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— FOREWORD —

The multiplying years do not abate the enthusiasm or devotion of the faithful women of the Auxiliary. Throughout my entire ministry of forty years this organization has occupied a conspicuous place in my thought and affections. While in other periods it has rendered its unfailing service to the great cause of Missions, it is called upon at this time to increase both its influence and generosity that the supreme work of the kingdom may go forward unlet and unhindered throughout the world. During the twenty-two or more years that I have served on the Department of Missions in New York I have grown increasingly conscious of the incomparable service rendered by the women of our Church. When enthusiasm has waned and widespread apathy has affected our missionary enterprise, the women have continued their interest unabated. Depressions have not affected their interest or their generosity, on the contrary they have been a contributing cause in awakening fresh interest and intelligent zeal. While we have multiplied the mechanisms of the Church and organizations have been created only to be abandoned in due time, the Auxiliary has pursued its course for more than half a century of time unaffected by the passing whims and changing opinions of each new age. I cannot think of a well-organized Parish without its strong Woman's Auxiliary. It is not only stimulating to the congregation generally but it is a source of inspiration to the Rector.

It is my hope and prayer that, undiverted from its high purpose, it may continue to go forward with increasing strength, not only informing the Church as to missionary fields and needs but stirring it to more determined efforts that the great command of the Master may be fulfilled: "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." I cannot but believe that the Church is to experience a new era of increasing usefulness, and it must come very largely through its fidelity to its Lord's word.

To every member of the Auxiliary I send hearty and affectionate greetings and best wishes for a blessed and happy New Year.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

We have come again to the time for reviewing the record of the old year and for beginning that of the new. You are shortly to hear in detail of our work since the last annual meeting. The general plan for 1935 is known to you. I would pause for a moment between the two to speak briefly of our present position as I see it. I recall Dr. Phillip's wise counsel at our November meeting that we must stop to appraise what we have done before we can plan intelligently for the future—that we must not concentrate attention on symptoms but trace them back to their causes.

One adverse symptom is a marked loss in membership. In the years—well over fifty of the life of the Auxiliary in this diocese,—it would seem that we should have reached every churchwoman and aroused her in some measure to her responsibility for carrying forward the mission of the church. Instead we find that in numbers we are not even holding our own. We must seek the cause and remedy it with all speed. I suggest to you that the purpose and program of the Woman's Auxiliary were never more appealing than they are at this time in the life of the Church. I am certain that the fault is not altogether in the insensitivity or indifference of the women outside active membership. It must then be laid at our own door. Just why are we Woman's Auxiliary members ourselves? Because we believe it to be a duty to busy ourselves in some form of Church work,—because our close friends are active in our particular parish branch,—because the rector suggests that we might be interested in the auxiliary,—or for some other inadequate reason? That is not good enough. We cannot join the Woman's Auxiliary as we would a woman's club, pay our dues, attend meetings, do some work, and be satisfied. We should be members because we covet a part for ourselves, however small, in the special work of the Woman's Auxiliary and could not be content without it. And then we should think of our enlistment as for life. In the Woman's Auxiliary it is never in order to say "I have done my share". If we value our membership more highly, take the obligations of that membership more seriously and perform them more cheerfully, do you not believe that others, now uninterested will feel the effects and catch the true spirit of the Woman's Auxiliary?

Another symptom is the reluctance of many to accept positions of leadership. There is no question that we are equipped for different sorts of work and the glory of the Auxiliary is that there is a place in it for every type of woman. But it is a fact that women who would make splendid officers frequently decline to serve. Bishop Burleson wrote a little sermon for Whitsunday of 1932,—describing the little band of Apostles gathered in Jerusalem on the first Whitsunday who, when "Suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind," were made into "Courageous pioneers who went out to conquer a world." He says, "Consider especially the inadequacy of the means: a handful of Galilean fishermen, small shop-keepers, and other nondescripts, without background, social influence, political experience, or education. So inconspicuous and unimportant were they, so wildly impossible their dream, that the leaders of their day dismissed them with a contemptuous gesture."

They had one equipment for the task, and only one; yet it was all He asked: "Ye shall be witnesses unto Me." They were to tell to men everywhere what they knew about Him.

Suppose they had felt so unworthy and so dependent upon their unaided selves as to have given up without trying!

As your president, I have been amazed to find that in the minds of many Church people including some of our number, we are considered the missionary society of the diocese,—and branches too often feel a sole responsibility for the missionary program of the parish. We must never overlook the second word in our name, "Auxiliary". Two of our clergy have recently suggested that we stress too much the material things we do,—our supply boxes, our C. P. C. work, our money gifts, etc.,—and in doing these, neglect the thing of prime importance, and much greater difficulty,—arousing our parishes at large to a greater activity in the mission enterprise. There is much food for thought in that criticism. Again I have been sorry to hear it stated in terms of reproach that the Woman's Auxiliary is becoming too much of a money-raising organization. Certainly one of our duties is to help supply our missionaries in the field and it takes money to do that. We are proud of the sums our women have contributed or earned to further the Church's mission and we shall continue to regard our money gifts as an acceptable service. But when we have given liberally, we must go on and try to show to others the joyful privilege they may share with us.

Closing, we too often waste energy in strain and worry over the progress of our program, overlooking the fact pointed out in a recent sermon,—I believe by Bishop Rogers,—that it is not our work in which we are engaged but our Lord's; our responsibility is only to do our best with such gifts as we have and keep on doing that best, leaving the results to Him. As St. Paul told the Corinthians, "I have planted, Appollos watered, but God gave the increase."

ST. MARY'S COUNTY

The St. Mary's Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary held a County meeting in Trinity Church, St. Mary's City, on April 12, 1934. The Holy Communion Service was celebrated by the Rector, The Rev. Nelson McEconomy after which he cordially welcomed the women of the County and guests.

The morning speaker was Miss A. M. France, principal of St. Mary's Seminary and College, who spoke of the significance of the Ter-centenary; she stressed religious toleration, the importance of Margaret Brent in the life of the colony, and gave a history of the St. Mary's Female Seminary. After luncheon in the parish hall, Miss France conducted the women on a tour of the interesting historical spots in the church yard and through the Seminary.

Our guest speakers were Miss Florence Hyde, who told of the various summer courses of her study classes and the work done in the branches. Mrs. Eaves, the Supply Secretary, explained

the work of her department by the means of a map—Mrs. Graham told of the importance of our prayers, our work and offerings to sustain our missionaries, at home and abroad; Miss Burton and a friend from St. James' Church, Washington, told of up-to-date methods in Church School work; Mrs. Swindler, the dean of the Junior College, spoke briefly of the importance of the missionary spirit and work to all peoples of the world.

A business session was conducted, reports of work done were made, and Mrs. C. E. Meredith was nominated for a term of three years, as vice-president of St. Mary's County.

A group meeting Sept. 27th. was held at Oakley, with the colored branch; six of the executive offices and county members were present and their presence did much to encourage the women in their good work. A goodly number of the members from the counties was present at the Missionary meeting held at St. Paul's Parish, Aquasco to hear Bishop Littell, The Rev. Dr. Oliver Hart from St. John's, Lafayette Square, and Mrs. Beverly Ober.

It was the pleasure of the Vice-President and The Rev. F. L. Metcalf to attend the General Convention held in Atlantic City. All problems in nations and in Christendom could be solved according to the theme of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary, "If I be His Disciple".

PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY

The speaker of the afternoon was Rev. E. A. Lemoine of St. Columba's, Washington, who paid a tribute to the work of Dr. Grenfell among the Eskimos in Labrador and to that of the Seaman's Church Institute, New York City. Mr. Lemoine made a plea for more practical Christianity.

In response to the hope expressed by the United Thank Offering Treasurer in her talk, that a certain goal be attained by October, the offering of the day was applied to that purpose.

The Fall meeting on October 26, 1934, took place at St. Philip's, Laurel. Holy Communion was celebrated by the Rev. Mr. Neighbor, assisted by Rev. F. A. Cook of Holy Trinity Parish.

The branches announced their plans for the season's work at the business meeting and Mrs. Burnside, delegate to Orkney Springs Conference, gave a report of her interesting experience and the stimulus and help derived therefrom.

The speaker of the occasion, Dr. L. W. Glazebrook, made a most inspiring address, giving many of the high lights of the General Convention. Mrs. Graham, United Thank Offering Treasurer, described in a graphic manner the presentation service at Atlantic City.

The offering was assigned to work among the Indians at Niobrara, Nebraska, a missionary from the County being stationed there.

Both Spring and Fall meetings were well attended, especially in the afternoons.

The educational work in the branches is receiving more attention and more County women are availing themselves of the very helpful mission study classes conducted by the diocesan secretary, which is a hopeful sign for the future.

DEVOTIONAL COMMITTEE

The present Devotional Committee was organized last February when I was appointed chairman. Our hope is that each branch may feel the importance of "putting first things first" and have a part in the devotional work. Where no appointment has been made the President of the Parish Auxiliary is expected to act. When this is impossible she should send someone to represent the branch.

Our first meeting was at All Souls convening a half hour before the Diocesan meeting. There were ten present representing six branches. Literature of the Church-wide endeavor was distributed.

On March second a conference on the devotional work was held at Epiphany. Mimeographed copies of the "Work of the Devotional Committee" were distributed and sent to those not present. It was an interested and enthusiastic group with twenty present and nine branches represented.

March sixth was observed as a Quiet Day with Fr. Tiedeman OHC as conductor. It was well attended, many remaining all day.

In April a short committee meeting was held for Night Branches before the Diocesan meeting at Christ Church. If those unable to attend the daytime meetings of the Devotional Committee will let us know we will be happy to plan an evening one. We are grateful for suggestions.

At the May meeting in College Park the Rev. Malcom Taylor, the national chairman on Evangelism, gave a helpful meditation with suggestions as how this might be used individually.

In June the leaflet "The Way of Vision" was mailed to all branches and delegates to the General Convention. We hope the branches made use of these leaflets.

The October meeting before the United Thank Offering echo service was poorly attended as so many had gone to the Convention. The literature for the Day of Prayer was mailed to all branches.

The November meeting was at Epiphany with fifteen present and twelve branches represented. Suggestions were given for the Day of Prayer.

- (a) Attractive Posters such as used by the Brotherhood at their Corporate Communions.
- (b) Schedule of periods and names of intercessors.
- (c) Sending literature to the "shut-ins".
- (d) Effort to reach those who have never attended such a day.
- (e) Bear members of the Every Member Canvass in mind.

Armistice Day coming on Sunday brought a larger observance of the day.

The Devotional Committee met in December before the Memorial Service in the Cathedral. An answer was considered to the Advent call, "Prepare ye the way of the Lord."

- (a) An Advent Corporate Communion with special intention.
- (b) Bible Study.
- (c) Circulation of devotional books.

- (d) Quiet Hour or Quiet Day in Advent.
- (e) Establishing Prayer Groups.
- (f) Consideration of such pamphlets as Dr. Robbins "Life of the Spirit" at the branch meetings.

Let us remind ourselves always of the primacy of the spiritual. Let us pray during the coming year that we may grow, day by day, in the knowledge and love of God and His Son Jesus Christ. That, we know, is the one thing needful.

SOCIAL SERVICE COMMITTEE

Christmas, at Episcopal City Mission was a most happy one this year.

For their Xmas relief work, they received many personal gifts and money.

All Soul's Church was most generous in giving a large sum of money raised by their Choir and Sunday School, also personal gifts of money from some of their congregation for the Episcopal City Mission.

I mention this particular Church, because they have been the most responsive in this new work of Social Service.

The City Mission at Christmas sent seventy-five baskets of bushel-size filled with groceries, vegetables, a ham or roast, more than enough for a Christmas dinner, also toys and clothing, to needy families.

They packed and delivered (300) three hundred baskets of fruit to "Hospitals and Institutions".

The Mission is in great need of men's clothing, such as socks, shoes, underclothing and top shirts.

Their demand is more than they can possibly fill.

They need children's clothing and shoes, especially children's shoes.

The old couple, Mr. Dow wrote about in the Washington Diocese, is now located in a very small apartment. They are so happy to be together again. The old gentleman, seventy-four years and his little wife very nearly the same age.

Fifteen Churches so far have appointed Social Service secretaries. THE RECORDING SECRETARY

The Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council, in the Diocese of Washington, consists of sixty branch Auxiliaries and thirteen branches of the Junior Woman's Auxiliary. The total membership is approximately 1800. Three new Junior branches have been formed during the past year; in the following parishes: St. John's, Bethesda; Grace Church, Woodside; and at St. Paul's, twenty-third St., Washington.

Seven business meetings were held during the year. The average attendance was one hundred and eighty, representing an average of forty branches. The greatest number of branches represented at any one meeting was fifty-two; the largest attendance was two hundred and forty-eight, both at the January meeting 1934.

Five of the seven meetings were preceded by Corporate Communiions and the Fall Presentation of the United Thank Offering was made at a Celebration of the Holy Communion. A Quiet Day was held in March, in place of a business meeting. Two hundred women were present for all or part of the day.

The Constitution was amended at the January meeting to allow the Treasurer, Mrs. Hopkins, to be reelected to succeed herself. The Executive Committee, comprising fifteen officers and department chairmen, held regular meetings, with an average attendance of eleven. Appointments to office by the Executive Committee

during the year were as follows: Mrs. Walter G. Dunlop, United Thank Offering, Treasurer, to succeed Mrs. J. J. T. Graham; Mrs. Granville Munson, Devotional Chairman, to succeed Mrs. Arthur Birney, and Mrs. Gordon B. Darling, as Chairman of the newly organized Social Service Committee.

UNITED THANK OFFERING

The United Thank Offering for this triennium, was \$15,697.39, not as large as the last offering, but not as great a drop as was the national one and I feel sure that it was caused by no lack of devotion on the part of those who gave.

The Spring Presentation was made at St. John's Church, Georgetown, at the evening service, on the Second Sunday after Easter. The sermon was preached by The Rev. Bland Tucker, the Rector of the Parish.

A special effort was made to make the Fall Presentation, held on October 5th, a memorable event. We had the Bishop's hearty approval of the plan to have the last Presentation Service of each triennium, held in the Great Choir of the Cathedral; this Service was a good beginning of the custom. Four of the Cathedral Clergy were present in the chancel; The Rev. Dr. Peter gave the address; the boy choir sang very beautifully and six ladies of "The Cathedral Aids" ushered and gathered in the offering. The Treasurers of The United Thank Offering from the different branches, sat together and received the Holy Communion in a body. It was altogether a Service of great beauty and dignity.

The Rev. Harry Lee Doll held the Echo Service at Epiphany Church on October 11, at the time the National Presentation was being held at General Convention in Atlantic City. With the offering at that Service, began the assembling of the next United Thank Offering to be presented in 1937.

Your Treasurer and Associate Treasurer both attended the Presentation Service and Mass Meeting at General Convention, and the latter the conference for United Thank Offering workers.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT

The greatest obstacle the great work of Missions has had to overcome in the minds of many Church people, is intolerance, due to lack of knowledge of the subject and consequent indifference. Conscientious and intelligent study is one way to overcome this and so the Woman's Auxiliary provides Mission Study Classes which in this diocese are held in the various parishes mostly during Lent.

In preparation for these classes, we hold pre-Advent and pre-Lenten normal classes for the leaders, this year with sixty-three names on our roll, but an average attendance of twenty-seven, explained by the fact that some of the leaders of rural classes can come more conveniently in the fall, while others prefer to study just before Lent.

Our subject for 1934 was "Christ in the Modern World" while our study this fall and the coming Lent, is our work in Japan, a most pertinent subject at this time when the attention of the economic and political world is focused upon that turbulent nation. We approach the subject from every angle—traditional, historical, civil, political, and religious and our normal classes are alive with discussion and interest.

During the summer a number of books of supplementary reading are circulated among our study class leaders and our Librarian's report shows how much literature goes through our department. If statistics and figures mean anything, we have gained more than two-hundred per cent in numbers, during the last two years. The Woman's Auxiliary has branches in seventy-four churches, the Educational department reaches forty parishes, in eight of which there are Junior branches that have study classes too. Our goal is, of course, a study class in every parish.

Miss Mary Burton, librarian, reports one hundred and fifty-six books and five hundred pamphlets bought, value \$82.30, and two hundred and ninety-three books and pamphlets sold, value \$38.90. The very small percentage we get from sale of literature pays our expenses—postage, stationery, books for circulation, etc., and is our only source of income. Miss Burton may be reached at 2903 29th Street, N. W. She will be glad to procure any literature that would assist the Mission Study Classes or any of the Parish Branches in their Auxiliary Work.

Our 1934 offering went toward the heating plant at Dabney House, Java, Virginia, under Miss Edmunds, and through the generosity of a member of St. John's Auxiliary, we were able to contribute \$240, which, with \$60 already given, made up the \$300 necessary for the whole heating plant.

In addition to this statement we report that The Eliza Hempstead Cook Memorial Fund is now \$254.52, the first books having been purchased at a cost of \$9.50. The decision to retain and administer this fund within the diocese was made after a careful study of the situation, and consultation with the Executive Secretary, Miss Thomas. It is our intention to increase this fund, and continue it as a perpetual memorial.

In comparing this report with that of the year 1933, it will be seen that there has been a decrease in the number of "Current Periodicals sent Regularly", while the number of Odd Magazines and Papers has increased. We urge that all who can possibly do so, will re-mail their magazines and papers, while they are new, recognizing the fact that much periodical literature loses its value very quickly.

Mention must be made of the two pianos and four victrolas which have been sent to new and appreciative homes during the year.

Our gift books for Christmas, have gone, as usual.

The same staff of workers continues the diocesan work. A few changes have been made in the parish secretaries. We part with the outgoers with regret, but welcome, gladly, the interest and work of the newcomers. We are happy to have several new branches, and we hope to revive interest in some that seem dormant. We ask your continued help.

JUNIOR WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

The Junior Woman's Auxiliary is going forward in the missionary work of the Church. Each year has seen the addition of one or two new branches until there are now thirteen branches whose total membership is approximately three hundred. This fall one branch combined with the Woman's Auxiliary of its parish and the president of the Junior Woman's Auxiliary was made president of the whole group. This is the first time this has happened in our diocese but no doubt as time goes by we shall see it more and more, particularly where one group is weak.

Individually and jointly the branches have done splendid work. All have had missionary speakers and missionary information. Half of them have had Study Classes. They have made offerings to Diocesan, Domestic, and Foreign Missions. Most have had Corporate Communions. Eight are doing Church Periodical Club work. They have all had Supply Work and have sent many boxes of second-hand clothing outside of their regular allotments. All are sharing in the United Thank Offering. Jointly they are working on plans for the showing, on February the eighteenth, of the motion picture "The New World" a history of the Church in this country, which was shown at the General Convention in Atlantic City. They are planning on using the proceeds for a scholarship.

It has been exactly three full years since I was elected by the branches to be their chairman and now that my term of office has drawn to a close I wish you all to know what a pleasure it has been to serve.

REPORT OF THE KULING SCHOOL COMMITTEE FOR 1934

Receipts from the Chinese Musical Recital given at the Washington Hotel, last February, by Mrs. Howard and from contributions received, the amount raised for the School was \$365.35. The expenses were \$112.10, so we were able to send to the Board of Trustees in New York, \$253.25. Twelve parishes aided us in disposing of tickets and two branches of the Woman's Auxiliary sent in contributions later.

I wish there was time to read letters from Bishop Lloyd and Miss Carroll. Bishop Lloyd says "I should like it if I could thank personally all who helped to make the entertainment a success. The Church School Service Program Committee for the Diocese of Washington, reports about forty active schools: of these, sixteen have worked through the program. The schools reported

this year, are St. Thomas, Pinkney Memorial, Hyattsville; St. Mark's, St. John's, Georgetown; and Trinity, Takoma Park. These Parishes have sent boxes, valued at approximately one hundred and sixteen dollars, to the Rev. H. A. Willey, Honolulu. Eleven other schools: St. Andrew's, Washington; Church of our Saviour; St. James'; Church of The Good Shepherd; St. Paul's, Rock Creek; Christ Church, Accokeek; Christ Church, LaPlata; St. John's, Olney; St. Andrew's, College Park; Ascension and Advent, sent boxes to Miss Brown, Reno, Nevada, for the relief of the "Isolated Children." The total value of these boxes is about \$285.82. Miss Brown acknowledges the receipt of the boxes most appreciatively. Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets and \$66.47 in cash has been distributed. \$25.00, sent to The Rev. Mr. Baskerville; \$1.00, to the blind, \$10.00 to the Rev. Mr. Dow. Five schools report their Lenten offering, amounting to \$201.10: The "Birthday Thank Offering" for the three years, amounted to \$22.03. We feel very much encouraged as the gratitude expressed for these gifts was most sincere.
