THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY was created by the Board of Missions during the session of the General Convention, October, 1871, in the city of Baltimore, and approved by the Board of Missions at the General Convention of 1880, to assist it in meeting its regular appropriations and to aid all missionary work of the church in any direction and in any way that may be recommended by the Board or endorsed by the several Bishops.

The Georgia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was regularly organized by Bishop Nelson in 1893, who divided the work into five Archdeaconries, and the first annual report was made in convention in Marietta that year. The next annual meeting of the Georgia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary will be held on the day immediately preceding the Diocesan Convention, which meets in Savannah the third Wednesday in May 1907.

THE OPENING SERVICE.

The Fourteenth Convention of the Georgia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was opened with the Celebration of the Holy Communion, the Right Rev. C. K. Nelson, Bishop of Georgia, being the Celebrant. The service was held in Trinity Church, Columbus, Ga., May 15th, 10 A. M.

The hymns sung were Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus, and The Morning Light is Breaking. An offering was made for the Church in California. The Bishop addressed the Auxiliary on the subject of the Church as a living organism, and the privileges, responsibilities and work of the members of the Auxiliary, taking his text from the Gospel for the Fourth Sunday after Easter, sixteenth chapter of St. John.

He urged that all be perfectly, steadfastly sure of the basis of life, of the essentials of faith, that Christ has all power, and that He, the Holy Spirit, "shall take of mine and show it unto you". Then even though our building may be of hay and stubble, God will make it worthy of His acceptance, if the foundations are right.

The church is not stereotyped, so that there can be no variations. Any living organism must assimilate, change, reconstruct, grow. A living Church is one that can, does, has changed, and ought to change—but never in fundamentals. The bed rock cannot be changed. The Church is conservative in preserving fundamentals, and gives all freedom in things that might be designated as accessory, rather than non-essential. Our Lord promised to guide us into all truth—not to give new beliefs, but new adaptations, new revelations to the individual, and to the corporate church. But seek such revelations on your knees.

An evidence of altered customs, of growth in the living church is the employment of woman in work and prayer for the Kingdom. Woman's present position is distinctly the result of Christianity, and nobly is she meeting its obligations. When the Church calls upon her daughters, she is sure of their fidelity and enthusiasm. Woman has risen to her responsibility. The work accomplished tells its own story of quiet, faithful, and persistent effort. Such work is worthy of all encouragement, not only as

parochial, local, or diocesan, but world-wide, for just so far as you go out of your family church bounds in church duties just so far you will be enlarged. A great, wide interest and service for the Kingdom at large will be abundantly blessed. But there are women who in groups of two or three, stand alone in their communities for the work that God has given them to do. Here and there, isolated, struggling, faithful, you find them throughout Georgia. They may not send money for your various missionary objects, but they are doing a grand work. In many places there is no man to do it. They keep up the services, they care for the church, they train the children, they stand for the church. They are giving themselves. Thank God there are such women. Their work should be reported as real missionary work. You need not ask, why they have no money often to send. If they have five dollars to spare, it is given lovingly to improve their little church, or add to their altar, or aid in securing a missionary for a service. Our plan is to recognize all workers for Christ and His church. These may not be able to cooperate with you in all lines of work. But surely nowhere on earth are there more noble women than these, as deeply spiritual, as earnest, and enthusiastic, as loyal, and true and pure in purpose, women of beautiful refinement and richness of character, women of strong faith and steadfast purpose-working on the outposts, deprived of the sweet association of fellow workers, lacking the inspiration of such personal contact as is found in such a meeting as this.

This personal contact of workers is most important and essential, wherever it is possible to bring it about. To this end the organizing secretaries of the different archdeaconries are urged to visit every point in their district. It will prove most encouraging and stimulating, and will result in a splendid advance along all lines of work. It is of the utmost importance that the work be thoroughly understood, and knowledge will be followed by increased effort. Our Secretaries are cordially and enthusiastically received at their points. They should spend some time in personal conference and encouragement with their workers. More and greater opportunities will come from such visits, and the work will be greatly enlarged. Pray that the Holy Ghost will give you strength and intelligence and help in difficulties in your Auxiliary work, and may He guide and perfect your work for His glory, and may God's blessings be upon your deliberations here for the extension of His Kingdom.

MINUTES.

At the close of the Service, the business session was called to order by the Diocesan Secretary, Mrs. Nellie Peters Black, and opened with Auxiliary prayers by the Bishop. The Bishop then submitted his nomination for the Diocesan officers for the ensuing year, as follows:

O'Hear; Assistant, Mrs. Murdock Walker; Augusta, Mrs. H. B. Alexander; Brunswick, Mrs. Charles S. Wally; Macon, Mrs. Mallory Taylor; Savannah, Miss Annie C. Johnson. Custodian United Offering, Mrs. T. S. Lewis, Atlanta; Secretary Junior Anxiliary, Miss Nita Black, Atlanta; Secretary Babies Branch, Miss Minna Waring, Savannah.

The roll call showed twenty two points represented, with seventy five present at the session. Attention was called to the fact that the first conference of the Auxiliary was held fourteenth years ago at Columbus, and that the first regular convention occurred the following year in Marietta when organization was perfected. The Diocesan Secretary then read her first annual address, giving an account of the past year's work, her encouragement in visiting the various archdeaconries, and her gratification in the great interest and work manifested. She urged increased knowledge and fervent prayer for missions. The report was received with great appreciation.

The Treasurer submitted her tabulated report which was received.

The Treasurer called attention to the fact that the Diocesan Secretary had presented to the expense fund the amount of her travelling expenses; and further called attention to the fact that the Treasurer's report gave very little idea of what the women of Georgia were doing in Auxiliary work. This was because much of the money given for Missions is sent immediately to the Church Missions House without first going through the Treasurer's hands. Miss Griffin further suggested that these funds be

sent as Diocesan gifts, through the Treasurer, even though from an individual parish, as it would be an inspiration to others, and serve to perpetuate by Diocesan record the fact of such gifts from parishes.

During the discussion of this suggestion it was shown what a splendid work for foreign missions Savannah is doing, and what an inspiration this city is to the rest of the Diocese, it having supported scholarships since 1835. It was shown by Mrs. William H. Elliott that Georgia is given full credit for all such work in the Spirit of Missions and it also is found in the archdiaconal reports published in the Minutes. On motion of Mrs. Mallory Taylor it was resolved that the Convention suggest that all moneys donated to foreign, domestic, or diocesan missions pass through the hands of the Diocesan Treasurer, to be forwarded as designated by donors.

The report of the Custodian of the United Offering, Mrs. T. S. Lewis, was accepted, and ordered printed in Minutes.

The Report of the Babies Branch was read by Miss Annie C. Johnson, of Savannah, Miss Minna Waring, Secretary, being unable to be present. Accepted and ordered printed in Minutes. (Appendix.)

Miss Nita Black, Secretary of the Junior Auxiliary presented her report, showing the record for the Juniors the past year. Report and tabulations in Appendix of Minutes.

The Diocesan Secretary then appointed the following committees:

Some valuable literature on missions from the Church Missions House was distributed. The maps shown and discussed by Mrs. Black were of great interest and helpfulness.

The morning session was then adjourned.

May 15th, 4 P. M., Trinity Church, Columbus.

On the reassembling of the Convention the minutes of the morning session were read and approved, submitted by Miss May Wells, and Mrs. Adele M. Walker, Acting Recording Secretaries.

The auditing committee reported that they had examined the report of the Treasurer, with vouchers, and the report of the Custodian of the United Offering, and found each correct. Submitted by Miss Annie C. Johnson, chairman.

Mrs. Mallory Taylor reported a resolution expressing the earnest thankfulness of the convention that Mrs. Frank. H. Miller had been so blessed in having her eyesight much improved, and assuring her of the loving sympathy of the Auxiliary in her affliction, and expressing the sense of loss in her absence from its councils. Unanimously carried.

Mrs. William H. Elliott then read the report of the Memorial Committee. Accepted, and page in Minutes set apart for record.

Miss Woodberry read the report of the committee on New and Unfinished Business, offering the resolution framed by Miss Lambert, which owing to the brief time for action, was referred to the Executive Board, which reported its adoption:

Resolved that owing to the difficulties of reaching the women of the remote mountain districts and isolated farms, that the Woman's Auxlliary of Georgia support a trained worker whose sole time shall be devoted to visiting, ministering to, and encouraging those who are thus cut off from religious privileges.

The committee on resolutions submitted a report expressing earnest sympathy in the afflictions of the Church in California, through the earthquake disaster, and ordering sent to Bishop Nichols the morning's offered of \$29.10, together with such amounts as the Archdeaconries might send to the Treasurer within the next two weeks. Adopted.

The Reports of Archdeaconries were read by the organizing secretaries. Mrs. A. P. Wright gave many interesting letters from her points, especially noting the splendid work done by Albany, and the mission study class of Thomasville, and then read the tabulated report of the Albany archdeaconry.

The new Athens Archdeaconry work was discussed by Miss Rosa Woodberry, giving tabulated report, and calling especial attention to the methods of developing knowledge and interest,

especially in Churchwomen isolated in remote districts. She urged the importance of organizing the Church girls in our various colleges into Auxiliary workers.

Mrs. S. Isabel O'Hear gave many inspiring facts in her presentation of the Atlanta Archdeaconry report, showing especially the beautiful development of the mission points, and the wonderful work of the new All Saints Church in Atlanta, not only in gifts but study and interest.

The Secretary of the Augusta Archdeaconry being absent, the tabulated report was read by Mrs. Black.

The Macon Archdeaconry was presented by Mrs. Mallory Taylor, who gave extracts from many letters showing the earnestness of the workers. She referred especially to the encouragement of the Barnesville work, recently organized.

The Secretary, Mrs. J. E. duBignon, being unable to be present, her tabulated report of the Brunswick Archdeaconry was read by Mrs. Black.

Miss Annie C. Johnson presented the report of the Savannah Archdeaconry, with its many and varied lines of work, especially in study of missions, and generous offerings for missions.

Many of the secretaries called attention to the fact that they had not included in their totals, the amounts collected by them on the various apportionments of their parishes,

All of the reports bore splendid testimony to the value of the visits from the Diocesan Secretary, Mrs. Nellie Peters Black, the inspiration and increased activity that had resulted being most marked. Great increase was noted in the United Offering, Georgia hoping to have by next fall a thousand dollars to take to the Richmond Triennial, as a thank offering from the women.

Great interest and appreciation were expressed on hearing the reports of the Juniors and Babes Branch, the Juniors reporting for the year \$983.75, and the Babes \$197.05, and of the United Offering, \$574.58, the grand total of all the archdeaconries including these being over \$24.000.

A letter showing enthusiasm and excellent organization of the colored work was sent by Miss Anna Alexander, Secretary of the Colored Branch of the Auxiliary, and received with great interest and congratulation.

A letter from Miss Emery was read, giving valuable practical suggestions for the work.

Sister Louise gave a most interesting report of the Appleton Church Home, expressing deep appreciation of the gifts of Auxiliary workers in money and most valuable boxes.

Pledges were then received by the Treasurer from the various parishes and missions for the Expense Fund, the Bible Woman in Japan, the Scholarship in Wuchang, China, St. Hilda's, and the Georgia Girls Educational Fund, and the Scholarship in Guantanamo, Cuba.

Resolutions of thanks were adopted expressing, the appreciation of the Convention of the beautiful hospitality of Trinity parish and of Columbus.

The Auxiliary then adjourned.

In the evening a missionary service was held in Trinity Church, the principal address being made by the Rev. John C. Ambler, missionary from Osaka, Japan, who told of the conditions of Japan, and the urgent necessity of able, well directed, well equipped missionary work there at the present time.

Meeting of Executive Board of Officers.

On Wednesday, 10 a. m., the Board was called to order in the Sunday School room of Trinity Church.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Mrs. Nellie Peters Black, Diocesan Secretary. Those present were Mrs. S. Isabel O'Hear, of the Atlanta Archdeaconry; Miss Annie C. Johnson, of the Savannah Archdeaconry; Mrs. A. P. Wright, of the Albany Archdeaconry; Mrs. Malory Taylor, of the Macon Archdeaconry; Miss Rosa Woodberry, of the Athens Archdeaconry; Miss M. Theresa Griffin, Diocesan Treasurer; Miss May Wells, Secretary of the Meeting; Mrs. Adele M. Walker, Stenographer.

By special invitation of the Diocesan Secretary, Mrs. William H. Elliott, of Savannah, Mrs. Wm. Bohler Walker, of Macon, and Mrs. Anna Dodge, of Darien, were also present.

It was ordered that cards with list of pledges be sent out in advance of the annual convention, to be received by the Diocesan Treasurer in time to be reported at the meeting, in order to save time. It was voted that all pledges be paid not later than January first, following convention—before or at the convention if possible. All parishes are therefore urged to mail their pledges in ample time to be reported by the Treasurer at the Convention.

It was ordered that in case an Archdiaconal Secretary be unable

to come to the Convention, she send a properly accredited substitute, an officer of a branch of the Auxiliary, with full instructions.

Each Branch was requested to state how many copies of the Spirit of Missions are taken in her parish, and what mission study work is done. This is to be made in the annual report.

The archdiaconal secretaries were instructed to hold the report blanks sent out by Miss Emery, and make them out from the parish returns, so that they might be uniform.

Attention was called to the present method of representation in the Triennial Convention, every officer being entitled to a seat, and properly accredited alternates to the number of eight. Hope was expressed that Georgia's full delegation might be present at the Triennial next year in Richmond, Va.

It was ordered that all United Offering Boxes be opened once a year, shortly before the annual convention in May.

The program committee was instructed to have presented reports from all Church schools and Homes at the Convention. It was suggested that statistical details be avoided as far as possible, those being printed for future study, so that the time might be given as far as possible to discussion of ways and means, and to personal accounts of the work and devotional meetings.

Mission Study classes were urged to keep in close communication with the educational secretary of the Church Missions House, 281 Fourth Avenue, New York, for detailed information and guidance.

It was voted to undertake the support of a Bible Woman in Rabun and Habersham counties, in the mountains of North Georgia. Pledges were made by the Secretaries for this as follows: Christ Church, Savannah, \$10; St. John's Church, Savannah, \$10; Thomasville, \$5; Athens Archdeaconry, \$25; Atlanta Archdeaconry \$25; Macon Archdeaconry, \$25. Total \$100.

Miss Rosa Woodberry was appointed chairman of a committee, with full power to act, to arrange, under the direction of the Bishop, the details of this work. The committee named by Miss Woodberry is Mrs. William H. Elliott, Mrs. John Walker, Miss Sarah E. White.

It was suggested by Mrs. Nellie Peters Black that the new scholarship established at this convention for education of children in the rural districts, be known as the Georgia Girls Educational Fund. So ordered.

Much interesting discussion followed Miss Woodberry's motion to undertake the expenses of a Bible Woman at Tallulah as Diocesan work. Mrs. Wm. H. Elliott spoke earnestly of the need of such a work among the mountains, where there is much ignorance, poverty and vice. She hoped to see Church schools established there and elsewhere, and referred to the beautiful work and influence of the old Bishop Elliott Montpelier School for Girls. She said that many of those actively interested in Church work now, she doubted not, had been influenced by Montpelier. A general response from the officers present, showed that its influence had been most closely felt by nearly all present—many of the Secretaries having been Montpelier girls. Among them were Mrs. Black, Mrs. Elliott, Miss Griffin, Mrs. Wright, and Mrs. Dodge closely connected.

It was urged that the Georgia Girls Educational Fund be so enlarged and extended as to aid in furthering such educational work in Georgia.

Sister Louise spoke at length of the details of the administration of the Appleton Church Home, where she now has twenty-six children under her care, and where over two hundred have been educated. They are baptized on being entered in the home, and very few leave it without being confirmed. Sister Louise will gladly communicate with any parish that desires to help them with boxes or other gifts.

Mrs. Dodge told of the Anson Dodge Home for Boys on St. Simon's and of the beautiful home relations of her large household, who never think they are in any sense objects of charity. Two of her boys are now in Miss Berry's Industrial School, near Rome, and saving extra earnings for college. One is at Porter Institute in Charleston, and one boy is in a Brunswick office. They aid in mission work for distant places just like any other Juniors.

When the Annual Report of the Auxiliary was presented by Rev. J. L. Scully, of the Diocesan Convention, it was moved by the Rev. Troy Beatty that the report be received standing, in recognition of the work of the women of the Diocese. Carried unanimously. Mr. Hawks said that he felt all should on their knees give thanks for such helpers.

ADDRESS OF THE DIOCESAN SECRETARY.

Fourteen years we have been working together, dear friends of the Woman's Auxiliary of Georgia, and fourteen times have we met together to hand in our reports and to compare methods of work—and this should be our banner year, for all through the Bible the period of seven indicates completeness, something perfected, and the *multiple* of seven should certainly be still better. As we unroll our sheaves and tell of the months that are ended, we can only hope for a splendid gathering in of the harvest.

As your Diocesan officer, my report only embraces a period of six months. On the ninth day of November, at the annual meeting of the Atlanta Archdeaconry, Bishop Nelson announced my appointment to the position which our dear friend, Mrs. Frank H. Miller, of Augusta, had been compelled to resign on account of physical infirmities. I hoped that we might have her with us at this meeting to speak about the United Offering methods, but Mrs. Miller wrote me it would be impossible for her to do so, and yet gave the cheering news that her eyesight has improved so that she can now read the head-lines in the newspapers.

It was with great reluctance I accepted this work, because I was afraid to undertake it in addition to other duties that could not be given up, but the still small voice said, "You must give of your best to God's service," and there was nothing for me to do but obey this voice, and I come to you to-day with the record of these six months and to thank you all, especially our seven Diocesan Secretaries, for your cordial and loving sympathy and co-operation.

The most important thing to do at first was to get acquainted with our women in each section of the state. To this end I wrote our Secretaries suggesting that we should hold archdeaconry meetings, and they cheerfully consented. Following the one in Atlanta came the appointment made by the Bishop of the Macon archdeaconry at Barnesville. Mrs. Taylor met me there and organized a branch with nine members present, there being representatives from Griffin, and Macon also with us. The next appointment was for Albany, then Brunswick, and after this

Savannah, during the month of December. In January the Augusta archdeaconry meeting was held at St. Paul's Church and two days after, the first assembling of our new division, that of Athens, was called together at Emmanuel Church by our new Secretary, Miss Rosa Woodberry.

It is impossible for me to tell you in this short paper of the kind reception accorded by clergy and people, when I went to them as a self-invited guest, but I feel it was most helpful and inspiring to look into the faces of so many of our church women, and I believe it will make unity of action more possible for us in the future. To sum up the number of individuals to whom it has been my privilege to speak about missions in the last six months, I find the total is seven hundred and forty-two—almost a regiment—and when we multiply this by the process of transmission, telling somebody else what we have heard, an interest has been aroused and new enthusiasm created in many hearts. We need each other; we can be more effective in the Master's business when we study about missions, talk about missions and above all pray for missions. This seems to have been the keynote of every communication from Miss Emery this year—prayer and study—followed by a more abundant giving than has ever been known before to the Board of Missions.

The field is the world and from every quarter of the globe the cry comes, "Send your trained men and women to us; we want to hear about the Lord Jesus, we must have some one come to tell us of His love for mankind." The spirit of our Bishop Knight is what we should pray for; he went to Cuba, not because he wanted to go but because the church sent him there; and he dared not disobey the Spirit—he went determined to conquer—and look at the result of one year's work—the communicants, the Sunday Schools and the day schools doubled, quadrupled—and doubled again. On every side success—why? because the head believed in the cause, every co-worker believed and nobody grumbled or complained. "Trust in the Lord with all thine heart and *lean not to thine own understanding.*" This is the mind of the Holy Spirit—this the strength which sends our missionaries over the ice and snow of the North, through the jungles of Africa and the country of the Chinese Boxers, safe and unscathed and joyful in the doing of God's service. It is the same spirit that animates our dear women in our mission points in Georgia where two or

three meet together, keep up the services, entertain the missionary and raise the money to pay his expenses. What else but the spirit of the living God that sustains our own dear Bishop in his travels, day after day, night after night, over this State, always cheerful, always brave and unselfish—surely with such a leader we must try to do our very best always.

Then our own United Offering missionaries—we have now more than one hundred at their posts of duty in foreign and domestic fields—some caring for the sick in hospitals in the far West, others teaching in day and boarding schools, others busy training women workers to go out as missionaries, and from all come the bright, beautiful words “we are so glad you have given your gifts and have sent us out in the Masters name, we do enjoy our work so much.” How encouraging and how inspiring, what renewed vigor it gives us—our hearts throb and the blood leaps in our pulse as we say, “I am ready Lord, use me, even me, and grant me the dear privilege to do more for Thee to-day, this month, this year, than I have ever done before.”

Of our special pledges I can say that all have been paid in full for the year, namely: St. Hilda's School in China, the Bible Woman in Japan, Bishop Knight's scholarship in Cuba, and for the *first* year, paid by the Savannah Archdeaconry, the “Bishop Nelson Scholarship, for our Georgia girls in the rural districts.” The Athens Archdeaconry has the honor of proposing a new work to us and one which appeals to me very strongly, a Bible Woman or Church Missionary, to go among our country women and teach them the religion of this dear church of ours. Surely many are as ignorant of what we believe and teach, as are the heathen, of the very principles of religion. Since November ninth, I have written one hundred and thirty-four letters and sent out eighty-four packages of circulars and have addressed audiences at seventeen points. For the next few months I will be wandering in foreign lands, but the work will be in efficient hands during my absence and I hope that our secretaries may arrange for general meetings for December and January, when it will be my pleasure to meet with their members, if it seems advisable.

We welcome most gladly a new factor in the Cause of Missions for Georgia, the “Athens Archdeaconry News,” a paper which Miss Rosa Woodberry has edited and published on her own responsibility without asking one cent of aid from any of us, and

has distributed it through the state; we will all anticipate with great interest the convention number, which she expects to send out after this meeting. I wish to thank Miss Theresa Griffin most earnestly and sincerely, for her faithful and untiring work as State Treasurer. Mrs. T. S. Lewis has kindly consented to serve as the Custodian of the United Offering Fund, and you will be delighted to hear from her report how it has grown this year through your co-operation and her careful management. We must make the effort to bring it up to one thousand dollars before the General Convention meets in October 1907. In addition to the pledges we have already made, and which I hope we may continue, the education of Georgia girls in the mountains of Georgia and other rural districts, appeals to us most deeply.

From the church at large comes the cry of distress from the stricken people of San Francisco; five churches were destroyed, the greatest distress prevails, but not one life was lost in the families of the clergy and this is a cause for thankfulness. You will no doubt take some action looking to a general offering to be sent to these sufferers. Praying for God's blessings upon every one of our members and for all who love the dear Lord everywhere.

LETTERS FROM THE SECRETARIES.

ALBANY ARCHDEACONY.

The Albany Archdeaconry this year shows work far exceeding anything in the past. We now number thirteen points, some new ones, and some very small ones, these latter I very much regret have sent in no reports. I wish our women realized how necessary these reports are, to show how the small places are struggling year after year to build up the Church in their midst. Often representing more self-sacrifice and love for our Lord's service, than does work in large parishes. To keep up these missions, they are obliged to confine their efforts mostly to home work, which is as truly mission work as for China, Africa or Japan. Cuthbert is one of the new points. They are working now for a church which they hope to begin in the Fall. The Woman's Guild is working for the roof and windows.

Bainbridge and Cordele report good parochial work. They have had some losses in their numbers this year, and the Auxiliaries help to keep the church open.

Albany has reorganized their Auxiliary. Mrs. Black's visit in December, when she made an earnest and interesting talk on missions, bore fruit in the good work done for various missions. They also formed a study class, during the winter, on Japan. Thomasville also formed a study class, and took up Japan, its history and missions. It proved to be most interesting and instructive, as nothing draws us so near to those who are laboring in far distant lands, to extend the Kingdom of God to every nation.

Americus has a splendid band of workers, not only the Auxiliary but a Ladies Aid, who look after parish needs, and have this year vested a choir of twenty-four boys. The Auxiliary have a missionary meeting once a month with appropriate reading, and have given a fine amount to Foreign missions.

THE ATHENS ARCHDEACONY.

The tabulated financial report shows that at several points there is marked interest in missions, and especially in the United Offering. Greensboro has the Appleton Church Home very much on its heart, and Athens is interested in Sewanee, having sent there a box and a purse of fifty dollars for the mountain work. Toccoa has made a large United Offering, and the little mission stations, the two or three are earnestly striving to keep up the services, while nearly all have given of their little to aid in the general and diocesan missions of the church. The meeting of the archdeaconry last fall was a great inspiration, and much practical good has resulted. Its proposition to place a Bible Woman at Tallulah has met with diocesan approval. While all the points could not be represented at that meeting, a full account was published and sent to each one. Strong efforts are being made to develop interest in the Church and its missionary work by organizing the girls of our colleges into Junior Auxiliaries, and placing the Spirit of Missions on their library tables. They are supplied with a United Offering box for birthday and other thank offerings, and are encouraged to pack missionary boxes, and give missionary teas. Each girl at the short weekly meetings should give a brief missionary topic of news. It is hoped that the visitors at the various summer resorts in this section will make efforts to present the Church there in a very real way by having the services, distribute church literature, and where possible organize a Sunday School. We are striving to keep in touch with the isolated church woman, sending her literature, a United Offering box, and urging her co-operation in study and prayer. A roll has been formed of every Church woman in the archdeaconry of whom any information could be obtained.

The chief aim of the Secretary is to encourage the study of missions, and urge that the offerings for missions, however small, be sent intelligently and with prayer. It should be remembered, too, that the five dollars sent from ten workers at these little stations, is as large a proportion as the hundred sent from two hundred workers in our larger parishes.

There is great activity in parochial work at many points. Greensboro is repairing its Church, Mount Airy wants theirs repainted, Gainesville is striving for a carpet and other needed

furnishings, Tallulah has land offered for an industrial school, or a hall connected with the one proposed; Union Point offers a two hundred dollar lot towards a church, Athens is building a seven thousand dollar rectory. It is interesting to record, too, that Athens has a mission study class and takes sixteen copies of the Spirit of Missions.

The new parish of All Saints, Atlanta, in addition to all its splendid work along parochial lines has begun its vigorous young life with earnest study of missions and generous offerings for missions making pledges for all our diocesan objects, and now organizing a plan for distribution of church literature, and exchange of mission study courses.

MACON ARCHDEACONY.

I take pleasure in reporting a new Baby Branch just organized in Hawkinsville and a Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary reorganized in Barnesville during a visit of the Diocesan and Archdeaconry Secretaries for that purpose. We found faithful, ear-

nest, self-sacrificing workers, the whole parish consisting of seven women.

I tried this spring, as I did two years ago, to get contributions from the small points in my jurisdiction, to fill a box to send to Archdeacon Hughson for his Mountain Mission school. Three places responded, Sparta, Hawkinsville and Talbotton, sending donations to the amount of \$27.30. We hope that Hawkinsville, whose contribution reached the value of \$17.65, will see their way clear to send a box independantly next year.

The word from St. Mary's, Columbus, is also encouraging. "Our Guild has lately been re-organized, and we are working with renewed vigor." Mrs. Clinch, of Sparta, sends a cheering message, "we are having a Thursday night service twice a month, Rev. Mr. Lanier, of Milledgeville, is in charge and it seems a very good arrangement, as we have more people at church and all are interested in the splendid sermons."

The Choir Guild, of St. Paul's, Macon, is doing a good work, having dispensed \$204.40 for parochial work. Rome, \$100 to parochial. There are flourishing Chapters of the Daughters of the King in St. Paul's and Christ Church, Macon. The former received crosses at a special service Palm Sunday.

The Auxiliary of Christ Church, Macon, reports the study of missions from the apostolic to the present time. During Lent they met every Friday morning and papers were read on the topic of the day—Memorial Cross, in Appleton Home Chapel.

These study classes are being very generally organized now—any one desiring to form one can get the programs, books, and all necessary information from Rev. Everett Smith, Educational Secretary, Church Mission House, New York.

St. John's, a fuller attendance and deepening interest. The special feature this season has been a steady effort for the circulation and study of the Spirit of Missions, each member being expected to give half an hour a week to its perusal, and the first 15 minutes of each meeting is devoted to the discussion of the current number.

St. Paul's without a president and with only seven members has bravely met its pledges and hopes in the near future to reorganize with increased strength.

The apparent decrease in the amount reported for Diocesan Missions is owing to the fact that the Parish pledges, formerly collected and reported by the Missionary Societies, no longer pass through their hands.

While not strictly within the scope of this report we can not deny ourselves the pleasure of mentioning that on Easter Day the offerings of all the Parishes were devoted to missions.

January, 30, 1906, the spirit of Lillie Ellis Waring entered the rest of Paradise. The founder and first Diocesan Secretary of the Babies' Branch in Georgia, she gave to it a love and devotion that will bear fruit for years to come. Then the Master whom she served called her to a still higher service, and for months with calmness and unflinching courage she met the steady, certain approach of death, leaving to us who loved her a memory which is an inspiration.

For such a life and death we give God thanks, and fervently pray that eternal rest may be granted to her and light perpetual shine upon her.

JUNIOR AUXILIARY.

The third annual meeting of the Junior Auxiliary, held in Columbus, was a splendidly attended one, there being eighteen delegates from twelve points out of twenty-two. Three sessions were held at which the members reported the work being done. More has been given for foreign missions than ever before, the first year only one branch reporting money for this. The importance of prayer and study for missions was emphasized, and there was an exhibition of methods and books for interesting children in the latter. Two or three branches are supporting and sending to school poor children in their parishes, and another at a mission station gave towards the support of their missionary. Two new societies have been organized—one in St. Paul's Church, Macon, and one in Lucy Cobb Institute, which is formed as a study class. It is hoped that by next year Junior Auxiliaries will have been established in many of the large boarding schools of the State, for in all are found Church girls, and what a fine work it is to interest them in mission study! At the afternoon session the Bishop gave us a talk about his educational work in Georgia. It was the first time the Juniors had had greetings from him. The scholarships in Guantanamo, Cuba, and Holy Trinity Orphanage, Japan, were renewed. Also it was resolved to support a scholarship for the Bishop's Educational Fund. \$15.00 was sent Mr. George C. Thomas, Treasurer, \$10.00 having been promised as our share, for the equipment of two class rooms at St. Paul's College, Tokyo, for which contributions are being asked from Juniors all over the world.

I have visited many points, and four of the Sunday Schools of Atlanta, bringing before the children the happiness and comfort derived from working for others. Dr. Arthur S. Lloyd, General Secretary, spoke to 150 children of the city at St. Luke's during the missionary conference. The meeting was gotten up by the Juniors. This idea of joint services is a most important one and it is urged that wherever there is more than one Auxiliary in a city, they unite at least once a year, taking turns visiting each other.

I ask again that the members of the Woman's Auxiliary keep the Junior work constantly in mind and that they notify me when new branches are formed, so that I may assist them in the organizing, and send them whatever books or plans that may be needed. Every Sunday School should have one and if the teachers and ministers could see the enthusiasm of the members, boys and girls from eight years to eighteen, they would realize how much the others are being deprived of in not being Juniors; for that is one of the duties of the leaders to be enthusiastic, and to make the meetings so interesting that the children will not stay away.

**Explanation of the Objects for which the Georgia Branch
of the Woman's Auxiliary Works.****BIBLE WOMAN IN JAPAN.**

Mrs. Hiratsuka is the native Bible Woman supported by Georgia women in Tokyo, Japan. This was proposed by Mrs. Alexander and established in 1889, when the convention met in the Cathedral in Atlanta. As is well known, the duties of a Bible Woman are many and varied. She visits and nurses the sick, trains the women, has Sunday School classes, assists in teaching and preparing for confirmation, cares for the church furnishings, and is general parish visitor. A native woman is particularly valuable, when trained for this work.

ST. HILDA'S SCHOLARSHIP.

The Georgia women support the Bishop Nelson scholarship in St. Hilda's School in Wuchang, China, where a girl is cared for, trained and equipped in this excellent literary and industrial school for Chinese girls, and developed in Christian womanhood amid Church influences.

This scholarship was proposed by Mrs. William H. Elliott, established in 1902, when the convention met in Augusta.

SHANGHAI SCHOLARSHIP.

Since 1885 the Bishop Beckwith Scholarship in St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai, China, for Chinese girls, has been maintained by the archdeaconries of Macon and Albany,

GUANTANAMO, CUBA SCHOLARSHIP.

A child is supported and educated in the large school of over two hundred students in Guantanamo, Cuba, by the Bishop Knight Scholarship, established at the suggestion of Mrs. Nellie Peters Black in 1905 when the convention met in Macon. This flourishing church school is most popular throughout that section of Cuba, and its opportunities are only limited by its endowment.

RURAL SCHOOL FUND.

The Georgia Girls Educational Fund is for the education of our girls in the rural districts, especially by scholarships in church schools, and to provide teachers who shall be properly equipped

to care for these children in mind, body, and soul. This was proposed by Mrs. Black and established at the last convention, Columbus, 1906.

TALLULAH BIBLE WOMAN.

The Bible Woman for the mountains of North Georgia will be placed at Tallulah, where she will find a large field among the people of this isolated section, to bring the blessings of the Christ life in loving service to the sick and afflicted and ignorant, and poor—a service for body and soul in His name.

UNITED OFFERING.

The United Offering in which every woman is asked to join represents especially birthday and other thank offerings, over and above general missionary work. This is presented triennially, and from it comes, through the Board of Missions, the means of supporting women workers in all parts of the field, to build schools, churches, and homes for the clergy, and to educate and train women workers, and the care of such workers, when sick or disabled. "To it we bring the incense of love, poured out in thankful gifts for special mercies, in memory of loved ones, for the ever daily mercies which bless us all. And if each woman in every parish gives something every day as she numbers her blessings, and with it the daily prayer, how near she must live to the Master, and imbibe of His spirit, thus helping herself, while the influence of such good work circles the whole church in loving deeds, spreads the Gospel, and hastens His coming".

THE EXPENSE FUND.

Each parish and mission is asked to contribute some little amount towards the expense fund which meets the expenses of the publication of the Minutes, circulars and report blanks, postage, &c., and also pays the expenses of missionaries invited to address the Auxiliary.
