THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY was created by the Board of Missions during the session of the General Convention, October, 1871, in the city of Baltimore, and approved by the Board of Missions at the General Convention of 1880, to assist it in meeting its regular appropriations and to aid all missionary work of the church in any direction and in any way that may be recommended by the Board or endorsed by the several Bishops.

The Georgia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary was regularly organized by Bishop Nelson in 1893, who divided the work into five Archdeaconries, and the first annual report was made in convention in Marietta that year. The next annual meeting of the Georgia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary will be held on the day immediately preceding the Diocesan Convention.

TO THE WOMEN OF THE CHURCH IN GEORGIA.

We are fifteen years old now and fast approaching the grown-up stage of our existence, and I believe we are really doing more substantial missionary work throughout the state than we have ever done before. Your Secretary ought to have an opportunity to look over all the reports of the seven Organizing Secretaries before summing up the work as a whole for your consideration, but it never seems possible to do this because of the delay in hearing from the various societies which make up the whole, so I will ask you to listen carefully to each of the seven reports as they are read that you may draw your own conclusions. I can speak from my own personal knowledge, however, when I tell you that each of the Secretaries has responded most cordially and promptly to every request that I have made for boxes or contributions, and I am satisfied we have made progress in the line of distinct *Missionary* work. For the first time, the General Mission Board has given Georgia the benefit of two "United Offering" women workers who are supported by this fund, one is teaching a day School in Norcross, Miss Daisy Ticknor, and the other, Miss Florence Hergesheimer, has created a settlement home in the midst of the Unity Mills, LaGrange, and you will hear directly from them of what they are striving to do. I have met each of these conscientious women, and feel that they are laying the foundation for a work which will certainly bring good results in the future for Christ and His Church. We must be ready to respond to every appeal that is made in their behalf, for no matter how good the carpenter is you may employ, he is perfectly helpless without good tools.

You will also hear from Rev. Mr. Benedict of his school for the country boys and girls of North Georgia—he has 270 under his care, and all, with the exception of about one dozen, are from the rural section—they are receiving an industrial, manual training along with the religious and ordinary school education. His modesty will forbid him to say anything of the personal sacrifices he has made in behalf of these young men and women, of his discouragements when the fires have raged and levelled two of his buildings to the ground, nor of the brave way in which he has kept steadily on until the light of success has finally shone

through the gloom of his misfortunes. Then—a still greater sorrow came when dear "Mother Benedict" was called from the active participation in all that her son was doing, to rest from her labors and to enter into the joys of Paradise. Her little cottage has been converted into the Mother Benedict Dormitory for girls, and I do hope we may be able to support an "auxiliary" girl here for many years to come. It is a well established institution and appeals to everyone who is interested in the up-lifting of the white girls of our country section. Each of these Mother Benedict girls when she graduates and returns to her home will become a genuine "Bible Woman" to bear the doctrine of good living and good thinking to a large circle of friends. Surely one hundred dollars a year cannot be invested by us in a way to bring back larger and more satisfactory results.

Mrs. Dodge is to tell you of her school under the great old live oak trees on St. Simon's Island—the grey moss is gently wafted over the graves of those who planted the church here years ago but there are joyous young lives being trained by this good woman to be good soldiers of the Cross and to bear the banner of the church which those who loved her services in the long ago have laid down. I am so glad Macon and Atlanta have sent such nice boxes this year for the "Mother Dodge" boys and our interest has made her very happy. And now what of our Foreign work—have we been studying the needs and conditions of the brethren beyond our borders? In Atlanta we have been particularly blessed this year by having missionary addresses from Rev. Mr. Patton, Secretary for the Fourth Missionary District; Rev. Mr. Ancell, of Suchow, China, and Rev. Mr. Hulse, the Secretary for the Men's "Thank Offering"—and it has been remarkable to see the interest they have aroused for the cause of missions—then, too, Mr. Chapman has been here telling us of his experiences in Japan. As we listen to the personal opportunities these men have had to tell the glad tidings of the gospel to the people of the East who are so eager for Western civilization, our methods of education, and our Christian religion, it has seemed as if the Holy Spirit opened many hearts and many purses, for there has never been an Easter in my knowledge when the churches of Atlanta gave as much to the cause of missions as they have done this year. Grey-headed men did not hesitate to say it was the first time they had ever been made to care anything about foreign

missions, and I believe all the reports from over the State will show a great awakening in this respect elsewhere.

When the first missionaries went to Japan in 1869, seven years passed by without one soul being baptized; now, men, women, and children come with eagerness to be taught the religion of Jesus, and what they learn they want to tell somebody else. There is a great desire shown by China and Japan especially to learn the reason of America's wonderful progress as a nation. They say, "it cannot be culture and learning, we have had these for a thousand years before Jesus Christ was born in Bethlehem. Is it the religion that he gave to the world that has carried the Anglo-Saxon race to the point where he is making himself master of the world? Then teach us this religion, let us learn all about it. We are willing for it to be taught in our schools. We have opened our doors wide to you; but we want your men of learning, men of worth and standing in your own country, to come to us. We wish the gentleman and the scholar, who can convince our reason, and win our hearts to your love of Christ."

What is our reply to this appeal; are we raising up our girls and boys with the idea before them of being trained to the service of the Lord; how many parents do you know who have devoted their most brilliant boys and girls to the church? There are very few "Samuels" set apart in these days of hurry, ambition and greed for gain. Shall we say to the nations of the world, we haven't the trained men or the women, or the money—go back to your idols of wood and stone, your cruelty and barbarism until a more convenient season, or will we arise as a noble phalanx of Christians and say, "Yes, we are coming, our gifts are ready, our boys and girls have been trained to be true soldiers of the Cross and we *will* win the world for Christ!"

This is the spirit which has made our early missionaries triumph in the midst of so many hardships, it has given them the power to release the women of China from the bondage of the dreadful foot binding, it has brought about the edict to prohibit the planting of poppies and the use of opium which has been such a curse to China, it is the influence which has brought to light the horrors of the Congo and has provided a relief for the same. Now, our secular papers have determined to find out the truth of the proposition, "Are the missionaries doing any good,

and what kind of men and women have we sent to convert the heathen?" Mr. Wm. T. Ellis has been sent by a syndicate of northern newspapers to look into this matter personally from the stand-point of the "Man of Society," and at the same time dear Dr. Loyd is making his trip around the world as a messenger from the church to encourage, to stimulate and bless the missionaries with his good cheer and enthusiasm.

It will be a matter of great interest to read the reports of these two men and to compare their impressions. I hope we may all seek the opportunity to do so.

When I was with you in Columbus last year, we begged you to bring up the amount for our "United Offering" to the sum of one thousand dollars. Mrs. Lewis, our Custodian, tells me it has gone beyond this sum already, and I feel we owe her a hearty word of thanks and congratulation for her faithful management of this fund.

This will be the fifth time we have presented a United Offering from Georgia to the Triennial meeting. In 1896 the amount was \$336.19, in 1898 it had grown to \$506, in 1901 a small increase made it \$595.89, while the last in 1904 reached \$775.47. Now I wonder what we can do for it by the first of September, when Mrs. Lewis wishes every penny to be sent that can be raised. This money is so far reaching in its beneficent influence; it supports one hundred women who are working for the Master in schools, in hospitals, and orphan homes for the ice-bound regions of Alaska to the flower be-decked Isles of the sea, from the wilds of Africa to the mill sections of our own State, and best of all, it will provide a home for these same women when they come back, sick or aged or weary and ready for a season of rest, or when the shadows from the land of Silence are closing about them. Do let us make the effort to interest every single church and mission station in all our Archdeaconries to give something to this fund, even if it is only twenty-five cents, then it would show a *unity* beautiful in its completeness and perfection.

Bishop Knight has kindly consented to tell us of the growth of his work in Cuba. I am sure you will be glad to feel we have had a small part in helping him through our scholarship for the school in Guantanamo. We have held two Archdeaconry meetings since last May, that of Athens, which met in Gainesville, and of Atlanta, when Mr. Patton addressed us at St. Luke's

church. Bishop Nelson made the suggestion in Gainesville that lenten services should be held by the women at every point in the State where the services of a clergyman could not be obtained. I sent out a circular letter to this effect and have received reports from six points—Norcross, Union Point, Greensboro, Fitzgerald, Clarkesville, and Holy Innocents Mission, Atlanta,—which encourage me to hope that the same plan may be tried by even more points next year. We must all try to keep in mind the *spirit* of our work, not the size of the reports we have to make, but the doing the very best we can at all times and in all places to the glory of God in a cheerful and even joyful spirit. I think sometimes we forget how often the words "be joyful in the Lord" occur in the Scriptures. Whenever we are downcast or despondent "let us be joyful" and show to the world that religion is the very happiest thing we can find in all our journey of life.

I wish to express my grateful thanks to Miss Rosa Woodberry for her kindness in editing and directing the publication of our Annual Report. Also for the great help her paper, "The Arch-deaconry News," has been in keeping us all closely in touch with each other during the year.

I have written one hundred and forty letters during the six months since my return from Europe, have sent out two hundred and twenty-five circulars—among these being ninety of our reports sent to other states, including foreign branches of the Woman's Auxiliary, and I have received quite a large number of reports in return, which are very stimulating and instructive. It is a great disappointment to me that I am providentially hindered from meeting with you this year, but I will surely be with you in spirit and in thought all during your deliberations.

It will be a great pleasure for me to receive any suggestions you wish to make before the meeting of the Triennial in Richmond. It is eminently right for you to instruct your Secretary upon any points you may desire.

Allow me to say in behalf of the Junior Auxiliary Work, that I am so much impressed with the importance of instructing the young people of the Church on the subject of missions that I believe nothing will do as much for the future growth of the Episcopal Church in Georgia, especially in the smaller places, as the organization of a Junior Branch, even if there is only one Church woman to start it and one child to be a member, it means life,

cheerful life, it means planting a seed and watching its growth until God is ready to give the increase.

And now as to the Babies, the dear blessed "Babies Branch." How I long to see more enthusiasm shown for this cause. What can be so lovely as to teach the little lips to say with the first words "papa and mama," the prayer "God bless our missions." Each tiny hand that drops a penny into the small red box is helping some other hand, outstretched for succor.

May God bless all who love Him and are trying to do His will in this, and in all other lands.

A MESSAGE FOR THE ANNUAL MEETING.

To THE GEORGIA BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

My Dear Friends:—But a few months remain before the Triennial of the Woman's Auxiliary will be held next October in Richmond. At that time the representative body of the church, gathered together in General Convention, will be expressing their thankfulness for the expanding life of our dear church, herself the outgrowth of the Mother Church of England, who sent her servants to our shores three hundred years ago.

The Woman's Auxiliary would not be behind in an expression of gratitude to God for blessings past, and of hopefulness for a more vigorous and abounding life in the future. We pray that the Triennial Service and meeting and all Auxiliary gatherings to take place in Richmond may be marked by a deeper devotion, a more intelligent sympathy, a more courageous outlook than ever before, and by a truly loyal following of such enterprises and methods as may be set before us by the authorities in the church by whom we have been appointed to our service. We ask that the members of your branch ask daily, from this time on, that

God's special blessing and guidance may be upon the church during the time of General Convention, and that they prepare to keep Saturday, September 21, the Feast of St Matthew, the Evangelist, as a day of special intercession in behalf of the church's work through General Convention, Board of Missions, Woman's Auxiliary, and all other agencies of help.

In 1904 the Georgia Branch gave \$775.47 towards the United Offering. How much has it now in hand? Since that time how many young women have gone from your Diocese to train as missionaries or to work in any mission field?

This year you have been asked to give towards the Auxiliary \$100,000, apportionment for the General Missions of the church—the Georgia women \$500, the Juniors \$100. Have you been able to accomplish this?

In this last year what efforts have been made to increase the number of parish branches or individual membership in those branches? What has been done in plans for deepening the spiritual life of the Auxiliary; its intellectual life, through missionary reading and study; its practical life, encouraging systematic giving, according to one's means?

A service founded on principle made vital by the love of Christ, and not confined by bounds and rules, but reaching out beyond any Auxiliary limits, glad to influence all to whom we are joined in Christ's family, the church, so that we may draw the nearer to that happy time when all shall work as one for Christ,—this is something to which we may look forward.

Hoping for this in the future in larger measure than we have ever yet enjoyed it, believe me,

MINUTES.

TUESDAY MORNING.

The fifteenth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Georgia was held May the fourteenth, nineteen hundred and seven, at ten A. M., in St. John's Church, Savannah.

Holy Communion was administered by Rev. Charles H. Strong and the address was delivered by Rev. C. W. Frazer, of Christ Church, Augusta, his subject being "Enthusiasm for the Salvation of the Souls of Men."

The business session of the Auxiliary was presided over by Miss Annie C. Johnson, Secretary of the Savannah Archdeaconry, in the absence of Mrs. Nellie P. Black, the Diocesan Secretary, who was providentially hindered from being present. After the singing of Hymn 261 and a prayer by Rev. C. G. Bradley, a rising vote of thanks was given Rev. Mr. Frazer for his beautiful address.

The annual report of Mrs. Black was read by the presiding officer. The following resolution was offered by Miss Theresa Griffin, of Columbus: "I move that Mrs. Black's address be accepted with thanks and the same be referred to the Executive Committee for action upon its suggestions; also that a telegram of sympathy be sent Mrs. Black and regret that she is prevented from being with us." This resolution was seconded and carried. A telegram was read from Mrs. Miller regretting her inability to be present. A reply was ordered sent to her. Reports of the officers was then called for. The Treasurer's report was read and accepted. The tenth annual report of the Babies' Branch was read by the Secretary, Miss Minna Waring, and accepted. The report of the Junior Auxiliary Secretary, Miss Nita H. Black, was read and accepted. Mrs. T. S. Lewis, Custodian of the United Offering, being unable to be present, was represented by Mrs. C. L. Pettigrew. The fine condition of this fund aroused much enthusiasm and gave evidence of the attention Mrs. Lewis has given this important subject. She is hoping to have the amount come up to fifteen hundred dollars by September first, when her books will be closed prior to the Triennial Convention. It will require fifty dollars from each Archdeaconry to make this possible. The reports of the Organizing Secretaries were then

called for. Mrs. A. P. Wright, of Albany, being ill her report was not ready and she asked to be allowed to send it to Mrs. Black. It was moved and carried that a telegram of sympathy be sent Mrs. Wright.

Miss Rosa Woodberry read her report from the Athens Archdeaconry. It was especially interesting because of the co-operation she has received from women in far off isolated places. Many of these persons have sent small sums for the United Offering and a sweet spirit of love and devotion seems to characterize her points. Mrs. Charles H. Phinizy, the newly appointed Secretary of the Augusta Archdeaconry, made her first report. She prefaced her financial statement by some remarks which showed the stimulating influence of the study of missions.

In the absence of Mrs. Isabel O'Hear, the Atlanta Archdeaconry report was made by Miss Bessie Lambert. The large amount of over eleven thousand dollars created great enthusiasm, especially when Miss Lambert told how much of this had been given for missions by the various churches.

Mrs. Charles S. Wylly, of the Brunswick Archdeaconry, read her report. It showed a very decided increase since last year, the total being nearly double what it was then.

Mrs. Mallory H. Taylor, of the Macon Archdeaconry, presented her report. The various columns pertaining to missions were well filled—the increase for this cause being evident.

Miss Annie C. Johnson, Secretary, read the report for the Savannah Archdeaconry. The old established church societies under her jurisdiction manifest the same faithful devotion to missions as ever. Her total was second in amount to the seven that were read.

The following standing committees were announced for the year:

Auditing—Mrs. Charles S. Wylly, Mrs. A. G. P. Dodge.

Memorials—Miss Annie C. Johnson, Mrs. Charles H. Phinizy, Mrs. A. P. Wright.

Program for next meeting—Mrs. Mallory Taylor, Mrs. O'Hear, Miss Rosa Woodberry.

Printing Annual Report—Miss Rosa Woodberry, Mrs. O'Hear, Mrs. Lambert.

Resolutions—Miss Theresa Griffin, Mrs. Charles Wylly.

Mrs. C. L. Pettigrew read the report of the Committee on

Memorials. It was accepted by a rising vote. The session then adjourned to accept the hospitality of the women of the three Savannah parishes. A most beautiful and attractive lunch was served in the Guards Armory to about one hundred and twenty-five persons with Bishop Nelson, Bishop Knight, of Cuba, the clergy of the city, and several visiting clergy as special guests of honor of the occasion.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

On the re-assembling of the delegates at four o'clock, the roll which was omitted in the morning was called.

Bishop Nelson made a short address to the Auxiliary and introduced the speakers of the afternoon, Rev. George Benedict, of Cedartown, Ga., and Bishop Knight, of Cuba.

Mr. Benedict spoke in a most interesting way of the work he represented, "The Benedict Memorial School." His story of the effort to give the boys and girls from the rural sections of the State an opportunity to receive a practical education was most inspiring. He spoke of his desire to make the cottage formerly occupied by his mother a memorial to be called the "Mother Benedict Dormitory for Girls," and expressed the hope that he might be able to obtain a trained deaconess of the church to put in charge of it. Bishop Nelson asked what he would probably have to pay such a woman. When Mr. Benedict replied that three hundred dollars would be the sum needed, the Bishop said, "Well, Mr. Benedict, I will guarantee that the Woman's Auxiliary will raise this amount for you." This remark was received with much enthusiasm. Pledges were made so fast that one hundred and eighty-five dollars were promised at once. Miss Woodberry then offered the following resolution: "Be it resolved that the Treasurer be instructed to write each branch of the Auxiliary which has made a pledge for the 'Bible Woman for North Georgia' to transfer the pledge to the one for the 'Mother Benedict Memorial'."

Bishop Knight, of Cuba, gave a fine report of his missionary field and expressed his thanks for the continued aid extended him by the Georgia Auxiliary through the scholarship for his school in Guantanamo. He seemed much encouraged by the increase in the number of communicants and the interest shown in the various schools under the direct care of the church. Bishop Knight

is a great favorite in the State and the women considered themselves highly honored by his presence with them. They will continue to support the scholarship.

Bishop Nelson submitted his nomination for the Diocesan officers for the ensuing year, no change being made except in filling the place made vacant by the resignation of Mrs. Alexander, Secretary of the Augusta Archdeaconry. Mrs. Charles H. Phinizy was nominated for the position. The names presented were voted upon and the election was unanimous.

Miss Griffin offered the following resolution, which was carried:

Resolved, that the Woman's Auxiliary of Georgia desires to express its debt of gratitude to Mrs. H. B. Alexander for her faithful services as our officer with regrets that she feels compelled to resign her position as Secretary of the Augusta Archdeaconry.

Miss Rosa Woodberry presented a resolution expressing the great disappointment of the women present because of the absence on account of sickness of three most valued members, Mrs. C. K. Nelson, Mrs. Isabel O'Hear and Mrs. R. M. Walker.

A resolution was offered by Miss Woodberry asking the Bishop to allow one hundred dollars from the "Georgia Educational Fund for Girls" to be applied to the expenses of the daughter of a missionary clergyman of the Diocese in the State school for girls in Milledgeville. The Bishop gave his cordial assent and the amount was ordered paid by the Treasurer—one half the first of September and the balance in February.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

The meeting was called to order in the Sunday School room of Christ Church by Miss Johnson at 4 P. M. The session was opened with prayer by Rev. W. B. Walker, of Macon. Hymn 583 was sung.

An interesting talk was given by Mrs. Dodge on the Anson Dodge Memorial Home for orphan boys on Saint Simon's Island. "Mother Dodge," as her boys called her, seemed much gratified by the gift of boxes of clothing from various points which have been of the greatest substantial help, but best of all have shown her how many people are interested in her labor of love.

Sister Louise, Deaconess of the Appleton Church Home for orphan girls, of Macon, Ga., was asked to give some account of

the condition of the Home. She seemed very hopeful and happy in this work and expressed her thanks also for numerous boxes that have been sent her for the children.

A short talk was given by Miss Florence Hergesheimer about the "Settlement Home" she has established in the grounds of Unity Mills, LaGrange. She has a night school, visits the sick, gives useful instruction to the mothers and to the neighbors generally who submit to her every kind of social problem to solve. A new and commodious building is to be erected for her use by the mill owners in the near future and there will be two other "United Offering" women sent to assist her in this fine undertaking for the future development of the mill people, spiritually as well as bodily.

Miss Daisy Tichnor was unable to be present, but she gave a written account of the school in Norcross, telling of the pleasure shown by her scholars in the Junior Auxiliary study of missions. She is another of our "United Offering" women—this being the first year Georgia has received the support of active workers from this fund.

Mrs. Mallory Taylor offered a resolution in accordance with the suggestion of Mrs. Lewis, asking that each Secretary shall try to raise fifty dollars from her points before September first, to bring the "United Offering" up to an amount double what it was three years ago. The hope was expressed that every one present would "talk up" this subject as much as possible during the summer months.

THURSDAY MORNING.

A short executive session of the officers was held, but it was deemed inadvisable to suggest any new work, as the impending division of the Diocese will make necessary some changes in the organization of the Auxiliary. The hope was expressed that all the officers may be able to attend the Triennial Convention of the Church next October in Richmond.

A rising vote of thanks was given to the ladies of St. John's, Christ, and St. Paul's Churches, whose joint efforts had made the meeting one of the very best ever held in the State.

The Doxology was sung by the delegates with a feeling of much sadness, as they realized with the division of the Diocese they would never meet again as one body, but their numbers would form two divisions of the Auxiliary in the near future.

The thanks of the ladies were tendered Mrs. Francis Pope Barney for her efficient and painstaking service as Recording Secretary for the meeting.

On Sexagesima Sunday the parable of the sower was preached about and as I listened it seemed to me that we of the Junior Auxiliary who might be likened to "new ground" should so enrich and fertilize that soil that the seed of Christ's religion should grow and flourish within us and not fall on rocky and thin soil to wither away or be choked, "but on good ground to spring up and bear fruit an hundred fold" now, how can we do this? Lent will soon be here, when the rest and quiet of that season will be upon us and with the lengthening of the days you who are busy at school can take the time to learn about the efforts being made to spread Christ's Kingdom. How many of you have thought about Bishop Rowe's tramp every winter in the snow and ice of bleak, frozen Alaska for thousands of miles from January to September when he hopes, so he wrote "to get back in time to sail to Seattle so as to be in Richmond" for the general convention of the Episcopal Church which meets in October. Or who can tell about the mission in Uganda in darkest Africa where thousands of savages have through the love of Christ become good law abiding people, or about the Indian schools where the children forget about ~~the~~ war paint and savage snake dances of their fathers as they learn how to do the things of this day and generation.

The Church Missionary Society which has its own big building on Fourth Avenue in New York, asks us church people, all over the world to send money for the support of these schools and far off countries, for without money they can do nothing. The Board of Missions which is made up of 16 Bishops, 15 Clergymen and 15 Laymen, business men who are members of the church, meet together and look over the reports sent them from Bishops in Alaska, the Philippines, Mexico, Cuba, Hawaii, China, Japan and the dioceses or Missionary districts in the United States, such as Western Texas, Oklahoma, Arizona, North Dakota and many others, even our own state, which are not able to take care of themselves without outside help; they see that it will take for this year, that is from September 1906 to September 1907, \$932,093.61, ^{to} look up and say "how are we going to get all this money?" Next they get a list of all the dioceses and see how much money they raised last year, and they see Pennsylvania raised so many thousands of dollars so they think she can send them so much this year. They do the same with Georgia and Bishop Nelson takes the amount he is told to make up and he in turn divides it up amongst his churches telling them to send it to the Board of Missions before next September. That is what is called the apportionment plan and we Juniors of Georgia are apportioned \$100.00. If we don't pay, some one, a doctor, perhaps, in Hankow will receive a letter from Dr. Loyd, the Secretary of the Board, telling him he is sorry he can't get that \$50.00 to pay for a new operating table even if the old one is so broken that it is dangerous to use, because the Georgia Juniors did not send but \$50.00 of the \$100.00 they were asked to send. Last year we only gave \$70.00 and we should feel very badly if we failed again this year, shouldn't we?

**TENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BABIES' BRANCH OF
THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.**

Last year the total amount of the Babies' Branch for Georgia was \$197.05. This year it is \$234.88.

This encourages us to still further efforts to interest the babies, mothers and secretaries throughout the State.

Of course we wish the money, that is necessary for the maintenance of the missionary work already started and for still further undertakings. Back of the money, however, lies a principle, one that goes to the very heart of things—the principle of giving through personal interest and effort. Every penny put in by the babies themselves means education in its broadest sense, kindergarten and primary teaching and religious training to those in dire need of them; education to the mothers in showing their children the true spirit of giving, and to the children themselves in the act of giving, and giving prayerfully.

No donation, however large, given in one sum by the parents at the end of the year can possibly take the place of these pennies, slowly but surely accumulating.

One other point is worthy of consideration: If the Secretaries of the different Auxiliaries throughout the State would give to the Secretary of the Babies' Branch the benefit of their working knowledge of their own Parishes, in suggesting good names to act as Parish Secretaries of the Babies' Branch; or, a good basis of organization for this particular work, it would be of inestimable service to the Diocesan Secretary, who, living in one city, cannot otherwise know of the best ways in which to accomplish the work satisfactorily.

This will promote sympathy and a good understanding between different branches of the work, and perhaps by a wise choice of the local organizer, insure a measure of success otherwise unattainable. These are the two points for our present consideration, with always the earnest appeal to those Parishes not already enrolled, to take up for their babies, the responsibilities inherent in their calling as "a member of Christ, a child of God, and an inheritor of the Kingdom of Heaven."

REPORT TO CONVENTION.

The consolidated report from the various Secretaries and Treasurers was made on Wednesday morning to the Diocesan Convention by Rev. G. Sherwood Whitney, of Saint Paul's Church, Augusta, Georgia, although the correct total could not be given at that time owing to the Albany total not being included. The report was received, however, with a standing vote and ordered printed in the Journal of the Convention.

LETTERS FROM SECRETARIES.

MACON ARCHDEACONY.

The interest in Missions—the real work of the Auxiliary—is slowly but steadily increasing in the branches of the Macon Archdeaconry, in spite of the discouragements necessarily involved in the work of the smaller places.

Improvement is shown in the fact that, although the financial report is several hundred dollars short of the amount raised last year, the falling off has not been in the Missionary funds—which have really increased somewhat—but rather in the parochial.

Another source of encouragement is that Hawkinsville and Talbotton have sent separate boxes this year, instead of a joint one, as they have heretofore, and Milledgeville has made a start in the same direction. The box from Griffin was much more valuable than the one last winter. It was the best, I believe, they have ever sent. St. Paul's Auxiliary, Macon, has given to the Appleton Home Chapel a beautiful vase in loving memory of Sister Sarah.

Christ Church, Macon, reports an increase in the diocesan work of over fifty dollars, and Trinity Church, Columbus, donates to general missions and diocesan work over fifty dollars. Last year they reported nothing for either fund.

St. Mary's, the Virgin, reports—I think for the first time—contribution to Foreign Missions and the United Offering and also an increase for the diocesan work from a dollar and a half to fifteen dollars.

It is a matter of congratulation that the Mission Study classes are growing in numbers and interest. It is to be hoped that in the near future there will not be a branch of the Auxiliary that will not devote at least a portion of its time to gaining an intelligent idea of the work at home and abroad.

Much to our sorrow Mrs. John Richardson, president of the Milledgeville Auxiliary, is very ill. It will be remembered that she re-organized the branch in the fall of 1903. Her work has been most faithful and efficient. We wish her a speedy recovery and strength to continue in all good works.

AUGUSTA ARCHDEACONY.

Our Archdeaconry met with great misfortune the past year in the resignation on account of ill health of the Secretary, Mrs. H. B. Alexander. No one could have been more efficient or better fitted for the office. For a number of months the Augusta Archdeaconry was without a Secretary, yet, despite this discouragement, it seems to me, that as a whole, we have had a prosperous and inspiring year. So varied are the circumstances and conditions in each parish and mission, that comparisons are quite out of the question. Each band of workers know whether or not they have done well. The figures do not tell all. The smallest mission may have done better than the largest parish.

In St. Paul's, Augusta, we have had for the first time a study class, taking Alaska for our subject, covering it in six lessons and ending with an illustrated lantern lecture. Without question the study class ought to be a feature of every branch, however small. Without knowledge of the work, enthusiasm will always be feeble, but under the stimulus of a study class, there is no limit to the zeal and enthusiasm that may be kindled.

If I may be pardoned for selecting one branch for mention, it would be to call attention to the fact that the Church of Atonement, Augusta, has given something for every object called by the blanks, a practice to be highly commended. But all have done well, and greater things can be hoped for this coming year.

I hope this may be the beginning of many memorials centering around the "Samuel Benedict Memorial." George and my other children intend that my cottage, built on the site of the first school, shall be a memorial to me when my work is done.

I am often reminded that I am living on borrowed time. "Three score years and ten" is a long journey and soon the burden must be laid down. God grant the strength will be given me to work up to the *end*, and die in peace and joy, having finished the work He has given me to do.

JUNIOR AUXILIARY.

Some of the girls of Brenau College got up a box for Easter of dyed eggs and cookies, and three little mission boys gave twenty-five cents from their mite boxes besides saving up during Lent for the Sunday School offering. One crowd of girls about twelve years old in one of the large churches got tired of waiting all winter for a leader, so organized themselves into a nominating committee, chose their President, went to her home and told her she had to take charge of them, and she said there was nothing else to do, so now she is having them meet every week to sew on some presents to be sent to Alaska. The Treasurer brought me a small amount for the pledges to our scholarships, and when I asked her if she did not have more she could collect, she and the Secretary started out on a journey, for it was a very lengthy trip, to each member's house to tell them they must bring their dues to Sunday school. When she got home late that evening she was too tired, she said, to water her plants, so they had to go dry until the next day. Some other girls have given up Saturday mornings to go down to a grocery store and sell candies which they had to make the afternoon before. It is these sacrifices which makes the work dear to one and is the true Christian spirit, for only that which we give through denial is sweet to the human soul.

Study has been the keynote for the past year and every branch

has had in it one form or another. Some through talks from their Rectors, others through the Spirit of Missions, and most of them have had models of foreign homes, etc., and letters from mission workers which I have loaned the branches. I am gradually getting up a collection of literature, plays, curios and personal stories which are kept on hand for the use of anyone who writes for the loan of them.

Boxes have been sent to Miss Hergesheimer in LaGrange, 3 boxes to Miss Daisy Ticknor in Norcross for her school. Two boxes to Mrs. Cantwell in Oakley Depot, South Carolina, where she has a school for the mill children. One to St. Mary's at Sewanee, Tenn. Two for Appleton's Church Home in Macon. St. Andrew's School for boys at Sewanee, Tenn., has had a box gixen them, and things have been sent Miss Stone at Tallulah Falls, and a cripple child at Midway, Ga., had a Thanksgiving box from some Juniors not far from there.

Only one of these thirteen boxes went to a foreign country, and all the rest, except four, were given within our own diocese, so it may not be said that the Juniors are neglecting those at home. We have given more money to foreign work than ever before, and this is largely due to our united scholarships, each branch thereby giving their share to help the dark-skinned children of other lands.

**Explanation of the Objects for Which the Georgia Branch
of the Woman's Auxiliary Works.**

BIBLE WOMAN IN JAPAN.

Mrs. Hiratsuka is the native Bible Woman supported by Georgia women in Tokyo, Japan. This was proposed by Mrs. Alexander and established in 1889, when the convention met in the Cathedral in Atlanta. As is well known, the duties of a Bible Woman are many and varied. She visits and nurses the sick, trains the women, has Sunday School classes, assists in teaching and preparing for confirmation, cares for the church furnishings, and is general parish visitor. A native woman is particularly valuable, when trained for this work.

ST. HILDA'S SCHOLARSHIP.

The Georgia women support the Bishop Nelson scholarship in St. Hilda's School in Wuchang, China, where a girl is cared for, trained and equipped in this excellent literary and industrial school for Chinese girls, and developed in Christian womanhood amid church influences.

This scholarship was proposed by Mrs. William H. Elliott, established in 1902, when the convention met in Augusta.

SHANGHAI SCHOLARSHIP.

Since 1895 the Bishop Beckwith scholarship in St. Mary's Hall, Shanghai, China, for Chinese girls, has been maintained by the archdeaconries of Macon and Albany.

GUANTANAMO, CUBA, SCHOLARSHIP.

A child is supported and educated in the large school of over two hundred students in Guantanamo, Cuba, by the Bishop Knight scholarship, established at the suggestion of Mrs. Nellie Peters Black in 1905 when the convention met in Macon. This flourishing church school is most popular throughout that section of Cuba, and its opportunities are only limited by its endowment.

RURAL SCHOOL FUND.

The Georgia Girls' Educational Fund is for the education of our girls in the rural districts, especially by scholarships in church schools, and to provide teachers who shall be properly equipped

to care for these children in mind, body, and soul. This was proposed by Mrs. Black, and established at the last convention, Columbus, 1906.

MOTHER BENEDICT DEACONESS FUND.

To Support a deaconess in the Memorial Hall for girls at the Cedartown school as a memorial to Mother Benedict.

UNITED OFFERING.

The United Offering in which every woman is asked to join represents especially birthday and other thank offerings, over and above general missionary work. This is presented triennially, and from it comes, through the Board of Missions, the means of supporting women workers in all parts of the field, to build schools, churches, and homes for the clergy, and to educate and train women workers, and the care of such workers, when sick or disabled. "To it we bring the incense of love, poured out in thankful gifts for special mercies, in memory of loved ones, for the ever daily mercies which bless us all. And if each woman in every parish gives something every day as she numbers her blessings, and with it the daily prayer, how near she must live to the Master, and imbibe of His spirit, thus helping herself, while the influence of such good work circles the whole church in loving deeds, spreads the Gospel, and hastens His coming."

Georgia has this year over \$1,200 to present.

THE EXPENSE FUND.

Each parish and mission is asked to contribute some little amount towards the expense fund which meets the expenses of the publication of the Minutes, circulars and report blanks, postage, etc., and also pays the expenses of missionaries invited to address the Auxiliary.

REPORT OF UNITED OFFERING FUND.

Mrs. T. S. Lewis, Custodian.

In presenting my report there are a few words that I would like to say. There are 98 churches reported in the last report of the Woman's Auxiliary, also 23 Junior Auxiliary's. In the United Offering there are 34 churches and 12 Junior's represented. To be a "United Offering," each church should contribute, no matter how small the amount. *Then*, and not *till* then, will it truly be a united offering from the women in Georgia to her sister women in mission fields, who are doing not only *their* work, but also *ours*. Will not each church try to send some little sum, so that in October our offering will be from the entire church in Georgia? In 1904 Georgia's share in the United Offering was \$775.47. Thus far it has reached the sum of \$1166.27. I think we should be very proud, but if we can raise \$384.67 by September 15th we will have exactly doubled our gift of three years ago. *Won't* you *each* and every one make an extra effort for this end? In the last two years I have had the pleasure of entering the names of 18 churches and 8 Junior Auxiliaries for the first time. We are growing, and I believe that before the next tri-ennial every church in the state will be represented. In conclusion, my books must close one week before date of convention (to which I am called on to report) to give me time to properly make out such report. Only such monies as are received by me before that time can be included in such report. Will each one sending me money, *each time* mention their Archdeaconry and Church connection, also give number and street address if possible, it will save me much trouble, and insure their receiving receipts for same promptly.
