MINUTES

The Eighteenth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Georgia was held in the hall adjoining Calvary Church, Americus, Ga., immediately after the opening services of the Convention, January 26th, 1910.

Hymn 249 was sung by the Auxiliary and then the meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. Mr. Laurence.

Miss Cobb, of the Americus Branch, in a few well-chosen words, extended a cordial welcome to the Auxiliary.

Mrs. Elliott, the President, requested Miss Anna Harrold to act as Secretary.

The meeting was called to order, and the President called the roll. There were thirty-eight Delegates present, representing fifteen Chapters.

The annual address of the President was listened to with close and appreciative attention. A few added words were of especial interest, urging individual duty and the privilege of each woman present to take an active part in order that the meeting might be earnest and enthusiastic.

Mrs. McGlohon read the report of the Baby Branch of the Auxiliary, and as the hour for adjournment had arrived, after reading of Hymn 586 and singing of Doxology, the meeting adjourned to meet at 2:30 P. M.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

The only order of business for the afternoon was the address by Rev. Dr. Wilson, of China, a most interesting and informal talk, which was much enjoyed.

The Auxiliary adjourned until 10:00 o'clock Thursday morning, in order that all might hear the annual address of the Bishop to the Diocesan Convention.

THURSDAY MORNING.

The Auxiliary assembled in the hall at 10:00 A. M. The Bishop opened the meeting with prayer, and then addressed the Auxiliary, first with words of greeting and commendation, encouragement for the future and suggestions as to work.

He spoke of two causes that he had near his heart, one being the rebuilding of the negro mission school in Albany; the other being some plan by which every missionary might have a vacation.

At the close of his address, the Bishop nominated officers of the Auxiliary for the ensuing year.

Miss Harrold took the chair, and upon motion the Secretary cast the ballot, and all officers were elected according to the Bishop's nomination.

Rev. Mr. Williams, of Augusta, gave a brief account of his mission work among the mill people of Christ Church, Augusta, Ga.

The Rev. Mr. Russell Smith extended to the Auxiliary of Georgia a loving greeting from the Auxiliary of Atlanta, Ga., and was authorized to convey a message from our assembled meeting expressing our interest in and our sympathy with our sister Auxiliary.

The President called for various reports, which were read as follows:

Junior Auxiliary—Full report read by Miss Harrold.

United Offering—By Mrs. Blount, with a few added words of interest and enthusiasm, and a request that every one would read literature that she would gladly furnish on the subject.

Treasurer's Report—By Mrs. Whitney, showing an excellent state of affairs, the most unusual feature being the fact of a balance in the treasury of \$123.00.

Archdeaconry Reports were read as follows: Albany, by Mrs. A. P. Wright; Augusta, by Mrs. Oliphant; Brunswick, by Mrs. Manser; Savannah, by Miss Harrold.

Report of Scattered Churchwomen—By Mrs. Young, was read by Mrs. West, of Sandersville.

Mrs. Dodge gave a most interesting account of her Home for Boys and the prospective school.

Next subject for consideration was the balance in the treasury of \$123.00 and what to do with it. After much discussion it was decided to give \$25.00 to Rev. Dr. Wilson for his work in China and \$75.00 to the Bishop to use as he thinks best.

The meeting adjourned for luncheon.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

The Auxiliary met in the hall at 2:30 P. M.

The President read a condensed report of the work for the year ending January 1st, 1910, showing that the total amount of contributions for missions was \$3,168.52. This report was read to the Convention by Rev. C. T. Wright.

"How the Auxiliary Could Best Assist the Missionary Work in the Diocese" was the next subject taken up. After much earnest discussion it was decided to start a fund to be called "The Georgia Missionary's Vacation Fund," and annual pledges were called for. Many Delegates were not authorized to make pledges for their Branches, but promised to use their influence to arouse an interest in the subject.

It was suggested that the Auxiliary have the annual meeting on the day preceding the Diocesan Convention; but the motion was lost.

Mrs. Dodge moved that a vote of thanks be tendered the Americus Auxiliary, and indeed to the people of Americus, for their courteous entertainment. Also that special thanks be given to Mrs. Lee and Miss Carrie Byrd for the use of their hall and grounds.

This was the last business before the meeting, and after a few earnest words from the President and a closing prayer, the Auxiliary adjourned with the singing of the Doxology.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

We are gathered together in our Eighteenth Annual Meeting not only to review the work of the past year, but to take council together as to how best we can serve our Master in the coming year, to find out what **we** can do to obey His command to preach His gospel to every creature.

A year ago we, the Woman's Auxiliary of this old, yet new, Diocese of Georgia, met in the church built on the very spot where John Wesley, a minister of our mother church of England preached the gospel of his crucified Master, the first voice in Georgia to proclaim His Name; perhaps even then in Wesley's soul had commenced that revolt against formalism; that longing for a fuller, more enthusiastic expression of his deep feeling of love for his God, that has wrought such a change in the religious world. Shall not we in this our new yet old Diocese follow his lead and seek to give expression to our love for the Master with enthusiasm and zeal, break away from all lukewarmness and indifference in either word or act, and strive to do the will of God, strive to glorify Him in being fruitful in that which we are called and chosen?

All are not called to the same service. The gifts of the Spirit He divides severally as He will, but the fruits of the Spirit are possible to all, and it is fruit that the Master calls for. Each one of us has our talent to account for. Let us each see to it that that talent, be it ever so small, be not buried, but cultivated and multiplied to the Glory of God and the salvation of our fellowman.

The past year has been blessed to us, in that our Bishop's health has been restored and he has commenced his work among us. Let us all give him all the support and encouragement that it is possible for us to give.

Six ministers have recently come into our Diocese to fill our vacant churches and mission stations. They, too, will look to us to bid them Godspeed in their work to lighten their labors as much as in us lies.

Georgia is a missionary field that lies very close to us and calls aloud for the services of our church.

For the church year ending September 1st, 1909, \$589.71

was the amount sent by the Auxiliary of Georgia towards the \$100.000 promised annually to the Board of Missions by the Woman's Auxiliary. This sum far exceeded our apportionment, which was only \$200.00. Feeling that we would be always able to give more than \$200.00 and being requested by Miss Emery to accept for Georgia a larger apportionment, I have promised, after consultation with my fellow officers, \$400.00 annually. This amount we will have no difficulty in raising, as all our pledges count on the apportionment.

I regret to say that I cannot give as good an account of the Juniors or the Babies. The apportionment for the Juniors was \$100.00. Of this they paid \$50.80—just half. The apportionment for the Babies was \$150.00, of which they paid \$90.00. After consultation with the officers of these Branches I wrote Miss Emery that the Juniors would retain their apportionment of \$100.00. The officers of the Babies' Branch decided to reduce their pledge from \$150.00 to \$100.00.

Are not we, the women of the Auxiliary, partially responsible for the failure of the Juniors and the Babies to fulfill their pledges? Surely if the mothers trained their children up to the privilege of giving, we would hear of no shortcomings. Mothers, do you realize the blessedness of leading those little ones to know that they can give to God; that they, too, though weak and small, can work with and for the Master? Begin with the little baby fingers and see how gladly they drop their pennies in their mite boxes, and those children of older years, how interested they will be if they only are told of these things. Knowledge creates interest. See you to it that they are trained in His Holy Word.

And Sunday School teachers, on you, too, rests the responsibility of their training. Are you bringing prayer and a deep earnest longing after spiritual things into your work as teachers? If not, ask of God the guidance of His Spirit in your work in the Sunday School, for only as you live close to the Master's side yourself so only can you lead those children to Him. The young are very quick to see where the heart is—zeal and enthusiasm draw out their young feelings, and where you lead they will follow.

And now for the coming year. Are we ready to go

forward? Ready His work to do? The fields are white for the harvest. Now is our opportunity.

In October the Woman's Auxiliary holds its great triennial meeting in Cincinnati. To this you must elect your Delegates. Only Diocesan officers are eligible.

There, too, our united offering will be laid upon God's altar. Just a few more months are left to add to that sum, which is offered up to God from all the women of all the churches and mission stations of our own great mother church.

Will the hearts of the women of the Diocese of Georgia prompt them to give freely and fully of both their prayers and their substance?

To us is given the privilege of working with and for our God. Let us see to it that we watch for the opportunities for that service.

We cannot choose
So let Him choose for us,
Worship or service,
As He sees best.

May the blessing of Father and Son come upon us and our work and the guidance of His Holy Spirit be with us in all that is said or done in this, our Eighteenth Annual Meeting.

TREASURER'S REPORT, 1909.

Mrs. Elliott has kindly asked me to say something about systematic giving and to make some suggestions which, if followed by the Branches, would be helpful to the Treasurer in her work.

On the general subject of systematic giving I have no ideas which seem to be new or original. We all know that the only way to accomplish anything, whether it be house-keeping or missionary enterprise, is to have a system and stick to it.

After two years' experience as Treasurer of the Auxiliary, I cannot say that I think the system of the Auxiliary as a whole is either very clear or satisfactory. There are many things that are not understood except by a very few who have taken the pains to study it carefully. I could suggest that the best way to help, not only the Treasurer, but all the officers and the credit of the Auxiliary, will be for every Branch to send in all the pledges early in the Summer, and certainly not later than August 15th.

The financial year of the General Board of Missions closes September 1st., and no money sent in later than that date can be credited on the current year. If Branches do not send their pledges before that date, the Treasurer is obliged to draw on her surplus funds to pay up the balance and keep her credit good.

I would further suggest that we devote at least an hour during this present session to an informal meeting at which the Delegates can all ask questions and discuss various matters which are not clear to many of us. I am sure that it will be time well spent.

I am able to report a surplus of \$123.00 in the treasury at present. Inasmuch as all our pledges are paid and our full apportionment has been met, I would suggest that we could

not do better than to offer a part of this balance for some special work in the Diocese which the Bishop may designate.

We have helped others very generously, and I think we would be justified in doing something more for the work which lies nearer at home.

REPORT OF TREASURER OF UNITED OFFERING.

One of our women writes: "I find it so hard to get our members to give to the United Offering." Others write, "We would like for our offerings to be used for such-and-such objects." And many write nothing.

I am afraid that the work of the Woman's Auxiliary and especially the United Offering is not fully understood by many, although letters and literature on the subject have been spread broadcast. It may be indifference, but I do not like to think so.

I wish it was in the power of the Georgia Branch of the Auxiliary to have a missioner to visit from mission to mission, for I believe if the church and her ways could be made plain to the people we would soon see brighter results; and I trust the day is not far distant when we can raise sufficient means to have some one to do this work.

In October our United Offering will be presented at the Triennial Convention. That means we have but eight more months to work for this cause, and I do hope that everybody is going to get busy and make an effort to double this past year's gifts.

Here let me say something in regard to the mite boxes: I find some opposition to them, which I regret very much. I really and truly think by the use of the boxes one is brought in closer touch with the work. The opening of one's purse and handing out 50 cents or a dollar, as the case may be, seldom carries a prayer with it. Whereas the box suggests a prayer—and, women of the Auxiliary, your prayers are needed as much as your money. Therefore, let me ask you not to lay aside this little reminder out of sight.

Give systematically; give in accordance with your portion. God has a place in His store for any gift that you may render, be it large or small. But don't let your giving be

simply a duty. "Duty is such a hard word," as I once heard some one say. Let it be a joy.

It is not the privilege of every woman to go to the mission field, but it is the blessed privilege of every baptised woman to help spread His kingdom.

"Speed the foot and touch the tongue,
Till on earth by every creature
Glory to the Lamb is sung."

Thy Kingdom come. How many of us are helping to hasten it? That is our privilege. However, "the will of God will be done, but the unspeakable loss to ourselves if we miss our opportunity."

A brilliant writer of the last century said: "Opportunity is a little angel. Some catch him as he goes; some let him pass by forever."

Don't let him pass us. Time is speeding, and soon another angel will be knocking at our door; and, beware, lest he finds us with our work undone.

REPORT OF THE BRANCH OF ISOLATED CHURCH-WOMEN, DIOCESE OF GEORGIA.

At the Annual Meeting in 1909 of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Georgia the Branch of "Isolated Church-women" was formed, so that the women of our communion who live apart from the active life of the Church might be gathered into one smaller fold, and thus become a vital part of the whole.

With this end in view an office was created and a church-woman appointed to fill it, with the hope that the effort made to bring together these children of God may be blessed. The following report will show that a little has been accomplished and that there is much to be done before the purpose is fulfilled.

The first official communication was made with Andersonville through the Postmaster. He was asked to put the writer in touch with a churchwoman living there. The reply came, "No Episcopalians in this vicinity." Next a little town near the Florida border was addressed. The reply came from the Savannah Post Office, "There is no Post Office at that point."

Next cards were sent to Cameron and Collins, but no reply was received.

From Baxley a list of three or four names was given, but no further response has been made. From Cuthbert came the answer that the three churchwomen there needed to expend all of their activity in keeping their church building in good condition, as no help was given them from the Diocese and the calls made upon them were frequent.

Just here it seemed that the "Scattered Branch" were scarcely needed, but an encouraging letter from an earnest church worker in Belfast, Bryan County, gave fresh heart and

hope. She at once became a member of the "Scattered Branch," and her letters are of deep interest, telling of the needs of the mill hands in this remote district, of the reading room she has established for them.

One member prevailed on two others from Lambert to unite with her and came into the fold.

Having heard that Dublin was the home of a small number of church families, a card was sent to that point, but it has so far met with no response.

Baxley and Pooler have both been written to, and are the homes of isolated churchwomen not members of the Scattered Branch.

At the end of the first year ten members are gathered into the one branch and \$9.20 contributed to the United Offering.

President's Report.

I am confident that the "Juniors" must have prayed and studied this year past, for they have given more. Seven hundred and fifty-three (\$753.00) dollars, in round numbers, a little over one hundred and thirty-three (\$133.00) dollars more than the previous year.

Then it seems only just to say that one branch, the Good Shepherd, of Augusta, gave nearly half of this amount, as they contributed to all causes since the last Convention about \$320.00, the Church of the Atonement coming next, with \$102.00. I think we will all feel quite cheered by the addition to our ranks of six new branches, Albany, St. Mark's, Brunswick, Quitman, St. Michael's and St. Paul's, Savannah, and Pineora. The last is our youngest member, but they are at work for a box to be sent at Easter to Saluda, N. C.

We have paid \$103.00 on our apportionment since the last Convention. Unfortunately, we selected two "specials," Holy Trinity Orphanage, Tokio, Japan, and Sister Katherine Scholarship, Guantanomo, Cuba. The money sent to them helps them, but does not count for us. Shall we give them up and select some other objects? That is the question. I am anxious for the Junior leaders to answer. If we do give them up, please every Branch send a special offering to Rev. Oshii at the Holy Trinity Orphanage, Tokio, Japan.

For the coming year let us make Christ more and more the center of all we do and let us live the Christ life. Only by doing this and being like Him can we turn men to Him. Let us pray as we never prayed before, remembering the promise in St. Matthew, 18, 19. And give, reading carefully Malachi III, 8-12. And study the lives of those heroic souls who are on the "firing line" and of those who have been, but are now "forever with the Lord." The motive for missionary work being II Corinthians, V, 14.

Mr. Ellis says: "One of the romantic aspects of Christian history is sending the Gospel back to the lands from which it came. Jerusalem, Antioch and all those other cities so familiar in name to all readers of the New Testament. We send the glad tidings to the heathen and they send back the evidence of the transforming power of Christ.

"The American Church is menaced to-day by a loss of its Christ. There are at work pervasive forces which are insidiously undermining the people's faith in a Divine Redeemer. With beautiful tributes to His noble humanity, teachers in supposedly orthodox schools are taking away from Jesus the crown of his deity. The man of the street eager to be up to date accepts this verdict.

"Right here comes heathendom to the help of Christendom. The churches at home may be uncertain what they believe, but the converts abroad know only the power of a living Christ has redeemed them. The refreshing breeze that wafts back to Christian shores the tidings of the conquests of the Christ also blows away the fogs of indifference and the miasmas of inconsistency. For whoso holds and sends abroad the gospel of a World's Redeemer must himself be true to its precepts. If a man offers this drink as life-giving to his neighbor, how can he without hypocrisy, which stultifies his manhood, live a small, sordid life at home. No man can be representatively a missionary in China and a mere money-grabber in America.

"The present outreach of Christianity into 'the regions beyond' is saving the church at home from the slow atrophy of self-centeredness."

We all remember Mr. Ellis was sent out a year or two ago by the secular press to investigate missions, and he is enthusiastic about the missionary and his work, and he tells the Christian world what missions are doing for **us**.

May God bless us and our work for Him in the coming year.

SECRETARY'S REPORT—BABIES' BRANCH

Woman's Auxiliary, Diocese of Georgia.

Text—"Little children, love one another."

Prayer of the Babies' Branch or "Little Helpers":
"God bless all of the missionaries all over the world, and all
of the Little Helpers; for Jesus' sake." Amen.

The Babies' Branch is intended to introduce our little
ones into their missionary responsibilities at baptism. This
is a Diocesan Society, not a Parish, and the "Little Helpers"
are expected to help the missionary work of the Church with
their prayers and gift of a penny each Sunday.

Six thoughts are emphasized by the Babies' Branch:

First. Consecration of the mother and child.

Second. Every baby by baptism becomes a member of
the Missionary Society of the church.

Third. The first day of the week is the time to lay apart something for the Lord—thus forming the habit in the child's life.

Fourth. This cannot be a Parish Society. It is something broader, teaching practically that the child belongs to the church at large.

Fifth. The gifts are to be devoted to mission work for children.

The sixth idea has already produced beautiful fruit. When the little ones are transplanted to Paradise their work does not cease, but each Sunday a penny is put in the box by the mother or other children, in memory of the little one who has gone before, and a prayer offered for the children of the world.
