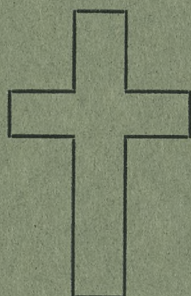

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PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Right Reverend Father in God and members of the Woman's Auxiliary:

It is a pleasure to state that during the past year the Society has grown in work and interest.

As you listen to the reports you will notice that there has been greater activity in each department.

A new work, that of knitting for Alaska, was started by our ever faithful Supply Secretary and this was made a sub Committee of the Supply department with a separate chairman, Mrs. J. S. Prettyman. Under her enthusiastic leadership much was accomplished even in the few months of its organization, and I am sure that the heart of Mrs. Thomas of Point Hope, Alaska, rejoiced when she received the box from Delaware. It is hoped that with the early start this year an even greater number of articles will be made.

The Society had three Quiet Days during Lent, one in each County. They were ably conducted and those attending these solemn services felt the spiritual benefit.

An inter-Parochial Mission Study Class was held during Lent in St. Andrew's Parish House, Wilmington, under the leadership of Mrs. Porchey, of Philadelphia. It was very interesting and helpful in bringing to us a better knowledge of our Missions in Japan.

In a number of the Parishes, Study Classes were held, so I feel that Lent was truly a season of Prayer and work.

We have had three stated meetings during the year. The Annual Meeting last October was in New Castle, where we were beautifully entertained and where we had the pleasure of hearing

Deaconess Newbold describe her work in Japan. Our Epiphany meeting was held in Immanuel Parish House, Wilmington, when Mrs. Pancoast gave an illustrated talk on our Missions in the East. There was no business transacted at this meeting. Our May meeting was in Dover at the same time as the Diocesan Convention. We were again privileged to have Mrs. Pancoast speak to us, also Mr. Souder, of the Central China Teachers' College, at Wuchang, and Dr. Mary James, of the Church General Hospital, Wuchang. These addresses were most interesting and instructive giving at first hand the difficulties and needs of their work. The very impressive United Thank Offering service held at this time in Dover will long linger in our hearts as one of great beauty and spirituality. The Dover Society left nothing undone that could add to our comfort and pleasure.

It is very gratifying to announce that one of our Delaware women, Dr. Margaret Richey, sailed in September, to China as a medical Missionary. At the May meeting the Auxiliary was proud to adopt Dr. Richey as a daughter and each year will send to her a sum of money to assist her in her work and that she may feel that we at home, are watching her with love and prayers.

The Vice-Presidents for the Counties have done much excellent work visiting the Parish branches and stimulating them to greater interest.

In closing this, my first report, I desire to stress the great kindness of my predecessor; the courtesy and co-operation of the Clergy and members of the Auxiliary; and the unfailing interest and helpfulness of you, our Bishop. It is hoped that the many members of the Auxiliary who are now Contributors only, may find the blessing of work as well, and that the Spirit of our Heavenly Father may give to us a vision of greater usefulness in His Kingdom.

Minutes of the Fortieth Annual Meeting

The Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held at Christ Church, Christiana Hundred, October 16th, 1924. An impressive service with Corporate Communion and an address by Bishop Cook was held in the morning followed by a delicious luncheon served by the ladies of Christ Church in their spacious parish house and out under the trees. The meeting was called to order at 2 o'clock in the church by Mrs. Preston Lea, the President. The roll was called and there were 231 members present. The secretary read the minutes of the May meeting in Dover which were approved as read. The Auditors, Mrs. J. S. Prettyman and Mrs. Chas. G. Prettyman, reported they had audited and found correct the report of the Treasurer. Mrs. Pratt, the Treasurer, then gave her report showing a balance on hand of \$274.00; \$251.00 belonging to the Bishop Coleman Fund; \$13.90 Contingent Fund, and \$9.21 the President's Fund; but there is a deficit as the President had advanced the \$30.00 for her fund.

Mrs. Lea then read her report stressing the accomplishments in the various phases of the work done and the meetings held during the past year.

Miss Spruance, Vice-President of New Castle County, gave her report; she feels the Auxiliary is growing in strength and that she met everywhere an earnest group of women; she has been most faithful in her visits and some of the branches had been visited for the first time.

Miss Cummins, Vice-President for Kent County, reported that at most of the meetings she had attended, two objects

were particularly stressed, viz; the little blue boxes and the knitting, and the blue boxes were being well taken.

Mrs. Orr, Vice-President, Sussex County, had to leave before giving her report.

Mrs. F. deH. Janvier, Corresponding Secretary, reported that the necessary letters had been answered and written.

Mrs. Murray Stewart, Educational Secretary, gave an interesting report on the activities throughout the Diocese and on the Advent Study Program, China being the topic for the next winter.

Mrs. W. D. Bradford, Supply Secretary, had an inspiring report, telling how we have exceeded our splendid showing of last year. 56 Boxes have been sent with a total value including knitting done, amounting to \$4,554.42. She reminded us not to forget that used altar hangings and vestment are needed.

Mrs. John S. Prettyman, chairman for the knitting, reported that while the work was new, having been started last January, that they had sent by April 14th, 282 articles to Alaska, 14 parishes contributing. A letter was read from Mrs. Thomas, at Point Hope, Alaska, stating the articles had been received August 7th, and they filled a great need and were as fine as any received. Three members had donated \$47.50 for the Wool Fund and the parishes were buying through her.

Mrs. Irving Warner, U. T. O. Custodian, reported that the offering was in 1923, \$1,117.17 and so far for 1924 it was \$1,461.61 making a total of \$2,581.78. She spoke of the lovely service in May at Christ Church, in Dover, and suggested that each parish hold each year a special U. T. O. service before the convention. 1600 letters and blue boxes have been sent out but we must find new members and send a glorious offering next October to New Orleans.

Mrs. Barsham, the C. P. C. secretary, not being present on account of illness, the secretary read her report showing a very active year with splendid co-operation from the different branches.

Mrs. Bradford reported that the Girls' Friendly Society took their mission work through the Supply Secretary sending 11 boxes and knitting for Alaska, valued at \$259.97. She also reported for the Bishop's Guild that they had 931 members and had received 1929 articles valued at \$1,233.60.

Miss Kenney was not present but sent a report that the Auxiliary Special had been brought before all the Auxiliaries, who were working, but had as yet no report; no pledges have been made but one year intensive work being done to raise our allotment.

Mrs. Cook reported that the Church Service School League had had no meeting since she gave her report in May, but would have a Fall meeting at which box work would be the first thing to be considered.

Mrs. Higgins gave the Necrology report showing that we have had 14 members taken from us throughout the State during the past year, and the death of a former president, Mrs. Littell, was announced and a letter read from her daughter, Miss Helen Littell, thanking the Auxiliary for the sympathy and the floral offering expressed through our President, Mrs. Lea.

The Secretary then read the following changes in the By-Laws, due notice having been given:

Article 3 to read "The dues of each parish branch shall be \$3.00 a year for a branch of 20 members or less, and \$0.10 per capita for a branch of over 20 members."

Article 5, Sec. 2, to read "There shall be 3 delegates to the Provincial Synod who shall be the President and two from the membership at large to be elected by ballot and 3 alternates to be appointed by the President."

These changes were unanimously adopted on motion duly seconded and carried.

The following recommendations from the Executive were read:

1. "That the Offertory at the morning sessions of our meetings be given to missions and the offertory at the afternoon session, be for the current expenses of the Auxiliary." This was moved, seconded and carried.

2. "In order to conform to the affairs of the Diocese that our fiscal year run from January to January." This was moved, seconded and carried.

That Articles 4 and 5 of the Constitution be changed, notice to be given at the May meeting in 1925, and same to be voted upon at the Annual Meeting in 1925.

Mrs. Lea reported that she had telegraphed the good wishes of the Auxiliary to Dr. Richey when she sailed and the Secretary read a letter of appreciation for our interest in her from Dr. Richey.

The nominating Committee then submitted the following ticket; all of whom were duly elected:

As the President was elected in 1923 for a term of 3 years she did not come up for election. Mrs. Lea announced that Mrs. Victor C. Records, of Laurel, had been appointed Secretary of the C. P. C. and Mrs. Maxmillan Hoopes, of Wilmington, as Corresponding Secretary.

Mrs. Bradford spoke of ways and means of raising money for the Japanese Reconstruction Fund and that anyone having

old gold, silver or jewels may turn them in towards the fund; it was moved, seconded and carried, "that Mrs. Bradford form her own committee to work this up in the Diocese and that this plan of collecting old gold and silver be carried out."

The following delegates to the Provincial Synod to be held at Charleston, West Virginia, in November were elected:

A rising vote of thanks was given the Christ Church Auxiliary for their delightful hospitality. The Offertory was then taken up and after a prayer by the Bishop, there being no further business the meeting was adjourned.

A most enjoyable reception in the evening by the President, Mrs. Lea, at the Parish House of Trinity Church, closed the session of the Annual Meeting. The Rt. Rev. J. P. Tyler, of North Dakota, spoke most entertainingly of his missionary work among the Indians and the Offertory at the morning service amounting to \$105.00 was given him for that purpose.

THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS TO THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

I Cor. 4:2—Moreover it is required in stewards, that a man be found faithful.

In addition to the cordial words of welcome on the part of the rector of this parish, it is also my privilege to welcome the members of the Woman's Auxiliary—but with this difference: In that spirit of hospitality so well recognized in him and his people, he welcomes you to this place and parish; I welcome you to fellowship in a task. He greets you in an offering of entertainment which is planned for your comfort and pleasure; I greet you to this Fall conference that will plan the work of the Woman's Auxiliary for the season now opening.

We have started as we ought to start with this holy service of communion with Christ and through Him with each other and I intrude upon the service no longer than is necessary to make a brief report of our diocesan standing in the missionary activities of the Church and to express my hopes for the future. The method by which the church at large rouses interest in its work and secures its funds for promoting and maintaining its missionary enterprises both here and in distant lands is very simple, and yet it is so frequently misunderstood that even though some of you have it clearly in mind I yet desire, for the sake of those who have not, to go over it once more. The cost of maintaining the missionary work of the general church both in the United States and in distant lands is about five million dollars a year. The income on nearly nine million dollars of invested funds held by the Church reduces the amount that must be raised from the parishes and missions to about four and a half million dollars a year—this is called the Budget. In addition to the work main-

tained by the Budget there are some eight hundred different missionary projects that the Church ought to do and must do so soon as the men and money are secured. These items have all been examined, scrutinized, approved and listed and are called the Priorities. The Budget plus the Priorities make the whole Program of the Church. The National Council of the Church takes the four and a half million dollars of the Budget, adds to it a certain determined part from the list of Priorities, which makes for this year a total of seven million dollars, and apportions this amount among the dioceses according to their strength and membership; the diocese in turn apportions a quota to each parish and mission. The amount assigned to the Diocese of Delaware for 1923 and again for 1924 is \$32,000 to be paid to the treasurer of the National Council for the support of work outside the Diocese. Of this \$32,000 about \$20,000 is for the Budget to maintain the regular work and the balance or about \$12,000 is for Priorities or new projects. Last year the Diocese of Delaware paid more than \$24,000 of this sum and so met the whole of its share of the Budget and furnished more than \$4,000 to be applied to advance work. This year of 1924 so far we are doing about the same as last year.

A week ago today the House of Bishops was meeting in special session with the members of the National Council to examine what had been done by the Church and to outline plans and formulate policies to be presented at the next General Convention a year hence. For that meeting, each Bishop was furnished with a report on what had been received from the Dioceses in the payment of their quotas. In the list of 97 Dioceses and missionary districts, the Diocese of Delaware stood sixth in the record of proportionate payments made. Of the five that stood in advance of the Diocese of Delaware, four were missionary districts which receive large grants from the funds of the Church and are largely supported by the National Council. Only one independent diocese was ahead of the record of Delaware, the Diocese of Eastern Carolina—In other words, the Diocese of Delaware was second in the list of regular dioceses.

I want you to know this for your own encouragement; I want to express my own sense of gratitude for this accomplishment. I am far from feeling that we have done as well as we can do or that we are supporting this work to the uttermost of our ability, but as a matter of comparison it stands as a record of which none of us need be ashamed.

Each parish and mission represented here has a right to take satisfaction and gratification in this record of the diocese in proportion and only in proportion as your parish or mission has helped to contribute to this result. I want to make it just as clear as I can that what has been done is not the result of large gifts on the part of a few wealthy and interested donors. Personally I have made no appeal for such gifts from individuals. This is the response to a general appeal and for the most part represents the relatively small and regular contributions of a large number of our people; it is a record that justifies the confidence that most of us have in the value of a campaign and every member canvass throughout the Diocese every year. We are now making ready for such a canvass the first week in the coming Advent, December 7th. I charge you to give to this work your prayers, your interest and your support.

The natural assumption would be that since the people of the Diocese are giving at the rate of about six dollars per communicant for work outside the Diocese that our local work must have suffered as a natural consequence. When I came into the Diocese four years ago, I promised that the local work would not be allowed to suffer and the record shows that it has not done so. Quite the contrary. The support of local work in the Diocese has kept pace with the support of work outside the Diocese. Clerical salaries have been increased; church property has been maintained better than ever before; parish budgets have been enlarged and the Diocese has had more to spend upon itself. This has happened here because it always happens everywhere. Delaware has been no exception to the general rule. In some of the parishes where financial problems seemed so desperate that to ask for gifts for outside work seemed foolish

if not madness, the financial pressure has been relieved. Those who have had courage to adopt the large plan suggested by the Church are stronger than in the past. It is the timid and the fearful who still have their most difficult problems ahead of them.

What is true of the Diocese as a whole is true also of this part of it represented in the Auxiliary. As an instance, I am told that the United Thank Offering of the Women of the Diocese is already almost if not quite equal to the amount given at the last General Convention and there still remains a full year—the last and best year to make up the total amount. Those of you who are giving more generously are also working more earnestly. The improvement in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary is one of the things for which I thank God and take courage. Your organization is more efficient, its influence is larger, its business is better handled. The boxes that you send to needy places carry with them better equipment because the arrangement for them is made with larger intelligence. Your knitting department is doing excellent work. Your membership understands its work better and does it better. Just as the appeal for young men for the ministry meets with a large and surprising response, so to the women is coming the satisfaction of knowing that young women of the Church are thinking more seriously of how they can be of service to the kingdom of God. It is a matter of gratification and cause for thanksgiving that this Diocese has begun again to furnish the work with recruits. I refer to Miss Margaret Richey, who, after years of training in her profession has gone to China for medical work among the women of that country. You have promised to assist her and I know you will keep that promise. Indeed, I wish you might adopt her to the extent of putting all your gifts as an Auxiliary into this one thing and assume responsibility for her salary, that the Diocesan Auxiliary might feel definite responsibility for a definite person and a definite work. I am convinced that this is what we need most—to think less in terms of money and more in terms of workers and of needs. She would establish a living

link between your organization and the mission field. With us too frequently this living link is the missing link. Without desiring to intrude upon your own business and plans I should be glad to have you give this subject serious consideration.

Your officers have been faithful and diligent in their oversight of the affairs of the Auxiliary; your President, Mrs. Preston Lea, has gone up and down this State seeking to keep in touch with the work of each branch; your vice-presidents in each county have made visitations to the branches under their immediate supervision. All this is telling in the general result and is bound to tell unceasingly as their efforts continue.

There is still that old feeling that the people of Wilmington are quite indifferent to places outside its own borders—a feeling that is not confined by any means to the members of this organization. It is true of every state-wide movement of which I have any knowledge, in Church, business, and politics. It is the natural misunderstanding as between a city and rural communities; a place of industrial interest and places of agricultural interest. Such a feeling is less justified in this organization than any other and I know the officers have made a great effort to show that such a feeling is without justification. It has seemed necessary to have the October meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary which is a business meeting for the election of officers in Wilmington, in order to be sure of a large attendance and proper representation to do the business and carry on the election, but since we have a meeting of the Auxiliary in connection with the Spring convention of the diocese wherever that convention meets, that Spring meeting has come to be a rival of the October meeting both in size and representation. For this reason I desire to give my hearty public indorsement to the suggested plan that this Spring convention meeting be made your business meeting with elections at the time that the convention is holding its election, that the terms of officers and annual reports may coincide with that of the rest of the Diocese: and that the October meeting be made an inspirational meeting to plan and make preparation for a season of active work which the Fall always

brings in. It is easy to see many advantages in such a change. These matters I leave for you to discuss and decide.

My brief and final word of exhortation for you today is that we all think less about money, less about missions as a separate enterprise, more about Christ. This is the work and the plan. If we are loyal to Him and follow Him we shall find that all other things fall into their proper places and relationship. It was a number of months ago that I heard Roger Babson of Boston tell this about Henry Ford, of Detroit: For a long time Mr. Ford and Mr. Dodge had been at enmity and practically the only time they met was in a court of law in some contention about rights and money interest. Quite suddenly Mr. Dodge died. On the day that his body was brought to Detroit Mr. Ford went to the station and was among those to meet the train, he followed the hearse to the home of Mr. Dodge and then to his own residence; and did not go to business that day nor until the funeral had taken place at which he was present. His friends remarked upon this action and Mr. Ford's explanation was somewhat of this kind: that he and Mr. Dodge had begun business life together. As poor men they had met their problems and difficulties and it was not until success came and with it money prosperity that they began to contend over their interests. Mr. Dodge died worth about \$50,000,000 not one penny of which he could take with him. Mr. Ford, with a fortune many times that of Mr. Dodge, was compelled to look forward to the time when he too would be stripped bare. The one thing that would count under these conditions was friendliness and in his death he came back to seek the friendship of his former partner. Whatever else this action may reveal it strikes one note the wise will recognize. It is so real as to become the basis of life's philosophy and the motive of action "we brought nothing into this world and it is certain we can carry nothing out." For the period of our day of life we are but stewards of all that we possess whether of material wealth or personal talents. "Moreover it is required of stewards that a man be found faithful." Where this law of our being is denied, ignored or misunderstood

the results in the lives of men and women are sad beyond description. To find a place and opportunity for service that demands our best effort and unbounded loyalty is not only a duty but a privilege. It is the duty of the Church to offer this opportunity to men and women. In our own communion such an opportunity is given to the women in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary and I venture to say that its greatest blessings are to be found not in some distant field where their money has gone and their prayers have found fruition but rather in the characters developed and the souls strengthened here at home in the Diocese and parishes of the American Church. Let us go forward with keen assurance knowing that Christ has not deserted his people and that the victory of His Kingdom is the victory of God.
