

## PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Once again it is with pleasure that I make my annual report to the women of the Auxiliary.

The year just passed has brought much of sorrow to many of us. Particularly have we been saddened by the passing of Mrs. Saulsbury, our late President, whose gentle, sustaining presence will be greatly missed, but whose memory will be ever with those of us who were fortunate enough to have known her.

To your present President it has seemed that never had there been a time when the whole Executive had been more shaken. The sudden passing of Dr. Richey was a great loss to the diocese—to us it brought the resignation of our Vice-President, Mrs. Richey, who has gone to live in Brooklyn. Her clear vision was ever helpful and we could hardly let her go. Mrs. Hoffecker, who had been so efficient a chairman of Knitting, was forced to resign. The Vice-President for Kent, Mrs. Virtue, having to move into Sussex, was no longer able to discharge her duties. Our Church Periodical Club had lost its leader too, when Miss Littell passed into Life Eternal.

To those who have so splendidly come forward to fill the gaps, we desire to record here our deep appreciation.

That great meeting in Atlantic City, when I was privileged to be one of your representatives, was one of the experiences of my life, the stimulating influence of which will go with me always.

You will see in the following reports how valiantly the Woman's Auxiliary of the diocese has carried on. Our United Thank Offering, our box work and our special gifts have all been splendid. Let us then exert every effort for the coming year and strive a little harder, feeling that upon each one of us, individually, depends the success of our undertaking. Let us indeed be Auxiliary to the National Council, whose task seems well nigh impossible, save with God's help, for which we must pray unceasingly.

## EXTRACTS FROM THE MINUTES

### EPIPHANY MEETING

Held in Claymont, January 11, 1934, with Bishop Cook, Miss Annie Parke, and Dr. Margaret Richey as speakers. 132 members were present. Pledges were made from the floor for the work of the two women speakers, amounting to \$170.00.

### FORTY-NINTH ANNUAL MEETING

Held in Milford, May 8th and 9th, with 193 members present the first day and 188 the second. The report of a special committee was read and adopted as follows:

The committee recommends that the legitimate expenses of the officers of the Woman's Auxiliary be met from the Contingent Fund, all bills being sent to the President to be approved by her.

Pledges amounting to \$220.00 were made from the floor for the missionary deficit of the Church.

### FALL MEETING

Held in Christ Church, Christiana Hundred on November 7th. 228 members were present. The speakers, Bishop Littell of Honolulu, Rev. Dr. Fenn of Baltimore, and Mrs. Edward M. Cross, were members of a team sent out by the Field Department of the National Council to carry the spirit and message of General Convention.

### REPORT OF TRIENNIAL MEETING, 1934

The Triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary held at Atlantic City, in October, was one of tremendous inspiration and intellectual interest. It is impossible to express on paper the sense of spiritual uplift and encouragement which the gathering produced in its members, although that is, in a sense, the most important message for your delegates to bring home to you. Most of you followed, in the Church papers, the action taken at the Convention and business transacted by the Woman's Auxiliary. Therefore, this report will endeavor to mention only the main points, although they are difficult to select from such a mass of material.

We were all privileged to attend the great opening service of the Convention, as well as the United Thank Offering service the following day. These two services were among the most valuable experiences that we had, the first devoted to thoughts of the tremendous oneness of the Church as it consecrated itself anew to the service of the Master. The second, a service of thanksgiving from women for past blessings and for future opportunities. The vision of the Church as one tremendous organization instead of as a group of many small organizations, is one of the most glorious impressions that a worshipper at these services can receive, and an effective antidote to parochialism and discouragement with local duties in our churches at home.

The great auditorium of Convention Hall at Atlantic City had been transformed into a splendid Church of the Byzantine type. Its coloring is predominately blue-green, which contrasted magnificently with the red baldichino over the temporary Altar, and the red academic hoods of most of the clergy. At the opening service, the space behind the sanctuary was filled with a choir of 1,000 members sitting upon tiered seats. To the majestic strains of the hymn, "God of Our Fathers Whose Almighty Hand," the procession of choirs, clergy and bishops moved down 3 aisles at once. The thunder of the organ shook the very foundations of the building, and the voices of choirs and congregation mingled with it and rang out as one great hymn of triumph. As the service continued, it was amazing how perfectly every word of the clergy could be heard through well controlled amplification in all parts

of the hall, though this gathering of 35,000 people was the largest of our Church hitherto on this Continent.

The following morning at 8 o'clock, 12,000 women gathered in the hall to take part in the inspiring Corporate Communion of the women of the Church. 150 members of the G. F. S., in white dresses and blue veils, took up the United Thank Offering which was presented by Bishop Perry, before the great Altar, in the golden alms basin about which we all have heard. The Presiding Bishop was the celebrant, assisted by 33 other bishops in the administration and other parts of the service. The immense number of communicants was cared for by a Communion rail, at which 100 could kneel at once. Being one of that great throng taking part in such a service of praise and re-dedication to our Master was an experience never to be forgotten. If in moments of discouragement and loneliness you can visualize that vast gathering, offering prayer for the work and needs of the Church, you can never again feel that your own efforts are futile, for you, as well as every other lonely worker for Christ, have been remembered in the petitions of that great throng of your fellow-workers.

On the evening following the United Thank Offering service, thousands gathered once more in the great auditorium, for a Missionary Mass meeting. Bishop Perry made the opening address, and Bishop Matthews, of New Jersey, held up before the congregation the original report of the Missionary Committee of 1835. As a result of this report the whole Church itself was recognized as the only Missionary Society and every baptized member a bearer of the Great Commission. All the missionaries at the Convention were seated, that evening, on the platform and presented in a body to the congregation by Bishop Bartlett of North Dakota. At the close of an address by Bishop Creighton, of Long Island, in which he charged the whole Church to re-incarnate the mind and life of the Master, through the reality of sacrifice, the Rev. C. P. Trowbridge, of Salem, Mass., made a personal suggestion. He acted upon it himself in a way which brought out an unexpectedly high point in the evening. He called upon all those who were willing to show their faith in the missionary cause to come forward and lay an offering on the Altar. Follow-

ing his speech, he stepped forward alone and laid his offering at the foot of the cross. After a moment's hesitation the crowd began to surge forward and soon the steps of the Altar were being covered with \$5.00 and \$10.00 bills, and some even larger. Bishop Perry called for the singing of "Onward Christian Soldiers," "The Son of God Goes Forth To War," and other hymns, while for 20 minutes the crowd of willing givers moved along the aisles and up the Altar steps. The next day we were told that the voluntary offering laid on the Altar steps was \$7,916.00. If all of you could have been present at these services you would have been most proud to belong to such a great and powerful body as is our Church. You would be happy to have a part in sending out those splendid men and women, the missionaries, from many of whom we had the privilege of hearing messages later on. You would be glad that such fine representatives are doing your work in the mission fields both at home and abroad.

To come to the business side of the meeting; the Woman's Auxiliary has taken one main theme for its next 3 year's consideration: "If we be His disciples." In the light of this theme they considered in small groups, the subjects presented by 4 speakers at different meetings of the Auxiliary; The first was by a missionary, Dr. Wei, on "Missions in this Age." The second, was by Dr. Gavin, on "The Resources of the Church." At later meetings we heard from Miss Vida Scudder, on "Christian Citizenship," and Dr. Howard C. Robbins, on "The Life of the Spirit." All these subjects were discussed in small groups and were most inspiring and helpful in turning our thoughts to the practical everyday living of the Christian life.

The following are a few of the interesting changes in organization and Canon Law that were made at the Convention:

After some debate both in the Auxiliary meeting and the 2 houses of General Convention, 4 women were nominated to sit on the National Council—the first ever to have seats on that Council. The Auxiliary nominated them, but General Convention formally elected them, and they are to hold office for 3 years. These women are:

Mrs. James R. Cain, of Columbia, North Carolina; Miss Eva D. Corey, of Brookline, Massachusetts; Miss Rebekah L. Hibbard, of Pasadena, California; Miss Elizabeth Matthews, of Glendale, Ohio.

They are all nationally known officers of the Auxiliary, with years of contact with national and international affairs of the Church.

General Convention was unwilling to effect the constitutional changes proposed in regard to the Presiding Bishopric, but did adopt canons relieving the Presiding Bishop of much office routine by creating a separate office of President of the National Council. We are all proud to know that Bishop Cook was elected to fill the new separate office of President of the National Council.

The question of a possible change in the name of the Church was long and vigorously debated in the House of Deputies. But it was finally decided by both Houses that the proposed change to drop the word Protestant from the Church name was inexpedient at this time.

The ground-work for a forward movement in the Church, intending to recapture all the retrenchment of the Church in depression years, was laid when the General Convention adopted a budget of \$2,700,000 for 1935. A reduction of \$386,000 is provided for if the givings of the various dioceses will not permit the larger sum.

There was no designation made by this convention for the United Thank Offering of 1937. In view of the many changing conditions of the present time, it was thought expedient to leave the decision to be made by the convention of that year. This year's offering amounted to \$789,561.13. The Auxiliary voted that part of the Offering presented this year be devoted to the training of Oriental women, which has not heretofore been done.

The Convention adopted very liberal resolutions concerning war and peace: It definitely opposed the blessing of any war by the Church; it called for the Federal Government's recognition of conscientious objectors; it endorsed a world conference on War and Peace; it called on the Federal Government to press its investigation of the munitions industry, and it demanded that the

Government withhold sales of munitions and loans of money to belligerent governments.

A resolution urging Government permission for licensed physicians, hospitals and clinics to give out birth control information under regulation was carried by a clear majority of both Houses.

A new canon on alien rites was adopted. This makes it possible to receive into communion with this Church individual congregations professing the Catholic creed, but differing in forms of worship from this Church.

Your delegates were privileged to attend a fascinating joint session of the House of Bishops and House of Deputies where leaders of the Church presented splendid reports on the Church's recent work in far places. Tho' I cannot cover them all I mention a few.

**Dr. Wood**, the Secretary of Foreign Missions, told us that people all over the world are still drawn to Christianity in spite of the present bad conditions in the world. Missionaries are not giving up, nor are they discouraged.

**Bishop Bartlett**, of North Dakota, Secretary of Domestic Missions, spoke of his efforts to see that every cent of money invested in this work is well invested. All his institutions are so organized as to aim to be self-supporting in 3 or 4 years. He finds many young people who want to go into this field but who are delayed because the necessary funds are lacking. He told us that Domestic Missions is the method to make America conscious of the necessity of sending the Church to foreign lands. "We must win America for Christ so that America can win the world for Christ."

**Dr McGregor** reported on Religious Education. He mentioned the 500,000 children in Church Schools and their teachers as the greatest missionary force in the Church.

**Miss Grace Lindley**, after a brief review of the plans for the Woman's Auxiliary meetings during Convention, voiced a splendid challenge in a few words: She said that the recent spirit of dis-

couragement in the Church is atheism. For anyone to say "it can't be done" is a denial of the power of God to fulfill His will through us."

**Dr. Hobbs**, of the Church Publicity Bureau, gave a fine description of the way in which his branch of the service stands ready to help all Church branches to publish abroad the work they are doing. He mingled it with delightful humor which sent the whole meeting into bursts of laughter.

**Bishop Thomas**, of Southern Brazil, told us how eagerly the Brazilian and Japanese people of his missionary area flock to his mission services, and appreciate the physical as well as the spiritual care received there. He told of one instance of a young Japanese man, who when in danger of shipwreck, had prayed to the Unknown God to save him. Only he and the captain of the ship were saved, and now that Japanese man is a faithful missionary in Brazil. He has brought over 1,000 people to baptism.

**Bishop Nichols**, of Kyoto, reviewed briefly the Church's missionary progress in Japan from its inception in 1859 to the present. From a tiny struggling missionary church it has grown up and developed into the national Church of Japan. The American Bishop still has power of veto, but the Japanese Church is not a group of foreigners imposing on Japanese life. It has its own bishops and clergy, and maintains and carries on its own church work. 2 dioceses are entirely self-supporting and others are aiming to become so. The same kind of progress is true in China.

**Dr. Lewis B. Franklin**, reporting on the financial status of the Church said that the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Protestant Episcopal Church of America is still sound as to assets and liabilities. It is true there is a deficit accumulated over the past two years amounting to about \$750,000. Also although the new budget of \$2,700,000 is in excess of present income, the National Council believes that the necessary money is there and can be raised if the Church is sufficiently interested. At present only 4½ cents out of every dollar given goes for missions. If 7 cents of each dollar could be given to missions the budget would be easily met. Therefore the greatest missionary

field is in the Church itself—arousing the interest of two thirds of the members who could give, but fail to because of lack of interest in and knowledge of the Church's work.

To return to my first statement, the most important message of the Convention was one of spiritual uplift and encouragement. Your delegates want to tell you that there was a strong feeling among all those present that the Church is far from being in a weak and dying state. On the contrary, it has reached a turning-point in its recent apparently down-hill progress. From now on it is going forward with unity and courage toward ever widening opportunities to bring the world to Christ—this present-day world that needs Him as never before. Let us therefore pray that all may catch this same spirit of joy and encouragement and "spend and be spent" more fully than ever before in the service of our Master.

**St. James', Stanton**—Supplied food and clothing to a family in great distress.

**Trinity, Wilmington**—Relief sewing. Sewing for St. Michael's Home for Babies.

**St. Philip's, Laurel**—Work as individuals but not as a unit.

**All Saints', Delmar**—Clothing, furniture, layettes, bedding, food and milk, 8 loads wood, 6 baskets of fruit at Christmas time, supplied to families in need.

No doubt many other branches have done a great many things for people who needed help, but have not reported it. I would like to have a Social Service chairman appointed by each president of Auxiliary branches to keep account of work done during the next year.

### REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

We are happy to report encouraging growth in educational work in most of the parish branches during the year. The Leaders' Classes, with 20 branches represented, proved themselves worth while. 80% of the branches had some form of educational work, ranging from individual reading to regular discussion groups. The culminating activity in the study of "Christ and the Modern World" was the planning and producing in each county of a program under the title "The Never Failing Light." In Sussex Co. it took the form of a series of tableaux or pantomimes, each scene introduced by appropriate quotations from the Bible. A committee composed of members from the different branches planned the scenes, which were then given to separate parishes to produce. 7 of the 9 branches, 21 people, took part. 60 people were in the audience, a record for Sussex Co.

Kent Co. gave a Poster Pageant, each branch preparing posters on subjects assigned by the committee which planned the program. The work of the Junior Branch of Wyoming on the subject, "Labor and Industry," deserves special mention.

New Castle Co. presented a pageant which was planned in outline by the educational secretaries of 11 of the 14 branches. 5 branches wrote all the speaking parts of their scenes; the rest of the dialogue and necessary connections were written by some of the original committee. 40 persons representing 8 branches, were in the cast. An offering was taken, amounting to \$10.90. The programs, which were kindly made by Miss Rowena Brown, cost \$0.90. The balance of \$10.00 will go toward a memorial to Miss Helen Littell.

The great value of these programs is in the fact that each was a real group project; including about 80 people in the production.

113 books and 64 Leaders' Manuals were distributed for the study of "Christ and the Modern World." So far 59 books and 27 Manuals have been put out for the study of "Understanding Japan." Of these about 20 have been lent by the department.

The regular Fall Get-together Meetings were held as follows: Sussex Co. at Georgetown, Nov. 20th; Kent Co., Dover, Nov. 21st; New Castle Co., St. Andrew's, Wilmington, Nov. 23rd. 18 of 29 branches were represented. New Castle Co., also had a meeting of educational secretaries to discuss plans for the year. Each of these groups discussed and approved a plan to establish a Woman's Auxiliary Lending Library of books pertinent to all interests of the W. A.—Bible Study, Missions and Missionaries, Church History, Religious Thought, etc. Books will be lent for the cost of postage. A committee will be named to consider titles and to purchase books, the cost to be met by having each branch contribute the price of one book, or a stated sum, each year. We hope for the co-operation of our whole membership, not only in **giving** books, but also in **using** them.

Leaders' Classes are in progress. Sussex Co., has already had an Intensive Day, held at Lewes, Dec. 12th, with 18 people attending, 6 of 9 branches represented.

At the Get-together Meetings and at the Sussex Co., Intensive Day, a plate was placed for offerings for the missions deficit. Receipts: Sussex Fall Meeting, \$4.45; Kent, \$2.05; New Castle Co., \$3.50; Sussex Intensive Day (including the offering at Communion) \$5.00—a total of \$15.00, which has been sent to the Diocesan W. A. Treasurer.

We plan to continue this opportunity for voluntary contribution at every meeting held by the department.

Your secretary has held 6 county meetings, 2 Intensive Days, 1 Study Class (4 sessions), 5 committee meetings, and visited 8 parish branches.

We are thankful for the progress of the past year, and we look forward to a new year of still deeper interest and greater zeal to hasten the coming of His Kingdom on earth.

## REPORT OF CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

It was with faltering steps and slow that I took up the work of the C. P. C. where Miss Helen Littell left off. No one else seemed willing, so I accepted the challenge to carry on in some small measure the work she did so ably and untiringly. The loss of such a great leader has made the work suffer, of course, but due to the willingness of the Committee members, Parish Secretaries and all our friends, I rejoice to report a continued interest and enthusiasm which is most gratifying. We have supplied reading material to practically all the Institutions of Delaware, as well as to 28 states, our Island possessions and the Far East. We have covered the walls of the Indian and other Missions with bright colored posters and cheered the lonely with cards and scrap books. Our books have gone to almost every corner of the globe, reaching isolated clergy, mission and college libraries, Seamen's Institutes and individuals in the Parishes and Communities. It is far-reaching indeed, this C. P. C. missionary work, and the more helpers we have the wider our scope and the larger

our circle of interest. We still give the "Living Church" and the "Spirit of Missions" to the Wilmington Public Library, but we need more magazine subscribers. There are constant appeals to the main office for magazines and they are more needed now than ever. And books, always books of many kinds are needed for adults and children.

The support of our work comes largely from the Associate Members, who pledge \$1.00 a year, but we need more members, and I am sure if you could read our letters of gratitude, you would realize that no other dollar does any more good than your C. P. C. dollar.

After the way in which my co-workers have kept up this work, one cannot help but feel a real encouragement for the coming year.
