MINUTES

*of the 4th Semi-Annual Meeting of the Easton Branch
of the Woman's Auxiliary held in Trinity Church,
Elkton, November 19 and 20, 1901.*

On Tuesday night there was a public missionary service at 7.30 o'clock. The speakers were the Rev. George C. Hall, D. D., Archdeacon of Wilmington, Diocese of Delaware, and the Rev. Dr. William M. Jefferis, rector of Calvary Church, Wilmington.

At 7.30 Wednesday morning the Holy Communion was administered by the rector, the Rev. Mr. Schouler, assisted by Dr. Jefferis. At 10.30 Dr. Hall read morning prayer. The business meeting then followed.

Mr. Schouler welcomed the visitors and spoke of the spirit and work of the Auxiliary, making a touching allusion to the late Mrs. Mary A. E. Twing. Mrs. Physick responded. The roll-call by branches showed eight Woman's and five Junior delegates. Some other women were also present as were also several most welcome visitors. After the minutes of the annual meeting held in Salisbury were read and approved, the delegates reported work done since that time.

Mrs. J. Lane Finley reported a Junior Auxiliary in St. Luke's Parish, Church Hill.

The Diocesan treasurer, Miss Josie Dawson, and Mrs. William T. Malster, president of the Babies' branch, read their reports.

Mrs. Physick read the report of the delegate to San Francisco at the tri-annual meeting. Mrs. George C. Hall talked about the meeting in San Francisco and suggested that the tri-annual offering be changed to an annual one.

Mrs. Physick advocated a treasurer for the United Offering. There was no action on either suggestion.

Reports of exhibits displayed at San Francisco and some account of the life and work of Mrs. Twing were read by Miss Josie Dawson.

The president appointed Mrs. Schouler, Miss Josie Dawson and Mrs. Finley a committee to draft resolutions on the death of Mrs. Twing.

Mrs. Hall talked of the work at Beaufort, N. C., and asked if three of the Junior Branches would take a scholarship at ten dollars each. The matter was left with the President of the Junior Branches. Mrs. Physick then asked for pledges to the memorial for Mrs. Twing. The delegates present responded for their respective branches.

Miss Schouler read a letter from Asheville, N. C., telling us what articles are best suited for Christmas boxes.

An invitation to a reception at the rectory at the close of the afternoon session from Mr. Schouler was accepted. An invitation was extended from Christ Church branch, Easton, to the diocesan branch to come to Easton for the annual meeting next May, and it was accepted. The business of the morning over the meeting adjourned.

The afternoon session was opened at 2.30 by singing a hymn.

The Committee then reported the following resolutions on the death of Mrs. Twing:

"The Womans' Auxiliary of the Diocese of Easton assembled in Semi-annual Session in Trinity Church, Elkton, Md., desires to place upon its record an expression of the deep sense of the great loss sustained by the Auxiliary throughout its national membership in the lamented departure, still fresh in memory, of Mrs. Mary A. E. Twing, late honorary Secretary of the Auxiliary, its founder and first President. She was imbued with large missionary zeal and abundant in good works.

"In common with our National Church we shall treasure her priceless memory and find her noble example the strong inspiration to Christian devotion and Christian deeds. To those who best knew her high worth we extend our heartfelt sympathy as we make the grateful acknowledgement of what God wrought through her for the furtherance of His kingdom and cause.

"*Resolved*, That the foregoing minute be placed upon the records of the Auxiliary; and that a copy be forwarded to the family of the late Mrs. Twing."

At Mrs. Physick's suggestion it was decided to send a letter of congratulation to the Rev. Mr. Ingle on his advancement to the Bishoprick of Hankow, China.

Mrs. Malster, President of the Babies' Branch, read an address on the history of the Branch. It is nine years since its organization.

Mrs. Hall, President of the Wilmington, Delaware, Junior Branch, read a paper on Junior work.

Mrs. Physick then talked about the United Offering, its beginning and growth; and thanked the Elkton Branch for kindness and hospitality. There was an adjournment to Trinity Church rectory to a pleasant reception given by Mr. and Mrs. Schouler.

The Ninth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held in Christ Church, Saint Peter's Parish, Easton, Tuesday and Wednesday, 6th and 7th of May, 1902.

The officers and delegates arrived Monday evening, and a meeting was held at 8 o'clock for business consultation.

A "Quiet Day" was conducted on Tuesday by the Rev. Wm. A. Coale, of North Sassafras parish. The Holy Communion was administered at 7.30 o'clock A. M., Rev. Mr. Coale being the celebrant. At 10 o'clock Mr. Coale said morning prayed and then explained the object of the "Quiet Day," and of the obligations of every member of the Auxiliary, which are prayer, service and study. All present were requested to unite in singing and in silent prayer. Morning service ended at noon.

The afternoon service began with praise and prayers, followed by a continuance of the morning subject. There was a missionary service in the evening at 7.45. The Rector, the Rev. Mr. Baldwin, welcomed the visitors. The Very Rev. Edward R. Rich made an address, followed by a sermon from the Rev. Dr. Henry B. Martin, of Chestertown.

WEDNESDAY.

At 10 o'clock Wednesday morning, a business meet-

ing held in the parish house, was begun by saying the Apostles' Creed, and prayer by the rector, the Rev. Mr. Baldwin. Roll call followed. Thirteen branches were represented. The secretary read the minutes of the fall meeting, which were approved. The president then read her annual address. She also read a letter from Miss Emory, thanking the Auxiliary for money given towards obtaining an organ for Bishop Ingle, and concluded with some happy remarks on the "Quiet Day."

Mrs. Malster's report of the Babies' Branch was read by Miss Josie Dawson. Four new branches have been formed during the year and a number of members have been added to the old branches. The Treasurer read her report. Mrs. Vanderbogart gave an interesting account of what was done at the meeting in San Francisco. The reports from the parochial branches were offered by the respective delegates therefrom.

An invitation to the rectory at the close of the morning service was given to all present and was accepted.

Pledges were asked to assist in furnishing the church at Ocean City. The delegates responded.

The question of continuing the fall meetings was discussed. It was voted upon and decided to continue them. The delegates from East New Market and Church Hill asked to have the fall meeting, and an invitation was read from Snow Hill. The invitation from Church Hill was accepted, and an invitation to meet in Cambridge, May, 1903, was also accepted.

It was decided to give five dollars to the Church Publishing Co. from the central fund.

A vote of thanks was given the Rev. Mr. Coale for the instruction and pleasure he gave the Auxiliary on the "Quiet Day."

Rev. Mr. Vanderbogart was unanimously made an honorary member of the Woman's Auxiliary. Mrs. Bayly, Mrs. Vanderbogart, Mrs. Hollyday, Mrs. Hines and Mrs. Hurtt were appointed a committee to nominate officers for the ensuing year. The morning's business ended with singing a hymn.

The afternoon session began at 2.30 with a hymn, and then the following names were submitted by the nomi-

nating committee and the officers were elected, as follows:

President, Mrs. Anna E. Physick; vice-presidents, Mrs. William H. Wallis, Mrs. J. Lane Finley, Mrs. Addie H. Byrd; recording secretary, Mrs. G. E. Haddaway; corresponding secretary, Miss Rebecca Wickes; treasurer, Miss Josie P. Dawson; correspondent for the Church Periodical Club, Mrs. Louisa P. Holliday; treasurer of the united offering, Mrs. J. T. Keas.

Officers of the Junior Branch: President, Miss E. May Stevens; corresponding secretary, Miss Nellie Shackleford; recording secretary, Miss M. Adele France; treasurer, Miss Isabel Mackall; treasurer united offering, Miss Adah Brewington.

A letter from the bishop of the missionary district of Asheville, thanking the auxiliary for contributions to a box sent him, was read by Miss Wickes.

The delegates of the Babies' Branches then made their reports.

The Junior roll call showed seven delegates present. Miss E. May Stevens read her report; and the parochial delegates reported the work done during the year. Mrs. Physick notified the Juniors that hereafter they will work independent of the Woman's Branch and will have their own diocesan and officers.

Miss Sabine, missionary to Alaska, talked to the Juniors about the children in Anvik and of work done by the Juniors there. At the conclusion of Miss Sabine's address the children gave her a vote of thanks. On motion by Miss Wilkins, resolutions on the death of Mrs. Mary A. E. Twing were passed. Hymn 254 was sung, and there was an adjournment to the rectory.

At 7.45 there was a service at which Miss Sabine addressed a large audience telling of her work at Anvik and of the traits of character and habits of the people there.

Miss Sabine was followed by a touching appeal from Mrs. Physick to the women of the Auxiliary.

The ninth annual meeting was then closed with the benediction by the rector, the Rev. L. B. Baldwin.

*To the Officers and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary
in the Diocese of Easton.*

The past year shows some increase in the Woman's and Junior Auxiliary in our Diocese, both in the value of boxes and money given.

No new branches have been organized in the Woman's, though we have strong hopes one will be shortly in Centreville, and at St. Mark's, Perryville, where over a year ago they disbanded, owing to lack of interest. They are now hoping to organize with renewed interest.

Some of the branches have done well, I might say their best, but in some of our strongest parishes, the Auxiliary is so weak we ask ourselves why it should be. Is it indifference or lack of knowledge. Do the people wish to know? if so, surely they can learn. Any information asked is only too gladly given. They find no trouble in gaining information on any subject they may be interested in. And why should they, in the missionary work of the church, they say they love.

Ten parishes have contributed to a Bishop's box valued at \$153.56, that was sent in April, to Bishop Horner, of the missionary district of Asheville, and one parish gave money for the same work. The contents of a Bishop's box is supposed to consist of clothing, household linen and anything that may be useful in a family, and to be distributed to the missionaries by their Bishop, who well know their needs. Some of the articles in our last box, I might say about one-half, did well for that purpose, but many of the garments will have to be given to the mountaineers, for while a good many were new, many were old, and in some of the new the materials used were so coarse and common no one could think of offering such things to a missionary. Let me urge that in the future before you offer anything for a missionary box to ask yourself, would I wear that? is that good enough for me? Often garments are out-grown, though perfectly good, those would be acceptable, but do not, I beg of you, send anything unless in good condition; no worn-out button holes, or any garment that needs repairing in any way. Always put each article in perfect order before sending to a box, and above all, *never, never* send old, soiled garments that can be of no possible

use to anyone. Remember, that missionaries and their families are gentle people with tastes as refined as your own, and it is an insult to them and a far greater insult to God to offer such things. There is not one Auxiliary in this Diocese that cannot give something that would be really acceptable for a box! it may be little, but let that little be of the best.

Some of the reports have been sent in more promptly than before, and while some were correctly made out, many were so confused it was almost impossible to get them in order. Had it not been for the kindness of the treasurer, in letting me have her report, more than one hundred dollars would not have been reported by the secretary. I tried last year sending report blanks to each parish immediately after the annual meeting, asking that all work be put down at the time it was done. Had this plan been carried out there would have been no trouble in having each report perfectly correct. Some lost the papers, others laid them aside until time to send them in; then much money that had been sent to the treasurer for different purposes was not reported to the secretary. I should be much gratified if any suggestion could be made that would enable each parish secretary to have her report sent in on time, and to be correct. All parishes of the Woman's Auxiliary have reported but three of the Juniors have failed to come to me. They are Cecilton, Princess Anne and Centreville, a little of what they have done was gathered from the treasurer's report, but I feel confident that is not all. One Junior has been organized during the year, that at St. Lukes, Church Hill, and the church at Cecilton has revived, so we shall hope soon to hear of good work being done there.

The branches responded promptly for the memorial to Mrs. Twing, and gave altogether \$60.05. The whole amount pledged and needed \$15,000, has been raised, and will be used at once for an addition to St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai, China. The money, \$65.00, for Bishop Ingle's organ is in hand and will be sent as soon as possible.

The United Offering made in San Francisco last October, amounted to \$107,000. I would ask your especial attention to the next United Offering to be made in

Boston in 1904, and to be used entirely for woman's work in the Domestic and Foreign fields, and for helping to care for broken-down women workers. The last offering from our Diocese amounted to only \$339.77. Let us put forth every effort to make the next much larger, and it can be done if each member will give each day or week a given sum, each according to her means.

The parochial reports show there has been contributed during the year, in money, \$719.48, and boxes valued at \$666.57, making a total of \$1,386.05, an increase of \$198.07 over 1901.

The secretary has written 57 letters and 84 cards, and received 40 letters and 11 cards; has expended for stationery, postage and sending out leaflets, \$3.18.

Report of the Diocesan Branch of the Junior Auxiliary of Easton.

We have this year only one new branch to report for the Junior auxiliary—that of St. Luke's, Church Hill, organized November 6th, 1901, with Mrs. Levi Clough as president, Miss Louise Hall as secretary and Miss Grace Newman, treasurer, and a membership of fourteen, almost as good as new is the one at Cecilton. St. Stephen's, North Sassafras parish, which has been working quietly all to itself for nearly a year, but now comes to light in a most satisfactory manner, full of the right spirit and with a desire to do good work in the future towards spreading the Master's Kingdom.

Chesapeake City has also taken heart again, brought together its scattered members, and has a good report though last year also a few faithful members would not allow the spark to die out, but struggled on without any organization, and accomplished some good work. All honor to such devoted spirit. Salisbury is *just now* without the care of its most efficient directress, and Centreville has lost its directress. Mrs. Tucker has been obliged to resign because of illness in her family. We hope these places will soon be filled, or resumed. Some of us are persuaded that we could do more effective work if all the branches would combine, and as far as possible work for the same object.

I consulted Miss Emery, who approved of the plan, and suggested that we prepare Christmas presents for the Pine Ridge Mission, South Dakota, in charge of the Rev. Mr. Cleveland. Accordingly, I wrote to all the branches, asking their co-operation. Several responded favorably, others had already been pledged to other objects, some had been working for sometime for favorite objects, but in most instances they promised to take up the work during the summer and be ready to join us when we send our boxes in the early autumn. Before undertaking this work, those of us who were in Salisbury and had the pleasure of hearing Miss Mann describe the work of the mission in Japan, giving us in her bright way, little pictures of home-life in the land of the rising

sun—and more especially of woman's life there—felt that it would be a sweet task for the Juniors of Easton to rescue one little girl from such sad surroundings, to put her where she would learn the truths of the Gospel and rise to the dignity of christian womanhood. We are sure that the children would learn to love this little girl—to have almost a sense of ownership in her as they watch her course from year to year.

I also recommended this to the branches. The response has been most encouraging, though not quite enough to justify us in at once assuming the responsibility. The sum required is not very alarming, only \$25 yearly, which at the modest tax of \$2.00 for each branch would need the entire number—12—to join it.

The Orphanage is that of the Holy Trinity at Oji, near Tokyo, in charge of the Rev. Mr. Ishii. Even if we undertake no other concentrated work, I would urge the Juniors to try this. The effort is not great and the idea is in entire harmony with the spirit of children's work—to help another child. It has been found difficult to interest boys (poor things, they cannot sew for boxes), so we have experimented a little in a more masculine field, that of business enterprise, at any rate, it sounds like it. We issue certificates of stock at 10 cents a share in the proposed boys' school at the mouth of the Tananna river in Alaska. I have suggested this idea to the branches as a means of raising our portion of the additional \$30,000 promised by the auxiliary to the Board of Missions. Scholarships in the different fields have been suggested to us, costing \$25 in Africa to \$100 in Alaska yearly, but, as some of the branches had undertaken this work already, it was thought that we might send the money raised in this way to the Board as our quota and not take up a new object. It will require the co-operation of all the branches; some have already reported contributions given to the Rev. Mr. Prevost, whether that has gone as a "special" I do not know. I wrote to the branches before Lent, I think, and tried to explain to them that it would be wiser to send the contributions to the Diocesan treasurer through the Junior president, as otherwise it would not be credited to us as our quota. I feel that we have much cause for thankfulness in the progress of the Junior Branch of

Easton. To be sure, the cry comes to me sometimes: "We cannot interest the children, our membership is falling off." Well, children must grow up, many must leave the home nest for school, but others come on to take their places, and the reports show good work, fine results in the face of obstacles that are almost insurmountable. It all shows we are growing, learning to feel our responsibility for those who sit in darkness, and I hope the Juniors are studying and will grow to be intelligent workers, knowing the great need for their work and prayers.

In the providence of God our Junior Branch of the Diocese of Easton, from a nucleus of two or three parochial branches has grown and blossomed until it now numbers twelve, with a hope of several more in the near future. God has touched the hearts of good women in our parishes, and taught them to realize that as children are educated and trained in preparation for other duties of life, so should their minds be informed and their hearts warmed to love, and to labor for the gift of the greatest of all blessings to their far-away sisters and brothers in heathern lands, and the dear children have responded as only fresh young hearts can, and though the service may be often imperfect and sometimes interrupted through the thoughtlessness of youth, yet the warm, tender heart is under it all, and we feel that it will be accepted and the small effort blessed into exceeding great fruitage. With our increase in numbers has come a corresponding increase in responsibility and an accumulation of business, so it has, therefore, been thought wise by the President of the Woman's Branch, under whose fostering care we have progressed thus far—that we should be formed into a separate organization with our own Diocesan officers. This arrangement, we understand, only refers to the business department. We are glad to be still under the supervision of the Woman's Branch, to be able to ask and receive counsel and assistance and loving care, and I am sure that in this new arrangement the Juniors will be spurred on to greater efforts and truer faithfulness by the desire to be worthy of its parentage.

**Report of "Babies' Branch" of the Woman's Auxiliary
of the Diocese of Easton, May 6, 1902.**

Another twelve months has been added to the life of our "Babies' Branch," and the time for another annual report has come to us

It is a matter of deep regret to me that I will not be able to make that report in person, but I could not possibly arrange so to do. I have always been so encouraged and helped by meeting those who were interested with me in the work, that I have come away cheered and uplifted, and ready for the work to come. But this time I shall have to be content with the many kind, cheering letters I have received from each and all who have charge of the "Little Helpers," and I want right here to thank them all, most heartily for their encouraging assurances, and for the zealous care of the work during the closing year.

From various unavoidable causes, our receipts from the Mite Boxes have not equaled those of last year, but our membership has increased considerably, not only by

additions to the branches already in existence, but by the organizing of several new branches, viz: In Elkton, Snow Hill and Christ Church, Easton.

We have now branches organized in thirteen different parishes with an aggregate membership of two hundred and seven, as follows:

I have written 57 letters and 20 postal cards to the different parishes in the interest of the work; to most of them I have received encouraging replies.
