PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL ADDRESS.

To those who have at heart the best interests of the Woman's Auxiliary, the Annual meeting is of great importance. It sums up our work of the past and gives inspiration for the future. It gives opportunity for consultation, and to the novice, it means courage for the work before her.

I welcome you then to our Annual meeting, and as we have prayed for God's blessing upon our efforts, and our plans, let us strive with all our might to labor hand in hand, not only with each other, but with God, for it is His work we strive to do, and He "Worketh in us to will and to do of His good pleasure." He has promised to be with us, and that promise cannot fail. Let us try to realize then, that Our Master whom we are serving is here with us, hearing and seeing all we say or do; and that he will guide us, in our decisions, if we really ask him from the heart.

A year of golden opportunity has passed, for some it has been a year of earnest work. Such as it is we lay it down at the Master's feet, and ask Him to accept it.

We feel that often "we have left undone the things we ought to have done"; and perhaps we have done the things we ought not to have done, even in our work for the missionary cause; but with all its imperfections and its lack of constant zeal, we offer it, a poor meagre offering it is true, and we trust His mercy will forgive what He sees lacking.

The work that has been accomplished has been made possible only by loyal adherence to our beautiful motto "Love and Service," by devotion, and self sacrifice.

We have few, if any women among our number, of

large means, so that our gifts usually are the result of self denial. Here, it means an invalid, on her couch, sewing on material for the hospital, or for the Missionary box; there it is a little group of women who love pleasure, giving up one afternoon each week to the service of God; or again it is some unselfish woman trudging about, on the thankless task of collecting money for the United Offering, or the Monthly dues of her branch. Or among the children, a few are willing to give up an hour or so of their precious Saturday afternoon, to hearing about, and working for some Indian Mission School; or we see the dear little ones, denying themselves of sweetmeats, for weeks at a time, to be able to swell the Easter Offering, by dropping some pennies into the Keystone Box. Are they not all blessed by Him who looks at the spirit behind all these efforts?

Surely they are, and even though our figures do not mount up into the thousands as do those of some Dioceses, yes, even though they are not as large as they should be, were we all alive to the blessedness of having a part in spreading the Gospel of Christ, yet, our gifts carry a blessing with them, and they surely bring one back to us; for the reflex action of unselfish work, done for our Lord, is greater far, than the direct good that our feeble efforts can effect.

We can hardly estimate, then, the blessing that would be ours, were every woman and child a worker in our Auxiliary; if every one, along side of the parochial work we are all interested in, would carry in her heart a thought and a prayer for the missions of the Church.

To spread the interest, and to reach a larger num-

ber of our people, we have in this Diocese, followed the example of others, and inaugurated what is known as the "Birthday Plan," for gathering, and increasing the United Offering. This plan offers to every woman in every parish and mission the opportunity of making an offering to Missions on her own birthday. A Birthday Officer has been appointed in several of our parishes, but so far, I have heard of but one working officer, and that one has by a slight effort secured many new names on its list of membership. This plan would seem to be a specially good one for the isolated places, in which there is no possibility of having a regular Woman's Auxiliary.

The little envelope which is given to some lonely woman, in which to place her thank-offering for mercies received during the past year, links her to the great army of workers, from which she has felt herself separated heretofore, and to some would bring a real pleasure.

I hope that during the coming year, we may see in each parish and mission an active Birthday officer, with a full roll of Birthdays on her book; for even this one annual gift will make the giver an active member of the Woman's Auxiliary; and as I have said in a recent letter in the Churchman, we must not rest until we have every woman in the Diocese a living force in our society.

Among the events of the past year, the most notable has been that of the great Triennial Meeting at Richmond. Of this I have spoken so fully in the Duluth Churchman that I hesitate to say more; but the remark of one of our delegates speaks volumes. She said: "I shall not go to the next Triennial; some one

must go in my place for I feel that it would be wrong not to give to others the great joy and inspiration I have received from its meetings." Of course, we cannot expect every Triennial to be as interesting as the one at Richmond, whose rich historical stores were unfolded for our benefit, and whose hospitality was so absolutely unbounded.

No other place of meeting can give us that wonderful gathering at Jamestown Island, where we were given the vision of that which the little handful of colonists just landed upon this foreign shore saw as their star of hope—the gaining of this new world for Christ.

But always, at each succeeding meeting, some new and absorbing interest is awakened, some new vision is sent; sent to help us when we separate to our own spheres of labor, to go on in our lot with the eye of faith more clear and steady, to see further than our own feeble efforts can possibly reach—even to that time when each member of the Church of God shall take up his or her share of work, to do for Him what He commands.

As the assembled throng worshipped on that bright day in October, under the shade of the great awning stretched among the branches of the beautiful trees on Jamestown Island, our hearts throbbed with pride, and with gratitude for the men and women, who three hundred years ago stood just there, and worshipped with the same service used by us—men and women who had given up home, friends, and comforts, for this great venture of Faith. And as we thought of these brave Churchmen of long ago, we were, I think, given to see something of what they only dreamed of—a land

possessed by Christian people—a land of freedom, of plenty, of prosperity, and of noble deeds for God.

How this has come to pass, is partly the history of our country—and partly the history of our great missionary societies. England first, and then our own people, have evangelized this land, converting the savage, teaching the truths of the Christian religion to the ignorant immigrant and rescuing the foreign element of the incoming flood, from superstition and darkness. This has not been perfectly done, as we all know; but to the work of our missionary organizations we owe largely what has been done to bring about the present encouraging growth of high ideals.

These thoughts, and many others similar, crowded in upon our minds, as we lived over again the well known history of the early days in this spot.

That day, both past and future seemed present, as memory and hope joined hands in fixing our faith in the growth of our beloved Church.

We, of the fourth century of our Country have a great heritage to inspire us—a heritage of brave and self-sacrificing forefathers, and of God-fearing, and courageous workers for the Church. Let none of us then, be downhearted at discouragements, nor let us listen for a moment, to those who would counsel us to let alone the purely missionary work we have undertaken, and absorb ourselves in home work. Where should we have been, had others felt and believed that doctrine? Where indeed, but in the hands of a people who make money, and money getting their God—who cared for the savage only as a cover for their bullets, and for the land as a producer of gold. Where would we in Minnesota have been had it not been for the

missions of the Church? In the hands of the Indians, who affrighted the early comers and under the grinding influence of such early settlers as we now see carrying high hand in some of our mining towns of the newer west. Yes, let us be thankful for the blessings the Church has given us here, and let us not forget to show our gratitude, not only by words, but by deeds. Let us pass on the benefits which have been showered upon us, not forgetting that of him to whom much has been given, is much required.

Report of Annual Meeting.

The twelfth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Duluth Branch was held in Trinity Pro-Cathedral, Duluth, May 28, 1908.

The opening service at 9:30 a. m., consisted of a celebration of the Holy Communion by the Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by the Dean, Rev. A. H. Wurtele.

The sermon on this occasion was preached by Rev. J. Johnson, of White Earth, upon the text, "I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills, from whence cometh my help." Ps. 121:1.

After the service in the church, the meeting was called to order for business in the crypt chapel, with the President, Mrs. J. D. Morrison in the chair.

The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and approved.

A letter to the Auxiliary from Miss Emery, General Secretary, was read by the President. A motion was made and carried that a vote of thanks be given Miss Emery for her helpful letter.

The Secretary's report was read and upon motion she was given a standing vote of thanks

The Treasurer's report being read, it was referred to the Auditing Committee to be examined after the meeting, and by vote the President was empowered to accept the report of that committee.

Mrs. Henry Taylor was appointed to fill a vacancy on the Auditing Committee.

A card acknowledging the receipt of the Diocesan Box was read by the President.

The chairman of the Church Periodical Club read her report which was approved.

An address of greeting, followed by noonday prayer, was given by the Dean of Trinity Pro-Cathedral.

Upon motion a vote of thanks was extended to Mr. Johnson for the poetical, helpful and inspiring sermon presented.

The report of the secretary of the Junior Auxiliary was read and approved.

It was moved by Mrs. Berry that \$20 be appropriated from the Junior Auxiliary fund for the education of children in the Industrial School of Winchester, Kentucky. The motion carried.

On motion it was decided that the balance of

\$10.70 from the Junior Fund be given to General missions to help make up the pledge of \$100.00.

The report of the Secretary of Little Helpers was read and approved.

A vote of thanks was given the Secretary of Little Helpers for her report.

An earnest appeal was made by the President for interest in enlisting assistance in the organization of new Junior and Little Helpers branches.

After an hour's adjournment for luncheon, the meeting was resumed.

Upon announcement that the morning's offering was \$11.70, it was voted that this amount be turned into the Central Expense Fund.

Mrs. Morrison announced pledges made in the name of the Duluth Auxiliary, at the General Convention, of \$2.00 for a church bell in Liberia, Africa; \$10.00 to a refuge for poor, sick Japanese children of Sacramento, California; total, \$12.00.

By vote the pledges were approved and the Treasurer authorized to pay the same.

Mrs. Suffel at the time of her death was President of the St. Paul's Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, and by her quiet manner, her cloak of charity for all, her willingness to serve the church, became an example for all members of this body to emulate. We miss her today, but through our faith in the communion of saints we know she is near us in spirit.

The Secretary was instructed to extend to Mrs.

W. H. Stultz, through Mrs. George Crosby, the sympathy of the Woman's Auxiliary for her in her illness, which prevents her helpful presence at this meeting.

An invitation was given by Mrs. A. W. Ryan, of St. Paul's, to hear an address on "Africa," by Mrs. John McLeod, June 12.

After singing No. 261 from the Hymnal, a closing address was made by the Bishop, and the meeting dismissed with the benediction.
