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— FOREWORD —

Once again it is my privilege to give my hearty and affectionate greetings to the members of the Woman's Auxiliary throughout the Diocese. In the face of seemingly insuperable difficulties, this splendid organization of women carries on its beneficent work, for which I am profoundly grateful. After all, the extension of the Kingdom of our Lord cannot be halted by the circumstances that periodically check the material interests of life. Repeatedly, where misfortunes have attended us they have but served to accelerate and deepen our interest in our Lord's Kingdom. Periods of prosperity have proved more disastrous to the Christian Church than periods of adversity. The old adage that, "the blood of the martyrs is the seed of the Church," is demonstrably true. Wherever ease and self-assurance have attended the Church it has lapsed into arrogance, indifference and inaction.

At the height of the World War when England was suffering from a prodigal loss of men and its material values were imperilled her people increased their gifts to world missions. It was this spirit that prompted one of her distinguished writers to declare: "Our sons have shown us God." I am bound to believe that while there are evidences throughout the Church of distress and sacrifices, enforced by rigid economy, we shall emerge from the dark shadows that encompass us upon a new day of deepened faith and increased activity. We may never forget the large part women have played in the rehabilitation of human concerns nor may we forget the conspicuous and incomparable service they have repeatedly rendered the Church and its beneficent institutions. Last at the Cross, first at the Tomb, this was the ancient record telling the story of a devotion that even a crucified Saviour and His seemingly defeated cause could not check.

The Woman's Auxiliary may not be great in numbers but it is great in consecration and service, and it constitutes one of the most vital elements of the Church's life. "Carry on"—this is our slogan, and carry on we will!

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As we study the reports of the past year, we must be grateful for the opportunities met and the work accomplished in the face of grave difficulties. We have more than held our own. To name only a few of the many encouraging instances which might be cited,—we have one branch in which every member is a subscriber to the Spirit of Missions; we have one branch which gave generously to each department of Auxiliary work and to the budget, and has in hand a good balance for its 1933 pledges; we have one branch which reconsidered a previous decision to discontinue and is carrying on with renewed courage; we have been able to stimulate interest in the Episcopal City Mission in many parishes; and we show an ever increasing appreciation of the value of summer conferences.

Gifts for Advance Work have very properly been deferred by many branches. These are always to be regarded as an added privilege for those who have been able to meet all their obligations under our program. We hope each branch will covet a part in the forward movement for the coming year.

The problems of 1933 will doubtless be no less difficult. Even harder to meet than the adverse conditions all about us, is the apparent bewilderment of many to whom we look for leadership. With some questioning whether missions should continue at all, questioning the value of certain types of mission enterprise, doubting the adequacy of the qualifications of members of the mission staffs,—with contradictory conclusions and recommendations from all sides,—how can we be sure that we are proceeding along the wisest path? It seems more than ever necessary that we adopt for our own, St. Paul's words,—the words from which Bishop Freeman preached to us a year ago,—"None of these things move me." We know that the missionary enterprise must advance. We regard that proposition as undebatable so long as we acknowledge the authority of our Lord's command. We know that our work has in the past been greatly blessed. We know that, ever seeking wider knowledge and clearer guidance, we must press on with undiminished zeal. We have faith to believe that, if we permit none of our present perplexities and discouragements to move us, the blessing will certainly continue.

DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

The hoped for routine of visits to Parish Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in the first District remains yet to be accomplished. Ten very cordial invitations for such visits have been received and accepted during the past year.

The organization and direction of a "Channel of Information" to the women of the Parishes regarding the need of Unemployment Relief under Episcopal City Missions, was delegated to the vice-president for the District of Columbia in response to Bishop Freeman's charge to the Auxiliary at the last Annual meeting. Response has been gratifying. Although technically a "Special" effort of the Auxiliary,—and presented to our membership as such,—the vision of the consecrated ministering to the unfortunates, as exemplified by the City Missioner and his staff, has I feel sure, deepened our appreciation of and interest in the Church's Mission to

the world. Thirty-six pledges of money, aggregating \$112.00 monthly for the period of one year, made possible additional space and facilities at 1329 K Street for the Episcopal City Missions, together with a much needed worker for the Clothing Bureau and Telephone. Job Masters have been appointed in 30 Parishes to stimulate Job Creation work in conjunction with the Employment Bureau at City Missions. During 9 months 281 jobs were provided for 1539 applicants at City Missions. Only 44 of these jobs were "leads" from Parish Job Masters. This leaves much food for thought and action during 1933. Please redouble your efforts this year,—the need is still acute, and the Church surely must not fail her suffering ones.

A study and report on the organization and method of Program building in three Auxiliaries of this Diocese, together with statistics regarding the relation of the Auxiliary to the Parish and Community, was prepared and submitted to Miss Grace Lindley, our Executive Secretary at 281 4th Ave., New York, by request.

I am grateful for the courtesy and co-operation with which you have unfailingly responded to my every call in the past year, and I hope for the privilege of continued and increasing service in the year that lies ahead.

CHARLES COUNTY

The four active Branches in Charles held two County Meetings in 1932.

1. The Spring Meeting was held May 24th, at Christ Church, La Plata. The Rector, Rev. H. H. Bogert, assisted by the Rev. J. Letcher Showell, celebrated Holy Communion at 10:30. It being the 37th anniversary of the ordination of Mr. Bogert, the Rev. Mr. Parkman of Indian Head spoke very feelingly of "The Duties of a Minister".

Mr. Cox, a Missionary to China, spoke of his work and of conditions in China, saying, "It is of necessity slow work, but the steady breaking down of prejudice and hatred of the Chinese has been the outcome of the atmosphere of Christian Love. I beg your prayers, your support and your sympathy". The Diocesan Officers present each spoke briefly, about her own work.

2. The Fall Meeting was held September 20th, at St. Johns Church, Pomonkey. At 10 A. M. Holy Communion was celebrated by the Rev. Mr. Heigham assisted by the Rev. Mr. Parkman. Reports from Summer Conferences were made by Mrs. Showell and Mrs. Metcalf. Luncheon was served under the Trees.

Business was resumed in the afternoon. Because of her removal to Washington, Mrs. Burroughs, the first and very faithful and much beloved Vice-President presented her resignation which was accepted with sincere regret. Mrs. Walter J. Mitchell was nominated for the unexpired term and longer if she would serve. Mrs. Thomas Brawner of Indian Head was chosen for Secretary and Mrs. Warren Albrittain for Treasurer. The Meeting closed with an address by Mrs. Albert Martin on the Mission Study Program for the Year.

Mrs. Mitchell's Short Term of office expired January 1st and as she felt she could not serve longer, the Nominating Committee presented the name of Mrs. Albert Martin of Hughesville, as Vice-President for Charles County at the Annual Meeting at St. John's, Washington, January 3rd, and her election followed.

Eight members attended Summer Conferences, three being Diocesan Scholarship Delegates.

In Charles County there are many devout women who are doing annually Woman's Auxiliary Work but who are not included in the four active Branches. The unusual number who attended Summer Conferences and paid their own expenses, all indicates a background which offers us a goal for which we must strive during this coming year to gather these small groups together and foster their work until it will of itself grow into organization. I pray for your cooperation and prayers as we start on our new year with new Officers and fresh zeal.

visitors were conducted on an interesting trip around the grounds and through St. Mary's Female Seminary and College by Mrs. Nelson McConomy.

After luncheon Mrs. M. C. Adams for seventeen years President of the Province of Washington told of the value of auxiliary work in the parishes and of the very close relation between the parish branches, the Diocese and the National Council. A demonstration of beautiful hand work was displayed which had been made by the women of the church and in the mountains of Virginia.

Mrs. English of St. Alban's parish spoke of her work as a nurse in Alaska during the life of Archdeacon Stuck. The Supply Department was represented by Mrs. Swagar Sherley who spoke of the blessings the work had bestowed upon hundreds of men, women, and children. Mrs. J. J. T. Graham gave a report of the spring presentation of the U. T. O. and urged all present to take a blue box. A visit to the parish branch at St. Mary's City was made November 16th and an interesting program meeting was held. Reports were made by County Delegates to the Synod held in October in Pittsburgh and of the Summer Conferences.

All Faith sent twelve dollars to the Advance Work. Six mission study classes were held with the church school who later sent a box of games to some children in the mountains, some books to the Preventorium and a box of used clothing to the Bluemont Mission.

The Vice-President through the courtesy of Mrs. Albert Martin has been present at every executive meeting except two and every Diocesan Meeting except one.

I know all auxiliary women join me in wishing that every Rector in the Diocese will come to realize what a parish branch means to the life of the parish because our program of service is to pray fervently, labor diligently, and to give liberally to make Him known in our parishes and to all nations as their Saviour and their King.

ADVANCE WORK PROGRAM FUND

In 1931-32 \$12,725.01 was forwarded to Dr. Franklin, Treasurer of the National Council representing the amount contributed by this Diocese to the Bishop Payne Divinity School. In addition the sum of \$4,000.00 was pledged through Dr. Patton making our total \$16,725.01. Since then \$1,140.01 has been received making a grand total to date of \$17,865.02. We still need \$12,134.98 to arrive at the \$30,000.00 pledged. In the light of these exceedingly hard times it would seem an impossibility to reach that goal but it would be gratifying to our President and to your Custodian were we able to round out our collection to \$20,000.00. Every few days checks are received from various branches, so with this generosity and interest we may at least succeed to that extent.

A few of the Branches have been unable to contribute at all and many others have done more than their share.

EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

Mission Study material has kept pace with changing world conditions in recent years and interest has been stimulated beyond ordinary bounds. "Building a Christian Nation" written chapter by chapter by experts in each field is so varied that it gave new zest to the study of such Domestic Mission Topics as Problems of City Life, of Rural Life, of the Church's Work among the First Americans, the Negroes, the People of other Races, and the Youth Movement. Coupled with these subjects, and bearing directly upon them, were the five Denver Addresses published by the Church Missions House. Two books dealing with special problems of the day "Roving with the Migrants" and "The Challenge of Change" were read and our current "Church's Program".

Normal Classes in January and again in September were offered for preparation for Parish Classes in Lent and in Advent. There is a growing number of trained and skillful Educational Secretaries and it is earnestly to be desired that the Parishes hold on to these and send them back together with a new one to begin training, for we need more women who can go out and teach. The Classes were enthusiastic and virile and in these unusual times, we need efficient leaders to get our Christian Message over to the World.

Summer time shifts the scene to the Rural Churches and in all four Counties there has been much activity. The County Meetings have been largely attended, the programs varied and interesting. I wish here to pay tribute to those Branches which are so isolated that it is well-nigh impossible for them to get around much. Many of them have had good Study Classes on the Church's Program or one of the Mission Study Books. The new Book on Indian Work "Facing the Future in Indian Missions" is of the most recent thinking in Indian Affairs and illustrates the changes going on in all of our Mission Fields. The Department is much indebted to Mrs. Partridge for placing the November Meeting in our hands. For it enabled us to present the government side through Dr. W. Carson Ryan, Educational Director of Indian Schools and the Church's Side through the well known Bishop of South Dakota, W. Blair Roberts of Sioux Falls. This made an excellent climax to our Fall Program.

As a closing thought to this report, of work done in our Educational Department I would add that uppermost through all of the work is the Missionary Motive of Christ's love for us all and His yearning for the souls of men.

The Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council in the Diocese of Washington consists of sixty-eight branch auxiliaries and eight branches of the Junior Woman's Auxiliary. The total membership is over two thousand. The Junior Branch at All Souls' Memorial Church was disbanded during the year and two new Junior Auxiliary Branches were formed, one at Pinkney Memorial Church, Hyattsville, the other at St. Alban's Church.

Seven business meetings were held during the year at the regular hour of two o'clock. The average attendance was 195 representing an average of 41 branches. The greatest number of branches represented at any one meeting was 51 and the largest attendance was 382; both at the January 1932 meeting.

Five of the seven business meeting have been preceeded by corporate Communions and the Fall presentation of the United Thank Offering was made at a service of the Holy Communion. A Quiet Day arranged by the Devotional Committee was held in Bethlehem Chapel in May.

In the face of difficulties our work has gone forward in a way that we find inspiring, for while our list of periodicals sent regularly has shortened, we have sent out more books, more magazines, and have made new contacts. We find that the work has broadened, and we have had many providential helps over rough places.

In addition to the institutions in the Diocese, already reported to have received books, etc., we have sent a great variety of reading matter and other gifts to 4 Missionary Bishops, 27 Clergymen and Missionaries, 4 Libraries, 9 Universities, colleges and schools and 12 Hospitals and Missions.

2 Victrolas have been given, while a third is awaiting transportation, and—departing from our regular line of work, we provided a baby carriage for the young son of one of our Alaskan missionaries.

3 more Rural Lending Libraries have been assembled, the C. P. C. working with the Smiley Library in providing the books. 16 of these useful, useable collections are now ready for circulation.

It was our privilege to send to St. Mary's School, Shanghai a book of poetry, as a memorial to a dear young Junior Branch secretary, who died, in Shanghai late in 1931.

Our secretary, Mrs. Staats, feeling the press of other church duties was obliged to give up our work. Miss Ellen Tyler consented to take the office, and has given it her faithful service.

Mrs. Couden and Mrs. Garlock continue to give their time and labor—and real labor it is—to the packing and mailing. We gratefully acknowledge this, and the untiring work of Mrs. Harris, our Registrar, who, a few weeks ago, added to her exacting routine work, the very grimy and disagreeable task of sorting and listing the contents of our room at Diocesan House. We give to her, and to her daughter who assisted her, our heartfelt appreciation.

We ask for your continued help—needed now, as never before. Remember the C. P. C., when you are about to destroy anything readable, any game, picture or music. There is some place where it will still be of use, and we will be so happy to send it there.

JUNIOR WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

At the Triennial meeting in Denver it was resolved that the enlisting of young women in the Woman's Auxiliary should be considered a major obligation in this Triennium. During my year of service on the executive board of this Diocese I have appreciated the effort that is being made to fulfill this obligation. The Vice-Presidents of the counties are assisting materially in their own fields and I wish to thank them for their splendid co-operation in interesting the young women and encouraging them to form branches in the various parishes. Similar efforts on the part of Auxiliary women in whose parishes there are as yet no Junior Woman's Auxiliaries would be of great value.

There has been splendid growth in the Junior Woman's Auxiliary! We have eleven strong and active branches to be proud of, and each one of the young women seem to have caught the vision of this glorious missionary work. Great emphasis has been laid on having missionary speakers and many boxes and large offerings have been sent to the mission fields. Throughout the Province there are 101 branches of the Junior Woman's Auxiliary. When the Synod met in Pittsburgh the representatives of this group were invited for the second time to be present and to have their special session. In this session the official name was decided to be the Junior Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council in place of B Branch the rather nondescript name formally used. At this time too, a committee was appointed to further interest in the Junior Woman's Auxiliary Summer Conference. It was hoped that young women from parishes where there were no groups might attend and become interested in the work. Will not the Woman's Auxiliary bring this to the attention of the young women in their parishes? It was the opinion of the session that one particular object be considered as the definite work of the Junior Woman's Auxiliary. A scholarship at the Deaconess Training School in Philadelphia was suggested.

Holding our plans ever before us we will hope that this year will find us going forward in the fulfillment of His work.

It has a very small sick fund. There is no Home here for colored incurables. The basement is being used for a Mothers' Neighborhood Club. As usual harmony prevails in the work but the League has sustained a great loss in the death of Mrs. William C. Rives.
