

## MINUTES.

---

The Nineteenth Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Georgia was held in the parish house of St. Thomas' Church, Thomasville, Ga., immediately after the opening services of the Convention, May 10, 1911.

Hymn 249 was sung, after which Rev. Mr. Higgins, of St. Thomas' Church, opened the meeting with prayer. He then spoke of the good work done by the Woman's Auxiliary.

Mrs. A. P. Wright, President of the Thomasville Branch, warmly welcomed the Auxiliary.

Mrs. John Cobb, of Americus, responded in a few well chosen words.

The meeting was called to order by the President, Mrs. Elliott.

A motion was made and passed to send a telegram bidding the Auxiliary of Atlanta Godspeed in their work, their session being held in St. Luke's Church, Atlanta, at the same hour.

The roll was called. Nineteen branches of the Auxiliary were represented, besides many visitors.

The annual address was read by the President, and the meeting adjourned after singing the Doxology.

### WEDNESDAY—3 P. M.

The meeting was opened by Rev. Mr. Rich, of Hawkinsville, who, after prayer and saying the Creed, gave an interesting ten minutes talk on Missions.

Mrs. Whitney, the Treasurer, read her report, showing a satisfactory condition of the finances of the Auxiliary.

The report of the United Offering was read by Mrs. Blount, the Treasurer, who made an enthusiastic appeal to the women of the Auxiliary to double their offering for the Triennial Meeting of 1913.

The Junior report was given by Miss Hansell.

The report of Babies' Branch was read by Mrs. S. B. McGlohon. The President spoke of the great importance of the Babies' Branch in its influence over both mother and child,

and urged the formation of a branch in every parish of the Diocese. At present there are only 12 branches in Georgia. It was suggested that next year the number of members in each branch should be reported, as well as the amount contributed.

The report of the Branch of Isolated Churchwomen was read by Mrs. Blount.

A form of prayer to be read at meetings of the Auxiliary was distributed, and the branches urged to use it, so that our scattered churchwomen might realize that they too were one with us in the Master's work and were indeed a part of the Georgia Auxiliary.

The report was read of the work of the Church Periodical Club of Christ Church, Savannah.

The following telegram from Atlanta was received: "Loving greetings for success in our mutual work."

Woman's Auxiliary, by Rosa Woodbury, Sec'y.

A letter was read from Mr. Ishii, of Tokio, Japan, telling of his orphanage for feeble-minded children; some of their work was also exhibited—boxes and flowers made by the children and sold to support the orphanage. The Juniors of Georgia are much interested in Mr. Ishii and his work, and have contributed to it for several years. This work is a special.

The President read a letter from Miss Emery, addressed to the Georgia Auxiliary, urging them to take part in the forward missionary movement of the Church.

With singing of the Doxology the meeting adjourned.

Wednesday at 8:30 p. m. the Auxiliary attended the Missionary meeting of the Convention.

#### THURSDAY—10 A. M.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the Bishop. He then addressed the Auxiliary with words of encouragement. He spoke of the need of a vacation in summer for the clergy, and of the house purchased at Saluda, N. C., for their use, and also of the need of a contingent fund to pay their traveling expenses, and hoped the Auxiliary would continue their interest in and their contributions to the Georgia Missionary's Vacation Fund.

The Bishop spoke with regret of the resignation of the four officers of the Auxiliary, and appointed the following members of the Auxiliary as their successors:

Mrs. D. W. Winn, Vice-President Brunswick Archdeaconry, to succeed Mrs. C. S. Wylly.

Mrs. F. D. Tinsley, Treasurer, to succeed Mrs. G. S. Whitney.

Miss Mary C. Cuthbert, President Juniors, to succeed Miss Hansell.

Mrs. H. E. Backus, President Babies' Branch, to succeed Mrs. McGlohon.

The President then read the condensed reports of the four Archdeaconries from January 1, 1910, to May 1, 1910, amounting to \$1,099.35.

The reports from May 1, 1910, to May 1, 1911, were then read by the Vice-Presidents.

The pledges of the parishes for the coming year were then read and discussed, and amounted to \$373. This sum will pay the Missionary pledges of the Diocese, \$305, leaving \$68 for the expense fund, which is used for the publishing of our annual report, stationery, postage, etc.; that is, all the running expenses of the Auxiliary.

The Auxiliary having thus completed its work of reports for the past year and pledges for the coming year, the President then called for reports of parochial work, explaining that Auxiliary work is missionary work for others, parochial work is what we do for our own Church and parish. While each parish should be active and interested in its own work, none should be so absorbed in their own parish as to neglect the command of our Master to tell of His Gospel both near and far.

The President then urged that each parish in the Diocese should have a branch of the Auxiliary, where the parish is small combine the two as Church Guild and Woman's Auxiliary, having the same officers, perhaps a separate secretary and treasurer, and devote one monthly meeting exclusively to missionary teaching and work. Money is not the principal object of Auxiliary work; prayer and the study of missions come first, and giving to the Lord will follow as a natural

sequence to our learning of and becoming interested in the great missionary work of the Church.

The roll of parishes was then called and each delegate asked to tell of their work, both parochial and auxiliary.

At 12:30 o'clock the meeting adjourned, having received an invitation from the Bishop to come into the Church to hear the Rev. Mr. Tyson, of Sewanee, speak of the University of the South, "the school to which the women of the Diocese of Georgia should send their sons to be educated."

#### THURSDAY—3 P. M.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the President.

It was moved and seconded that a rising vote of thanks by the Auxiliary be given to Mrs. G. S. Whitney for her faithfulness and interest in her work as Treasurer for the past three years.

The roll was called and reports of parishes were continued.

An earnest and enthusiastic report was read by Mrs. J. P. Stewart, delegate from the recently organized branch of Grace Church, Waycross.

Mrs. Whitney moved that a vote of thanks be tendered both the Auxiliary and citizens of Thomasville for their kindness and hospitality.

The President spoke a few earnest words of love, service, sacrifice—love being the motive of all Auxiliary work, service springing from that love and self-sacrifice being the result of both love and service.

The meeting closed with prayer and the singing of the Doxology.

## PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

---

Sixteen months ago we met in midwinter, today we meet in May once more. We have returned to the month that was chosen by our forefathers to tell of what God had done for them during the past year and together to plan for the future.

We are all glad of the change. Our Diocesan year and reports will now correspond more nearly with the Church year, and thus make the work of your Diocesan officers much lighter, and the rendering of the reports much less confusing to the parish branches.

We are auxiliary to the Board of Missions, which is the controlling power of all of the mission work of the Church, both at home and abroad, and our first duty is to that board; to uphold their hands by contributing to the organized work of the Church. This we can do by our appropriations, all of our pledges, except the one for our own Georgia Missionary's Vacation Fund, are a part of the appropriation.

Look how wide the field of work to which we contribute through our pledges—not only Georgia, but also to Alaska, China and Japan.

To Alaska in memory of our beloved leader, Mrs. F. H. Miller—Alaska, that land of ice and snow, with its intrepid Bishop, who commands the love and respect of all with whom he comes in contact, the gold-seeking miner, the Indian, the Eskimo, his work, and our work reaches them all.

Then our scholarships in China, that land of vast opportunities, whose teeming millions are beginning to hold out their hands to us, to ask for knowledge of the true God, and for Western education.

In Japan, our Bible woman carries the word of God to our Japanese sisters, so ready and so glad to receive it.

Next in importance is our United Offering, so close to the heart of every woman—woman working for her sister woman, who is doing for each one of us our work in the field. By this offering we train, we support, we care for in sickness and old age, the woman who is our substitute in that portion of the Master's vineyard.

Last of all come our specials, and these have been called "the luxury of giving," for in a special we can be influenced by our feelings, choose as our object whatever appeals most to our sympathy or our interest, or shall I say our knowledge, for what we know most about generally appeals most strongly to us.

The apportionment for the Auxiliary of Georgia is \$600, including Babies and Juniors, for the year ending May 1, 1910, we sent on to the Mission House \$638.81; of this amount the women sent on \$466.85, when we had only pledged \$400, a record for which we are all very thankful.

It was a great disappointment to find that at our Triennial Meeting in Cincinnati there were only three representatives of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Georgia—the wife of your Bishop, Mrs. W. K. Miller, of Augusta, and myself.

I have not words to express how much you missed in not going to that meeting, and three years hence, when we have gathered together again to place on God's altar the offering of grateful hearts and raise our voices in praise and in thanksgiving, that He will accept our service—then, I trust, the Auxiliary of Georgia will have many delegates to join in those services and to enjoy the many meetings where women talk to women of their work and of the manner of carrying on that work.

I regret to state that during the past year four of your Diocesan officers have resigned. The Bishop will appoint their successors at our meeting tomorrow morning. I bespeak for your new officers your hearty co-operation.

As a general thing I have found that the women of our Diocese are afraid of responsibility. They do not remember that the promise is "As thy day, so shall thy strength be." The strength, the power, the ability to do God's work does not come to us until the time we need it to do His work, and then if we place ourselves at His disposal and are ready to undertake for Him in confident faith that He will work through us, and should we commence that work resting only on Him, the strength will be given us to do all that He calls on us to do.

"What I ought to do, by the grace of God I will do," should be the keynote of our Auxiliary work. Personal work, the effort of the individual, was the means employed by the Master to build up His Church, and each one of us should realize our individual responsibility. The one purpose for which Christ founded His Church, the one thing which is the supreme desire of His heart as He sits at His Father's right hand, is that that Church should carry His message—His message of free salvation to all the world, and that is the end and aim of all Auxiliary work—that the prayer of the Master may be speedily answered.

At one of our meetings in Cincinnati the following words were given to us, and they found a responsive echo in every woman's heart. I give them to you, to each member of the Auxiliary of Georgia, to carry home with you, to carry them in your hearts and your lives and to pass them on to others:

I am only one,  
But I am one.  
I cannot do everything,  
But I can do something.  
What I can do  
I ought to do,  
And what I ought to do  
By the grace of God  
I will do.

**\$836 Amount of Triennial Offering.**

I hope that you feel the same gratification in the results of our three years' work that I do. A few months before the General Convention the Bishop suggested that we should raise our offering to \$800. I wrote to all the branches of the Auxiliary urging them to reach that point, and with few exceptions all responded beautifully. And while our offering of \$836 was a joy, I am not willing to stop at that, but am looking forward to double that amount to present at the next Triennial Convention. Knowing the strength of our outposts, I know we shall raise it.

Let me tell you my plan, and I think you will agree with me that it can be easily accomplished. Let every branch appoint a local custodian, and let her ask not only the members of the Auxiliary, but every baptized woman in her parish or mission to take a mite box. If each one would give a dollar annually, think of the result. It could be divided into weekly portions, and the passing of it would never be felt from our purse. However, if something has to be given up to render this gift, nothing is lost by sacrifice, but everything is lost by failure to obey God's call. And the call that has been wafted down the shores of time is "Go ye into the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

You and I may not go, but we can with our prayers and by sparing a portion of that which God has given us, help some one else to bear the message.

The years are fleeting by. Soon our life's work will be done, and while time is ours, let us not be unresponsive to the call.

### OPENING SERVICE.

At noon May 8th, 1912, the twentieth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Georgia was opened with prayer by the Rev. Mr. Dakin, of St. John's Church, Savannah. He welcomed the Auxiliary to both parish and city, in a few earnest words and bade them God speed in their work for Missions.

Ten junior branches were represented, also five from the Babies Branch and two from the Scattered Churchwomen, besides many visitors.

### Reports.

The President read her annual address, stressing specially the point, that our Auxiliary work requires of our best, and that in our religious life, we owe to our God, and to our own souls, to be ever diligent and watchful for an opportunity to fit ourselves for better service.

Mrs. Tinsley, the Diocesan Treasurer, read her annual report showing that \$388.51 had been paid in by the different Branches. Of this, \$305.00 paid our four annual Diocesan pledges; \$50.00 paid for the printing of the

annual report of 1911; \$13.50 was sent on to General Missions, as directed by the donors; \$2.00 returned to Thomasville for the Beckwith Scholarship, leaving balance on hand of \$18.01.

The report of the United offering was given by Mrs. Blount, Treasurer, who reported \$350 14 received during the year, which added to amount reported May, 1911 gives cash on hand May, 1912 \$495.57. The Triennial offering is to be made October, 1913. Mrs. Blount urged therefore that the Auxiliary of Georgia should rouse themselves to renewed interest and effort so that the offering of 1913 should double that of 1910.

Miss Cuthbert, President of the Junior Auxiliary, read her annual report showing that \$895.40 had been contributed to Missions by the Juniors during the past year.

Mrs. Baskus, President of the Babies Branch, reported that during the past year \$109.92 had been given by the Babies, all of which was forwarded for work for children in various parts of the Mission field. Who can doubt but that God's blessing will go with this offering from Babies.

"I am but a penny  
From a baby's hand,  
Can I bear glad tidings  
Over all the land?  
Baby's love goes with me  
So I know I'm blest  
God's love joined with baby's  
Will do all the rest."

A letter was read from Miss Emery regretting that she could not accept the invitation of the Georgia Branch to be present at their annual meeting, and another letter urging renewed interest in and larger contributions to "The Foreign Missionaries Insurance Fund."

Mrs. George Denny, Librarian of the Church Periodical Club, gave her report, showing many magazines collected and forwarded during the year and others sent regularly by subscribers to Missionaries in Georgia.

Meeting adjourned with singing of Doxology.

#### Thursday, May 9.

Thursday, May 9th, at 10 A. M the Auxiliary again assembled in St. John's parish hall.

The meeting was opened with prayer and an earnest talk on Mis-

sions by the Rev. Mr. Rich, of St. Luke's, Hawkinsville, he urged all mothers present to train their sons for the ministry, to sow good seed and not be discouraged, even if they saw no immediate results.

Bishop Reese then addressed the meeting, thanked the Auxiliary for their help during the past year by the Missionary Vacation Fund, and by sending of boxes in the Diocese. The Bishop said that hereafter the Diocesan officers of the Auxiliary should be elected at each annual meeting, and not appointed by the Bishop as heretofore. By request, he appointed the officers this year, but notified the Auxiliary to be ready for an election in May, 1913. The Bishop reappointed the same officers for the ensuing year.

Miss Neely spoke most interestingly of her work in Japan, where she had been for fourteen years, being the first Missionary sent out by the United Offering.

#### The Diocesan Pledges.

The five Diocesan Pledges were then taken up.

1st. The Japanese Biblewoman, Miss Neely spoke of the work of the biblewomen and the necessity of a native helper.

2nd. Bishop Nelson Scholarship, St. Hilda's School, Wuchang, China A photograph of a girl, educated at St. Hilda's School, with her husband and baby, was then passed around for all to see, and a letter from her husband, Rev. Reuben Nieh, was read by Miss Shotter.

3d. The Julia K. Miller Memorial, for Hospital work in Alaska. Mrs. Kingman gave an interesting account of some of the Missionaries she met during the past summer which she spent in Alaska. She also read letters from Bishop Rowe, urging the women of the Auxiliary to use their influence to secure national aid, medical and otherwise for the Alaska Indians.

4th. The Georgia Missionary's Vacation Fund. Mrs. Reese told of the necessity of such a fund and of the benefits of the Clergy House, at Salluda.

5th. The Expense Fund. Miss Johnson told of when the fund was

started and why it was needed

An invitation to lunch was extended to the Auxiliary by the ladies of St. John's Parish.

The meeting adjourned with the singing of the doxology.

Thursday, May 9th, 3 P. M. The meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. Mr. Holbrook, of the Church of the Atonement, Augusta, who spoke of the increasing interest in Missions as manifested by the men of the country, and urged the Auxiliary to do all in their power to forward the Missionary work.

A letter was read from Mrs. Loaring Clark, Secretary to the Auxiliary of the Department of Sewanee (Fourth Department)—It was voted to pledge \$5.00 as requested for the expenses of the Auxiliary of the Department.

The following delegates were elected to the meeting to be held in Charlotte, N. C next fall: Mrs. W. H. Elliott, Savannah; Mrs. F. F. Reese, Savannah; Mrs. John Hayler, Augusta; Miss Mary C. Cuthbert, Augusta

These delegates were authorized to select their own alternates if they could not attend.

It was decided by a unanimous vote that only a condensed report should be published this year, to save the expense of a full report.

The question of the time of the annual meeting was fully discussed, and it was voted to go back to the old custom and meet the day before the Diocesan Convention so that the members of the Auxiliary might be free to attend the sessions of the Convention.

#### Archdeaconry Reports.

Archdeaconry reports were called for. Mrs. Wright, Vice-Pres., Albany Archdeaconry, reported \$1,127.70 contributed to Missions from May 1st, 1911 to May 1st, 1812.

Pledged for the coming year \$83.00. Mrs. Phinizy, Vice-Pres., Augusta, reported \$1,080.86 contributed during the past year. \$81.50 pledged for the coming year.

Mrs. Winn, Vice-Pres., Brunswick, reported \$197.35 contributed during the past year. \$89.00 pledged for the coming year.

Miss Johnson, Vice-Pres., Savannah, reported \$1,020.04 contributed during the past year. \$143.00 pledged for the coming year.

After receiving reports from the Parishes and a few closing words

from the President, the meeting adjourned with prayer and the doxology.

In writing the report of the scattered branch of the Woman's Auxiliary in this Diocese, the fitting text seems to be "By whom shall Jacob arise? for he is small." Last year the number of members was twelve; this year it is eight. In Brewton there are two earnest workers, there is one member in Thomson, one in Hinesville, one in Moultrie, one in Belfast, one in Jefferson and one in Vidalia. To each of these, Church missionary literature has been sent each month since the early autumn. There are nearly one hundred and fifty isolated churchwomen in small towns and villages in the Diocese. In a few cases one is found in a position of trust in some denominational school of the State, which is strong in numbers and influence, and which will absorb many of the baptized children of the Church, who are attracted by educational advantages and the natural desire for fellowship with their young companions. So far as can be ascertained, these are the conditions now among the scattered children of the Church, and it is earnestly desired that some means be suggested by which their love and loyalty will bring forth fruit abundantly. Then the slogan will be "a little one has become a thousand." Amen!

THE UNITED OFFERING OF 1913.

At the conference of Diocesan officers held in Cincinnati October 8th, the question of the object for the United Offering of 1913 was one of the most important matters to be decided. After careful consideration, the resolution offered by the committee appointed by the conference was unanimously adopted. It is as follows:

Resolved, That the United Thank Offering of 1913 be given to the Board of Missions for Woman's Work in the Mission field, including the training, testing, sending and support of woman workers; also the care of such workers when sick or disabled; but that a sum not exceeding \$20,000 be devoted to buildings for the use of women workers, approved by the Board of Missions on the recommendation of the General Secretary and the Secretary of the Woman's Auxiliary.

Also, that to our united gifts there shall be added our united and earnest prayers that God will put it into the hearts of many faithful women to give themselves to the work of the Master in the Mission field, or, if they cannot go themselves, to give of their substance gladly as the Lord hath prospered them.
