Many officers of the Auxiliary and other visitors were present at the meetings.

MINUTES.

The Twenty-third Annual Meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary was held on May 18th, 1915, in the Sunday-School room of Christ Church, Savannah, Ga., immediately after the corporate communion in the church.

Mrs. Elliott presided. The meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. Mr. Whitney.

Mrs. Elliott and Mrs. McIver welcomed the delegates, and the response was given by Mrs. Young of Brunswick.

Bishop Reese then addressed the meeting, saying he would add to his address just given in the church by speaking more of practical details. He thanked the Auxiliary for the \$100 for the Vacation Fund; the \$100 for the Missionary Traveling Fund; told how he had used the money and the good it had done.

He spoke of the need of a Traveling Diocesan Missionary and presented three other subjects: Adding a bathroom to the clergy rest-house at Saluda; the building fund for a church at Blakely, and money for repairs on the church at McRae, which had been damaged by a cyclone. He urged the giving of individual donations, and while thanking the Auxiliary for the help given in the past, urged them not to rest content, as increase of work means increase of interest.

The roll was called. The combined roll calls of this and the following day showed seventeen branches, represented by twenty-four delegates; five junior branches, by six delegates, and four branches of the Little Helpers, represented by five delegates. There were also present many members of various branches.

The meeting then stood while Mrs. Elliott announced the death of Mrs. George G. MacWhorter, Secretary and Treasurer for the Church of The Good Shepherd, The Hill, Augusta, and spoke of her devotion to that and other parts of the Auxiliary work. Miss Johnson, Mrs. Blount and Mrs. Miller were appointed a committee to draft resolutions of appreciation and regret.

Mrs. L. G. Young, Secretary of the branch of Scattered Church Women, being ill, the secretary was instructed to express to her the regrets and sympathy of the meeting.

A letter was read from the Auxiliary of the Diocese of California, offering hospitality and assistance to those of the Georgia Auxiliary who should go to the Panama Exposition. The secretary was instructed to acknowledge it with thanks.

Mrs. Elliott appointed the Nominating Committee: Chairman, Mrs. J. E. Young; Miss Stark, Mrs. Davidson, Mrs. Reese.

The resignations of Mrs. T. M. Hazlehurst, Diocesan Treasurer, and Mrs. Frank Harrold, Diocesan Educational Secretary, were presented and accepted with regrets. Mrs. Elliott, the President, resigned; said she had served for seven years and was not a candidate for re-election. Mrs. Elliott read her annual report.

Mrs. Blount, Treasurer of the United Offering, read her report and then spoke. She stated that the sum, so far, is not as large as it should be; advised the appointing of local custodians; urged that we should not fall behind but press forward, and said: "A great necessity is a great opportunity."

Miss Mary C. Cuthbert, President of the Junior Auxiliary, read her report and spoke of the work.

Deaconess Boorman then addressed the meeting and gave an interesting account of the Boys' Home in Augusta, of which she has charge. It was founded by the Rev. Mr. Williams, not only to care for boys, but with the hope that boys trained there would help raise the moral and religious standards of the mill district in which the home is situated.

Miss E. M. Johnston, President of the Parish Aid Society of Christ Church, invited the officers and delegates to luncheon.

Mrs. Elliott read a note from the manager of the Savannah Hotel, asking the delegates to avail themselves of use of the parlors and rest rooms of the hotel.

The meeting was adjourned until 3:00 o'clock, after prayer and singing of the Doxology.

TUESDAY, 3:00 P. M.

The afternoon meeting was opened at three o'clock with prayer by Mrs. Elliott.

Mrs. Backus, President of The Little Helpers, read her annual report. Miss Beaufort of Augusta, spoke of the work and urged it, not only for the good accomplished by the gifts, but especially because it trained the children to an interest in church work and developed them spiritually. In this connection she spoke of the responsibilities of parents and leaders.

Mrs. Robinson, Diocesan Secretary of Boxes, read her annual report. She urged the reporting of all boxes sent, and also the accepting of those assigned from headquarters in the Church Missions House. The latter point was discussed, some branches preferring to answer direct appeals.

Miss Cuthbert, delegate to the Primary Synod of the Province of Sewanee, held at New Orleans, Nov. 17th, 18th and 19th, 1914, gave a full and interesting account of the meeting. She spoke of the conferences, the business side and the personnel of the sessions.

A letter from the Secretary of the Province of Sewanee was read, advocating the appointment of a Traveling Educational Secretary, to be supported by contributions from each of the Dioceses. He asked that the delegates to the next Synod come instructed on the question. After some discussion, Mrs. Young moved to lay the question on the table until after the Archdeaconry reports with pledges were made. This was seconded and carried.

The report of Mrs. Harrold, the Educational Secretary, was read by the secretary. Mrs. Elliott said she had hoped Mrs. Harrold could be present to address the meeting.

Mrs. Elliott urged the increase of the list of subscribers to The Spirit of Missions, and said she would ask the Nominating Committee to nominate a secretary for the work.

It was voted to continue the session instead of adjourning at five o'clock, the fixed hour.

The Treasurer's report was read and received. It showed an overplus on pledges of \$52.50. Mrs. Elliott suggested we should designate an object to which it should be given. Various suggestions were made for Diocesan, domestic and foreign causes. It was voted to have a scholarship in St. Mary's Hall, China. Discussion of name was postponed.

After prayer and the singing of the Doxology the meeting was adjourned.

WEDNESDAY, 11:30 A. M.

Mrs. Elliott opened the meeting with prayer.

There were no minutes. The roll was called.

The time and place of future meetings, unfinished business from the last annual meeting was discussed. Miss A. C. Johnson moved that "Hereafter these meetings be held at a different time and place from the convention." Seconded and carried.

Mrs. Blount moved that "These meetings be held in the fall." Seconded and carried. It was voted the next meeting should be held in November. It was voted that officers elected at this present meeting should hold office until November, 1916.

The support of the proposed Traveling Secretary was discussed. Miss M. C. Cuthbert, Mrs. Reese, Mrs. Blount and Mrs. Elliott were elected delegates to the Synod and instructed that the Auxiliary of Georgia consider it inexpedient at this time to employ a Traveling Secretary.

A delayed telegram of greeting and good wishes was received from Mrs. Y. C. Rust, our absent vice-president. The secretary was instructed to acknowledge it.

The Archdeaconry reports were read.

It was voted to name the scholarship at St. Mary's Hall, "The Bishop F. F. Reese Scholarship."

The meeting stood to hear the resolution of the committee on the death of Mrs. MacWhorter. It was voted they should be spread on the minutes and a copy sent to the family.

Miss Cuthbert, President of the Junior Auxiliary extended an invitation to the annual meeting to be held in St. Paul's Church in the afternoon.

Mrs. Young brought a request from the Nominating Committee to Mrs. Elliott to allow her name to be used. This was urged by the meeting and Mrs. Elliott consented.

A rising vote of thanks was given for the hospitality of Christ Church. The meeting was adjourned until three o'clock.

AFTERNOON, 3:00 P. M.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. Mr. Whitney.

Mrs. W. K. Miller was nominated from the floor for Vice-President but withdrew her name.

Miss Norma C. Palmer was nominated from the floor for Secretary for The Spirit of Missions. This, and the nominations of the committee were voted on name by name, and all unanimously elected.

A vote of thanks to Mrs. Hazlehurst for her services as treasurer and regrets for her resignation was passed.

A vote of thanks was passed for the luncheons provided by the Parish Aid Society of Christ Church.

*Mrs. Lamar declined to serve. The Bishop appointed Mrs. J. K. McIver Treasurer.

It was voted to send to the convention a report of the work done during the year.

It was voted each parish branch should meet as soon as possible, consider all business requiring immediate action and report to Mrs. Elliott by June 15th.

Mrs. Alfred Chisolm was appointed treasurer for the improvement on the Clergy Rest House at Saluda. The delegates to bring the subject before their home branches immediately.

The invitation to meet next at St. Mark's, Brunswick, was accepted by a rising vote of thanks.

A vote of thanks to Mrs. Elliott for reconsidering and for all she has done for the Auxiliary was passed.

After prayer and the singing of the Doxology the meeting was adjourned.

THURSDAY, 12:00 M.

A special meeting was held today at noon, which was opened with prayer by Mrs. Elliott.

The action taken fixing the date of the next meeting in November was rescinded.

It was voted it was expedient the next meeting should be held the day before the convention, as that is also to meet at St. Mark's, Brunswick.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

The Twenty-third Anniversary of the Auxiliary of Georgia finds us gathered in the Mother Church of our Diocese.

Where we stand, John Wesley stood—on this very spot the first services of the Church of England in Georgia were held. From then to this present time this ground has been consecrated to the worship of our God.

From generation to generation has the voice of praise and thanksgiving risen to the throne of the Most High from where we are now assembled—shall we not claim the promise that continued, earnest prayer shall be answered?

John Wesley came to this country as a missionary to the Indians, so a missionary first served our church in Georgia. With such a beginning, should not our Diocese be filled with missionary zeal to pass on to others that gospel that John Wesley crossed the waters to bring to the Indians—heathen here in Georgia—in those days Georgia was a foreign mission field.

At the Synod of the Province of Sewanee, held in New Orleans last November, the names of all the missionaries from this department, now in the field, were read aloud and not one of them, not even one, of the sixteen hailed from Georgia.

This should not be; can not we as a united Auxiliary, through the coming year, at every meeting, pray God to raise up from among us workers for His mission fields, where the harvest is so white—where so many souls are waiting to be bid to come in?

Women of the Auxiliary, pray, pray God's spirit to manifest itself among us, so that many will make the offering of their lives to the Master and be ready to carry His name and His message even to the uttermost parts of the earth.

The past year has not been marked by any special event in the life of our Auxiliary; I think there has been a quiet but steady growth in both interest and methods—the giving has been more systematic; the pledges have been

more promptly paid, and your Treasurer's report will show that while all obligations have been met, there is still a balance in the bank.

But we of the Auxiliary of the Diocese of Georgia are very much behind in our educational methods—we should wake up to the fact that mission study, that is, mission study with up-to-date methods, is the only way of educating the women of the Auxiliary so that they will be fitted for leaders, fitted to pass on to others the knowledge of and the love for missions that is slumbering in their hearts.

It matters not how many years we may have numbered, we must go on learning, studying God's will and God's service, until we pass on to the better land, to continue there that service only begun in our Auxiliary work here.

How many of our members have attended a summer school or conference? I urge each one of you, if possible, to go to one or more of these institutes—there can be no better opportunity for broadening one's views of the mission field—no better way of realizing one's own responsibility in mission work, and of all others it is the place to find out how close Christians should draw together in the service of the Master—the place to bring home to us that the Christ came into the world to save all men and that we, individually, must do our share of that work.

Women of the Auxiliary, fit yourselves for His service, for His work needs special training, just as much as all of the many specialties of our time.

Training for each member of the Auxiliary, so that she can do her part, for the responsibility of the work and the meetings should be shared by each individual member; each one should give as God has given to her, not only of money, but of brains, of time and of study—or, as another has expressed it: "The duty of each member of the Auxiliary is to pray, to study, to give—the last is the result of the first two, for surely we cannot pray to God for the spread of His Kingdom, if we are not willing to give to it, and we can neither pray nor give of our means intelligently, without we know, and how can knowledge come to us

except through study, and so the threefold chain of prayer, and study and giving forms the basis of our Auxiliary life."

In a recent visit to the Church Missions House in New York, I was told that the following qualities were considered necessary in all women who desired to be workers in the field. Consecration, common sense, adaptability, enthusiasm, sympathy, tact, cheerfulness. Do we possess these? Let us cultivate them, they are all to be desired in our daily work for the Master, quite as much as in the field.

We can report our financial and box work, our growth in numbers and our meetings, but our prayers, our spiritual growth, our increased knowledge of missions, are known only to God and ourselves, but they will surely tell on our lives, on our personal influence over others and in the increased interest in missions in our Auxiliary and our parish. We must each one try to realize, and influence others to realize that our parish is not a field, but a force—a force that should band itself together for the spread of Christ's Kingdom.

We are responsible to God for our capabilities and powers, whether we are conscious of them or not, whether we use them or not. He has given to each one certain gifts whether we know it or not. Whether we wish it or not, God requires of us, that we use those gifts in His service. Beware, that you do not let any opportunity pass—that you do not too easily say: "I cannot do it, I am not capable of it." Examine yourselves, pray for knowledge of your powers, and then strong in the strength that the Master gives—the strength that can only be gained by prayer—rise up in humble faith in His power to work through you and take up the task that seemed so far beyond your capabilities, and you will find that He is with you and that He enables you to do all things through Him. Hold yourselves in readiness, watch for the leading of the Spirit, listen for the divine call. The Spirit of God is always present with us, but only manifests itself when it reaches the soul that is ready and waiting to do the will of the Most High.

“Lord I know a work is waiting
For each ransomed child of Thine,
Lo I come, in faith beseeching,
Show me mine.
Whatsoever thou appointest,
Be the service great or small,
Give me grace to rise and do it
At Thy call.”

Let each member of the Auxiliary daily ask: “Lord,
show me my work.”

REPORT OF BOXES SENT OUT BY THE WOMAN'S
AUXILIARY OF THE DIOCESE OF GEORGIA
DURING THE YEAR ENDING MAY 1, 1915.

Up to the present time I have received reports of fifteen boxes sent to the missions from the Woman's Auxiliary of the Diocese of Georgia. Of these boxes, four were sent to LaGrange, Ga., for the Settlement Work under the direction of the Rev. Mr. Philips; two went to Alaska; three to Saluda, N. C.; one to the Belgians; one to Virginia; one to St. Mary's on the mountains, Sewanee, Tenn.; one to Arizona; one to the Boy's Home in Augusta; and one to the Appleton Home in Macon. Several branches of the Auxiliary wrote to me last fall stating their intention of sending boxes to Mrs. Barbour of Saluda, but so far I have heard nothing further from them. The total value of these boxes, exclusive of Juniors and Little Helpers, being \$403.00. I have written during the year 79 letters and 14 postal cards; and while the depressing financial conditions have made all Church Work unusually hard this year, I think most of the branches have responded nobly to the calls for boxes.

I find that some of the branches still prefer to select the place or person to whom they send their boxes, but on the whole the work has been done in a much more systematic way than last year, and the Box Secretary's work has been much more pleasant.

Quite a number of letters from the various branches of the Auxiliary have been sent to Sandersville, causing considerable delay in answering them, besides the risk of their not being forwarded to me. When I was first appointed two years ago, I was living in Sandersville and my address was in the annual report of that year; I think possibly that is why the letters were sent there.

I have the report of one branch of the Juniors who sent a box valued at \$50.00 to Saluda, N. C. The Little Helpers of the Church of the Atonement, Augusta, sent two Christmas boxes to Saluda and two Easter ones to La Grange, Ga. In reporting some of the work to the Mis-

sion House, N. Y., I mentioned the boxes (and their value) sent by the Little Helpers, and Miss Emery wrote to me asking if I had not over-valued the boxes, as she could not believe it possible such tiny children could send such valuable boxes. I sent her some of Miss Beaufort's letters to me, telling of the contents of these boxes and she was amazed. She said the Diocese of Georgia ought to be congratulated on the future church men and women who are being trained to work for missions in their most impressionable years by the directress of the Little Helpers of the Church of the Atonement in Augusta.

Miss Emery also said that the Woman's Auxiliary was responsible for so great a number of boxes, that they need the active help of every branch, and she asks us to do all in our power next year to encourage every branch of the Auxiliary in our Diocese to go to work regularly and systematically with all the Diocesan branches throughout the country.
