MINUTES

FIRST DAY

WEDNESDAY, April 24th, 1918, 9 A. M.

The Twenty-sixth Annual Meeting of the Georgia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary convened at St. John's Church, Bainbridge, on Wednesday morning, April 24th, 1918, at 9 o'clock.

The Rt. Rev. F. F. Reese, D. D., assisted by the Rev. Roberts P. Johnson, Vicar of St. John's, and the Rev. William B. Sams, Vicar of Christ Church, Cordele, celebrated the Holy Communion. The offering was devoted to the United Offering.

At the conclusion of the service the Auxiliary organized for business, Mrs. John K. McIver, Diocesan President, presiding. The meeting was opened with prayer and an address of welcome by the Rev. Roberts P. Johnson. The Bishop of the Diocese then made his annual address to the Auxiliary.

In the absence of the Corresponding Secretary, the Rev. W. B. Sams was requested to act as Secretary for the meeting.

Mrs. C. R. Graham, President of the Local Branch, extended a cordial welcome to Bainbridge and to the Albany Archdeaconry, to which Mrs. F. F. Reese made a very happy response.

The roll of delegates was called by the Secretary and the following were found to be present:

Mrs. A. H. Hilsman of Albany was also present as the Chairman of a Diocesan Committee.

Mrs. McIver read her annual address as President of the Auxiliary.

The Secretary then read, for information, the minutes of the last day's session of the previous annual meeting.

In the absence of the Treasurer, her Annual Report was read to the Convention and, on motion, was accepted with thanks to the Treasurer for her faithful work.

The annual report of Mrs. E. C. Blount as Treasurer of the United Offering was next submitted by Mrs. W. L. Ball, and, on motion, was accepted with the thanks of the Convention.

On motion the Secretary was requested to write a note of thanks to Mrs. DeVoe and Mrs. Blount, expressing the Convention's appreciation of their services and sincere regret at their unavowed absence from this meeting. On motion the President was requested to appoint the following members as the Committee on "Offering of Life": Mrs. E. C. Blount, Chairman; Miss Mary Cuthbert and Mrs. A. C. Haskell. This Committee was duly appointed.

Miss Mary Cuthbert, as President of the Junior Branch, submitted her annual report, which was accepted with thanks.

The annual report of Deaconess Boorman of the Boys' Home in Augusta was read by Miss Mary Cuthbert and showed splendid work being done.

Noonday prayers were said by Rev. W. B. Sams, after which the Convention took a recess until 2 o'clock.

WEDNESDAY, April 24th, 2 P. M.

The afternoon session was opened with prayer by Rev. Mr. Sams. The minutes of the morning session were read, corrected and confirmed.

The President appointed the following committees: Committee on Resolutions—Mrs. W. L. Ball, Chairman; Mrs. F. O. Tarver and Mrs. James Davenport. Committee on Nominations—Mrs. F. F. Reese, Chairman; Miss Wright and Mrs. Charles Tillman.

Mrs. Reese read the annual report of the President of the Little Helpers, which was received with thanks to the President, who was unavoidably absent.

The President read a letter which she had received from Mrs. H. E. Backus, President of the Little Helpers, expressing her regret at not being present, and tendering her resignation. On motion the resignation of Mrs. Backus was accepted with regret.

The President then asked for an expression of opinion from the delegates as to whether they favored the plan of the Auxiliary meeting at the same time and place with the Council, or holding separate meetings. There was much discussion on both sides, but it was voted to continue holding separate meetings.

After some discussion it was voted to publish the proceedings of this meeting in full, as was done last year, and the President was authorized to have the printing done.

Mrs. A. H. Hilsman, of Albany, Treasurer of the Fund for St. Agnes' School, Kyoto, submitted her report, which showed that \$80 was still needed to complete the amount promised from the Georgia Branch and voluntary pledges were called for and as a result \$30.00 more was pledged. (See list of pledges.)

The President appointed the Committee on Business as follows: Miss Eugenia Johnston, Chairman; Mrs. A. C. Haskell and Mrs. A. H. Hilsman.

The question as to whether or not the Georgia Branch was in favor of the plan of having women on the Board of Missions was brought up by the President, and after some little discussion on both sides a tentative vote was taken, showing a slight majority in favor of the plan; this question will come up for final action at the next annual convention.

The report of the Church General Hospital in Wuchang, China, was read by Miss Julia Wright of Thomasville and accepted.

A very interesting and encouraging letter from Mrs. Biller, of the Church Missions House, was read by the President.

The President called the attention of the Convention to that part of the Bishop's address in which he spoke of the needs of St. Athanasius's School for Negroes at Brunswick, and on motion it was decided to give \$100 through the American Church Institute for Negroes as a "special" for St. Athanasius School, and definite amounts were pledged towards this Fund by some of the Branches.

At 4 o'clock the meeting adjourned to accept the invitation of the local branch for an automobile ride around the city.

At 8:30 p. m. the Convention reassembled and heard a splendid and most interesting and helpful address from the Rev. Louis G. Wood, Field Secretary of the General Board of Missions.

SECOND DAY

THURSDAY, April 25th.

The Holy Communion was celebrated in St. John's Church at 7:00 a. m. by the Rev. Roberts P. Johnson.

At 9:00 a. m. the business was again resumed, the meeting being opened with prayer by the Rev. John D. Wing, Rector of Christ Church, Savannah.

The minutes of Wednesday afternoon's session were read, corrected and confirmed.

A motion was passed requesting the several branches to forward the money for the American Church Institute for Negroes to the Diocesan Treasurer, Mrs. DeVoe, and let her forward it to the proper party.

On motion the order of business was suspended for a few minutes to allow the Nominating Committee to make their report. Mrs. Reese read the report and the officers were elected as follows:

On motion it was decided to leave the matter of electing a President, Recording Secretary and Corresponding Secretary to a Special Committee, consisting of the Bishop, Mrs. McIver and Mrs. Reese.

The regular order of business was resumed and the Rev. J. D. Wing, of Christ Church, Savannah, delivered an address on the Missionary Work of the Church.

The annual reports of the Vice Presidents were then read and accepted.

Mrs. A. C. Haskell submitted her report as Educational Secretary, showing what had been done during the past year, and giving a brief outline of work to be done this year.

The next business was the election of delegates and alternates to the Provincial Synod in Louisville, Ky. The following were elected as delegates: The President, Mrs. F. F. Reese, Miss Mary Cuthbert and Mrs. A. H. Hilsman. Alternates: Mrs. A. B. Hull, Mrs. C. R. Graham, Miss Gertrude Coney and Mrs. Frank Walker.

The Committee on Resolutions read their report. (See report.)

On motion a rising vote of thanks was extended to the St. John's Church Branch for their gracious hospitality, and to Revs. L. G. Wood and J. D. Wing for their splendid addresses, and to the retiring President for her faithful and untiring work during the past year.

On motion the time and place for the next annual meeting was left in the hands of the Bishop and the President of the Auxiliary.

There being no further business, the meeting was closed by the Bishop of the Diocese with a few words of encouragement. The closing prayers and benediction were then said by the Bishop.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

Today finds the Georgia Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Board of Missions closing up twenty-six years of work. Last year we thought that the twenty-fifth year had passed swiftly—that year seems almost like a pleasant dream—now that our nation has just passed its first year in this war of horrors that is piercing into our hearts and homes and causing many of its anxious days to seem almost as long as a whole year of the past blessed times of peace.

On every side the challenge is to be courageous in this awful time of depression, by keeping busy and seeing to it that we work to a right purpose. All church workers are complaining of how war work is overshadowing the Master's work. This should not be the case. Church and Red Cross work should go hand in hand, and I suggest that each branch take up knitting or sewing, if they have not already done so, in connection with their Auxiliary work, and so aid the Red Cross.

Never before has our nation been so called on to give. This will be the case until the war ends. This fact puts a great lesson before us. If we "give until it hurts" to protect the human lives of our boys and allies—how do you think we ought to give to help save their spiritual lives, and those to whom God has willed for us to send the message of salvation?

We are being told that it is an honor and privilege to wear old clothes and hats—half-soled shoes and eat just what is allowed us, to help make the world safe for democracy. I endorse that heartily—but let's go home and tell our women that if we mean what we stand for we will also do this and more to make the world safe for everlasting peace. The testing time is upon us, let us wake up and pray God to give us a new vision of the world's real need—unselfish love—and seize greedily upon the many opportunities awaiting us.

Mr. McAdoo states in no uncertain words that we need money and have got to have it to win this war. Our Church Missions House says that they are falling behind in money and

have got to have it if we hope to keep our machinery running for world-wide evangelization. The war claims may seem more pressing now, but long before this war came the Church was here with the divine command of her Captain. A command that leaves nothing to our choice. Mr. Brown puts it thus—it is an order comprehensive and unequivocal, a clear, peremptory, categorical, imperative: "Go." This being the supreme thought of Christ for His followers, how dare we fail Him by sending an inadequate supply of money to the Board of Missions and to our faithful Bishop who so needs it in this diocese.

I am not complaining—you have done well—but I must urge more activity—will you not go home and be enthused to help enlist every woman, girl and child in your parish to pray, work and give to missions? Is the Red Cross contemplating a suspension of work this summer? Certainly not—then we should not for more than two months at most. Our soldiers on the firing line are depending on us to supply the ammunition to explode ignorance, superstition, selfishness and false pride—the very evils that brought this war to pass—we cannot—must not—rest easy in Zion.

Perhaps you are silently asking how I dare to ask anything more of this Branch, now when the cost of living is so high and war claims so great? It is not I, but the Master's work calling you and me to follow Him on to victory. The echo from Calvary's Cross has come down through the centuries and is so distinct in this year of our Lord 1918. "I gave my life, my all for thee, what hast thou given for me?" and "If you love me feed my sheep and lambs"—remember that the test of love is obedience.

It has been a source of great regret to me that several adverse circumstances prevented my visiting any of our branches the past year except those in Savannah.

We regret the loss of Miss Norma Palmer in her removal from this diocese. You will remember her as Diocesan Secretary "Spirit of Missions" for several years past. I am glad

to announce our good fortune in securing in her stead Mrs. I. A. Sims of Savannah, a much interested and earnest young woman. She has already asked each branch to elect a secretary to secure subscriptions in their respective parishes, remember that for each new subscription our United Offering gets 25 cents to its credit. Encourage your new secretary by getting all the subscribers possible to this splendid monthly source of missionary information.

Bishop Edward S. Osborne, now of Savannah, offered his services to the Auxiliary anywhere within reasonable reach during the Synod in Charleston, November last. I am glad to report two Quiet Day Services for Savannah, one for Augusta and one for Brunswick, conducted by him. This year past Savannah had one of these days during the last week of the Pilgrimage of Prayer, at which time a neat sum was raised for St. Agnes' School, Kyoto, Japan. I cannot say too much of the value to any parish that is fortunate enough to have a "Quiet Day Service" conducted by this saintly man of God, his teaching and leading is beyond compare. If possible, let each "District," at least, arrange for one.

There is a great cry from the four quarters of our Branch saying how much our women need and desire information about the work. A great opportunity lies at our door for all to gain this information—send delegates to Blue Ridge Conference that they may learn how, and gain the inspiration for spreading this necessary information over the diocese. Atlanta Branch has promised Miss Hunter to try and send ten delegates there this summer—we should send at least four—one from each district. One of our women has offered \$25.00, another \$10.00 for this purpose. Try to get your rector to see what a help such work would be in his parish and doubtless he will help you raise funds for one delegate. Talk about it to members of your parish, ask God to open their hearts and they will help.

One cannot learn to sing, sew or knit unless they practice same—and to know how to pray, work or give of ourselves or money, one must practice the doing of each constantly, dili-

gently. Women of the Auxiliary, let us see to it that nothing interferes with our practice of God's methods! Christians are being weighed in the balance as never before—if Auxiliary women fail to hold up the high standards of Christian life now, of whom can our bishops and priests expect it? God help us to measure up to our responsibilities.

War work calls for the annihilation of self—certainly the Master's work does—the question is, will we put self aside? Our women will be called on, doubtlessly, to make sacrifice after sacrifice for our country and we are glad to do all that we can for her, but I call on you to let first things come first. Take the step faith points out and fearlessly take hold of any new work and ideas that seem good to you during this meeting. To stand still will not do—one step forward, at least, must be taken—so let us adopt the recent motto of a sister branch—"God and Our Country," and let our prayer be:

Teach us, O Father, to serve Thee as Thou deservest; to give and not count the cost; to fight and not to heed the wounds; to toil and not to seek for rest; labour and not to ask for any reward, save that of knowing that we do Thy Will.
