

MINUTES OF THE THIRTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL MEET-  
ING OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF  
THE DIOCESE OF EASTON

---

The thirty-eighth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council in the Diocese of Easton, met at Emmanuel Church, Chestertown, October 28 and 29, 1931.

10 o'clock, Wednesday—The session started with registration in the Parish House.

10:30—Holy Communion, the celebrant being the Rt. Rev. George W. Davenport, D. D., Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by the Rt. Rev. Wm. M. M. Thomas, D. D., Bishop of Brazil, and the Rev. Charles L. Atwater, Rector of the parish. The speaker at this service was the Rt. Rev. Wm. M. M. Thomas, D. D., Bishop of Brazil.

He gave us a very interesting talk on his work in Brazil and brought home the fact that if the parish quotas were not paid, this work would suffer. He left with us the thought that what the world needed most was "Faith, Strength and Zeal with holding fast to God's word."

Mrs. Hynson Rogers, President of the Emmanuel Church branch, Chestertown, then gave us a very cordial welcome.

Mrs. Trippe also welcomed the auxiliary as a body and expressed her appreciation to all, for sending her as a delegate to the Triennial at Denver. It had helped her in many ways, but especially had it been an experience of enlarged vision, vast educational value and extended friendships.

We then had a short message from the Bishop of our Diocese. He thanked the Auxiliary for their contribution to his discretionary fund and while it had been small, he told us it had been of great help. He also congratulated the women of the Diocese for the wonderful amount given the "United Thank Offering". He urged that we center our efforts on the quota in our respective parishes. We must not let up; for salaries must be paid. He told us we could not isolate finances from religion under present conditions and urged us to not pass by the things that needed correcting simply because they did not touch our lives, but to face the problems so that whatever we do, will be dedicated to the service of God.

12:45—Roll call by parishes. One hundred and thirty-seven persons representing twenty-two parishes responded.

1 o'clock—Luncheon was served to all delegates and visitors in the parish house by the ladies of the parish.

Opening of the afternoon session with Hymn 504 and prayer led by the President.

The President then gave her message and urged us to press on to greater achievements.

Then followed the reports of the Vice-Presidents: Mrs. Thomas Perkins, Chestertown; Mrs. Alward Chamberlaine, Centreville, and Mrs. M. V. Brewington, Salisbury. Mrs. Spencer Wright reported the progress being made on the fund for vocational work among the colored people. She felt rather discouraged as we had only contributed about \$100 in three years and it takes \$300 to send a girl to the "Tuttle Memorial School" for one year. She had found that unless we could furnish the money, the girls could not finance it themselves. She urged that we not go on with this unless we would try harder, as she did not want to encourage a girl with the idea that she would get help from the women of the Church and when the time arrived disappoint her. Mrs. Trippe asked for discussion. Miss Bryan thought this no time to fall down and suggested that we put together greater effort and try for another year at least. Mrs. G. B. Bennett made a motion that we continue the work. This was seconded and carried.

Reports from the Corresponding and Recording Secretaries were then heard.

Mrs. Trippe gave us a most complete report on the business part of the convention.

She reported that one hundred dioceses were represented by 389 delegates and that forty-four had their full quota of five, and that our Diocese of Easton felt very proud to be of that number. She reported being so impressed by the fact that no matter how different the opinions, everybody showed such kind consideration for the views of others.

Mrs. Edwin Brown, Treasurer, gave a very interesting report and we were all glad to hear that we had gone ahead notwithstanding the difficulties of the last year.

Miss Matilda Keating, Educational Secretary, gave her report. She recommended two books for reading, "The Inner Life" and "Building a Christian Nation." She reported that Dr. Adelaide Case would be with us for our intensive day of study to be held at Easton, January 18th, 1932.

Mrs. Dudley Roe, United Thank Offering custodian, reported that the offering this Triennial was the same as

three years ago, \$5,350. She urged us to use the blue boxes and the special envelopes. These can be ordered through Mrs. Roe at any time.

Mrs. M. V. Brewington gave us a very interesting report on the United Thank Offering Service at Denver.

Mis Janie Bryan, Box Supply Secretary, told us that the boxes had not amounted to quite as much this year as usual, but the work had gone on and she had always found the branches so willing to help and that she had never been refused a request.

Mrs. George W. Davenport gave us a very charming talk on the sidelights of the Convention. She thought the three outstanding services were: The United Thank Offering Service, the Children's meeting and the Service of Consecration of the two Bishops. She touched the social side of the convention and told of the lovely scenery around Denver.

Miss Helen Lloyd, chairman of the nominating committee, reported; United Thank Offering Custodian, Mrs. Dudley G. Roe, Sudlersville; Box Secretary, Mrs. Joseph A. Ross, Trappe; Treasurer, Miss Mary McDaniel, Easton.

5:30—Meeting adjourned.

---

8 P. M., Wednesday evening—Mass meeting at Emmanuel Church. The speaker was the Rt. Rev. Charles B. Colmore, D. D., Bishop of Porto Rico. He told us about the wonderful work the church was doing in Porto Rico and again we were impressed with the importance of paying our parish quotas.

He asked especially for our prayers for the workers in the field, prayers for them in their work in their loneliness. He especially asked for prayers for Miss Ethel Robinson, praying that her restored health might be kept, thus enabling her to continue her work.

Thursday, 7:30 A. M.—Holy Communion, the celebrant being the Bishop of the Diocese, assisted by the Rev. Charles L. Atwater, rector of the parish.

9:30—Business session opened with Hymn 3, and prayer led by the President. Minutes of the previous day were read and approved. Mrs. Trippe stated that we always missed Mrs. Physick when she was not at our annual meeting but especially so at Chestertown. A motion was made and carried that a telegram be sent to Mrs. Physick expressing our regret for her absence.

We were also sorry not to have with us Mrs. Borden-Smith, who due to ill health has had to resign as chairman of the Church Periodical Club.

Miss Jean Phillips, who has been appointed by the

Bishop to fill this vacancy, was then introduced. We were most glad to welcome Miss Phillips.

Next came consideration of pledges for 1932. Miss Lloyd asked that we not forget the fact that the pledge the "Church's Program" and the quota were the same. Mrs. Keas stressed the fact that 60% of this amount was kept in our own Diocese, quoting that "He that hath denied the wants of his own household, hath denied the faith and is worse than an infidel". Mrs. Keas urged that we go back home and prevail upon the women of our respective parishes to pledge a penny a day toward the "Church's Program." Mrs. Frazier made this suggestion a motion, which was seconded and carried.

Mrs. Edwin Brown made a motion that we accept the pledges as of last year with a discussion first of the Valle Crusis Scholarship. This resulted in 17 different parishes pledging \$102. Mrs. Trippe was instructed to write Miss Boulden, telling her we were assured of this much and hoped the full amount would be contributed but could make no promise.

All other pledges accepted as before. Miss Sallie Deane of Richmond, Va., Representative on the National Executive Board from the third province, gave us a most inspiring address. She gave us a number of suggestions and helps for organizing B branches.

Then came the election of the officers as presented by Miss Helen Lloyd, chairman of nominating committee.

U. T. O. Custodian—Mrs. Dudley G. Roe, Sudlersville.

Box Work Secretary—Mrs. Joseph A. Ross, Trappe.

Treasurer—Miss Mary McDaniel, Easton.

Motion made and carried that secretary cast the ballot. Secretary declared officers elected.

Mrs. Dunbar Gould asked that a rising vote of thanks be given to our two retiring officers, Mrs. Edwin H. Brown, Jr., and Miss Jeanie Bryan. This was unanimous.

The new officers were then introduced and welcomed.

Miss Matilda Keating distributed leaflets to delegates to carry back to their branches and use in their Advent study classes. Mrs. John White told of work among the isolated, offering several suggestions and helps. The Bishop told us that due to the nearness of our parishes, he had never felt the need of a Diocesan organization for this work but preferred the clergy take care of the work in their respective parishes.

Mrs. Elliott Burroughs invited the Auxiliary to hold its 1932 annual meeting in Salisbury. This invitation was accepted.

12—A very impressive service of meditation was led by Mrs. Davenport.

12:30—Meeting ajourned for lunch, which was again served in the parish house by the ladies of Emmanuel Church.

1:30—Opening of afternoon service by hymn and prayer led by President. Minutes of the morning session read and approved.

Mrs. Trippe announced the nominating committee for next year as follows: Mrs. John Keas, Mrs. John White, and Mrs. Austin Roberts.

She read the following names of delegates appointed to attend the Synod at Pittsburgh: Mrs. Hynson Rogers and Mrs. Bourke Wright; alternates, Mrs. James Noble and Mrs. Frazier.

Miss Jeanie Bryan asked for a rising vote of thanks be given Miss Deane for her most helpful talk. This was unanimous.

The following resolutions were then offered. The first by Miss Jeanie Bryan and the second by Miss Matilda Keating:

Resolved—The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Easton in convention assembled respectfully request our Representative in Congress to consider and if possible further the sending of our surplus grain and cotton to the suffering people of China.

In view of the nation wide unemployment in the industrial world at this time, be it resolved that "The Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Easton" make every effort in its various branches to help alleviate the consequent situation, and do all it can to unite with other local associations to provide work for the needy.

These resolutions were accepted and the President and Corresponding Secretary instructed to sign same and send first to our representative and have later published.

Reports of discussion groups at the convention were then given. Mrs. Roy Rolfe Gilson reported on "Family Life"; Mrs. M. V. Brewington on International Relations; Mrs. George W. Davenport gave report on Property and Economics and Mrs. Barclay H. Trippe on Interracial Contacts and on Religious Thinking.

Miss Helen Lloyd asked that a vote of thanks be given our hostesses and expressed our appreciation for all the courtesies extended to us.

The meeting adjourned with prayer led by our President and Hymn 172.

We were dismissed by the Bishop.

## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE FOR 1931.

With the experience of Denver fresh in my thoughts I bring you my Annual Message fraught with the conflicting emotions of my rare privilege in presenting to you what I have seen and heard, and of my grave responsibility lest I fail to arouse in you the enthusiasm necessary for Christian leadership, which seems the great need of the present time.

The past year has been one of encouragement, in that in spite of hard times which we all have felt, we have met our obligations, and through the generosity of a devoted Auxiliary woman were able to send to Denver the same amount for the United Thank Offering which we presented in Washington. Beside this, we gave \$800 toward the Advance Work Program and I want to congratulate those women who through their work and gifts made this possible. Lacking a Diocesan Chairman for this fund, I undertook it myself, and due to the local co-operation of the Parish Chairman and the inspiration given us by Mrs. William H. Laird, of Baltimore, we achieved this creditable result.

I have sent out six letters to Parish Presidents and countless personal letters, have presided over three Executive Board meetings, provided for the Diocesan Educational day in my own parish, attended the Wicomico, Talbot, Caroline, Queen Anne, Kent, and Cecil County Interparochials, met informally with the officers of the B Branch in Cambridge, and visited St. Michaels Branch, when I spoke on the Advance Work Program.

I presented the report of the Auxiliary to the Diocesan Convention in May and am glad to bring back to you the good wishes and congratulations of the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese.

I was authorized to ask the Convention if they could provide a place of safety for the records which Mrs. Keas has offered us and it was recommended that the Diocese have such a place, but I understand that, owing to lack of funds, no provision has been made.

At our last Annual Meeting we had new Branches from the four parishes of Spring Hill, Mardella, Quantico, and Tyaskin. I can hardly express the joy this gave to me, for since I became president my goal has been an Auxiliary in every parish and mission of the Diocese. With only one

more year to go, the achievement seems far from fulfillment, but it is not an impossible objective. I am hoping I may be called to organize many branches the coming year.

In conference with the Executive Board it was decided to recommend that we take no new pledges, but continue the same ones we had the past year. The Church at General Convention declared it would not retreat. That means our first consideration must be the payment of our quotas. If we could only digest the fact that quotas are not disagreeable things inflicted on a parish, which can take or leave them as it chooses, but rather a legitimate debt which every parish should meet in order to provide maintenance for the whole Protestant Episcopal Church, then the raising of these quotas would be a joyful privilege.

As we consider our plans for this Triennium, and in particular for the coming year, what is the challenge? If I understood the message of the Triennial Meeting in Denver, it was not more money, acceptable as that would be, but more Christlikeness.

With the exception of the United Thank Offering and fifteen minutes given at the last session to the Advance Work Program, money was not mentioned. We were told, as we already knew, that the greatest problems of any age confront us now, and as we listened to specialists in their respective fields discuss the issues of our time, each one brought in the same conclusion, "A United Christian Church" is the only hope. That church must necessarily be comprised of individual Christians, not professing but practicing Christians in the family, in economic and industrial relations, in interracial contacts, in international relations, and all are influenced by our religious thinking.

May we, the women of the Auxiliary in the Diocese of Easton, accept the message of the Triennial Meeting for a renewal of prayer, conscious of the truth spoken by one of our Missionary Bishops, that "when the Church learns to pray it can bring work to pass."

Miss Lindley said, "It is within the power of the women of this branch of the Church to see that there is no more war." This involves not only education but earnest prayer for peace. She also expressed her conviction that we are on the verge of some spiritual discoveries and urged that during the three years ahead we grow in prayer.

We can set no higher standard for ourselves than that we become praying women, and I would leave with you the words of Bishop Lloyd, who is affectionately called "The Godfather of the Woman's Auxiliary." Said he, "Problems come out of things being done wrong. People we are

sending will meet problems manufactured by people at home. Let us be careful lest the way we order our lives may misinterpret the truth which sets man free. Go home not with burdens on your back but go away zealous lest the tone of your voice or the things you do make a problem for those who give their lives."

WHAT THE REV. DR. JOSEPH FORT NEWTON  
THINKS OF THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH

Since I learned to know the Episcopal Church in the blazing days of war, something deep in me has responded to its sweet and tempered ways. Its atmosphere of reverence, its ordered and stately worship, its tradition of historic continuity linking to-day with ages ago, its use of those symbols which enshrine the faith of the past and the hope of the future, its wide and wise tolerance, its old and lovely liturgy—like a stairway, worn by many feet whereon men climb to God—and still more, the organized mysticism of its service and sacraments: All these things of beauty and grace move me profoundly.

But more vital still, if possible, is the central strategic position which the Episcopal Church holds in the confused religious situation of our times. It is the roomiest Church in Christendom, in that it accepts the basic facts of Christian faith as symbols of transcendent truths, which each may interpret as his insight and experience explore their depth and wonder.

Midway between an arid liberalism and an acrid literalism, it keeps its wise course, conserving the eternal values of faith, while seeking to read the Word of God revealed in the tumult of our time.

If its spirit and attitude were better understood it would be at once the haven and the home of many vexed minds, torn between loyalty to the old faith, and the new truths.

After all there is only one Church of Christ. It may bear many names, but its faith is one, and finally, or soon, or late, it will be one in fellowship, drawn together by creative desire, if not driven together by the sheer necessity of facing the forces of destruction in our day which, if they have their way, will end in materialism and futility. Each man should labor where he can do his best work in behalf of our common Christian enterprise; and I look forward to happy and fruitful service in a great and gracious fellowship.

Above is a report of the Study Classes, 23 Classes in all: 3 Advent, 1 Epiphany, and 19 Lenten groups; one more class than last year, but a smaller enrollment. We were glad to have a report from our newest branch, Stepney Parish Tyaskin.

The Advent Study groups are very important. I know they come when we are busy about Christmas, but it only means an hour one afternoon or evening a week for four weeks and during this time set apart by the Church for penitence and preparation, let us try in our parishes to gather a group even if it is a small one for some serious thought.

The New General Church Program is suggested for study; it is now out and full of interesting material.

A splendid suggestion came to me from Dr. Sherman, that you take the Missionary Calendar and make your choice of fields for the four sessions. You have a wide range to choose from. Give a paragraph of information to a member having her enlarge upon it, geographically, or what has been done there or the Church would like to do.

A member might write a letter from a particular Mission Station, impersonating a visitor, using information found in the paragraph.

Use the prayer in the Calendar, prepare series of questions whose answers can be found in Calendar; have members prepare a "Believe It or Not" taken from Calendar information. That seemed a splendid plan to me and gave opportunity for all sorts of original plans.

A book I would like to recommend for your consideration, is "The Inner Life", by Rufus Jones. There is a chapter on the "Second Mile", not only fulfilling the letter of the law, but going a little further doing a little more. There is a chapter called "Otherism", and then a marvelous chapter on prayer.

Your subject of Lenten Study, "Building a Christian Nation", is the problem right outside your doors, the foreign born, the Indian, the Negro, the Migrant and the Youth of today. This book is compiled by eight experts. Copies can be gotten from me.

Just a word about the Summer School with an enrollment of 256 being the largest in the history of the school. Easton led the enrollment with 86.

I want to say a word about Educational Secretaries. Will you presidents give them a little encouragement—give them a few minutes to present what they prepared if not every meeting as often as possible, consult with them or suggest something you would like presented? We are anxious to develop this side of Auxiliary work.

Dr. Adelaide Case, of Columbia University, will be at Christ Church, Easton, January 18th for an intensive day on "Building a Christian Nation". Please bear this date in mind and be sure your parish is represented.

Please use me whenever you feel I can help you, it is my pleasure to be of service to you.

## SUGGESTIONS

(For these suggestions we are indebted to the Diocese of Harrisburg.)

Study with your Rector your year book. Take a day each month at the Parish House or meet at the home of the Church women, have a box lunch with tea or coffee provided by the hostess or a committee of three or more, and read and discuss the program:—

1. A day for the U. T. O. with the U. T. O. Litany and the leaflet. Keep up the interest in your Blue Boxes.
2. The Supply Work Department—use your Manual and the spirit of Missions. Read letters from recipients, etc.
3. Pledges, Diocesan and National and International to carry on the Church's Program.
4. C. P. C. work—A very entertaining and interesting program will result in greater effort in this worthwhile work.
5. Resume of Educational Work. The study class; what books are being read and used; the Adult and young people's classes; everything concerning greater zeal in Educational work.

6. Have a committee to look after the Spirit of Missions and Diocesan papers and the Church at Work. To know is to achieve, through interest and willingness to serve.

7. Discuss Domestic and Foreign work. Our share in the Indian, Negro, and foreign born work. At the end of the year, have a play or pageant and include the people we want to interest, and our churches will grow in grace and strength.

8. Have Days of Intercessions; Quiet Hour and Corporate Communion.

9. Visit the Shut-ins; the sick and lonely.

10. Have offerings for Missions at your study classes.

11. Have a committee and arrange a program meeting each month for your Churchwomen, and you will have an interested and active Auxiliary Branch.

12. Send all Pledges in before September 30th—Your Treasurer must send your pledges to the Diocesan and National Treasurer. Be prompt, and she will be able to remit our pledges promptly.

13. Devote part of each Auxiliary meeting to the Year Book.

14. Because of the nature of our Auxiliary work, we must have overhead expenses, stationery, programs, year books, notices sent through cards and letters, postage, typing at certain times of the year, etc. In addition, speakers' expenses to Annual Meetings, Conferences, Institutes, etc.; dues to National Board and Province Board.

Also such literature as will be of interest and material help for advancing the work, through the Diocese, to forward the work of the whole Church.

If each Parish increase their pledges proportionally, according to their Parish strength, many officers would not have expenses they can ill afford.

Will your Branch be ready and willing to share in these pledges and the responsibility, too, that this Diocese may be able to enlarge its opportunities to further the Missionary endeavor of the Church, for the Extension of His Kingdom?

## 1. IN OUR HOMES

Do we say Grace at table, and teach the children to do so? Have we Church and Mission calendars and follow the Daily Readings, the Noon Day Prayer for Missions? Remember the Prayer Book has an Order for Daily Service. Do we take the children to Church, and teach them

the Service, or expect the Bible School to do that? As sponsors in Baptism, we are responsible for the Devotional Training of our children and God's children.

## 2. AUXILIARY MEETINGS

Do we as leaders and members take the Devotions or expect the Rector to leave his Parish Work? Why not make this Service a part of our meetings? We must remember our Prayer Partners, to encourage and bless their work, our Prayers to bless our Church Envelope Money, our Boxes, and those who receive them. To interest our younger members to become Future Leaders. How can we work for others without first asking for Divine Guidance? Our Common Prayer is rich in Intercessions. Leaflets, Prayer Cards, Literature, our Spirit of Missions and other splendid Magazines, Books, all may be secured from the Church Missions House, 281 Fourth Avenue, New York City.

## 3. QUIET HOURS AND DAYS

Do we take time to get away from the busy world for a few hours, or a day, to feel "Round our restlessness His Rest?" We come away after Prayers and Meditations, in "a calm serene frame" realizing "He is with us, even to the end of the World." There is so much to pray for, our problems are world wide, the strong must help the weak, and cheer and encourage the faint hearted.

Let us in our Meetings seriously and prayerfully "think on these things," and try to follow, that our Church, our Parish work, and our lives may be enlarged and blessed. Then we can sing:

"So shall my walk be close with God,  
Calm and serene my frame,  
A Purer Light to mark the road,  
That leads me to the lamb."

# Constitution and By-Laws

---

## THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

### Diocese of Easton

---

#### CONSTITUTION

##### ARTICLE I.—Name.

This association shall be called the Easton Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

##### ARTICLE II.—Object.

The object of this body shall be to carry out within the Diocese of Easton the purposes and work of the Woman's Auxiliary to the National Council.

##### ARTICLE III.—Membership.

All baptized women of the Diocese are eligible to membership.

##### ARTICLE IV.—Officers.

The officers of this body shall be a President, three Vice Presidents (one from each convocation), a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, an Educational Secretary, Box Work Secretary, a Treasurer for the United Thank Offering. These together with the Secretary of the Church Periodical Club shall constitute the Executive Board.

##### ARTICLE V.—Amendments.

This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of this body by a two-thirds vote of all members present, notice of the proposed amendments having been given in writing to each branch one month previous to the Annual Meeting.

#### BY-LAWS

##### ARTICLE I.—Duties and Powers of Officers.

Section 1. The President shall preside at all meetings of this body and of the Executive Board. She shall conduct the correspondence with the Executive Secretary and do whatever in her judgment is best to advance the work of the Auxiliary.

Section 2. Vice Presidents—The Vice Presidents shall be presidents in the Northern, Middle, and Southern Convocations. They shall promote the formation of Parish Branches and help to strengthen those already existing. They shall preside at convocation meetings and conduct the correspondence with the President. They may arrange special meetings in their convocations to arouse keener zeal and interest. They may preside at Annual Meetings and meetings of the Executive Board in the absence of the President, the one in whose convocation the meeting is held having the precedence, or they may choose one of their number to preside.

Section 3. The Recording Secretary shall keep the minutes of this body and of the Executive Board and issue notice of meetings.

Section 4. The Corresponding Secretary shall prepare and edit the yearbook and perform such other duties as may be assigned to her by the body or the Executive Board.

Section 5. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all Auxiliary moneys (keeping accurate accounts and rendering annual report).

Section 6. The United Thank Offering Treasurer shall collect all contributions for the United Thank Offering twice a year—March and September. She shall have appointed in each parish or mission a treasurer, who shall endeavor to collect an offering from every woman of the Church. This money shall be placed at interest and a check for the entire amount shall be presented at each General Convention.

Section 7. The Secretary for Religious Education shall arrange for study classes throughout the Diocese and give all information regarding the educational work, and try to promote attendance at the Summer School. She may appoint an Assistant Educational Secretary in each Convocation.

Section 8. The Box Secretary shall have charge of the Box Work, receiving allotments from headquarters, and assigning allotments to parishes and missions. She may appoint a committee to assist her.

Section 9. The Executive Board shall be entrusted with the general business of this body, and shall exercise all powers which are not herein expressly provided, shall fill vacancies occurring by the death or resignation of officers between the Annual Meetings. Three members of the Executive Board shall constitute a quorum. There shall be two meetings of the Executive Board each year subject to the call of the President.

Section 10. The officers shall be entitled to vote at all meetings of this body.

#### ARTICLE II.—Officers and Their Election as in Report of Committee.

Section 1. These officers shall be elected for a term of three years.

Section 2. These officers shall be eligible for election to the same office for not more than two consecutive terms.

Section 3. Each officer shall serve until the end of the year or until her successor is elected and installed, but the Educational Secretary shall continue her duties through the Easter Season.

Section 4. There shall be a nominating committee of three members appointed by the chair, whose duty shall be to receive any suggestions for nominations prior to the annual election, and to prepare a ticket to be voted upon at that time. Nominations may also be made from the floor.

Section 5. The officers shall be divided into three groups, as follows:

Group 1—President, Corresponding Secretary, Educational Secretary.

Group 2—Recording Secretary, three Vice Presidents.

Group 3—Treasurer, Box Secretary, Treasurer of the U. T. Offering.

Group 1 to be elected the year preceding the Triennial.

Group 2 to be elected the year of the Triennial.

Group 3 to be elected the year following the Triennial.

At the time of organization the officers shall be elected for the following terms:

Group 1 for one year.

Group 2 for two years.

Group 3 for three years.

Section 6. The election of officers shall be by ballot, a majority vote constituting an election.

Section 7. Any vacancy occurring in any office during this term shall be filled by the Executive Board. Any officer intending to resign must send her resignation to the President one month before the Annual Meeting.

#### ARTICLE III.—Reports.

Each officer shall prepare a written annual report, a copy of which shall be sent to the President and one to the Corresponding Secretary. All accounts shall be audited annually.

#### ARTICLE IV.—Annual Meeting.

Section 1. There shall be one meeting each year of this body, known as the Annual Meeting, on the fourth Wednesday and Thursday of October unless notice of a change is given by the President.

Section 2. Each Branch or Group shall be entitled to one delegate, who shall attend all sessions, vote upon all questions, and prepare a report to read before her home Branch. All members present shall have the right of discussion.

Section 3. The Recording Secretary shall call special meetings, on request of the Bishop or President or five members of the Executive Board.

Section 4. At the Annual Meeting ten members shall constitute a quorum.

#### ARTICLE V.—Interparochials.

Each county shall hold an Interparochial meeting once a year, to which all woman's church organizations in that county shall be invited to send a delegate, with a written report of all Parish work since the Interparochial of the previous year, the delegate to take back a report of the meeting to her organization. All visitors and delegates to have part in the discussions.

#### ARTICLE VI.—Parish Dues.

Each Parish Branch or Group shall send annually to the Diocesan Treasurer money for current expenses and other obligations of the body. The Central Fund and Delegate Fund each call for 10 cents per member from every branch.

#### ARTICLE VII.—The Year.

The fiscal year of this body shall be from October 1 to September 30, inclusive.

#### ARTICLE VIII.—Delegate to Triennial Synod.

Section 1. One delegate and one alternate shall be elected at the previous Annual Meeting to represent the Diocesan Branch at the Triennial Convention, and the remaining four delegates and four alternates shall be appointed by the Bishop in consultation with the President.

Section 2. The delegates and the alternates to the Synod shall be the President and two other members appointed by the President and approved by the Annual Meeting, or in the absence of a meeting subject to the approval of the Bishop.

#### ARTICLE IX.

By-Laws may be adopted, amended, suspended, or repealed by any Annual Meeting by a two-thirds vote.
