. She urged the sending of delegates, from the Delaware Branch to the Woman's Auxiliary Conference to be held at Ocean City, Maryland, in June.

Miss Emery's letter concerning the condensing of the Annual report of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, was read, and the subject discussed. Hereafter only boxes sent in response to letters received through the Church Missions House will be counted in the Annual Report to the Board.

Invitations were received from Smyrna for the Fall meeting; and from St. John's, Wilmington, for the next Annual meeting, both of which were accepted.

The thanks of the Auxiliary were extended to the members of St. Thomas' Parish for their gracious hospitality. In addition to the luncheon they entertained in their homes the members of the Executive Committee, and the Presidents of twelve parish branches who held a conference in Newark the previous evening.

After the business meeting Deaconess Stewart again talked about her work in China.

Adjourned to meet at Smyrna October 12th 1911.

Report of Secretary

The Annual Meeting of the Delaware Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary for 1910 was held in St. Andrew's Church, Wilmington, Thursday, May 26th.

The Autumn Meeting was held in St. Anne's Church, Middletown, on Thursday, November 10th, 1910.

The Bishop of the Diocese celebrated the Holy Communion and made an address. There was a large attendance and the meeting was made specially attractive by Rev. Mr. Betticher's illustrated lecture on Alaska. The Executive Committee met at Middletown on the previous evening, and were entertained over night by members of the branch.

A minute on the death of Miss Annie E. Hunter was adopted.

The Epiphany meeting was omitted, as a Missionary Service under the auspices of the Third Missionary Department, was held in Trinity Church, Wilmington, on February 21st. The attendance was very discouraging.

Twice during the year has Holy Trinity, (Old Swedes) been used by the Auxiliary for special services.

On Saturday October 1st at the celebration of the Holy Communion, our Triennial United Offering was presented. The amount \$1,923.00, being \$200.00 in excess of the last offering. It was a beautiful and impressive service.

On Wednesday March 22d the church women of the diocese were given the privilege and the blessing of a Quiet Day, conducted by Bishop Kinsman. The members of Old Swedes' Branch provided a simple luncheon, so that those who wished could remain all day.

Mrs. Frederick Bringhurst's resignation at the November meeting was most reluctantly accepted. Mrs. W. D. Bradford was appointed to fill the vacancy, and the Executive Committee feel that Mrs. Bringhurst could not have a more earnest successor than the one upon whose shoulders her mantle has fallen. She

has had many misgivings about the box work for the year, fearing that her inexperience would be felt; her report however shows an increase of about \$100.00. Twenty-one branches have sent boxes, with a total value of \$1,566.62. Seven of these were sent to the Babies' Hospital, value, \$116.84.

Four members of the Delaware Branch attended the Triennial Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary at Cincinnati, your Secretary having the honor and privilege of carrying the United Offering from Delaware. She gave her "Impressions of the Triennial" at the meeting held at Middletown.

With the hope of arousing new interest in the Church Periodical Club, Miss A. W. Fisher, correspondent for the Pennsylvania Branch has kindly consented to speak on that subject at the annual meeting.

Miss Anne Dale Gibbs, correspondent for the Delaware Branch reports for the past year: "Periodicals sent regularly each week and month, 61; Boxes of Literature, 5; Easter Cards, 15; several families supplied with reading matter, who were unable to secure it from other sources. Special mention should be made of Miss Palmer, of St. Andrew's, Wilmington; Mrs. George Dawson, of Dover, and Miss Lindley, of Middletown, for their earnest work in behalf of the C. P. C."

Report of the Foreign Directress.

1910-1911

There have been only five missionary study classes in the twenty-five branches of the Woman's Auxiliary during the past year. Only two of these were true study classes, and were in St. James, Stanton, and in Christ Church, Dover.

One class at St. John's, Wilmington, was rather a lecture class, with talks on Alaska, Japan, India, and on the Oberammergau Passion Play, given by Miss Kinsman, Mrs. Hall, and by Mrs. Beacom.

Two others were reading circles, one at St. Anne's, Middletown, led by Mrs. Bradford, and one at St. Andrew's, Wilmington, led by Mrs. McIlvaine and Mrs. Shearman. They read together that delightfully written book by Mrs. Montgomery, "Western Women in Eastern Lands."

The Middletown class was well attended by from ten to thirty women at different sessions.

The class at St. James', Marshallton, was conducted by a member of the Woman's Auxiliary for eight or ten members of the Girls' Friendly Society, and met Friday evenings during Lent to study missionary work in Mexico, Alaska, and for the Indians and the Negroes.

The class at Christ Church, Dover, led by Mrs. Boyce, began very auspiciously with the course on Japan, but owing to the illness of the leader had to be given up after a few meetings. We earnestly hope that next year the Dover class will be a great success.

There ought to be a missionary study class in every branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese, and I think the time has come when we should send some one to one of the Summer Conferences for special training in mission study work. Without this special inspiration and preparation our missionary study work will never be what your Executive Committee believe it

ought to be, and I earnestly recommend that definite plans be made at this annual meeting to send a representative to attend the missionary summer school at Silver Bay, on Lake George, at Cambridge, or at Ocean City.

One gain, I believe has been made in this work as a result of the stress laid upon intercessory prayer in Miss Kinsman's normal class last year.

At St. Andrew's, Wilmington, during Lent, at the weekly meeting of the Auxiliary to sew for missionary box, work was laid aside at noon and the rector or some visiting clergyman read prayers for missions, and it was felt to be a very real and vital part of the Auxiliary Lenten work. I wish that this might become a habit in every one of our parish branches, for as Mr. Robert Speer has said, "Deeper than the need for men; deeper far than the need for money; aye, deep down at the bottom of our spiritless life is the need for the forgotten secret of prevailing, world-wide prayer."

Let us each one realize that this is true and try to make intercessory prayer a vital part of her own life and of the work of her own branch of the Auxiliary.

United Offering Report

The year since we last met in council has brought to the United Offering its greatest triumph. Our many trifling discouragements were turned to joy, when, on that beautiful Autumn day at dear Old Swedes, we consecrated our in-gathering with prayers and praise to God and listened to a fine address by our bishop.

At the last meeting we had only 683.01, and a little more than three months later sent \$1925 to be placed upon the golden Alms-basin at the Triennial Meeting at Cincinnati.

Our efforts were certainly crowned with success, and your treasurer shed many tears of joy over the final accomplishment, and too with perhaps a feeble regret that we had not made just a little more effort for the \$75 that would have made an even \$2,000.

Let me take this opportunity to thank each treasurer for her hearty cooperation that made this step forward possible, to swell this splendid offering of our church women for Missionary Workers.

Now to make a summary of the past work may help us to get in line for the next three years.

We have 25 contributing parishes, of these 17 increased their former contributions, and 8 of our important parishes fell behind.

Three new parishes not before represented--Immanuel and St. Matthew's, Wilmington, and St. Mark's, Millsboro made generous offerings, and only two small parishes made no report during the three years.

A glance over this Summary will show that we have not at all reached our possibilities, and each wise treasurer should now find where she stands and renew her efforts to enlist her parish women in this work, that will certainly bring the contributor more joy in its awakening her love for her fellow men than the satisfaction

she feels over the few pennies dropped daily or weekly in the little blue box.

Would it not help in your systematic effort to keep a list of your women in the parish, and the percentage that contribute each year?

It would be a great satisfaction at least to your treasurer to know just how many women in our diocese do contribute and whether it is increasing or diminishing.

Let your annual in-gathering also be marked by some service of praise and thanksgiving, and to the work of our missionary women.

The United Offering now supports 142 workers. We are depended upon to succor those who need much help, and this is why we must work harder for the United Offering for 1913, and work so faithfully that it shall be larger than ever before.

Remember this is our thank-offering, and add a prayer just as faithfully as you drop your pennies that God may move the faithful to give as generously as He gives beauty in this Summer Season.

Report of Mexican Division.

The report of the Mexican Division this year, consists of some extracts from letters received from Mrs Aves, Bishop Aves and Mr. Silenas, and they will tell us just what we have done, what is needed, and what they hope to do.

Mrs. Aves writes, "You may well be satisfied with the result of your scholarship. Rev. S. Silenas is one of the most useful men the Bishop has. Our own Clergy think the Rev. Efraim will be a bright man. He has been sent to Nashotah House, Wisconsin, for two years to finish his studies. I think a Quiredo boy is on the scholarship now. He is from Jojutla and is a very bright boy.

There are eleven missions under our good Mr. Silenas in the state of Hidalgo. Mrs. Silenas speaks good English. She writes well also. Both are wonderful in what they do for the sick and suffering, working from morning till night. We have had \$1000 sent as the beginning of a hospital. One who has never seen the poverty of these people can hardly imagine what the sight is."

Bishop Aves writes, "However this present manifestation of popular discontent may eventuate, it will effect some ultimate good if it gives the people of the United States a more intelligent and sympathetic appreciation of the great needs from which Mexico is suffering to-day. The native field is as yet undisturbed, but there is a noticeable unrest; if the present strife will only call the attention of the brother in the north that he is his brother's keeper this revolution may not be entirely in vain."

Mr. Silenas writes, "I wish to make a memorial to Bishop Lee. The church of the Transfiguration, perhaps in time my purpose will be satisfied. I have received little gifts to that end. You can invite if you please all the old friends of Bishop Lee. Who of those who knew Bishop Lee and his good work in the Church would refuse his help for a memorial in Mexico? Certainly, perhaps, he is only a name to the present generation, but names like his, are the names which History keeps, and which never die."

President's Report.

The Junior Auxiliary of the Diocese of Delaware, celebrated its "Twenty-first Birthday", in historic Old Swedes, Wilmington, Saturday, May 20th, 1911.

The morning Conference of Officers and delegates was held in the Parish House, at 10 o'clock. Rev. Mr. Clay conducted the opening Service, and cordially welcomed the "Juniors."

Minutes of the Annual Meeting of 1910 which was held in Smyrna were read.

The Roll Call of Parish Branches was answered by delegates from, St. Anne's, Middletown, St. Peter's, Smyrna, St. Thomas', Newark, and Calvary, St. John's, Old Swedes', and Trinity, of Wilmington, and later, reports were submitted by the Branch Secretaries of these Parishes, telling of conduct of meetings, Mission study classes, and ways and means by which their pledges to schools and hospitals were met, and missionary boxes prepared. The reports were most interesting, demonstrating good work

done by all the Branches, and an increased value in the sum total of money and boxes.

The President commended the Juniors, and in this connection paid a tribute, for special work done by them. "The Memorial Tablet" placed in the Day-Nursery and Hospital for Babies, and their Contribution to "The Junior Auxiliary Exhibit," held in Cincinnati, during the Meeting of the General Convention in that City last October. The exhibit of the Delaware Juniors was generally conceded to be the most beautiful and unique of all the "Diocesan Exhibits." Our exhibit consisted of Dolls, artistically dressed in the costume of the various countries where our Church has Mission stations planted. The arrangement of the Dolls, by the Committee in charge of the general Exhibit, was very effective, and had much to do in bringing out the characteristic designs of those who dressed the Dolls with that aim in view. These Dolls were so much admired, that all of them could have been sold in Cincinnati, but they were expressly prepared for Miss Clara J. Neely of Tokyo, Japan, and go there to be used in, or for her work, as she deems best.

The Speakers at the morning session were, Rev. John Rigg of Immanuel, New Castle, who described conditions of the Church in Jamaica, Rev. Albert E. Clay, who told the children about Nashotah Theological Seminary, and Mrs. C. L. McIlvaine, President of the Delaware Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, who gave a most interesting and instructive talk on some Missionaries from Delaware, who had done, and others who are still doing noble work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom. Among those mentioned were the Rev. Lloyd Breck. Dr. John B. Driggs, and his sister Miss Driggs, Miss Bessie Newbold, Rev. Mr. Cooper, the Rev. S. Harrington Littell, and Miss Cooch of Newark, Delaware, a former "Junior", who is doing fine work under Archdeacon Neve, in the Mountain district of Virginia.

Mrs. McIlvaine might have included in the list, her own father, The Rt. Rev. Alfred Lee. When consecrated "The first Bishop of Delaware", he found the Church very weak, and the parishes few in his new Diocese.

Besides working hard and starting a number of Missions, that are now self-supporting Parishes, Bishop Lee, who was an ardent advocate of Foreign Missions, was instrumental in establishing the work in Mexico, that today reflects such honor on the Church in America.

The Bishop Lee Scholarship, in a Theological Seminary in Mexico, is a memorial maintained by the Delaware Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary. The Juniors at the Annual Meeting, in Old Swedes', made a pledge of \$25.00, to be paid annually toward the maintenance of this Scholarship.

They also resolved to raise \$50.00 annually to support a Bible Reader in China, the same Reader to be under the direction of Rev. S. Harrington Littell.

A vested choir of Juniors, led the singing of the grand old missionary hymns.

Two fine missionary addresses were delivered; one by The Bishop of Delaware, the other by The Rev. Hubert W. Wells, Rector of St. Andrew's, Wilmington. Other clergy present were Rev. John Rigg, New Castle; Rev. Mr. Meares, Delaware City; Rev. Percy L. Donaghay, Middletown; Rev. F. W. Arthurs, Smyrna; The Rev. J. Russell Peckham, Rev. Charles Holmead and the Rev. Albert E. Clay of Wilmington.

At 3.30 P. M., the Juniors and their friends proceeded to "The Day-Nursery and Hospital for Babies" where Bishop Kinsman rendered an appropriate and beautiful service, unveiling the

memorial Tablet placed over the mantel in the large Kindergarten Room.

The Tablet from J. E. Caldwell and Co. Phila., Pa., is of bronze. At the top is a reproduction, in relief of the Diocesan Pastoral Staff.

A fac-simile of inscription is printed in this report.

A delightful informal Reception followed the unveiling ceremonies.

Refreshments were served by members of the Junior Branches of Wilmington.

Some of the out of town guests who had never been through "The Day-Nursery and Hospital," since the new building was acquired, took this opportunity of visiting it, and pronounced themselves much pleased; especially attractive was the Kindergarten Room, and the operating room of the Hospital came in for words of commendation for its perfect arrangement and conveniences.
