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THE BISHOP'S FOREWORD

The Year Book of the Woman's Auxiliary records annually the story of the sacrificial and generous offerings of the women of the Diocese for the cause of Christian missions. In the face of a long-continued depression with greatly curtailed income, still this noble organization carries on without diminution of interest. It is my privilege year by year to record the fact that, the Woman's Auxiliary is an outstanding and premier organization of the Church. I owe to it personally from the inception of my ministry down to this latest day more than I can adequately repay. Looking back over a ministry of forty-three years in three notable parishes, and now for over fourteen years in the Episcopate, this splendid body has been a source of continuing inspiration and refreshment to me.

Here in this Diocese, this interest has continued unabated and its generosity unfailing, and where parochial offerings for Missions declined, the Woman's Auxiliary has maintained its cause, and beyond its gifts through weekly offerings it has given liberally to the Woman's Thank Offering. For these things I thank God, and to each member of this splendid body I send my grateful acknowledgement.

Throughout the period of Bishop Perry's tenure as Presiding Bishop, he was faced with conditions that well nigh imperilled the cause of Missions, but with unfailing zeal he gave of himself to his great tasks, and for this the Church gives him grateful praise. Now, one tried in the missionary field, namely, Bishop St. George Tucker, of Virginia, has come to his high office, and we believe that his broad knowledge of the missionary field, coupled with a genius for statesmanship will make his career as Presiding Bishop a memorable and increasingly useful one. The very criticalness of the world situation lays upon all of us who believe in the sovereignty and leadership of Christ a weighty obligation. The frontiers of His Kingdom must be pressed forward, and I sincerely believe that the Woman's Auxiliary will be a large factor in accomplishing this end.

The cause of Missions is a challenging one, and it transcends every other obligation laid upon the Christian Church. I am confident that the very exigencies of the present hour will accelerate interest in Missions and that the Church at home will grow in strength and power as it lengthens its cords and strengthens its stakes.

Again I send to every member of the Auxiliary a word of gratitude for past service and high hopes and expectations for a greater service in the years that lie ahead.

Money is the least important of our gifts but it is a good measure of our devotion. Time we give because we love Him. Thought is the final measure for it controls us. Our ability and success will depend upon our surrender. A half way Christian hinders the cause.

Let us claim all time for Christ and fill every day in every year with His Name and His Worship.

"We beseech Thee, O Lord, to complete in us the work begun in the day when first we gave ourselves to Thee, reveal to us Thy Will through Thy Word, give us daily a new experience of Thy Presence, make us true witnesses of Thy Message and Thy Gospel and pour out a baptism of Thy Spirit upon us and upon Thy Whole Church, through Jesus Christ Our Lord. ST. MARY'S COUNTY

In the year as Vice-President for St. Mary's County I have not been able, because of distance from Washington and lack of leisure, to attend many Diocesan meetings but an effort has been made to attend, and to have representatives of the parish branches attend educational conferences and classes that might give us a broader vision of the Woman's Auxiliary.

In Mrs. Holt's message in the 1936 Year Book she pointed out very clearly the effect of the ignorance of church members and summed it up in these words "An ignorant Church is a retreating Church". It cannot be denied that the Church in this county has been a retreating Church, therefore, we should pursue a militant campaign.

There are seven parishes in this county, one of which is colored with a colored rector. There are two white branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, and two colored; a branch having just been organized in the colored parish.

All of these, I feel, are in a healthy state.

Our annual meeting, held in William and Mary Parish September 29th, in which we have no Auxiliary branch, was largely attended. The guest speaker, the Rev. James Valliant, gave a most instructive and interesting talk on the missionary work among the Japanese, Mexicans and Indians in western Nebraska.

Diocesan officers, six of whom were present, explained very clearly the work of each department of the Auxiliary.

Many expressions of appreciation and interest have been received since this meeting, giving great encouragement for the future.

Reports have not been received from all branches this fall. We pray that each branch will carry on the work with greater zeal and that each one will be represented at our Spring meeting which will be held at St. Paul's, Baden.

The discussion of our problems proved live and helpful. Miss Ruth Burnside, our United Thank Offering missionary in Tokyo, was our guest of honor, and gave us a short and interesting account of her work there.

As my term as chairman ends, I wish to thank each member of the Diocesan Devotional Committee. They have served faithfully and well and have shared in the work which for me, has been a joy and a blessed privilege.

REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY

The Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council in the Diocese of Washington is made up of seventy-three branch auxiliaries, nine of which are Junior Woman's Auxiliaries. The total membership is approximately 1800.

Two new senior branches and two new junior branches have been added during the year; in addition to which, the branch at Christ Church, La Plata and the junior branch at St. John's, Bethesda, were reorganized.

Six business meetings were held. In March the usual business session was replaced by "A Quiet Day". The average attendance has been 175; the largest 214, at the January meeting when 49 branches were represented, being the best representation at any meeting.

The service of Holy Communion was celebrated five times during the year, including the "Annual Memorial Service" which was held in Bethlehem Chapel of the Cathedral, with Bishop Freeman officiating.

The election of Mrs. George M. Harris as Vice-President for Prince George's County, and Mrs. Richard Pembroke as Vice-President for St. Mary's County were confirmed at the January meeting.

The Executive Board consisting of officers and departmental chairmen, 16 in number, held six regular meetings and three special meetings, with an average attendance of 11 members.

A nominating committee was appointed in February to report at the December meeting on the selection of candidates for President and Vice-President, to be elected in January.

In November, with deep regrets, the Executive Board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Katherine Guy Hopkins, who had served as Diocesan Treasurer for nine years. Mrs. Partridge was appointed to fill the office until January when the position will be filled by election.

The Diocesan Woman's Auxiliary was represented at the "Central Church Council for Woman's Work" meeting at London, England, in July, by Miss Florence Hyde, Diocesan correspondent with this group.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

This year the secretary omitted the customary pre-Advent series of normal classes at Diocesan House. Instead she directed her efforts toward Prince George and Montgomery counties, hoping thereby to foster the study of the Church's work among those not yet greatly aware of it. Two special educational meetings in each county with, in some cases, considerable discussion, have, we think, made a good beginning. In Montgomery County every branch was represented. It is a matter of great regret to the secretary that she could not inaugurate the same plan in the southern counties, but we hope for such an opportunity next year.

The Diocesan organization jointly with sixteen branches financed the sending of twenty-five women to the summer conferences at Orkney Springs and Lawrenceville. These went from sixteen branches. This is a considerable advance over 1936. The recipients appreciated their opportunities, and in one case a new branch was founded as the result of inspiration. Mrs. Charles Shaffer's thorough work in this matter has been a great help.

The Lenten Normal Class was held weekly from January 22 to February 26, with an average attendance of 25, drawn from 22 branches. The subject was The African Negro and His Changing Life, with special reference to our own Church work in Liberia.

Aside from attendance at special Educational, Diocesan and County meetings, the secretary has visited and addressed seven branches.

Beginning in March, the secretary has contributed one page a month to the Washington Diocese, in an effort to reach as many of our women as possible. These pages are devoted partly to special mission-study subjects, and partly to matters looking toward better Churchmanship.

The Church Literature bureau, ably conducted by Mrs. Shaffer, with Mrs. Donald Carpenter and Mrs. E. E. Metz as assistants, has considerably increased. The sold stock has included, beside regular mission-study books, Forward Movement, devotional, juvenile and organization matter, Washington Diocese and Spirit of Missions copies, and some miscellaneous and free items.

Our Third Annual Educational Conference occurred May 17 at Holiday House, with 36 served luncheon. On this day we discussed the branch classes and methods, and tried to analyze our results. Mrs. Leming, former Educational Secretary for Northern Presbyterian work in Washington, was guest speaker at luncheon, and in the afternoon Rev. Philip Mason of Boswell, Va., took up the subject of Rural America. His experience and knowledge helped us to a start toward fall study.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

The first item in this report of the Church Periodical Club for the year 1937, must be a very special word of thanks to our Registrar, Mrs. Harris, for her untiring and varied work. Her own department has been run, as usual, with skill and efficiency. She has repeatedly assisted with the packing, and has helped in many ways, such as moving to our room, on a hot July day, the entire Church School Library of one of the city parishes, and by carrying through the plan for establishing the library for Glendale, which will be mentioned later in this report.

To Miss Mildred Harris, we owe our thanks, also. She gave us valuable assistance in sorting and cataloguing, and in typing lists.

The Packing Committee has taken over the care of the new room in the Cathedral office buildings. This room, which was assigned to our use, during the summer, by Dean Powell, is larger, brighter and infinitely more convenient, and we are duly grateful for it.

More of the distribution of magazines in quantity has been done by the secretaries. This is a very desirable development, as it brings each parish into closer touch with its recipients, besides lightening the labor of the diocesan committee.

While the work increased along all lines, the greatest activity, during the past year, has been the distribution of books. In May, we sent 152 volumes to Rosebud Mission, South Dakota, where the library had been burned. A large proportion of these books came from our branch in the National Cathedral School. In November we sent 100 books to the Tuberculosis Hospital at Glendale, Md., as the beginning of its library. This was accomplished by Mrs. Harris, who found, upon conferring with Miss Clara Herbert, that the Public Library would provide for the cataloguing, care and distribution of any books that we would furnish. It is our intention to add to this collection, and we will welcome books that are suitable.

We have sent collections of books to 11 other libraries, ranging in scope from a very simple lending shelf in the South Carolina swamps, to our Cathedral libraries, and in numbers, from 19 to 181.

Last January, the third purchase was made with the interest from the Eliza H. Cook Memorial Fund. Two books were sent to Rev. Francis A. Gray, of Chaptico, Md. This fund has grown during the past year, and we are glad to report that its total is \$406.

In June we sent to All Saints' Parish, Oakley, Md., 20 hymnals, words only, and one with music. This was the second gift, made in memory of Miss Anne Gray.

As usual, our activities have been many and interesting. One of the Junior Branches dressed 20 dolls, in response to a request from Mrs. Mollyneux, of Sitka, Alaska, and filled 25 Christmas stockings for a local charity. One parish supplied funds for a radio, for a "Shut-In", in the Nebraska plains. Another parish, responding to an awakened interest in the work in Liberia, inspired by their Mission Study Class, voted to send, through the C.P.C. secretary, \$10.00, to be spent for "books for Liberia".

One new Lending Library was assembled in April. It has been thought advisable to wait for a time, before sending out more of these collections.

JUNIOR BRANCHES

At the end of last year the Juniors lost five branches from Graduation into Senior Branches and one from disorganization, so that we began 1937 with only six branches, one of which is composed of girls from 12 to 15 years of age. Of these five, only three branches had been in existence more than a year.

Fourteen girls attended the Junior Conference at Orkney, ten representing four branches, and four members at large, from parishes with no organized Junior Auxiliary, one from St. Thomas' and three from outside the District of Columbia. This was a decrease of only three delegates compared with the preceding year, when there were twice the number of branches.

We are ending the year with two new branches, St. John's, Georgetown, and Christ Church, Clinton, both organized during the past two months, and the branch at St. John's, Bethesda, has been reorganized after being dormant for nearly two years. We are happy to welcome these new branches, especially happy to have a second branch outside of the District, for now we have a branch in Prince George County as well as one in Montgomery County.

REPORT OF THE KULING SCHOOL COMMITTEE

The past six months have been a most difficult time for our missionary friends at Kuling, China. I hope that every member of the auxiliary has read the extract from a letter from Mrs. Roy Allgood to Miss May Carroll that appeared in the January issue of the "Washington Diocese." If you have not, please do for I am sure you will want to do all in your power to help those Christian workers who are standing by their Chinese friends in the hour of need.

The past year has seen an increase in the number of interested friends for Kuling School, both among the Episcopalians and Presbyterians. Last May the Afternoon Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary of Epiphany Church sponsored a luncheon and book-review for the benefit of this school and with the generous response from the Presbyterian women the members were able to make it a financial success. \$105 was realized from this benefit.

Seventeen branches have contributed to the Kuling School pledge this past year which together with individual contributions amounted to a total of \$206.58 disbursed through the Auxiliary treasurer.

The Joint Committee for Kuling School in Washington reported a total of \$346.58 forwarded to Dr. Lewis B. Franklin, 281 Fourth Avenue, New York, N.Y. during 1937.

This is most gratifying.

We are encouraged by the increase of the Diocesan pledge to \$100 for the coming year. Thus the Kuling School Committee goes forward with renewed effort and enthusiasm.

PUBLICITY OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

The greatest step forward in the publicity of the Woman's Auxiliary and in fact in the publicity of the entire Diocese, is the publication of the Washington Diocese the last week of each month. This date enables announcements to be made at the proper time and news to really be news.

Both diocesan and parish activities have been published in each issue of the Washington Diocese for 1937 and also in local newspapers.

Each parish president is asked to send news from her branch to the diocesan chairman by the tenth of each month and all chairmen of diocesan committees are asked to do the same.
