As we survey the work of another year we are strengthened and encouraged by the unfailing loyalty and devotion of the Woman's Auxiliary throughout the Diocese. THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

For two years we have worked together and I can truthfully say, for my own part, that it has been with increasing joy, as the spirit of loving understanding, that makes of the Woman's Auxiliary one family, has also grown.

As your President, I have some disappointments to meet, but I have also the happiness that comes from a report of work well done.

The simplicity of the Annual Report Blank makes all the more apparent the development of a branch in certain definite ways;—in its Devotional life, in its Educational work, in its Supply work, while the United Thank Offering report tells a vital story in itself.

The Standard Branch, as given in the President's Letter of January, provides a table of points by which to measure a branch's accomplishments.

Although some flexibility of administration is allowable, there are fundamental aims and ideals to which loyalty is required.

It should not be possible for any branch to grow so faint-hearted as to give up entirely, especially now when every person in the Diocese has had the opportunity of gaining spiritual vision during the recent Mission.

The Diocesan Officers are quick to respond to every appeal for assistance and they are glad to go to any branch requesting their presence.

The Church for a long time has barely held the line. Now the call has gone forth, in the Name of her Leader, to Advance.

The National Council has asked for a Corporate Gift of \$1,500,000 from the Church. The share of our own Diocese is \$30,000, this being half of the amount needed to rebuild the Bishop Payne Divinity School.

A schedule of gifts has been prepared in amounts ranging from \$1,000.00 to \$5.00. Of these latter, it is expected that there will be two thousand, provided by the membership of the Auxiliary. Individual gifts may be Memorials to faithful members of the household who served as butlers, cooks, maids, nurses, coachmen, chauffeurs, laundresses, gardeners or in some other capacity.

Gifts may also be made in acknowledgement of the faithful service of one still living who, in this way, will receive the pleasure that comes from recognition of duty well performed.

In this last year of my term of office, the opportunity is at hand to show our love for the Master and our devotion to His Cause.

Let us humbly implore: "Teach us, good Lord, to serve Thee as Thou deservest; to give and not to count the cost; to fight and not to heed the wounds; to toil and not to seek for rest; to labour and not to ask for any reward, save that of knowing that we do Thy will, Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen."

**REPORT OF THE VICE-PRESIDENT FOR
MONTGOMERY COUNTY**

Ten branches of the Woman's Auxiliary are functioning in this county. Four of them, All Saints' with three B Branches; St. John's, Bethesda; Grace Church, Woodside; and Ascension Church, Silver Spring (formerly Silver Spring Mission) are in the thickly settled part of Montgomery County adjacent to the District of Columbia line. Four of them are in towns, Christ Church, Kensington; Christ Church, Rockville; Ascension Church, Gaithersburg; and St. Peter's, Poolesville and Christ Church, Barnesville. Two are in the open country, St. Bartholomew's, Laytonsville; and St. John's, Olney. All are classed as rural and all save one have paid their annual dues. There are about four hundred members in all.

Mrs. Taber's visit to the branches was not only helpful to them, but was also of the greatest benefit to your Vice-President, who was enabled to see the work in a county-wide way presented by one who has had nation-wide experience.

The County Meeting held at St. Bartholomew's Church, Laytonsville, on the tenth of October was, as always, a day of real Woman's Auxiliary inspiration. The theme of the meeting, College Work, was most ably presented by Mr. Coleman Jennings, and the offering was used as a gift to the new St. Andrew's Church at College Park.

Montgomery County needs and asks for the interest, the understanding sympathy and the prayers of all the other branches in the Diocese of Washington, that this work may continue and grow.

REPORT OF THE VICE-PRESIDENT FOR PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY

The Spring Meeting of the Auxiliary Branches of Prince George's County was held at Trinity Church, Marlboro. Owing to the unseasonable heat it was a small meeting. The speaker was Mrs. Taber who also held a conference with the Presidents. Three Diocesan officers were present. Mrs. Hopkins met with the treasurers and helped them towards a better understanding of financial matters. The offering went to the unfulfilled diocesan pledges. Mrs. William S. Hill, of Marlboro, was elected secretary-treasurer to serve in the county for three years.

The Fall meeting was at St. Philips, Laurel. Dr. James Morris spoke in the morning of the work in Brazil. The offering was given to him to be used at his discretion. Mrs. Martin met the Educational Secretaries to outline the year's program of Mission study; at the Presidents' conference a model constitution was given to each one, with the request that she submit it to her Branch for adoption; stressing the need for definite length of term and rotation in office.

During Mrs. Taber's stay in the Diocese she visited each of our branches and one parish guild; in two cases women from parishes without branches were invited to join their neighbors; she spoke at five Sunday services; one of them was at St. Simons, a colored chapel.

I regret to report that we have lost one branch. St. John's, Beltsville, has been, by its own request, dropped from the roll. Seven persons attended Summer School, three of them from B Branches. In preparation for our gift to the advance work program, each branch has been supplied with information including a report of the Bishop Payne Divinity School.

REPORT OF THE VICE-PRESIDENT FOR CHARLES COUNTY

The Charles County Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary held two meetings during the year—one in June at Wayside and the other in September at St. John's Chapel, Pomonkey. Owing to the early date of the fall meeting, no Diocesan Officers were available and the meeting was carried on by Charles County people.

One new branch was formed, making a total individual membership of seventy-five.

Mrs. Taber's visit in May and the mission in November were a great inspiration, and, with such opportunities, the work of the Auxiliary is bound to go forward in Charles County.

REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY FOR THE YEAR 1930

The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Washington held seven business meetings during the year. Six were held at the regular hour of two o'clock and one at eight in the evening. The average attendance was 168, representative of 52 branches.

Corporate Communion preceded the Annual Meeting in January, the Officers' Conference in February, the Devotional Hour in March, the Annual Institute in November and the Anniversary Service in December. At the December service in Bethlehem Chapel were commemorated the names of those members who during the year had passed on into the Life Triumphant.

Speakers during the year included Bishop Freeman; Miss Winegar, Secretary of the Board for Mountain Work in the Blue Ridge Archdeaconry; Bishop Rowe and Deacon Mather of Alaska; Mrs. Taber, National Field Worker under the U. T. O.; Dr. Mary James of Wuchang, China; the Rev. George B. Gilbert of Middletown, Connecticut, who spoke on Rural Work; Miss Cornelia Sorabji of India; the Rev. Robert W. Patton, D. D., Director of the American Church Institute for Negroes; Mrs. Anson Phelps Stokes, who presented the work of the Woman's Committee of the National Cathedral; Mr. Lawrence Choate, who told of the Faith and Youth movement; and Miss Grace Lindley, National Executive Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

There are 70 Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Washington with an approximate membership of 2054. Of these 11 are B Branches and 4 are Night Branches. Five Branches were organized during 1930—Trinity, Takoma Park; Esther Memorial, Congress Heights; St. George's Mission, Washington; Trinity, Newport; and Ascension, Gaithersburg. One Branch, St. Paul's, Aquasco, disbanded, and at Trinity Church, Washington, the Day Branch consolidated with the Night Branch.

The Executive Committee, consisting of fifteen members, held nine meetings with an average attendance of eleven.

Each Parish Branch was asked to undertake special work in preparation for the Diocesan Preaching Mission, November 16th to 23rd, which was arranged by the Commission on Evangelism of which the President of the Diocesan Auxiliary is a member.

Five subscription luncheons have been held—in January, in honor of Miss Lindley and Miss Ayashi; in February, in honor of

Miss Amy Burt of the Appalachian School, Penland, North Carolina; in April, in honor of Mrs. Taber, National Field Worker under the U. T. O., who was our Diocesan guest during a ninety-day visit for the purpose of stimulating missionary understanding and interest. The two luncheons, in March and October, were arranged as conference points for Parish Presidents, Diocesan Officers and Chairmen of Diocesan Committees.

At the Annual Meeting, January 1930, the Auxiliary was the guest at luncheon of the Rector, Vestry and Woman's Auxiliary of St. John's Parish. This was the largest meeting of the year—279 members from 48 Branches responding to the Roll Call. At this meeting a new Constitution was adopted and a maintenance budget of \$1,000 for 1930 was voted.

In May, the Washington Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was incorporated under the laws of the District of Columbia.

Beginning with the January number, the President's monthly Letter appeared in an improved form and became available to subscribers as a source of information on current Auxiliary events.

Two officers were elected at the Annual meeting for terms of 3 years:

Vice-president for Montgomery County—Mrs. Josiah Jones.

Vice-president for Charles County—Mrs. Edward Burroughs.

Appointments during the year were as follows:

Mrs. Hutchison, as Director of the Church Periodical Club, succeeding Mrs. Cook.

Mrs. McGrew, as Chairman of the Devotional Committee, succeeding Mrs. Munson.

Mrs. Martin, as Educational Secretary, succeeding Mrs. Bauer.

Mrs. Partridge, as Corresponding Secretary, to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. Carl.

The Educational Secretary was sent as a delegate from this Diocesan Auxiliary to the Educational Conference at Racine in May.

A Clergyman was given a Scholarship to the Conference for Rural Leaders at Madison during the summer.

6 members of the Auxiliary received Scholarships to either the Summer Conference at Blue Mountain or Tappahannock.

5 Delegates, 2 of whom represented the B Branches, were sent to the Provincial Synod meetings at Philadelphia in October.







I hope that our President's suggestion for a Standard Branch may be adopted, for I can see in it a great source of interest and an incentive to greater activity. The things we do are what count.

We are beginning our Classes on India. Next year we will have a new Church's Program to study, and a new vision to do it with, we hope. Our Mother Church would lead us. Let us follow her lead with reverence and devotion.

The C. S. S. P. is operating in twenty-four parishes. Our usual two public meetings have been held this past year. At the one in April in Trinity Church, Miss Alice Cocke gave the children a most interesting talk on work in Mexico. As our last B. T. O. had gone to the Hooker School the children were much interested, and the attendance was good. At this meeting the B. T. O. was received. Our Advent meeting was at St. John's, Georgetown. Out of 47 Branches of the C. P. C. in the Diocese, only 31 have sent in reports. Hence this report, accurate so far as it goes, does not give a true picture of the work done in the Diocese by the C. P. C.

While 49 Branches were listed as active last January, 4 have had no Parish Secretary for the past year and 8 have taken no active part in the work. This is a condition which should be corrected.

Although no new Branches have been organized in the Diocese, there have been some interesting new fields developed. For instance, one Parish Branch has "adopted" a boy in an isolated Western district, and one member a month supplies him with a suitable magazine, culminating in a box of presents for Christmas. Another Branch sent a complete set of Scott's novels to the library of the Public School at La Plata. Several Branches gave new books and subscriptions to magazines as Christmas presents to Missionaries, and to Mission Schools in the South and far West.

Through the Diocesan Director, new books as Christmas and Easter presents were sent as follows: 3 to Bishop Campbell, 7 to Bishop Binsted, 4 to Dr. Taylor, Anking, China, 5 to Miss Hester, Christmas Carols to Miss Payne, 2 books to clergymen in isolated districts of the U. S., 1 book to St. Paul's University Library, Tokio.

Upon news of the disastrous fire destroying the Library at St. Andrew's School, Tennessee, a large number of books were de-

spatched to replace the loss, sixty of these from the Diocesan Director's office.

The Book Endowment Fund, which is in charge of Mrs. Henry T. Cook, has reached the sum of \$220. Our goal is at least \$250 to be presented at the Triennial at Denver. Let us continue to work for this Fund which has for its object supplying new books to our clergy and missionaries.

This report would not be complete without a word of appreciation of the devoted work of Mrs. Harris, as Registrar, and Mrs. Coudon and Mrs. Garlock, faithful members of the Packing Committee at Diocesan House, and of regret that Mrs. Bryan, who for years has made over old Christmas and Easter cards for us, has had to give up this work.

REPORT OF CURATOR OF THE FILE OF SPIRIT OF MISSIONS

Through the past year, 1930, we had very few magazines given us for our file of The Spirit of Missions. They were the missing numbers to complete the years 1929 and 1930, and twenty-eight duplicates.

The magazines have been rearranged, the duplicates separated and labeled, so the file is much more accessible than before.

Early this fall I learned that the Cathedral Library had a number of duplicate years of The Spirit of Missions and inquired of the librarian if it would be possible to obtain some of the years we lack. He has graciously consented to give us twenty-nine years of the magazine, bound, and in good condition. These years are 1850 to 1853 inclusive, and 1855 to 1879 inclusive.
