Address of the Bishop

In the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost, Amen!

I have often said, and I hope it is not tiresome to you to have me say it again, that it is always a pleasure, a happiness, a comfort, an uplift to my soul, to meet the members of the Woman's Auxiliary.

I wish to return my thanks, first of all, to the Woman's Auxiliary, for the aid which they have given me, spiritual as well as financial, during the past year. Perhaps it seems strange that I should say the aid and help they have given me, when we consider that the Woman's Auxiliary is working for the building up of the Diocese, but I experience the greatest happiness in seeing the Diocese upbuilt and helped, because there is upon me a responsibility to the Master, a responsibility that weighs heavily upon my shoulders. I must give an account of the deeds done by me to the Master, and I confess that the judgment day is ever looming up before my eyes, the judgment day, when I must answer for these immortal souls which are placed under my care and charge.

The Woman's Auxiliary has been this especial comfort to me that it has enabled me, as the chief shepherd, to help the scattered souls to do the work of God's kingdom in the different parts of the Diocese. It has been a personal comfort to go to the Treasurer of the Diocese, and find there the record of a large increase, at times, in the funds which the Woman's Auxiliary has placed in his hands. These things come home to me because I certainly am responsible to the clergy of the Diocese for their salaries. You cannot expect the men who are in the field to pay their debts unless they receive their salaries, and throughout the Diocese the chief help in this respect has come from the Woman's Auxiliary. As I have said, if it were not for the Woman's Auxiliary, during, I might say, the last fifteen years, or since 1895—with the exception of the last two years—it would have been impossible to maintain the missions of the Diocese. I am in hopes that the Men's Auxiliary will become organized so that it may, to a certain extent, relieve the pressure upon the Woman's Auxiliary. The demand has been so great that I have been afraid to have the Woman's Auxiliary enter into any general work except it be the united offering, which is given once in three years, at the General Convention. I have been afraid, I say, distinctly afraid, because there has been a distinct fear that if anything were done to suspend the contributions of the Woman's Auxiliary, there would be some missionary without his salary, or some church closed, some soul begging for the bread of life. Do

you know what that means? When people have not a rector or missionary, they write and ask me when I am going to supply the service? When are they going to have the celebration of the sacraments? How long will I allow them to stay there without the ministrations of the Church? Can you understand the agony of it, when these letters keep coming and coming and coming, and I know I cannot send them a priest to minister to them? Can you understand the agony of it, and is it a want of courage on my part, that I have not been willing to have anything done that will stop the revenue of the Woman's Auxiliary? Is it a want of courage? Perhaps it is!

The Board of Missions of New York is about to begin a new system for the support of the Missions of the Church in general.

As you know, the Auxiliaries of the Diocese of Florida and of the Missionary Jurisdiction of Southern Florida, are the only Auxiliaries in the United States which have their special work in supporting the Missions at home.

It has been recognized by the New York Board that there has been a mistake in trying to have the Auxiliaries work absolutely and entirely for Missions outside of the Diocese. The Board recognizes that this has been a mistake, for in doing this the Auxiliaries have crippled the revenues from the Dioceses. As a general thing, there are exceptions, of course, but as a general thing where the Woman's Auxiliaries have given large sums to the apportionment these Dioceses have not made up the apportionment which is assessed and arranged by the Board.

Finding that it does not work well, the desire now is to have the Woman's Auxiliary in each Diocese work as well for Diocesan as General Missions. The situation is changing, but as far as the Diocese of Florida is concerned, whether the Woman's Auxiliary can help more outside depends upon what the men of the Diocese do.

We are trying very hard to organize the Men's Missionary League. We are trying to have the Men's Missionary League do something toward the support of the Diocese, so that the Woman's Auxiliary might, in a great measure, be relieved from the pressure which is upon it now, of supporting the Missionaries in the Diocese.

It is summer when the finances are always lowest, and although people may go out of the State and may have a pleasant time at the summer resorts, the clergy have to remain in the State and they have to be paid and cared for just the same, so I hope whatever legislation you undertake, you will have the new work begin after the summer, and you will also consult with the President of the Men's Missionary League, and find out what the Men's Missionary League is doing towards the support of the Missions in the Diocese. We hope, through the organization of this Men's Missionary League,

to be able to give up what the General Board in New York now gives the Diocese \$2,300.00. That is what we hope to do, but bear in mind, that after September 1st the apportionment is to be paid by the Woman's Auxiliary, the Lenten Offering of the Children and the special amount apportioned to each parish. That is the situation we have to meet—it matters not whether it is wise or not—there is no use in discussing the wisdom of it. As your representative in the Board of Missions I have discussed the unwisdom of it, but still this is the regulation and this is the situation which we have to meet.

Before speaking my last word, I want to express my thanks to the Junior Auxiliary. The Junior Auxiliary, as you know, I organized in this Diocese for the purpose of supporting the men who are studying for holy orders. That is their work. I confess at first, and recently, the support I have received from the Junior Auxiliary has not always been adequate, although the Juniors have helped immensely, and I hope in the future that the Junior Auxiliary will remember the great work before them, will remember that I am solely dependent upon the Junior Auxiliary for the support of the men who are studying for the ministry. I have several studying now, and I hope to have more.

Some of those whom you have educated—I speak now to the Juniors—some of those whom you have educated have been ordained, and one of them is now a professor in one of the theological seminaries, preparing other men for holy orders.

I wish to thank the Juniors for what they have done and to beg them to remember how dependent I am upon them.

And finally, allow me to express my gratitude and my thanks for what the Woman's Auxiliary, in its different branches, has done and is doing, for the support of the Diocese and the upholding of the hands of the Bishop of the Diocese.

It is always a happiness to meet you, because I feel stronger and better when I can look you in the face.

Address of Diocesan President

When the conditions throughout the non-Christian world inviting a comprehensive advance of the Church are considered, as well as the serious obstacles and critical tendencies which threaten the progress—both the urgency and the difficulty of the task seem to be overwhelming, if not depressing; but a survey of recent triumphs and of the present-day working of the Christian forces in non-Christian lands, affords abundant ground for hopefulness and confidence.

"In the great battle of Mukden, with a frontage of many miles, a certain regiment of the Japanese army, hard pressed at times by the enemy, might have feared that defeat was impending; but the general in charge of the Japanese operations, in touch with the whole line by means of wireless telegraphy and other appliances of the modern signaling corps, knew full well that taking the battle as a whole victory was assured." So on the world-wide battlefield of Christianity. While there are apparent discouragements in some of the parts of the field and while certain divisions of the Christian forces are being hard pressed by the forces that oppose—taking the world as a whole victory is assured if the present campaign be adequately supported and pressed. It is well said, without doubt, however, it is true that the Christian ministry holds the key to the Missionary problem. If the clergy are keenly interested in Missions, if they are aflame with Missionary zeal, if they believe no other work so important as leading the forces of the Church to the conquest of the world for Christ thus the larger part of the problems of Missions will be solved. Leadership, however, is not confined to Missionary Boards and the clergy. Those who lead in the work of the young people of the Church may play an equally important part in the Missionary movement for it is from them that the future leaders of Church, clerical and lay, are being raised up and men and women enlisted to carry on its varied activities.

In the end it is by young people that young people are led, and in every Parish and Mission there is need for men and women who will lead their fellows into an active interest in Missions. Anyone who has the power for leadership and will take upon himself or herself this responsibility may play an important part in the world's Missionary movement. The work of the Mission Study movement among young men and young women is therefore of fundamental importance. Much more attention must be paid to giving the subject of Missions its proper place in colleges and seminaries. Also there should be more comprehensive and constant efforts to cultivate

the Missionary interest in the schools, and also in the young people's societies of the Church, from which the ranks of the Christians are recruited. Let us awake from the paralyzing lethargy of the present, and have the future vibrating with a new and intense life. Some prominent Englishman says: "Has it ever occurred to you that there are five keys to the world—the straits of Dover, the straits of Gibraltar, the Suez Canal, the straits of Malacca, the Cape of Good Hope. And we hold every one of them." Is it not wonderful? Isn't the hand of Providence in that? Is it not intended that the holding of those five keys shall Christianize the non-Christian world? Surely the federation of the English-speaking races will lead the world into the paths of peace.

While I have emphasized the great necessity of effective work for those beyond our borders, I am not unmindful of our own necessities. We are a Diocesan organization with all the difficulties of a Missionary Diocese—struggling Parishes and impoverished Missions. At times our Bishop is desperately in need of money to pay the stipends of his faithful Missionaries. We must continue to work hard, yes, very hard, until the time comes when our labors will be lightened. The dawn is coming, gray still, but surely the mists are lifting to show you how our Bishop values the Woman's Auxiliary I quote from last year's Convention address of the Bishop—he says: "There are only two Dioceses where a Woman's organization is the chief support of Missions, viz: the Diocese of Florida and the Diocese of Southern Florida. We cannot say too much in praise of their labors. Certainly the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Florida has made it possible to carry on what work has been done, but I think the time has come to relieve these women and to allow them to do this more legitimate work of looking after the general work of the Church. It is somewhat trying to them not to be able to enter into the same work which is engaging the other Auxiliaries in the United States. We simply cannot exist without this help at present, but I think the men of the Diocese might come forward and do more.

"I see no way of bringing this about except through the development of a Men's Mission League, give it whatever name you wish."

With such words of commendation, I am sure the Women of the Auxiliary cannot fail to respond cheerfully by doing their duty, and rendering such assistance so as to make it possible to carry on the work, as long as our services are required, then we can look beyond, "strengthen the stakes and lengthen the cords."

The United Offering is already demanding our attention. "How ~~should~~ we feel in New York in 1913 were our Triennial Offering ten times the size of that in Cincinnati in 1910."

It was both gracious and graceful in Miss Emery when she

learned that the Florida Branch was not represented at the service of the United Offering held in Cincinnati, to request (a native Floridian) Mrs. Barbour Walker, of Washington, to place the offering of the Florida Branch in the great golden alms basin of the Woman's Auxiliary. Let us remember that for the present it keeps us in touch with the great throbbing pulse that beats for Missions.

Will the Florida Branch of the Auxiliary, with its Juniors, and Babies' Branches, make a supreme effort and send to New York in 1913 an offering as large, and better still, larger than in 1910, to meet the requirements of far-reaching movements.

"National, racial, economic religions are shaking the very foundation of the non-Christian nations." Such strong words are an inspiration. Onward and upward shall be our watchword until our work is finished.

The Junior Auxiliary have done splendid work, nearly doubled their receipts of last year, their officers, both Diocesan and Parochial, are deserving the greatest commendation for their unremitting and effective work.

The Report of the President of the Babies' Branch shows good work accomplished by the little helpers and their faithful officers. The Julia Weed Memorial Branch have fulfilled their pledge. Their report shows growth and increasing strength. We think there should be other branches consisting of young women of eighteen years of age. The Periodical Club completes our organization; it is encouraging that it is gaining in strength and influence—it is an important work of the Auxiliary. Continue to give your books, magazines and papers regularly.

Give the Diocesan paper your earnest support. Renew your subscriptions. Write articles about your different Parishes. It takes a long time to firmly establish a Church paper. Make this a success.

In summing up the work of the year, we find that the Auxiliary has done fairly well. Its receipts and reports are encouraging—enough so to redouble our energy and make next year vibrate with renewed life and determination to carry our work higher.

An excellent report from the Juniors of *St. John's*, Jacksonville, was read.

Miss Elma Maclay, Directress, was in attendance with a large delegation of the Junior Branch of *Christ Church*, Pensacola, and Miss Margarita Moreno, the Secretary, read a most businesslike and interesting report.

Mrs. S. E. Hutchinson read a report from *Saint Mary's*, Jacksonville, and Mrs. S. D. Clarke read one from *Christ Church*, Monticello.

In the absence of Mrs. William M. Stockton, President of the Babies' Branch, her report was read by Mrs. S. E. Hutchinson.

On motion, the reports from Branches were all received and approved.

The annual report of Mrs. M. H. Haughton, Treasurer, was read by the Secretary, and, on motion, was received and approved.

The annual report of Mrs. J. S. Arnold, Corresponding Secretary, was read and accepted.

The Secretary read the following report from the Correspondent of the Church Periodical Club:

"I have to report ten librarians, each sending out from five to ten periodicals.

"It has been difficult to get this work in good running order, and I ask the help and co-operation of every woman in the Auxiliary. I hope to have a fuller report next year.

On motion, the report was received and approved.

The President asked Miss Weed, editor of the Diocesan paper, "*The Newsbearer*," to address a few words to the meeting on the status of the paper. Miss Weed said since taking the editorship of "*The Newsbearer*," she had necessarily been absent from the Diocese a good part of the time, and that during her absence Mr. Edwards, of *St. Andrew's*, Jacksonville, had looked after the editing, and the printer had mailed the paper. Since her return she should give the mailing her personal attention. She has received in all about sixty-seven dollars (\$67.00), and has expended of that amount forty dollars (\$40.00) for postage. It costs between five and six dollars per month to mail the 500 copies. If she could revise the subscription list, and increase it to 500 *bona fide*, paid up subscriptions, it would materially lessen the cost for postage. She is desirous of turning over to the Woman's Auxiliary, in October, when the first year of her editorship expires, a goodly sum over and above expenses, and feels sure she can do this, if all the Branches will give her their hearty support and cooperation.

On motion, the meeting then adjourned to 9 A. M., Thursday.

THURSDAY, MAY 18, 1911.

The meeting was called to order at nine o'clock and opened by the Rev. W. B. Allen, Rector of St. Katherine's, with morning prayer.

The minutes of yesterday's sessions were read, and after correction approved.

Mrs. R. P. Daniel offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted by a rising vote:

WHEREAS, The Florida Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions is assembled for its twenty-first annual meeting, and

WHEREAS, The members of this Association desire to express their appreciation of and veneration for their beloved Bishop Edwin Gardner Weed, therefore be it

Resolved, That we most truly and gratefully recognize the self-sacrifice and devotion to God's service, and the promotion of the Master's cause in all his work among us, and for us.

Resolved, That we devoutly pray for God's continued blessing on our beloved Bishop, and that he may be spared many more years of service to the cause of Christ, and with the flock in his charge before being called to his eternal rest.

Resolved, That our Secretary be instructed to prepare and convey to the Council now in session (the 25th anniversary of Bishop Weed's call to the Episcopate), a copy of this preamble and these resolutions.

The following communication from Miss Emery was read:

"The Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary in her last annual report raised the question of a still farther condensation of the tables of money and boxes in the report.

"She suggested that, while the report printed and circulated in each Diocesan Branch, might contain a full record of all work approved by the authorities in that Branch; the reports sent to headquarters at the Church Missions house to be presented to the Board of Missions be made uniform, as follows:

"1. That the money tables report only that money, under appropriation and specials, which shall have passed through the treasury of the Board of Missions and been acknowledged in the *Spirit of Missions*.

"2. That the box tables report only those boxes sent to Missionaries and Missions, included in the lists furnished to the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary by their Bishops.

"In Cincinnati the Auxiliary officers conferring upon this suggestion:

"*Resolved*, That the matter of the Annual Report as presented in the Secretary's Report for 1910 be reported to the Diocesan Branches, and the result of their discussion be: after the annual meeting of each Branch, reported by the Diocesan Secretaries to the Secretary of the Auxiliary, she, in consultation with the Board of Missions, having power to act upon these reports.'

"We are, therefore, submitting the matter to your Branch for consideration and action at the next annual meeting, reminding you that it should be brought before the entire Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary and its Junior Department.

"Please report upon this as soon as possible after your meeting. These reports will be received too late for us to change the tables of the general report for 1910-1911, but will guide us in the decision regarding that for the following year.

"We hope for an answer from every Diocesan Branch at as early a date as possible.

"March, 1911."

On motion of Miss Weed the following resolution relative to the matter was adopted:

Resolved, That the Florida Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary assent to the resolution passed at Cincinnati concerning the General Secretary's report as to the condensation of money and box tables, and concur with her suggestion as to methods of condensation.

Mrs. Daniel offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That this Association extend to Mrs. Telfair Knight its hearty thanks for her efficient services as Assistant Secretary.

Miss Weed offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

WHEREAS, The delegates to the twenty-first annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary held in the city of Pensacola desire to return their thanks to the resident members of the Auxiliary for their many courtesies, be it

Report of Corresponding Secretary

Though we have been much concerned about our Systematic Offering falling below that of last year, there has really been a slight growth in our organization since the last annual meeting. Last year 658 members were reported, an increase of 37 over the previous year. At the present time the reports of only nineteen Branches gives about the same number of contributors (654), with six Branches yet to hear from.

We have the pleasure of welcoming one new Branch into the Auxiliary. This Branch is at Lloyd's, with Mrs. J. H. Bond, Directress, and Mrs. Clara R. Nillie, Secretary-Treasurer, and starts out with an earnest, courageous spirit that means success.

For our encouragement, special note should be made of the wonderful gain made by the Branch of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Jacksonville, when, by an active campaign for new members, the number of contributors was increased from 70 to 125 in one month.

What is there to prevent other Branches from attempting similar gains?

During the year I have written circular letters to the Directresses on the following subjects: Diocesan Paper, Deficit in Systematic Offering, Christmas Boxes, Auxiliary Day Services, Annual Meeting and Delegates, besides many individual letters concerning various interests. Each month I have written and collected notes for the Auxiliary page of the Diocesan paper. Auxiliary Day was very generally observed this year and Mission Study is assuming a more definite form.

Miss Emery, in her annual report, suggests that "the raising of a certain sum of money will never be a sufficient motive for a supreme spiritual endeavor," and if we are to make decided progress in our work for Missions this coming year, an educational campaign should be inaugurated to awaken the minds and souls of the baptized women of the Church in this Diocese to the blessed opportunity they are missing—the privilege of being participants in the fulfilment of our daily prayer for Missions—"Thy kingdom come."

St. John's Junior Auxiliary.

Since last annual report we have held about fifty meetings. We meet every Saturday morning at the home of the Directress, for prayer, work, and the payment of dues, special attention being paid to the prayers, which are recited by all present, reading from the prayer cards. On Ember Days we use the prayer for that season, since our contributions are now being used by the Bishop to help in the education of young men being prepared for the ministry. All members are also expected to say a short prayer for missions (Thy Kingdom come) at noon each day. During Lent we had some reading from *The Young Churchman* while the members sewed.

In addition to our systematic giving of 5 or 10 cents a month, we have added to our funds in various other ways, such as sales, teas and entertainments.

At the request of our Rector we repeated the mystery play, "The Little Pilgrims and the Book Beloved." This play is so much enjoyed and has such a far-reaching influence that we hope to be able to give it at least once a year in our own Parish, and we are now considering a request from the Rev. James H. Davet to present it at an early date in All Saint's Parish, South Jacksonville.

In January our Directress sent out one hundred postal cards inviting members of St. John's Sunday School to join the Junior Auxiliary.

Only four boys contribute to the Junior Auxiliary and one young man gives us sixty cents a year, or five cents a month, for this work for Missions.

Last year our membership was twenty-two; we now have forty-one members, an increase of nineteen.

Constitution of the Florida Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary

I.

This Association shall be called the Florida Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

II.

The object of the Association is to pray for GOD'S blessing upon the Church, and to obtain contributions for Missionary Work.

III.

Any person may become a member of this Association, who may be admitted thereto by the Directress of one of the Parochial or Mission organizations.

IV.

There shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, Diocesan Treasurer, Recording Secretary and Corresponding Secretary appointed by the ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese. The President of the Junior Branch and the President of the Babies' Branch of the Auxiliary, shall be, ex-officio, Vice-Presidents of the Auxiliary.

V.

This Association shall have an organization in every Parish and Mission. The Rector, or Missionary in charge, shall appoint a Directress, Secretary and Treasurer, whose duty it shall be to divide the Parish or Mission into districts of convenient size, assigning to each a Collector, or Committee of Collectors, who shall, each month, collect the pledges; once a year to procure from the Rector or Missionary a list of the members of the Parish, or Mission, and try to secure from each member a contribution of one cent a day.

In case a Parish or Mission is vacant, the Bishop may appoint the officers.

VI.

There shall be a Diocesan Committee, composed of the President, the Vice-Presidents, the Diocesan Treasurer, the Recording Secretary, the Corresponding Secretary and the Directresses, or the accredited representatives of the Directresses.

The President, or one of the Vice-Presidents acting for her, and any three of the above named officers shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

In case both the President and Vice-Presidents are absent from the Diocese for more than one month, then one of the Secretaries of the Diocesan Committee may call the meeting to order, and any three of the above named officers shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

VII.

The President of the Association shall have general supervision of the Association, and shall decide in all cases of dispute. One of the Vice-Presidents shall act for the President when she is absent from the Diocese for more than three months. When requested by the President, the Vice-President may act for her, at any time. When acting for the President, the Vice-President shall exercise all the authority of the President.

The Diocesan Treasurer shall have charge of the funds of the Association, and shall keep a correct account of the same. She shall make all disbursements according to the direction of the ecclesiastical authority of the Diocese.

The Recording Secretary shall keep, in a book provided for that purpose, the minutes of the Diocesan Committee, and attend to such other work as the President may request.

The Corresponding Secretary shall, under the direction of the President, correspond with the organizations in the Parishes and Missions, and obtain information concerning their management and general welfare, and give such advice as the occasion may require.

The Treasurer of the Parochial Branches shall remit the funds which they have in hand to the Diocesan Treasurer on or before the fifteenth day of each month; the Treasurer of the Junior Branch shall remit each quarter, and the Treasurer of the Babies' Branch once a year.

VIII.

The Diocesan Committee shall meet on the first Wednesday of each month, and may be called together at any time by the President.

The Parochial or Mission organizations shall meet on the first Monday in each month, and may be called together by their respective Directresses at any time.

All meetings, wherever and whenever held, shall be opened with prayer.

IX.

Each Parochial Branch, and the Junior and the Babies' Branches shall report the condition of the work to the President of the Auxiliary of the Diocese every quarter.

X.

This Constitution may be altered by the Bishop of the Diocese, after giving one month's notice of the proposed change, to the officers of the association.

Rules of Order of the Woman's Auxiliary Society Meeting

1. Opening Service and Address by the Bishop.
2. Roll Call by Branches.
3. Address of President.
4. Report from Branches.
5. Treasurer's Report.
6. Corresponding Secretary's Report.
7. Report of Church Periodical Club.
8. General Business.

Rule I. After the opening services, the President shall take the chair and call the meeting to order, when the order of business shall proceed.

Rule II. When a member is about to speak, she shall rise and, with due respect, address herself in an audible voice to the chair, confining herself strictly to the point in debate.

Rule III. No member shall speak more than twice on the same subject without the permission of the house.

Rule IV. While the President is putting any question, the members shall continue in their seats and not hold any private discourse.

Rule V. Every member present shall vote when a question is put, unless excused by the house.

Rule VI. When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be made, unless to lay it upon the table, to postpone it to a certain time, to commit it, to amend it, or to offer a substitute; and motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order herein named.

Rule VII. A motion to lay on the table shall be decided without debate.

Rule VIII. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, and, if unqualified, shall be decided without debate.

Rule IX. No motion shall be considered as before the house unless it be seconded.

Rule X. All committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered.

Rule XI. The reports of all committees shall be in writing and shall be entered on the minutes, unless otherwise ordered.

Rule XII. Before the final adjournment of the meeting, the minutes of the last day's proceedings shall be read, corrected if necessary, and approved.
