PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The pages that follow will give you in detail the work accomplished by the Woman's Auxiliary of the diocese of Delaware. My part is merely to add a few items which I hope may be of interest. On our golden jubilee, which we celebrated last May, we presented to those attending our annual diocesan convention and our members a pageant depicting some of the achievements of our fifty years of endeavor. Those who impersonated our first officers were in most cases their daughters or near relatives—still carrying on, sharing in the work of the Auxiliary in spreading God's message to those who have it not, helping by prayer and work and gifts to make "His beloved Son known to all nations as their Savior and their King."

Your response to our appeal for \$250.00 to swell the sum of our diocesan "expectancy" to \$13,000.00 was so splendid (\$505.00 being pledged) that we feel we must here record our appreciation. Would we could thank each one personally who through loyal self-sacrifice made this possible.

Your officers were asked to sit with the diocesan Executive Council at a recent budget meeting. While we have no representation on the board, I feel that through this closer contact with the work and problems of our diocese we shall grow in usefulness and intelligent service.

I ask that you will make preparation for the Quiet Day for Prayer and that you will let nothing prevent you from doing your share. It is a beautiful and uplifting experience to feel that we are a part of this band of women in every parish and mission of our Church, praying on Armistice Day for the peace of the whole world.

I have attended the County Quiet Days, and also the Educational Days, and note with gratification the increased attendance. Also I have visited most of the branches.

I cannot too strongly urge upon you all to make daily use of "Forward—Day by Day," the booklet of Bible readings and meditations for the Church year. Pass some of these booklets on to others. There are so many who need God. In the words of the Presiding Bishop "Give in loving faith—and trust God for the rest."

EXTRACTS FROM THE MINUTES

EPIPHANY MEETING

Held in Old Swedes' Church, Wilmington, on January 10, 1935. Attendance 131. Addresses by Rt. Rev. J. B. Bentley, Suffragan Bishop of Alaska, and Rt. Rev. Philip Cook, who asked for greater missionary support from the diocese. It was voted that the matter of an extra gift of \$250.00 from the Auxiliary be brought before the Executive Committee to determine.

FIFTIETH ANNUAL MEETING

Held in St. John's Cathedral and St. Andrew's Parish House, Wilmington, May 14 and 15, 1935. Attendance 243 and 197. The guests of honor were the Provincial president of the Auxiliary; the presidents of diocesan branches of Baltimore, Easton, and Washington; all the living past presidents of the Delaware branch of the Junior and Woman's Auxiliaries. A most interesting history of the first twenty years of this branch, written by Mrs. C. L. McIlvaine in 1905, was read, followed by reminiscences of the past presidents there present.

The annual pledge to the Hebrew-Christian Publication Society was voted to be discontinued. Announcement was made of the gift of a credence-shelf to St. Thomas' Mission, Point Hope, Alaska, in memory of Dr. Driggs, a Smyrna priest and physician, who was the first missionary to the Eskimos. Pledges were received from the floor for \$250.00 promised to Bishop Cook to raise Delaware's "expectancy" to \$13,000.00. These totalled \$505.00 instead of the sum asked for. The president announced her appointment of Mrs. John Boyt as corresponding secretary, and Mrs. Frederick Bringhurst as treasurer of the Fund for St. Luke's Hospital, Tokio. The supply secretary reappointed Mrs. G. M. Miller as chairman of Knitting.

Held in St. Paul's Church, Georgetown, on October 10, 1935. Attendance 183. Preacher, Rt. Rev. Philip Cook, president of the National Council. Address by Rt. Rev. Hiram Hulse on Missionary Work in Cuba.

Interesting Items from the Programme

The youngest person to join the W. A., and a member from the beginning, is our president, Mrs. Baker. She was eleven years old when she heard the rector of Ascension Church, Claymont, announce that Trinity Church was to organize a branch of the W. A., and invited other women to the meeting. When the day came, she remembered, so collected another small girl, drove to Wilmington, attended the meeting, and joined the W. A.

Immanuel Church, New Castle, joined the National W. A. in 1884, almost a year before the Delaware Branch was organized.

1888—The first Quiet Day for Women was held.

1894—Babies' Branch organized. Noon-day prayers for missions established.

1919—Bishop Lee Scholarship Fund completed. Efrain Salinas here—now Bishop of Mexico.

1924—Dr. Margaret Richey, medical missionary to China, adopted as a daughter of the Delaware Branch.

The first money contribution recorded by the Delaware branch was toward the salary of the missionary in Laurel.

In 1888, the membership was 301 in 12 branches, including 2 branches of the G. F. S. In 1890, there were 18 branches. Today we have 29 branches and 850 members.

The Bishop's Guild, organized by Mrs. W. D. Bradford in 1923, has supplied St. Michael's Home for Babies with almost 20,000 articles and \$400.00 cash in the 12 years of its existence.

Dover has 3 members who were at the original meeting of that branch in 1887; Mrs. J. H. Wilson, Mrs. A. H. Culbreth, and Miss Alice Gibson. Mrs. John P. Saulsbury was the treasurer from 1887 to her death in 1934.

When the parishes of Newport, Stanton, and Marshallton organized a joint branch in 1893, Mrs. A. J. Newlin was elected secretary. She has continued as secretary and treasurer to the present time.

Mrs. Gilbert Lynam is the only member of the original group still belonging to the branch at St. John's, Wilmington.

The Leighton Coleman Memorial Fund, started in 1908, is devoted to the Bishop's Purse for special needs in the diocese.

Miss Helen Cooch, whom Newark sent as its own Missionary to the mountain people in Virginia, afterwards married Archdeacon Neve.

In 1889, county vice-presidents were appointed to instruct the parish branches in Diocesan Missions.

In 1895 the first Mission Study classes appeared. For some time the responsibility for such work rested on the Directress for Foreign Missions. In 1912 the title Foreign Directress was changed to Educational Secretary, Miss Margaret Shearman being the first to bear that name.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT**January 1 to December 31, 1935**

The work of the education department has shown encouraging progress. The Leaders' Study Groups on Japan were held in January, an all-day Institute in Kent Co., and a three session class in New Castle Co., this class being led by Mrs. John H. Moore. Sussex Co.'s Institute was held earlier. From January to May, there were 12 groups studying Japan, average attendance, 160; 3 Reading Clubs, 56 members; 62 Individual Readers outside of study classes or reading clubs; 2 institutes, 1 class of three sessions for Leaders, average attendance 46; 2 Bible Classes, average attendance 29; 6 branches had book shelves, one reporting 30 borrowers on subjects connected with Bible study; most branches reported some missions information at every meeting; among programs given were some on Orientals in America, The Daughter of a Samurai, Missions in This Age; Church History and The Prayer Book were additional subjects of study in two branches. The total number of persons reported in some kind of educational work is 353, more than 40% of the total membership as reported in the Year Book.

Because of the celebration of our fiftieth anniversary in May, the usual Spring Educational Days were omitted; and the branches gave themselves to looking up their own W. A. history, and to making anniversary posters.

At meetings of parish educational secretaries held in September, (Kent and Sussex at Milton, New Castle Co. in Wilmington), it was decided to have all-day Fall Get-together Meetings, with the usual conference on missions in the morning and a speaker to address the meeting in the afternoon.

The New Castle Day was held at St. Andrew's Church, October 23rd. At the morning conference, Mrs. R. W. Twining of Trinity Branch gave a résumé of Stephen Duggan's Book, "The Two Americas." The speaker of the afternoon was the Very Rev. Hiram Bennett, Dean of the Cathedral, who talked on "Our Missions in Latin America." Kent and Sussex held a joint Education Day at Milford, November 7th. At the morning

conference, Miss Anne Bell of Old Swedes' Branch, talked about the Pan-American Conference at Montevideo and relations between U. S. and Latin American countries. In the afternoon Mrs. John Hill, President of the Pennsylvania W. A., addressed the meeting on "What the Woman's Auxiliary Means." The combined attendance at these meetings was 100, and those present were enthusiastic over the new plan.

Kent and Sussex held a joint Institute on Latin America at Laurel, December 5th.

During the year your secretary has held two Intensive Days, two all day Get-together Days, four meetings with parish educational secretaries, and attended three study class sessions and fourteen parish branch meetings, most of the last to further the anniversary program. Through these 25 meetings, she was in touch with members of all but one branch.

The county meetings a year ago voted to contribute fifty cents a branch to a Library Fund. Eleven branches have so far paid their quota, so we have now in that fund \$5.50. Fifteen books have been given to the Library recently.

The collections at education meetings, amounting to \$20.00, are to be sent to Bishop Salinas for educational purposes in Mexico.
