MINUTES.

The Ninth Annual Meeting of the Georgia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was held May 9, 1901, at 9:30 A. M., at Emmanuel Chapel.

The Bishop of the Diocese, Rt. Rev. C. K. Nelson, was present and opened the meeting with prayer, and an address of welcome and appreciation. He encouraged especially the Junior Auxiliary, and pointed out the importance of, "Babies Branches," and requested that note be made, and resolutions adopted, on the resignation of Mrs. Frank H. Miller, of Augusta, as Treasurer of the United Offering Fund.

After the Bishop left for the Diocesan Convention the Woman's Auxiliary was called to order by Mrs. H. C. White, Diocesan Secretary, who made an address of welcome, and proceeded to call the roll of the ninth meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary in Georgia.

Reports were then read from the Archdeaconries of Albany, Augusta, Atlanta, Savannah and Macon.

Albany and Savannah Archdeaconries were not present, although reports were sent in from each.

A letter was read from Mrs. Y. C. Rust, in which she deplored her inability to get reports. Mrs. Nellie Peters Black, Atlanta, suggested that an earnest effort be made in the future for full reports from each Parish for the annual meetings.

A good report from the Willing Workers of Christ Church, Augusta, for the year ending May 1, 1901, was then read.

Miss M. T. Griffin spoke of the Unselfish Fund, and of the method of raising money in Trinity Church, Columbus.

Reports from the Athens and Gainesville Junior Auxiliaries were read.

It was reported that Milledgeville had been taken from

Mrs. Julia K. Miller's report as Honorary Secretary was read and accepted.

Miss Walker spoke of the Sunday School class of St. Luke's, Atlanta, supporting a Japanese girl, the offering of the class being \$2.00 a month. Motion was made and carried that this class be made a Junior Auxiliary.

Mrs. Henrietta B. Alexander's report as Treasurer, showing a balance of \$32.90, was presented and accepted. On suggestion that the expenses of the publications, etc., be borne by the entire Auxiliary, instead of by individual persons, a motion was made that the amount of assessment be \$2.00 from the larger parishes. The motion was accepted.

A motion was made and carried inquiring as to Rev. James Morris' work in Brazil. Mrs. C. M. Strahan spoke of Rev. Mr. Morris' work and success.

Mrs. Clark made an interesting talk on the Indians, and Missionary work among them.

\$50.00 was pledged and thirty-one (\$31.00) was handed in to be turned over to Rev. Mr. Patton, in Japan, for the support of a Bible Woman.

Mrs. Lillie Ellis Waring's report of the "Babies Branch," Christ Church, Savannah, was read, as Mrs. Waring was not present.

On motion of Mrs. McWhorter, of Augusta, the following resolutions were read and carried unanimously:

Resolutions on the Resignation of Mr. Frank H. Miller, as Treasurer of the United Offering Fund.

"Resolved, That whereas our honored Honorary Diocesan Secretary, Mrs. Frank H. Miller, has tendered her resignation of Treasurer of the United Offering Fund, we, the Woman's Auxiliary, in Convention assembled, do express deep regret upon this loss of a capable and

efficient officer. Her ability and faithfulness are on record in the splendid work accomplished. The Auxiliary will miss most seriously her valuable aid, and express hearty appreciation of her service in this work."

Motion was made and carried that Mrs. Henrietta B. Alexander, Augusta, be made Treasurer of the United Offering Fund.

Upon motion of Mrs. N. P. Black, Atlanta, that resolutions of sympathy be sent Bishop Weed, of Jacksonville, for the Jacksonville sufferers, Miss Woodberry and Miss McPherson, Athens, were appointed as a committee to draw the resolutions.

The following ladies were nominated and elected as delegates to the Woman's Auxiliary Convention to be held in San Francisco, in October, 1901: Mrs. Elliott, Miss Johnson, Mrs. Nelson, Mrs. Black, Mrs. McWhorter, Mrs. S. F. Reese, Mrs. Charlie Phinizy, Mrs. H. C. White.

Finding that there was no further business on hand, Miss Emily Paddock, of New York, was introduced and addressed the Woman's Auxiliary, speaking especially of the Missionary work in the Northwest, and gave a strong plea for the Girls' Friendly Association, of which she is a National officer. After a rising vote of thanks to Miss Paddock, the meeting adjourned.

Annual Address of the Diocesan Secretary.

To the Members of the Georgia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary.

In the Providence of God and with prayful trust in His continued favor we are once again met in general session. It is with very great pleasure that I welcome you to your ninth annual meeting in my home parish, during the seventy ninth meeting of the Diocesan Council of the Church. The Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions has been an organization only twenty nine years; the Georgia Branch was established only nine years ago. In looking back over our accomplishments during this brief period we have every reason to congratulate ourselves upon the results and to strengthen our faith in the efficiency of the organization for the purposes for which it was established. In this Diocese, where the Church is numerically weak, the women of the parishes seem to have the great bulk of the missionary work to do—and do it. In some of our parishes, indeed, it appears that the women do it all. This was conspicuously illustrated at an interesting meeting of the Archdeaconry of Atlanta which I had the pleasure to attend in November last. The report from one parish indicated that a single woman had done practically all of the lay missionary work of her parish during the year. So long as these conditions exist, the women of the auxiliaries must recognize and be prepared to meet the great responsibilities which are theirs.

Our present plan of division of the Diocese into archdeaconries for Auxiliary work and a yearly meeting of the separate archdeaconaries in the Fall preparatory to the Winter's work seem admirable arrangements for systematic endeavor, mutual encouragement and assistance

and the inspiration of enthusiasm in our work. During the year I was gratified to be able to attend the meeting of the Atlanta Archdeaconry, and was much distressed that illness prevented me from attending the meeting of the Albany Archdeaconry in Thomasville. At both these meetings most encouraging reports were presented of the work in the several parishes concerned. In November last I attended the Conference of General and Diocesan Officers of the Woman's Auxiliary at the Church Missions House in New York City. From the reports there made I learned that this Diocese was not altogether alone in the relative magnitude and enthusiasm of the missionary work of the women of the Church. Two women reported that, by their personal endeavors and visitations, they had organized, within twelve months, forty branches of the Woman's Auxiliary in the States of Washington and Oregon. I was glad to be privileged to tell something of our good work in Georgia. Our plan of Archdeaconry division of the Diocese seemed new, and much interest was manifested by those present in my account of the work and apparent success of the plan with us.

For two years past we have arranged for the support of a Bible woman in Japan under direction of the Rev. Mr. Patton. It is most wise and proper that this arrangement should continue and I trust no difficulty will be experienced in entering into a definite engagement to that end.

The permanent provision of the General expense fund for the Georgia Branch should engage your attention at this meeting and I suggest it be provided through a small but adequate assessment upon the archdeaconaries or parishes represented.

Inasmuch as the General Convention of the Church is about to convene, the United Offering should claim at this time a great part of our interest. It is to be hoped

that Georgia will not be found lacking in her full and fair share of that Offering when it is presented in San Francisco in October ; each parish of the Diocese should by all means have some part, and as liberal a part as possible, in that important and most necessary contribution to the general missionary work of the Church. At this meeting you will designate your representatives to the general meeting of the Auxiliary in San Francisco. I sincerely trust there may be no failure to secure certainty of proper representation of this Branch.

We are fortunate in having with us to-day a consecrated woman who has given her life to the work of the Church. Miss Paddock, of New York, will kindly address us during our meeting and I am quite sure her relation of the admirable work she has done as representative of that most excellent Church organization, the Girls' Friendly Society, as well as of her general experiences in missionary work will be most helpful and inspiring. We welcome Miss Paddock to Georgia with great sincerity and pleasure

The Annual Report of the Georgia Branch for 1900 was duly published and distributed to the Bishops of the Church, the General Secretaries of the several Diocesan Branches and to the usual officials. Copies will be distributed during this meeting.

Trusting that the labors of this meeting may inspire us to continued and increased interest and enthusiasm in the blessed work for Christ and His Holy Church, and asking thereon the blessings of the Almighty Father.

To increase the number of Branches has been the desire and work of the past year.

Only one new Branch has actually started, that in St. Paul's, Savannah, but we have the promise of two in Augusta to begin work shortly.

This year we lose some members by over age and also want of interest, but the number of reported boxes stands, 61, St. John's, Savannah; 54, Christ church, Savannah—a small decrease from last year. With a total offering of \$107.17—divided as follows.

Report of the Atlanta Archdeaconry.

To the Woman's Auxiliary:—

In presenting to you this my ninth annual report of the work done by the women of the Atlanta Archdeaconry,—the same longing fills my heart as of old that it might be a full and complete report and prove all our points. As usual, we lose the joy of learning so many good things from our co-workers by the failure to keep a simple record of the work that has been accomplished. In giving you the tabulated statement I wish it might be brightened by the good letters which accompanied the figures. It is so fine to hear from East Point. "our debts are all paid, we meet the promises made to our beloved Rector regularly." St. Mary's, Carrolton, where three church women, one earnest layman, are the main strength of the work—a letter from Mrs. Slade says, "It is a joy to know our little church is entirely paid for." The faith, the patience, and the labor it took to do this, the good angels have recorded in the great book of daily deeds.

The women of St. Peter's, Rome, will soon see the conclusion of their efforts, judging by their total of fourteen hundred dollars for this year. St. James, Marietta, with their large balance left after their pledges were filled, reduced me to despair. I did not know where to report such an unusual sum.

St. Luke's, Atlanta, doubles the amount reported last year. The several committees on the "Organ Fund" have raised by personal endeavor nearly one thousand dollars and will pay CASH for their organ instead of having a debt hanging over them. How sweet will be the first notes they hear, it will be glory! glory! glory! without the weary sigh over the money "yet to be raised." What a fine and healthy state of affairs. Emmanuel,

Athens, one and all hostess, stands with smiling face to greet us, for has she not paid in one year, over seven hundred dollars towards her church fund, and more than one hundred for missions in Georgia. No wonder the air of hope and good cheer fills us with pleasure—that we are here.

There are many very encouraging features for us to dwell upon, and yet from the small mission stations there comes a cry which we cannot pass unheeded. We must unite in sending all the sympathy, all the encouragement we can to them from our large parishes. The church Periodical Club is doing this through church papers, magazines, etc.; it deserves our best support.

It is with great pleasure we note the fact that our "Unselfish Fund" is growing, our gift to the Mission Fields beyond the state has increased, and we hope to see it grow year by year. The meeting of the Atlanta Archdeaconry last October was largely attended, and has been productive of much stimulus to those who were present. As a member of St. Philips, Atlanta, I cannot refrain from asking you to rejoice in the prosperous, healthful condition of our parish, the result of the splendid business methods of Mr. Knight, our earnest, devout pastor. Having wept with us in our dark days, we ask you to smile with us now while the sun of prosperity is shining upon us. In our dear Bishop we of the Auxiliary, have a sympathetic, patient friend, one who is ready at any minute to give of himself to the Master's cause. Surely such an unselfish leader should inspire us to put forth our very best efforts.

We pray for God's richest blessing upon our Association of Women Workers, and beg that each will remember, "In due season, ye shall reap if ye faint not."
