

Bishop's Address

Holding our meeting in one of the oldest Churches in the Diocese makes me turn my eyes to the past and brings before me the struggle of those years when the hopes of the people were blasted in a night. '95 and '99 were dreadful years. The frost came in February when the sap was up and the trees in bloom; the groves were laid waste and orange culture appeared to be a thing of the past. The people left their homes full of furniture to the forest fires and pelting rains and vacated the state. In 1886 the population of the state was greater than in 1900; at this time, when gloom and depression marked every face, the Woman's Auxiliary rose to the necessity of the occasion and by their prayers and strenuous labors made possible the continuation of the Missionary work of the Diocese. Every member contributed something, no matter how poor, though some found difficulty in supplying their daily bread. The women met together, prayed and worked and managed to send something to the support of the Missionaries. The men received their salaries promptly and those salaries were paid through the self sacrifice of the women. If the Woman's Auxiliary does nothing more, the unflinching faith and persistent labor of those days will entitle them to the gratitude of the Diocese. Remember, too, that these disasters came after the yellow fever epidemic when death took many of our strongest workers.

The Woman's Auxiliary, unconsciously, has grasped the truth which God has sought to impress upon men, that He has delegated to men a large part of His work on earth. To speak more plainly, God never works alone, but by, in and through men. In other words, God has made man His helper in propagating the truth and in advancing His Kingdom. This, the Woman's Auxiliary has grasped and has ever looked upon themselves as God's helpers. Is there any position in the world higher?

May God bless you for your work in the past and give you the vision and strength to do even greater things for Him in the future.

President's Address

My dear Sisters:

A year has passed since we last met together and we give thanks to God that it has been a year of growth and development in our work.

Much of the progress in the past year is due to the wisdom and enthusiasm of the District Presidents. As the reports of the year's work are read you will realize anew the wisdom of the step taken in Palatka, the dividing of the Diocese into Districts.

I wish to commend the excellent work done by the Branches in their donations to the Emery Fund. When the figures were read at the Synod Meeting in Savannah I was both surprised and delighted, as I had no idea that the Diocese could respond so liberally.

In our gifts to the Bishop's Purse we have improved, but are still quite a distance from the goal that was set in Palatka. You remember it, do you not? A dollar per communicant throughout the Diocese for the year, which would make, roughly, a fund of about \$5,000.00. Shall we not endeavor this year to come even nearer our goal?

This year we undertook our first Diocesan Box, and the results were most gratifying. Your Box Secretary, Mrs. Fritot, told me that it was most beautiful work and that the responses that she had had from the Branches had been most hearty. Our National Box Secretary, Mrs. Wade, has written to Mrs. Fritot of her surprise and delight in the swift and complete response on the part of the Diocese of Florida to their allotment.

There has been an increase in Study Classes during Lent, and I am very glad to report that some Branches are beginning to have them during Advent. As I have often told you, we cannot be interested in a thing about which we know nothing and we cannot interest others unless we are able to tell them something clearly. It is, therefore, an absolute necessity for us to learn ourselves if we would spread the knowledge of the work being done for Christ's Kingdom.

I note also that several Branches have begun sewing circles during Lent, and I hope it will become a universal practice.

I am glad to report that six branches of the Young People's Service League have been organized in different Parishes and Missions.

As we value the future of our Church, as we value her power to become a leading force in the betterment of the world, so must we devote our prayers, our time, our thought, to

turning the energies and fresh enthusiasm of our young people into the channels of the Church's work. I am glad to report two instances where the Woman's Auxiliary has been directly responsible for the organization of Sunday Schools.

The plan, as developed by those in charge of the Brotherhood at Gainesville, was sent to the various Branches early in the year. It was hoped that twenty-five Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary could send fifty dollars a year for either three or four years, I have forgotten which, and that this would help to pay for the building and its equipment. Many of the Branches have responded most wonderfully and I sincerely hope that the remainder will put it in their budget of work for the coming year. If fifty dollars a year is divided into 12 parts it is only a little over four dollars a month, and we might try to work for it in that way. Any further information desired on the subject can be obtained from the Rev. R. B. Templeton, Gainesville, Fla.

I regret to report that we have made no progress on the censorship of moving pictures and in the very vital question of week-day religious instruction for the children. I feel that in this coming year there will be a great awakening in the minds of men as to the necessity for Christian ideals and inspiration, and I beg you to be prepared to meet the demand when it comes. We stand for Christian education. Let us be sure we stand firmly and fully equipped to meet any demand upon us.

Accompanied by your Educational Secretary, Mrs. J. Stuart Lewis, and the President of District No. 3, Mrs. Richard P. Hopkins, I attended the meeting of the Synod of the Fourth Province in Savannah, Ga. The three resolutions which were sent out by the Presiding Bishop and Council as to woman's status in the deliberations of the Church were presented, and after much most interesting discussion were voted down. These will be presented to you for your consideration later in the meeting.

I have during the past year addressed District meetings at St. Andrew's, Jacksonville, Gainesville, Quincy, and St. Columba's, Ortega. I have attended the Synod meeting in Savannah, have been a guest at a meeting in the Church of the Good Shepherd, Augusta, Ga., and have attended branch meetings at the Church of the Good Shepherd, Jacksonville, St. Mary's, Jacksonville, St. Alban's, Jacksonville, and Our Saviour's, Mandarin. In the past year I have only written one hundred letters and sent off several charts. As always, your love, your courage and your enthusiasm have sustained and inspired me. God bless you for it.

And now, what of the coming year's work?

First of all, I must announce with regret the resignation of our most devoted and efficient Box Secretary, Mrs. A. W. Fritot. Her work in the past year was wonderful, and we shall greatly miss her interest and executive ability. We have for our new Box Secretary, Mrs. Walter P. Corbett, 230 Gilmore St., Jacksonville, Fla. All who know Mrs. Corbett realize how fortunate we are in securing her leadership in this work. I am pleased to announce that Miss Eleanor Rawson, Instructor at Concordia School, residing at 1943 Riverside Avenue, Jacksonville, Fla., is the Diocesan Director of Pageantry for the coming year. Miss Rawson's wide knowledge of literature and her experience in pageantry will be of great assistance to us in our work. We are to hear Dr. Robert W. Patton on the subject of the Nation-Wide Campaign, and I will ask you, my sisters, to work as never before in your respective Branches in this progressive work of our Church. In some places it may be wiser for you to undertake to meet a portion of your parochial quota; in other places it may be better for you to work as individuals; but at all times try to follow the entire program outlined by the General Church. Give the whole plan outlined by the Presiding Bishop and Council a trial before deciding upon its success or failure. For the rest, all of our old work expanding and progressing under the inspiration of prayer and increasing knowledge, and new work undertaken with enthusiasm and continued with devotion and courage. I remember a time when a large Branch told me that I was asking too much of them when I told them that I wanted each member to attend program meetings, have a study class during Lent, and give ten cents per member per month. They said that nobody would come to the meetings, that they could not get a leader for the study class and that the dues must be reduced to five cents. If you will listen to the reports of the program meetings, study classes and the sum totals of money given to various causes, including the box work, you will see how God has answered our prayers that we might learn more of Him and do more for Him. Could we not this year have a Prayer Circle in each Branch in the Diocese that would at least once a month have distinctive prayers for the general work of the Woman's Auxiliary, for the Nation-Wide Campaign, for each of the Five Fields of Service, for the United Thank Offering, and for our various distinctive plans of work here in the Diocese? You would be amazed at the results next year. Our plan, you see, is very simple after all—to pray, to work, to give and to grow in the knowledge of God and of the work to be done for His Kingdom.

I will end by telling you of a conversation I had with a friend recently. She was inquiring about the sewing being done during Lent—how we did it, for whom we were sewing, and she raised frequent objections. In the end she said, "I don't think I will join in this work, I want to do something big, and just making up baby clothes seems so little. Do you think it is worth while?" I ask you that question, my sisters. To make the road easier for stumbling feet, to heal the wounds dealt to the bodies and souls of our brothers and sisters, to make a mother glad that her baby can be clothed, to give some doubting soul a realization of God's love by an act of thoughtfulness and mercy, to carry to the sullen and despairing in hospitals and prisons the realization that Someone cares what what happens to them, is this worth while? Has not Christ Himself told us, "Inasmuch as ye do it unto the least of these, my brethren, ye do it unto me?" It is with joy and a quickened spirit of service that we start on this stretch of the road.

Their young secretary read an excellent report, after which Miss Weed read the reports of the Diocesan Officers of the Junior Auxiliary and also gave a most interesting talk which was enjoyed by the Seniors as well as the Juniors.

Reports of the Junior work were presented as follows:

These are two new Branches which have been added to District No. 2 since the last Convention.

At the conclusion of the reading of the reports Miss Weed announced that a memorial service would be held at the afternoon session, for those who had passed since the last annual meeting, to their higher work, "their great and glorious reward."

Dr. Anna Higbee spoke in glowing terms of the splendid work done by Miss Tebeau in the Diocesan School at Gainesville.

Miss Weed presented for discussion the following questions, sent out by executive board of the Woman's Auxiliary, to the Presiding Bishop and council, to discover, as far as possible, the sentiment of the Woman's Auxiliary regarding woman's work and place in the Church:

Question No. 1—Do you agree or not with resolution 46 of the Lambeth Conference, namely, "Women should be admitted to those Councils of the Church to which laymen are admitted and on equal terms?"

No. 2—"Do you favor or not the advisability of putting this principle into effect by establishing a National House of Church-women, in equal co-ordination with the existing Houses of General Convention?"

No. 3—As an alternative to No. 2, "Would you favor or not the admission of women as delegates to the House of Deputies?"

Vote taken on each question, separately, resulted in the negative for all.

Expression from the Branches being asked regarding the influence upon church activities, of the following subjects which were taken up during the past year, resulted as here recorded:

Pageantry, as a force for good in the Church's life. Favorable.

The Effect of District Meetings. Agreed to be most helpful.

Influence of the Young People's Service League. Heartily endorsed as imparting enthusiasm to the young people, and a desire to be helpful in the work of the Church.

On motion, the meeting adjourned until 2 P. M.

2:00 P. M.

The meeting was opened at 2 P. M. by Miss Weed with appropriate prayers, and a beautiful tribute to all members of the Auxiliary who have passed since the last annual meeting, to their reward. Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Resolved—That in appreciation of the wonderful work done in Miss Tebeau's School at Gainesville, the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Florida should found a Scholarship in this Diocesan School, to be competed for by girls over fourteen years of age, recommended by each rector in the Diocese, "once in four years."

Additional resolution in regard to this was:

Resolved—That the various Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary further this work, by calling the attention of the rectors of their Parishes to this School and asking their aid in influencing parents in favor of it.

Resolved—That the sympathy of the Woman's Auxiliary be extended to Mrs. Worsham in her bereavement.

Resolved—That a message of greeting be sent Mrs. J. M. Jones.

Resolved—That a message of love and sympathy be sent to Mrs. Chas. Linn and prayers offered for her recovery.

Resolved—That we regret exceedingly the absence from this annual meeting of five of our Diocesan Officers: Mrs. A. B. Vance, Second Vice-President; Mrs. M. H. Haughton, Treasurer; Mrs. A. W. Fritot, Box Secretary; Mrs. B. F. Haynes, Custodian of the United Offering; Mrs. J. Stewart Lewis, Educational Secretary.

After discussion the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved—That reports of the Woman's Auxiliary, for the Fiscal Year, be from January to January, instead of from April to April, as heretofore.

The Committee on Courtesy submitted its report, which was accepted, and is as follows:

Resolved—That the Woman's Auxiliary desires to express their appreciation of the cordial hospitality, and many courtesies extended to them by the Woman's Auxiliary and members of Trinity Parish, and citizens of Apalachicola. To Mrs. Hagerman for the use of her lovely home. And also to Mr. W. H. Wood, manager of the Franklyn Hotel, for the use of the hotel lobby for our meetings.

Report of Educational Secretary

Madam President, Ladies of the Woman's Auxiliary:

It is a great disappointment not to be with you this year, sickness is the only cause that would keep me away from this Council.

I have disappointments to report of last year's enthusiasm of "The One Hour Religious Education in Cooperation With the Public Schools." The only partial success, being that of Lloyd. For many weeks our rector at Monticello, Mr. Knauff, had one hour every Monday afternoon at Lloyd, then the entire school being turned over to him for instruction in religion. Mr. Knauff has lately been transferred to DeFuniak Springs, and let us hope he will be successful in placing this instruction in the public school there, also in stirring up the Woman's Auxiliary.

Mr. Lavendar, the Baptist pastor, who had this work in charge at Live Oak, wrote in November they "had done what they could, but the Presbyterians would not cooperate and they thought best to wait, until the work should be unanimous. They had not given up hope."

As I reported last year there is a great deal of enthusiasm and earnest thought of the necessity for this education among the children of the public schools, for the saving of our Country, as a Democracy, and as a Christian Country, a saving of the United States for—God.

Ladies, we, the women, were the first to be given the command by our Lord Jesus Christ to "Go, and tell my brethren." Will you not cooperate with God now in the work? Think of it, cooperate with God, the wonder of the privilege, and "Go and tell" our own people. "Go and tell" the Methodists, the Baptists, the Presbyterians, show them the way to do it, to teach religion, faith in Jesus and in God, during the week, show the children we think it is just as important to learn how to serve God, as how to serve man. Let this be our work for this year. The unbelief in Christian families is alarming, the ignorance and indifference in Christian homes is appalling. "Go and tell" and pray, that God will be merciful and not let this, "His heritage be brought to confusion."

I wrote seven letters and sixty post cards this year and sent over four packages of leaflets and three books for Advent and Lenten Study Classes and monthly program meetings. I made three visits of instruction for the Woman's Auxiliary and Study Classes. I, also, sold nearly two hundred Missionary Calendars in the Diocese. Respectfully submitted,

Report of Box Secretary, Woman's Auxiliary

Diocese of Florida

Jacksonville, Fla., May 12, 1922

Madam President, Diocesan Officers and Members:

I have the honor to report that the work for the year has been progressing satisfactorily.

October 28, 1921, we received the allotment of a personal box to be sent to a clergyman and his family in South Carolina. This allotment consisted of household goods and clothing. With the aid of Miss Weed, our beloved President, I was able to assign allotments to the various branches throughout the Diocese. Then followed a period of correspondence, in which some of the branches requested an adjustment of the allotments, which was promptly carried out, and all assignments were made before Dec. 1, 1921.

All of the branches did splendid work and responded most enthusiastically.

St. Albans Branch, Murray Hill, St. Peter's Branch, Fernandina, St. Mary's Branch, Madison, and the Newberry Branch, were for various good reasons, unable to aid in the work, and Mrs. Fred Hardee, of Madison, sent personally, one dollar, to be applied to a clerical suit.

I wish to especially commend the work of District No. 2, which not only accepted the original allotments, but furnished twenty pair of curtains, at a cost of \$35.75, and also sent a "Sunshine Box" for Christmas, which contained delicacies, which was valued at \$71.11.

Mrs. C. B. Rogers of Good Shepherd Branch, aided in packing and shipping the box and did much toward getting it off, so that it reached Martin's Point for Christmas. The total value not including the Sunshine Box, was \$300.00.

Dec. 18, 1921, the Little Helpers', St. Mary's Branch, Jacksonville, sent a box of children's clothing to Mrs. Geffrey, Beaufort, N. C., valued at \$20.00.

April 18, 1922, a box of children's clothing was received from Christ Church Branch, St. Andrews, Fla., which was sent to the Diocesan President, for distribution. Value \$18.00.

Our Savior Branch, Mandarin, reports one box to Grace Hospital, Morganton, N. C., value \$50.00; a Christmas box for a clergyman's wife, containing two gowns, value \$3.00; and a Lenten box to Grace Hospital, Morganton, N. C., value \$37.75.

Crescent City, Holy Comforter Branch, sent a box to Grace Hospital, Morganton, N. C., containing hospital supplies, valued at \$35.00.

St. Peter's Branch, Fernandina, sent a box valued at \$30.00 to Monterys, Tenn.

St. John's Branch, Jacksonville, reports having sent five barrels of clothing to Glenn Alpin, N. C., valued at \$259.60.

Little Helpers, St. Mary's Branch, Jacksonville, sent an Easter box, containing children's clothing, to Beaufort, N. C., valued at \$25.00.

St. Andrew's Branch, Jacksonville, reports a box of quilt scraps sent to Miss Roine, Sherwood, Tenn. Clothing to County Hospital; two complete baby layettes, one to County Hospital and one in the city, no value reported.

Total value of boxes sent by the Diocese during the year, \$849.46.

Report of Junior League, St. John's Church School, of Tallahassee, Florida

The Junior League is the official title (name) of the Juniors of the Church School, organized for week-day activities. The aim of the League is Service, in the Five Fields. They pray: "GOD BLESS OUR WORK AND ACCEPT OUR SERVICE FOR CHRIST'S SAKE."

The Report for 1921-1922 is as follows:

SERVICE IN THE PARISH: Altar service from the boys. The girls had charge of and distributed the flowers to the Congregation on Mother's Day.

SERVICE IN THE COMMUNITY: *First:* Weekly offerings to the Silver Cross Hospital and to the county jail of magazines, newspapers and flowers. *Second:* Offering at Thanksgiving of two complete outfits of children's clothing, also candy and fruits.

SERVICE IN THE DIOCESE: The Lenten Offering to Nation-Wide Campaign.

SERVICE IN THE NATION: A box of clothing and toys to St. Mary's School and to St. Andrew's School, Sewanee, Tennessee.

SERVICE IN THE WORLD: Response to call of Near East Relief for clothing. Collections are now being made in preparation for "Bundle Day."

ORGANIZATION

OFFICERS: The League is directed by the teachers of the Junior Department of the Church School. The only officer is the secretary, who is one of the children, and is elected by the members for one month.

CHURCH EXTENSION: The League has the privilege of extending its membership to Juniors of the Evangelistic Sunday Schools. The League has three in its membership.

FUNDS: The funds used by the League in these activities are obtained from the Church School systematic weekly offerings. The Church School employs the Treasury System, as outlined by the Christian Nurture Series.

MEETINGS: The Junior League has one business meeting, one social meeting and two service meetings each month. The Junior League holds weekly meetings. One of these is a business meeting, one a social meeting, and the remaining two are for community service. The program of the League closes with the closing of the Church School.

DIRECTORS: The directors of the Junior League are: Mrs. James B. Whitfield, Mrs. A. M. Roberts, Mrs. John W. Henderson and Mrs. A. M. Williamson.

Report of Little Helpers

Apalachicola, May 18, 1922.

To the President and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary:

While parents are feeling the need of spiritual help from some source, the Church is offering the Little Helpers' department, whose aim is to develop spiritual life in the home and to deepen the Missionary in the Church, beginning with the child at his Baptism. This work is a beautiful link which binds him to the Church until he is old enough to enter the Sunday School.

Many parents lose a great opportunity because they do not begin with the earliest years to train their children in the Church, for those who have made a study of child nature tell us children are greatly influenced by their earliest surroundings.

On the Mite Box is a prayer asking God to bless the Missionaries all over the world, and every little helper. This is said first by the mother, then repeated with the child until he can say it alone as he drops in his penny or weekly offering. The offering is collected once a year, usually Holy Innocents' day, and is sent to maintain work among children, the mission fields, such as two day schools in China, two kindergartens in Japan, a cot in St. Agnes' Hospital, Raleigh, N. C., and to assist in Church work generally. We are covering the five fields of service in Home and Parish, offering assistance, if necessary, in arranging for babies' baptism.

Community sewing for the poor.

Diocese contribution to Bishop's Purse.

Matron boxes for hospitals and schools.

World schools in foreign countries.

Our offering from January, 1921, until January, 1922, amounted to \$73.90, expenditures \$6.00, leaving a balance of \$67.90.

Please let me emphasize the importance of the work of the Little Helpers. We are all responsible for this great foundation work of the Church.
