PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

Rt. Rev. Father in God and Fellow Members of the Woman's Auxiliary:

With a sadness very like regret, I make my last address as your president. I crave your indulgence to be personal. For six years it has been my very great joy and privilege to hold this office and during all that time I have never failed to feel your loyal support and hearty cooperation. I want you every one to realize my sincere appreciation of your many kindnesses: I want you to know that it was your faith in me, your charity toward my many shortcomings, that gave me the courage and the confidence to do my work and to be happy in doing it.

Very many privileges have come to me through the Auxiliary; privileges of friendship, privileges of meeting and knowing intimately those whose lives have been dedicated to the Master's service.

Sorrows, too, there have been, great ones. Sorrows through the deaths of many of those upon whom I most depended and best loved, yet still have parted from hopefully, knowing that through the Blessed Communion of Saints, they could never be lost to us nor to the work of the Church. There has been one sorrow much more tragic. It has been very sad to lose not only my Bishop, but my dear and intimate friend, my guide, my leader, whom I loved so loyally and trusted so implicitly. At all times he was most interested; at all times most helpful; to him I could take all matters, great and small, diocesan or personal. He remains my friend, but can no longer beguide and counsellor. I want to pay this last tribute to the man as I knew him and to the memory of the past. Today, his successor in office is with us. I know I am speaking for all of us when I assure him of the loyal support of the women of this diocese.

To my successor in the Auxiliary, the new President whom you are soon to elect, I also want to pledge loyalty and devotion in the name of us all.

If I might be to her the help and strength my predecessor, our dear Honorary President, has been to me, I should be more than satisfied.

I cannot close without speaking especially of my fellow officers of the Executive Committee. When we were left without our diocesan head we pledged ourselves to stand together and to remain in office until a new Bishop should be chosen. This we have done, some at personal sacrifice. Each one of us has given, not by any means all we have wished to give, but faithfully and conscientiously of our best. It is a great regret to us all that Mrs. Tallman and Miss Beadenkopf and Miss Giles, to all of whom we are indebted for most earnest and faithful work, are no longer of our Executive Committee. Of the rest of us, some are willing to remain in their present offices, some to exchange offices and work as you will see later in the report of the Nominating Committee.

Last, but by no means least, I wish to express appreciation of the courtesy and kindness of the clergy of our diocese, whose inspiration and sympathetic interest have made all things possible to us. The smallness of our diocese has this great advantage, it is possible for us to meet each other often, to know each other well, and to be all one little family.

That the work of the Auxiliary may continue to grow and prosper, that each one of us may feel, as the years go by, a deeper and still deeper devotion to Christ and to His Kingdom, together with a burning desire that all peoples and all nations be gathered together into one fold of Christian Unity, is the earnest prayer of your retiring President.

EXTRACT FROM MINUTES OF THE EPIPHANY MEETING

The Epiphany meeting was held in Calvary Church, Wilmington, January 15, 1920, with forty-six members present.

The President announced the election of Mrs. Delaware Clark as Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club to fill the unexpired term of Miss Caroline Sharp, resigned.

A letter was read from Mrs. Wetmore, of Christ School, Arden, telling of their terrible loss by fire and soliciting aid. The President asked the various branches to bear this in mind at their parish meetings and see if some help could be given.

The Rev. Mr. Shriner, of the Church Farm School, Glen Lock, Pennsylvania, told of the work being carried on there for white boys between the ages of twelve and fifteen years. The school takes a boy deprived of support and gives him an education and a trade at no expense to him or his family. The cost of a scholarship is \$200 a year, although the actual expense to the school is \$500.

A motion was made by Mrs. Tallman, duly seconded and adopted, that the President appoint a committee to help in some way this important Social Service work.

EXTRACT FROM MINUTES OF THE SPRING MEETING

At the Spring Meeting of the Auxiliary, held in St. Anne's Church, Middletown, May 6, 1920, Holy Communion was celebrated by Bishop Israel, assisted by Mr. Doneghay, Mr. Hill, and Mr. Clash.

The speakers of the morning were Bishop Israel and Mr. E. J. Lee of China.

A delicious luncheon was served by the members of St. Anne's Branch at the Woman's Club.

The afternoon session was called to order at 2 o'clock by the President, Mrs. Frederick Bringhurst, with one hundred fifty-five members present.

Miss Grace Lindley, General Secretary, spoke of the reorganization of the work of the Auxiliary and trusted that **sanity** and **sacrifice** might possess us.

Mrs. Delaware Clark made a plea for the Church Farm School, Glen Lock, Pennsylvania, and suggesting holding a Diocesan affair of some sort in the interest of this school.

In response to Mrs. William H. Laird's plea for more money for Child Welfare work, \$170 was pledged from the various parishes.

On motion fifty dollars of the "Bishop's Purse" was given to Dr. G. N. B. Turner, of Lewes, Delaware, for his work among seamen there.

Mr. E. J. Lee asked for help for the Kuling School, China. A pledge of \$100 was given by Mrs. William H. Laird. The President requested the Branches to bear this need in mind when making pledges for the year. The morning offering was given to Mr. Lee for this school.

Mrs. Preston Lea told of the work of the Woman's Club of Trinity in repairing and refurnishing the Clergy House at Rehoboth. The Club would like the assistance of other Branches in keeping this house in order.

Mrs. Murray Stewart read a memorial to Miss Mary T. Ridgely.

On motion of Mrs. C. L. McIlvaine, duly seconded and adopted, it was, "Resolved, That this body, through our representatives, petition Congress to pass Bill No. 13,334, which will restore the food supply to the natives of Alaska inhabiting the region of the Yukon River and its tributaries. Said supply of fish, upon which Esquimaux and Indians and their dogs depend for subsistence, having been cut off by the establishment of salmon-canning factories at the mouth of the Yukon River."

Minutes of the Thirty-sixth Annual Meeting

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Delaware met in Immanuel Church, Wilmington, at 10.45 a. m., October 21, 1920. Bishop Cook spoke from the text "The field is the world." Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop, assisted by the Rev. Mr. Clash, Archdeacon Thompson, Mr. Kirkus and Mr. Earp.

At the conclusion of the service, Mr. Clash, after a few words of welcome, invited the Auxiliary into the Parish House where a bountiful luncheon was served by the women of his parish.

The President, Mrs. Bringhurst, called the afternoon session to order at 2 o'clock. Roll call showed an attendance of 304 members.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Mrs. McIlvaine read a letter from Congressman Layton stating that it would give him great pleasure to further the progress of H. B. 13334 because of its intense merits.

The President then made her annual address and at its close Mrs. McIlvaine, Honorary President, asked if she might take the chair, and Mrs. Murray Stewart presented the following minutes which were unanimously adopted:

"It is a great pleasure to voice the feeling of the Society in thanking Mrs. Frederick Bringhurst for her capable leadership of the Woman's Auxiliary during the past six years.

"The Society was never in a more prosperous condition than it is at present, and to her enthusiasm and devotion to the work we owe much that has been accom-

plished. The completion of the new scholarship is largely due to her unremitting effort. Her unfailing hospitality has promoted the interests of the Auxiliary, and to her we owe the inspiration brought back from more than one convention. Though loath to let Mrs. Bringhurst retire from the presidency, we feel that we cannot conscientiously hold on to her when we know to what extent the work had called upon her time and strength.

"It has been a joy to us all to work with her for we realized she was especially fitted for her task, which she performed so faithfully. The hearty good wishes of all the members will follow her in any new work she may undertake."

Mrs. McIlvaine spoke on the Emery Fund, a special Jubilee offering to be collected in 1921, the income of which is to be used by missionaries at home on furlough.

Mrs. Wm. H. Laird expressed the thanks of the Reconstruction Commission for the part the Auxiliary had taken in Child Welfare work, and suggested that those who had been supporting French orphans transfer that support to a child in Delaware as France is now going to look after her own children.

Brief reports were given by Mrs. William D. Bradford, Directress of Missionary Box Work; Mrs. William H. Beacom, Educational Secretary; Mrs. F. G. Tallman, Treasurer of the United Thank Offering; and Mrs. Delaware Clark, Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club.
