MINUTES.

The Twenty-first Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held in the Sunday-school room of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Augusta, Georgia, on May 13th, 1913, immediately after the corporate communion in the church.

Rev. Mr. Johnson welcomed the delegates to Augusta and then Bishop Reese spoke to the Auxiliary. He spoke of the Clergy Vacation House at Saluda, N. C., and of the benefit that it is to the clergy. He suggested more work for the Auxiliary in furnishing vestments and altar linen, etc., where money is lacking to buy them, and he also spoke of the money needed to buy land for churches or to repair buildings.

Rev. Mr. Winn gave a short talk urging the women of the Auxiliary to influence more boys to study for the ministry. A rising vote of thanks was given to the clergy for their addresses.

The roll was called, and sixteen branches were represented with twenty-nine delegates and many out-of-town visitors.

Mrs. Elliott read the annual address. A committee was appointed for the nomination of officers consisting of Mrs. Reese, Mrs. Whitney, Mrs. Tift and Mrs. Young.

Resignations were handed in from Mrs. Wright, president of the Albany Archdeaconry, and from Mrs. Tinsley, treasurer of diocese.

Mrs. Haskell of South Carolina brought greetings from that state, and invited the Auxiliary to their meeting in Aiken this week.

Mrs. H. H. McKee spoke for more interest in the Clergy House at Saluda, and spoke of the contributions needed.

Miss Lindley of the Church Missions House in New York gave a most interesting talk about the use of the Bible as a text-book for mission study. She took up the Book of Matthew, chapter by chapter, and explained how each could be used as the basis of study.

The meeting adjourned after the singing of the Doxology.

TUESDAY—4 P. M.

The afternoon meeting opened at four o'clock with prayer by the Bishop. The roll was called of the delegates to the Junior Auxiliary, with sixteen present. A very interesting report of the work of the Juniors was read by Miss Frances McCoy for Miss Cuthbert, who could not be present.

Miss Pond read a most encouraging report from the United Offering.

The president read a letter from Mr. George Gordon King the treasurer, urging the members to more earnest faith and work.

Miss Lindley then spoke to the Juniors on the work of the Auxiliary. She said how much depends on the young people of today and how much they should be able to do in this wonderful age they are living in. They should have joy as their watchword for that is what missions really means, a bringing of joy to others. The work must have a motive, and there must be a definite aim to get the best results. Miss Lindley spoke of the conference at Black Mountain, North Carolina, in June and urged those who could, to attend.

It was moved that a rising vote of thanks be given to Miss Lindley for her inspiring talk, which was done.

The report of the Branch of Scattered Churchwomen was read by Miss Johnson, in the illness of the president, Mrs. Young.

A letter was read from the Bishop thanking the Auxiliary for the one hundred dollars paid to the Clergy Vacation Fund.

A letter was also read from Miss Julia C. Emory, secretary of the Church Mission House, reviewing the work of the past three years, and urging the formation of more branches. She also recommended a corporate communion on some especial day for every branch in the country.

A report by Mrs. Backus, president of the Babies' Branch of the Auxiliary, was read, telling of the money contributed and urging the members to take a greater interest, and to try to form more branches.

The meeting adjourned after the singing of the Doxology.

WEDNESDAY, 11:30 A. M.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. Mr. Whitney.

The secreary read the minutes of the Tuesday's meetings. The roll was called and three more branches were represented. The roll was also called of officers of the Babies' Branch.

Mrs. Reese read the treasurer's report in the absence of Mrs. Tinsley, which was accepted and a rising vote of thanks was given to Mrs. Tinsley as retiring treasurer.

The reports of the several arch deaconries was read by their respective vice-presidents.

The president spoke of the lending library at the Church Mission House in New York, for the use of any parish by simply paying the postage on books, both ways.

A rising vote of thanks was given to Mrs. C. H. Phinizy for the invitation to the reception at St. Paul's Church on Wednesday, and also to the Church of the Good Shepherd for the invitation to lunch on Thursday.

The president spoke of two letters asking the Auxiliary to undertake scholarships, one from Miss Horner at the Valle Crucis School, and the other from Mr. Betticher, at Alaska. At present it is financially impossible to undertake either one.

The giving of altar linen to poor churches in the diocese was next discussed, and it was voted that the president distribute the work among the Altar Guilds.

A committee was appointed to confer with Mrs. McKee about the needs of the Clergy Rest House at Saluda, consisting of Mrs. Reese, Mrs. J. E. Young, and Mrs. C. H. Phinizy.

Four Auxiliaries including one Junior branch subscribed five dollars each toward the money needed.

Mrs. W. H. Elliott was re-elected president and Mrs. Edward C. Blount, treasurer of United Offering; Mrs. D. W. Winn was elected vice-president of the Brunswick Archdeaconry; Mrs. C. H. Phinizy of the Augusta Archdeaconry, Miss A. C. Johnson of the Savannah Archdeaconry, and Mrs. Carol Graham of the Albany Archdeaconry; Mrs. Frank E. Harold, educational secretary; Miss Mary Cuthbert was re-elected

president of the Junior Auxiliary, and Mrs. H. E. Backus of the Babies' Branch. The president spoke of the need for a secretary on Spirit of Missions, and on the boxes, and she was asked to appoint them.

The following were appointed delegates to the New York Conference in October: Mrs. Reese, Mrs. Elliott, Miss A. C. Johnson, Mrs. E. C. Blount, and Miss Mary Cuthbert from the Juniors. Mrs. G. S. Whitney of Augusta, Mrs. J. P. Stewart of Waycross, Mrs. J. S. Wright of Brunswick and Mrs. Carol Graham of Bainbridge were appointed alternates, and Miss Gertrude J. Comey, alternate from the Juniors.

It was decided to let each branch discuss the best day for Corporate Communion for auxiliaries all over the country, and then notify Mrs. Elliott as to their decision and the one most favored would be the choice of this diocese.

A rising vote of thanks was given to the Church of the Good Shepherd for their kind hospitality.

After a few earnest words of encouragement and hopefulness from the president, and the reading of a beautiful hymn the meeting adjourned with the singing of the Doxology.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

This is our twenty-first annual meeting to which we gather this morning. For twenty-one years we have met and worked together. In twenty-one years men are supposed to attain their majority, and are ready to enter upon the full round of their life's privileges and duties.

What about the Auxiliary of Georgia? Have we grown up to the full measure of our privileges and duties? It is a solemn question. What about our prayers? What about our gifts? What of our studies? What of our interest in influencing others in the work of His Kingdom? Let each one of us answer these questions to our own souls, and ask God to give us the guidance and help of His Holy Spirit, so that when each one returns to their own home and parish such an increase of love and enthusiasm may go with us, that they too who have not been able to meet with us this morning, may be roused to new efforts and new interests and a closer walk with their Lord and Master. Let the incense of praise and adoration and love rise from our hearts to the very footstool of our God, and do we on our knees wait for His Holy Spirit to come from above and rest upon us and our work.

Strength and holy zeal, thus acquired, is the birthright of every Christian. See to it that each one of us lay hold on the strength promised to those who ask for it, and in that strength go forward in our Auxiliary work. Jesus Christ, the sent, is the sender of others, and every one is sent of Him, not only to go himself, but to send others besides.

Just as our Lord sent the Apostles to Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria and to the uttermost parts of the earth, so He sends us to do His work, His missionary work in our family, our parish, our diocese, our country and the whole world.

As workers in the Auxiliary we must bear in mind that the work of the Master requires of our best, requires mental cultivation and concentration, along with business accuracy and modern methods. These all should be brought to bear on our work. We all realize that to keep up with the daily

current of life and literature, needs constant effort and study, so in our religious life and work we owe to our God and our own souls to be ever diligent and watchful for an opportunity to fit ourselves for better service.

There is no better training for work, or no greater spur to our enthusiasm, than the many meetings now held by the Auxiliary, and I trust that whenever possible Georgia will be represented at these gatherings.

In October of this year the Triennial meeting of both Church and Auxiliary will be held in the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York and we must at this meeting elect delegates and alternates to represent Georgia. It will be a privilege to go and worship with that vast throng, and then too, to join in laying on the altar the woman's offering of praise and thanksgiving, to send our substitute to do our work in the mission field.

Will Georgia's offering be a worthy one? Have we done what we could? At present our united offering supports less than one-half of the women missionaries.

Remember, God looks not on what we give, but what we withhold; on what we have left from our gift. There are still four months in which we can give of our money and our prayers for the United Offering of 1913.

A new duty is laid upon the Auxiliary this year. The Bishop decides that you will have to elect your own officers. The choice of leaders is no light or easy task and must be entered upon with many prayers for guidance, and a calm, clear judgment; putting aside all personal preference and choosing those who best can lead and influence the Auxiliary, as well as all churchwomen who have not hitherto worked with us.

The Auxiliary of Georgia needs more Diocesan officers; we have only nine; most dioceses have from twelve to fifteen. We certainly need three more—an Educational Secretary, a Secretary for the Spirit of Missions, and a Secretary for Boxes. With these new officers (who I trust will enter on their duties with zeal and enthusiasm as well as an earnest study of their new duties), I think the Auxiliary of Georgia will wake up to a new interest in the spread of the Master's Kingdom. I do

not think through the past year that the course of study on Japan, recommended by the Board, has been followed as closely as it should be, and I trust that next year we will all study about China, that most interesting of all nations. Many of the books are already published, and can be gotten from the Educational Secretary at a very low cost. A little reading, done through the summer months, will add much to the interest of our study classes and meetings next year.

I believe that in all Christian work, more especially missionary work, the encouragement of united prayer and united effort will do more to help us move onward than any other one thing.

Then let each Branch meet as often as possible, and where it is practicable, let parish meet with parish, and together discuss methods and objects of work and join in united praise and prayer, as well as offering of gifts to our Lord and Master and perhaps—no **surely**—some of the joy of service, the realization of Heaven, will come into our hearts and lives.

We must live each day at our ^{very} best.

The work of the world is done by few;
God means that a part be done by **you**.

Have a purpose and do with your utmost might—
You will finish your work on the other side
When you walk in His likeness satisfied.

To the President and Members of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Georgia:

It is with great regret that I have to report no gain in numbers or interest in the Branch of Scattered Church-women.

There is abundant material upon which to work, but nothing can be accomplished except by an earnest, able missionary or deaconess who will give themselves, body, soul and spirit to the work of awakening love for the Church among those who have been so long without her fostering care that they are scarcely Churchwomen save in name.

In many of the small towns one, two or three are found who if any reply is given by them to an intended inquirer say, "We are willing to do what we can for the Church but so far all effort is useless."

In some cases these women have joined in Christian work with other bodies because the prospect of any harvest in their special field is so hopeless.

It is surely a sad and depressing state of things to contemplate. How shall it be met? By the persistent loving efforts of a capable, earnest missionary who can give his or her life to the work of visiting from point to point instructing the scattered children of the Church in her doctrine, discipline and worship.
