

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

Rt. Rev. Father in God and Members of the Auxiliary:

A year has passed since our last annual meeting and the auxiliary has apparently gone on as usual, tho' your President feels that, owing to her inexperience, she has not always grasped the full responsibilities of her office nor its many opportunities, and when mistakes have occurred, she has been at fault.

The required number of stated meetings have been held. Beginning with the October Meeting when we had the great privilege and pleasure of greeting our new Bishop, who gave the address of the day.

At the Epiphany Meeting we were deeply impressed by the account given by the Rev. Dr. Turner, of St. Peters, Lewes, of his devoted work among sailors at that port, and realized the need of a suitable home for these strangers within our gates. The session was closed by the Bishop who urged a fuller realization of the spiritual side in the service rendered by the auxiliary.

The parish branches were well represented at Milford where the May Meeting was held.

The addresses by Rev. Dr. Milton, Sec. of the "Nation Wide Campaign", and Mrs. Pancoast in behalf of St. Lukes International Hospital, Tokyo, were full of interest and inspiration. Pledges were made to the hospital and the Kuling School, China.

In the early winter Bishop Thurston of Eastern Oklahoma visited the Diocese, speaking in a number of parishes. At a later date the usual Quiet Day was held bringing its deep spiritual blessing to those attending.

A most successful Mission Study Class, under the direction of Mrs. Pancoast, was held during Lent, closing with a beautiful service at Bishopstead.

Two special calls have been made upon the auxiliary in the past year. One the plea for aid to the famine stricken area

of China, giving the church a great opportunity to prove her interest in that country in a time of appalling distress.

The other the "Jubilee Thank Offering" of the Woman's Auxiliary for fifty years of service.

Much has been accomplished in the missionary activities of the Church in this time, it is our hope, however, that this is but the beginning of our work, that it may grow in ever widening circles, for the field is the world, and to-day as two thousand years ago the "harvest is ripe" and the laborers are alas! still but few.

In becoming an Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council "Religious Education and Social Service" were included in our service for missions. A chairman for Social Service has not been added to the Executive Board of this Diocese. As it opens a wide sphere of usefulness which will appeal strongly to many, and is also a part of the new order of things, I would suggest this addition be considered.

In a few weeks the Synod of the Province of Washington will honor our Diocese by meeting in Wilmington.

The Woman's Auxiliary is an important part of this body and it is hoped our members will not only endeavor to make this council successful in a material way, but by so stressing the spiritual side that the power and uplift of the messages from the many consecrated workers in God's Kingdom may bring a full realization of the true significance of this assembly.

In the coming year our work will, no doubt, be similar to that of other years, but may I urge more thought given to our privilege of service, greatly enlarged and constantly growing, with a fuller sense of our responsibilities.

To quote one of our prominent church women—"The need for this Triennial period is for Trained Leaders; the Gift of Life; all women banded together to serve in the five fields of service, and last but not least the devotional side of the lives of women expressed through prayer."

EXTRACT FROM MINUTES OF THE EPIPHANY MEETING

The Epiphany meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held at St. John's, Wilmington, January 20, 1921, with 89 in attendance.

The President announced the appointment of Mrs. Thomas Getz Hill, of Smyrna, as Assistant Secretary.

Dr. G. N. B. Turner spoke of the work among seamen at Lewes, Delaware, and the great need of a Church Seamen's Institute there, but even before the Institute is realized, there is an ever present need for victrolas, books, magazines, etc., in short, the support and backing of the Church and the Auxiliary.

EXTRACT FROM MINUTES OF SPRING MEETING

The spring meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held at Milford at the same time as the Diocesan Convention, beginning with a service in Christ Church, May 10th, at 4 o'clock, followed by the opening of the convention and the Bishop's address.

At 7.30 dinner was served in the Armory to 225 delegates and friends.

The regular spring meeting of the Auxiliary was called to order by the President, Mrs. John Saulsbury, May 11th, at 10.30, with 121 present.

Dr. Milton, Secretary of the Nation Wide Campaign, spoke on Woman's Opportunity for service in the Church.

The resignation of Mrs. William H. Laird, United Thank Offering Custodian, was accepted with regret and sincere appreciation of her services. Mrs. Irving Warner was elected to succeed her.

On motion of Mrs. McIlvaine, it was resolved to send \$25.00 to Bishop Rowe for his twenty-five years of valuable service in Alaska, and an additional \$25.00 for the Archdeacon Stuck Memorial Fund.

Mrs. John E. Parks introduced the following resolution which was seconded by Mrs. Jane Penniwell and Mrs. Delaware Clark, and adopted: "Resolved: That this convention of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Delaware express its interest in the cause of vocational education for dependent and other children in the Diocese, and its desire to further the cause by cooperating with the Bishop and any Diocesan committee appointed to investigate or to effect a bureau or school that tends to embody this resolution."

Mrs. Charles R. Pancoast spoke in the interest of St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo, and pledges amounting to \$225.00 for this fund were received from the floor.

Mrs. John Bancroft told of the work and the needs of the Kuling School, China, and received pledges for this school amounting to \$80.00.

Minutes of the Thirty-seventh Annual Meeting

The thirty-seventh annual meeting of the Delaware Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held at St. Peter's, Smyrna, October 13, 1921, beginning at 10.30 with Holy Communion and an address by the Bishop.

Luncheon was served in the Parish House by members of the Smyrna Branch, and the afternoon session was called to order at 1.30 by the President, Mrs. John P. Saulsbury.

Roll call showed an attendance of 244.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read, corrected, and approved as corrected.

The missionary address was by the Right Reverend C. B. Colmore, Bishop of Porto Rico.

Mrs. Thomas, of Baltimore, told of the work of the Church Service League, which is a federation—an organization of the various organizations in the diocese.

The report of the Treasurer, showing a balance from 1920 of \$397.53; receipts for the year, \$2,470.16; total \$2,867.69; disbursements, \$2,213.34, and balance, October 13, 1921, \$654.35, was read and accepted.

It was with deep regret that the Auxiliary received the resignation of Mrs. F. W. Curtis, Vice-President for New Castle County. The nominating committee, Mrs. McIlvaine, Chairman, presented the name of Mrs. David J. Reinhardt to succeed Mrs. Curtis.

On request of the President, Bishop Cook took the chair and conducted the elections, which resulted in the following officers being unanimously elected:

Mrs. Irving Warner, United Thank Offering Custodian, reported the amounts received from the various branches since October, 1920, and urged more systematic giving and that remittances be sent to the Custodian once a year only. The Bishop suggested that the Auxiliary ask the clergy to cooperate by setting aside two days—perhaps Ascension Day and All Saints Day—for corporate communion for the Auxiliary, and let it be known that the collections on those days are for the United Thank Offering.

Mrs. P. B. Lightner, Chairman of the Committee appointed to draft a new constitution and by-laws, presented a constitution and by-laws to be considered and voted upon at the next annual meeting.

Mrs. Charles R. Miller moved that the committee be continued and empowered to send a copy of the proposed constitution and by-laws to each parish. Adopted.

Mrs. McIlvaine moved that the morning offering be given to Bishop Colmore, preferably toward a scholarship. Adopted.

Mrs. Rayner moved that the afternoon collection, after deducting the President's traveling expenses and the expenses of the second speaker, be given toward completing our apportionment for Diocesan missions. Adopted.

Mrs. Janvier spoke briefly in reference to the Emery Fund in commemoration of our Jubilee, and Mrs. Parks on the Home for dependent children.

Reports were received from Mrs. W. D. Bradford, Directress of Missionary Box Work and from Mrs. Frederick Bringhurst, Educational Secretary.

On motion of Mrs. Delaware Clark, duly seconded and adopted, a vote of thanks was extended to the Smyrna Branch for its delightful hospitality.

A letter from Bishop Tuttle expressing thanks for copy of the Report sent him and gratification for the fact that Delaware has risen superior to all her trouble and is active and alert in sustaining the great missionary work of the Church was read by the secretary.

The Secretary read the names of members of the Auxiliary who have passed to their eternal rest during the year.

The meeting was dismissed with prayers and benediction by the Bishop.
