MINUTES

THIRTEENTH ANNUAL MEETING of the

GEORGIA BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY,
Macon, Ga., May 17th-18th, 1905.

The annual meeting was called to order by the Diocesan Secretary, Mrs. Frank H. Miller, 83 women being present, and opened with prayers by Bishop Nelson. The Bishop then welcomed the Auxiliary, and gave hearty commendation of its aims and work. He said that one element of its success was that in doing work at home, it had not neglected that abroad; that the reports which would be given would probably not show all that is being done by women in and for the small mission stations in Georgia, the sacrifice, the enthusiasm, the earnest study of missions. The Bishop said that at present he would suggest no other line of work to the Auxiliary, but bid them God-speed in the splendid work they were doing in parochial, diocesan and general missionary fields. He was assured that if their hearts and prayers and hands went out for those in darkness in foreign lands to send them the Gospel, that they would be ever ready to respond to any home demands that may be made upon them. Greater interest in foreign fields will always deepen interest in work in Georgia. All his calls had been responded to splendidly, and his trust in their work and will was as deep and earnest as was his gratitude for their co-operation and sympathy.

The Bishop then explained that the object of the organization was to be an auxiliary to the Diocese of Georgia as well as to the Board of Missions, and that therefore he would ask for a complete report of all woman's work, parochial, charitable, diocesan and general. He stated that only general missionary work would be reported to the Board of Missions, but that all would be recorded in the Georgia Auxiliary report.

A motion was carried requesting the Bishop to make this

statement relative to the reports of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Convention, so that all clergymen in the Diocese might know his wishes in this matter. This was done in the Convention the next day.

The roll call then showed delegates present as follows: Atlanta 11, Augusta 4, Washington 3, Waynesboro 2, Waycross 2, Macon 27, Columbus 2, Griffin 2, Hawkinsville 1, Thomasville 1, Milledgeville 3, Sparta 1, Savannah 2. Total parishes 22, delegates 57..

The Diocesan Secretary then read her annual address. (See Appendix.)

Mrs. Blark moved that the Diocesan Secretary's address be printed in full in the minutes. Duly seconded and adopted.

Miss Johnson then read Miss Emery's letter, which gave many fine suggestions and practical directions.

The Diocesan Treasurer's report was read by Miss Griffin. (See Appendix).

Mr. John W. Wood, the Corresponding Secretary of the Church Missions House was then introduced and spoke most earnestly of the needs for work for women in foreign lands, and of what this auxiliary was doing in its St. Hilda's scholarship in China and its Bible women supported in Japan. He brought greetings from Miss Emery and told of the enthusiasm of the Boston meeting, and of the wonderful work the Juniors are doing. He explained the apportionment system as not in any sense an assessment, but an offered opportunity for systematic aid in the work of the church. He explained the United Thank Offering made by the women at each triennial, amounting last year to \$150,000. This is made up of personal individual thank offerings of the auxiliary women throughout the United States and all foreign missionary jurisdictions. It is not in any sense connected with the apportionment. It is to be used for the training and support of women workers in missionary fields in all parts of the world.

Miss Higgins, a returned missionary from South Africa, told of the one million people there in Liberia that the church is trying to reach. Only twenty thousand of them are whites. She told of the mission school that cared for and trained two

hundred of these children, and how willing the parents were to lead them to the school. Twenty-five dollars a year supports a child.

Miss Nita H. Black, organizing secretary of Georgia Junior Auxiliaries, reported that the children of the diocese had worked with fine enthusiasm and effectiveness the past year. They now number three hundred, and represent a gain of fifty per cent. They had met the apportionment of \$200, and \$25 above it. Their total of earnings the past year \$1,163.89, with a United Offering of \$62.50. The Woman's Auxiliary expressed the deepest interest and congratulation.

Reports from the Archdeaconaries of Albany and Atlanta were then read by Mrs. Wright and Mrs. Black, and accepted.

Reports from the Archdeaconaries of Augusta and Brunswick by Mrs. H. B. Alexander and Mrs. J. E. DuBignon were read by the Diocesan Secretary and accepted.

Then followed the reading of the report from the Archdeaconary of Macon, by Mrs. Mallory H. Taylor, which was accepted.

A report from the Savannah Archdeaconry by Miss Annie C. Johnson was read and accepted.

All the women present rose and sang that beautiful missionary hymn, "O Zion Haste, Thy Mission High Fulfilling."

The Eighth Annual Report of the Secretary, Mrs. P. A. Waring of the Babies' Branch of the Georgia Auxiliary was read by the Diocesan Secretary and accepted.

Then followed a renewal of the pledges made annually. Meeting adjourned until Thursday morning, May 18.

THURSDAY MORNING, 10 O'clock.

The Auxiliary was called to order at the residence of Miss Ayers and opened with the Auxiliary prayers by the Diocesan Secretary.

It was moved by Miss Griffin to refer all matters of printing to the Executive Board. Carried.

The minutes of the previous day's session, read by Miss Rosa Woodberry, acting secretary, were approved. Pledges to the expense fund were then received for publishing the

Minutes. It was suggested by the secretary that subscriptions to this fund be made by every parish and mission, even though the amount be small, so that a more elaborate report could be published each year. The fund was then considerably increased by delegates present.

Mrs. Nellie Peters Black moved that a summary of not more than three hundred words be sent in by each Archdeaconal Secretary for publication in the minutes, accompanying her statistical report. It was so ordered.

Miss Rosa Woodberry moved that the editors of the Minutes be requested to include in the published report a short account of each object toward the support of which the Auxiliary contributes a fund, so that all members might know exactly the nature of the work they were aiding. Carried.

Rev. W. B. Walker, of Christ Church, Macon, appeared before the Auxiliary, and gave a message from the Diocesan Convention, expressing its gratitude and congratulation on receiving the report of the Woman's Auxiliary with its record of nearly twenty two thousand dollars given the past year for church work.

Mrs. Mallory H. Taylor moved that the Bishop be requested to explain to the clergy in convention the Georgia plan of reporting all woman's work, parochial, diocesan and charitable, in connection with the Auxiliary report. Carried.

Mrs. Black read a letter from Bishop Knight of Cuba, telling of his school in Guantanamo and the need of twenty three scholarships of \$50 each. Mrs. Black pledged Holy Innocents, Atlanta, for \$5 as the first contribution to a Georgia Auxiliary scholarship for Cuba. Other pledges were made, until a large part of the fund was realized.

A letter was received from the Bishop requesting that he be furnished with reports separately of the parochial, diocesan and general missionary offerings of the Auxiliary.

Mrs. Frank H. Miller then explained the pledges made at the Boston Triennial for Georgia, and stated that the amount had been made up.

Miss Griffin moved the appointment of an executive committee to consist of the Diocesan Secretary, the Organizing

Secretaries, and the Treasurer ex-officio, to arrange the order of business of the session. Carried.

Miss Woodberry moved that a Credential Committee each year be appointed to make a roll of delegates, full name and parish, to be published annually in the minutes, and that such delegates be instructed to bring proper credential cards to hand to this committee. Carried.

Mrs. Black moved that the Auxiliary express its satisfaction in the suggestion of the Bishop that a new archdeaconry be created out of the Atlanta Archdeaconry, and to concur in his plan to make this the Athens Archdeaconry, and to request that it be formed at an early date, if in his judgment best. Carried, and submitted to the Bishop.

After receiving a message from the Woman's Auxiliary of their concurrence in his proposed plan of setting off the archdeaconry of Athens, and the expression of the opinion that it was desirable at this time, the Bishop announced to the Convention of the Diocese and the Woman's Auxiliary members present, that he had established the new Archdeaconry of Athens, appointing the Rev. Troy Beatty, archdeacon, and Mrs. H. C. White, of Athens, Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary of the new Athens Archdeaconry. Upon receiving notice of Mrs. White's inability to serve, the Bishop appointed, on Ascension Day, Miss Rosa Woodberry, of Athens, Secretary..

Mrs. Miller urged a wider subscription to the "Spirit of Missions," as the official organ of the church's missionary work, and said that all new subscribers would have the privilege of reserving 50 cents of the \$1 annual subscription for their united offering boxes.

Mrs. Black suggested that any one desiring help in mission study classes could get excellent aid by writing to Mr. Wood, Church Missions House, New York.

Mrs. Dodge told of the work of the Dodge Home for boys on St. Simon's Island, and of the self-denial of the children in missionary offerings. Mrs. Dodge was requested by the Auxiliary to furnish an account of the home for publication in the minutes,

Miss Johnson told of the Bishop Ingle Memorial, and expressed the hope that individual offerings from the women of Georgia might be sent to this noble work.

Mrs. Miller stated she has received \$171.55 for the United Offering at the 1907 Triennial in Richmond, Va., from Georgia.

Miss Johnson moved that the thanks of the Auxiliary be extended to the ladies of Christ Church and Saint Paul's Branches for their charming hospitality, and to Miss Ayers for the use of her lovely home, which has added so much to the comfort of the meetings. Adopted by a rising vote.

The minutes of the second session were then read and approved, and the Thirteenth Annual Convention adjourned.

Diocesan Secretary's Annual Address.

To the Georgia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary:

Dear Friends—Once again we are gathered together for our annual meeting, and it is with a grateful appreciation of many kindnesses in the past that I now welcome you, my dear Georgia Auxiliary, to this hospitable home and city after an interval of eight years, feeling very sure of your able co-operation now and during the coming year. Our Bishop has just most highly endorsed your work, and it rests with you to aid him in his Diocesan missions, as well as to assist in carrying out more extended objects, both domestic and foreign, which our duty to the Board of Missions requires of us. This mission work, so dear to our hearts, is God's work, and deserves our very best efforts. It is ours to work and do what seems wisest, but results are His, so however small they may be, we should not be discouraged.

Our reports for the past year show steady growth, and are most helpful in aiding us to "press toward the mark of our high calling," with renewed hope and vigor. We feel much indebted to our Parochial officers, that band of devoted women, to whom our Auxiliary in every Diocese, owes so much for their efficient work. Let us all begin our new year at once, doing what we can during this coming summer. Let each of us, try to interest some women who does not yet know of our absorbing work. Let us do all that we can, not waiting for winter to commence. We rely upon our dear Juniors to aid us by sending boxes, holding study classes, giving scholarships, and in many ways lifting some of our burdens to their strong young shoulders. The Kindergartners, our precious Babies' Branch, have been doing most beautifully, and in time will make wise successors to us of the present day. You know of our annual pledges, and some other gifts made to missions during the year, reports of which will be read to you later. Most of these pledges form part of the Apportionment Plan, which has been adopted by our Board of Missions.

Woman's Auxiliary Report

ATLANTA, June 2, 1905.

Dear friends of the Woman's Auxiliary:

Our recent meeting in Macon was so satisfactory I feel as if you would like to hear something about it now instead of waiting until we meet during the Fair in October, as I hope we can do. Mrs Miller called the meeting to order Thursday afternoon and Bishop Nelson opened the services with prayer. His address was stirring and full of good cheer. His suggestion that the Archdeaconry of Athens be created was acted upon later on in the meeting and there are now six Archdeaconries instead of five. Miss Rosa Woodberry, of Athens, was made Secretary. I lose six points from my list, Athens, Gainesville, Elberton, Mt. Airy, Toccoa and Tallulah Falls, which is a source of regret after being together so long. Following Bishop Nelson's address was the roll call, showing sixty delegates present from twenty points. Mrs Miller's annual report was greatly enjoyed and she was asked to have it printed in full in our year book. Mr. John W. Wood, Corresponding Secretary of the Board of Missions, gave a delightful talk about missions in general, but especially their relation to women in foreign fields. He was followed by Miss Higgins, a missionary from Africa, who is in

this country on her vacation. Her experiences and travels in the jungles and the improvement in the pupils under her care were all very interesting.

The yearly reports of the five Archdeaconry Secretaries were read; they showed a very cheerful condition of affairs especially in and around Atlanta. The totals were as follows: Albany, \$648.65; Atlanta, \$9,645.02; Augusta, \$3,626.14; Brunswick, \$790.63; Macon, \$3,381.39; Savannah, \$3,433.98, with an aggregate of \$20,525.72. Add to this the Junior Auxiliary report of \$1,163.89 and the Baby's Branch \$167.72, and we had \$21,857.33 to report to the Convention. It was received with much enthusiasm and is an evidence of what can be done by steady, persistent work, when we learn to "take care of the fragments that nothing be lost." The report of Miss Theresa Griffin, of Columbus, our Treasurer, showed all 1904 pledges filled and a small balance on hand. Pledges were then called for the Bible Women in Japan, St. Hilda's School in China and the expense fund. It was decided to adopt a new work, the Bishop Knight Scholarship for Cuba, which will require fifty dollars a year to keep a Cuban child in school. All but eight dollars was pledged for this at once and we hope to get this small amount from Atlanta points. It

was also resolved that every branch be asked to appoint a treasurer to have charge of the United Offering and the "Birthday Fund." Every church woman is asked to send on the date of her birthday to this treasurer any sum she wishes as a kind of "thank offering," and this will go to the United Offering to support women workers in the mission field. We beg every branch to take notice of this resolution and to send the name of the treasurer who is appointed to Miss Theresa Griffin, Third avenue, Columbus, Ga. Special attention was called to the keeping of all items that can be entered on our annual reports, as the Bishop is particularly anxious to have the Convention know just how much of the church work in the state is done by the women. It was decided to make a special offering for the expense fund in order that the full report of the year's work may be printed. After a rising vote of thanks to the women of Christ and St. Paul's churches for their charming hospitality, the meeting adjourned. I hope this condensed report may be read and passed along so that as many as possible may know what was done.

Report Annual Meeting Junior Auxiliary of Georgia

MAY 17, 1905

The second annual meeting of the Junior Auxiliary in the Diocese of Georgia, was held in Macon May 17, 1905, at the residence of Mrs. Flanders, during the session of the Diocesan Convention.

The business of the officers was called to order at 10 a. m. by the Organizing Secretary, Miss Nita Black, of Atlanta, being opened with prayer by the Rev. Mr. Lawrence.

The report of Miss Black showed great stimulation in work during the year. In a few well chosen words she congratulated the delegates on the record made, and begged that greater care and accuracy be shown in the reports sent her.

A most interesting letter from Miss Sybil Carter giving an account of the work of lace making introduced by her among the Indian girls was read by Miss Black. Also one from the present Bishop of Cuba, until recently our beloved Dean of the Cathedral, urging that the Juniors support him in his reaching out after the children of the Islands by taking a scholarship in a school at Guantanamo which he has the opportunity of securing.

The roll call was then read and reports from the branches represented requested. Reports showing good work during the year were given from All Saints, Atlanta; Emmanuel, Athens; Good Shepherd, Augusta; St. Pauls, Augusta; Trinity Church, Columbus; Christ Church, Macon; St. Stephens, Milledgeville; St. Michaels Mission, Savannah. Greensboro was also represented. Total 9 branches. Mr. John W. Wood, Corresponding Secretary of the Board of Missions being present, to the great delight of those assembled, undertook to explain any matters connected with the work of the Board not fully understood by any present, and he cheerfully responded to the questions poured upon him. He begged that the Juniors continue in their former good work and spread out to Cuba also. He gave a very interesting account of the new paper for children about to supersede the "Young Christian Soldier" and asked that suggestions for a name might be sent him. He described the use contemplated for the United Offerings, being devoted to the maintenance of women workers in the field and the support of those compelled to abandon it through infirmity; every United Offering, in addition, is to be marked by some building, the cost of which is not to exceed ten thousand dollars, either a church or institution. He made an appeal for the Hospital in Nganking, China, and gave statistics as to the need of that excellent undertaking. He suggested that the same work be undertaken from year to year as that was a greater help to the managers of the mission funds.

The session then adjourned to meet again for the conclusion of business at 12 a. m. the following day.

In the afternoon the members of Christ Church Branch gave a most delightful entertainment to the visiting delegation. It was presided over by Mr. Wood and talks were given by him and Miss Black. A novel feature was introduced in the debate by two "Juniors" on the comparative merits of foreign and domestic missions. The girls deserve hearty congratulation for their splendid papers and their courage in delivering them.

Missionary hymns were sung during the meeting and a rising vote of thanks given Mr. Wood for the inspiration afforded by his presence; a refreshing lunch was served and all dispersed, carrying hope and pleasant memories for the coming year.

Thursday morning, May 18th, the second session of officers was called to order at noon, in the residence of Mrs. Flanders by the Secretary, and opened by her with prayer.

A report from Greensboro of the faithful work accomplished by six members was then heard. St. Cecelia Branch from Griffin then made its report. It is composed of both girls and boys and has reason to be proud of its record. The tabulated report of all the Branches was then read by the Secretary and showed a total of \$1,162.89 raised during the year.

A resolution to continue the Japanese scholarship was carried, also a resolution to undertake a scholarship in the school at Guantanamo, Cuba. It was decided that said scholarship should be a memorial to Sister Katharine, late of the Appleton Church Home, and be known by her name. Each Branch to be assessed 50cts to expense fund, \$2.00 to Holy Trinity Orphanage, \$2.50 to Sister Katharine scholarship.

Resolutions of thanks to Miss Black for her zeal and ability in presiding, and to Mrs. Flanders for her kindness in affording such an excellent place for meetings were carried.

After an interesting discussion of different modes of work, the meeting adjourned till the following year.

LETTER FROM BISHOP KNIGHT.

Calle 15, esquina C., Vedado,
Havana, Cuba, April 29th, 1905.

My Dear Miss Nita:

Your letter was received just as I was leaving New York, and I was very sorry that there was no opportunity for me to answer it at that time. I asked the Rev. Everett P. Smith, the Educational Secretary of the Board of Missions, to send you some information that I had given him for use in his office. I hope that you have received it and that it will help you in stirring up interest in our work, for we certainly need the interest of our church people in the

great problem which the Church has sent me to solve. I find that the interest is great enough to have more volunteers for the work than it is possible for me to use. These volunteers are men and women, and most of them are now in good positions in the United States. But I cannot accept their services because we have not money to support them with, and I cannot bring people away from home to a foreign country simply on the supposition that the Church at large is going to send me the money with which to take care of them.

The principal work that we have to do in solving this question down here is to educate the children of the Church. It makes of it, therefore, a work of the future, and one that will not show great results for some time to come, so my friends in the United States must not be disappointed if they do not hear of the great progress of the Church in Cuba in the very near future. I am but laying foundations now. I may not live to see the superstructure begin to rise, but I hope to lay the foundation so strong that when the building begins to rise, it will be on such a sure basis that it will support a mighty fabric. I must, therefore, have money for schools. There is a school at Guantanamo that I am very anxious to get hold of, and to do this I have to meet a deficit of about \$1,100 per annum. It is a Home and a day school combined, and I consider it the very best school in Cuba. It has been run as a private institution by a Mrs. Brooks who has been devoting herself to philanthropy. She is a woman of considerable means, and intends to keep up her interest in the school, but she is very anxious for the Church to have the control, so she has offered to give it to me, if I will see that the deficit is met. This I must do, as the Church cannot afford to let such a golden opportunity go by. To meet this deficit I am asking that different people and organizations undertake to support 22 scholarships of \$50 each. It so happens that there are at present 22 children in the Home, and \$50 means practically that \$50 takes care of one of these children for a year. I have already had a number of these scholarships provided for, and I hope that the Junior Auxiliary of Georgia can be interested in taking up this work. It means a great deal to me to be able to take the school.

Guantanamo is about six hundred miles from Havana on the Eastern end of the Island and is at the upper end of the Bay where Uncle Sam is building his great Naval Station, which is to be one of the greatest Naval Stations in the world.

When I was over there I took a few pictures of the children of the school, and I enclose one of the children of the Kindergarten at play in the yard.

The very successful results of a Birthday Fund in other Dioceses make it most desirable to have it grow in Georgia. Every baptized woman is asked to give her name, with the month and day of her birth, to the Parish Secretary or Treasurer, and each year to give a thank offering for another year of life, when her birthday comes. The money should go to the United Offering. You all know of this. It is the one gift in which every baptized woman is asked to unite, over and above all other gifts, a thank offering for our Christian faith and privileges, to enable us to send to those who do not know and cannot have the opportunity of knowing the same sweet faith and love which God in His infinite mercy has given us. The thousands of these little mite boxes, each so small, when united, are a power almost beyond our comprehension, a great chain of many links to encircle the world.

"Mean are all offerings we can make,
But thou hast taught us, Lord,
If given for the Saviour's sake,
They lose not their reward."

During the past year the angel of death has thinned our ranks. This city, as well as the entire Diocese, sustained an irreparable loss, when, on March 2d, 1905, Sister Katherine fell asleep. To her ability and devotion during the fifteen years, from 1890 to 1905, is due much of the exalted position and influence of the Appleton Church Home for which she labored unceasingly. Full of wisdom, love and gentleness, forgetful of self, always serving others, she has doubtless won that highest of all praise which the Master gives, "She hath done

what she could." She worked and watched, a ministering angel, and now she has entered into "the rest that remaineth for the children of God."

Among other names dear to us of those who have fought the good fight and finished their course, are Mrs. Wm. W. Montgomery, president of the Church of the Good Shepherd Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, and Mrs. W. H. Chaffee, president of the St. Ignatius Church Branch at Tallapoosa.

"May they rest in peace, and may light perpetual shine upon them."

Since our annual meeting in Atlanta a year ago, we have had our great triennial meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions, held in the city of Boston at the same time that our General Convention met there. It was my privilege and happiness to attend many of these meetings.

On a beautiful autumn day, Wednesday, October 5th, 1904, the General Convention opened with a most beautiful and impressive service in Trinity Church, Boston. It was an occasion never to be forgotten. Looking down from a gallery on the vast building, crowded with hundreds of delegates, not a woman to be seen there, the long line of ninety Bishops, led by the immense vested choir and accompanied by the Archbishop of Canterbury in his scarlet robes, with other English, Canadian and Australian Bishops, made one realize most fully the bond which unites so closely all branches of the Anglican Communion. On the same day, at 2.30 p. m., the first general meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions was held in Pierce's Building, Copley Square. Hundreds and hundreds of women crowded the large hall and charming reception rooms so beautifully and carefully prepared for us by our most hospitable hostesses of the Massachusetts Branch. We found a "Register room," a bureau of information, and a perfectly conducted post-office. In a corner room was a beautifully arranged display of Junior Auxiliary work. For three weeks almost daily, the Auxiliary met here at 10.15 a. m., for conferences relating to every department of our work, arranged with wonderful skill and knowledge by Miss Emery, our General Secretary. Always at 12 o'clock, there were prayers

for missions and the growth of the Kingdom, followed usually by three addresses of fifteen minutes each, from different missionary Bishops. At 4.30 p. m., afternoon tea was served by the ladies of the many churches in Boston and its vicinity, each church taking its turn and vieing with each other in their exquisite entertainments.

After much discussion during two days, it was voted by Dioceses, that each should have representation, by eight members, at our Triennial meeting, entitled to all parliamentary privileges. When the number of Diocesan officers present is less than eight, a sufficient number can be appointed by the Bishop and Diocesan Secretary, selected from other women present.

You will be surprised to learn that two thousand members of the Woman's Auxiliary registered at Pierce's Hall. Words utterly fail to tell of the warm enthusiasm and deep feeling pervading every crowded service. It was impossible to listen to those superbly brave, self-sacrificing missionary Bishops as they told of their different homes, from Alaska and Brazil, to Shanghai and Southern Florida, but always the same story of the many hardships endured, and the same cry, "Help us, for Christ's sake!" without a heart ache that we could do so little for them. Pledges were made by the Georgia women present, as follows: Alaska, Southern Florida, Hankow, China, and Kyoto, Japan, for twenty-five dollars each, with ten dollars to the missionary jurisdiction of Laramie.

On the morning of Thursday, October the 6th, the women of the Auxiliary gathered in Trinity Church for the great United Offering service, to which we had been looking forward for three years, and which so perfectly realized our highest hopes. Fully an hour before the service began, every one of the seventeen hundred seats were occupied, and hundreds stood in every available spot. Finally, there came a soft note, and the long choir entered, singing "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name!" They were followed by eight clergymen and Bishop Lawrence, of Massachusetts, whose beautiful sermon was the acme of simplicity and perfect good taste. The service was the Holy Communion. Then came the great event which we had so eagerly anticipated—the taking of the United Offering!

"Let your light so shine." The Bishop turned with these words on his lips, and immediately there was a flutter; from bags and pockets came envelopes, carefully marked with the name of the Diocese and the amount of the enclosed checks. I had the happiness to lay Georgia's envelope on the offertory plate marked Woman's Auxiliary, Junior Auxiliary, and Babes' Branch, total, \$767.07. The gold alms basin of the House of Bishops was used, and four clergymen could just lift it to the altar. We sang over four times, "Holy Offerings, Rich and Rare," during its collection by ten divinity students.

On the same day at 2.30 o'clock the great missionary meeting was held at Tremont Temple. Five thousand were in the hall, which was beautifully decorated. Mrs. Thayer, of Massachusetts, presided and welcomed us to Boston. Miss Emery read her Triennial Address, and the Archbishop of Canterbury was introduced by Bishop Lawrence, and immediately won all our hearts by his spirituality, his earnestness, devotion and great dignity of manner. He spoke of Florence Nightengale, who is still living, to rejoice in the results of her work. He asked us to rise and gave us his benediction.

About 5 o'clock Mr. George C. Thomas, our General Treasurer, appeared to tell us of our United Offering. Oh! the thrill over that immense audience as we learned it was nearly \$144,000. The next day it was made \$150,000 by a lady who would not give her name.

It was decided that our next United Offering should be for the same purposes as the last, for having sent women into the missionary fields, we must support them there. In addition to the training, support and caring for our women workers in the field, \$10,000 is to be used for a permanent building or buildings, preferably for woman's work, to be decided by the General Secretary of the Board and our General Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

At this great meeting in Tremont Temple Dr. Lloyd, the General Secretary to the Board of Missions, said: "One hundred thousand dollars will enable us to do things of which our fathers never dreamed, but one hundred and fifty thousand dollars will lead us out into the dark-

ness if we trust to it alone. Think of your money offering as a witness that you have entered into a compact with your Master, who has given you the precious gift of your Christian womanhood, and who means that you should give yourself for your sisters."

Dr. Lloyd's words carried the meeting to its highest plane, and as the closing hymn rang out it was easy to read upon hundreds of faces the record of a new resolution to pray, work, and give as never before for the Kingdom's coming.

ATHENS ARCHDEACONY.

The new Archdeaconry of Athens comprises a most interesting and important territory for extending and developing the missionary work of the church. It contains large school centers,—Athens, Gainesville, Demorest, and Young Harris—where students come from all parts of the State and many of them from church families. It contains several mountain resorts—Tallulah Falls, Tennessee Valley, Clarksville, Mount Airy, Gainesville, Nacoochee Valley, Toccoa. At many of these places summer visitors have already become interested in church work and education among these mountains. The educational institutions of Athens are training men and women who could be valuable in these places. Each year among the six hundred enrolled at the University, the four hundred at the State Normal School, and the two hundred and fifty at Lucy Cobb Institute, are many students who come within the influence of the church. The various branches of the Auxiliary have a mission in familiarizing these young people with the missionary work of the church, its needs, its aims and methods.

Among the important points in the archdeaconry are Elberton, where a new stone church will soon be built, Commerce, Madison, Monroe, Lawrenceville, Winder, Greensboro, Lex-

ington, Union Point. Very few of these places have as yet a branch of the Auxiliary.

ATLANTA ARCHDEACONY.

In looking over the goodly number of reports that have come to me this year, dear Madam President and women of the Auxiliary. I would call special attention to the splendid amounts reported from the churches in and near Atlanta. All Saints brings us her first report, and we welcome this addition to our numbers most cordially; their active members double those of any other of my points. St. Peter's Rome, is to be congratulated upon being out of debt. The women of the Incarnation, Atlanta, are working hard to accomplish the same result, while the women of Emmanuel, Athens, being out of debt, are now raising money for a Rectory.

The Epiphany, Atlanta, will soon enlarge its church to accommodate the increased membership. St. James, Cedartown, has been painted and improved in many ways; the same thing has been done for Grace Church, Gainesville. The women at these points and all the others we have heard from have been brave, unselfish and remarkably successful in their undertakings. The cause of missions has not been neglected nor the united offering, but we hope to see more done for both causes in the coming year.

There are ten points not reported. The ladies write me they have had many discouragements, several losses of members, therefore little work done. We hope by next year things may brighten up for all these places. I believe every weak point will be strengthened if we will all try to remember each day at 12 o'clock to ask God to bless our missions and our missionaries.

AUGUSTA ARCHDEACONY.

I cannot put into the hands of our Secretary the bare figures required by our tabulated report without attempting to set forth for the Diocesan Auxiliary some of the things figures do not tell. The Augusta Archdeaconry contains but three self-supporting Parishes; the others are missions, and in several of them the Woman's Auxiliary or its equivalent meets all the expenses of the mission outside the minister's stipend. The splendid things that have been done in our Mill District Mission of Christ Church are due primarily to the consecrated enthusiasm of the Rev. John Chipman, whose loss we now have to deplore. Its parish house contains a circulating library, a reading room, a night school and sewing school for girls, a swimming pool and gymnasium for boys—all free and for the use of the factory operatives. This house is maintained largely by two organizations composed of women—one, "The Willing Workers," also ministers to the poor in various ways. At Greensboro the Auxiliary has painted the church, besides keeping up with the other necessary expenses. The Ladies' Aid Society of the Good Shepherd has contributed \$747.00 toward the church debt. In Washington \$164.00 has been paid for repairs on the Rectory. The Atonement Church has sent away two valuable boxes and given to every form of mission work, and St. Paul's our senior parish, leads in each department for generosity. We have four Junior Auxiliaries, whose activities are recorded in Miss Black's report. I trust many representatives from our little missions will be in Macon, and, hearing what others are doing, will take courage afresh, and be guided to the conclusion that however small in a monetary way their gifts to missions are, they are as acceptable to God as was the widow's mite.

MACON ARCHDEACONRY.

It is much pleasure to report an increase of interest and work in nearly all the branches of the Macon Archdeaconry. In Columbus and Griffin about a third more money has been expended than the previous year. Two places—Sparta and Fort Valley—had no report at the last convention, but have one at this.

The work in Milledgeville is very remarkable, in view of the fact that two years ago there was no Auxiliary branch at that point. It is also very encouraging to note the presence of delegates from four parishes which have not been represented before since I took charge of the Archdeaconry.

Last fall we had our second Auxiliary conference in Christ Church, Macon. We partook of the Holy Communion in the church and proceeded to the chapel, where we had a strictly women's meeting. Reports from the heads of each society in the different churches were given, ways and means discussed, and a delightful letter was read from our Diocesan Secretary. We found the conference drew us closer together, and all felt an inspiration from the personal contact, which is drawn from letters. It is often a help for the left hand to know what the right hand is doing.

In closing I wish to make a plea to the few places that sent us no reports this year, to try and send one to the next annual convention, no matter how little it may seem.

We should not "despise the day of small things." There is scarcely a large parish in this country that did not start in the same insignificant, discouraging manner.

When each parish—no matter how tiny—realizes that it is a part of the great whole, and as such sends its delegate and report, when all church women struggle together, then will be the day of great things throughout the length and breadth of the church.

SAVANNAH ARCHDEACONY.

REPORT OF JUNIOR AUXILIARY.

"The principal work that we have to do down here is to educate the children in the church. It makes it, therefore, a work of the future. . . I am but laying foundations now. I may not live to see the superstructure begin to rise, but I hope to lay the foundations so strong that when the building begins to rise it will be on such a sure basis that it will support a mighty fabric," so writes Bishop Knight from Cuba. How well he expresses the need and importance of Junior Auxiliaries in the States. If we train boys and girls now to be familiar with the workings of the church they can easily fill their elders' places when advanced to the church's senior societies.

The second annual report of the Georgia Junior Auxiliary shows an increase of over 50 per cent. in one year. We have a total of \$1162.89 against \$500.66 as acknowledged at the last convention. This represents the work of 331 children between six and eighteen, and one branch of young ladies, who are our senior juniors. Boys are members as well as girls, and they are just as enthusiastic, too. It means a great deal to these children to give up an afternoon or morning in each week for church work, besides Sunday School, for they are at school most of the day, and outside hours are filled with music lessons or study. One branch spent over \$200.00 in supporting and educating a family of five in their parish, and some boys have been doing a similar work in another place. One little boy would not eat eggs during Lent because his mother paid him 5 cents on every dozen he found, and he wanted to save all he could. Some other boys and girls who belong to the same Junior Auxiliary have planted gardens and sell the vegetables to make money for their band.

A month ago the Juniors were told that Miss Emery had apportioned them \$200.00, including the Babies Band, and within that month over \$50.00 has been sent the general treasurer for this, and it was announced at the meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary that the Juniors had already paid \$225.00 towards their apportionment.

I have not visited as many branches as last year, but have done a great deal of correspondence, having written over 100 letters and sent out several hundred pamphlets. Rev. Everett J. Smith, the Educational Secretary, has sent lists of interesting books for children, and he is so anxious to assist any of the directors who want new ideas to help make the meetings live and entertaining.

Twenty-four dollars has been sent to Holy Trinity Orphanage, Tokyo, Japan, and \$10.00 towards the equipment of a children's ward in St. James' Hospital, Nyankin, China, which is a part of \$500.00 pledged by all the Juniors in the United States, and instead of the above amount \$800.00 has been contributed; \$62.50 was given towards the United Offering, and last year only \$20.25. It is hoped that the future will be as fruitful and plentiful to the Juniors as the past, and that always they will strive to reach out and help others.

Again, I ask the women not to forget that we are only a part of their organization, and that they take an interest, offer suggestions and visit the Junior Auxiliaries in their parishes.

Object of the United Offering of 1907.

RESOLVED, That the United Offering of 1907 be given to the Board of Missions, for woman's work in the Domestic and Foreign fields; including the training, sending and support of women workers, also the care of such workers when sick and disabled; this is to be interpreted to include Brazil, Haiti, Cuba and Mexico; but that a sum not exceeding \$10,000 be devoted to some building, or extension of the same, preferably connected with woman's work, to mark the United Offering of 1907 and to be begun in that fiscal year, such building to be approved by the Board of Missions on the recommendation of the General Secretary and the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

"There is no work in the church of greater importance than our United Offering. It binds us all together in loving service for God; it enables us, by United effort, to give more money at a given time than can be attained in any other way, and, consequently, there flows from it more channels for good. From it comes the means to educate and train and support women workers in all parts of the field, to build schools, churches and homes for the clergy and supply many wants not otherwise provided for. To it we bring the incense of love, poured out in thankful gifts for special mercies; in memory of loved ones, or for the ever daily mercies which bless us all. And if each woman in every Parish gives something every day as she numbers her blessings and with it, the daily prayer, how near she must live to the Master, and imbibe of His spirit, thus helping herself, while the influence of such good work circles the whole church in loving deeds, spreads the Gospel and hastens His coming."
