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THE BISHOP'S FOREWORD

It hardly seems credible that another year has rolled around and we are making the Annual Report of the Woman's Auxiliary. It is a report of which I am always justly proud, but I am also reminded that figures do not reveal the sacrifices and the service that lie behind them.

I am always reminded, whenever I write my annual letter to the Auxiliary, of the large place it has occupied in my long and varied ministry. I think I may say with confidence that of all the women's organizations in the Church, the Auxiliary has always occupied a commanding and conspicuous place in my affections and admiration. Few as my contacts with the Auxiliary are, I am kept advised of its progress through the periodic reports that come from its splendid Diocesan President, Mrs. Reber. Every Parish where a branch of the organization exists, is made the stronger by its operations. Quite apart from the large funds it collects for the cause of Missions, it does an educational work that is most valuable.

Sitting here in my study as I dictate this letter, I envision the wide extent of the Auxiliary's usefulness. In city and country Parish it has its large place. I could wish that I might express to each member of it in adequate terms my warm and deep appreciation of the service rendered. May the New Year that lies ahead find us in better circumstances than the year that is passing, and may the great cause of Missions throughout the world make fresh advances. These advances will be largely determined by the devotion and fidelity with which we, whose lives are blessed with ever-increasing privileges, do our duty. To my mind the very precariousness of the world's situation implies a new fullness of time, and if the Christian Church can be stimulated to a finer expression of its faith and its devotion to our Lord, we shall witness the beginning of a new reformation.

May God through His Holy Spirit stir us to a greater and broader service.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

"Faith and Fellowship in the Work" was the program planned for this triennium, at the Triennial Meeting in Cincinnati. The questionnaire, sent out by the Provincial President, prior to the Provincial Meeting in Richmond, included a question, as to what the Diocese had done to promote this program. Our reply was that "it is carried out in spirit, but with no definite plan." Having always felt that the whole atmosphere of the Woman's Auxiliary, more than any other organization, and even before we were made auxiliary to the National Council, was one of faith and fellowship, and that the best way of proving the point, was by the results of our efforts;—in this we have not failed during the past year.

Assuming that the membership, in the few branches who have made no report, has remained the same, we will have made a gain in numbers amounting to nearly seven per cent, a nice healthy growth.

The Educational report shows a greater desire, on the part of our women, to know the background of our work, and also the characteristics and environment of the people we try to help.

The United Thank Offering is slightly less than at this same period last Triennium, and much less than last year. In this we seem to be lacking in education, the education that would have a woman realize she has as many blessings for which to be thankful in 1938 as she had in 1937. This offering should increase from year to year, rather than show any decrease. Not only should those contributing be increasingly conscious of their "Blue Box" but we should interest more women in this offering, not alone for the increase in the gift, but to give them the opportunity to share in this great privilege.

The Supply Bureau has been handled most efficiently, and the results show an increase of about sixteen per cent.

The Church Periodical Club has caught the vision, not only of the senior branches, but also the junior branches, who, aside from giving fine service, have shown unusual originality.

The budget to the General Church Program has been over subscribed by about sixteen per cent, and the gifts to special projects and appeals have been larger than we have ever known them to be; the contributions to City Missions show considerable increase. The gifts to the "Advance Work", in which is included a gift of \$50 from St. Monica's League, have increased three-fold over last year. The offerings from three Diocesan Meetings have been sent to some special missionary project.

Does this advance show any lack of faith and fellowship in our work? We do it all on faith, and in the precious fellowship with each other.

Through it all has been woven a deep devotional spirit, a consciousness that "we do all things through Him who strengthens us."

Two meetings of the Prince Georges County branches of the Woman's Auxiliary were held during the past year. At the spring meeting, St. Paul's Church, Baden, reports were received from ten branches. Another was represented but had no report. The Rev. J. W. Watters, Hughville, Md. and Canon Everett H. Jones, of the Washington Cathedral, made most inspiring addresses.

The officers' conference held in November at Pinkney Memorial Church, Hyattsville, was well attended. Miss Ross told of her work in St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Shanghai, China, and exhibited many interesting things she had brought with her. The Very Rev. Noble C. Powell, Dean of the Washington Cathedral, was the guest speaker. His talk on "Leadership" was most timely and we believe will do much to stimulate the interest in the work of the Woman's Auxiliary in Prince Georges County.

For the convenience of all those concerned, it was decided to fix the dates of the county meetings well in advance. The Spring meeting will be held on the second Tuesday in May and the Fall meeting the second Tuesday in November. The branch at St. Barnabas, Leeland, will be hostess on Tuesday, May ninth.

Five branches were represented at the Orkney Springs Conference in June.

REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY

The Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council in the Diocese of Washington is composed of sixty-one Senior Branches,—one less than in 1937 due to the amalgamation of two separate branches in one Parish for greater strength,—and ten Junior Branches.

At the time of this writing five branches,—Christ Church, Kensington; St. John's, Broad Creek; Trinity Chapel, Oldfields, (Senior Branches,); Grace Church, Woodside and Christ Church, Clinton, (Junior Branches,) have failed to send in their reports. Assuming their numbers to be the same as last year, the total membership of the Auxiliary in the Diocese is 1968—an increase of 128 over 1937.

Seven monthly meetings were held, that in March being a Quiet Day with morning and afternoon meditations conducted by Dean Powell of the Cathedral. The average attendance at the six business meetings was 188, the January meeting leading with 217 present, representing 49 branches. Because of the revision of the calendar, which eliminated three all-day meetings, substituting two morning meetings and one afternoon business session, only three corporate celebrations of the Holy Communion were held,—in January, March and May.

The Diocesan Executive Board of sixteen members,—Officers and Chairmen of Departments,—held one special and six regular meetings with an average attendance of twelve. There were the following changes in the Executive personnel: Mrs. Katherine Guy Hopkins succeeded Miss Helen Munroe as Finance Chairman, then because of illness was forced to withdraw. Mrs. Frank F. Rogers who had resigned as Supply Sescetary, accepted the Finance Chairmanship, and Mrs. Thomas M. Rees was appointed to fill the vacancy left by Mrs. Rogers.

In the death on February 6 of Margaretta Wood, wife of Admiral Spencer S. Wood, the Auxiliary lost not only a former President, but a dedicated member whose zeal and devotion were an inspiration to her fellow workers.

Wilkinson, D.D., rector of St. Thomas' gave us a message of inspiration. The amount of the Fall Offering was \$2,447.33.

I have attended all but two of the Diocesan and County meetings, and upon invitation sixteen of the parish branches. We have held two conferences for parish treasurers of the United Thank Offering. One conference was at the Church of St. Stephen and the Incarnation on February 1, the other at Epiphany Church, December 6. Both were well attended. We endeavored to make them a clearing house for our various problems, an opportunity to exchange ideas, and a source of inspiration to continue in our efforts to reach every woman of the Church in this diocese with the message of the United Thank Offering.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

The educational effort, for this year, registers some advance. Of course no one can reasonably expect a rapid increase of the habit of study on the part of our women. The study of the Church's work, her needs and progress, her successes and failures, is not undertaken more energetically than any other study. Perhaps, it even appears, to some, more as a dreary duty than a practical requirement for success. On this subject, therefore, the Secretary has frequently dwelt, in her personal and branch contacts, attempting so to illumine and vivify her subject, that a greater desire to understand may be awakened in her groups. It is, therefore, a gratification to observe some advance, as shown by the reports.

Methods must vary with the need. In Montgomery County, one educational meeting was held. In St. Mary's County, the subject was dealt with in a smaller way at the November county meeting. And, in Prince Georges County, the Secretary met with an educational department conference at the county meeting—members from seven branches participating. An advance in educational work has this year been inaugurated. This is the attempt to cover the whole field of mission activity instead of half, as heretofore. The full results of this plan cannot yet be seen, as it is still in operation. So far, Miss Florence Hyde has conducted the Advent season leaders' class on the foreign subject "India". Later, the home subject series will be given.

As a practical result of our study of "The Church and Rural America", the several educational groups gave \$88.36 for a rural education project. This, with a small contribution from the central fund, financed additional training for two rural clergymen—the Rev. J. W. Watters of Trinity Parish, Charles County to Madison, Wisconsin, and the Rev. E. B. Harris of Holy Trinity Parish, Collington to Sweetbriar, Virginia. Both reported much help and inspiration received.

Five senior scholarships and one junior scholarship to the Shrine Mont Conference and four scholarships to the Lawrenceville Conference were given. Mrs. Charles Shaffer again managed this part of the work. Two private gifts, totaling \$8.50, were made to this object.

Mrs. Fred A. Leser, 4711 Chesapeake Street, has been attached to the department as Diocesan Chairman for the "Spirit of Missions" circulation, and has also succeeded Mrs. Donald Carpenter and Mrs. E. E. Metz as Assistant Librarian.

Aside from attendance at all designated meetings, the Secretary has visited and addressed thirteen branches.

Our fourth Annual Educational Luncheon Conference was held at Holiday House on May 20th, with thirty-five members present, representing eleven branches. Captain Rhoda Millikin, of the Woman's Bureau of the District of Columbia Police Department, discussed her work. This was appropriate to the coming study of the "Church and Urban America".

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE FOR JUNIOR BRANCHES

There are now nine Junior Branches as there were at this time last year, for, though we have one new branch during the past year, we have, unfortunately, lost one. The St. John's, Bethesda, branch has again disbanded, after struggling through the year; while the new branch is at St. Patrick's and is the first Auxiliary to be organized in that chapel.

Three of the branches, including the one at St. Patrick's, are composed of young girls from about ten to fifteen years of age, the other six, of older girls and young women. Some of the branches are showing a healthy and encouraging growth, both in their activities and in their donations to the Auxiliary program, as shown in the Treasurer's report for the year.

Seven girls attended the summer conference at Shrine Mont, one delegate at large, the other six representing three branches, one of which had not sent a delegate before. This percentage is not as low as it appears for the reason that the girls in three of the branches are really too young for this Junior Conference.

An officers' conference was held in December at the close of the diocesan meeting, and though the number was small, I think the meeting was helpful especially in bringing these juniors to the diocesan meeting and letting them feel that they are a part of the great organization of the Woman's Auxiliary.

SOCIAL SERVICE COMMITTEE

The Social Service Committee of the Woman's Auxiliary is of great benefit to Episcopal City Missions, as they aid in the care of our people who are in need at all times, especially at Thanksgiving and Christmas.

During the year the Diocesan Chairman has held two conferences with the Parish Chairmen, at one of which the Rev. George W. Dow, City Missioner, surveyed the work with us.

City Missions gave a very favorable report of the response made by the branch auxiliaries to the requests for gifts of fruit, baskets of food, also money, clothing and furniture. Thirty-six branches shared in making these gifts.

The Diocesan Treasurer reports contributions, by twenty-three branches, amounting to \$483.17, an increase over the previous year.

In an effort to make the holidays happy for our less fortunate friends, 275 baskets of food were distributed during this season.

Most branches continue their faithful work during the whole year, but with increased efforts during the winter months, for then the needs are greater due to the severe weather.

We ask that every auxiliary branch will be represented on this committee, and for this objective a special committee will be formed. It is hoped that all of our Social Service Chairmen and their assistants will continue their good work in helping City Missions care for the poor and needy who turn to them for help. We earnestly urge that this welfare work continue during the year to meet the ever increasing needs.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH PERIODICAL CLUB

Each year as I write this report, I have a feeling of regret that we, your diocesan officers and your parish secretaries, cannot bring to you, who provide the materials and the funds for the C.P.C., some of the satisfaction—the real thrill that we are constantly getting from the work.

In so short a space it is impossible to give individual instances of needs met, requests supplied. I wish that many more of you might find the time to visit our room in the Cathedral offices. It is not a beautiful place—often not even very neat, but there one gets an idea of our work such as words cannot give. Of course the ideal C.P.C. room is one with sufficient space for the storage of back numbers of the more valuable and important periodicals, both religious and secular, so that we might more efficiently fill in files for schools and libraries, as we now do in a very small way. At present, we are very grateful for the room that we have, and will continue to use it to the best advantage.

1938 has been a busy year, and, although no very large piece of work was undertaken, new friends have been made, new fields of work have been entered. In January, another gift was sent with the interest from our Memorial Book Fund—this time a year's subscription to the New York Times, Sunday Edition—to the Rev. Victor Menard, of Ellsworth, Kansas, and in June the third gift was made in memory of Miss Anne Gray, twenty prayer books for pews, and one for the altar, these sent to All Saints' Parish, Oakley, Md. We feel sure that the two former workers, Mrs. Cook and Miss Gray, who have gone on into the life of greater service, approve of these memorials of their devotion, here.

It is not possible to name all those who have given us special help during the past year, but to each one we say a word of thanks for their valuable assistance which is appreciated, not by us alone, but by those to whom the results are sent, as is attested by the letters we receive.

In October, Mrs. Harris and I attended the Provincial Meeting, held in Richmond, Va., and were helped and stimulated by contacts made as well as addresses heard. Our interest was aroused in the Provincial Project—the school for children of the colored race, at Miller's Tavern, Va.

The superintendent, Rev. Dr. Hamilton gave a very full and comprehensive account of the school. Our great regret was that more did not hear him.

From the appended list of gifts sent out, it will be noted that our scope is constantly broadening. A back-rest and book-rack sent to the bedridden widow of a clergyman, radios, victrolas and their records, a zither, dressed dolls, candy, toys and medicines, a kodak, games and scrap-books, as well as a very interesting exchange of stamps between some of our members and their families with new friends in all parts of the world.

It will be noticed that there is one new item—"Gift cards". By this we mean the reconditioned cards that have small gifts enclosed. These we sent to missions for Christmas, and the letters of appreciation we have received, prove their value to the workers who used them. This offers an interesting suggestion for Lenten work for parish branches—turning old Christmas cards, which have been only trash, into something useful. Magazine subscriptions, 227. Remailed 349. REPORT OF THE KULING SCHOOL COMMITTEE

The distressing news of the conflict in China during the past year has no doubt increased our interest in the conditions at Kuling School. It has been stressed from time to time that although the school was evacuated in December, 1938, Mr. Allgood, the headmaster, had remained in Kuling to serve the community and safeguard the property, therefore means for his support should be supplied.

As a means of furthering the interest in the school a meeting of the Joint Committee was called by the Chairman, Dr. Z. B. Phillips during January, at which time plans were formulated for a benefit lecture. On February 10th Dr. Boyd-Carpenter, Professor of International Relations of the Far East, at Georgetown University gave an illustrated lecture on "China" in Epiphany Parish Hall. A silver offering was taken amounting to \$94. On December 13th the Afternoon Branch of the Women's Auxiliary of Epiphany Church served a luncheon followed by a book review by Mrs. R. Winston Holt at which time \$52.50 was realized.

During the past year 23 branches of the Women's Auxiliary have contributed \$182.74, showing an increase in the number of branches over the past year which no doubt is evidence of a keener interest in this school.

The total amount appropriated by the Treasurer of the Joint Committee in Washington during 1938 amounted to \$334.74. This sum was forwarded to Dr. Lewis B. Franklin, New York City.

In making up the budget for 1939 the Finance Committee found it expedient to reduce the appropriation for Kuling School to \$50. Let us not be discouraged by this reduction in the budget for by the appointment of a representative in each branch there is every indication that a larger amount can be obtained for this most worthy cause.
