PRESIDENT'S REPORT

In compiling this report I look back over a twelve-month period which has been fruitful in results.

As in the past, I refer you to the individual reports of each chairman for details of achievements in her particular department. I have personally answered all communications, Diocesan, Provincial, and National. Have arranged for speakers and provided for their transportation.

It has been my privilege to attend all County Auxiliary Days, and Quiet Days with two exceptions, and have accepted all invitations to attend Parish meetings throughout the diocese. It was my privilege to serve as a delegate at the National Peace Conference in Washington last March representing the Woman's Auxiliary of the Episcopal Church. All pledges have been covered and meetings have been well attended. At each session we have heard messages from representative leaders in the Church, and all appeals have been generously responded to.

Mrs. John E. Hill, our Provincial representative on the National Executive Board, was one of these speakers, impressing us all with the importance of her work and thrilling us with the joy of service. Close upon the death of our beloved Bishop, Rt. Rev. Philip Cook, came the announcement of the great deficit in the adopted Budget of the Church. It seemed that there could be no more fitting tribute to him and his great missionary spirit than a thank offering for this need. When it was brought before our Annual meeting, so keen was the interest and so generous your pledges that the sum of \$2028 was sent in proof that his influence is still a living force in this Diocese.

A full delegation attended the Fiftieth Provincial Synod held in Richmond, Va., October 19-21st, which was of unusual interest, and inspiration. Reports of the meetings have been made at parish visits. The Most Rev. Henry St. George Tucker addressed us on our duty to the Church, in light of the position we now hold in the eyes of the world. He said "America has become as it has never been before, a symbol of whether Christianity is adequate to meet the needs of a sick, discouraged, war torn, helpless people. We must make ourselves more Christian in order to meet this challenge."

EXTRACTS FROM THE MINUTES

Epiphany meeting, January 13, 1938, at Christ Church, Delaware City, attendance eighty-three members. Amendment passed to Article II, Section 2 of the Constitution, making the office of Corresponding Secretary elective. Speakers, Sister Elspeth of the community of All Saints, who sketched the history of the monastic movement in the Church, and told of its benefits and aims; the Reverend Robert Y. Barber of Laurel, who made a stirring address on his rural work in this Diocese.

Annual meeting, May 11 and 12, St. Peter's Church, Lewes, with 217 members present the first day and 191 the second. Speakers were Dr. Margaret Richey who told of her work in China during the war years, and the Rev. William J. Woon, who described rural work in Nebraska. Pledges from the floor for a fund to be sent to the National Council for General Missions in memory of Bishop Cook, amounted to \$2000. On motion it was voted to appoint a member of the Girls' Friendly Society on the Executive Board of the Diocesan Auxiliary.

Appointments were announced as follows: Chairman of Knitting, Mrs. Julian Adair; Social Service Secretary, Mrs. Howard Seaman; Representative of the G. F. S., Miss Anne Bell.

Fall meeting, Christ Church, Christiana Hundred, October 13, 1938. 172 members present. Speakers, Mrs. Guy Emery Shipler, of Newark, N. J., who spoke on Christian Social Service as construed to mean prevention of causes of distress; and the Reverend Carey Montague, City Missionary of Richmond, Va., who told of his work in the institutions and with the unfortunates of that city. The two addresses gave a well defined picture of Christian Social Service work, both preventive and remedial.

REPORT OF WORK FOR BISHOP'S GUILD FOR ST. MICHAEL'S HOME

In compiling the report for the Bishop's Guild, I found it necessary to make my own valuation of supplies, as very few figures were given. The Superintendent said generally the cost is \$65 for a crib for a baby, and \$45 for a child three years or older. REPORT OF GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY

Miss Anne Bell, the G. F. S. representative on the Diocesan Executive Board, reported an increase in the membership of the society in the Candidate group, ages from five to twelve. In 1937 there were no branches in rural Delaware; in 1938 a branch has been organized at Milton and plans are being made for another in lower Delaware. The young people of this Diocese were represented at the Young People's Week End at the General Convention at Cincinnati by a member of the G. F. S.

Nationally the G. F. S. has given itself the task of bringing about a better understanding between that organization and the Woman's Auxiliary. They have for years co-operated through the Supply Department. In Delaware the Woman's Auxiliary sponsors the G. F. S.; the Vice-president of Sussex County has done promotion work; the new branch at Milton has as its President a member of the Auxiliary; a member of the society is on the Executive Board of the Diocesan Auxiliary. It is to the advantage of both organizations when they work together as they have in Delaware.
