Brainerd, Paynesville and Sauk Centre had seven delegates and and several alternates present.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

For the second time in the history of our Diocese the delegates to the Diocesan convention and the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary were guests of the kind and generous people of St. John's Church, St. Cloud.

The opening service of the Convention was held on Monday evening, January 26, at eight o'clock at which time Bishop Wilson of Eau Claire, the Guest Speaker of the Convention, spoke of our Church in America as compared with our Church in other countries. "We have," said the Bishop, "a unique situation here. We deal with all races and colors." We not only have foreign missions to consider but the missions of foreigners right at our door. One wishes in recording this opening address that every one in the Diocese might have heard it, as it presents a situation which all of us who love the Church should bear in mind.

All the Delegates met in St. John's on Tuesday morning for the Corporate Communion and to listen to the addresses of Bishop Bennett and Bishop Kemerer. Bishop Bennett told of his numerous journeys and sermons and addresses within and without the Diocese, also the number of confirmations and expressed the hope that the goal set some years ago of 500 might yet be reached.

Bishop Kemerer followed with a very comprehensive report of his journeys in his new field which was very interesting. The Coadjutor had covered much ground in the short time since his consecration.

After the morning service, the members of the Auxiliary adjourned to the lovely and comfortable Presbyterian Church across from "St. John's" where our meetings were to be held.

With Mrs. Hanson of Sauk Centre at the piano, the opening hymn, "Go Labor on", was sung with a will and the President read the opening prayers after which she turned the meeting over to Mrs. W. G. Bugbee

who was to be the presiding officer during the sessions of the Auxiliary.

In a few gracious words, Mrs. Lehrke, the President of St. John's Auxiliary, welcomed us to St. Cloud.

A very good number answered to the Roll Call which was left open for new comers as they should arrive.

The minutes of the 1930 Annual Meeting were read by the Recording Secretary; followed by the reports of the Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer. By this time the Noon Hour had arrived and Mrs. Hallett of International Falls led us in the Noon Day Prayers for Missions.

Mrs. Bugbee then announced the appointment of the following Committees: Auditing, Mrs. Brandon, Mrs. Sandven, Mrs. Burns and Mrs. Scott. Committee on Resolutions, Mrs. W. A. Retz, Mrs. C. B. Lewis, Mrs. E. Smith, Mrs. L. H. Clepper and Miss Isabel Lawrence. Time Keepers for Tuesday were Mrs. Beaty and Mrs. Scott.

Mrs. Kempton then read the report of the Board Meetings during the year.

Mrs. Bugbee read Mrs. Fitzsimmons address which we all love to hear, as we know in these addresses that her heart speaks to our hearts. She gave us, as the watch word, this year, "Go Forward."

Mrs. LeQuesne gave her usually lovely report of the United Thank Offering of which she is the faithful treasurer.

As the Chairman of the Parshall Memorial Fund was not present, her report was read by Mrs. Lundblad of Paynesville.

The Educational Secretary also being absent, her report was read by Mrs. Hudson of Paynesville. The Study Book for 1931 was "India on the March" and brought to us a new and fascinating country to explore as at present the American Church has no work in that country. It was also announced at this time that there were "Daily Bible Readings" on sale at ten cents each.

Luncheon time had arrived and was served in the Parish Hall of St. John's, and a pleasant and profitable time was spent round the tables where delicious food was served and much laughter, greetings and discussions took place. Well, Church people can afford to be happy.

At two o'clock the delegates were back in their seats ready to listen to Bishop Wilson's talk on The Advance Work Program. We were all eager to hear this address because we were to be deep in it very soon.

Bishop Wilson gave us a complete history of the plans of the National Council. Spoke of the methods of by gone days and the improvements made in them. "Now," said the Bishop, "it is felt that each Diocese, knowing just where its money is to be spent, just what field it is working in, has already shown very satisfactorily, that this plan is the best to date." Every Diocese has its own project. At 2:30 the delegates moved over to St. John's Church for a joint session on Rural Work.

Bishop Kemerer presided during this session and it was a joy to see the church full and all eager to learn about the Rural Work which was really the keynote of the 1931 Convention.

Rev. Mr. Long spoke first. He said that our Diocese was distinctly rural with the scattered white work in this North country of long winters and great distances. Mr. Long said that the Rev. Mr. Kah-O-Sed had been valuable to many white families, administering baptism and preparing people for confirmation and that they were very appreciative of his efforts in these far away places. The clergy have had to reach out far beyond their own parishes. It was the general opinion of the Clergy discussing this subject that it was better to go out in the Rural Field more as teachers than preachers in order that time so valuable should not be used merely as Church advertising.

Mrs. Biller then addressed the joint session. She said we have more members in the country than in the city, that there were four thousand Communicants in Bishop Kemerer's field. That we should stop talking

and do things. She said that Deanery meetings should be held; clergy should exchange pulpits; children should be taught through a correspondence method, if they cannot be reached often enough for personal instruction; good literature should be sent out and gave many other suggestions. A general discussion followed and Bishop Wilson gave us some of his experiences in Rural Work. Bishop Kemerer faces a tremendous task in the building up of this Rural Work. It takes money, men and a consecrated laity to do it. The Bishop has had to ask his clergy to go outside their own parishes to reach the isolated because there is no money for additional clergy.

A committee consisting of the Rev. Mr. Long, Mrs. E. C. Biller, Mrs. O. S. Kempton, Mr. J. H. Harding, Mrs. L. W. Hallett and Mr. Eliek Johnson, was appointed to draw up a plan for Rural Work. After the adjournment for the day, this Committee met and drew up a Resolution to the effect that a Committee of two clergymen, two laymen and two members of the Woman's Auxiliary be appointed by Bishop Kemerer to plan out the Rural Work.

On Tuesday evening occurred the Convention Dinner which was held at the Hotel Breen and which proved to be one of the largest gatherings of any Diocesan Convention and was a most enjoyable affair in every particular. We were honored by the presence of three Bishops. Bishop Bennett proved himself an inimitable toast master and the addresses by Bishop Wilson and Bishop Kemerer were an inspiration.

Wednesday morning, January 28th, was a beautiful morning after a feathery snow storm with the sun shining over it all. A 9:30 Communion service at St. John's began the day after which the delegates of the Auxiliary adjourned to their own meeting place for the last day's business sessions.

With Mrs. Donald Smith at the piano, we sang, "Go Forward Christian Soldiers" and then Mrs. Kemerer led the morning devotions, after which she spoke of the Auxiliary work as a whole and its unselfish devotion to the Church. She spoke of her life in the Southern

Mountains during Bishop Kemerer's work there earlier in his Ministry, their interesting contacts with the Mountaineers and she also spoke of her travels about this diocese with the Bishop, her kindly feeling for the people whom she met and her hearty desire to be known to all members of the Church in the Diocese and her hope for more knowledge of this field as time goes on.

The Time Keepers for Wednesday were Mrs. Parker of Sauk Centre and Mrs. Nelson of Eagle Bend.

Reports were next in order and Mrs. T. S. Wood, the Supply Secretary, reported that the Boxes sent into the Indian Field were valued at \$435.71 and was the largest amount ever sent out in our Indian Work. Mrs. Wood thanked the members for the support given her department during the year.

Mrs. Hobbs, of Trinity Cathedral, read the report of the C. P. C. Work. It was a splendid report of the various articles sent out. This is a fine piece of Diocesan work done by consecrated women who give far more of their time and strength than any report could show.

Mrs. Wilhelmi said that the Gold and Silver Crop would have been a total failure if it had not been for donations to this offering from Brainerd and St. Paul's, Duluth. Please, everybody, take notice. Business seems very good in the jewelry stores in our cities according to reports. Where are the castoffs? Let us make a special effort to replenish this very needy department.

Mrs. Randall made the report for the Advance Work Program. We have been assigned \$3000 as a Diocese for buildings and land in the Diocese of Osaka, Japan. Of this sum, the Auxiliary pledged \$500 which is practically in hand.

Mrs. Parker, Secretary of the Indian Auxiliary, spoke of the Indian Convocation. She had five reports sent in. At this point it was voted to send Mrs. Waukazo a letter of sympathy from the Delegates, in their great trouble. Mrs. Critts, from White Earth, told how the White and Indian women work together. There are two branches of the Auxiliary at White Earth, one for

those speaking English and one for those who do not.

Miss King read Mrs. Catherall's report of the Church School Service Program, which includes the service and money offerings of the children from their birth until they leave the Church School.

Mrs. Watts, as Chairman of the Box Work for the Church School Service Program, sent in a fine report. Gifts must be sent earlier this year. May 1st is the latest due to scarcity of boats and there must be no disappointments at Christmas. A letter from Mr. Hedelund was read showing what his church school had done. If every Church School could show a like report, we would have little to worry about in regard to the future of the Church.

Mrs. Richards made a splendid report on the Little Helpers. She explained her method of getting her letters answered. She sends out an addressed envelope and she had been more successful in receiving replies by this method. She also stressed the Service for Little Helpers. Mrs. Richards is to be congratulated on her handling of this, the very beginners in the Church's Life,

Mrs. Ellis, President of the Indian Auxiliary, greeted the women and thanked them for the \$50.00 given her at the last Annual Meeting in Duluth. She gave a very comprehensive report of how she had spent it. One ten dollars went towards funeral expenses; \$5.00 went to a sick family; \$2.50 was spent for medicine for a sick woman; oranges and milk for the sick; groceries and a load of wood for a family with a new baby; a load of wood and food for a widow; \$1.50 for thread and sewing materials for someone else. The balance was used for sick people and for funerals.

In Ponsford, when they have meetings, they sew and have a social hour. Mrs. Ellis said English was spoken entirely at Ponsford. She also thanked the C. P. C. for reading matter, which is read and passed on; and also thanked the Executive Board for many letters, gifts and favors done for her. As the President of the Indian Auxiliary, she has many demands made upon

her. She made, during the year, two hundred calls, often being called out in the night. A rising vote of thanks from all to Mrs. Ellis, who is nurse, cook, minister, friend and God's messenger to the Indian women of all ages and in all places.

At this point, Mrs. B. B. Wood and Mrs. L. H. Clepper went over to the Convention Hall to bring Bishop Kemerer over to read the Noon Day Prayers.

Mrs. Randall spoke about the Report Blanks and the lack of response in filling out the five fields of Service. It is impossible to make up the Tabulated Report without this information. If it was not understood what was wanted, now was the time to ask questions.

Mrs. Manypenny and Mrs. Parker took up the Offering, which Bishop Kemerer received and said the Noon Day Prayers which were followed by a special prayer for our friends, Rev. and Mrs. Waukazo, who are in such trouble in the loss of their son, who had gone into the woods in the early fall and had not yet been found.

Bishop Kemerer gave a short talk and spoke of our gift of a Moulded Stone to the Cathedral at Washington, D. C. The Bishop said what we leave behind determines what we are. Our work should take on an everlasting quality. The memorials all around us testify to man's love of Service to Country, Church and Mankind.

Mrs. Hobbs read Mrs. McGiffert's paper on "India" which was lovely and fascinating in its picture of India.

Mrs. LeQuerne reported on Provisioning the Summer School and read a letter from Mr. Hallett saying how greatly the help of the Auxiliary was appreciated and that they hoped to purchase a new stove with part of the balance they had on hand.

Mrs. Randall, in the absence of Mrs. Green read the report on Furnishing Bennett Hall. The Auxiliary bought more chairs, rugs, cushions, ash trays, etc. and there was also given a piano and muslin curtains, so the Hall was a very inviting place as well as very comfortable.

We again adjourned to St. John's Parish Hall for luncheon. The memory of the apple pie lingers yet with your Recording Secretary.

At two o'clock the meeting opened with a final roll call, so that the delegates who came after the opening meeting might be recognized by the Chair.

Mrs. Biller made the report on the Synod Meeting at Miles City, Montana, which was very interesting, especially the fact that Methodists, Presbyterians and even Roman Catholics helped make the delegates comfortable and happy. Mrs. Biller announced that the Triennial would be held in Denver, Colorado from September 16th to the 30th, it being only for two weeks. It is hoped that many will be able to attend this time who could not go when the Convention has been held in the East. Many outstanding speakers from all over the Country are to be there.

Mrs. Bugbee also spoke of the triennial and hoped that our Diocese would be well represented.

By request, Mrs. Randall outlined what was planned for the Summer School. It was hoped to have Miss Elizabeth Baker and Bishop Kemerer's advice was to have as many women as possible come to Cass Lake to take the course which Miss Baker would give on Religious Education. Mrs. Bugbee, who knows Miss Baker, recommended her highly.

Mrs. Bugbee then called for the reports from Committees. Mrs. Brandon, Chairman of the Auditing Committee, reported that the books were found to be correct.

Mrs. Reetz, Chairman of the Resolution Committee, not being present, Miss Isabel Lawrence read the Resolution which were voted upon separately. They will be found on another page of the Year Book.

Mrs. Donald Smith spoke on her trip abroad and her visit to Oban, Scotland. Our money was the very first to be sent in towards the completion of the Church at Oban. She also spoke of the Seabury Shrine at Aberdeen, Scotland. She took some of our Year Books

with her which she gave to those interested and wished she might have had more to give out. Mrs. Smith had some lovely things to show us that she brought back with her, especially some lovely silver crosses that any Church woman would love to own. It is hoped Mrs. Smith will be able to speak often about her wonderful trip whenever she visits any Parish branch.

There were no Deanery reports.

Mrs. Manypenny gave a talk on her Church work and we then had just a short time for parish reports.

Mrs. Brown, of Fergus Falls; Mrs. Hallett for International Falls and Warroad; Mrs. Bauby for Aitkin; Miss Van Dyke for Alexandria; Mrs. Burnett for Brainerd; Mrs. Askew for Wadena; Mrs. Sandven for Paynesville and a report from Eagle Bend were all that we had time to hear. Mrs. Askew spoke of the Memorial Service for Father Murphy which is held each year in Wadena and for which Mr. Long was responsible. After prayers for our work by Mrs. Ellis and Mrs. Bugbee, the meeting adjourned and we crossed the road once more for the farewell tea which closed the 1931 Convention and Annual Meeting.

One can hardly find words to express our appreciation of the St. Cloud friends. The gracious hospitality of those who opened their homes to the delegates, the delicious luncheons, the kindly Rector and his beloved wife, the donation of cars and many other things which all helped to knit us all closer together.

Many could come to St. Cloud from nearby towns who often are unable to come to Duluth, and we were most thankful for this contact with those in this part of the Field.

In looking back over the Meeting, many things stand out as very promising. The deep interest in Rural Work; the fact that Indian clergy serve the white parishes and missions as well as white clergy serving the Indian Missions; the Christian spirit of the clergy in doing more than their share in reaching out to help the Isolated, which means more work for which just

now there is no extra money to recompense them; the desire for more Deanery Meetings and conferences; and the joy of such a large gathering as the Joint Session. If it is true and we know it is, that in such a large group much Power is released for our Father's Work, and that together we gather courage and love and inspiration, then this Annual Meeting should be a never to be forgotten one.

As these minutes are recorded, I am wondering how much will have been accomplished when the time arrives to read them at the Meeting in 1932. Will we have made great strides in our Rural Work and for the Isolated? Will our Indian Work have advanced? Will our parish branches be larger? And just how much farther will we be spiritually? We have lost awhile some loved members throughout the Diocese the past year when it seemed as though we could not get along without them, we needed them so much. Will we, through our lives of love and prayer and service, bring others in that they, too, may know the joy of loving and serving. God grant that we will.

Jesus said "Follow Me" and we answer: "Teach us, Lord, to serve Thee as we ought. To toil and not seek for rest, and not to ask any reward save to love Thee more and more." Amen.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETINGS

Another year has gone by and I extend to you, fellow workers in the Woman's Auxiliary, the greetings of the Executive Board of the Diocese. We have had the usual number of Board Meetings and as usual they have been of deep interest, calling, not only for concentration, but, I believe, for consecration as well. While each member is concerned with the work of her own department, the Board is not divided, but work together as a whole.

This year has been a year of important changes not only with members and the Clergy but we now work under two Bishops, where formerly we had one. The Board has assured Bishop Kemerer of their loyal support and he has responded most cordially and has attended a Board Meeting and the Board have all profited by his good councils. We are still happy in having Bishop Bennett in charge of the Duluth Churches and the Indian Field. We should go forward this year under such splendid double leadership.

Our beloved President spent the winter months in California following the Annual Meeting, so the work went forward under the able leadership of our First Vice President, Mrs. Green. In February, the Board met to discuss the money needed for the Bishop's Educational work and it was voted to loan him \$642.00 which, together with the evening offering of \$88.00 voted him by Resolution, made up the required sum of \$730.00.

The Vestment Fund, especially the giving of stoles to the Clergy in the Diocese, was an important item of discussion and it was finally decided by a unanimous vote that the stoles which Mrs. LeQuesne made, were to be a loan until the Clergyman receiving them had been in the Diocese five years. After that time they were to become his property. If he left the Diocese before, he was to pay for them if he wished to keep them. The stoles that have been given have been Beauty personified. Mrs. LeQuesne's work is unsurpassed and with

her eyes taxed to their utmost in doing the work, the clergy of the Diocese hardly realize, we think, just what is being done for them when they receive any of these lovely stoles. I do not know of any other diocese where their Executive Board can furnish a member, who, besides being a most capable United Thank Offering Treasurer, is an artist with the needle as well. At this February Meeting we welcomed Mrs. D. C. Wakeman of Holy Apostle's Church, West Duluth, as a new member of the Board, being Manager of the Duluth Deanery.

In March an invitation from the Auxiliary of St. Albans' in Superior, Wisconsin was received and Mrs. Green and myself went over in a raging blizzard to speak to them about the Auxiliary work. There were about twenty women there and we had a very nice afternoon and as the meeting grew more informal, we felt that, in spite of the blizzard, it was good for us all to confer together.

In June the President and several members of the Board went to Cass Lake to the Indian Convocation. The weather was lovely and, as several had stayed over from the Summer School, there was quite a gathering of white people, whom with the Indian delegates from the different Missions crowded into the Chapel for the evening service. Rev. Mr. Brown interpreted for the Bishop and there were several confirmed, one old man and some of his relatives were in the class. It was so peaceful there, I thought of the early days of our State and of Bishop Whipple and his work among these people, and I thanked God for this wonderful privilege of having just a small part in His work in the Indian Field. There may be more grandeur in some of our beautiful Cathedrals but here in this secluded spot, under the oil lamps, I am sure we were all "lifted up." On the alms basons, besides the usual gifts of money, there were other offerings, among them some lovely beaded moccasins. One more event occurred of great importance in the Indian Work and that was the announcement by Bishop Bennett of the appointment of Mr. Boyle as the Archdeacon in the Indian Field, the very first one of his race to hold

this office. I happened to be present when Archdeacon Boyle was ordained a Priest in Trinity Cathedral. Duluth, some fifteen years ago. I just hope I live to see him consecrated our first Indian Bishop.

The next Board meeting was called in July to discuss the Bishop's request for another loan to help him in his purchase of a piece of property in the town of Cass Lake, which he eventually expects will be used for an Orphanage for Indian children. It was voted to loan him \$500 as this was strictly Indian Work.

During the summer the Board had their usual summer meeting and picnic at the Kempton's summer home. It was a lovely day, though warm and was spent in the open. At four o'clock the "picnic" moved down to the Lindstrom cottage on the river where they were served refreshments and those who felt inclined, went in for a swim.

Our fall meeting was in the nature of a farewell luncheon at the home of Mrs. Constable in honor of Miss Frances Quilliard, who was leaving Duluth to make her home in far away New York. A prayer book and hymnal were given her by the Board and it was with deep regret that we parted with our C. P. C. Director not only for her work in the C. P. C. but for her assistance in our councils where with her spiritual insight, she was most helpful.

Mrs. Biller, our second Vice President, was also at this meeting and gave us her report on the Synod meeting at Miles City, Montana. We always wish Mrs. Biller could be with us at every meeting. At this meeting we also voted to pay for the repairs on the buildings at the Mission at Cass Lake. They amounted to \$297.55.

Our December meeting was saddened by the death of Mrs. Jamar, which occurred in November just after our last meeting. Mrs. Jamar, who was Chairman of the Auxiliary at Large, never missed a Boardmeeting or an Annual meeting unless illness kept her away. Her faithfulness to her Church and interest in its growth was a living thing and will be kept alive by those who

worked with her and loved her.

The January meeting was held to plan our program for the Annual Meeting and to finish up the business in all departments. Reports were given, letters read and all loose ends gathered up into a compact whole. In the midst of this, we were told of Mrs. Neide's death in St. Cloud. This was a blow. We could not believe it possible, after seeing her sweet face in November at Bishop Kemerer's consecration. We had all looked forward to seeing her again in St. Cloud and she had spoken of it and was so pleased to think the Convention and Annual Meeting were to be there. Our membership is steadily growing in the Church in Paradise and we hope to be accounted worthy to meet her there.

And so ended the meetings of the Board for 1930. We have worked many hours during the year but we have loved it and our fellowship has been closer than ever. Our thanks go out to all of you who share the Master's Work with us.

It has been a hard year for many, with the drouth, much sickness and financial losses, but, even so, we have made progress and you will hear splendid reports. May we be brave to go forward for another year of work, study and prayer. To study Him is to love Him, and through prayer we grow to know Him.

REPORT OF THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY

January, 1930 to January, 1931

The work of the Auxiliary grows more interesting and engrossing as the years pass. There were forty-two out of town delegates who answered to the Roll Call last January in St. Paul's Church, Duluth. It was a goodly gathering and warmed the hearts of the members of the Board. This was two more than we had the year before and we hope for even a larger attendance this year.

A Manager for the Duluth Deanery, Mrs. D. C. Wakeman of Holy Apostles' Church, Duluth, was appointed during the Annual Meeting and directly after the meeting our dearly loved President left to spend the remainder of the winter in California and the affairs of the Diocese were left in the capable hands of the first Vice President, Mrs. C. V. Green.

In February the first check of the year, from the Parshall Memorial Fund, was given Bishop Bennett for his Educational Fund. Then, just as the work was starting on the Year Book, our U. T. O. Treasurer met with a sad accident and the Editor turned her attention to nursing and the Year Book had to wait for weeks. However, the Budget was sent out during February and was rearranged to fit the objects which composed it for 1930. To Paynesville goes the honor of being the first to pay their Budget in full, closely followed by St. Andrew's, Duluth. Bena, in the Indian Field, holds first honors for paying theirs in February. We have received under the Budget \$1060.00 as follows: Duluth Deanery \$504.00; Mississippi Valley \$410.00; Red River Valley \$146.00. Had one of the Parishes of the Red River Valley been able to complete their Budget as is their usual custom, we should have been ahead of last year. As it is, we fall short only \$6.50 of the amount received in 1929. Personally I consider this a remarkable showing, especially in view of the business depression, and we feel that the spiritual life of the members of the Auxiliary must be increasing steadily in order

for them to make this showing. Of course, we still dream of the day when the whole \$1500, which is the quota for the General Auxiliary work of the Diocese, will be paid. It is always wise to hitch your wagon to star! While I am on the subject of budgets and finances generally, let me sound an appeal right now for the items of Central Expense and Delegate Fund to be paid before the work closes for the summer. This is the year of General Convention and our Triennial Meeting and it convenes a whole month earlier than usual, the date of the opening service being September 16, 1931 in Denver, Colorado. It is imperative that we have ALL the money for these two items in the treasury by August.

Last year you were told of the disbanding of the splendid Guild at Eveleth and this year the good news comes that they have reorganized and have begun to work with their usual energy. We fully expect they will be able to resume their part in the Auxiliary work before long.

The Red River Valley Deanery is still without a Deanery Manager and the work is directed from the desk of the Corresponding Secretary. The five parishes all contributed to the Budget. three paying it in full and the other two making substantial payments. All but one contributed towards the "A.B.C. Resolution;" three helped towards the provisions for the Summer School and three paid the sum asked towards the furniture for Bennett Hall, and they contributed to the Box Work. We feel that this Deanery has done extremely well for the Red River Valley has been hard hit for several years with poor crops, bank failures and other ills to which flesh is heir.

The correspondence grows by leaps and bounds and it is a rare occasion when there are no letters to be written whenever the Secretary has free moment.

While the President was in California, we decided to try and raise the money for the "A.B.C. Resolution," so as to have a happy surprise for Mrs. Fitzsimmons on her return. We were quite successful and were able to pay the \$50.00 pledged to the Seabury Shrine and the

\$50.00 for the Church in Oban, Scotland and we surely had our reward in her great pleasure at the good news. We have a balance towards the sum needed for the Moulded Stone to be given to the Cathedral in Washington, D. C. and the sum will be completed immediately after this meeting and forwarded to Washington.

The Vestment Fund has been working overtime this year. We have provided two Cassocks; bought two stoles ready made and the materials for two more, one of which Mrs. LeQuesne has finished and sent to its destination. We hope to be able to show it to you all during this meeting. I assure you that it is a thing of beauty and a joy forever. We feel that the clergy appreciate our Vestment Fund and that Mrs. Cooper left a monument to herself as it was at her suggestion, the Vestment Fund was started.

The Committee on provisioning the Summer School again did a fine piece of work and we shall, of course, continue to aid them in this way while such aid is needed. Plans are already being made to make the next Summer School better than ever but it is too early to divulge them.

The Furniture Committee has finished its task of securing furniture for Bennett Hall and it is now a very comfortable place.

May saw the Secretary trying wildly to secure someone to take the Auxiliary class at the Summer School and just as things seemed the darkest, word came that Mrs. Thornberry of Wyoming was to be at Cass Lake and a couple of letters solved that very pressing problem.

June 1930 seems to have been the busiest month of a very busy year. It was in June that Captain and Mrs. Jamar celebrated their Golden Wedding and the members of the Board sent a beautiful basket of yellow roses to help them celebrate the event. It gave Mrs. Jamar great pleasure to have us remember them.

Also in June the Year Book was brought out of temporary retirement, finished and sent to the printer's.

It was mailed out to the Presidents and Secretaries of the Diocesan branches and Guild-Auxiliaries.

Dr. Silver of New York wrote us that they were planning a celebration of Bishop Lloyd's fiftieth anniversary of his ordination to the Diaconate and asked us to the luncheon and also invited us to contribute towards the gift of robes for him. We were forced to decline the luncheon but we sent \$2.00 towards the gift. Bishop Lloyd was for many years head of the Board of Missions before it merged into the National Council and is very dear to all Auxiliary women.

The Indian Convocation took our attention at the close of June and while it was only held one day, opening with a service on Sunday and closing Monday noon, yet it was one of great interest and we were glad to be able to go and meet our Indian friends once more.

July was peaceful as far as desk work was concerned but a busy time as the Secretary was down for an Address at the Deanery Picnic in St. Cloud, the 9th day of July. Several delightful days were spent in St. Cloud before the picnic, which was a very enjoyable affair in spite of that "Address." Leaving St. Cloud, she accompanied our Provincial Representative home for a visit which was thoroughly enjoyable. While in Paynesville a talk was given before the Guild, which is a splendid group of women.

August came, bringing a charming invitation from Mrs. Kempton for the Board to have lunch with her at her attractive home in Fond du Lac and a most happy day was spent with her. Late in the afternoon we drove to Mrs. Lindstrom's cottage where a happy hour was spent on the lawn and a swim for those so inclined. In August we again drew a check from the P. M. Fund. This time to help out with a payment on a note of Bishop Bennett's.

September brought the reopening of fall work and getting ready to send out two delegates to the Synod Meeting. Mrs. Biller had two Bishops on her trail for fear she would not attend, but she and dear Mrs. Neide went together and contributed much to the success of

the meeting, as the President, Mrs. Kinney, wrote to our President.

Our pledge for the Advance Work Program which is to take the form of Land and Central Buildings for Osaka, Japan, is almost completed. More will be said about this later on.

In October the news was broken to us that we were to lose our C. P. C. Director from the Diocese. It certainly was a blow, for we had come to lean much on Miss Quiliard for ideas and advice and we shall miss her very much. The Board gave a luncheon for her at Mrs. Constable's and the gift of a Prayer Book and Hymnal helped to show her how much we loved her. As it proved, it was the last time any of us saw dear Mrs. Jamar, who did so enjoy being with us. On the 17th of November she passed suddenly into the rest of Paradise leaving an invalid husband who did not long tarry here without her. A happy personality has gone from us and she will live long in our memories.

In November, too, we again drew heavily upon the Parshall Memorial Fund for there were large bills for repairs on the Chapel and Dining Hall at Cass Lake which must be paid and we also borrowed the necessary \$200 to meet the debts incurred in our Auxiliary work.

The Auxiliary has given Bishop Bennett this past year the sum of \$1527.55. \$88.00 of this sum was the evening offering voted him by Resolution at the last meeting, the balance was from the Parshall Memorial Fund. \$642.00 of this is secured by a note.

December, as is usual, was spent gathering up the loose ends and sending out Report Blanks and the rest of the Year Books to every Diocese throughout the world. We have already received several letters complimenting us on our Year Book.

January brought the sad news that Mrs. Neide had been called home. She was a devoted Church woman and we have sorrowed with our friends here in St. Cloud who will miss her sorely. She was a woman of rare charm and it was a deep pleasure to call her "friend."

There are several things for delegates to bear in mind during this session, viz:

First—That while our bills are paid, we owe the Parshall Memorial Fund \$200 at 6% interest and at least a portion of this loan should be returned this year.

Second—That the pledge for the Advance Work Program must be completed this year before the Triennial.

Third—That the sum pledged for the Moulded Stone for the Cathedral at Washington must also be completed at once and paid.

Fourth—That it is the year of the Triennial and every effort must be made by each one to bring our United Thank Offering up to its usual standard.

Fifth—That if it is still the opinion of the delegates that the Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer is entitled to \$300.00 a year in salary (which by the way she very much doubts), a way must be found to secure the additional \$180 necessary to cover this item. It is with great appreciation, she acknowledges the thoughtfulness which prompted the motion passed last year, but if it is necessary each year to borrow, it would be much better to relinquish the increase.

And so the record of another year is done. God grant that as we turn the pages of a new year of work, we shall grow more and more in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

REPORTS OF THE STANDING COMMITTEES

The Report of the Diocesan Store Room

In view of the fact that the past year has been a hard one, the women of the Diocese have been most generous in responding to the appeals from "The Store Room" and we want to thank you for your support and co-operation.

During the year many boxes have been sent IN and OUT of the Diocese. Our Lenten Box to The Phoebe Ann Community House at Halifax, Virginia was valued at \$195.39. Miss Hankins, who is the head of the Mission, in her letters expressed untold gratitude and appreciation for all we sent her. The two Personal Boxes were sent in December, one by the Woman's Auxiliary of St. Paul's Church, Duluth, to the Rev. Nelson Elsworth of Jamestown, North Dakota and was valued at \$235.31. The Diocesan Box, valued at \$140.28 went to the Rev. Daniel Johnson, Jr., of Springfield, Illinois. Contributions to this Box came from almost every Parish in the Diocese which was gratifying to the Committee and showed a fine spirit. Both Personal Boxes contained an excellent quality of new clothing. Many little personal gifts were tucked in here and there and delectable, little Christmas cakes and plum puddings, which brought much joy to the recipients. In acknowledging the Diocesan Box, Mr. Johnson said: "We shall long remember the Woman's Auxiliary of your Diocese and ask God's blessing on your work."

The Mission Box to Miss Geffroy's School at Beaufort, North Carolina, was valued at \$123.59. Three large cartons of new and second hand clothing helped fill a very great and serious need. Miss Geffroy said, when they arrived, "That another fear had vanished and my children had a Happy Christmas."

Our former Church Periodical Club Director, Miss Quilliard, before leaving for her new home in New York City, sent a contribution of clothing for this Mission for which we were most grateful. It was valued at \$15.00.

The two Joy Boxes, each valued at \$5.00, were

sent, one to Miss Phellis of Honolulu by St. Cecelia's Guild of Trinity Cathedral, the other to Deaconess Shepherd of Dansville, New York, by the Ryan Memorial Circle of St. Paul's, Duluth.

The total value of the Boxes sent outside the Diocese amounted to \$704.61. This does not include a valuation of the second hand clothing sent to the Missions outside the Diocese, as Mrs. Wade requested no value be placed on them. However, when sending second hand clothing WITHIN the Diocese, please be sure and place a value on it and send your report to the Supply Secretary. This is very necessary, as we must keep track of all second hand clothing. Also, once again, I urge you to place the value on all new clothing sent in for the Box Work. We are greatly indebted to those who have been so kind in sending such generous donations of clothing for the Indian Field, the value of which was \$485.71. We sent into the Indian Field new clothing to the value of \$46.97.

The Executive Board of the Diocese had the pleasure of sending Christmas Boxes to Miss Colby, Deaconess Mitchell and Mrs. Ellis. These were valued at \$25.00.

In closing, I want to tell you of the fine work our President, Mrs. Fitzsimmons, and some members of her family are doing for the Box Work. Mrs. Fitzsimmons prepares and sends the material for the lovely patch work quilts which are made in the Indian Field. She selects the designs and fabrics, using the best of two materials and the samples which are sent her. These she arranges for each quilt which are done up and sent to each Mission in the Indian Field all ready to be made up. In the past few months ten of these quilts have been sent. Many of these quilts Mrs. Fitzsimmons sells for the Indian Auxiliaries and the sum is credited as their contribution to the Parshall Memorial Fund. This winter one of the Duluth Merchants sent Mrs. Fitzsimmons two cartons of large samples of heavy overcoat materials. These to be made into comforters and were neatly packed and sent into the Indian Field. Mrs. Fitzsimmons has been doing this work for many years, as some of you know and I am sure the women

of the Indian Field, as well as ourselves, are most grateful to her and her helpers.

For our Lenten work, we will finish the allotment Mrs. Wade sent for the Mission at Beaufort, North Carolina. She recently asked us to take some extra work for another mission but the Board will decide about this after the Annual Meeting.

PARSHALL MEMORIAL FUND

1930

In the attached financial statement of the Parshall Memorial Fund you will note we had a very satisfactory year in view of the present conditions existing in the business world. However, we did not raise our entire pledge of \$1,000. Owing to circumstances beyond their control some of the Auxiliaries have not and will not be able to meet their quotas, but it is gratifying to learn some of these quotas will be completed for 1930.

The main points of interest in connection with our income for the year 1930 are: first, \$689.50 received under the yearly budget; \$57.15, from the sale of quilts made by the Indian Auxiliary members; \$26.12, interest, making a total of \$822.77, which, added to our splendid balance of \$1845.13 with which we began the year, makes a grand total of \$2667.90.

Our interest in the Parshall Memorial Fund is to assist our Bishop Bennett in his work in the Indian Field, and 1930 has been a year when he needed our financial assistance.

The principal expenditures were \$642.00 to the Bishop's Educational Fund, to assist students studying for the ministry, \$500.00 on a note given in payment for property located in Cass Lake, which the Bishop hopes to use later for an Indian orphanage; \$297.55 for repairs on Dining Hall and Chapel at the Indian Mission. There was also loaned the General Fund of the Auxiliary \$200.00 at 6%. The total of these expenditures is \$1639.55, leaving a balance of \$1028.35 in our Fund with which to begin 1931.

In order that we may have a satisfactory working capital, it is essential that each quota be sent in as promptly as possible, and I wish to take this opportunity as chairman of this Fund, to thank all of the Auxiliaries or Guilds, especially the Indian women, for their co-operation and interest.

As Chairman of the Advance Work for the Auxiliary of the Diocese, I urge you to use all your influence towards helping raise the required amount. As our pledge is almost complete, we having \$480.16 on hand, it is not money the members of the Auxiliary are asked to give this year so much as it is their prayers and help in arousing interest in this most important work. The Diocese has \$2500 to raise and I feel very confident that if we women will put our hearts and minds into this work and use every opportunity to tell about it, so that every person in the church hears about the Advance Work Program and our share in it, there will be no trouble in raising the required amount.

REPORT OF THE RURAL WORK

During the Annual Meeting of 1930, one of the delegates asked me to try and get a Sunday School started at Little Marais on the North Shore and I offered to send material or help in any way I could but received no answer. I have since learned that a Methodist Sunday School Missionary is in the field.

One of our Rural members was confirmed at the Cathedral in March.

Two new families were reached, one with three children, the other with two. Letters were written and the Home Quarterly sent them. Renewals of the Quarterly were sent to seven other families.

At the request of the Guild at Two Harbors, I went there and led in a meeting on Ash Wednesday.

Miss Quilliard and Mrs. Biller were appointed on Ways and Means Committee with me. We had one hundred copies of Prayers from the Sanctuary of Prayers from the Spirit of Missions typed and sent to all rural families, auxiliaries and guilds for use on Rogation Days or meetings nearest them.

At the Mississippi Valley Deanery Meeting, held in St. Cloud, July 11, 1930, the program was on the work for the Isolated.

In October, Mrs. Biller, Mrs. Lindstrom and I met with the Bishop Coadjutor elect to talk over the plans for the Rural Work. Since then little has been done, but we hope, when Bishop Kemerer gets his work lined up, more may be accomplished.

Mrs. Biller reported a service being held at Clear Lake with about thirty five out. Also a baptism of several in one family.

The proceeds for last year are these: \$9.60 from sale of articles at the last convention and \$15.67 from the sale of broken pieces of old gold and silver, making a total of \$25.27.

"Co-operation Produces Cheer"

This report is not as complete as it should be as far as the report outside of the Duluth work is concerned owing to the resignation of Miss Quilliard as Director of the Diocese in November. At present there is no Director for the work.

There are four active branches in the Diocese: Duluth, Virginia, St. Cloud and Hibbing.

Virginia and St. Cloud sent magazines to Crane Lake in November and St. Cloud sent in scrap books during that month. In the year just closed the Diocese sent out five hundred Prayer Leaflets, fifteen hundred Handshakes (Lenten Folders) for Holy Week and two thousand new Christmas cards. We also sent \$15.00 to headquarters.

The work of the Church Periodical Club is such a beautiful mixture of Social Service Work, Rural Work, Christian Uplift and everything else that is kind and helpful, it is hard to define. "To do good and to distribute" seems to be the watchword. We might add, also, "forget not." The things to be distributed may vary from smiles and cheer and friendly visits to good advice and text books, as well as popular magazines. One learns to see possibilities in almost anything. During the last year, the linings of envelopes turned into paper dolls and place cards were sold and the money used to buy tiny Gospels to be given out, bits of ribbon from old Christmas cards being used for book marks. Nothing is ever lost in the C. P. C. work.

The work in the city of Duluth brings to a close another very successful year due to the unfailing enthusiasm and work of Miss Quilliard and her able Assistants. Mrs. Butcher and Mrs. Alexander did not take charge until November.

Owing to the rapid growth of the work, it was found advisable to divide it into sections with a head and one or more assistants for each department.

Through the kindness of one of our church women a subscription to the Spirit of Missions is sent to one of the women and she writes that when she is tired at night she just loves to lie down and read "her beloved Spirit

of Missions."

Books have been sent to Rev. Frank Persons, at La Gloria, Cuba, to the Bishop Tuttle School at Raleigh, North Carolina and to Bishop Denby at Little Rock, Arkansas. These were books that were especially needed in their varied work and the C. P. C. was able to send them through the kindness of Miss Quilliard and were much appreciated.

The C. P. C. is also a grand school of economy. The work in Duluth has no definite source of income and depends, entirely, on voluntary gifts, so every little thing takes on added value, a piece of string is no longer just a piece of string, but means a bundle tied for delivery, and five cents seems a small fortune when you think of it as 2 - two cent stamps and one cent over.

Best of all are the return postals received, so full of gratitude and appreciation. Here are a few extracts: "Thanks so much for the magazines, it is good to know someone is thinking about you." "Thanks for the papers, we pass them around to the settlers, Indians, trappers, and I am sure they give more pleasure after reaching us than before." A man writes that his wife is in the hospital at Grand Rapids and knows we will be interested, so a nice, long letter was sent to her and the Rector asked to go and see her. Another man writes: "Thanks so much for the magazines. If it were not for the C. P. C., we should have no reading matter here at all. What a wonderful institution the Episcopal Church is."

In the Duluth work, a double postal is sent out with each package, so our people are heard from each month and in a short time one feels rather responsible for them. Personally the Secretaries feel as if they had suddenly acquired a large family.

The receipts for the year were \$161.03, the expenses were \$151.72 leaving a balance of \$9.31.

The income is derived from gifts from the Auxiliary branches, Guilds, and private gifts and from the sale of old papers, Christmas tags, etc.

THE CHURCH SCHOOL SERVICE PROGRAM

The Church School Service Program includes the service and money offerings of the children from their birth until they leave the Church School. In our diocese there are two departments—The Little Helpers and the Church School proper; but in some localities there is a third, known as the Home Department. The work is in the Five Fields of Service. The money offerings are the Lenten Offering, the Little Helpers' Offering, the Birthday Thank Offering, and the Christmas Box Work.

The Christmas Box Work Chairman is Mrs. Thomas Watts, 914 Woodland Avenue, Duluth, who for many years has relieved me of all the responsibility connected with the Box Work. There are two assignments to Box Work, one to Domestic Missions and one to Foreign Missions and it requires much faithful letter writing and planning to take care of this work and Mrs. Watts deserves much praise.

The Lenten Offering for the past year amounted to \$1,421.44. The Birthday Thank Offering goes to furnish a Children's Ward in St. Luke's Hospital, Tokyo. This offering in 1930 was \$78.53, a gain of \$22.45 over 1929. What will it be in 1931?

Mrs. W. Bryant Richards of St. Cloud is the Little Helpers Chairman for the Diocese and I am sure her splendid report was much enjoyed.
