**MINUTES**

*of the Eighth Semi-Annual Meeting of the Easton Branch of  
the Woman's Auxiliary, held in St. Luke's Church,  
Queenstown, October 17-18, 1905.*

The first service, with a large attendance, was held Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock conducted by the Rector, Rev. Mr. Batte, assisted by the Rev. Mr. Stehll, of Centreville, and Arch Deacon Jones, of Idaho. Mr. Stehll gave a fine sermon on work and zeal in the Lord's vineyard. Then followed a preliminary address by the Arch Deacon on his work in the far West. Wednesday at 9 A. M. there was a celebration of the Holy Communion. At 10 A. M. the meeting was called to order by the president, Mrs. Finley. Eight officers and fourteen delegates answered roll call, calling forth expressions of pleasure, at the good attendance, from our president. The minutes of the last meeting were read by Mrs. Philemon Davidson, recording secretary pro tem.

Mrs. E. L. Hooper was called upon for her report of the finances which was very satisfactory. Mrs. Hooper earnestly requested prompt payment of dues and pledges. Mrs. John Keas, treasurer of the United Offering next gave her report. Fifteen Branches heard from. Finding that many persons did not understand the object of the United Offering, Mrs. Keas, in her usual clear and comprehensive manner explained the object and necessity, urging the members to recognize the importance of complying with the demand and how much embarrassment would be spared the Branches. She proposed the penny-a-day system, which would raise the incredible amount of \$1908.95 a year, without taxing the givers. The responsibility and work of the Treasurer is not easy, and without the co-operation of the members of the Auxiliary, very irksome. No work can be accomplished without money. Let the money boxes be overflowing.

Mrs. L. P. Hollyday, correspondent for Church Periodical Club, was next called. She reported the work growing, but much more help needed and more librarians. In her most gentle persuasive way suggested that contributors pay their own postage on papers sent, also that papers, magazines or books be sent with some regularity. A motion was made and carried that each Branch should contribute 25c a year for postage and expressage. Mrs. Hollyday reported many letters received expressing great appreciation for literature. Sad, lonely, suffering hours had been lightened by books and papers with appeals for more.

Mrs. Finley thanked Mrs. Hollyday for her zealous and efficient work, and announced that Christ Church, Easton, and Trinity Cathedral were the banner Branches of the Diocese. Berlin was highly commended.

Mrs. Hooper presented a petition from Mr. Vanderbogart to raise funds for a clergy house at Ocean City where the weary over-worked clergymen could go for rest every summer. Several church women have promised free meals. He asks the Branches to take this proposition for earnest reflection, so of course, he asks for help only, not for all of the \$25,000 needed for building each Branch to give as able.

Mrs. Finley asked attention while she made a personal statement. Many had asked her if the report was true that she had resigned her office as Diocesan President. She stated in a dignified beautiful manner her appreciation of her office, that she had no intention of resigning. She had visited within the year, every branch, and now she expected her Vice-Presidents to carry on the work under her instruction. The Recording Secretary moved to give her a rising vote of esteem and appreciation of her well-done work and interest, which was promptly carried. Reports of the Branches were now called for. Each reported fair work for summer months. Kent Island enrolled a Branch.

A discussion now arose as to the propriety of having collations at the monthly meetings. Many views offered for and against. Mrs. Finley thought that the spirit of the meetings was entirely done away with, giving place to the social feature, our work is of a prayerful, serious nature, and one hour is but a fragment of time, that can well be spared for God's work, and that we should forego the desire of mixing duty with festivity.

A motion that Mrs. Keas, Mrs. Hooper and Mrs. Hollyday should make an amendment on article 9th for the May meeting was carried.

A letter from Mrs. Peterkin read on box received and appreciated. Another letter from Miss Sabine, from Alaska, thanking for a bundle of pieces sent by the Juniors from Church Hill.

Mrs. Hooper suggested asking a reduction on delegates fare on the B. C. & A. and Queen Anne roads; thought Mr. Benjamin would be pleased to grant a cent a mile.

The delegates were requested not to call our meetings Convocations, but Annual and Semi-Annual meetings of the Woman's Auxiliary and giving this quotation:

"Money is the outward and visible sign of the interest felt and shown."

The meeting then adjourned with prayer by Mr. Mitchell, of Centreville.

The afternoon session opened at 2 o'clock and was devoted to the enthusiastic Juniors, Miss France, president, the session lasting till five o'clock. The most delightful part of the afternoon was an hour of instructive talk by Miss Mahoney on work in Africa. Surely her crown of glory will be bright. A reward for the hard, unselfish work in that field so unattractive to most workers. She gave an idea of the crude manner of living and eating, displayed articles of *almost imaginary* clothing, some articles requiring good eyesight to see at all. She has great faith in her work—so great that she is giving her health and life to the cause.

Evening prayer at 8 o'clock followed by an interesting talk by Arch Deacon Jones. He said the work in that far West is harder than among the heathens, the almost insurmountable obstacles of stolid indifference is beyond expression. No one wants to be enlightened, making the missionarie's heart sad to breaking, but urged young men to enter the field and to hope and pray and wait for the promised spirit.

Mrs. Finley, in the name of the Auxiliary, thanked the people of Queenstown for their hospitality, and with a few remarks to the Branches closed this very delightful meeting, the first held in Queenstown. All expressed great pleasure at seeing the quaint town and the lovely church, also were well pleased with the earnest beautiful hospitality extended to all guests.

## MINUTES

*of the meeting of the Women's Auxiliary, held in Chestertown,  
Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday 15th, 16th and 17th  
of May, 1906.*

The thirteenth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held in Emmanuel Church, Chestertown, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday 15th, 16th and 17th of May, 1906.

The Diocesan Officers met at 4 P. M. Tuesday in the Parish Building for discussion of business and it was decided to change the annual meetings from the third to the fourth week in May.

The visiting speakers were Rev. Floyd Tompkins, D. D., rector of Holy Trinity Church, Philadelphia; Archdeacon B. M. Spurr, of West Virginia; Miss Stuart, of Virginia; Rev. Peregrine Wroth, rector of the Church of the Messiah, Baltimore, and Miss Richmond, of China.

The opening service was in Emmanuel Church, Tuesday 8 P. M., when Dr. Tompkins preached. After service a hearty welcome was given the guests in the Parish Building.

On Wednesday at 10 A. M., Holy Communion was administered by Dr. Tompkins and Dr. Martin, the rector, in the church. Following this service, Dr. Tompkins held the "Quiet Hour," dividing the time into three meditations. After this service a luncheon was served in the Parish Building.

At 2.30 P. M., after prayer and an address of welcome by Dr. Martin, the business session of the Junior Branch was held. At this meeting the name Babies Branch was changed to that of Little Helpers.

At 8 P. M. there was service in the church, and addresses by Miss Stuart and Archdeacon Spurr.

On Thursday at 7.30 A. M. the Holy Communion was celebrated in the church by Dr. Martin, after the opening prayer and a few remarks by Dr. Martin in the Parish Building. Mrs. Finley called the business meeting of the Woman's Branch to order, a rising welcome was then given the visitors.

Twenty Branches responded to roll call, a new one, Kent Island has been organized.

After the report of the Recording Secretary was submitted, the President read her annual address, impressing the Branches of the necessity for appointing delegates who will attend the meetings and whose pledges will be kept, for these must be kept before Parochial pledges.

Mrs. Keas, the Treasurer for united offering, read her excellent address. Mrs. Hollyday's report showed an increase in the work of the Church Periodical Club. Archdeacon Spurr was called upon to talk of the work. Pledges of \$55 and a large amount of literature were then made by the different branches.

Noon-day prayers were said by the Rev. A. Vanderborgart.

Business was resumed by discussing whether there was a better way of making a committee for nominating Diocesan Officers. A motion was carried to continue the old way. A committee was then appointed to nominate officers for the ensuing year.

A resolution was passed for an article to be incorporated in the constitution, "that a nominating committee be appointed, by the President, at every annual meeting, for the nominations of Diocesan Officers."

A committee was appointed to amend articles of the Constitution.

A recess was taken till 2 P. M. and luncheon was served as on the previous day.

At 2 P. M. the meeting came to order. Miss Emory's annual letter was read, trusting that the three summer months may be fruitful ones and may see the \$3,000 needed, given for the building of a school for the training of mission women in Tokyo District; the \$2,000 called for, for the junior class-room of St. Paul's College, Tokyo, and the \$5,000 given for the training school for bible women in Hankow.

A most interesting address was then made by Miss Richmond.

The nominating committee reported having made no changes in the Woman's Diocesan Officers, and in Junior Branch Miss Annie E. Dashiell was appointed Treasurer for the united offering and Miss Mary Jenkins, Vice-President of middle convocation. The Parochial reports were read, showing increased work done by most of the branches.

Mrs. Finley earnestly requested the Branches to observe Quiet Day, and said that all reports for the annual meeting must be sent in by the first of May or there will be no credit given them until another year.

The following pledges were made to give \$50 to the Rev. H. G. England for a piece of furniture for his church in Berlin, \$25 to continue the work of Miss Mahoney, in Africa, and \$25 to Archdeacon Spurr for his work in the mountains in West Virginia.

Invitations to meet in Port Deposit in October and in Elkton in May 1907 were accepted.

After a few pleasant words from Dr. Martin, Mrs. Finley, in behalf of the Auxiliary, thanked the rector and Emmanuel Branch for their great hospitality.

The business meeting then adjourned. At 8 P. M. there was service in the church, an address by Miss Richmond on the work in China and a sermon by the Rev. Peregrine Wroth upon the text "Who will have all Men to be saved," 1 Tim. 2; 4.

The rector then made a few appropriate remarks and closed with benediction.

## Church Periodical Club Report May, 1906.

The work in the "Church Periodical Club" has increased in our Diocese, and I feel encouraged, and believe that the interest will continue to spread until every Parish will have a librarian, even if the work accomplished the first year is very limited. In any work we undertake we must expect to meet with difficulties—such is life. But much can be accomplished by continued perseverance. Librarians must ever be on the lookout for an opportunity to ask a Parishoner if he or she would not like to have the privilege of sending their papers and magazines, after they have finished reading them, to persons who are unable to supply reading matter for themselves. Then explain to them what is expected of them. Tell them addresses will be supplied them and they can mail their papers with the proper postage on them, or, if they prefer not to have this trouble, can send the magazines or papers to the librarian or even let her call for them, they supplying her with the postage. I think there must be very few Parishes in this Diocese that at any rate two or three papers could not be procured. Librarians must bear in mind (I find it is sometimes forgotten) that literature sent which is expected to be credited to the work of the "C. P. C.," must have their addresses from the Correspondent of this organization. I have discovered once or twice that papers were simply sent to friends, which is all right, but librarians are expected, at any rate, to report such a desire to the Correspondent of the Club and this will be noted on the regular book and reported to the Mission House in New York. We are now sending 125 papers and magazines, and in the past year have sent 15 boxes or barrels of literature. This has gone from one end of the United States to the other and some to Canada. Last year I had 112 papers and magazines to report. Expenses are more than many suppose and this is one of the difficulties. I have received \$4.25 from the Parishes, and paid out \$3.50 assisting Librarians, leaving 75 cents for personal expenses for postage, stationery, sending leaflets, etc., for a year. Two or three Parishes failed to pay the assessment. The small amount is, of course, a great help but I have in some instances given \$1.50 to one Librarian for freight on a box. If each librarian could collect freight on their boxes, in their Parish, it would be better, but it seems they cannot and I always try to help. Some

Librarians are doing fine work but report having paid out as much as \$5.00 for freight and postage, and most of this from their own pockets, with perhaps 50 cents or \$1.00 from me. It is impossible to send off 125 papers and magazines and 14 boxes or barrels without money, and we cannot expect the correspondent and librarian to bear this expense. It should be divided. I have spoken of the difficulties, now let me speak of the pleasure we give to so many by denying ourselves a little, and in fact in many cases no self-denial, but simply for want of reflection and often from need of information. I receive many letters of gratitude and thanks to the Diocese of Easton, for the great pleasure afforded by the recipients of these 125 papers, weekly or monthly, and from schools and charitable institutions for the barrels and boxes of interesting reading furnished those deprived of so many pleasures of life, and more particularly of the great pleasure of reading. I am sure we do not appreciate the pleasure we give by so little trouble and self-denial. I pray we may have a boom in our club in the next twelve months.

Before closing I must mention our Banner librarian from Trinity Cathedral, Easton. She has 28 papers and magazines on her list. Let me have half that number to report in 1907 from half my librarians. I now have 19 librarians and I want one new one before I leave Chestertown, as I would like to say I have 20. But I will detain you no longer and close, with thanks to my librarians for the efforts they are making and beg they will not flag and not be discouraged. Any assistance I can render them will be cheerfully given.

The president read her address which told of increase over last year in both boxes and money; mission study commenced and encouraged the sending of Xmas boxes. All the branches have met their pledges and the President urged each member to contribute to the Central Fund. Report of Cor. Sec., Miss Henry, was then called for, in which she urged the officers and members to be more prompt with the annual reports. Only Emmanuel Branch had observed the Quiet Day and Miss France urged hereafter it be universally observed.

It was decided no credit be given any branch for money or boxes sent, unless reported 1st day of May, and all monies must be sent direct to the Diocesan Treasurer. The President then spoke of the United Offering as a Thank Offering and urged it reach \$100 for 1907. She also spoke of taking more interest in sending delegates to the annual meeting.

## CONSTITUTION.

---

### ARTICLE I.

This Association shall be known as the "Easton Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary" to the Board of Missions.

### ARTICLE II.

Its object shall be by means of individual and corporate effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence and increase missionary activity among the women of the Diocese. Also to unite societies already in existence, and to urge the formation of such, where there are none.

### ARTICLE III.

All Parish Societies and all individuals desiring to be members of the Diocesan Branch will be so considered. The officers of a Parochial Branch shall be a President, Vice-Presidents, Secretaries and Treasurer. These members to be taken from the women of the Parish Branch with the Rector as President ex-officio.

### ARTICLE IV.

The officers of this Association shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary, Treasurer, United Offering Treasurer and a Correspondent for the Church Periodical Club.

### ARTICLE V.

It shall be the duty of the President to preside at business meetings : to call special meetings when occasion shall arise, and together with the Vice-Presidents to obtain fresh information from the missionary fields to be circulated whenever opportunity shall offer.

### ARTICLE VI.

It shall be the duty of the Vice-Presidents to enlist the interest and sympathy of the parishes about them, in the different sections of the Diocese, and to preside over meetings in the absence of the President.

**ARTICLE VII.**

It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Association, especially with the General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, to send out notices of stated and special meetings, to keep a record of missionary reports and to prepare an annual report. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep minutes of the proceedings of the Association at the annual and semi-annual meeting.

**ARTICLE VIII.**

The duty of the Treasurer shall be to receive, and to keep account of all monies contributed to the Diocesan organization, to pay all debts and to present an annual report. The United Offering Treasurer is to be the custodian of the United Offering Fund and to present an annual report.

**ARTICLE IX.**

There shall be an annual meeting of the Branch the fourth Wednesday and Thursday in May, and a semi-annual meeting in the autumn, time and place to be designated by the President.

**ARTICLE X.**

Elections of officers shall take place at the annual meeting. This election to be by a nominating committee of five members to be appointed by the President. These officers shall continue in office one year or until their successors shall be appointed.

**ARTICLE XI.**

In order to defray necessary expenses for printing, postage and stationary for the use of the Association, as well as to meet objects to which the association may be pledged as a whole, a Central Fund will be formed by the contribution of ten cents yearly from each member where it is possible.

**ARTICLE XII.**

The Constitution may be altered or amended by a majority vote of the members present at an Annual Meeting, one month's notice having been given of the contemplated change.
