PRESIDENT'S REPORT

January 1st to May 14th

At the close of my three years of office, it is my privilege and pleasure to make this report of my activities and impressions. I have visited parishes from one end of the State to the other. Though two branches have become inactive, two new branches (Newport and a second section at the Cathedral) have been added to our numbers. Work in the remaining twenty-seven is going on in a most satisfactory manner.

A program which was developed by Mrs. Linton, Miss Littell, Mrs. Bringhurst, and Miss Anne Bell was presented this spring in place of the customary Education Days. We hope it may result in a more uniform method of procedure throughout the branches.

We have co-operated in the Interdenominational Day of Prayer, which was held in the Cathedral Church last Lent.

I cannot speak too highly of my admiration and appreciation of your response to the appeal for the recent crisis in the support of the Missionary work of the Church. I know your generous response came from your devotion to this great Church of ours. You will reap a rich reward in seeing the work go on and prosper.

Do not be discouraged by small numbers or financial drawbacks. Keep in touch with parish activities, especially young people's groups. Present Auxiliary work to young women in an interesting way, and we shall gain many new members. Encourage each other by your attendance at all meetings of the Auxiliary.

I cannot close without expressing my thanks to the Bishop for his generous assistance throughout these three years; to the Executive Board for the patience they have shown to an untried chairman; and to the parishes which have offered me such cordial hospitality. I have learned so much from my contacts with you that I shall be forever in your debt. My prayers and hopes are with you always, that you will go on and on in your endeavor to advance God's Kingdom here on earth.

May 14th to December 31st

My report must begin with the endeavor of arranging for the Fourteenth Synod of the Third Province in October. Preparations were begun in June, and entailed much correspondence and many conferences. I cannot adequately express my gratitude for the fine spirit shown by all who took care of the 325 guests. In no instance did I meet with a refusal when appealing for leaders or workers. Many letters and verbal expressions of appreciation have come from those who attended the Synod.

Our regular October meeting was held in Trinity Church, Wilmington, and was well attended. As the Negro here and in Africa has been selected as the subject for this season's study, we invited as guest speaker a young Negro woman from St. Paul's School, Lawrenceville, who proved to all present that the Negro needs only the opportunity to show what education can do for a white soul under a dark skin.

A Regional Conference, under the leadership of Dr. Grace Lindley, was held in Richmond, Va., in November. The five delegates from Delaware felt they had received great benefit from the conference, and were well repaid for the effort of going.

Two County Auxiliary days have been held, one in Sussex and one in Kent. They were well attended, and I believe have created better understanding and co-ordination in the Auxiliary work.

The reports which follow show that our contributions for the past year have decreased. May we enter the year before us with renewed zeal; work more diligently, pray more fervently, and with grateful hearts give gladly, as He has given to us.

EXTRACTS FROM THE MINUTES

Held in Smyrna, May 12 and 13, 1936, with 202 present the first day and 184 the second. Speakers were Bishop Colmore of Puerto Rico and Rev. William McClelland of the Diocese of Easton. It was voted to close the account for Advance Work and to send the balance of \$42.33 to Alaska. It was also voted to add to the pledge-cards "St. Luke's Hospital, Tokio," thereby terminating the special fund for that object. Appointed officers were announced: Mrs. William H. Beacom, Assistant Secretary; Mrs. John K. Conolly, Corresponding Secretary; Mrs. Richard S. Rodney, Chairman of Knitting. Pledges from the floor were received for the Diocesan Expectancy amounting to \$225.00. Mrs. Robert B. Rayner was elected President for the ensuing term of three years.

OCTOBER MEETING

Held in Trinity Church, Wilmington, October 29, 1936, with 198 members present. Speakers were Miss Helen Edmonds of the American Church Institute for Negroes and Miss Caroline Gillespie of Rosborough House, N. C. It was voted that next season an Auxiliary Day be held every month in different counties, with officers' conferences and speakers. These were to be arranged by county vice-presidents under the president.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT

January to December, 1936

The Educational Department reports progress. All but four branches gave some attention to the mission subject, Latin America. 16 branches were represented at the Leaders' Classes; 17 branches had regular study groups with an average attendance of 131, and number of sessions ranging from 3 to 8; 8 branches had missionary programs with guest speakers, poster talks, etc.; 24 individual readers were reported; 2 reading clubs, 9 members; 2 Bible Classes with average attendance 23; members from 8 branches attended the Peninsula Summer Conference at Ocean City, Md. One of the study groups took the form of a Missionary Tea, with a charge of 25 cents a session, and included members of other denominations. The group had an average attendance of 20, and was most successful. Several other branches continued study during June. Approximately 150 books on Latin America were distributed. 12 books for supplementary reading were put in the Lending Library and were in almost constant use.

The Educational Department turned over its appointed Spring Education Days to the Diocesan Executive Committee for County Auxiliary Days. The morning program included a discussion of the Parish Program, led by Miss Littell, Mrs. Bringhurst and Miss Anne Bell, and conferences with parish officers. The afternoon was given to an address by Mrs. James Davis, Field Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary of Pennsylvania. These meetings were held at the Cathedral Church of St. John, and at Milford.

It had been decided that as we were studying Latin America, we would devote the offerings of the Education Days to the work of Bishop Salinas y Valasco in Mexico. These offerings amounted to \$55.34. Expenses were \$5.20; \$50.14 was sent to the Bishop.

As the County Auxiliary Days are to continue, there were no separate all day meetings of this department in the fall. A meeting

of parish educational secretaries of New Castle County was held in October, with all but three branches represented. Work on the present subject, "Understanding the American Negro," is progressing.

The various books accumulated in this department for the past eight years have been placed in the Chapter Room of the Cathedral Church, as a nucleus for the Lending Library of the Woman's Auxiliary. Mrs. A. T. Calhoun has been appointed Librarian. When plans are perfected, she will be in the Chapter Room at regular hours, one day a week. A Book Committee, consisting of Mrs. Charles Prettyman, Mrs. Frederick Bringhurst and Mrs. W. E. Linton, has been appointed to read and pass on books to be added to the Library. This committee is ready to consider requests for new books, and also invites contributions of used books. The Library Fund now amounts to \$13.00. Thirteen branches contributed to this fund in 1936. Every branch is asked to contribute 50 cents a year, and we look for this regularly. We urge all members to use freely the books, and so help to make the Lending Library really worth while.

Blankets and towels were sent to a colored institution in Virginia. Fruit and jelly went to Sunnybrook; Sunday School tables to a mission in Alberene, Va., etc.

REPORT OF THE DIOCESAN SOCIAL SERVICE WORK

Different branches of the Auxiliary have seen to it that the babies at both of our Homes had what was needed in the way of clothes, bedding, and food. Auxiliary members have helped in the Red Cross and served on different social service boards and committees such as the Children's Bureau, St. Michael's Home for Babies, Family Society, Girls' Industrial School and Juvenile Probation Association. Your Secretary continues to serve as clinical follow-up worker for the Juvenile Court. There have been 371 visits made to homes and 227 to clinics. Fifty-five children were helped with operations and glasses.

This year we are doing a new piece of work. When Judge Willey was elected to be judge of the Juvenile Court of Kent and Sussex Counties, he found his hands tied because the Legislature had neglected to provide for any probation work. Bishop Cook was asked if the diocese would be willing to let me give them part time until the next Legislature meets. I am doing this, and it is real missionary work at home.
