Report of Recording Secretary

At our opening meeting in the fall we were fortunate in having with us Bishop Johnson from South Dakota. He spoke of Bishop Hare and said his life was "like a holy dew which watered the earth and made it bring forth." He described an Indian as a man who had never had a fair chance, and spoke of their slovenly habits, but true souls, and said many of them came to the Communion with pure hearts, if not with clean hands.

Bishop Kinsolving, from Brazil, gave us an interesting address, speaking of the growth of the work from its inception 21 years ago. He was most anxious to collect scholarships for founding schools for the youth of Brazil.

Mrs. Wetmore, from North Carolina, talked to us in her vivid way, and said our diocesan scholarship had educated a boy who is believed to be considering the ministry as his future profession. She impressed upon us the expense as well as the importance of the "industrial training."

Miss Lindley, General Secretary of the Junior Auxiliary, gave us a most spiritual address.

After dwelling upon the immense importance of the present moment in missions, she quoted Emerson as saying "what you are speaks so loud that I cannot hear what you say."

Mr. Thompson, from Kentucky, gave us a graphic picture of his school, which trains for the Seminary and Holy Orders. He asked for the "prayer behind the gift." Mrs. Hunter, from North Carolina, gave us a most valuable sketch of the work which has been done amongst colored people in her institutions.

Rev. Mr. Cooper, from Hankow, spoke of the Chinese missions and character in a most interesting way. As we hear these holy voices we realize:

"It was not then a poet's dream

* * *

Which bids us see in heaven and earth
In all fair things around,

Strong yearnings for a blest new birth
With sinless glories crowned."

Report of the Corresponding Secretary

One new Branch has been received this year, that of St. Paul's, Aquasco, Maryland, making our number 34. These have worked, as heretofore, for Missions and Missionaries in our own Diocese and in almost every part of the great field.

They have united in the support of the Catherine E. Jones Memorial Scholarship in St. Mary's School, Shanghai, China, in the Bishop Rowe Fund, and in aiding other Missionary objects from time to time presented to us. Also in the Christmas boxes sent to Mission Home, Charlottesville, Virginia, and to one of our Diocesan Missions, and the Easter boxes sent to the Church Home and Hospital, Orlando, Southern Florida.

Two cases of great loss, occasioned by the burning of rectories, were brought to our notice; one in Virginia, the other in our own Diocese, and prompt and generous aid was sent.

A Quiet Day was given in Lent by the Bishop of the Diocese. Mission Study Classes were held weekly during Advent of Lent. At the request of the General Secretary three Committees were appointed; one on Spiritual Development, one on Missionary Information, and one on the "Forward Movement."
