It was a year of stress and sacrifice but one of real spiritual growth in the Diocese and the fact that even in those hard times, we completed our pledge for the Advance Work item was a source of great satisfaction.

I gave you as the watch word for 1933—"Power" and I quote the closing portion of my address, which is as applicable to-day as it was when it was written. "The National Council used this sentence from our Lord's own words during the Every Member Canvass, 'Ye shall be given Power from on High', and O, what that Power can do, if rightly used. If we remember that Jesus passed over to us both His work and His way of working; that His is the wisdom, the purpose and the power', what can we not accomplish?

*We kneel so weak!
We rise so full of power
Why therefore should we do ourselves the wrong
Or others that we are not always strong?*

'God's power is MY POWER to the limit of my capacity of tapping it, that is knowledge; of appropriating it, that is faith; and using it, that is every day living.' "

MINUTES OF THE THIRTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL MEETING

JANUARY 23, 24, AND 25, 1933

The Annual Convention of our Diocese opened in the lovely new Church of St. Paul's, Brainerd, Monday evening, January 23rd, 1933 with an address by Bishop Bartlett of North Dakota, who was the guest speaker of this Convention. The Bishop spoke of conditions in the World to-day and the great responsibility resting on our Church and its members to bring about "a better day".

On Tuesday, all the delegates gathered in St. Paul's for the Corporate Communion and Bishop Kemerer's address. The Bishop gave a splendid address. Every part of the Diocese was mentioned, the journeys, visitations, improvements, meetings and progress were all taken into account by the Bishop and everyone who heard this address felt better informed about the Diocese than ever before.

At this time, also, Bishop Bennett's resignation was read to the Delegates.

After the morning service, the Woman's Auxiliary delegates adjourned to the Baptist Church across the street, where our meetings were to be held. The meeting opened with the Hymn, "Fling Out The Banner", after which, Mrs. Wanless, the Second Vice-President read the opening prayers and presided during our sessions.

After the Roll Call for both the Indian and White Fields, the new Deanery lines being used for the latter for the first time, Mrs. Kempton read the minutes of the 1932 meeting, which were followed by the Reports of the Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer, Mrs. Randall. These reports were accepted. Then followed the report of the Board Meetings for the year, read by the Recording Secretary after which Mrs. Wanless appointed the following committees:

Auditing Committee: Mrs. Halverson, St. Cloud; Mrs. Wilhelmi and Mrs. Catherall of Duluth.

Committee on Resolutions: Mrs. Frazier of Duluth,
Mrs. Lewis of St. Cloud and Mrs. Hanson of Sauk Centre.
Mrs. Taylor was appointed Time Keeper.

Mrs. David Thornberry of Virginia read the Noon Day Prayers.

It was voted to send Mrs. Fitzsimmons, our President and Mrs. Green, our First Vice-President, telegrams expressing our regret at their absence on account of illness.

It was then time for adjournment for Registration and luncheon which was served in St. Paul's Guild Hall.

Immediately after the afternoon session was called to order, Bishop Bartlett told us about the Rural Work and Work among the isolated in his Diocese of North Dakota. The Bishop spoke of the breaking down of other churches due to lack of funds. "This meant an enlarged work for our Church", said the Bishop and through the efforts of Miss Ally, a U. T. O. worker, five hundred children had been added to the Church School list and Bishop Bartlett felt that in reaching the isolated through the Correspondence method a great deal more had been accomplished in 1932 than ever before in his rural field. After the Bishop's talk, a short conference followed which we felt was a great advantage to us, as in our Diocese, we too, have much rural work and isolated territory to reach.

Mrs. David Thornberry gave the next talk on "Faith". It was a fine spiritual message and one we will not forget. "At Thy Word, I Will", was her parting message. A fitting close for her talk and an open door for us. Many commented on this talk of Mrs. Thornberry's and we know it is going to be a real joy to have her in the Diocese.

Mrs. LeQuesne in her report of the United Thank Offering, felt we should rejoice in the fact that our beloved Blue Box Fund is growing in these very discouraging times. She has \$559.90. "A Christian is a mind through which Christ works", she said in closing her report.

Mrs. Lindstrom, our Educational Secretary, not being present her report was read. She said that the two study books on China and The American Indian had been sent to every Auxiliary Branch in the Duluth Diocese together with the Leader's Manual for the Book on China. She urged all parishes to take advantage of Mrs. Frazier's kind offer to go about and speak on The American Indian. She said that the Study Book on China could be easily mastered with the aid of the Leader's Manual. She also mentioned the Book, which the Brotherhood of St. Andrew is asking the help of the women of the Church, in putting before the members of the Church. It is called "Knowing The Christ". She also spoke of the bulletins sent out by the Auxiliary from time to time and said they were of vital importance to every woman in the church now that we had no Diocesan Paper. Mrs. Lindstrom closed with these words: "Christian Religious Education is fundamental to our life and should take its place as a basic part of our worship of Almighty God."

Mrs. Thomas Wood gave her report of the work done in the Supply Department. It was a very good year and she thanked all of us for our cooperation and asked that any second hand clothing which could be spared be sent to her, as the calls were many.

The report of the Rural Work sent in by Mrs. Kenneth Smith was read by Mrs. Ralph Moore. Mrs. Smith said she was glad to report that the work was not going behind.

Mrs. Bugbee, C. P. C. Director, reported more local work done the past year in each parish to save postage and other expenses. She hoped for more co-operation between the C. P. C. and the Rural Work; urged that the men might work with the women in this field and also urged that the work be carried on through the Deaneries. Altogether this was a very good C. P. C. report.

Mrs. Wilhelmi, Chairman of the Gold and Silver Offering, reported that this department was the only one standing still. It was hoped that the department would be more active by next convention. Please send in gold, silver or

jewels or some little trinket to start this fine work again. It certainly has been in the past an interesting and lucrative effort. We do not want it to die out of our Diocesan life.

Mrs. Randall read the final report of the Advanced Work which showed that in June 1932 we completed our pledge of \$800 by forwarding to the National Council the balance due of \$300 and thereby placed the Diocese of Duluth on the list of Dioceses where the advance work item was taken care of entirely by the Auxiliary. She also read the letter received from the Director of the Advance Work thanking the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese for the completion of this pledge.

Mrs. Wanless, Chairman of the Committee Towards Provisioning the Summer School, reported that in all a total of \$63.50 in cash and supplies were sent to Cass Lake.

Mrs. Randall reead Mrs. Green's report of the Personal Box Work and Mrs. Green was very much pleased at the response from the Diocese for the Box work for 1932.

The World Wide Day of Prayer was announced and the support of the Episcopal Church in our Diocese was pledged.

Mrs. Wanless then read the President's Address. We rose as the names of the Faithful ones who have gone on to a fuller life were read. A new watch word for 1933 "Power" was given to us by our President, who told us very lovingly that "God's Power is our Power". Let us strive to use this power in the years ahead of us.

Mrs. Biller gave the report of the St. Cloud Deanery which was a fine report and the kind we always have from Mrs. Biller.

As it was almost time for adjournment, Mrs. Gemmell of Brainerd invited us to visit the Court House and see exhibits there of the Historical Society dealing with the history of Church and State which would be of great interest to us. A good many of the delegates availed themselves of this invitation while others went to their rooms to rest after a very busy day.

A banquet was served in St. Paul's Guild Hall at 6:30 where Bishop Bartlett, Bishop Kemerer and Dr. Johnson of Minneapolis gave splendid addresses. In summing up, each speaker spoke of the seriousness of the times. They each seemed to feel that we needed our Faith as never before. Divine Leadership should be our only leadership. Men may fail us but God never will. Dr. Johnson made an earnest plea for getting the men into church work and it seemed that they felt the more joint sessions the better.

The Wednesday morning business session was opened with the Hymn, "My Faith Looks Up To Thee" and Mrs. Wanless read the U. T. O. Prayer, and then called on Mrs. Catherall for her report of the Church School Service League. The Box Work of the children of the Diocese showed that their foreign assignment was valued at \$40.00 plus the postage and their Domestic assignment was valued at \$156.50. Ten Sunday Schools contributed towards these assignments. The Lenten Offering was \$791.94 and the Birthday Offering \$33.91 which made a total of \$1,021.63 from the children of the Diocese for 1932.

There was no report from the Little Helpers.

The Report of the Parshall Memorial Fund was more of a financial statement as the Committee on the Status of the Fund were to make a full report. The balance was \$690.53 and showed that the Diocese had paid back on the loan from this fund \$85.30. The Chairman stated that it was expected that the balance of the loan to the Diocese would be paid back during the next two years.

Mrs. Frazier then gave the Report of the Parshall Memorial Fund Committee and made the following recommendations which were accepted:

To lower the \$1000.00 to \$800.00, divided as follows:
To return to the original Parshall Memorial Fund of \$200.00
A General Fund for Indian Work..... 300.00
A Fund for Theological Education of a white man
to be known as the Bishop Morrison Fund..... 300.00

The Committee also presented the Resolution to continue the Committee during this Triennium which was carried.

Following this report, Mrs. Frazier gave a talk on The American Indian. She spoke of the change in Government plans for the Indians which meant she said, "They must depend on us. They must be dealt with in a purely Christian manner". This talk was interesting to both Indian and White delegates and was considered one of the best we have heard on this subject.

There was a lively discussion about getting our young people into interesting groups in Church work especially about interesting young girls and women in the Auxiliary work.

Mrs. Gemmell spoke of a very good book to use in young people's groups, "A Lantern For Young People". Mrs. Lewis of St. Cloud spoke of sending out cards to keep track of our confirmed young people.

Mrs. Randall urged all Parish branches to report the names of new officers whenever there was any change. It makes the detail work of the Diocese much easier if such information is reported to the Secretary-Treasurer.

Mrs. Potts brought the greetings from the Bemidji Deanery and read a letter of thanks sent to the children from Christobal. There were no reports from the Duluth Deanery nor from the Deanery of Hinckley.

Mrs. Frazier read the Resolutions as prepared by that Committee. Each one was voted on and all were accepted.

Mrs. Wanless spoke of the resignation of Bishop Bennett and Mrs. Lewis of St. Cloud moved that a telegram be sent him. Carried. Mrs. Wanless and Mrs. Lewis were to see to sending the wire.

Mrs. Kempton reported several of the Indian Quilts which had been on exhibition had been sold during the meeting.

The Auditing Committee through Mrs. Halvorsen reported that the Books were found to be correct.

Reports from the Indian Field were next in order. Mrs. Waukazoo made a report for Naytahwaush. She had many and varied duties in her field and was carrying a heavy load with sorrow, sickness, and death as an added burden. She was trying to do Missionary work and had prepared six for confirmation. We all were much interested in Mrs. Waukazoo's report and felt honored to have her with us.

Mrs. Nelson reported for St. Peter's, Cass Lake. Mrs. Nelson asked for help in her Bible Class. Any lesson leaflets or literature for Sunday-school work would be appreciated, also pieces, old silk stockings and silk underwear to be used in making rugs would be most acceptable.

Mrs. Nordall reported for St. John's Mission at Red Lake. She also would like literature for Auxiliary work or any help for Indian Branches. Mrs. Robert Hallock was the President and Mrs. English, who had been President for a number of years is now blind. Mrs. Paine of Duluth, promised to send some needed literature to Mrs. Nordall. After a general discussion of Indian Work, the reports from the Branches in the White Field were heard. Mrs. Wanless reported for St. Paul's, Duluth; Mrs. LeQuesne for Trinity Cathedral; Mrs. Lehman for St. Mark's, Grand Rapids; Mrs. Mertens reported for International Falls and Mrs. Murphy spoke of her visit there and the splendid work they were doing. Mrs. Thornberry spoke on her visit to Eagle Bend which she enjoyed so much and where the people under their good Rector are getting along in such a fine manner. Mrs. Brandon made the report for Brainerd.

As it was noon, Rev. Mr. Kempton of Sauk Centre came in to receive the offering, which had been taken up by two of our Indian Sisters, Mrs. Manypenny and Mrs. Parker, and to say the Noon Day Prayers, having a special prayer for all the forlorn unfortunates in these depressing times.

The Parish reports were then resumed and Mrs. Hanson gave the report for Sauk Centre who especially rejoiced in

their Quiet Day and its good results. Mrs. Murphy reported for St. Helen's, Wadena, and Mrs. Burns for Eagle Bend. Mrs. Randall reported that she had heard from all parishes not represented at the Annual Meeting with the exception of two.

It was announced that the Woman's Offering was \$6.93 and would be applied toward the Bishop's Diocesan Pledge and the offering at the service on Tuesday morning was \$23.88, making a total of \$30.81. The morning offering was to be used for Central Expense.

There being no further business to come before the Meeting, Mrs. Brandon closed the Thirty-seventh Annual Meeting with the Benediction.

Luncheon was served in one of the restaurants and then those of us who did not have to leave went to St. Paul's Church for the Joint Session. Bishop Kemerer welcomed the Woman's Auxiliary to this Session and asked Mrs. Wanless representing Mrs. Fitzsimmons, the President, to occupy a seat on the platform.

Bishop Kemerer first spoke of the necessity for work among the young people, "When one thinks of the long list of names read at the opening service of those who have gone on, the young people must be trained to take their places in the life of the Church."

Mrs. Halvorson of St. Cloud made a splendid address on "The Young People's Fellowship," giving an outline of their program as worship, study, fellowship and service and asked for a representation at the Diocesan Convention of the Young People's Fellowship, the same as clergy, laity, and Auxiliary members. The clergy were asked if they were working as hard for the Y. P. F. as they were for the right side of their envelopes. No child born since 1914 has lived a normal life. We must have sympathy and understanding and a sense of humor in order to work with them. Mrs. Halvorson made the leadership of a Young People's Fellowship seem like a thrilling adventure. She said the Young

People of St. Cloud conduct their own services with a great deal of dignity.

Bishop Kemerer pointed out the tremendous importance of this work that these young people might keep their vision and contact with the Church.

The Bishop then spoke of the Missionary Work in the Diocese and the measures taken to keep it open. Mr. Lyder read the plan submitted to the Convention for this emergency year which provided a cut of 10 per cent over last year's salaries to make up for the latest cut in the money received from the National Council.

Our clergy have been very loyal, and agreed to a man, to go on in spite of the cut. As the permanent Trust Funds of the Diocese have dwindled, it also involved a sharp cut for the Bishop, who joined the clergy in the sacrifice. Bishop Kemerer said in closing, "It might be a hard year but we could make it a wonderful year of growth in numbers and spirituality. He reminded us that religion was caught by contagion. "Let us go on with our shoulders back and go on in hope."

A tea served in the Guild Hall by the Ladies of St. Paul's closed the convention.

We are starting a new year and better times are coming. Let us realize that if God is not a Reality in our lives, He can never be a Reality to another through us. The Kingdom of God will come. Let us hasten to have a share in it.

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REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON STATUS OF PARSHALL MEMORIAL FUND

At the January 1932 Convention a committee was appointed to determine the future status of the Parshall Memorial Fund and its use.

The committee met with Bishop Bennett in Duluth in June 1932, when he explained that all the money he had borrowed from the Parshall Memorial Fund had been used on the Cass Lake property laying foundations for the future work there. It was all primarily for education. He stated at the time that there were no Indian men who, in his judgment were capable or worthy of being educated for the ministry.

At a Board meeting in June, 1932 it was voted to cancel the notes held by the W. A. Board and they were duly returned to Bishop Bennett.

In January, 1933 the chairman of this committee had a letter from Bishop Bennett in which he stated, "I have written Bishop Kemerer asking him to take care of the Indian field, so any matters of policy which arise in the W. A. regarding that work, you can talk over with him."

Bishop Kemerer appeared before the W. A. Board on January 11, 1933 when he stated that he had only one possibility to educate this year for work in the Indian field. After careful discussion it was voted to do the following for the coming year of 1933:

To lower the \$1000 to \$800, divided as follows:

To return to the original Parshall Memorial

Fund	\$200
A general fund for Indian Work	300
A fund for theological education of white men (to be known as The Bishop Mor- rison Fund)	300

The committee presents the following resolution:

BE IT RESOLVED, that this committee be continued for the two remaining years of this triennium for further study of the Parshall Memorial Fund and its future status.

FOREWORD FOR 1933

Some of the facts gleaned from the reports not published but on file, follow:

There were ten families receiving the "Quarterly" in the Rural Field during the year.

The Religious Educational Secretary, Mrs. Lindstrom, reported the Study Books sent out as usual but regretted very much that so few Parishes had Mrs. Frazier come to talk to them on "The American Indian." "Christ and the Modern World" with the source book "The Never Failing Light," was to be the Study Book for 1934. She urged a careful study of them that we might "realize that only sacrificial thought and consecrated service will build a better world."

The Supply Department worked overtime and while the demands for good second-hand clothing were many, we were able to meet most of them—thanks to the co-operation of the Auxiliary women.

Our Boxes were splendid and everyone contributed to them which is a record, I believe, for the Diocese.

There was much Christian Social Service work done in the Diocese during 1933 and the City of Duluth branch of C. P. C. did a wonderful work, sending out 5,765 magazines, 3,429 papers and many Christmas cards to hospitals and institutions.

The Indian Convocation was the largest held in many years and it was a real disappointment that there was no member of the Board able to be present. From the reports coming in from the Indian Field I am satisfied that there is great interest being shown in the Auxiliary work.

I gave you "Confidence" as a Watch Word for 1934. "We have had Vision to Go Forward and Power given us to help us accomplish our work. Now, let us remember as Isaiah says, "In confidence and quietness shall be our strength.

MINUTES OF THE THIRTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL MEETING

January 17 and 18, 1934

The Thirty-eighth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese really opened Tuesday evening with the ceremonies of Bishop Kemerer's installation as Bishop of the Diocese in Trinity Cathedral and our reception for Bishop and Mrs. Kemerer and the visiting Bishops in Trinity Cathedral Hall. A very large attendance of our people from all parts of the Diocese must have gladdened the Bishop's heart and it was a delightful way to open the convention and Annual Meeting.

The Corporate Communion of the delegates was on Wednesday morning at Trinity Cathedral at which time the Bishop gave his annual address, speaking of world conditions and then dealing with those of the Diocese. In a very real sense Bishop Kemerer depends upon his Woman's Auxiliary to help him in the Diocesan work and he paid us some very fine compliments in his address and offered suggestions which will be found embodied in Resolution I. of the Resolutions passed at our meeting.

Immediately after the service at the Cathedral, the Woman's Auxiliary opened their business meeting at St. Paul's Parish House, where all our meetings were held.

The opening hymn was "Christ for the World We Bring," and Mrs. C. V. Green, our first vice president, opened the meeting with the Auxiliary prayers and presided during the sessions, as Mrs. Fitzsimmons was too ill to be present.

After greetings from the chair, roll was called for both Indian and White Fields and a goodly number responded.

The minutes of the 1933 meeting were read by the Recording Secretary, followed by the reports of the Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer. These reports were accepted and the reports of the Board Meetings were then read.

Mrs. Thornberry of Virginia conducted the Noon-day
Prayers.

The first report given was that of the United Thank Offering Treasurer, Mrs. LeQuesne, whose reports while dealing with money, always seem more spiritual than material in their emphasis. She also spoke of the Spirit of Missions and the plan to increase its circulation.

A motion was made at this time by Mrs. Wakeman, of Duluth, to send a message of greeting to our President, Mrs. Fitzsimmons, whom we knew was with us in spirit.

The next report was from the Chairman of the Parshall Memorial Fund, Mrs. Constable, followed by the report of the Educational Secretary, Mrs. Lindstrom and by the report of the Supply Secretary, Mrs. Wood. These reports were accepted and all showed a healthy growth in the departments.

Mrs. Wood read some very interesting letters which came to her department and thanked the Deanery Managers for their fine co-operation.

A letter was read from a Mrs. Porter in the Indian Field asking for help for a poor Indian mother who was expecting a little one. Much sympathy was aroused and the delegates from Virginia promised a Layette. Mrs. McGiffert, officer of the Red Cross, said she would send things to the mother and other child.

Mrs. Kenneth Smith reported on the rural work and spoke of her work with Mr. Hallett, chairman of rural work in the Diocese and of prayer cards sent out. She told of one woman who loves the Quarterly and her joy in a Church that carries good tidings to rural people.

Mrs. Wilhelmi, chairman of the Gold and Silver Offering, reported a department as bare as Mother Hubbard's cupboard and asked that we all remember to send her any old gold or silver, beads, etc. This has been such an interesting department, it must not die out.

Miss Amy Flinn gave the report of the Church Periodical Club Work done in the City of Duluth and after the report of Mrs. Wanless on provisioning the Summer School, the meeting adjourned for luncheon served at St. Paul's.

At two o'clock the meeting opened in St. Paul's Chapel with Bishop Spencer, our convention guest, speaking to us on "The Comfortable Words." It was one of the best addresses we have ever had and I am sure every member of the Auxiliary will not forget Bishop Spencer and his fine spiritual message.

Mrs. Catherall made the first report for the afternoon on the Church School Service League. She reported \$69.00 in the treasury. Mrs. Percy Hansen of Sauk Centre was to assist in this work. A very good report was sent in on the Box Work by Mrs. Watts and Rev. Mr. Hedelund sent in a fine report on the Birthday Offering.

Deanery Reports were then called for: Bemidji Deanery made no formal report but the Parishes had all contributed to the work during the year.

Hinckley reported very good co-operation and had helped as much as they could in the work.

Mrs. E. A. Brown reported for the Moorhead Deanery which was an excellent report.

Mrs. E. C. Biller reported for St. Cloud Deanery which was very good.

Mrs. Green appointed a committee on revising the Constitution to consist of:

Mrs. McKilligan of Hibbing.

Mrs. Long gave the report for St. Peter's Cass Lake in the Indian Field. She also spoke about Mrs. Manypenny, whom we all missed at this meeting. She entered into a fuller life last October.

At this time Mrs. Green read the president's address. A fine address as usual. Our president, although very ill the past year, still managed to take care of every part of the work in this large and scattered Diocese.

All stood as the names of those departed during the year were read. The president requested that a committee be appointed at this meeting to discuss and plan for a memorial for Mrs. Manypenny, who has been a member of this Diocese for so many years. Mrs. William Constable was appointed chairman with Mrs. Huntley of Grand Rapids and Mrs. Schumacher of St. Cloud as the other members of the committee.

Mrs. Hobbs reported for the Auditing Committee that the books were found to be correct.

Parish Reports were the next business. Mrs. Randall reported for Warroad that all obligations were paid.

Mrs. Wolner gave the report for Cloquet. Mrs. Schumacher gave the report for St. Cloud and Mrs. Rudolph Hansen gave the report for Sauk Centre.

A discussion of the Bishop Tyler Memorial followed these reports.

Mrs. Frazier, as Chairman on Status of Parshall Memorial Fund, reported that the committee recommended that the present division of the fund be continued for another year.

The meeting adjourned until Thursday morning.

The Convention Banquet was held on Wednesday evening in Trinity Cathedral Hall for all members and guests of the convention and with the guest of the convention, Bishop Spencer, as the principal speaker. It was an outstanding meeting, both in attendance and interest.

"Christ Is Made the Sure Foundation," opened our meeting in St. Paul's Chapel Thursday morning at ten o'clock. The Auxiliary and United Thank Offering prayers were said and then Mrs. Green asked that the corresponding secretary read Miss Lindley's letter on the Triennial to be held in Atlantic City in October.

Mrs. Wakeman, manager of the Duluth Deanery, gave her report which showed that the parishes in her Deanery had done good service during the year.

Parish reports were then continued and Mrs. Lindstrom reported for St. Peter's and Holy Apostles. Much hardship and no work has made it very hard for the western part of our city.

Mrs. LeQuesne reported for Trinity Cathedral Auxiliary and for the Day of Prayer. The Auxiliary of the Cathedral met their budget and did a great deal of relief work. 179 Red Cross articles were turned in.

Mrs. Huntley of Grand Rapids reported their parish as "going ahead." They meet with Coleraine now and then, which tends to bring the two parishes nearer together.

Mrs. Wanless reported for St. Paul's Auxiliary. Many activities were carried on during the year. Sixty-nine comforters were made for the Red Cross and Indian work. They also did a good deal of Study work during the year.

Christ Church, Proctor, reported that the young people have done much to help in every way.

Holy Trinity, International Falls, reported that they had studied two books, China and the American Indian. They have only eighteen members.

The nominating committee, through its chairman, Mrs. Johnson, made its report. The committee recommended that each delegate be given \$60.00 towards their expenses to the Triennial Meeting, which was adopted.

Parish Reports were then resumed. Mrs. Thornberry made the report for St. Paul's, Virginia. The 14 members do Auxiliary work entirely and St. Paul's were to be in charge of the World Day of Prayer that year.

It was voted to send a letter of greeting to Mrs. F. W. Paine at this time.

Mrs. Constable reported on the Memorial for Mrs. Manypenny and said that after talking with her committee and the Rev. Mr. Sherman of Cass Lake they thought a Communion Service as a permanent memorial would be appropriate. It was voted that the memorial should consist of the Chalice and Patten and be given to St. Peter's Church at Cass Lake. This fund was to be outside the budget and from the whole Diocese in the White Field. We cannot help but feel that Mrs. Manypenny would have loved to be remembered in this way.

Mrs. Thornberry, chairman of the Resolution Committee, read the resolutions which were voted upon separately and which are printed in the Year Book.

Bishop Kemerer came to our meeting at this time to speak to us about his recent visit to the Niobrara Convocation in South Dakota.

A very different field from our own Indian Work. These Indians live more the old tribal life; use the old type of dress and old customs. It was all most interesting. Mr. and Mrs. Frazier, who had worked in this field, told many anecdotes and we would all love to wear a cross such as Mrs. Frazier wears, which she received while in that field.

The morning offering was taken up by Mrs. Long, our Indian Sister, this offering is always taken up by our Indian delegates. The offering for the two days amounted to \$20.85.

It was reported that two of the Indian Auxiliaries had paid their budget for 1934 in full.

It was moved, seconded and carried that a letter of information concerning the budget be sent out into the Diocese explaining the different funds and how they function.

After a general discussion by the meeting as a whole, many expressed their pleasure at being able to come and that they had learned so many things they had not known before.

The delegates from Eveleth expressed the hope that they could carry back, to those at home, the whole program of the year.

St. James Guild, Hibbing, sent in the following Resolution, with the request that it be made part of the Auxiliary Records of the Diocese:

"Be it Resolved that in memory of our beloved Past-President Agnes Hayden Barber, whose absence is keenly felt, we, the Guild of St. James, extend our sincere sympathy to her son and that this resolution be recorded in our minutes and in the records of the Woman's Auxiliary of Duluth."

"As My Father has sent me, even so send I you," says the Master and we have His assurance that we go not alone. His Holy Spirit goes with us in all life's tasks.

"O Watchman, what of the night?" and we clearly hear like the Prophet of Old, the answer. "The morning breaketh."
