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— FOREWORD —

One organization that remains stable through all the changing circumstances of life is the Woman's Auxiliary. Like the little brook, men may come and men may go, but it goes on forever. Depleted incomes and impaired fortunes have little effect upon the efficiency of this splendid missionary organization. It has caught a vision of the meaning of the great commission of the Master: "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." This commission we cannot disregard except to our peril. Only recently at the meeting of the House of Bishops in Davenport after hearing the comprehensive report from the Presiding Bishop, a strong resolution was approved in which the Bishops expressed the danger of losing the missionary spirit from the life of the Church in this critical time. This missionary spirit may express itself, so far as gifts are concerned, in smaller terms, but to lose it or to impair it would be to seriously embarrass the whole work of the Church.

At the recent annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, it seemed to me that there was a larger attendance and a finer spirit than I have known in the ten years of my episcopate. The one regret that I have is, that there are comparatively few of the younger women of our Churches engaged in this vitally important work. As a matter of fact we might with great profit have a "Man's Auxiliary", who, through study and planning might greatly augment the general and diocesan work of Missions. For considerably over fifty years the women have carried on, sometimes in the face of great obstacles, this notable missionary society. As the rector of three large and important Parishes I can testify as to the value of this splendid body. Here in the Diocese of Washington, in season and out of season, I look with increasing favor and praise upon the work accomplished, and I send to every member of this great organization an expression of my gratitude for the consistency of their service and the self-sacrificing generosity of their giving.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

One of the privileges of the president is the opportunity to study the annual reports of the parish branches. The blanks filled out with figures and answers to questions about the various departments of Auxiliary work are far from dull reading bringing as they do a realization of the tremendous zeal and devotion of hundreds of women throughout the diocese. The following accounts from the officers and chairmen of committees summarize the results of the year's endeavor. Here it may be permissible to speak generally of a few features.

The discontinuance of one evening branch is greatly to be regretted although it appeared to be unavoidable and may be temporary. This loss is however more than off-set by the reorganization of a branch which had been inactive for several years and the formation of three new groups of juniors.

The diocesan pledges for the General Church Program were over-subscribed. This in addition to an unusually miscellaneous list of gifts made to special objects in which the several branches have a particular interest. These "Specials" include gifts to many missions not counted on the quota, to general objects such as the Retiring Fund for Deaconesses and the American Mission to Lepers, to the diocesan hospitals and other institutions, to parish relief and the Episcopal City Mission.

Almost every branch has participated in some form of Christian social service without neglecting its primary duty—the carrying out of the plans of the National Council. Our supply work and other gifts to the missions of our Church must not be curtailed but, as an organized body of Christians we cannot ignore local needs. Ours is a field which cannot be reached by secular charities; the cup of water given in His name carries a blessing over and above the material assistance rendered. True Christian social service, moreover can escape the pitfall most difficult for organized charity to avoid—irreparable harm to what has been called "The sanctity of individual personality."

Although intangibles, such as the results of the effort of the educational and devotional departments, are more difficult to appraise, it can be said that in the former, the size of the normal classes and the increase in the number of parish study groups is noteworthy; in the latter, an increasing concern with matters of personal religion is strikingly apparent. There have been more prayer groups, service of intercession and quiet days; more and more the United Thank Offering of each parish is presented at a corporate communion;—these and other signs indicate that we realize that the Auxiliary, great as it is as an organization, would be ineffective without the motive power drawn from the heart of each of its members. The individual woman's will to do to her utmost the part which is hers in the purpose of God is the mainspring of the Auxiliary's strength. "We must see God first, and our problems and difficulties in the light of His greatness. We must learn that God is not an assistant to our purpose but that we are assistants to God's greater purpose for us and for all men."

DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

The duties of the Vice-President for the District of Columbia differ from those of the County Vice-Presidents in that our Diocesan President, being resident in the District, can visit the Branches on invitation and is accessible to them in an advisory capacity. Only three times this past year, have I been asked in the words of the Constitution, to "In the absence of the President, perform her duties".

Nor has there been any "Special" work assigned to the Auxiliary this year, similar to the Unemployment Program initiated by the Auxiliary two years ago, by special request of Bishop Freeman. This work continues to go forward at Episcopal City Missions, financed by the Diocesan Department of Missions rather than by voluntary subscription. Any parish desiring to continue active support of this work may render invaluable aid to the Unemployment Bureau at City Missions by continuing in office alert Parish Job Masters who will make known to their Parish membership cases of special need, and to City Missions opportunities for temporary or permanent employment within the Parish. Let us not forget to do our part in 1934. The need is still acute.

I stand ready to serve you in any way possible. A happy New Year to you all.

The four Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary which constitute the Charles County District, have carried on nobly during this difficult year, and have held the ground gained in more favorable times. In all Departments of the work, they have done their part in proportion to their numbers and their opportunities. Distance from the center, I am confident, accounts for small attendance at the Diocesan Meetings.

A full Report of the President's Conference was sent to each of the four Presidents.

The Annual Meeting was held at St. James Church, Indian Head, on Tuesday, September 26, 1933. The Rector, Reverend Henry C. Parkman, was the Celebrant at the Holy Communion Service which opened the meeting. The Meditation was delivered by the Reverend H. A. Donovan, of Zion Church, Fairfax, Virginia, formerly a Missionary to Liberia. Mr. Donovan in an address later spoke of his work in Liberia and stressed the importance of knowledge of the missions to which the Church contributes.

Mrs. J. Letcher Showell presided at the Business Meeting, introducing the Diocesan Officers who spoke—Mrs. J. J. T. Graham, Mrs. Robert Eaves and Miss Florence Hyde — explaining their various departments and answering questions relative to the work.

Two delegates, Miss Bessie Freeman and Reverend J. Letcher Showell, spoke from their different standpoints about the Tappahannock Conference, which they attended under the Diocesan Scholarship Fund.

The resignation of Mrs. Albert Martin, as Vice-President of the Charles County District, on account of illness and change of residence, was presented and accepted. A Committee consisting of Mrs. Parkman and Mrs. Parran was appointed to find some one to fill the unexpired term of two years, caused by Mrs. Martin's resignation and to report to the December Executive Board Meeting. This they have done and present the name of Mrs. John T. Parran of Indian Head for confirmation.

With fervent prayers for the work in this rural section, which has great possibilities and wishing for Mrs. Parran, God's blessing upon her work, I close my report with regret that I could not do more and thankfulness that I had the opportunity to do what I could.

Quite a large delegation was present from St. John's, Washington, and two Diocesan officers, Miss Florence Hyde, the Diocesan Educational Secretary, explained about her study classes and of available material, including the two authorized books, "Living Issues in China," and "Facing the Future in Indian Missions."

Miss Margaretta Ridgley, for many years a missionary in Liberia, told us about her work there teaching the natives and of the progress that has been made in Christianizing the people and banishing so many fears from their minds; these people she said were in every way capable of being taught to be good Christians and desirable citizens. Mrs. Eaves told of her work in Supply Department and urged the women to do more to help in this important work.

After luncheon fifteen children from the elementary school were present with their teacher. Miss Hyde graciously told them about the American Indians and their customs; Miss Ridgley told them about her school work for black girls in the House of Bethany, Liberia.

Visitations have been made upon the several branches to give encouragement and help in the work of the several departments.

Four persons from the County attended the Summer Conference at Tappahannock.

The Church School at All Faith Parish gave a Pageant in Dent Memorial Chapel, Sunday evening, December 17th. It was quite a success and the chapel was well filled with people, "May Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done" is the prayer of our County Branch.


From the reports of the different Churches our Diocese seemed to have very faithfully observed the day.






Year of 1933

The Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council in the Diocese of Washington consists of 72 branch auxiliaries. The total membership is over 2,000.

Six business meetings were held during the year, four at the regular hour of 2 o'clock, one at 8 P. M., and one in December at noon. The average attendance was 164 representing an average of 39 branches. The greatest number of branches represented at any one meeting was 44, the largest attendance was 185; both at the January, 1933 meeting.

Four of the six business meetings have been preceded by corporate Communions. A Quiet Day, arranged by the Program Committee, was held in March, at St. Paul's Church, in place of a regular business meeting. Two hundred and forty women attended during all, or part of the day.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

During the year we have been in touch with forty Study Class leaders and have had reports from thirty of them. Thirty enrolled for the pre-Lenten Normal Class and the average attendance was twenty; subject, The Indians. Our offering went to the Episcopal City Mission. The pre-Advent Normal Class was as usual, smaller, with an enrollment of twenty-three and an average attendance of fourteen, our general subject, Christ in the Modern World, under which we studied, Dicipleship, Communism, Labor in Industry, Brotherhood of the world, etc.

During the summer four books bearing on the above subjects: The Tinder Box of Asia, Eastern Women, Today and Tomorrow; Christianity and Industry in America, and How Far to the Nearest Doctor, have been circulated among the leaders, so that they came to the Normal Class equipped for interesting discussion.

Your Educational Secretary has been speaking guest of eighteen different parishes, has attended the County meetings of St. Marys, Charles, Montgomery, and Prince George's counties, in that order; and attended the eleven days' sessions of the Blue Mt. Conference at Frederick, Maryland, in June and July.

We are prepared to take up the text book The Never Failing Light, by James Franklin, in the pre-Lenten Normal Classes, which begin Friday, January 12, 1934, and shall be glad to have anyone who is interested, join us in this thrilling study of what Christianity is doing for the world.

The year 1933 began, for us, with great sadness. The loss of our dear Mrs. Henry T. Cook is one that cannot be filled. Another of our workers has been taken from us by death. Mrs. B. Jones Carter, secretary of the Night Branch of St. Margaret's parish, died in August. She had worked with us for only a short time, but her interest was so keen, and the association with her promised so much of pleasure that we deeply regret her going.

Mrs. Harris, Mrs. Couden and Mrs. Garlock continue their valuable work. They deserve credit for the really hard part of the labor. Miss Ellen Tyler, who had been acting as recording secretary for a year, is away from the city this winter, and as we were loth to accept her resignation. Mrs. George Robinson volunteered to carry on that work in addition to her duties as secretary for Trinity Parish, Takoma Park.

Mention must be made of the fact that our financial report covers only the money received and spent in the work of the Club. The sums that have been given for the Book Endowment Fund are deposited in a savings account, and do not appear here.

To four missionary Bishops we have sent Christmas gifts of books, and to many of our mission workers, to schools, libraries, etc., have gone the greetings of this Diocese, carried by some suitable and substantial gift.

Especial mention must be made of the splendid, generous response to the appeal for very good, new books to be used for these Christmas gifts. Because of this, it was necessary for us to buy only two books, that were to fill a particular need, and yet we were proud and glad to send the books that came to us.

A stereoptican with 100 slides was sent to far-away Wyoming. A piano has been given for St. Ann's Preventorium, but as it has not yet been sent we cannot count it in this year's work. Two more victrolas, a zither, and a small radio are also waiting to be forwarded.

We are so very happy because our report shows no falling off in any of it's items. Won't you help us keep the report for the year 1934 up to standard?

REPORT OF THE KULING SCHOOL COMMITTEE, 1933

Last February a committee was formed in the Diocese of Washington to revive interest in the education of the children of missionaries in the American School in Kuling, China. In April, Mrs. Charles Wood, of the Church of the Covenant, gave a beautifully illustrated lecture on China and Mrs. Edmund Lee, wife of the principal of Chatham Hall in Virginia, added to the pleasure of the evening by telling of the advantages of school, having had children as students in Kuling.

From the sale of tickets and including a few contributions from Episcopalian and Presbyterian friends interested in the school the sum of \$226.50 was realized. After deducting \$13.00 for expenses we sent to the Board of Trustees in New York, \$213.50. Twenty-two branches of the Woman's Auxiliary aided us in disposing of tickets.

After talking with Bishop Lloyd, chairman of the Board of Trustees, it was decided to form a Joint Committee of Presbyterians and Episcopalians and to ask the Rev. Dr. Z. B. Phillips to be Chairman, with Mrs. Wallace Radcliffe as "Captain" of the Presbyterian group and Miss Barkalow as "Captain" of the Episcopalian group. At a meeting of the committee in December, Dr. Phillips, presiding, it was decided to give an entertainment for the Kuling School on Monday evening, February 5th, in the Rose Room of the Washington Hotel. Mrs. Frank Howard, a well known musical director in Washington, will give a Chinese musical recital followed by an address by the Rev. Dr. Arthur M. Sherman, the Educational Secretary to the National Council and a member of the Board of Trustees of the Kuling School. Bishop Root of Hankow, China, met the joint Committee and friends of Kuling, on December 11, and told of the work at the school. He is an enthusiast of the school, having been a missionary in China and two of his children pupils there.

The greatest service we can render our dear missionaries in distant China and one which will give them real joy and comfort will be an assurance from us that we shall remember them in our prayers and continue to aid them in the education of their children in Kuling.
