PRESIDENT'S REPORT

MAY 1933

The work of the Auxiliary has gone on as usual, with perhaps a little falling off in contributions, but I think not in the supply work and our knitting is in excess of anything we have done before. All the regular meetings of the Auxiliary and the executive meetings have been held and one special meeting of the Executive Board. I have attended all the meetings and the Quiet Days and Intensive Days in each county. The Quiet Day at Laurel, conducted by the Rev. Martin Bram, was a helpful and memorable one. The Intensive Days were the most interesting we have had. Under Mrs. Linton's enthusiastic guidance, a steady improvement is very noticeable and gratifying. I have accepted all invitations to visit the parish branches except one, which I had to miss on account of being sick with a cold. Our meetings have been well attended and our speakers interesting. I was especially pleased to have some of the girls from our two Junior Woman's Auxiliary branches, take part in the Intensive Day meetings, those from Christ Church, Christiana Hundred, singing an Indian song at the New Castle County meeting, and those at Laurel acting a little play at the Sussex County meeting.

As this is my last report and my term of office expires tomorrow, I want to thank you all for the good work you have done, upholding my hands in everything and forwarding the Master's work and the coming of His Kingdom.

EXTRACTS FROM THE MINUTES

EPIPHANY MEETING

Two amendments to the By-laws were adopted.

Article I, Section 1. A nominating committee consisting of one member from each county shall be appointed by the president at the Epiphany meeting.

Article III. The dues of each parish branch shall be \$3.00 a year for a branch of 20 members or less, and an additional ten cents per capita for a branch of over 20 members. Dues are payable by April 15th of each year.

It was voted that offerings at the Quiet Days be applied to General Missions, after expenses have been deducted.

MAY MEETING

It was voted that Mrs. Philip Cook, as the Bishop's wife, be made Honorary President of the Auxiliary. The president re-appointed Mrs. John Boyt as Corresponding Secretary; Mrs. Robert R. Rayner, Custodian of Advance Work; Mrs. George R. Hoffecker, Chairman of Knitting; Mrs. John Harvey, Assistant to Supply Secretary; and Mrs. Edward H. Ford, Custodian of Fund for St. Luke's Hospital, Tokio.

OCTOBER MEETING

The president announced the resignation of Miss Grace Beadenkopf as Custodian of the United Thank Offering and the appointment of Mrs. Ernest N. May as her successor. A message of love and sympathy was sent to the family of Mrs. John Harvey, the late Assistant to the Supply Secretary.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

January 1, 1933 to December 31, 1933

It is a great pleasure to report for the past year a continued increase of interest and activity in the educational work on the part of most of the branches of the diocese. The concluding Education Day, known in each county this year as Indian Day, marks the culmination of reading and study during the period and is an index to the interest and enthusiasm shown in the subject.

These meetings were held at Dover, Laurel, and Immanuel Church, Wilmington, with the largest attendance yet in each county: 33 in Kent, 55 in Sussex, 115 in New Castle County—203 as against 146 last year. Kent had 100 per cent in number of branches represented, New Castle 80 per cent, Sussex 70

per cent. The Junior branches of Laurel and Christ Church, Christiana Hundred, also took part. Twenty-four branches were represented, 7 absent.

Each county had a fine exhibition of relics and Indian arts; and besides these, there were numerous posters about Indian life, missions, etc., and a quantity of colored pictures, some mounted and suitable for hanging, to be sent to Indian missions, many of these pictures prepared by some of the young people of the parishes. At Dover, the exhibit of things Indian was made a part of the set program, interesting details being given about various ancient tools and utensils found in the immediate neighborhood, and examples of blankets, jewelry, etc. of western Indians. At Laurel, the walls were covered with attractive and instructive posters; examples of Indian art were arranged on tables beneath them. The platform in the front of the room was set as a girls' room in an Indian school. At Immanuel Church, Wilmington, the very large exhibit was arranged in groups by parishes, the sections marked by small tepees bearing the name of the parish. These exhibitions, our first attempt at anything of the kind, were most satisfactory. It is a pity that all three could not have been seen by all the Auxiliary.

The general plans of all three programs were similar: papers on subjects connected with Indian problems of education, health, missions, etc., and occasional hymns or Indian songs and legends. Every number was very well worth hearing, and worth talking about; I will mention only a few: a paper on The Story of the Blanket, how the Spider Woman taught the Navajo women to weave. The hymn *Holy, Holy, Holy*, sung in Dakota language. A member of St. John's branch gave a monologue, "The Turquoise Way", a story of an Indian woman's life from childhood until she became a Christian teacher among her own people. This was so artistically done that we who heard it know that Indian woman personally, because we really heard *her* speak. An Indian song, "Arise", was given by a group of Juniors from Christ Church and a play, "Which Trail", by a group including some Juniors from

Laurel. And last, Immanuel, Wilmington, presented, with appropriate stage setting and wonderful costumes, a dramatic presentation of a Navajo family and the ceremony of blessing the hogan.

Those who heard any of these programs must have a deeper interest in our American Indians. Our thanks to all those who made them possible.

These county meetings were started three years ago. Each year a greater number of people have shown interest in the subject considered. This year two-thirds of the branches have had study groups or some variety of reading group meeting regularly with average attendance varying from 5 to 25. Each year, the final programs have shown a wonderful growth in excellence and finish of product. Each year the audiences have given more informed and enthusiastic support.

Our Indian Days have been a real achievement—biggest attendance, best programs, greatest interest yet! Shall we raise our standard higher still next year?

The fall get-together meetings to discuss the new work were held as follows: Sussex County, Lewes, November 3, 38 present representing 6 of the 9 branches; Kent County, Camden, 16 present representing 3 of 6 branches (Middletown is included in this group); New Castle County, Calvary, Wilmington, 32 present representing 8 of 14 branches.

At each of these a brief outline was given of the subject: Christ and the Modern World. Two items of business were taken up. First: the advisability of having an educational secretary in each parish to be the representative of the diocesan educational secretary, to keep the members of the branch in touch with the educational plans of the diocese, and to further missionary instruction in the parish. This plan was unanimously endorsed. Second: How to meet the need for assistance in getting material, plans, methods for putting the missions subject before the parish. It was suggested and approved in each county, that an intensive class for leaders be held, each branch to send two delegates, one of whom should be the parish educational secretary. Sussex County decided to have

an Intensive Day at Georgetown, Dec. 14. Kent County also decided on the Intensive Day with two delegates, but agreed to welcome all others who cared to come. New Castle County decided on a series of three sessions to be held at St. Andrew's, Wilmington, on Tuesdays, January 9, 16, 23, from 7:30 to 9:00 P. M.

The decision about educational secretaries resulted in the appointment of secretaries in ten parishes. That means that 21 parishes have secretaries. 8 branches have not yet reported.

The Sussex Co. Intensive Class was held at Georgetown on Dec. 14. 14 people were present, 5 parishes represented. The Schedule for the day was as follows:

10:00, Holy Communion; Celebrant, Rev. R. Y. Barber, rector of St. Philip's, Laurel.

10:45 to 1:00, Class Sessions.

1:00 to 1:45, Box Luncheon.

1:45 to 3:15, Class Sessions.

A very informal plan was adopted for the discussion hours. The Leaders' Manual was used as the basis of instruction, the leader explaining the topics taken up and suggesting references, methods, etc. which were discussed by the members of the class. As far as your secretary knows, this was the first round table conference for leaders to be held in this diocese. The interest shown and the free discussion of the different topics indicate, we hope, a good year in missionary education.

Following are some statistics:

Your secretary made 11 visits besides the 6 county meetings, thereby coming in direct touch with all but 2 branches.

The 481 knitted garments contributed by 19 branches of the Auxiliary and 2 branches of the Girl's Friendly Society and valued at \$1,050.00, were shared with 8 missions:—Standing Rock and Pine Ridge Corn Creek in So. Dakota; St. John's, Virgin Islands; Christ Church and St. Matthew's, Minn.; Atonement, S. C.; Leper Mission, Japan; and St. Paul's, Eagle, Alaska, and were shipped during May at a cost of \$32.89 for postage, insurance and cartage. Bags and cartons were donated. There were 112 sweaters, 122 pairs stockings, 35 pairs mittens, 77 Afghans, 30 scarfs, 17 pairs wristlets, and 88 articles for babies.
