Minutes

OF THE

Twenty-ninth Annual Meeting

The 29th Annual Meeting of the Delaware Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held at Christ Church, Dover, May 29th, 1913.

At 10.30 A. M. there was a celebration of the Holy Communion by the Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by the Rev. F. J. Clark and the Rev. B. F. Thompson, rector of Christ Church. The attendance was good. We were privileged to listen to a most able and interesting address by the Rev. F. J. Clark, assistant Sec. of Board of Missions, on conditions and needs of the times with special reference to China.

At noon, prayers were offered for Missions.

The business meeting convened in the Parish House and was called to order by the President.

The roll call revealed the number of representatives to be 150 from 19 parishes.

The minutes of the October meeting were read and accepted. In the President's address there was a note of encouragement. She reminded us of what is expected of us and dwelt upon the importance of prayer and the help and inspiration derived from Corporate-Communion.

The pledge system was approved.

Announcement was made that the Diocesan Triennial United Offering Service will be held at St. John's Church, Wilmington, Sept. 29th at 10.30 A. M.

At this juncture word came that luncheon was ready to be served, and a cordial invitation was extended to all to partake of it at the rectory.

At a quarter before two the meeting reassembled refreshed for the business of the afternoon. Reports were read by the Secretary and the Treasurer. Mrs. S. R. Nones and Mrs. Bessie P. Noonan were appointed to audit the Treasurer's accounts. The annual election of officers was next in order. Bishop Kinsman took the chair at the request of the President and the election resulted as follows: *President*, Mrs. C. L. McIlvaine; *Vice Presidents*, Mrs. W. F. Curtis; Mrs. M. K. D. Eldridge; Mrs. Daniel Short; *Directress for Missionary Box Work*, Mrs. W. D. Bradford; *Educational Secretary*, Miss M. H. Shearman; *Assistant*, Miss Cora Tschudy; *Secretary*, Miss Mary Lafferty; *Assistant*, Mrs. David J. Reinhardt; *Treasurer*, Mrs. Wm. C. Lodge; *Treasurer of The United Offering*, Mrs. F. G. Tallman; *Correspondent of Church Periodical Club*, Miss Anne Dale Gibbs.

The following officers nominated by the Junior Auxiliary were elected. *President*, Mrs. George C. Hall, *Vice Presidents*, Mrs. F. M. Kirkus, Mrs. Julian B. Cochran, Miss Jennie Prettyman; *Secretary and Treasurer*, Miss Lucy J. Jackson. Mrs. Murray Stewart was elected *Secretary of the Babies Branch*. Letters were read from the general Treasurer, Geo. Gordon King and Miss Emery, and the Secretary was instructed to reply to them.

Special pledges were asked for General Missions and the sum of \$242 was raised in response.

Upon motion it was ordered that the offerings of the morning be turned over to the Treasurer of the United Offering.

Reports were presented by the President of the Junior Auxiliary; Directress of Missionary Box Work; Secretary of Mexican Division; Treasurer of Mexican Division; and the Educational Secretary.

A paper read by Mrs. R. B. Rayner telling of the Institute held at Church Missions House, New York City, last October, made us feel that next to going to the Institute one's self it was best to have Mrs. Rayner go for she brought home so much to us.

The following motions were made and carried.

1st. That every parish Branch shall elect or appoint one

delegate and alternate to attend the Annual and Fall Meetings of the Diocesan Branch.

2nd. That a letter of sympathy be sent to the Rev. S. Harrington Littell on the loss of his wife.

There was a rising vote of thanks to the rector and ladies of Christ Church, Dover, for their delightful hospitality.

The Fall meeting of this Branch will be held at Immanuel Church, New Castle, the first Thursday in November. The Annual Meeting in May will be held at St. Paul's Church, Camden.

The meeting then adjourned.

Report of Secretary

The Fall Missionary Meeting, always the formal opening of the year, for the Delaware Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, was held in Trinity Church, Wilmington, on October 10th, 1912.

At 10 o'clock the Bishop of the diocese celebrated the Holy Communion, assisted by Rev. G. C. F. Bratenahl, and the clergy of Trinity parish. A short business meeting was held and after luncheon, addresses were made by the Bishop of Bethlehem, and Rev. Dr. Bratenahl, Secretary of the 3rd Missionary Department.

More than one hundred and fifty delegates were present, and seventeen of the clergy.

A special meeting of the Diocesan Branch was held on Wednesday, November 20th, at 3 o'clock, in Trinity Parish house, Wilmington.

The meeting was arranged to suit the convenience of the Bishop of Mexico, the Rt. Rev. Henry D. Aves, who was anxious to meet those, who for twenty-six years, have supported the

Bishop Lee Memorial Scholarship, and to interest others in the work in Mexico. Bishop Aves told of the distressing effects of the Civil War, and of the needs of the Hooker Orphanage, and the new hospital, just finished and needing equipment. A pledge of \$25.00 was made for the furnishing of a room in the hospital which was sent through the treasurer of the Mexican Division to Bishop Aves.

There was no Epiphany Meeting held this year, owing to the fact that the Secretary of the 3rd Missionary Department had made a tour of the diocese, presenting the subject of Missions in each parish instead of having one big meeting.

A special three hour service for the women of the diocese was given by the Bishop in St. Andrew's Church, Wilmington, on Thursday, March 6th, 1913.

Three meetings of the Executive Committee have been held, two in Wilmington and one at Dover. There has been for some time a strong feeling among the members who attend the Annual meeting, that much valuable time is wasted in the taking of pledges. At the meeting of the Executive Committee held at Bishopstead in October, a committee was appointed to plan some method of taking the pledges for the ensuing year before the Annual Meeting. The double postal card sent to the Secretary of each branch, is the result of this effort, and it is hoped the change will meet the approval of every member.

Report of the Educational Secretary

1912—1913.

In the Mission study work we have yet to attain to our vision, which we have for so long held before us, of having a mission study class in every parish in the Diocese. Your Educational Secretary is tempted to discouragement, but surely the year will soon come when this cherished ideal will be realized.

During the past year classes or reading circles were conducted in eleven parishes, less than half of the twenty-five parishes which have branches of the Woman's Auxiliary. Two of these were mission study classes, and nine were reading circles. In three parishes the Rector gave one or more lectures on the course. The text books used were "Japan Advancing, Whither?" for the Seniors, and the "The Honourable Little Miss Love," for the Juniors.

Is it too much to hope that every one of the nine reading circles will become true mission study classes next year?

The year's work began with the coming of Miss Lydia West, who is a graduate of Mrs. J. Nicholas Mitchell's wonderful normal class in Philadelphia. Miss West came to conduct two of the normal study classes, which had been planned to train leaders for the Lenten parish classes. The plans for the two normal classes for the parishes of Sussex County, at Georgetown and at Laurel were not able to be carried out. But the two classes conducted by Miss West, one at Christ Church, Dover, for Kent Co. and the other at Trinity and at St. Andrew's, Wilmington, for New Castle Co., were not only very delightful, but were considered by all who attended them as most stimulating and helpful.

Only Christ Church, Dover, with about twenty representatives, from Kent County, availed itself of the opportunity of sending representatives to the Kent County class. But seven Parishes in New Castle County sent about twenty representatives to the Wilmington Class.

It is earnestly hoped that every branch will send delegates to the normal class in its own county next year.

Report of Directress for Missionary Box Work.

May 29th, 1913.

In making this my third report of the Box Work done by our Delaware Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, it may seem at first discouraging as we have not reached the amount of last year's work, either in the number or the value of the boxes, and we had expected to do even better this year than last.

But on examining the report more closely you will see we have done better. Last year 21 parishes sent boxes, this year 22. Last year 10 branches fell behind their work of the previous year, this year only seven. In the case of one, Millsboro, the loss is more apparent than real, as owing to the force of circumstances, it was impossible for the members to do much box work, they more than made it up in their cash offerings.

Trinity parish, Clayton, also makes a good showing. Beginning three years ago with a mail package to Alaska valued at \$5.00, this year they have sent a box valued at \$22.00. Trinity must be a good name, as Trinity, Wilmington leads us with box work, valued at \$240.00 and a gain of \$51.90. St. Thomas, Newark, is a close second with a gain of \$49.50.

St. Anne's, Middletown, has the distinction of being the only parish in the diocese, that sent a personal box to a clergyman's family this year. I hope she will not enjoy that distinction long. Last year we sent six personal boxes, valued at \$815.54 and I hope the stronger parishes will see their way clear to take personal boxes in the coming year.

We have made good progress, let us all resolve that with God's help we will work harder, and learn more of the blessedness of giving this year than ever before and pass the \$2,000 mark. We can if we will.

The past year, for the United Offering, has been the most prosperous in its history; at no time has there been such a prompt response to the request for annual or semi-annual contributions, which have been sent from nearly every parish with systematic regularity and in most instances in slightly increasing amounts.

The Triennial presentation of our Delaware contribution to the great United Offering, will be held in St. John's Church, Wilmington, on St. Michael's and All Angels' Day, Monday,

September 29th:—Therefore, before that time we have four months to continue our activities, and I think we can confidently expect an offering worthy not only of our best efforts, but worthy of those faithful women who are doing our Master's service. But fearing we may become too satisfied with our labors, let us reflect—Have we steadily increased in each parish, in our contributors? Have we been satisfied with the active Auxiliary workers only and left out many Church women who do not give their regular service? Have we used our leaflets and, greatest of all, have we prayed for help and inspiration in this cause?

Let me entreat you to use all diligence and zeal to bring this work to the knowledge and understanding of every Church woman in your parish or mission.

Think of the work in the United States alone! Our United Offering Missionaries are working among the Indians, negroes and mountain people. Their work is a national gain, and the results are measured in better citizenship, in higher standards of intelligence, as well as religion and morals; in habits of industry and thrift, in happier childhood and more contented old age.

The Rev. William Manning, Rector of Trinity Church, New York, in an address to the United Offering Treasurers, says:—

“Do not feel as though you were collecting money, even for so great a cause as the Church's Missionary work; realize that your work means far more than that, that you are missionaries yourselves, doing a work of deep spiritual value; that you are helping to make every woman who becomes interested not merely a contributor to the fund, but a more earnest disciple of Him whom we worship, and serve, a more interested member of her own parish, a truer Churchwoman and a better Christian.”

Report of Mexican Division

The Mexican Division has been especially favored this year in having had a visit from the Right Reverend Henry D. Aves, Bishop of Mexico. In Trinity Parish House on November 20th, 1912, Bishop Aves gave a graphic and detailed account of the work in Mexico, and told of its especial needs. Bishop Aves is bearing a vast weight of responsibility; his diocese is greater in extent than that of any other of our bishops, being equal in area to all that part of the United States lying east of the Mississippi River; and he ministers not only to the Americans in Mexico, for whom he was at first appointed, but also, and this at their own request, to the native Mexican church.

During the past year, the Mexican Division has not only made up its pledge of \$250.00 for the Bishop Lee Scholarship, but has also collected a special fund of \$160.00 for the Rev. Samuel Salinas. This was in response to an urgent letter received by our President from Secretary John W. Wood of the Church Missions House, stating that Mr. Salinas and his entire family had been stricken with scarlet fever. Mr. Salinas himself having been threatened with blindness as an after-result of his illness. Providentially this calamity was averted. A most grateful letter has been received from Mr. Salinas for the kindly aid sent him.

Last fall our good Treasurer sent to each branch of the Auxiliary a plea for more contributing members to the Mexican Division; she was rewarded by receiving several new members for enrollment; but will the Auxiliary please bear in mind that still more members are sadly needed. Especially at this time, when Mexico is passing through the throes of civil strife, should the prayers and the support of the Church in the United States pour out for her in fullest measure.

Report of the Junior Auxiliary.

DIOCESE OF DELAWARE.

The Twenty-third Annual Meeting of the Junior Auxiliary, Diocese of Delaware, was held in Trinity Parish, Wilmington, Saturday, May 24th, 1913.

At 10.30 A. M. there was a celebration of the Holy Eucharist, celebrant, Rev. F. M. Kirkus, rector of the Parish, assisted by Rev. William Patterson, curate.

A large number communicated.

A business session followed, Mrs. Hall, presiding.

Rev. Mr. Kirkus extended a warm welcome to the "the fine representation present, in numbers and quality both" as he expressed it. The President in her response said the Junior Auxiliary, invariably, were so hospitably entertained in Trinity Parish, it made them long to come whenever the opportunity was afforded.

Miss Lucy Jackson, Secretary, called the roll; delegates from St. Anne's Middletown, Immanuel, New Castle, St. Peter's Smyrna, and from Calvary, Old Swedes', St. John's and Trinity, Wilmington, responded; about 90 in all. Christ Church, Dover, St. Thomas Newark, and St. Luke's, Seaford, were not represented, St. Luke's, however sent a report. The Branch Secretaries present, read very interesting reports, giving an account of their year's activities, number of boxes sent, and the amount in money given to special work and pledges.

St. John's have a Senior and Junior department.

The Seniors, numbering 16, studied "Japan-Whither?" The Juniors numbering 20, "The Honorable Little Miss Love." A number of children in this department, none exceeding ten years of age, wrote most excellent critiques on "The Hon. Little Miss Love," showing how well they understood and remembered the "Story" that had been read to them.

Old Swedes' reported 47 members in their Senior Department and 27 in their Junior Department. Both Departments studied "The Hon. Little Miss Love." Calvary and Trinity Branches, Wilmington, and Immanuel Branch, New Castle did the same.

Mrs. E. P. Noonan said St. Andrew's Church, Wilmington, has no organized Junior Auxiliary at present. Some children held a "Harvest Home" affair at Thanksgiving time, when they brought fruit and vegetables, amounting to \$6.60, which they afterwards carried and presented to the Babies' Hospital.

It is her hope that a working Branch may be established in the near future, in St. Andrews' Parish. Mrs. C. L. McIlvaine Diocesan President of the Woman's Auxiliary takes a deep interest in the Junior Department and always attends the Annual Meetings. On this occasion she complimented the Branches on their fine reports, and in her address gave them a Missionary thought to carry through the year, "The light that shines *farthest*, shines *brightest* at home."

Miss Mary Lafferty, the Diocesan Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, was present, and spoke on the subject, "How to keep the older girls, and interest them in Mission work and study." Mrs. Cyrus V. Jaquith, of St. Mary's Church, Cincinnati, Ohio, told of some work of a varied character, Missionary and Charitable, done by a very enthusiastic young woman's Guild in their Parish. Noon-day prayers were said by Rev. Mr. Kirkus, after which Miss Mary Jenkins, President of the Junior Auxiliary of the Diocese of Easton, Md., delivered the annual address. Miss Jenkins is a successful and devoted Junior worker, and is a winning speaker. She began by reciting from memory, or rather telling in her own effective way that beautiful story of "The Measuring Rod." She held the attention of everyone. At its

close, she made a pertinent application, and gave some good suggestions touching work among Juniors. Some discussion open to all followed.

At one o'clock a delicious luncheon was served by Trinity Juniors, under the leadership of Mrs. F. M. Kirkus and Miss Lucy Jackson.

The afternoon meeting convened at 2.30.

The speakers were the Bishop of Delaware, Miss Jenkins and Mrs. Hall. Among other things, the latter spoke of the very interesting Mission Study Class given in Bishopstead, the 8th, 9th and 10th of Oct. 1912, conducted by Bishop Kinsman, and closing with an illustrated lecture by the Rev. Hugh Burleson of New York City. He is a fascinating lecturer. Another conference of Junior workers will be held in Wilmington sometime in November 1913. The exact date and names of Leaders will be announced later. The subject will doubtless be China and if so an illustrated lecture on that country will be one of the features of the conference.

Two illustrated lectures on Canterbury Cathedral were given in St. John's Parish House by Miss Helen Helmore, daughter of Canon Helmore of the Cathedral staff. She gave the first lecture to a guild of young women in St. John's Church, and by request it was repeated under the auspices of St. John's and Trinity's Branches of the Junior Auxiliary. The proceeds of this Lecture were given to Miss Helmore for restoration purposes for Canterbury Cathedral as she desired them to be. Miss Helmore expects to visit the United States this fall or winter, and if she does, will bring with her lectures and slides of other famous Cathedrals of England. If some Junior Branches could secure her services, it would be not only helpful to all our Junior workers to hear these lectures, but a "means" or opportunity to earn some money for missionary work and pledges, as Miss Helmore will be very willing to share the proceeds of her lecture with any Auxiliary Branch.

This election was confirmed by the Delaware Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary at their annual meeting held in Dover, Thursday, May 29th, 1913.

The United Lenten Box of the Juniors, was sent to a school in Africa, under the care of the Rev. Mr. Cooper. It contained about 200 gifts, valuation \$75.00. This box did not equal in value that of last year, but it was the work of only a very few of the Branches. Individual Parish boxes being sent elsewhere; some to the Babies' Hospital, others to various mission schools and hospital, in the south and elsewhere.

Then, too, it must be remembered, that we made a special effort to increase our donations and pledges, so that our gifts in money exceed largely those of last year. We have more than doubled our United Offering. The Bishop Lee Scholarship pledge has been increased. A Junior Auxiliary Scholarship in China assumed. Besides this, one branch sent money to furnish entirely a room in a Hospital in Mexico. Several branches have promised Bishop Kinsman individual gifts towards the furnishing of the Chapel to be erected in Hartly. A new Junior's Branch has recently been organized in Laurel. Several others will be before many more months pass, greater interest and enthusiasm in Missions generally and mission study has been manifested, so that we have reason to be encouraged, for this year has truly been the best of many, in the history of "The Delaware Juniors."
