THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS.

The annual meeting of the Board of Managers was held at the home of Mrs. Collier, Monday morning, May 19th, Mrs. James G. Staton, presiding. Roll call showed the absence of Mrs. N. N. Davis and Mrs. John Cranmer, the latter coming in on a later train.

After planning the meeting for the next day and discussing the coming year's work, Miss Emery's letter was read and considered. The following resolution offered by the Pennsylvania Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was read and approved by this Board, subject to the endorsement of the Auxiliary as a body:

"Resolved, That the United Thank Offering of 1916 be given to the Board of Missions to be devoted entirely to the training, testing, sending and support of women for Mission work at home and abroad, and to the care of such as are sick or disabled."

"Also, that to our united gifts shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to the work of the Master in the Mission Field, or if they cannot go themselves to give of their substance as the Lord has prospered them."

It was agreed that the Educational Secretary should go to each Convocation and conduct Study Classes, limiting the class to those who would agree to become leaders of a class. The time and place to be arranged by the Dean, President of the Convocation and the Educational Secretary.

It being time for the meeting of the Parochial Societies, the officer's meeting adjourned.

THE CONFERENCE OF THE PAROCHIAL SOCIETIES.

The Conference of the Parochial Societies was held in the Parish House of St. Stephen's Church, May 19th, at eleven-thirty. Before this meeting members of the Daughters of the King and the Sanctuary Guilds gathered for an interchange of ideas. The Parochial meeting was opened by the singing of the hymn, "Blest be the Tie that Binds." Mrs. H. M. Bonner, presiding, led us in the Creed and prayers.

The address of welcome was made by Mrs. D. R. Kornegay, of Goldsboro, and responded to by Mrs. H. R. Bryan, of New Bern.

Roll call by the Secretary showed 22 delegates present. The presiding officer called attention to the fact that the reports showed lax attendance at the meetings and urged that a special effort be made to correct this.

Mrs. W. A. Townes, of Wilmington, then made an address on "How can we learn more about and do something for both Auxiliary and Parochial work?" After a few words of introduction the following five questions were written on the blackboard and were discussed by all:

- I. Why do we try to learn more?
- II. When will we begin to learn?
- III. Where shall we begin our work?
- IV. Who can best teach others?
- V. What are we doing now in this direction?

"Should a Person concentrate her efforts upon One Branch of the Work?" was the subject of a splendid paper by Mrs. H. R. Bryan, which brought forth varied opinions; some advocating the members belonging to one Society and others advocating members belonging to more than one Society.

The paper on "What are the Requisites of an Ideal Parochial Meeting?" written by Miss Minnie Albertson, of Elizabeth City, and read by Mrs. Karney, was intensely interesting and made us long for an ideal meeting.

These ladies were all given a rising vote of thanks for their very helpful papers. After the singing of the Doxology, the meeting adjourned.

MINUTES OF THE TWENTY-SIXTH ANNUAL MEETING.

The Twenty-sixth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary and Sixth Meeting of the Parochial Society of the Diocese of East Carolina was held in St. Stephen's Parish, Goldsboro, N. C., May 20, 1913.

Corporate Communion was held in St. Stephen's Church at 7:30 A. M., the Rev. J. H. Griffith, of Kinston, the chaplain, being the celebrant, assisted by Rev. Archer Boogher, of Fayetteville, and the rector of the Parish. Mr. Griffith delivered a very appropriate address on the immortality and indestructible value of the soul. He appealed for more faith, more conscience, and more soul-power in our religion. At this service the annual offering known as the Bishop's Fund was placed on the altar.

The business meeting was called to order by the President, Mrs. James G. Staton, of Williamston, in the Parish House at 10 A. M. After the hymn, "Lord, speak to me," the chaplain led us in the Creed and prayers, and in his address said that the greatest work we can do is not what we do for ourselves, and he urged us to use the time God has given us in helping others, for in this work is the greatest joy.

The address of welcome was made by Miss Arrington, of Goldsboro, and responded to by Mrs. W. A. Townes, of Wilmington.

The President's report was then read, after which the roll was called and 30 delegates responded, making the total number of delegates to all societies and visitors present 88.

The reports showed 39 Study Classes held during the year.

The report of the Convocation of Edenton was read by its President, Mrs. T. G. Skinner.

Mrs. F. R. Rose, of Fayetteville, the Junior Secretary, in her report showed increase in interest and offerings, and two new branches formed.

The report of the Convocation of New Bern was read by its President, Mrs. H. M. Bonner.

The President of the Wilmington Convocation being absent, her report was read by the Secretary.

The absence of one of our officers, Mrs. N. N. Davis, of

Wilmington, and our former President, Mrs. Nathaniel Hard-
ing, of Washington, was noted with regret and the Secretary
was requested to write them notes to that effect.

The Educational Secretary, Miss Bettie Windley, of New
Bern, then read her report which showed excellent results of
her first year's work. At the request of Rev. Arthur Gray,
she announced that next year's Mission Study would be
"Emergency work in China" and asked that every one read
the Educational page printed in each issue of the "Spirit of
Missions."

The cause of the Orphanage was as usual well brought for-
ward by Rev. W. J. Smith, of Charlotte. He thanked us for
past efforts and urged us to do as well in the future.

The Treasurer, Mrs. George H. Roberts, had a most en-
couraging report and showed that over two thousand dollars
had passed through her hands during the fiscal year. At the
announcement that the Bishop's Fund was \$428.68, larger
than ever before, the body arose and sang the Doxology.

The United Offering Treasurer, Mrs. Joshua T. James, of
Wilmington, reported a great increase in the United Offering
and begged us to labor more earnestly than ever during the
remaining four months. She said that there were only six
or eight parishes and missions in the Diocese that did not
contribute to this fund and that she hoped before next October
that each of those would respond. She then offered resolutions
which were read, discussed and adopted.

All officers reports will be found in full in other pages of
this report.

It being the hour of noon, the Bishop led us in the noon-
day prayer for Missions. He then appointed as delegates to
the General Convention Mrs. James G. Staton, Mrs. Joshua
T. James, Miss Bettie Windley, Mrs. F. R. Rose, and Mrs.
N. N. Davis; as alternates, in the numerical order in which
they were named, Mrs. H. M. Bonner, Mrs. T. G. Skinner,
Mrs. W. E. Cox, Mrs. G. H. Roberts and Mrs. John Cranmer.
He asked us this year to work for the Church at Lumberton,
Church at Whiteville, five students for the ministry, and the
work at Hope Mills. He stated that St. Paul's School, Beau-
fort, was not a Diocesan school and that he did not endorse
it, but that he did not object to a society sending funds
through their treasurer to the school.

The Secretary then read her report. The office of Corre-
sponding Secretary having been abolished it was moved,

seconded and carried, that the following clause in Article VII of the Constitution be transferred to Article V, making these the duties of the President instead of the Secretary: "To conduct the correspondence of the Society with the Missionaries, and with the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions. She shall give notice of all meetings."

Miss Emery's letter was then read, and as a body it was moved and carried that we follow as far as we were able her two suggestions. The suggestions were: First, that each society should try to have a Study Class both in the Bible and in Mission study during the year; second, that we have a special day in the fall in which to have a Corporate Communion with the thought of our special work in mind and a special prayer for God's blessing upon it. The day was voted to be the last Friday in October.

The work of the Educational Secretary was discussed and the following resolution was carried:

Resolved, That our Educational Secretary hold a Normal Class—the attendance being limited to those who will in turn lead a class—in each of the three Convocations, the time and place of meeting to be decided by the Educational Secretary, the President, and the Dean of the Convocation in which Study Class is held. That Parishes be requested to pay the expenses of one delegate to that Normal Class, if necessary.

The Resolution of the Executive Board of the Diocese of Pennsylvania with regard to the disposition of the United Offering of 1916 met with the approval of our own Board of Managers and was endorsed by the Auxiliary as a body. The Resolution in full may be found in the report of the officers' meeting.

Mrs. W. D. Pruden, of Edenton, Miss Deita Roberts, of New Bern, and Mrs. Frank Huggins, of Wilmington, were appointed a committee to draft resolutions expressing our thanks to Miss Sue Collier, for her long and faithful services to this body.

Mrs. Bonner then told us something of the Cambridge Conference that she attended last summer, of the inspiration that it was to her, and she urged us to make the sacrifice where possible and attend one of these Conferences the coming summer, the nearest one to us being the one held next month at Black Mountain, N. C.

Miss Lindley, of the Church Missions House, whom we all

know and love as our own, made a most stirring address. She urged us to make the most of our opportunities *now*, especially with regard to those countries in the East who are now at the crisis and just waiting. In viewing the work at home in the Auxiliaries she found much to encourage her, and that each branch seemed to be truly in earnest and trying to follow where the Master has led. She begged us to make it the purpose of our lives that we should never forget the Mission work, and look forward to the time when the knowledge of God shall cover the land as the waters cover the sea.

At the close of Miss Lindley's address our hearts were filled with joy and gratitude when Mrs. Bonner announced that a young woman of her Convocation, Venetia Cox, of Winterville, had just offered herself to the Board of Missions for training for service in the mission field. We felt that no more fitting words could express our unspeakable joy than the Doxology, which was then sung.

The minutes of the meeting were read and approved, after which Mrs. Robert Strange in behalf of the Society, thanked the people of Goldsboro for their delightful hospitality.

After prayer led by Miss Lindley, the meeting adjourned.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

It has been a pleasure to serve for the past year the Auxiliary and Parochial Society of our Diocese and I wish to express my high appreciation of the ready help and loving interest which has been accorded to me by our former President, Mrs. Nathaniel Hard-
ing. While I feel that I can in no way take her place, still we are told that a leader is as strong as the people behind her, and having that fact in mind and knowing the strength and loyalty of the women of East Carolina and feeling assured of their hearty co-operation, I am certain that we will be able to accomplish great things for our Auxiliary and Parochial Society.

I was very glad to attend the Missionary Council held in Charlotte last October, and it was a most interesting meeting. It is to be regretted that we women had so many things to discuss that there was little time left for us to hear the men in their interesting debates and discussions. East Carolina was well represented. It was fine to hear Mr. Ancell of China remark to one of our clergy, "Oh! you are from East Carolina, the Diocese which has paid its apportionment?" We women help the Diocese to pay this apportionment and this praise was most gratifying.

Late in October I attended The World in Baltimore. There was given the wonderful Pageant of Darkness and Light which made us feel that we should do all in our power to send the Light of the Gospel to all the Dark countries. There were also exhibits from all parts of the world. People were dressed in native costumes and houses and huts were erected to represent the habitations of man in different countries.

On April 17th, I attended the Conference of Diocesan Officers at the Church Missions House, New York City. At this Conference the problems of our next Triennial were discussed. It has been my ambition for the last two years that East Carolina might be represented at one of these conferences, and now that she has answered Present at one I hope that every year some one may go to at least one Conference. I feel that there are many things which the Northern women do and understand which would be a great benefit to us in the South.

I attended the Missionary Mass Meeting at Tarboro last Wednesday. The Baptist, Presbyterian and Methodist Missionary Societies were represented and we were glad to hear of their methods of interesting women in missions. The work of the Auxiliary of North Carolina was reported very interestingly by different ones. It was a privilege for me to tell of our work in East Carolina. The meeting closed with a Missionary Mystery play by the Juniors and Babies. When we saw the children impersonating the people from all parts

of the world in true native costume we realized that all our efforts here at home are well worth while in sending the blessed gospel to those who have it not.

In going over the reports it is most gratifying to observe that the study classes are now the universal thing, and in the future I am sure we will find that as our Missionary knowledge increases, so will our prayers become more earnest and our gifts larger. Prayer is the most important part of it all for we can not pray about a thing without giving of ourselves and means. Let us pray earnestly this coming year that some young woman may come forward and offer herself for work in the Mission Field. I am glad to report that we now have several branches of the Young Woman's Auxiliary. Many of our young girls having outgrown the Juniors, and feeling that they are too young for the Woman's Auxiliary are finding their places of usefulness in an auxiliary of their own. Let me urge every parish to form their young women into such an Auxiliary, because after our days of service are ended these same women will be trained to take our places.

Please bear in mind that we have only one more time of contribution to the United Thank Offering before the Triennial, and surely we can be more thankful than we were three years ago and by showing this thankfulness have a larger offering to present on October 9th.

We should be conscious of the many blessings that have come to us, and be not weary in well doing nor become discouraged because our calls are now more numerous. Let us pray for God's blessings on all our work, remembering that we shall receive our reward. We should give of our means, but still more should we give of ourselves, "The Gift without the Giver is bare."

CONVOCATION OF EDENTON.

My work as an officer of the Diocese began in August 1912, and since that time I have found much pleasure in the work, and in trying in my small way to advance the Master's Kingdom on earth. From August to October, I spent much time in getting in touch with the different organizations, writing letters and sending out notices for the Gatesville Convocation, which was in session September 30, October 1 and 2. It was not as well attended as we had hoped, but was a most enthusiastic meeting. A Sunday School Institute was conducted on the second day, and was so much enjoyed and proved so instructive, that it was moved and carried that an Institute of this kind be a feature of each Fall meeting of the Convocation. The Church men and women of St. Mary's, Gatesville, are to be congratulated upon their beautiful little Church, which was con-

secrated at that time by the Bishop of the Diocese assisted by the Clergy present. The Church is a credit to them and shows what a small Parish can do when composed of faithful men and women. The meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in the Methodist Church on the second day and was most gratifying, being well attended not only by our own delegates and Church people, but by women from other Churches, thus showing their interest in our work. The reports, most of them verbal, were very good and the papers interesting. The women at this meeting were earnest and willing to undertake and carry out suggestions for the furthering of our great work. Gatesville is now working for a new organ.

My second Convocation was held at Christ Church, Creswell, in March, a most uplifting meeting it was. On Thursday at 10:30 A. M. a beautiful service was held at Old St. Davids, just out of the town. Holy Communion was celebrated by the Bishop assisted by the Clergy, after which a most beautiful cross, a Monument to the Rev. Luther Eborn was unveiled, a worthy tribute to a man who had served his people more than thirty years. Thursday afternoon the Woman's Auxiliary met in Christ Church, and we had the honor and pleasure of having with us the Bishop and Ministers. They showed much interest in our work and said encouraging things. Eleven Parishes responded to the roll call and the reports were splendid. Mr. Bethea and Mr. Noe gave verbal reports from some of the Parishes that had no delegates present. Sunday School work was discussed and we agreed that we must turn our most earnest attention to this important factor in the future of our beloved Church. Miss P. C. Norcom's paper on the United Offering was a masterpiece, and her talk to the Juniors at their meeting, telling of her lovely work with the Juniors of Hertford was both instructive and interesting. At the suggestion of the Bishop two Auxiliaries were appointed to send to the Mission Herald each month a report or letter telling of their work in the Auxiliary. The Parishes being taken alphabetically, they were notified at once by card when to send their letters.

At both of these Convocations the hospitality of the people was unbounded. From Creswell I went to Columbia for an afternoon and night. There a faithful few are building a lovely little Church, which they hope to complete in the near future. There are only eight communicants in the Parish. Do they not deserve great credit and all the help that we can give them? Most of the Parishes in the Convocation of Edenton have had Study Classes during the winter. In Elizabeth City the Study Class met once a week for six consecutive weeks, instead of meeting once a month as had been done before, they found that this plan worked splendidly, and the interest kept up better than ever before. Elizabeth City is painting and improving its Rectory for the coming of the Minister, June 1st. In November I attended the great Missionary Exposition The World in

Baltimore. I also during the winter while in the cities of Washington, Baltimore and New York inquired into Missionary work, and received many helpful ideas.

From most of the Parishes I have good reports, and have had encouraging letters from many of my co-workers. These I appreciate very much as I am new in this work and often need a helping hand. I have sent out many copies of "The Spirit of Missions" and hope in this way more interest in the work has been aroused. Let us pray earnestly that we may not grow weary in this glorious work, but may our faith and strength increase so that we may feel that we have at least done our best.

CONVOCATION OF NEW BERN.

Another year has passed with its successes and failures; its disappointments as well as encouragement. With all, I feel that we have many reasons to look forward with courage and hope.

My work for the year 1912 began at the Congregational meeting in New Bern, immediately after the Council. Here splendid reports were read by the delegates from Council giving me an idea of the enthusiasm and inspiration carried back to the different Parishes by their delegates. My next work was a very delightful trip to Cambridge, Mass., to attend the Conference on Church work. These two weeks were pleasantly given to studying different phases of church work. As President of New Bern Convocation I have attended two Convocational meetings. One at Vanceboro, the other at Bonnerton. The meetings at Vanceboro and Bonnerton were full of interest. Detailed accounts of both these meetings were published in the Mission Herald. The reports from the different branches are with a few exceptions, very encouraging. While there have been no new branches formed yet some old ones have been revived and in many societies there has been an increase in membership.

The Educational work this past year has been encouraging, still we wish every Auxiliary to make an earnest effort to have a Mission Study Class during the year. They can secure the assistance of our Educational Secretary, Miss Windley, whenever they desire.

Many letters have been written and received and some literature has been sent out. It is with pleasure we note that so many of the branches have paid their assessments in full. Among these Aurora, Ayden, Kinston, Goldsboro, Christ Church and All Saints Chapel, New Bern, N. C. There has been an increased interest in the United Offering; but, as yet, we have not had the greatest possible offering from our Convocation—the offering of self. Let us pray that one, at least, of our very best girls may give her life to the Mis-

sion field. Let us put this thought before our sons and daughters as the very best thing they can do. The largest, the greatest service which they can render.

The Church Periodical Club has given liberally to our Convocation. Having sent not only magazines and papers but a good supply of reference books to one of our young men who now has charge of the largest Bible Class in our Convocation. It has sent Bibles to a Mission Sunday School and to a class of fourteen boys for their very own. These boys carry their Bibles to Sunday school almost every Sunday. Let us increase our gifts both of money and literature to this most beneficial society.

The New Bern Branch of the Daughters of the King, with the permission of their rector, discontinued their meetings but are still active in all good works. We have cause for thankfulness in the formation of one new Branch of the Girls' Friendly Society and of the increasing interest in this Society for girls.

The Juniors have done very well increasing their membership and in some branches their monetary gifts. I wish to call attention to the Auxiliary of Winterville. They have a membership of four and an average attendance of three, and have raised \$38.20. Also to the one in Ayden with a membership of eight and an average attendance of seven. Some of the branches have memberships of 40, 39, 31 and an average attendance of 10 or even less.

Let me ask the delegates from parishes where the last named condition exists to begin a personal campaign determined to have full meetings. The personal contact of the interested person will exert such an influence as no other means can except prayer.

Now, my friends, with this review of what has been done I feel that we are encouraged to expect greater things the coming year. The spiritual side of our work we cannot estimate but by "their works we know them." We must remember that real missionary work is bringing the world to Christ. Then, let us give not only of our means until we know the real meaning of giving—sacrificial giving—but give our thought, our prayers, our time and talents that we may really and truly pray, "Thy Kingdom come."

CONVOCATION OF WILMINGTON.

The past year has been one of conscious growth for the Wilmington Convocation. Advance has been made along every line of the work.

Following a suggestion made in a Leaflet sent from the Church Missions House, many of the Auxiliaries and Societies began their year's work with the service of the Holy Communion. Shall we

not always begin our year's work with this our greatest help?

In October the Convocation met in St. John's Parish, Fayetteville. Our meeting was a most satisfactory one. Papers on the Auxiliary work were read, and plans for the year discussed.

Five new Auxiliaries and one Guild have been added to our number—Calvary Auxiliary, Warsaw; St. Gabriel's, Faison; St. Philip's Guild, Southport; a Young Woman's Auxiliary, St. John's, Wilmington, and two Branches of the Daughters of the Auxiliary—one at St. John's, Fayetteville, and one at St. James', Wilmington.

The report from St. John's Woman's Auxiliary, Fayetteville, shows a most successful year's work.

St. John's Branch, Wilmington, followed a program for their series of meetings, adopting the suggestions for the Auxiliary work for the year sent them from the Church Missions House. With the steady progress made in their work has come a perceptible broadening and strengthening of the life of their Auxiliary. Their study class was St. Matthew's gospel.

Many interesting and helpful gatherings were held at St. James'. One that proved most successful in increasing their membership I would like to mention, quoting from an account given by one of the members.

"The women of St. James' Auxiliary entertained all the women of the Parish at an informal tea. In a short address, the President of the Auxiliary stated to the ladies that the object of calling them together was to present to them the claims of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions upon their loyalty and interest. Recognizing the fact that every woman present was doing noble, faithful work in other Guilds and Societies in the Parish, and wishing in no way to interfere with this good work, she still urged them to avail themselves of this privilege which was theirs by virtue of their baptism into Christ's Church. It was not for money that she was asking all women in the Parish to enroll themselves as members of the Auxiliary, but for the increase in power which would come from enlarged interest, as well as for the personal enrichment of all who would come and share in this privilege of service. Two papers were read, giving the information which any interested woman would like to have before becoming a member of the Society. As a beginning of the result of this meeting, eleven new members have been added to St. James' Auxiliary, with increased interest and enthusiasm on the part of the former members."

Splendid work has been done in the Study Classes in the Convocation. Our Educational Secretary visited us in the Fall. In Fayetteville, she conducted a Normal Class, and seven study Classes were held in that Parish during the winter. Educational Leaders have been appointed in most of the Parishes. At St. James', Wilmington, a Normal Class was held by the Educational Leader of the Parish and during Lent each one of the members took a Class; in

this way, seven Classes were formed. The study was Japan. At the close of the course a meeting of the Classes was held in the Parish House, and all the women of the Parish invited to attend. The meeting was conducted by our Educational Leader, each Class having been assigned by her a topic for discussion. This meeting not only proved of intense interest to the members of the Classes, but the review and discussion of the year's course was an immense advantage to those who had not had the study.

Especially gratifying has been the general work and Study Class work done by the Young Woman's Auxiliaries, the Daughters and Juniors—our future Auxiliary and Study Class Leaders.

The Girls Friendly report three new Branches this year. In the Branch of the Good Shepherd, Wilmington, three interesting Study Classes were held—two on "Japan" and one on "the Acts."

Reports from all our Leaders and Members show that in their work the emphasis this year was on prayer and study. The result has been a quickened interest, increased offerings, more generous and faithful giving of self.

And in the way of study so many doors of opportunity are opened to us. Our Study Classes, the Summer Conferences, the General Meetings and Conferences of the Auxiliary, the wonderful Missionary Expositions, and perhaps the greatest of all, the Triennial now before us. All are open doors of information, training, inspiration. And because they are open to us, how great is our responsibility.

Miss Bettie Dunn Windley, of New Bern, was appointed Educational Secretary. She has been in personal touch with so many of you in your work that further introduction is unnecessary.

It was with regret that we heard of the resignation of Miss Sue Collier. Miss Collier was one of the oldest officers of the Auxiliary having been its faithful secretary for more than six years. The office of Corresponding and Recording Secretary has since been merged into one, the President assuming the greater part of the duties of the former office.

It was our privilege to attend the great Missionary Council at Charlotte, N. C., in October, and truly it was a great Council. We have also received and had printed in the Mission Herald from time to time articles from the various parishes and missions. Let us state that all articles for publication must be in the hands of the Secretary not later than the 20th of each month, and we trust the coming year that each branch of this society will let us hear of the work they are doing through the columns of our Diocesan Organ.

REPORT OF THE UNITED OFFERING TREASURER.

Again, my co-workers, I have the pleasure of reporting an inspiring increase in our United Thank-Offering. With the exception of six or eight small missions, every church in the Diocese now contributes to this fund, and I have a reasonable hope that most of those will be heard from by October.

Since my last report I have collected \$631.25 making a total now to the credit of the Woman's Auxiliary of East Carolina \$1,382.00; a gain of \$512.58 over that for the corresponding time for the Offering of 1910. St. Peter's, Washington, now heads the list with \$209.72, the largest amount that has yet been presented by any one church in the Diocese, except St. James, Wilmington, which for the past two Offerings—that of 1907 and 1910—has given more at each time than the rest of the Diocese together. The greatest in-

crease for the past three years comes from St. John's, Wilmington, which has already more than doubled any previous offering. Holy Trinity, Hertford, has doubled its offering.

But four months remain before we present our Offering. Let us all work with renewed zeal and endeavor to make it \$3,000. More than twice that amount was sent for mission work in the State of North Carolina from the Offering of 1910. I pray the Holy Spirit to put into your hearts such love for the Master, that you may fully know the joy that comes from loving service and generous giving.

Before I bring this report to a close there are one or two things I wish again to bring to your notice—things that I am anxious to see fully established for the furtherance of this work before I give it over to another. First, let me suggest,—let me put even stronger and urge,—that each and every parish and mission, no matter how small, appoint a special Treasurer or Collector for this Fund. A few have responded to this request, and I am sure that most of the increase I have reported from my own parish has been due to this provision for a special custodian of the United Offering Fund. Secondly, I suggest an annual meeting in the interest of the United Offering, to which every baptized woman, and all interested in the United Offering, must be asked to come. I have asked that, wherever it is practicable, this meeting be held on Annunciation Day. A few Branches have responded to this request—but I want all. The special Treasurer should confer with the other Parish officers and arrange for this meeting. Thirdly, in every parish and mission where it may be had, have a celebration of the Holy Communion on United Offering Day, and if practicable have it at the hour when our United Offering is being presented at the General Convention. Thus every woman throughout the Church will, in thought and in spirit, have a vital and personal part in the presentation of that great Offering.

That these suggestions may be brought definitely before you, I offer the following resolutions:

Resolved 1st: That each Parish and Mission shall appoint a special officer to be known as the Custodian of The Woman's United Thank Offering, whose special duty it shall be to stimulate interest in and take charge of contributions to the United Thank Offering.

Resolved 2nd: That in each Parish and Mission there shall be an annual meeting in the interest of this Fund, such meeting to be held, wherever practicable, on Annunciation Day (March 25th).

Resolved 3rd: That each Branch of the Auxiliary arrange with its Rector for a celebration of the Holy Communion on the same day, and as nearly as possible to the same hour, that the United Offering is presented in the General Convention.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY.

In October, 1912, when by the appointment of Bishop Strange, I assumed the responsibilities of Educational Secretary of East Carolina my first thought was how I could prepare myself for the duties of this office. The way towards this preparation was opened to me by the Bishop, when he appointed me a delegate to the Missionary Council of Sewanee which took place in Charlotte the last week in October. During that Council, Miss Grace Lindley gave instruction on the course which had been prepared by Mr. Gray for the use of the whole Church during the winter. In that class I began my study of "Japan advancing—whither?" In November I attended the great missionary exhibition, The World in Baltimore, and while there I had the privilege of visiting another class on Japan, led by Mrs. Mitchell, the Educational Secretary of Philadelphia.

My first work in the diocese was to attend the Convocation of New Bern which met in Vanceboro on October 22, and to give a short talk on the object of Mission Study classes. All Saints' Day, I spent in Wilmington. There I met the leaders and many members of the Auxiliaries and had talks with them which have been a help and inspiration to me all winter. I assisted, in a small way, in the plans for the Normal Mission Study class of St. James which was most ably led by Mrs. W. A. Townes. In January I visited Fayetteville and led a normal class, of six most earnest and enthusiastic women, for four meetings; then, on my return home, I stopped in Goldsboro, organized and led a class there for three meetings. I had a normal class in New Bern, of eight members, which met weekly during December and January, my traveling expenses were paid by the Auxiliary or an individual, to Baltimore, Wilmington, Fayetteville and Goldsboro. I was entertained at all these places and also in Charlotte and Vanceboro.

During the winter I wrote 71 letters and sent literature to 48 Societies. Ten Societies wrote for further information and at the end of the year nine parishes (including the ones in New Bern) reported on their work. It is impossible for me to be sure of the exact number of classes held during Lent.

I think that this is a wonderful work for East Carolina and I hope these mission study classes may increase in numbers and in enthusiasm and bring a rich blessing to the world and to ourselves. For the object of a mission study class is not merely that we may learn about missions because they are a part of the church's work but its object is to make us realize the blessings of Christianity to such an extent that we long to carry the message to others.

WHAT ARE THE REQUISITES OF AN IDEAL PAROCHIAL
MEETING?

To be called upon to describe an ideal parochial meeting, makes one long for the pen wherewith the saintly Bishop Cox described his "Dreamland Church." Our ideal meeting must first of all be provided with ideal members and these are not found in any appreciable number outside the Land where parish meetings are no more.

But for ordinary mortals, the prime requisite of any meeting is a full and prompt attendance. The presence of a member proves first of all that she is interested, and as interest is happily contagious, the greater the number to spread it, the more likely it is to warm into enthusiasm.

The necessity for punctuality need not be dwelt upon. There may be some present, though we hope not, who have advised or heard it

advised that a meeting be appointed for four o'clock, in order to get the members together at least by four thirty.

Our ideal meeting is full and enthusiastic because brought together by an object in which all are interested, and which every woman present has thought and talked over before hand. After the opening prayers, which joined in heartily, are the best possible preparation for the work in hand, the meeting proceeds at once to the business of the hour. No time is lost in discussing outside topics, so every woman present is given an opportunity to express her views upon the subject under discussion, and the more fully and frankly this is done, the better, provided every one "speaks the truth"—as she sees it "in love". But the measure once agreed upon with the consent of all present, afterward if ever, "Silence is golden," unless one can give her hearty approval and support to the work undertaken.

The ideal meeting will go on itself with the two requisites first mentioned and a full and prompt attendance of consecrated women. First, last and always let us insist upon the attendance of all who can possibly come. Some of course are unavoidably kept away. Others absent themselves, not always from carelessness or indifference but because they really do not know their own value. They have confidence in the few who always lead in the parish work and do not see how their mere presence could help. If they would but come and bring the gifts they have! The clear common sense which would see a way through a difficult problem; the kindly interest, the feeling of good fellowship, the desire to put new hearts into those discouraged by indifference, real or seeming, or the precious gift of humor, provoking the harmless laughter which clears away many a gathering cloud! Some of us may recall an incident like this at more than one meeting. One or more of the customary attendants enters, and proceeds to disburse various "dues," sent by Mrs. A. B. and C. These ladies "could not come themselves," but supposed the money was the important thing after all!

Just here is the key to this whole matter of non-attendance, the idea that **the end and aim of Church work is the raising of money.**

"He gives nothing but empty gold,
Who gives what the hand can hold."

In our highest act of worship, we own it but a reasonable service to present ourselves, our souls and bodies to be a living sacrifice to our Lord. A due proportion of our means is necessarily a part of this service to which we are so solemnly pledged, but how small a part, in comparison with love and faith and prayer and work, in one word, CONSECRATION.

So it all comes back to the principle with which we began. Our ideal meeting must be composed of consecrated Christian women.

HOW CAN WE LEARN TO KNOW MORE ABOUT AND DO SOMETHING FOR BOTH AUXILIARY AND PAROCHIAL WORK.

This, or similar queries, have puzzled greater minds than ours, and have been the subject for debate at many larger gatherings, but we hope with no better results than we shall obtain this morning.

When Mrs. Bonner, our honored Second Vice-President wrote and asked if I would give you a paper on this subject, I replied that I would be glad to help her in a discussion of this important matter, and I am now here merely to give you a few suggestions of thought that might lead to a clearer view of what our duty is as members of the Protestant Episcopal Church in America, and to stimulate our interest in the growth of these two branches of the Church's work at home and abroad.

Those of you who were so fortunate as to study "The Conquest of the Continent" will recall the discouragements, hardships and repeated failure of many of the early settlers who gave their life for the spread of Christ's Kingdom in our own country, and you will also remember how disgrace came upon the church in the abuses and misuses of her forms of service. How, as Bishop Williams of Connecticut, wrote "She was regarded as a piece of heavy baggage left behind by the British when they evacuated New York and Boston." It is too painful to go into the details of that period of our Church's History following the close of the Revolutionary War. It is enough for us to know that out of chaos has come peace and glory.

Let our minds revert for a moment to the two Bishops, twenty Clergymen and sixteen Laymen, that composed the First General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in Philadelphia, in 1789, and follow the growth of the Church up to the General Convention that will be held in New York in October, 1913. Could there be a much more glorious victory? Can we find a better stimulus for the work yet to be done by us? We wonder how this little band of thirty-eight men could have accomplished such marvelous results, and in following their example of self-sacrifice we shall obtain the best answer to the question before us. Let us consider with what faith and fortitude these few Christian men gradually overcame condition and prejudices that seemed insurmountable. How patiently and tactfully they met the opposition to her Creed and to her Prayer-book. How bravely they undertook to carry Westward God's message. I refer to these early days of the Church to illustrate the similarity in a small measure of the work that is left for us to do in keeping alive a keen interest in the Parish Guilds and in learning more of the life-work of our Missionaries who need our sympathy and support.

We are not handicapped in numbers, for out of this land where

was sown the seed of faith and hope, God has brought forth glorious fruit. Now, shall we, who are blessed with these benefits, selfishly keep them to ourselves?

God's messenger comes to us at any hour of the day or night to comfort us in trouble, and to rejoice with us in any added blessings. He it is who prays for us, asks God to pardon our sins and leads us to higher thoughts and deeds. Do you not think that he needs our help and co-operation to carry on this work, and do you not think that we should try to send this same messenger to those who sit in darkness? Just here is where the opportunity is given the women of each and every Parish to take up her share of the work for the Lord. Mr. Gray likens the day of the First General Convention to a "Gathering of the Forces," and so it should be with us in our endeavor to interest other women in our Church at home and in Mission Field. The General Convention of 1913 will perhaps better demonstrate than ever before what the work of the women means to the Church.

We are all here this morning to discuss how we can learn more and interest others in this work. Let us bear in mind the simple and direct manner in which Philander Chase reached the hearts, and won for the Church, many brave soldiers of the Plains; not by threats, not by vindictiveness, and not by self-importance, but he taught them with a spirit of meekness, prayerfulness and thanksgiving exercising the utmost tact in adapting himself to the customs of the people with whom he came in contact.

So it is today that there are women of our Diocese who claim either distaste or unfitness to join any Auxiliary or Guild. For this reason we should see that each Parish has its Societies so organized that some particular branch will appeal to every one. There are those whose tastes are for sewing, others for literature, and yet others to whom the artistic solely appeals. Surely, there is always work in the Auxiliaries for those who love to sew. The recently adopted Study Classes afford every opportunity to the literary inclined, and where could one better use their artistic talent than in the care and decoration of the Sanctuary of God's House.

Select among yourselves the most tactful member of your organization to interest others in the Parish. There are those who are capable leaders and Executive officers, but who lack the necessary personal magnetism to attract outsiders. It is more than probable that this talent will be found in a faithful member of your little circle who would fall by the wayside if asked to act as an officer or to make an address, but who could interest in her quiet tactful way some indifferent woman who had not previously awakened to a realization of the work she could do.

Before closing with the following five questions for discussion, let me suggest that in the work of our Guilds, we be guided by the words of St. Paul (1 Cor. 6 chap. ver. 12): "All things are lawful

for me, but all things are not expedient." And so we will learn to do only those things that are for the good of the Church.

GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY.

The meeting of the Girls' Friendly Society was held in St. Stephen's Parish House, Monday afternoon. The President, Mrs. T. P. Noe, called the meeting to order at 3 p. m. Mrs. J. S. Cox, of New Bern, who has served as Secretary since October was at her post to take the minutes of the meeting. After repeating the G. F. S. prayer the President congratulated the Society upon its being the first in the Department of Sewanee, to make a move towards a Diocesan organization. This organization was partially effected in the autumn of 1912 in Fayetteville, and will be completed in the near future. The formation of five new Branches in the last six months was mentioned as most encouraging.

"Recreation in the Girls' Friendly Society" was presented in a most excellent paper by Miss Bettie Windley, of New Bern, who showed what an advantage the different forms of recreation are to the girls physically, mentally and morally. Following this a paper was read by Miss Alice Mallet, of Fayetteville, "The Girls' Friendly as a Parish Organization", in which she showed how valuable the organization might be in the life of any Parish in helping to mould the lives of the girls and young women along the best lines of character and usefulness. For the benefit of those who were less familiar with the purpose and work of the G. F. S. the President made a few impromptu remarks sketching briefly its origin in England and its subsequent organization in America; emphasizing its importance and influence on the lives of girls and its adaptability to any social condition.

The period allotted to the G. F. S. meeting in the Parish House was too short to accomplish the business planned, so the meeting was transferred to Mrs. Collier's, next door, where in the absence of Mrs. Cox, who was attending the meeting of the Juniors, Miss Windley acted as Secretary. Reports were read from the following branches: Christ Church, New Bern; The George Memorial, Riverside, New Bern; St. John's and St. Philip's Fayetteville; Good Shepherd and Ascension, Wilmington; all of which showed gratifying progress in the year's work.

A letter from Miss Lewin, of Washington, D. C., who has been so successful in Extension Work in the South, was read by the President, in which were many most helpful sug-

gestions for the work and the new organization. A discussion followed as to time of meeting, and acting upon a suggestion of Miss Lewin, two meetings a year were approved, one in the autumn and one at the time of the Diocesan Council.

The President then announced that the election of Secretary and Treasurer was in order. At the organization meeting in Fayetteville, Miss Windley was chosen, but found it impossible to accept and Mrs. Cox, of New Bern, was appointed by the President to fill the office until a regular election could be held. Miss Windley then nominated Mrs. Cox and Miss Mallett nominated Miss McNeill, of Fayetteville, and the latter was elected, the Officers and Associates present as delegates voting. The election of fifteen members and the adoption of the Constitution was left over for the fall meeting.

The meeting then adjourned.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I. The name of this Society shall be "The Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions and Parochial Society of the Diocese of East Carolina."

ART. II. The object of this Society is, by means of united and systematic effort, to arouse greater interest in Parochial work, and especially to diffuse Missionary intelligence, to increase Missionary activity among the women of the Diocese, to unite previously existing Societies and to encourage the formation of Societies where there are none.

ART. III. The Church itself is a Missionary Society, and every person by baptism becomes a member of this Society; therefore, every baptized woman in this Diocese is a member of this Society.

ART. IV. The officers of this Society shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretary and such other officers as may be needed; all of whom shall be appointed by the Bishop, and shall constitute the Board of Managers. The Board of Managers shall meet from time to time at the call of the President. The Secretary of the Junior Auxiliary shall be a member of the Board of Managers.

ART. V. The President shall give notice of all meetings, call meetings together, and preside over them. She shall conduct the correspondence of the Society with Missionaries, with the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, and do whatever in her judgment is best to advance the work of the Society.

ART. VI. The Senior Vice-President shall preside over the meetings during the absence of the President. Each Vice-President shall be President of the Society of her Convocation. If the Vice-President or Secretary of a Convocation shall be invited to visit a Branch, said Branch shall pay her traveling expenses. If the Vice-President or Secretary goes into a Parish or Mission to establish a new Branch her expenses shall be paid by the Convocation which she represents.

ART VII. The duty of the Secretary is to prepare an annual report for circulation in the Diocese, keep record of all meetings, and prepare an abstract of the minutes to be read at the annual meeting.

ART. VIII. The duty of the Treasurer is to take charge of all money sent to her for Missionary purposes and to disburse the same, as directed by the Parish or Mission sending or by the Board of Managers. She shall prepare a report at the annual meeting of all money which has passed through her hands during the preceding year.

ART. IX. All Parochial Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, the Junior Department and Babies' Branch, together with all Woman's Parochial organizations shall be entitled to one representative. All Diocesan officers of this organization shall be ex-officio representatives.

Amendment 1. Only Junior Leaders, Baby Branch Leaders or Juniors over sixteen shall be entitled to go as delegates; exception being made when the leader cannot go and has a younger Junior member capable of being a help to her by going, in which case she has the same privilege as other delegates.

ART. X. The Annual Meeting shall be held at each Council of the Diocese, and general meetings may be held at such other times and places as may be designated by the Bishop of the Diocese and the President of the Society.

ART. XI. The Society shall be divided into three sections according to the territory comprised in the three Convocations of the Diocese. Each section shall meet at least once a year in connection with the regular meetings of the Convocation.

ART XII. This Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of those present at the Annual Meeting.
