RECORDING SECRETARY'S NINETEENTH ANNUAL REPORT, 1911—1912.

The Nineteenth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held in St. Paul's Church, Berlin, Wednesday and Thursday, October 23 and 24, 1912.

Archdeacon Spurr, of West Virginia; Archdeacon Steele, of Havana, Cuba, and the Rev. Mr. Allen, of Snow Hill, were the visitors.

The Little Helpers and Juniors held their business meetings Wednesday afternoon in the Parish House.

At 7.30 there was a service in the church, the Rev. Mr. Allen reading the lessons, Archdeacon Spurr making an address telling of his work among the prisoners, in the hospitals and among the mountaineers throughout his diocese.

Thursday morning at 7.30 the rector, Mr. Potter, administered the Holy Communion to a large number of the delegates.

At 9.30 A. M. the diocesan officers met for consultation.

The Quiet Morning was conducted by the Rev. Mr. Potter, the service lasting from 10 to 12 noon. Mr. Potter's address was most impressive, the 53rd chapter of Isaiah was taken and divided into four parts beginning with the *Atone-ment*. "We can hardly understand why our Lord should have suffered for us. Why He suffered? Because He was the good Shepherd, He gave His life, bore our sins and burden of solitude of being misunderstood and of being thought self-willed, and then the apparent failure when taken from prison to judgment and to the cross. But the growth of the church during nineteen centuries proves that the most living thing in the world is christianity. The cross of Christ can never fail, and after we have seen the shame, degradation and rejection, we now see His reward. We must have faith in the sacraments, confession and absolution which will produce restfulness and peace."

After Noon Day Prayers the Woman's Branch adjourned to the parish house and opened its business meeting with a beautiful and hearty welcome from Mr. Potter. In response Mrs. Finley said Berlin had been the match that was set to the torch, for the meeting was to have been held in the southern part of the diocese, but owing to domestic reasons it was impossible to have it there and in her dire need Mr.

Potter invited us. The roll was then called—five diocesan officers and fourteen delegates present. The delegates read their reports, and those branches not represented sent in reports. After these were read, Mrs. Finley spoke of the valuable work done by the late Miss Stevens, of Cambridge, especially in her own parish. Mrs. Tilghman, Miss Jenkins and Mrs. Keas were appointed a committee to draw up resolutions of respect to Miss Stevens' memory.

Miss Purnell, Mrs. Adkins, Mrs. Woolford, Mrs. Comegys and Mrs. Wilson were made the nominating committee for diocesan officers for the ensuing year. Meeting then adjourned until 2.30 P. M.

On re-assembling the Rev. Mr. Allen opened with prayer. Miss Wickes' resignation as Corresponding Secretary was read and accepted with regret. The secretary was requested to write Miss Wickes to that effect.

The Secretary read her report of last meeting. Miss Wickes' report was read. The reports, she says, have come in more promptly by sending out the blanks later. Four new branches have been organized since last meeting—Pocomoke, Cordova, Quantico and Longwoods—making our number 23. Miss Wickes wishes the branches to remember to report only auxiliary work and not church work. One parish has reported this year \$123.43, and when all that was given in, the parish was taken out of this amount, only \$70.05 remained for the auxiliary. Nothing must be reported except what is done for missions, and not missions in the parish. We have in money and boxes this year \$1,234.79.

The Treasurer in her report says the only fund that has increased this year is the Church Periodical Club, and that Shrewsbury's thirteen members have given the splendid sum of \$135.60, and as usual holds the banner of the diocese in auxiliary work. At the conclusion of this report, the President said she wanted to bring one word to us. "*Faithfulness*," faithful to the vows we made when we began this work; faithful to our rectors, to one another; faithful to our bishop; faithful to God; never to feel discouraged because some of the branches have not done so well this year, as long as we have one, especially Berlin. Is the faithfulness of the few who can do little any less than much that the greater parishes do? The work before the 23 branches of Woman's Auxiliary the coming year is to be faithful.

Mrs. Keas, in her report of the United Offering, advises every branch to have one meeting a year for the purpose of

teaching the members what the United Offering is in all its bearings. The offering of 1910 has placed in the mission field 140 women. They are working in the U. S. among the Indians, the Negroes, the mountain people, in the kindergarten schools and hospitals, in Alaska, in Honolulu, in Porto Rico and in the Phillipines. The history of 1913 will be what we make it; we have never yet taken a step backwards. Mrs. Keas asks that we will use the blue box and pledge ourselves to give something daily as a thank offering together with the prayer.

Miss Barroll read a fine report of the Church Periodical Club. It is steadily growing.

The nominating committee reported no new nominations with the exceptions of Mrs. Spencer Wright for Corresponding Secretary, to fill vacancy caused by Miss Wickes' resignation; Miss Urie, vice-president of Northern Convocation; Miss Gantt, vice-president of Middle Convocation, and Miss Margaret Harcastle as secretary for Juniors.

On motion of Miss Jenkins, it was decided to purchase now robes for Bishop Adams. Miss Jenkins was appointed treasurer for that fund. A resolution was passed to have an Educational Secretary in the diocese; Mrs. Tilghman Davidson was appointed to that office. The Secretary was requested to notify Mrs. Davidson of her appointment. Invitations were sent from Princess Anne and Trinity Cathedral for the spring meeting. The invitation to Trinity Cathedral was accepted. An invitation to Chestertown for the fall meeting was accepted.

Mrs. Finley was elected delegate to the General Convention in New York next October. Mrs. Keas was elected alternate.

A letter of thanks from the bishops was read for check of \$46.40, also for contribution to Diocesan Missions. A resolution was passed to withdraw our pledge for Diocesan Missions and to increase the Bishop's Fund to \$100 if possible.

At Mrs. Hooper's suggestion, designated pledges will be continued, but if they fall short, she will not have to make up the amount from Central Fund.

The following pledges were made: Bishop's Fund \$100, Miss Lusby \$25, Archdeacon Spurr \$25 to pay for educating a boy this year. The bishop's box is to be sent to West Virginia.

Letters were read from Miss Lusby thanking us for the sum of \$48 sent her and from the Mission House. Miss

Emery thinks our summer conference last year and other work of the officers will certainly tell.

A rising vote of thanks was given the rector and ladies of St. Paul's Branch for hospitality and kindness.

Mrs. Finley then drew our attention to the fact that we are leaving to work and we now ask God's blessing on the rector, our president, our bishop and on our auxiliary.

At 7.30 evening service was held in the church, Archdeacon Steele, of Havana, Cuba, made an address on his work and on the peculiarities and habits of his people.

RECORDING SECRETARY'S SIXTEENTH SEMI-ANNUAL REPORT, 1912—1913.

The Sixteenth Semi-Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held in Trinity Cathedral, Easton, Tuesday and Wednesday, April 22nd and 23rd, 1913.

The delegates arrived Tuesday. Miss E. T. Hicks, from the Phillipines, was the visitor.

By request of Mrs. Finley, a conference was held Tuesday evening in the Sunday school room for the study of lessons on the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, and of the course conducted in the institute at the Church Mission House by the president of the New York branch. This study was divided into five lessons to realize the strength and weakness of the Woman's Auxiliary.

The first aim is "to understand the purpose and organization of the Woman's Auxiliary."

The aim of the second lesson is "to discover why auxiliary meetings bore people, and how this can be remedied."

The third is "to grasp the necessity for definite knowledge in the auxiliary."

The fourth, "to appreciate what may result from the auxiliary's triple aim of prayer, work and study."

And lastly, "to realize the importance of the Junior Department."

This meeting was not only delightful, but very instructive, bringing to the mind of each member the duties, privileges and the joy of our work. It is to be hoped that great and lasting success may follow this study.

At 9.30 Wednesday morning Holy Communion was administered to quite a large congregation in the cathedral. Rt. Rev. Bishop Adams and Rev. E. Rich, dean of the cathedral, were the celebrants.

At 10.30 the business meeting opened with words of hearty welcome to the visitors by Dean Rich, to which Mrs. Finley responded, expressing our happiness in accepting the invitation to come to the cathedral. Six officers and twenty-three members, representing ten branches, responded to roll call. Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

Mrs. Finley reported having sent the bishop's box to Corbin, Ky., instead of West Virginia, as so much had been

sent to West Virginia.

Miss Jenkins reported \$121.80 contributed to the bishop's robes. \$91.93 was spent for the robes, \$20.00 for satchels, material for sachet and sleeves, \$3.87, making a total spent of \$115.80, leaving a balance of \$6.00, which on motion of Mrs. Summerfield Tilghman would be given to the bishop's fund.

The reports of the diocesan officers were read.

It was decided to send all pledges to Miss Barroll not later than March.

Mrs. Davidson sent in a list of nine parishes holding study classes during this year. The larger parishes have been much interested in the study of missions, but the smaller parishes need help and encouragement. Mrs. Davidson asked to have her resignation as educational secretary accepted, not having the time to give to the work. The secretary was requested to write Mrs. Davidson of our acceptance with regrets.

On motion of Mrs. Keas, a request was made for some one to volunteer to fill the vacancy. After noon day prayers, as no one responded to the request, Mrs. Keas offered herself. A rising vote of thanks was given Mrs. Keas.

Mrs. Summerfield Tilghman, Miss Jenkins, Mrs. Merrick, Mrs. Finley, Miss Barroll, Mrs. Watkins, Mrs. Brewington volunteered to organize study classes.

A letter from Miss Neely, Kioto, was read telling of her cordial reception there of her girls class for the uplift of womanhood. St. John's is a large church with a bright future. Bishop Tucker is a splendid leader. The interesting part of her letter was the description of her little house, the tiny little home Bishop Williams built and lived in so comfortable with its four square rooms, porch and lovely flowers.

It was resolved to have the following letter spread upon the minutes:

Mrs. Keas reminded the members of the United Offering service which will be held in September.

A letter from the Rev. C. E. Brethchen, of Fairbanks, Alaska, was read, asking if our auxiliary could secure an "Easton scholarship" for one year—cost \$100—beginning September 1st, for his boarding school at St. Mark's, Nenana, which is doing more than any other agent for the advance of the Indians of Central Alaska. There was no action taken on the request.

The morning session closed with prayer.

Public service was held in the Cathedral at 8 P. M. by Dean Rich, the Rev. Henry Davies reading the lessons.

Miss Hicks made an interesting and instructive talk to the congregation on her work in the Phillipines. At its conclusion Mrs. Finley in a few chosen words expressed our thanks to the Dean of the Cathedral and to the members of the auxiliary for their hospitality. We came with pleasure and leave with reluctance, with hopes that the conference held Tuesday evening will be a benefit. May the end of this meeting be the beginning of a new campaign.

RECORDING SECRETARY'S TWENTIETH ANNUAL REPORT, 1912—1913.

The Twentieth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held November 12th and 13th, 1913, in Emmanuel Church, Chestertown.

Mrs. Finley was most fortunate in having Bishop Rowe, of Alaska, and Bishop Brewster, of Western Colorado, with us. Much inspiration was given us, and a longing desire to hold up their hands, with our prayers, our means, and our self-consecration. Bishop Rowe addressed a large and attentive congregation Wednesday evening, describing his life and work among the people of Alaska. The Eskimos love the services of the Church, they are generous and give much to missions, and when they become Christians they become cleaner and improve in personal appearance. Notwithstanding the terrible dangers and hardships of his life, Bishop Rowe loves his work and the only request he is making is for a man who will return with him—a man who is willing to take his life in his hands and one who can use tools, cook his own meals, and do anything that is to be done. Would there were such an one in our own Diocese to be found who would give himself to the work!

Thursday morning at 9.30 Holy Communion was administered by the rector, Dr. Martin.

At 10.30 the business meeting was opened in the Parish House. The President presiding, 36 members, representing 12 branches, responded to roll call, including 9 diocesan officers. No reports came in from the vice-presidents. The treasurer, Mrs. Hooper, gave an explicit financial report. There are now 20 organized contributing branches in the diocese, the total receipts are \$39.66 less this year than they were last year. Of the \$25 promised Miss Lusby there was a deficit of \$4.50, and a deficit of \$8.50 of the \$25 pledged to Archdeacon Spurn, to help with one year's expense at school of a mountain boy in West Virginia. The central fund had an increase of \$11.61 over last year and a small increase in the delegate fund, \$113.62 being the total for the three years. The Bishop's fund was increased to \$96.50, a gain of \$21.53, for which the Bishop sent a letter of thanks. There was an increase for specials of \$2. The appropriations have a gain of \$3.18. As usual Shrewsbury Branch with its 13 members

has contributed to every fund and obligation and the amount given by them is \$124.60.

The President appointed Mrs. Harris, Mrs. Covington, Mrs. Purnell, Miss Compton, Mrs. Z. Collins., the nominating committee. Mrs. Stavely was nominated Corresponding Secretary and Mrs. Vanderbogart, Vice-president of Southern Convocation for the Woman's Auxiliary in place of Mrs. Spencer Wright and Mrs. Polk. No other changes were made. In Junior Department Miss Margaret Hardcastle was made Corresponding Secretary and Miss C. Barnett Treasurer to fill vacancies caused by resignation of Miss Wilmer and Miss A. Bailey, respectively. No other changes made in the Junior branch. Mrs. Keas resigned as Treasurer of the United Offering. Mrs. Keas' resignation was not accepted.

A motion was carried that the Educational Secretary be added to the list of Diocesan officers. Mrs. Keas was re-elected to that office.

Miss Jenkins made a plea for the teachers to organize Junior Auxiliaries in Parishes where there are none, followed by a discussion on the best way of doing it. Dr. Martin asked if he might say a few words, he did not think the trouble was with the Woman's Auxiliary, but it lay with the clergymen.

By request Dr. Martin consented to bring this question before the ministers at the Diocesan Convention. The Doxology was then sung heartily by all present.

Mrs. Keas read her report of the United Offering, which said in part "the story of the United Offering of 1913 in the Diocese of Easton is interesting because it tells of a forward movement. \$1931.33 in all. From the Woman's Branch \$1609.20—an increase of \$508.26 over 1910 from the Woman's Branch. Every coin that helped make that offering is above the criticism of mere man for it has been offered to Christ, dedicated to the service of man and God hath received it. We have only words of loving thanks to all who helped make the offering what it was."

Mrs. Keas offered the following:

Resolved That a committee be appointed to amend the articles of the Constitution and bring them up-to-date.

Resolved, That a committee be appointed to draw up rules of order for the conduct of future annual meetings, consideration of the report of said committee to be brought before the annual meeting of 1914 as the first order of business for the day.

The committee appointed for both were : Mrs. Keas, Mrs. Physick, Miss Dawson.

Resolved, That in cases where no representation from a branch could be had, reports of annual meetings be sent to absent branches by the Corresponding Secretary and that this be considered as extension work by the Diocesan Branch.

It was so ordered.

An interesting discussion was held on the importance of the appointment. Mrs. Finley thinks there is great necessity of keeping up our amount \$260.00. Mrs. Summerfield Tilghman said it should not be given as from the Auxiliary but from the congregations.

Miss Barroll read a fine report on periodicals and literature sent out and money contributed this year. Miss Barroll is making a success of her work. If our delinquent branches could know what a blessing our literature is to those who are in need of it as Mrs. Finley heard from several of the Bishops when in New York, there would surely be an effort to encourage Miss Barroll and to gladden the hearts of those who are starving for what is being wasted, it would take so little time, work or money.

After Noon Day Prayers by Rev. Mr. Ware, Mrs. Finley read a letter from the Rev. Samuel Salinas, who expected to be with us, expressing his regrets and disappointment, but he was called home because of trouble in Mexico. Mr. Salinas begs for prayers for his poor church in Mexico and in behalf of his unfortunate country. Mrs. Finley, in her talk about the General Convention, said : "She did not know where to begin or where to end for there was so much instruction and interest there." The wonderful addresses at the great meeting in Carnegie Hall, of Dr. Tuesler's work, of Mr. Pepper's address, of whom no one ever tires of listening to, then of Bishop Lloyd gathering up the last of the convention with his words of peace and counsel of keeping peace in our hearts and giving our prayers for those who are far off at their work. Mrs. Finley made her talk too short.

Mrs. Finley made three Diocesan pledges : \$5 towards getting a bell for a little African Church, \$25 for St. Mary's Shanghai and \$15 to St. Johns' Hospital, Tokyo. Total amount pledged \$45.

The 3d Missionary Department will hold a conference at Ocean City 2nd week of June. It was decided to have our spring meeting there at the same time.

Parochial reports were then read by the delegates present, as the name of the Parish was called. Resolutions of thanks were given to the rector and people of Chestertown for their cordial reception and gracious hospitality. After a few helpful words from Dr. Martin and the closing prayers, the meeting adjourned.

An address was made at the church Thursday evening by Bishop Brewster, of West Colorado.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE JUNIOR AUXILIARY, 1911-1912.

She told them when they felt too old to be Juniors they must not give up their work but join the Woman's Auxiliary and so continue their Missionary work and do their part in winning the world for Christ. Especially she emphasized self-sacrifice, and as an example suggested that the Juniors, who have been confirmed, would be more regular at the corporate communion, the 3rd Sunday in every month, for "Now is the accepted time." **Fifteenth Annual Report of the Little Helpers,
Diocese of Easton, 1912 – 1913.**

The Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Easton, was held in Chestertown, Nov. 12th and 13th, 1913. The sessions began on Wednesday, Nov. 12th, with the meeting at 2 P. M. of the Little Helpers or Babies' Branch, Mrs. Summerfield Tilghman, Diocesan Secretary, presiding.

Mrs. Tilghman urged that more of her parish secretaries have the "Service," as well as the "Party," for their Little Helpers, and that all be diligent in adding to their membership.

A message of good wishes from the Little Helpers, then in session, was sent to Miss Mary Henry, of Cambridge, who had resigned her post of Parish Secretary, because of her approaching marriage, November 13, being the happy day.

Bishop Rowe, of Alaska, then spoke in his delightful way to the children, and was presented with a number of "picture charts," made by the Little Helpers of Chestertown for use among his Indians and Esquimaux. The Little Helpers then made way for the Juniors.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

The Association shall be known as the "Easton Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary" to the Board of Missions.

ARTICLE II.

Its object shall be by means of individual and corporate effort, to diffuse missionary intelligence and increase missionary activity among the women of the Diocese. Also to unite societies already in existence and to urge the formation of such, where there are none.

ARTICLE III.

All Parish Societies and all individuals desiring to be members of the Diocesan Branch will be so considered. The officers of a Parochial Branch shall be a President, Vice-Presidents, Secretaries and Treasurer. These members to be taken from the women of the Parish Branch with the Rector as President ex-officio.

ARTICLE IV.

The officers of this Association shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary, Treasurer, United Offering Treasurer and a Correspondent for the Church Periodical Club.

ARTICLE V.

It shall be the duty of the President to preside at business meetings ; to call special meetings when occasion shall arise, and together with the Vice-Presidents to obtain fresh information from the missionary fields to be circulated whenever opportunity shall offer.

ARTICLE VI.

It shall be the duty of the Vice-Presidents to enlist the interest and sympathy of the parishes about them, in the different sections of the Diocese, and to preside over meetings in the absence of the President.

ARTICLE VII.

It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Association, especially with the General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary, to send out notices of stated and special meetings, to keep a record of missionary reports and prepare an annual report. It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to keep minutes of the proceedings of the Association at the annual and semi-annual meetings.

ARTICLE VIII.

The duty of the Treasurer shall be to receive, and to keep account of all monies contributed to the Diocesan organization, to pay all debts and to present an annual report. The United Offering Treasurer is to be the custodian of the United Offering Fund and to present an annual report.

ARTICLE IX.

There shall be an annual meeting of the Branch the third Wednesday and Thursday in October, and a semi-annual meeting on the fourth Wednesday in April, time and place to be designated by the President.

ARTICLE X.

Election of Officers shall take place at the annual meeting. This election to be by a nominating committee of five members to be appointed by the President. These officers shall continue in office one year or until their successors shall be appointed.

ARTICLE XI.

In order to defray necessary expenses for printing, postage and stationery for the use of the Association, as well as to meet objects to which the Association may be pledged as a whole, a Central Fund will be formed by the contribution of ten cents yearly from each member where it is possible.

ARTICLE XII.

The Constitution may be altered or amended by a majority vote of the members present at an Annual Meeting, one month's notice having been given of the contemplated change.
