Address of the Bishop

I have often told you that it was a happiness, a comfort and a pleasure to speak to the Woman's Auxiliary—a happiness because I feel the responsive chord, for it is the responsive chord which buoys us up and brightens our lives and changes the aspect of things in this world; a comfort which comes from that mysterious sympathy which passes from heart to heart in some unknown way; a pleasure which we derive when we have intercourse which cheers and when we have a chance to talk out the heart-to-heart things of life.

I have often told you this, but in these days, with dark lowering clouds around us, there are demands upon our physical strength and upon our sympathies which wring the heart and make us wonder at times what we ought to do, whom we ought to help and whom we should leave off. We wonder whether we are standing right in the sight of God and doing our duty to God. With so many things pressing upon us, we are drawn in every direction and are under a strain which tests our mental, physical and spiritual strength. Therefore in these days, when we all need sympathy and help, I find it a special pleasure to speak with you, and to have the support of every one upon whom has fallen the responsibility of looking after conditions in the Church. The responsibility is at times overpowering—so overpowering that all we can do is to get upon our knees and pray God for wisdom and strength to do what our hand finds to do. We should not go any further than that, because when we go any further we are spending our time in philosophizing, in mental discussion, in trying to take a survey when there can be no survey taken. The pressure is at our doors, and we are face to face, not daily, but hourly, with such demands upon us that we are to do just what our hand finds to do. We are to pray God for strength and wisdom to do it, because there is so much to be done, and so much that should be done wisely.

With this introduction, allow me to speak to you of the work which you have done. You have carried the Diocese through the dreadful freeze of '95 and all that came after. There were less people in the State of Florida in 1900 than there were in the State of Florida in 1895, before the freeze. We speak of the growth of Florida since 1900, but Florida was emptied from 1895 to 1900. Those were days when we did not know how it was possible to live from month to month, places which had been strong became weak, and some are weak still. There were fifty millions taken out of the State in one night, so naturally there was this change in conditions. I might speak of just one place, by way of illustration. There was Waldo, surrounded with orange groves, and, nearby, Fairbanks, named after Major Fairbanks of Fernandina. That whole country was full of orange groves, and people were happy and receiving an income, lands were being sold, new groves planted out. There isn't a sign of a grove there today! In fact, our Church at Waldo stands out in the field by itself, away from the railroad, and Fairbanks, where we had a Church, has been literally

wiped out. There is a station and one house left in Fairbanks, but the Church, rectory, everything, is gone. The Church has been moved to Starke. I merely speak of the changes which did take place in '95, and I want to return my thanks again. I have done it before for the help which you gave me. Now we are going through a war. I did hope that after the yellow fever in '88, which took off those saintly men, Colonel Daniel and Colonel Fleming, and a number of others whose places can never be filled; the freezes of '95 and '99, the fire in Jacksonville of 1901, and the yellow fever in Pensacola, that calamities had passed, but they have not. We have perhaps the worst one to face now. With twelve hundred miles of seacoast, of course the ports have suffered. Fernandina has suffered seriously. The catching of shrimp is the only industry which they have now in Fernandina. There are no ships to load; the wharves are silent; there is absolutely nothing going on in the place except the shrimp industry. Fernandina, which at one time was a great help, which contributed largely to the support of the Woman's Auxiliary, and also to the support of Missions in the Diocese, is now being helped. We are giving it \$300 a year to enable it to have a rector.

The time has come for us to buckle our armor on and face the difficulties and the trials before us. I must say I have not very much respect for any one who sits down and says he can do nothing, that conditions are such that nothing can be done. I am sorry to say I have had this drummed into my ears from people who, I think, are too lazy and have too little thought of God's Church to rise up and do what they can. That is, however, what we must do. We *must* face the difficulties knowing that if we are courageous and take up the burden the Lord will give us strength.

It is a question of whether we are willing to endure as the Lord endured. We call ourselves Christians, but are we willing to make any sacrifices for Christ? We have the picture of the Master wending His way up to Jerusalem, with the crowd crying to Him, "Hosanna in the highest, Hosanna to the Son of David!" We see Him as He crosses the end of the Mount of Olives and wends His way down into the valley of the Cedron, crossing the brook Cedron, and up the sides of the hill to the Beautiful Gate of the Temple. Then we see Him as He goes into that Temple, with the choristers of the Temple crying out and proclaiming Him the Messiah, while He stands face to face with those priests, offering, if I may so speak, Himself for the cross for our sakes. If the Master was courageous enough to go to His death for our sakes, I say woe to the man or woman who calls himself or herself a Christian who has not the courage to meet the difficulties which come day in and day out.

My simple request is one which, I feel, I can make of you, because I know woman's courage and strength. It is just this: That you go down upon your knees every day and ask the Lord to give you strength and wisdom to do what your hand finds to do.

The Address of the President

So many things have happened since last we met together that we have seemed at times to be caught in a whirl of insistent and conflicting demands that have left us thoroughly perplexed. Truly, "we are bewildered on the way." In the great danger menacing our country, all social conditions and standards in a state of upheaval, the constant parting with those we love, and the appeal for patriotic work of all kinds, it is not wonderful that we are plunged into a form of spiritual fog. Thanks to God, now, as always, He sends forth His Light to guide us.

How truly you have followed the Bishop's injunction of last May—"Seek ye first the Kingdom of God"—has been amply demonstrated. The interest in the Woman's Auxiliary throughout the Diocese is much greater. The contributions for the eight months of this year is over two hundred dollars in advance of that of the preceding year, and there are many instances of healthy growth. Therefore I know, my sisters, that you have prayed, for God's answer is shown in your work.

I am happy to announce that, thanks to the generous responses of many of the Branches to my appeal for gifts for the Fair at Fairbanks, Alaska, I was able to forward five hundred most attractive articles—some were so pretty I wanted to keep them myself. St. Augustine; River Junction; Quincy; Tallahassee; College Branch, Tallahassee; Mandarin; St. John's, St. Mary's, the Good Shepherd and St. Stephen's, Jacksonville; Christ Church, Pensacola, and several individuals united in these generous gifts. In a letter I have just received from the Missionary-in-Charge at Fairbanks, he says that could we have seen the joy of the people in buying the gifts and the pleasure they have in owning them, he thinks we would be repaid for our trouble. He also states that he was prepared for confirmation, years ago, by Bishop Weed, when a Priest in Georgia, and that years after the Bishop ordained him to the Diaconate. There is, therefore, this personal link also that binds us to that far-away land.

In the matter of comfort boxes, the response has been most encouraging. St. John's, the Good Shepherd, St. Stephen's, Jacksonville, Tallahassee, Apalachicola, St. Augustine and Quincy all have responded to my appeal. Of these, Quincy is my banner branch. They have sent me three boxes and notified me that two others are awaiting decision as to where to send them. Apalachicola is second on the list, with two boxes, one of which has already gone to Alaska. In a letter of thanks I received from one of these boxes, the poor little girl to whom it was sent writes me that not only did she have a thrill every day as she opened each package, but that it was a period of interest to the entire ward, who all watched eagerly as she unwrapped the dainty gifts.

When the emergency arose in a call for Testaments to be supplied to our soldier boys, I really felt reluctant to write you. I know so well the innumerable demands—double what they were last year—upon your time and money, the constantly mounting cost of living and the confusion that is apt to arise

from the different demands for the same work. Truly, I expected a comparatively small response, but I failed to realize the power of your love, my sisters; the extent of your willing self-sacrifice. From every direction the money poured in, with letters so encouraging, so loving, that they were a joy to read. Thanks to you, we have equipped two hundred boys with Testaments, and have sent sixty to our Chaplain in Macon. In addition, we have a reserve fund of \$60 in the treasury, which I am going to request you to allow me to hand to the Bishop for any spiritual needs that may arise in serving our soldiers. From Cedar Key came a check for \$2 from the Sunday School, with a note saying that each child was taught to say every day, "God bless our soldiers and sailors and keep them from all evil." Could we not do likewise? From another Sunday School, in Melrose, Fla., a small Mission struggling hard to keep alive the light given them, comes a gift of \$15 for some Mission poorer than they. Is that not an inspiration to us all?

So much for the work of the past year. My heartfelt thanks are yours, for, as always, you have strengthened my hands and given me courage to go forward by your unfailing loyalty.

In the coming year I would ask, first of all, that you try to form prayer circles in your branch. Try to get some members who will be willing to say each day (at 12 o'clock or in the evening), "Thy Kingdom come, O God. Bless our soldiers and sailors and keep them from all evil." Those who are not willing to do this once a day perhaps will agree to meet once a week, and at that time say a brief prayer for the growth of God's Kingdom and the protection of our soldiers and sailors.

I next ask for increased interest in Missionary work and a larger systematic offering. We complain of people's lack of interest in Missions, but I wonder if we are not somewhat to blame ourselves for their attitude. We are all too apt to present the cause of Christ apologetically. Instead of asking some one to join the Woman's Auxiliary because it is their duty, even though it may not be interesting, should we not say to those indifferent ones that we extend to them the glorious privilege of fighting in the Army of the Son of God in the war he is waging against sin and ignorance? There is everything in the way we approach people. I once asked a woman if she would ask some one to join the Mission Study Class, and she said, "I will do it if you want me to, but I know she won't." And when she said that I knew she wouldn't, too. If we make up our minds beforehand that people are anxious to spread the knowledge of the love of Christ, we are much more apt to find them ready to help. Another cause of our failures to interest others is our own ignorance of Mission fields and the conditions against which they fight. For this reason, Mission Study Classes are most necessary. They give the sharp edge of knowledge to the weapons with which we fight for Christ's Kingdom. Another unfortunate thing is the way many of us think of Missions as confined to foreign fields or the poverty-stricken. If we could realize and make others realize that every time we do an act of loving kindness to our fellow men for Christ's sake we are helping to spread abroad the knowledge of His love,

and that it is therefore a missionary act, it would greatly change many people's mental attitude. But remember, "Do all in the name of the Lord, Jesus Christ." Organized charity is an excellent thing in its sphere, but it should never be used by us as a salve to our conscience. Shifting our burdens and responsibilities on the shoulders of some one paid to take them is not bearing one another's burdens. The tender personal touch means twice as much in the eyes of God as a check handed to the Associated Charities once a month.

I would ask you next to try and do some form of work for our soldiers and sailors through the Church and the Woman's Auxiliary. In sending your gifts, send them in your own name always—again, that personal touch means much to the soldiers and sailors—but add the names of your Branch and your Church, as the Woman's Auxiliary, St. John's Episcopal Church, Tallahassee, Florida. Thus do we acknowledge to Our Mother, the Church, our appreciation of the great lesson that she so steadily teaches—the lesson of service to our fellow men—and thus do we show forth to the world the Source from which we draw our strength to continue that service, our courage to endure all that may come to us in so doing. Our Chaplains are calling for many things—books, magazines and games for the men, as well as sweet chocolate and tobacco. In addition, there are the needs of the sick soldiers to whom they so lovingly minister in the many base and regimental hospitals in the various cantonments. They need old linen. They need anything to divert the minds of the convalescents, or a small fund to buy fresh eggs and oranges to help our the convalescents in that hiatus between a sick man's food and a well man's food. Could you not during Lent work on some of these suggestions? A comfort box for a sick soldier would be a blessing to him, and to you.

Therefore our outline for the coming year is much the same as before—prayer and loving work for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. And let us bear in mind always that never again can we hold aloof as a nation. The nations of the world have been mingled in one huge melting pot, and never in the future can one withdraw. The next huge immigration will be the hordes of the East, who even now crouch on our borders, and if they come, with strange and unclean gods and debased ideals, it is our fault. We must teach them of Christ and His Kingdom or we will be the sufferers. A selfish view to take, my sisters, and one that I, therefore, mention last of all, because the only reason for all that we do is that we do it at the command of the Lord Jesus, and do you remember how that command ends? After telling us to preach the Gospel to all people, He adds: "Lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world."

May God bless you and keep you and prosper your work in the coming year.

The noon hour having arrived, prayers for Missions were offered by Rev. C. H. H. Bloor. The President called on Mrs. J. Stewart Lewis to give her impressions of the meetings of the Synod of the Province of Sewanee, recently held in Charleston.

The President read the "Suggestions for the Organization of the Woman's Auxiliary," referred to this branch from the meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Province of Sewanee, for our approval.

After a short discussion of this subject, on motion, the meeting was adjourned, to re-convene at 3 o'clock p. m.

3 O'CLOCK P. M.

The meeting was again called to order at 3 o'clock p. m.

After appropriate prayers, the minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

The President appointed the following a Committee on Courtesy: Mrs. George H. Ruge, Mrs. A. B. Monson and Miss Adele Chaffee.

Mrs. L. Fitz-James Hindry offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

"Resolved, That expressions of regret be conveyed to our absent Diocesan officers, whom we are missing so sadly."

The "Suggestions for the Organization of the Woman's Auxiliary" were now considered. The President appointed Mrs. John E. Hartridge to read them, and each suggestion was voted on separately, with the following result:

1. The Auxiliary should have a constitution, to be ratified by the Board. Accepted.
2. The President of the Board of Missions is, ex-officio, President of the Auxiliary. Accepted.
3. The General Secretary should be nominated by the Auxiliary and appointed by the Board of Missions, her term of office to coincide with that of the President of the Board.

Mrs. W. W. Hampton offered the following amendment to this, which was adopted:

"Resolved, That the General Secretary be nominated by the Diocesan Presidents at the Synods, term of office to be three years, with the privilege of re-election."

4. There should be some sort of unified provincial organization. Accepted.
5. The delegates of the Woman's Auxiliary at the triennial meetings shall elect a chairman of its Executive Committee, who shall preside at all meetings. They shall also elect an Executive Committee, consisting of sixteen members, eight to be nominated by the provinces and eight to be nominated by the whole body of delegates. In case of vacancy in the chairmanship between the triennial meetings, the Executive Committee shall have power to fill the same. Sent back to be made clear.
6. Eight members of the Executive Committee shall be elected members of the Board of Missions. Accepted.
7. The Executive Committee shall meet at the same time as the Board of Missions, either immediately before or immediately after. Accepted.

At this time the Junior Session began. Miss Weed spoke some words of welcome to the Juniors present, and read the annual report of Mrs. Vance, President of the Junior Auxiliary. She also read the financial report and the excellent branch report sent in by the Junior Branch of St. Mary's Church, Jacksonville. She reminded the Juniors of the Missionary scrap books to be finished in June.

The Rev. Loftin addressed the Juniors on the subject of the Missionary work in Western North Carolina, and promised some interesting pictures for their scrap books.
