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Report of the Recording Secretary.

Since our Diocesan Auxiliary reassembled in the past autumn we have had our six monthly meetings and one Missionary tea, at which we have had the great pleasure that we always look forward to, of hearing and seeing face to face some of the great missionary workers of our Church, whom we love and esteem highly for their work's sake. This year we have heard Bishop Spalding plead for the varied and difficult work of his great district; namely, the Mission among the Ute Indians; the work amongst the ranches near the living and dead mines; the effort to give the Mormons a pure, spiritual faith, and the St. Mark's Hospital, Salt Lake City. We have heard Bishop Johnston speak of his diocese, twice as big as the State of New York, with the flood of emigrants from Southern Europe pouring into it; and of the work he is trying to do among German socialists and unbelievers. Then from Bishop Funsten's Diocese came the Rev. Mr. Ruffin Jones, of Boise, who spoke to us of the Indian work, and of the frightful spread of Mormonism, and interested us in his hospital at Boise. The Rev Robb White from Virginia, and the Rev. Dr. Bishop from Tennessee, made us feel some of their enthusiasm for the poor, isolated mountain people of the South, who have seemed dead to all human happiness and progress since the early settlement of our country. The Rev. A. B. Hunter, of Raleigh, North Carolina, told us of his school of 380 pupils, and of the mental and moral teaching given to them; he is asking help for a hospital that his pupils are building. Then

the Rev. Mr. Kong, a Chinese clergyman living in Honolulu, spoke of the wonderful success of the Mission to his people there, in Bishop Restarick's district. The Rev. Mr. Lund from Hankow spoke of the influence of Christian missionaries in China, and of the absence of any religion amongst the people, although they had many faiths. He spoke of the ease with which a congregation can be gathered in China, and said he was anxious to build a little church upon a crowded business street.

And so we have found in the words of these noble men additional inspiration to go on in our quiet, peaceful home-work, feeling very thankful if we can cheer and help in the smallest way those who are in the forefront of the battle.

Report of the Corresponding Secretary.

The opening service of the Washington Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in November, 1905, in St. John's Church, Washington; an address was given by the Rector, the Rev. Dr. Roland C. Smith. Since that time the Parish Branches, 32 in number, have been diligently at work, as will be seen by the report of boxes and money herewith submitted. Dollars and cents, however, can but poorly represent the real help, comfort and refreshment, for the spirit as well as the body, which these gifts have brought to the workers in our many Mission fields, far and near. Some of these fields have been vividly pictured to us by the speakers who represented them at our meetings, and on these occasions an offering has been given for the work.

We thank all the Parish Branches which have so nobly aided in providing for the missionaries in our own Diocese, and also for their co-operation in the united boxes.

The Christmas boxes were sent to Missions in Stanardsville, Virginia; White Rock, Utah; Eastover, South Carolina, and in our own Diocese; the Easter boxes to a hospital in West Virginia, and a Mission in Asheville. We still support the Catharine E. Jones Memorial Scholarship in St. Mary's School, Shanghai, China, and contribute annually to

furnish a companion for Bishop Rowe, of Alaska, when on his Arctic journeys. Special cases of need have been brought before us, and not in vain. The Mission Study Classes have been held as heretofore. During Lent the privilege of a "Quiet Day" was kindly given to us at St. Mark's Church by the rector, the Rev. Dr. Devries, whose earnest and helpful words were gratefully appreciated.
