PRAYER.

Quicken us, O Lord, by Thy Holy Spirit, that we may choose and love Thy way. Give to us, the members of this Auxiliary, Thy favor and protection and Thy abiding presence in our daily walk and conversation. Give us wisdom, zeal and perseverance in our work for Thee. Bless our plans for carrying forward Thy work. Direct and govern each word and thought, and fill every heart with love for Thee and Thy work, and to Thy name, O Lord and Master, be all honor and glory. Amen.

The Officers and Delegates were invited to luncheon by the members of the Christ Church Branch. The meeting was closed by singing the Doxology.

AFTERNOON.

The afternoon meeting was called to order by Mrs. Elliott. The Rev. Mr. Frazer offered prayer and gave an address on missionary work.

Bishop Reese then spoke, greeting the meeting and giving both commendation for the past and encouragement for the future.

After these two addresses Mrs. Elliott said she felt sure others had been stirred and enthused by them, as well as herself, so she would venture to tell the meeting now of what she earnestly hoped the Auxiliary would undertake in the future. The support of a diocesan missionary: She thought the time not yet ripe and the Auxiliary not yet strong enough, but she did hope it would be done at some time.

Miss Billesley, the Deaconess from Christ Church, Augusta, gave a most interesting address on the training and work of Deaconesses and the growth of the order.

The Treasurer's report was called for and given by Mrs. G. S. Whitney, the Diocesan Treasurer. Mrs. Elliott said the matter of pledges was next in order; that at the last annual meeting it had been decided all pledges were not to be renewed yearly, but held until withdrawn. Therefore, if any Branch wished to change or withdraw any pledge, they could now do so. No pledges were changed or withdrawn. Miss A. C. Johnson moved that as the pledges given by the Branches last year had exceeded the amounts promised by the Auxiliary, the balance now held by the Treasurer be applied to the printing of the report of the present meeting and the rest of the amount not so used be given to General Missions. This was seconded and carried.

The President stated that the object of the Julia K. Miller pledge would now be considered. Mrs. Pratt moved that it be hospital work in Alaska. Mrs. Berckman, that it be the salary for the Auxiliary Diocesan missionary suggested by Mrs. Elliott. Mrs. Winn, that it be to help the school under the charge of the Rev. Robb White, Jr., in the Philippines.

After full discussion, the vote was taken by parishes, and Mrs. Pratt's motion, that it be for hospital work in Alaska, was carried. Pledges being called for, they were given as follows, Mrs. Elliott saying she wished the whole amount to be at least \$100.00:

Mrs. Elliott stated that several Branches not represented by Delegates would doubtless send in pledges later.

Mrs. Elliott asked that the title, Archdeaconal Secretary, be changed to Vice President, the term used in several Dioceses. The motion was made, seconded and carried.

The reports of the four Archdeaconries were called for. The report of the Albany Archdeaconry was read by Mrs. Elliott, Mrs. Wright being absent on account of illness. The report of the Augusta Archdeaconry was read by Mrs. Whitney, Mrs. Phinizy being absent on account of illness. That of the Good Shepherd Branch was read by Miss Cuthbert. A communication from the Atonement Branch was read by Mrs. Clark, stating their heavy losses caused by the recent flood, on account of which they could not increase their pledges. The report of the Brunswick Archdeaconry was read by Mrs. Screven, Mrs. Wyllly being absent on account of illness. The report of the Savannah Archdeaconry was read by Miss Johnson.

Mrs. Elliott said she wished to establish a special branch of the Auxiliary to be called "The Branch of Scattered Churchwomen." Such a branch already exists in Mississippi, and is doing a great work by uniting the churchwomen scattered by ones and twos in small groups through the Diocese. This met with the hearty endorsement of the meeting. She appointed Mrs. L. G. Young President of the Branch. Mrs. Young expressed her thanks, and said she would take under consideration the acceptance of the office. Miss Cuthbert read a letter from Father Hughson, expressing his appreciation of the help and work of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Mrs. Whitney asked that Mrs. Blount, custodian of the United Offering, have charge of the supply of mite boxes, instead of herself. Also that an account book be provided for Mrs. Blount's use. It was voted that both should be done.

Mrs. Whitney presented in writing a very cordial resolution of thanks for the hospitality shown the Delegates by the Christ Church Branch of the Auxiliary. This was adopted by a rising vote.

The motion to adjourn until the next annual meeting of the Convention was made, seconded and carried. The meeting was closed by prayer, offered by Mrs. Elliott, and the singing of the Doxology by all present.

WELCOME BY PRESIDENT.

The Auxiliary of Christ Church welcomes most earnestly, most lovingly, our Sisters of the Diocese of Georgia.

Could there be a stronger tie to bind us together than together to work for the Master, together to plan for the extension of His Kingdom?

IN MEMORIAM.
JULIA K. MILLER.

November 9, 1908.

We meet to-day under the shadow of a great sorrow.

Since the last Annual Meeting of the Auxiliary there has passed from the labors and sorrows of the Church Militant to the rest and joy of Paradise our beloved leader, Mrs. Frank H. Miller.

The thought of her fills our hearts, and it seems most fitting that our first act should be our tribute to her memory, the tribute of the closest, tenderest affection and the deepest gratitude for all she gave to us during her years of devoted service.

Since the full organization of the Georgia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary, in 1892, she was one of its Diocesan Officers, three years later becoming its honored head.

"Next to her children she loves the work of the Auxiliary," were the words of him who could best speak for her, and those of us who have had the privilege of being closely associated with her from the beginning know all that she brought to it; the rich gifts of service and leadership; the deep, tender, personal sympathy; the unfailing courtesy; the abounding hospitality; the beautiful womanliness and gracious presence in which we delighted as she represented us in our great Triennial Meetings gathered from every part of our land; nay, from every Continent! And added to these, the absolute fidelity to every obligation, so that nothing was ever neglected or omitted; no detail of her work was ever slighted, no opportunity for courtesy or consideration allowed to pass by.

She never failed you.

It was largely through her instrumentality that the Georgia Branch was brought into the close relationship which has

ever subsisted with the General Secretaries of the Auxiliary, Mrs. Twing and Miss Emery, who were her warm, personal friends and frequent guests, and through this intimate association Georgia's work was laid out and developed on lines in strict accordance with the ideals of the original founders of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Thus her active work was completed, the foundation laid on which others could build; and when, three years ago, in a moment the sudden loss of eyesight came, and the decree, that, though partly restored, the dearly-loved work must be turned over to another, she yielded with uncomplaining submission; her generous support never for an instant faltering.

And when with equal suddenness her great sorrow came, she did not sink beneath it; but with a calmness and peace so wonderful that they seemed unearthly, she kept on her way with the same careful thought for every duty, the same loving consideration for earthly friends, the same absolute childlike submission to her Heavenly Father's will.

When on the blessed All Saints' Day she knelt at the altar, and with "Angels and Living Saints and Dead" and "Christ, Their Living Head," she joined in rapt communion, her life-work was completed.

It was her viaticum.

A few days more and "God touched her with His finger and she slept," the earthly "Good Night" dying on her lips as she entered into the joy of Paradise.

"Father, in Thy gracious keeping,
Leave we now Thy servant sleeping."

Her memory is a precious inheritance.

What more fitting than that it be perpetuated by us through some pledge to the Mission Field, to be known as "The Julia K. Miller Memorial"?

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Ready my place to fill,
Ready for service, lowly or great,
Ready to do His will,
Ready to speak, ready to warn,
Ready o'er souls to yearn;
Ready in life, ready in death,
Ready for His return.

Before I begin to speak of the business part of my report for this past year, I would rather that we first spoke together of what is the foundation of all Auxiliary work, and that is prayer; united prayer, for therein is our strength.

The prayer that I used to ask for us, the Master's presence in this, our Annual Meeting, is the one I beg you to use at your Parish Meetings; use it in full faith that His Spirit and His Strength will be with you.

In order that the Auxiliary of Georgia may more closely join in united prayer, I have had printed this Litany to send to every Parish Branch copies enough for them to use at their Lenten meetings. I think you will find it helpful. The lines that I read you at the beginning of this address were from its title page.

Prayer is a habit; it is an atmosphere in which the soul lives, a conscious abiding in a power that is higher than ourselves, and the more we pray, the more our inner life is spent with this higher power, the more we will realize that missionary work is the highest work to which we can aspire—the work of making ready for the return of our Master.

Study your New Testaments and you will find that His coming again is the inspiration and hope of all those saintly men, is the end for which they worked and prayed. Shall not we, too, work and pray that His name be preached to every clime, for when His name has been borne witness to in the uttermost parts of the earth and in the islands of the sea, then will our Master come into His inheritance and we will rest from our warfare with sin.

We are a band of Christian women, meeting together to do God's work—"Ready our place to fill; Ready to do His will."

What is His will? The directions are plain: "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." But I hear some one say, "Neglect our home missions?" No! The work of both must go along side by side.

Have you never gone into some young mother's home and found her with her baby, her darling, clasped with her one arm close to her heart; the little arms are round her neck, the little cheek nestled close to her face. The baby is her very own, her heart, her life; she is loving it; she is caring for it as only mothers can. But yet with her free right hand she is doing other work, caring for some older child, doing some household duty, carrying on her daily life. Just so it should be with home and foreign missions. Our own parish; our own diocese. They are ours; our work; we share it with the Master. It is work for God and for ourselves; but foreign work is all God's, and while clasping our work for parish and for diocese to our heart and putting our life into it, still with our free hand we throw ourselves into what is only God's work, missionary work for those beyond our home lines, and His blessing rests on us and His spirit comes down into our hearts and lives and gives us power and strength and opportunity to work for both home and foreign missions, and we find strength for both in prayer.

The year that has passed since you chose me for your President has been marked by no special event, except the visit of Miss Emery to us last Spring, when those who had the privilege of hearing her realized how the Auxiliary is one in purpose, one in prayer, even though its members are scattered even to the uttermost islands of the sea.

I have found it, during the past year, a great convenience that the title of my office was changed to that of President, and I would suggest that during this meeting you change the title of your Organizing Secretaries to Vice-President. It will be a great convenience to all parties, and their office is so designated in many other dioceses.

Before I close I would beg each member of this Auxiliary

EXPLANATION OF THE JOINT PLEDGES OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY FOR THE DIOCESE OF ATLANTA.

UNITED OFFERING.

The United Offering in which every woman is asked to join represents especial birthday and other thank offerings, over and above general missionary work. This is presented triennially, and from it comes, through the Board of Missions, the means of supporting women workers in all parts of the field, to build schools, churches, and homes for the clergy, and to educate and train women workers, and the care of such workers, when sick or disabled. "To it we bring the incense of love, poured out in thankful gifts for special mercies, in memory of loved ones, for the ever daily mercies which bless us all. And if each woman in every parish gives something every day as she numbers her blessings, and with it the daily prayer, how near she must live to the Master, and imbibe of His spirit, thus helping herself, while the influence of such good work circles the whole church in loving deeds, spreads the Gospel, and hastens His coming."

THE EXPENSE FUND.

Each parish and mission is asked to contribute some little amount towards the expense fund which meets the expenses of the publication of the Minutes, circulars and report blanks, postage, &c., and also pays the expenses of missionaries invited to address the Auxiliary.

GUANTANAMO, CUBA SCHOLARSHIP.

A child is supported and educated in the large school of over two hundred students in Guantanamo, Cuba, by the Bishop Knight Scholarship, established at the suggestion of Mrs. Nellie Peters Black in 1905 when the convention met in Macon. This flourishing church school is most popular throughout that section of Cuba, and its opportunities are only limited by its endowment.

to realize that Christ and Him crucified, Christ the atonement for sin, Christ our Master, Christ our Saviour, our Redeemer, to set Him forth in our lives, to labor to draw all men to Him, is the aim of all Auxiliary work.

But another's language will express this better, bring the truth more plainly before you. I read from a recent publication of a Southern minister, the Rev. R. W. Hogue, of Chapel Hill, N. C.:

"How many of our women whom Christ's teaching and influence have elevated, honored and protected, to whom prayer and worship and the Bible are your surest and most sacred strongholds, how many of you are seeking not merely by garments sewed in guilds, but by personal interest and personal sacrifice to give to others less fortunate and less consecrated what is reserved for you and you alone to give."

"It is because our Christian women do these things so indifferently or so irregularly that they lose their hold on the Divine Christ. He has made it so that only in His most unselfish service can His best teaching be understood, His deepest love be found and His personal presence be felt. In that service alone we shall find—nay, we shall become—the truest answer to our prayers."

"Let no one of us permit ourselves to forget that we are in this world as a disciple and a representative of the Son of God—each one must realize their own responsibility; each one must so act as to indicate our service and vindicate our calling."

"Remembering this, we will work with a clearness of vision, a wisdom of foresight and a resoluteness of heart that will accomplish the highest results. We shall have the courage, when it is necessary to look beyond the easy and undertake the difficult with a faith worthy of our cause and its great Captain.

"In every question that arises we shall seem to hear the question of our Master, 'What think ye of Christ?' and we shall speak and act as if replying to that question. We shall place ourselves under the heartfelt acceptance of His entire influence. We shall in deep reality and humility come often to His altar with a consecrated and uncompromising promise

to offer and present unto Him and His service ourselves, our souls and bodies to be a reasonable, holy and living sacrifice. We shall return to the regular routine of our separate lives holier and more hopeful women, more fervently anxious and more fully able to bless, to instruct and to inspire others, through the evident consecration of our purified hearts and lives and the unwearied perseverance of our patient labors."

"May the blessing of the Master be upon us all and may His Holy Spirit rest upon us and all that we shall undertake."

Report of the Treasurer of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Georgia.

The Treasurer begs to submit the following report:

Owing to the Division of the Diocese, all financial matters having been previously adjusted, there was no balance on hand with which to begin our year. The Treasurer has received from all sources the sum of \$270.22, of which amount \$10.00 was a donation from Mrs. F. F. Reese; the balance came from the various Branches.

Of this amount, I have paid to George C. Thomas, Treasurer of the General Board of Missions, \$155.00 to cover the pledges of the Auxiliary for the year 1908, and \$20.00 to meet the expenses of Miss Emery's visit to Savannah. The expenses for the year, including the printing of the report of the last annual meeting in the Church Bells, amounted to \$12.00, and the sum of \$5.58, remitted by St. Paul's, Albany, for the United Offering, was sent to Mrs. Elliott. The balance remaining in the Treasury is \$77.57.

The tabulated statement appended to this summary gives the receipts and disbursements in detail. In addition to the care of the funds, the Treasurer, at Mrs. Elliott's request, mailed to the Branches 110 copies of the Church Bells, containing the report of the last Annual Meeting. I wish also to thank the Treasurers of the Branches for their prompt remittances, and in this connection take the liberty of suggesting that in making remittances to the Treasurer great care should be taken to state exactly the object for which the money is sent.

Should the Auxiliary see fit to authorize it, the Treasurer would suggest the printing of a small blank containing the names of the various objects for which pledges are made, which could be furnished to the Branch Treasurers for their use in remitting. Such a blank would also serve as a memorandum and a reminder to the Branches of these objects. The expense of a supply of such blanks would be about \$1.50.

I wish also to remind the Auxiliary that the fiscal year of the General Board of Missions ends Sept. 1st, and all pledges should be in the hands of the Treasurer in time for her to send them in before that date.
