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THE BISHOP'S LETTER

To the Members of the Woman's Auxiliary.

My Dear Sisters:

It was a great disappointment to me that I could not meet the members of the Woman's Auxiliary at the May meeting. It is the first time in thirty-six years that I have failed to have the cheer and comfort which I always receive from contact with the earnest, energetic spirits which compose this famous organization.

I use the word "famous" advisedly because of the famous work which the organization has accomplished. When the State was depleted, owing to the freezes of ninety-five and ninety-nine, the Woman's Auxiliary never lost heart; never became discouraged: they simply worked harder and sustained the missions of the Diocese.

Owing to the labors and self-sacrifice of the Woman's Auxiliary, only once in thirty-six years have the salaries of the men on the field been behind and then only for a month. That was during the yellow fever epidemic of 1888.

It was largely through the encouragement of the Woman's Auxiliary, both in interest and gifts, that the Brotherhood Club at Gainesville was made possible.

Am I not right in calling the organization "famous"? So much have you done to advance the Kingdom of God that your labors have become known beyond the bounds of Florida and it is with admiration and gratitude that I think of all your loving self-sacrifice for Christ.

No one will ever know how much I have missed being at your meeting this year. May God bless and prosper you through all the coming year.

## PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

My Dear Sisters:

Before we go on with our plans for another year's work for God, let us gather up the hopes and disappointments, encouragements and discouragements, successes and failures, and lay them at the feet of Him who understands all. He knows with what love we planned all and with what distress we mourned our failures, and His blessing will transform each act of love into a bit of paving of the way that leads to Him who is Love. So may another through our experience find the road easier to tread. Can we ask more?

In the past year there has been a most encouraging growth in work and workers, and above all in the spirit of love and hopefulness as well as co-operation. For all of these blessings we give thanks to God.

In the year to come, we must above all things try to draw nearer to God through prayer. Never try to do work for God without first asking His guidance and help. So let us pray more earnestly, more constantly and more specifically. I am sending to the District Presidents a list of objects for which I hope the Branches will pray at each meeting. If each petition is offered by a different person it will make a more widespread interest. I would also like the various Branches to establish prayer partnerships with various workers in the field. You can get more information from your District Presidents on this subject. Have the devotional part of each meeting in the middle of the meeting or at the end, instead of the beginning. The middle is preferable, as you will then have both the "late comers" and the "early goers" at the most important part of the meeting.

After praying to God we must "throw our lives after our prayers," and to do this we must learn more of the objects of our prayers that we may be able to tell others. I hope, therefore, that you will meet for Discussion Groups in Advent as well as in Lent for your Study Class. Take the Gospels for your Advent study and discussion. Also be sure to attend and lead the Discussion Groups in connection with the Nation-Wide Campaign. Take the Spirit of Missions as well as one of our National Church papers, and do not forget the Missionary Calendar, which you will find a storehouse of information and a great help in getting up program meetings. The Story of the Program you can get from Miss Julia Yonge, DeFuniak Springs, Florida, and you will find it most interesting and helpful. At



one of your meetings read the Resolutions passed at the Triennial in Portland, that you may know what our delegates have planned for the next three years. Copies of these resolutions may be obtained from your District Presidents. At another meeting read the literature on the Auxiliary Specials and also the Provincial Special. Give one meeting to learning more about the United Thank Offering. Literature about this may be obtained from Mrs. Haynes, the Custodian. Literature about the Auxiliary Specials can be obtained from Miss Wilson, Diocesan Chairman. Miss Weed can furnish you with literature on the Provincial Special.

Having learned yourself, do not forget to tell others. Make the central plan of each meeting one of the objects for which you are praying. Make your United Thank Offering meeting a most interesting one, and also talk about it; ask each member especially to come, and to bring someone with her. Ask women of other denominations, and be sure that you know about the United Thank Offering so that you can answer questions that will surely be asked.

Remember that you are auxiliary to all the forward work of the Church, so do not fail to give your "labor of heart and hand" to the Church School by establishing, encouraging, and teaching, also to the Young People's Service League. Information on this subject can be obtained from Rev. Melville E. Johnson, Riverside, Jacksonville, Fla., who is the Diocesan President. Try to have pageants at Christmas and Easter and in connection with your United Thank Offering Meeting. You can get them from Miss Rawson. Above all, remember that the work of the Church is to spread the knowledge of Christ's love everywhere, and you can do much by your own life.

As to the financial part of our work, I would suggest a departure from our old methods. Make a budget of your pledges and hang it on the wall of your Parish houses or in the house where you meet, on the day of meeting. You can get the figures from your District Presidents. This budget will not only be a reminder to you, but it will inform the Parish of the work that you are doing. The little Missions are as dependent as are individuals on the Bishop's Fund, so do not lose sight of your pledge to this Fund. The Brotherhood Club at the University of Florida for our boys and boys of other denominations and no denomination, is our most vital and pressing need. We have pledged our aid and I am sure that we feel the need and want to supply it. So let us do our part quickly. The Branch at



Santa Rosa is doing a unique and splendid piece of work in collecting bandages, simple medicines and sick room supplies to be used when needed throughout the sparsely settled country. Any person having anything that would help in this work can send it to Mrs. C. A. Taylor, and it will fill a great need. It is seeing and grasping these opportunities for service that show "how we have learned Christ."

I would like to have you carry in your hearts and minds throughout the year the thought expressed by Rev. W. W. Memminger in his "Spelling the Cross": "The C in the Cross stands for Courage, moral courage to do and to endure. The R is for Responsibility, to our brother, to our community, to our nation and to the world. The O is for Obedience to Christ and His law of Love for all men. The double S is for Self-Sacrificing Sympathy—the sympathy that not only understands and feels, but helps at cost to one's self. Thus we see that the Cross spells Service—Loving Service to the World."

As we work for God throughout the coming year let us work with joy and the constant remembrance of that Cross and its loving Call to Service.

Miss Weed announced that Mrs. Tyler could boast of three new branches in her District—Warrington, Santa Rosa and Milton.

Miss Weed gave a short explanation of the charts she had prepared, and suggested Branch Budgets, monthly contributions from Church Schools, and closer affiliation with the newly confirmed, as future work.

After a delightful luncheon served by the Woman's Guild of Holy Trinity, the members assembled for the afternoon session. The meeting was called to order at 2 p. m. After prayer, the minutes of the previous meeting were read, and, after corrections, approved. Miss Weed followed with an address full of that unfailing enthusiasm which is always so inspiring to her co-workers.

Mrs. M. H. Haughton, Treasurer, read her report, which was accepted.

Mrs. J. H. Arnold followed with her report, as Corresponding Secretary, which was also accepted.

The Educational Secretary, Mrs. Stewart Lewis, being prevented by ill health from attending the meeting, her report was read by the Recording Secretary, Mrs. George Chapin, and upon motion accepted. The resignation of Mrs. Lewis which accompanied her report caused genuine sorrow among the members, with whom she has been a faithful co-worker, and her resignation was accepted with regret. On motion, a committee composed of Miss Weed, Mrs. Corry and Mrs. Arnold was appointed to send a telegram of greeting and regret to Mrs. Lewis.

The report of the Box Secretary was read by Mrs. Chapin.

Mrs. Ruge, Custodian of the Young Memorial Fund, made a final report of having received a total of \$1,020, and the President declared this fund officially closed.

Mrs. Haynes, Custodian of the United Thank Offering, read her report, which was accepted.

Miss Weed again called attention to the charts as illustrative of work accomplished in the different Districts.

Mrs. Westcott, in the absence of Mrs. T. T. Weltch, read the report of the Little Helpers. This report was accepted.

Miss Weed spoke of the work of Miss Rawson as Director of Pageantry, and urged the branches to notify Miss Rawson early when in need of plays or pageants.

The following resolutions were offered and adopted:

The Woman's Auxiliary presents the following resolution:



"That the Bishop or Presiding Officers of the Council, call attention of the Clergy to the Canon of the Church that the Sunday School Offering for the first Sunday of the month, and the Advent offering, should be sent to the Treasurer of the Diocese for the Bishop's Fund."

**Resolved,** That owing to the importance of the Brotherhood Club of the Diocese of Florida at Gainesville, to free said Club of debt each Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary shall be asked to borrow the amount of their apportionment of said debt, and pay that amount to the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees of said Club, so that each Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary can raise the amount pledged at their convenience and yet clear the Club of debt.

**Resolved,** That we, the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Florida, in Annual Session, do hereby express our sympathy to the Diocese of Missouri, and to the family of our late beloved Presiding Bishop; realizing the great loss that the Church has sustained, and thanking our heavenly Father for his noble life and example.

**Resolved,** That this resolution be spread upon our minutes and that a copy be sent to the family of Bishop Tuttle.

**Resolved,** That each Branch shall contribute annually to the best of its ability, to the Thackara Library Fund.

**Resolved,** That the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Florida send the following request to the Bishop: that he grant the privilege to any Branch to change the day of its meeting, if not convenient to them to meet on the first Monday in the month.

**Resolved,** That in the absence of a delegate from a Branch the District President, if a member of that Branch, shall act as delegate.

A short memorial service followed, all standing while prayers were offered for those members of the Auxiliary who have passed, since the last Annual meeting, to broader fields of service.

Parochial Reports were resumed and the reports from Milton, Santa Rosa and Warrington, the new Branches, were read by Mrs. Tyler, President of this District.

Miss Birley presented a report on the Tebeau Scholarship, introducing Miss Gladys Malcolm, the winner of the scholarship offered by the Woman's Auxiliary, and giving the record of her splendid work which showed her lowest mark for the whole year to be 90. Miss Malcolm and Miss Hollins, another scholarship



girl from the Tebeau School who was present, were received with hearty applause when presented to the Auxiliary.

The award of a gold star, for 100 per cent organization, was made to District No. 4, Mrs. Alfred Tyler, President, also three red stars placed for the three new Branches in that District, Milton, Santa Rosa and Warrington. Two red stars were placed for the two new Branches in District No. 2, Mrs. Reginald White President, Cedar Key and Green Cove Springs. Two red stars were placed for the new Branches in District No. 1, Mrs. W. B. Young President, Ortega and Hilliard.

The following Committees submitted their reports, which were accepted with appreciation:

Committee on Courtesy: **Resolved,** That the Woman's Auxiliary desires to express to members of Holy Trinity Parish, the Woman's Auxiliary and the people of Gainesville, their hearty appreciation of the delightful hospitality and the many thoughtful courtesies extended to them during their visit.

The Publicity Committee reported that they had furnished detailed accounts of the daily sessions to the newspapers.

The Chart Committee reported the inspection and hanging of the Charts, and the placing of stars where awarded.

At a signal from Miss Weed, all rose for the singing of the Doxology, after which, upon motion, the meeting was adjourned sine die.

Shortly after the previous Annual Meeting, I undertook the re-organization of the Church Periodical Club in this Diocese. I wrote to the President in New York for instructions, then to each Directress asking her to appoint a Librarian to be ready when a Dicesan Correspondent of the C. P. C. should be appointed several responded and when Miss Weed appointed Mrs. H. H. Buckman, Correspondent of the C. P. C. for Florida, I turned over to her all correspondence relating to the office. I bespeak for Mrs. Buckman your heartest co-operation.

It is a simple and inexpensive thing to remail to an isolated person a magazine we have read and think of the wonderful result—comfort and joy to a lonely one and a new friend for ones self.

In May, 1922, we learned through Miss Lindley that Miss Thakara had retired from mission work. Miss Thakara's father was one of the early priests of this Diocese, having served faithfully several missions, including St. Johns, Jacksonville; Fernandina and Gainesville some years ago. The Auxiliary, wishing to honor the memory of this beloved priest, established the Thakara Fund, which was used to help his daughter in her work among the Navajo Indians. At her request it is to be used in the Diocese and is now called the Thakara Library Fund. It is given to our Bishop, who will use it to buy the more expensive books of reference to be loaned to the clergy of the Diocese. It seems to me that the Thakara Library Fund should receive yearly contributions from every branch.

Besides the correspondence relative to these matters, four times during the year I have sent circular letters to all Directresses with notices of Auxiliary Day Annual Meeting, urging branches to send in the U. T. O. money before August 15th to Mrs. Haynes and to appoint Librarians.

I have sent out several packages of Prayer leaflets and the pamphlet, "What It Is," by Miss Weed.

I have written five letters of sympathy, and several miscellaneous letters; also mailed some Annual Reports to individuals.

## REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY

Madam President and Ladies of the Woman's Auxiliary:

It is a great disappointment not to be with you this year, both in missing the inspiration of your reports and companionship and not being in Gainesville.

In looking over the Parish reports of the Council, held in Apalachicola last May, I find there were nineteen study classes, held during Lent, 1922, and several Parishes report monthly program meetings, with readings or study classes. May I hope that some of these were answers to my letters and prayers. Eleven Parishes or Missions made no report of study classes or readings of any kind at meetings during Lent.

There are now thirty-five Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in the Diocese. I wrote each Branch of your request that there should be a study class in every Parish and Mission of the Diocese during Lent, 1923, studying, "How Can We Know the Way?" I hope each Branch will report having this Study Class.

On account of ill health I was unable to handle the Church Missionary Calendars for 1923, but sent a list of the Parishes with names of the Officers to Miss Avery, at Philadelphia, for her to take up the sales direct with the Parishes. Quite a number were sold in the Diocese.

At Christmas, I requested, through the daily papers, magazines for distribution. I sent two boxes, containing one hundred and seventy-eight magazines, to the State Prison Farm at Raiford; one box of seventy-two to the Government Hospital at Lake City; and twenty-four to the City Jail and County Convicts. These were of all descriptions, religious, fiction, scientific, agricultural and of different lodges.

During the year 1922, I wrote twenty letters, fifty or more post cards and sent several packages of literature for Program Meetings and Study Classes.

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REPORT OF THE BOX SECRETARY

Woman's Auxiliary—Diocese of Florida.

Oct. 1st, 1922, to Dec. 31, 1922.

Madam President and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary:

You will notice that this report covers only the last quarter of the year 1922. The Lenten work of last year was reported by my predecessor in office; that of 1923 will appear in next year's report.

The Diocesan allotment was a "personal box" which was to be sent to a family in charge of an industrial school for boys in the mountains of North Carolina. The list of articles of clothing desired was a long one, but what seemed to be an equitable distribution was made. The various branches were each requested to donate certain articles and in addition one dollar in money toward the purchase of the clergyman's suit as it was desired to make that literally a gift "from the Diocese."

It is with pride that we report that every organization made its contribution. Every article requested was provided and all were of the highest quality. In addition there were many extra gifts.

The box valued at \$375.00 reached its destination two days before Christmas. A list of all donations accompanied the box and the recipients have written notes of thanks to each contributing organization. We feel sure that the personal interest shown in all our gifts was highly appreciated.

In addition to taking their share in the Diocesan box, three Branches: Good Shepherd, of Jacksonville; Our Saviour, of Mandarin, and Trinity, of St. Augustine, sent special Christmas boxes to the same family.

Other Branches reporting individual work are as follows:

St. John's Church, Jacksonville—Three barrels of clothing, valued at \$160.55, to St. Paul's Mission at Glen Alpin, N. C., and one box of children's clothing sent to the Industrial School at Beaufort, S. C., value \$10.00. Total \$170.55.

St. Agatha's Church, DeFuniak Springs—Three boxes valued at \$52.00.

St. Andrew's, Panama City—Scrap books, dolls, etc., sent to Grace Hospital, Morganton, N. C.

Little Helpers of St. Mary's, Jacksonville—Box valued at \$15.00 sent to St. Paul's School, Beaufort, N. C. Also bed linen



and nightgowns to the value of \$16.00 to the Children's Ward of St. Luke's Hospital, Jacksonville.

Holy Comforter, Crescent City—Christmas box valued at \$25.00 to Grace Hospital, Morganton, N. C.

St. Peter's, Fernandina—Box valued at \$30.00 to St. Raphael's Mission, Monterey, Tenn.

Trinity, Apalachicola—Little Helpers sent baby layettes, crib sheets, etc., to Children's Ward of St. Luke's Hospital, Jacksonville.

To apportion the articles for the Diocesan box, acknowledge receipt of packages and express appreciation of the donations, about one hundred and seventy-five (175) letters were written by the Box Secretary.

All expenses were paid and there remains on hand a few dollars as a nucleus for the work of 1923.

Your former Box Secretary, Mrs. A. W. Fritot, has rendered valuable assistance in many ways, but especially in acting as buyer for those organizations which could not satisfactorily procure their allotment in their home towns.

To your President, who personally knows the workers, the size of their hearts and their ability to meet the demands made upon them, is due the credit for making the apportionments which needed no adjustment.

Expressing appreciation of the privilege of serving the Woman's Auxiliary and regretting my inability to attend the annual meeting and make my report in person, I am,

Discussion followed upon various subjects from which we derived great benefit; space and time being too limited to go into details, but which has kept us looking forward to our work and District meetings in the future. Reports were next heard from outstanding committees. Very gracious words were spoken by the Chairman of the Courtesy Committee, thanking the entertaining Branch for their hospitality, and the Secretary felt we, too, should thank them for the inspiration they afforded us—they—just a few, but with the vision to persevere. It was then reported that DeFuniak Springs Branch had invited the branches to meet with her just previous to the Council meeting in May, date of which is to be announced later.

During part of the day's session Archdeacon Knauff and the other clergy of the Fourth District held a meeting at which the following resolutions were adopted:

"We, Archdeacon and other Clergy of the Fourth District of West Florida, attending a District meeting of the Auxiliary on the date of November 9th, 1922, have organized ourselves with the idea of holding semi-annual meetings for the discussion of problems affecting the interests of this part of the Diocese. The following resolutions were passed:

"1. That our Fall meetings should be held at the time and place of the District meetings of the Auxiliary.



"2. That our Spring meetings be held at the time and place of the Diocesan Council.

"It is, therefore, Resolved, That we suggest to the women of this District that they meet annually, and in the Fall.

The College Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has a regular meeting once each month. There are always quite a few girls at this service. On the second Sunday in each month we have corporate communion; also have a committee to write to Olive Rigdon (the little orphan whom we are clothing) each month.

After business several articles are read from Church magazines so that we might keep up with the work done in the Mission field. The Infirmary Committee visits the College Infirmary every day to talk or read to girls there and to take flowers to them.

Our most interesting work is the clothing of Olive. We sent a box to her just before Easter containing a white dress, a nice green gingham, six gingham aprons, lingerie, two pairs of shoes and socks. These clothes were cut out by Mrs. Barnes and made by the members of the Auxiliary. We send her two boxes a year, one for Christmas and one each Spring. She is now eleven years old and seems to be a very interesting, appreciative child.

Each member as she graduates leaves one dollar to the Vocational Fund so that we may have enough money to give Olive one year of special training when she is too old to remain longer at the home.

During Lent we had a study class each Thursday. We had a short service, followed by most interesting and instructive talks by Judge Whitfield.

Our membership is forty (40). We live in hopes of greatly increasing this number. There are many others who would like to do this work, but their time is so taken up with school affairs.

## REPORT OF YOUNG PEOPLE'S SERVICE LEAGUE GAINESVILLE, FLA.

The Woman's Auxiliary.

Greetings:

The Young People's Service League has been organized and working in Holy Trinity Parish since January, 1922.

We started out with a membership of about twenty. During the past eighteen months we have grown from twenty to about fifty.

During this time we have conducted regular meetings every Sunday night, at which some topic of interest has been discussed, usually by one of its members.

Besides the above services, we have conducted a missionary service each second Sunday in the month (the other Sundays being taken care of by the other leagues of the city) at the Florida Farm Colony.

In this same connection, the League decided to club together with the other leagues of the city in buying a piano for the Farm Colony. Our quota was set at ten dollars, which was paid at that time.

At the beginning of the summer session of the University, the League sent out letters to all the clergy of Florida asking them to put us in touch with any young people coming here for that session. We advised them that we would reserve rooms for them, and meet them at the trains. This was not very successful owing to few clergy that responded. However, we were of service to some of them.

In November of the past year, the League made sixty dollars to be given toward the Parish House, by staging a Society Circus. This was made possible largely through the efforts of Miss Ruth Templeton.

At the present time, we are raising funds for a table to be used in the Parish House, that will cost about thirty-five dollars.

We decided to get in touch with some of the outlying missions near here, and conduct at least one service in each, each month. But this was undertaken so late in the spring that as yet we have not been very successful.

I regret that I have not a complete Treasurer's report to make. However, we have at the present time about twelve dollars in the Treasury.

For the past month we have been holding services in the Parish House, and we have gotten excellent results. We feel that the success of this League is now assured.
