PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the members of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Owing to the change in date of our annual meeting, my re-

port covers eighteen months, really two working years, as there has been no report since our last annual meeting at Wyoming in November, 1925. We will always remember that large and enthusiastic gathering of women, and the hospitality of the Auxiliary of St. Paul's Chapel. During the winter of 1925 and 1926 we had our Epiphany meeting in the new Parish House of Calvary Church, Wilmington, when Mr. Pugh told of his work in the Virgin Islands and Miss Blacknell told of her work in Alaska. Study Classes and readings on Missions were held in many Parishes during Lent, and a Quiet Day was held in each County.

A year ago we had that delightful meeting in Rehoboth when we were entertained by our then youngest branch, not six months old. It was a great undertaking but was accomplished with apparent ease and great comfort for us all. We will not forget the beauty of sky and sea during those two days. In June a new branch was formed in Milton and also in June a special meeting of the Auxiliary was held at Bishopstead to hear the English Church Army which was working at that time in Delaware. The knitted articles for Alaska in 1926 numbered 385, and you can see today the number for 1927. This department owes much of its success to the enthusiasm of its chairman who has been unfailing in her efforts to create interest in this work.

At our meeting last October at St. Anne's Church, Middletown, we had the great privilege of a visit from Miss Grace Lindley, Executive Secretary of the National Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, who conducted an hour of meditation be-

fore the celebration of the Holy Communion, and also gave a talk at the afternoon meeting on her visits to our Missions in China and Japan. The Auxiliary of St. Anne's was most hospitable and served us a delicious luncheon. Our Epiphany meeting was held in Dover when the Bishop and Mr. Clash, Diocesan Secretary for the Bishops' Crusade, prepared us for our part in this great Church Movement.

A Quiet Day was held in January in Bridgeville, conducted by the Rector and Mr. Hinks, this also in preparation for the work. I am glad to say that the Woman's Auxiliary responded nobly and was very active during the week of the Crusade, which I am sure caused an awakening of the Auxiliary to its responsibility, and that the Follow Up work is being conscientiously continued and is bringing great results. A Quiet Day was held in Milford the last of March, meditations conducted by the Rector and Mr. Thompson. You will hear from your chairmen the detailed accounts of work accomplished, and I am sure you will feel very happy that you have made such reports possible.

In closing this, my last report, I wish to thank the Bishop for his willing help and advice in all perplexities, and the Clergy for their co-operation and for the welcome always given to me to their Parishes. To you, my dear fellow workers in the Auxiliary, I can only say that you have made my more than three years as President very happy ones, and the friendships formed will be a joy always. I ask for my successor, the same loyalty and co-operation that under her guidance our work for Christ and His Missions may increase more and more,

EXTRACTS FROM THE MINUTES OF THE EPIPHANY MEETING

The Epiphany Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Delaware, was held in the new Parish House of Calvary Church, Wilmington, on January 14th, 1926.

The two speakers of the afternoon, Miss Blacknell from Nanana, Alaska, and Mr. Pugh from Porto Rico and the Virgin Islands, gave us most interesting accounts of their wonderful work in those countries.

EXTRACTS FROM THE MINUTES OF THE MAY MEETING

The May meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held at Rehoboth Beach on the afternoon of May 11th and the morning of May 12th, 1926.

At the afternoon meeting delegates and alternates to the Provincial Synod, to be held in the fall, in the Diocese of Bethlehem, were elected as follows:

Mrs. Preston Lea, by virtue of her office; Delegates, Mrs. Philip Cook, Mrs. Henry Higgins; Alternates, Miss Anne P. Spruance, Mrs. Victor Records.

The morning meeting on May 12th followed a corporate communion service, at which time the United Thank Offering from the women of the Auxiliary was presented.

Bishop Hulsa, of Cuba, opened the meeting with prayers, after which Mr. McAlister spoke informally about the Auxiliary from a parochial point of view. He paid a tribute to Miss Grace Lindley's devotion to her work, and said that the Woman's Auxiliary was the best investment the Executive Board of the National Council had.

In closing he left this thought with us: "I am only one, but I am one; I cannot do everything, but I can do what I can; I can only do what I ought to do, but I ought to do what I can do."

Bishop Hulsa told us of the general conditions in Latin America, and advised us that the powers of religion need reinforcing by the best qualities instilled in us by our church life.

Pledges were made from the floor, amounting to \$125.00, to aid Bishop Hulsa in his work.

Mrs. Lea reported that the Executive Committee recommended that the Delaware Auxiliary join Class B, and give \$25.00 a year, towards defraying the expenses of our provincial representative to the National Executive meetings in New York.

The delegates were entertained most delightfully on both days by the Rehoboth Beach Auxiliary.

EXTRACTS FROM THE OCTOBER MEETING

The October meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held on Oct. 14, 1926, at St. Anne's Church, Middletown.

Miss Grace Lindley, Executive Secretary of the National Board of the Woman's Auxiliary, conducted a most inspiring devotional service of Prayer and Intercession, which was followed by a Corporate Communion, and address by Bishop Cook.

A delicious luncheon was served by the women of the Parish, and a meeting followed—at the opening of which Mrs. Lea paid a tribute to Bishop Cook on the sixth anniversary of his consecration as Bishop of Delaware.

Miss Lindley gave us a most enlightening, interesting and inspiring account of her trip around the world, and gave many concrete examples of the courage and sincerity of the Oriental Christians.

EXTRACTS FROM THE EPIPHANY MEETING

The Epiphany Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in Dover on January 13, 1927.

Mrs. Bradford gave the meeting the encouraging news that we had passed the \$5,000.00 mark in our box work.

Mrs. Lea explained the object of the Corporate Gift, and announced that she had appointed Mrs. William Jester as chairman of the Fund from Delaware.

Most interesting addresses were made by Rev. Mr. Clash and Bishop Cook, and at the close of the meeting tea was served by the ladies of the Parish.

ANNUAL REPORT

A corporate ~~luncheon~~ The Annual Meeting of the Delaware Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held at Milford, Tuesday, May 10th, 1927, at the Parish House of Christ Church. The sessions were opened by a delicious luncheon served in the Parish House, followed by a meeting in the church at which the Bishop gave his annual address. The Auxiliary meeting was then called to order in the Parish House at 2:30, the President, Mrs. Preston Lea, in the chair. The meeting was opened by the singing of a hymn, and a prayer by Mr. Hill, after which the Offertory for the expenses of the Auxiliary, amounting to \$36.52, was taken. The Secretary then called the roll to which 173 members responded; after which the minutes of the Epiphany Meeting were read and approved. The Auditors reported they had examined the Treasurer's books and found them correct. The Treasurer reported a balance on hand of \$265.09; Coleman Fund, \$36.70; President's Account, \$94.43; the Contingent Fund, \$135.96.

The President then gave her annual report covering 18 months, on account of the change of our Annual Meeting from October to May. It was a most encouraging, inspiring and comprehensive résumé of the activities of the Auxiliary which impressed us all by the devotion and loyalty it showed Mrs. Lea had brought to the work of the Auxiliary. Mrs. Stewart and Mrs. Bringhurst made some very charming and lovely tributes to Mrs. Lea, voicing the deep appreciation and thanks of us all for her three and a half years of unselfish service in our behalf.

Mrs. Janvier spoke of the activities of the branches she had visited in New Castle County; Mrs. Brown gave a very interesting one of those in Kent county, which she has visited and which showed interest and industry. No report from Sussex county, but Mrs. Layton reported progress everywhere.

Mrs. Bradford gave the Box Work report: Boxes, 87; amount, \$6,621.09, and spoke of the criticisms and problems incident to allotting the Box Work.

Mrs. Stewart, Educational Secretary, announced the subject for study next year to be "*The Church at Work*." Christ Church, Christiana Hundred, had especially fine classes. She reported eight program meetings and twelve speakers during the year.

Mrs. Records, C. P. C. gave a short report of the various phases and problems of this work.

Mrs. Bradford reported for Bishop Guild: members, 912; articles, 1,827; value, \$955.96.

Mrs. John Prettyman, Chairman of Knitting, reported: articles, 407, sent to Fort Yukon, Alaska, value, \$1,044, 18 parishes doing the work, which in the four years it has been established has increased each year.

Mrs. Lea explained the Corporate Gift of \$100,000.00 which the Woman's Auxiliary had pledged themselves at New Orleans to raise, and announced that she had appointed Mrs. Jester, Chairman for Delaware.

A motion was made, seconded and carried that the above reports be accepted.

Mrs. Lea then presented the two recommendations from the Executive Committee: that the Secretary had been instructed to send a telegram from our Auxiliary to Bishop Lloyd of New York carrying our best wishes and birthday greetings; that \$30.00 be sent from our Auxiliary to go towards defraying the expenses of a delegate to the Summer Conference to be held at Madison, Wisconsin, on Rural Problems. It was moved, seconded and carried that our Treasurer do this.

Mrs. Lea read a letter concerning the Faith and Order Service for Church Unity to be held May 29th and June 30th,

with special prayer service, and asked the Auxiliary members to co-operate with their rectors.

Mrs. Bradford then gave the reports of the Used Altar Hangings and the Girls Friendly.

Mrs. Lea spoke of the follow-up work of the Bishops' Crusade, and had distributed some leaflets to help us in this special effort of personal re-dedication to the service of Jesus Christ.

There being no more old business the meeting was adjourned to meet the next morning at 10 o'clock.

The Second Session of the Annual Meeting of the Delaware Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was called to order on Wednesday, May 11th, at 10:30 in the Parish House of Christ Church, Milford, by the Vice-President, Mrs. Frederick Bringhurst. It was preceded by a most impressive Corporate Communion Service at which United Thank Offering was presented.

The meeting was opened by prayer and the roll was called.

The delegates to the Provincial Synod to be held this Fall at Roanoke, Virginia, were then voted upon; the President goes by virtue of her office and selects her own alternate; the two remaining delegates were nominated: Mrs. Preston Lea, Mrs. Alban Richey; it was then moved, seconded and carried "that the nomination be closed and the secretary was instructed to

cast the Ballot for the election of Mrs. Lea and Mrs. Richey as Delegates to the Provincial Synod."

Much discussion then followed on the method of securing names for nomination, the general idea being for the Auxiliaries to be notified of those up for nomination before the delegates come to the meeting, so that they could come instructed how to vote by their branches, thereby being able to vote more intelligently; also giving the branches an opportunity to present names in nomination. It was moved, seconded and carried that the President of each Branch should submit the names of eligible members of her parish to fill vacant offices of the Auxiliary to be elected at the Annual Meeting. Each President to be notified of the nominees a month before said meeting, by the Nomination Committee sending out the list of Nominees to each parish a month before the meeting.

It was moved, seconded and carried that most sincere and appreciative thanks be extended to the Milford Branch for its delightful hospitality.

Mrs. Bringhurst read an appeal from Bishop Nichols of Kyoto for funds towards the earthquake destruction. It was moved, seconded and carried that the Auxiliary send \$25.00. It was also moved, seconded and carried that notes of sympathy on account of illness, be sent to Mrs. John Bancroft, Mrs. William Darbie, and Miss Jane Lea.

Dr. Margaret Richey then gave an intensely interesting and graphic account of her work at The Church General Hospital, Wuchang, China, which was of especial interest as she is a Daughter of the Woman's Auxiliary of Delaware.

In closing Dr. Richey asked that, on account of the unsettled conditions in China, the money raised for her use in that country, be sent to the Mission House in New York to be used for the returning missionaries.

Miss Mary Ellen Wood spoke of the wonderful work she has accomplished in establishing the Boone University Library

at Hankow, China. She asked for aid, and one hundred and fifty dollars was pledged by the different parishes.

A rising vote of thanks was given to the retiring secretary, Mrs. de Forest Willard, for her untiring devotion, and never failing interest in all the works of the Woman's Auxiliary. It is with deep regret that we see her retire from this office as recording secretary.

Following a closing prayer and benediction by Bishop Cook, on motion made, seconded and carried, the meeting adjourned.
