## MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

The thirty-ninth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese opened in St. Paul's Parish House October 1, 1935, with a goodly number of delegates present. Due to a longer morning service we were somewhat late in starting our meeting.

After the opening hymn, "Jesus Calls Us", Mrs. Biller led us in the Noon Day Prayers.

At the request of the President, Mrs. Fitzsimmons, Mrs. Green the first Vice-President called the meeting to order and presided.

After the Roll Call for both White and Indian Fields, the Minutes of the last annual meeting were read by the Recording Secretary. The Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer gave her reports and the Recording Secretary read the report of the Board Meetings held during the year.

Mrs. Green then appointed the following Committees:

Auditing Committee—Mrs. Eales, Proctor; Mrs. A. L. Mertens, International Falls; Mrs. John D. Wiggins, St. Cloud.

Committee on Resolutions—Mrs. Walter Reetz, Paynesville; Mrs. J. H. Drake, International Falls; Mrs. R. R. Gould, Brainerd.

Nominating Committee—Mrs. F. W. Wilhelm, Duluth; Mrs. E. C. Biller, St. Cloud; Mrs. W. K. Boyle, Bemidji; Mrs. A. E. Eddy, Hinckley; Miss A. Braden, Detroit Lakes.

Adjournment was then taken for Registration and luncheon which was served in the dining room of St. Paul's Parish house.

On reconvening for the afternoon session, we were addressed by Dr. Block of St. Louis, Mo., a member of the Forward Movement Commission. Dr. Block's address was so stirring, so spiritual, that it is deeply regretted every woman in the diocese could not have heard it. "This is a day of confusion and a lack of knowledge. We must, through Religious Education, acquaint our people with the things of the Spirit" is one of the things Dr. Block said. We certainly hope he will come again. Bishop Maxim, whose place Dr. Block took, was called home by the critical illness of Bishop Gailor.

Mrs. D. D. Taber, who came to us from National Headquarters, and who was to be with us a month going about the Diocese, was our next Speaker. Mrs. Taber spoke to us "On Meeting the Needs of our Church Today". Mrs. Taber, a Field Secretary with a wide experience, felt that as a whole, we were stressing too much the material side. "We are too busy raising money, when we should be educating our women," said Mrs. Taber, "in the things of the Spirit." Her talk was most interesting, helpful and inspiring. The wonderful things done through the U. T. O. as related by Mrs. Taber should give us thankful hearts that we too have had a share in promoting the Kingdom in so many places through the little Blue Box.

Mrs. William Constable, Chairman of the Parshall Memorial Fund, made her report. It seems necessary each year to give a brief history of this Fund at the Annual Meeting. It was moved, seconded and carried to have a portion of this report and other information concerning the Parshall Memorial Fund put in the Duluth Churchman from time to time in order that the whole Diocese might become better informed about this Fund which is such a vital part of our work. Mrs. Constable also made her final report for the Committee on the Status of the Parshall Memorial Fund and the committee was discharged. She then gave the report on the Jane

Manypenny Memorial. The lovely Communion Service is all paid for and is a delight to Indian and White members alike. We know Mrs. Manypenny, who never missed an Annual Meeting, will be remembered through the years in a very beautiful way.

At this point, Mrs. E. C. Biller of St. Cloud, made a motion which was seconded and carried, that the next matter of business be the Report on the Revision of the Constitution because many of the delegates were leaving and would not be there the next day when the subject was scheduled to be taken up.

Mrs. Thornberry, Chairman, then presented the proposed Constitution to the delegates, article by article. The discussion of these was so prolonged that as the hour was growing late, it was decided to postpone further discussion until the next day, and the meeting adjourned.

The Wednesday morning session of the Woman's Auxiliary opened with the hymn, "My Faith Looks up to Thee" with Mrs. Wanless at the piano.

After the opening prayers were said, Mrs. Green read the President's address which was comprehensive and inspiring.

Mrs. LeQuesne, the United Thank Offering Treasurer, gave her report, in which she said the total for the Triennium from our Diocese was \$1202.82, and that we had \$175.68 on the offering for 1937. She urged us to try to interest every woman in the Diocese in the U. T. O. and stated that our Diocese was next the lowest in pro rata in our United Thank Offering.

Bishop Kemerer came in at this time to talk to us about the Parshall Memorial Fund. He spoke of the hard work and low salaries of the Indian clergy. "These men are consecrated workers and ministers to their people under very trying condi-

tions," said the Bishop. We have heard the call of the Mille Lac Field where in this large area of wild country these Pagan Indians are most anxious to have the gospel preached to them. This has come about through the death of a chief, who was opposed to Christianity, and who was able through his leadership to keep them Pagan while he lived. They want very much the services and ministry of our Church. The Bishop's load is a heavy one. The Nett Indians also need us. We must feel this tremendous responsibility and get behind the Bishop with our help, money and prayers. It is hard to burden our few Indian clergy, willing though they are, with this large task without a great deal of aid from all of us.

Mrs. Thomas Wood, Supply Secretary, gave her fine report of the Box Work done during the past year and a half. We are all very proud of this department. Mrs. Taber suggested excerpts from this report go into the Churchman when we can have the space.

Mrs. Wanless made the report as acting Secretary of Religious Education, reading first Mrs. Lindstrom's report as former Educational Secretary, and then her own report. Mrs. Wanless sent out the Study Books for the year and spoke of the splendid review of the Book, "Latin America", given by Mrs. Thornberry at the Interdenominational "School of Missions", held in the fall at the Y. W. C. A.

Mrs. Kenneth Smith made her report on the Rural Work. She sends out the Quarterly Magazine to a number of families and keeps in touch with them in various ways.

Mrs. Wilhelm is still hopeful of the Gold and Silver Offering, asking that we enlarge this department a bit and bring in odds and ends in the trinket line so that we can keep this work alive and make it pay for itself.

Mrs. Randall read the very fine report sent in by the Church Periodical Club doing work in the city of Duluth.

Mrs. Schumacher of St. Cloud, one of our Delegates to the Triennial, gave her report of the United Thank Offering Service held in Atlantic City. Mrs. Schumacher said it was a thrilling experience and one she would never forget. She gave a fine report and told us many things about this wonderful gathering.

The Recording Secretary, Mrs. Kempton, made her report on the Conference she attended at Brent House, which was held in May. These meetings are inspiring and helpful. One wishes all our members at one time or another could attend them. When you think of living for a few days with one hundred women who are of "one mind", you have to experience it to know the joy of it. Mrs. Biller, the Oriental Students, the fine conferences, the comfort of the House, the National Secretaries and the consecrated women make life very rich in the few days spent there. Let's have more Brent House Conferences, and more members going to Brent House.

At this point the Revising of the Constitution was brought forth for further discussion. There were fifteen parishes present to vote. Mrs. Bugbee made a motion to defer voting on the Revision until the next Annual Meeting. The motion was not carried.

Mrs. Vince made a motion that each section be discussed and then the Revision be voted on as a whole, but this motion was later withdrawn. According to the Constitution the vote was required to be made by Parishes. After a lengthy discussion which disclosed the fact that few were prepared to vote and as many seemed unable to understand some of the changes, Mrs. Fitzsimmons wished it to be tabled until another year when a better understand-

ing could be had, and after much discussion this was done. A motion was made and carried that a copy of the Proposed Revision of the Constitution be sent to each branch in the Diocese six months before the next Annual Meeting and that a careful study be made of it and the delegates come prepared to vote as instructed by their Parishes.

As it was time for Noon Day Prayers, they were said by Mrs. Taber and the collection was taken up by two of our Indian friends.

Mrs. Biller, a member of the Nominating Committee, then stated that it was the Bishop's request that the present officers hold over for one year and that the present Nominating Committee be continued for the same length of time. Mrs. Wilhelmi, the Chairman of the Nominating Committee, read the list of the present officers including two new ones, Mrs. D. W. Thornberry, Secretary for Religious Education and Mrs. H. H. Peyton as Director of the Church Periodical Club. A motion was made and carried to accept the report of the Nominating Committee. A vote of thanks was given the Committee on the Revision of the Constitution.

Mrs. Drake of International Falls presented the Resolutions which are printed elsewhere in the Year Book. These Resolutions were all carried.

The Quiet Day for Prayer was announced to be held on Armistice Day, November 11th. Last notices were given by Mrs. Randall, who spoke about the Prayer Partnership Plan and gave the names of our two Prayer Partners, Miss Lenhart at St. Andrew's Hospital, Wusih, China, and Miss Elizabeth Dickson at Nara, Japan, for whom the women of the Diocese were to remember in their prayers, both at their meetings and in private devotions.

Mrs. Biller spoke about Mr. Grace who is the Missionary to the Deaf in this Province and whose salary we help to pay through our Pledge to the Deaf Work. There were four of our Indian Sisters

present, two from Red Lake and two from Redby. They reported much work done in the two branches.

As there was no more time for Parish Reports, the meeting adjourned after singing the Doxology.

Luncheon was served at Trinity Cathedral Guild Hall.

In reviewing the events of this Annual Meeting, we feel we were especially favored this year in the fine addresses we were privileged to hear. Bishop Maxom, at the opening service of the Convention, Dr. Block and Mrs. Taber, and of course our own Bishop telling about the work in our Diocese in both White and Indian Fields. No matter how fine our guest speakers may be, we do love our home field and want to hear all about it.

We regret that so much time was taken up in discussion; that no Parish Reports were heard. Our Parish Reports, Synod and Deanery Reports could not be given and as our delegates came prepared, it was too bad to have to miss this interesting part of the Annual Meeting.

It is to be hoped that during the year much detail business can be taken care of, so that reports will be ready and given at the proper time and place—the Annual Meeting. We want the expression of the whole Diocesan Family, so that our coming together may be a real help in promoting Diocesan growth, spiritually and materially.

Some one has said that loyalty to duty is the noblest achievement; but a passion for righteousness and an enthusiasm for humanity are the Divine Gifts to all those who with open mind and heart live to do the Father's Will.

Two personal Boxes, one from the Diocese to the Rev. Mr. King, Forrest City, Arkansas, and the other to the Rev. Mr. Alexander Coffin of Spokane, Washington, from St. Paul's Duluth Woman's Auxiliary. One Joy Box to Miss Griffith, Manilla, Philippine Islands, from the Ryan Memorial Circle, St. Paul's, Duluth.

The Diocesan Lenten Box of 1934 was sent to the Rev. Mr. Johnson, New Bern, North Carolina, and the Lenten Box for 1935, to Miss Harris at Bat Cave, N. C. The total value of these Boxes amounted to \$744.77. In the Indian Field in the Diocese of Duluth clothing, etc., was sent which was valued at \$266.49.

This all means faithful and interesting work on the part of the members of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese. Each year a greater interest is manifested which is most gratifying.

Miss Harris, to whom we sent the Lenten Box, has sent the Supply Department most interesting pictures and an account of her work at Bat Cave. She is doing a wonderful and self sacrificing work among the mountaineers in that section. Her letters, as well as those of our other Missionaries to whom we send our Boxes, always express most heartfelt appreciation for the many useful and lovely articles sent them, so it is an incentive for us to go forward in our work for them and their great Cause.

## REPORT OF THE UNITED THANK OFFERING October 1935

Since our last Annual Meeting, another Triennial Year has passed and another glorious United Thank Offering Service held. Mrs. Schumacher of St. Cloud had the privilege of placing our Offering on the plate at Atlantic City last October. The amount of our Offering for three years was \$1,202.82. Mrs. Schumacher will tell you of the Service later. We have received \$175.68 on the Offering of 1937.

Some of us were privileged last week to hear our beloved Presiding Bishop speak in our neighboring Diocese across the Bay. One of the phrases Bishop Perry used in speaking of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary was "Splendid discontent". I commend this phrase to you for thought. "Splendid discontent"! We need more of it in the Diocese of Duluth. Discontent with things as they are; looking forward to things as they could be; that ever "receding goal" of which Bishop Perry spoke. "Without vision the people perish". Let us look at this Diocese as it might be—could be. Look at it just from the standpoint of an Auxiliary woman as a beginning, but don't stop there. Just supposing every woman felt her responsibility towards the work of the Diocese. Would we cut our Budget? Would we cut our Box Work? Our Parshall Memorial? Would we be satisfied to have our Diocese next the lowest in pro rata in our U. T. O.? We gave 37 cents per woman communicant in the offering of 1934. Can't we do something about that? What about reaching every woman with a Blue Box? What about interesting the younger women? Every tenth family in Minnesota had a new car this year. There is no lack of money for pleasures and fashionable clothing. Why not see that the Church gets her share?

We have much work ahead of us in this Diocese.

## REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

The following is taken from the Parish Reports for 1934 and came under the report submitted by Mrs. Lindstrom, former Educational Secretary:

Most of the Parishes observed the Quiet Day for Prayer November 11, 1934. There were 52 Corporate Communions during the year. There were eight quiet hours and in the Indian Field several Prayer Groups. Twelve Parishes reported doing Social Service Work but it is thought that all the Parishes did work that would come under that head although they made no report of it. The work has been done chiefly through the Y. W. C. A., Red Cross, Hospitals, Salvation Army and our own C. P. C. and other church organizations. There were 45 Discussion Groups, 65 Program Meetings. One Parish reported an exhibit of missionary articles, etc., and one reported giving a subscription of the Spirit of Missions to the Library. Another reported a Bible Class during Lent. There are five Parishes having representatives for the Spirit of Missions. In the Indian Field a study class on the Altar was held during the winter and the same Mission bought leaflets and distributed them for Lenten reading. Only eight Parishes reported a study class on the book for the year. One Parish said they read it individually but did not have a class. The Books were sent to every President.

Since I have been acting Secretary of Religious Education during the past few months books have been sent to all the Branches in the Diocese. I sincerely hope all Branches have used them. "Orientals in American Life" is quite worth the time spent in reading and discussion by any group. Try to arrange one hour's study at each meeting.

A great deal of reading matter dealing with progress in different departments of Missionary work throughout the mission field (also many pam-

phlets) may be had just for the asking or for the small sum of five cents.

Samples of these you will find on the table which I wish you would look over if you have the time.

## REPORT OF THE PARSHALL MEMORIAL FUND

For the benefit of those who have not attended our Annual Meeting in recent years I shall give a brief summary of our Parshall Memorial Fund.

Back in 1920 this Fund originated as a Memorial to the much loved Archdeacon Parshall, who spent his life ministering to the needs of our Indians in Northern Minnesota, and it was therefore called the Parshall Memorial Fund. The Annual Diocesan pledge was to be \$200.00 and to be used for educating young Indians for the ministry.

In 1924 our annual pledge was increased to \$1000.00 due to there being five young men receiving this training. After these boys had completed this education there didn't seem to be any immediate candidates and during the next few years we had a considerable sum accumulating. Therefore in 1927 at our Annual Convention a motion was made that the Executive Board be allowed to turn over to Bishop Bennett any money in the Fund to be used for the Indian work. This was given as needed, and later, in 1933, at the Annual Meeting held in Brainerd the Fund was reduced to \$800 a year by a general vote. This sum was to be divided into three working funds, as follows: \$200.00 for Indian Theological Work, \$300.00 for General Indian Work, and \$300.00 for White Theological Work and this later was named in memory of Bishop Morrison or The Bishop Morrison Scholarship. At Bishop Kemerer's request the \$690.53 at that time in our Parshall Memorial Fund was divided and placed in these three funds.

Since that time these different Funds have been used more effectively. From January 10, 1935, to September 30, 1935, the books show that The Indian Theological Fund had a balance on hand at the beginning of the year of \$370.09 and \$32.52 was received, making a total of \$411.61. An expenditure

of \$45.00 for salary of Robert Rice, Catechist, leaves a balance of \$366.61. Bishop Kemerer tells us there will soon be some Indian Candidates for the ministry and a demand made on our Indian Theological Fund.

The General Indian Fund had a balance on hand January 10, 1935, of \$236.37 and \$71.76 has been received making a total of \$308.13. Expenditures of \$100.00 for the Indian Convocation leaves a balance on hand of \$208.13.

The Bishop Morrison Scholarship Fund had a balance on hand January 10, 1935, of \$123.76, and \$93.33 has been received making a total of \$217.09. Expenditures of \$150.00 for a student at Seabury-Western leaves a balance of \$67.09.

The total of the three funds on hand September 28, 1935, is as follows: Indian Theological Fund—\$366.62; General Indian Fund—\$308.13 and the Bishop Morrison Scholarship—\$67.09, or a grand total of \$641.84.

The Bishop Morrison Scholarship is the one giving us most concern at the present time. With the regular payments of \$25.00 per month to the student at Seabury-Western our \$67.09 will last between two and three months, and we had hoped to assist another student at Seabury-Western but at present Bishop Kemerer has resorted to a small educational fund he has on hand and hopes that our Bishop Morrison Scholarship will grow faster than it has this past year to help on the balance. It is necessary, if we use this fund as intended, that we send in our quotas immediately. Let us pray that our efforts will be successful in meeting these obligations and an abundant harvest result from our labors.

Through Mrs. Wanless we are reaching four new families in Northern Minnesota. This is real Missionary work as they are beyond the reach of any Church.

Whenever I am in need of money or stationery, I call upon our diocesan Treasurer. The expenses for 1934 were \$9.04.

Prayer cards and letters enclosing suggestions for a Quiet Day were sent to each family asking them to join with us in the Quiet Day for Prayer on November 11th.

In the Witness for May 16, 1935, the Rev. J. M. Stoney of Alabama says, "I was surprised to find out how well the Episcopal Church Home Department Quarterly fills the need of those out of touch with the Church." I was so glad to read this as this is the paper sent to the seventeen families on our list.

## REPORT FOR PROVISIONING SUMMER SCHOOL

The report for Provisioning Summer School for 1934 shows that twelve parishes gave cash to the amount of \$42.75 and four parishes gave canned goods to the value of \$30.10 making a total value of \$72.85 in response to the letter sent out by the committee to all the Parishes and missions in the Diocese.

In the spring of 1935 a meeting was held in Trinity Cathedral, called by the Rev. L. W. Hallett, to discuss plans for the Summer Conference at Cass Lake.

As I, as Chairman, was unable to attend, Mrs. William Constable substituted for me and reported to me after which the yearly letter was prepared and mailed to all the branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese. In response to this letter, thirteen parishes gave cash amounting to \$44.80 and seven parishes gave canned goods valued at \$38.94, a total of \$83.77, an increase of \$10.00 over that of 1934. The Rev. L. W. Hallett in a letter to the Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer says, "We had a fine summer school as you no doubt know and appreciate again the help received from the Woman's Auxiliary."

In addition were sent 32 books, 5 puzzles and 1,758 Christmas cards, which were made from old Christmas cards donated to us, and there is a great demand for them by some of the institutions on our list.

The majority of papers used are of a religious type—church publications such as The Witness, The Spirit of Missions, The Diocese of Duluth, etc. These

seem to be especially enjoyed by the Indians, and Mrs. Peyton, whose group takes care of the Indian work, receives many requests for them.

Our magazines are not sent out in a haphazard fashion, but are carefully chosen to suit the people who receive them, and are listed so that postage is not being paid for sending duplicate numbers. Records are kept which tell something of the recipients and the type of magazine for which each family cares, as well as the number and ages of the children so that, where it is possible, something may be included for them. However, very little material suitable for children is received by us for distribution. On a number of cards are written such notations as "Elderly woman—lives alone", and those who have personally delivered reading material to some of these women know how much they enjoy it. It is known, too, that the magazines are passed along from one person to another and are practically worn to shreds before their work is done.

The Church Periodical Club appreciates and thanks our church members for their kindness in supplying material for this much-needed work, and is especially grateful to those who have sent personal subscriptions or taken the trouble to send on their own magazines to some lonely person or to an isolated family.
