

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Rt. Rev. Father in God and Members of the Auxiliary:

As we stand upon the threshold of a new year it is well to pause a moment and take account of the year that has passed.

We can report two new Branches, one at Harrington, the other at Millsboro, making a total of twenty-six in the Diocese of twenty-one parishes and sixteen missions.

Interesting speakers addressed our three stated meetings—in October the Rev. Bland Mitchell on “The Program Presented;” Miss Boyce on “Church Educational Work” at the Epiphany meeting; and in May the thrilling account of his visit to the Far East by Dr. Sturgis, who dwelt particularly upon the tremendous issues at stake in that field and the great need for more workers. He was followed by Mrs. Phelps, who gave a practical explanation of the Church Service League.

A deeply impressive “quiet hour” was held during Lent at St. Andrew’s Church, Wilmington, conducted by our Bishop, and the meetings of October and May were, as always, preceded by the service of the Holy Communion.

Our Untiring Supply Secretary reports a successful year of box work and an encouraging growth in the newly organized Bishop’s Guild, formed for the purpose of supplying the Babies’ Hospital with clothing and household linen.

The Treasurer’s report shows our quota more than met and pledges paid, and an increased interest in the “little Blue Boxes” is reported by the Custodian of the United Thank Offering.

Owing to the illness of the Educational Secretary we have had no Diocesan leader for Mission Study, which is greatly to be deplored as it is an extremely important department of the Auxiliary.

The lack of knowledge of the great undertakings of the Church, its wonderful opportunities and pressing needs is, I think, the weak point of our organization.

In the late summer our dearly beloved Honorary President most peacefully passed into the higher life. We grieve for our loss but rejoice that for so many years the Auxiliary was blessed in having her wise leadership to which a great measure of its success is due. May her blessed spirit continue to guide us.

We older members of the Auxiliary have a retrospective view of its thirty-eight years of existence, struggling years at first, and at times discouragements, but happy years, all of them filled with the joy of service for the Master; and now the present is with us full of tense, vibrant life, new conditions are to be met and new methods adopted. The Auxiliary must go forward ever, not afraid to undertake new duties; she has never yet failed in meeting her responsibilities; the work is the same only enlarged and more comprehensive.

A tremendous responsibility confronts us now in the tragedy of Japan's terrible disaster; the appalling losses will be met, we are sure, but it will mean a great sacrifice for all of us and untiring devotion to our Missionaries there, as the fruits of their fifty years of loving service must not be lost.

In closing this, my last Report, I wish to extend to you all my sincere thanks for your kindly consideration. To the Bishop for his valuable advice and his ever ready help and unfailing interest in our work; to the Clergy for their always courteous co-operation, and to you dear fellow-members of the Auxiliary for your loyal support, your generous response to my frequent appeals, and your kindness in overlooking my many mistakes; particularly am I grateful to my predecessor who has ever been ready to advise and assist me and to make my path smooth over the rough places.

It has been a great honor and a great happiness to have served you these three years, my only regret being that there have

not been greater gains in that time. In passing our beautiful historic gavel to my successor, I feel that I can assure her of equally loyal support. My sincere hope is that to her may be given the vision of a Woman's Auxiliary standing for greater things than ever before and that it may be our privilege to aid her in making that vision a reality.

Minutes of the Thirty-ninth Annual Meeting

The Thirty-ninth Annual meeting of the Delaware Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council was held at Immanuel Church, New Castle, Thursday, October 11th, 1923, beginning at 10.30 with an address by Bishop Cook and the celebration of the Holy Communion.

Lunch was served by the New Castle Branch at 12.30 and the afternoon session called to order at 2 o'clock with the President, Mrs. John P. Saulsbury, presiding.

The meeting was opened with prayers by the Bishop and a hymn. The minutes of the meetings of May 8th and 9th were read and, with two corrections accepted. Roll call showed an attendance of 259.

A motion was made, duly seconded and adopted, that \$100 be sent from our general fund to the Japanese Emergency Relief. The Treasurer reported that the money had already been sent, as she had interpreted a letter received from the President immediately following the meeting of the Executive Committee at Dover, as instructions to forward the money at once.

A motion was made, duly seconded and adopted, that the offerings today be sent to the Japanese Emergency Fund. Miss Hayes moved that the order of business be suspended and Deaconess Newbold give her address at 2.30. The motion was adopted.

The Secretary read the following memorial:

"The Woman's Auxiliary to the Presiding Bishop and Council, Delaware Branch, desire to place upon

record their deep sense of loss and bereavement in the death of the late Clementina Lee McIlvaine, and their sincere affection for their beloved leader.

Mrs. McIlvaine was in very truth the Mother of the Auxiliary, having been one of its founders, for some twenty years its President, then its Honorary President, and at all times its guide and councilor and the sympathetic friend of all its members. Mrs. McIlvaine was rich in Churchly inheritance, having been the daughter of the late Rt. Rev. Alfred Lee, D. D., first Bishop of Delaware and Presiding Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States. She was also the wife of a clergyman, the Rev. Charles McIlvaine.

Her intense interest in all that pertains to the Church, and especially to Missions; her beautifully spiritual nature, her untiring zeal, her wonderful personality have enshrined her memory to those whose great privilege it was to work under her inspiring leadership. No more fitting tribute can be paid her than to continue her work for the Master, to strive to maintain her Christian standards and ideals, and to realize her continued oneness with her spiritual children in the blessed Communion of Saints, the Kingdom of Christ here and now, as well as the Kingdom that is to be hereafter."

The Secretary moved that the memorial be entered upon the minutes and a copy sent to the family of Mrs. McIlvaine. The motion was adopted.

The President read her Annual Report. At the suggestion of the Bishop a rising vote of thanks was given the President for her excellent report and all that it stands for in the way of loyal service.

After the singing of a hymn, Deaconess Newbold of Aomori, Japan, told of work in her district and something of the havoc wrought by the recent earthquake.

Miss Spruance, Vice-President for New Castle County, made a brief report. She had been unable to visit all the branches in her county, but had visited St. John's, Wilmington; Immanuel New Castle; St. Anne's, Middletown. She urged that women attend the meetings of the Auxiliary, giving up, if necessary, social or other engagements to do so.

A motion was made, duly seconded and adopted, that the order of business be suspended, and we proceed with the election of officers.

There being no further nominations for any office the secretary was instructed to cast the necessary ballots and the entire ticket was unanimously elected.

There was no report from Miss Cummins, Vice-President from Kent County, or from Mrs. Prettyman, Vice-President from Sussex County.

was read, together with the report of the auditors, and on motion accepted and ordered placed on file.

The Secretary reported for the Deputy Custodian of the United Thank Offering that offerings to the amount of almost \$900.00 had been received.

The report of the Supply Secretary, Mrs. Bradford, showed the excellent box work done by the various branches. In addition to the Auxiliary boxes, there were two from the Girl's Friendly Society, amounting to \$129.61.

Reporting for the Bishop's Guild, Mrs. Bradford said that progress had been made and the shelves at the Babies Hospital were filling up with much needed garments. Bishop Cook moved that this report for the Babies' Hospital be incorporated in the Annual Report. The motion was adopted.

Mrs. E. M. Barsham, Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club, reported regular contributions of 163 magazines; 250 books (new) sent by Christ Church Christiana Hundred to the Veteran's Mountain Camp at Saranac; \$5.00 received from the Dover Branch for the Fund for books to be sent to Boone University; and a large number of used magazines distributed to the Workhouse and other institutions.

Miss Jane Lea reported for the Girl's Friendly Society and Mrs. Lightner for the Church Service League.

On motion of Miss Lea, unanimously adopted, a vote of thanks was extended to the members of the New Castle Branch for their delightful hospitality.

Mrs. Lightner moved that greetings of love and good wishes be sent Mrs. T. Gardner Littell, one of the founders of the Delaware Branch and a former President. The motion was adopted.

Mrs. Beacom moved that a message of love and sympathy go from our Auxiliary in Annual Meeting assembled to Mrs. Robert B. Rayner who was for many years our faithful and capable Treasurer. The motion was adopted.

Mrs. John Bancroft and Miss Anne P. Spruance were elected delegates to the Synod to be held in Washington, November 21st, 22nd and 23d, 1923.

Mrs. Richey moved that as our beloved Bishop and Rt. Rev. Father in God would shortly complete his fourth year among us, that we stand in grateful recognition of these four years of faithful and loving service.

Mrs. Bradford reported a request from Miss Lindley that bedding for single cots be sent to Japan, and in response to this request letters have been sent to the various branches setting forth this need.

The Bishop closed the meeting with prayers.
